



IN 1972 OVER 12,000 CHILDREN under the age of fifteen were killed or injured in road accidents in London alone-an increase of 2,000 on the previous year. In Great Britain last year over 64,000 children were injured-896 of them died.

Consequently, it is rather appropriate that Magpie on Friday of this week is devoted solely to road safety—in the form of the Magpie Challenge Trophy. Competing for this annual trophy will be two teams; representing the County of Durham is the Blaydon Comprehensive School from the Tyne Valley, whilst the Greater London area is represented by

the Nork Park County Secondary School, from Banstead in Surrey.

Both teams have five members (four to play and one as reserve)—the Blaydon school have three girls and one boy against the four boys of the Nork Park team. So it's almost boys versus girlsnot to mention North versus South.

Both teams have won their way through to this final by winning their own county competition. The Blaydon team came out as winners in their competition which was organised by the Durham Police Traffic Department; and the Banstead team by winning the Metropolitan Police Clearway Trophy.


To do well in any competition requires a great deal of hard work and also, in some cases some sacrifices. Lunch hours are spent studying the Highway Code when friends are having a good time; one boy-Mark Jones from the Blaydon Comprehensive School has even turned down a week's holiday in Norway with his parents in order not to miss this final!





GEORGE, RINGO, JOHN





RINGO

It was Ringo Starr who put the Beat into Beatles. And although the ex-drummer is still drumming (he appeared in George's sensational Bangla Desh concert), writing (he wrote his hit single 'Back Off Boogaloo'), and recording sessions with his friends for their own releases, his main interests now are designing furniture and making films. Ringo's designs, mostly made from steel, have been twice exhibited at Liberty's in London's Regent Street. His most famous item is a coffee table with the ends made from Rolls-Royce radiators which sold for £1,400. People used to be able to afford Rolls with their coffee. But Ringo's not proud. He made a table for his Apple office from an old manhole cover he found in George's garden.

Apart from his film acting roles (as opposed to his coffee table Rolls) Ringo has made a film called 'Blind Man' which the British film censors think is too violent to be given a certificate, and of course his film of Marc Bolan's concert 'Born To Boogie'. But his latest film is called 'Count Downe' and stars friend Harry Nilsson as a sort of hippy Dracula and Ringo himself as Merlin the Magician. Ringo is worth his weight in gold—but then he always had a nose for business.


(A BRIEF BREAKDOWN OF POST-BREAK-UP BEATLE BEHAVIOUR)


In 1970 the most famous pop band of all time split up. What have the Fab Four been doing since? Will they ever get back together? Look-in traces the Beatles' separate activities since 1970 and makes a prophecy about the future.

GEORGE

Voted top male vocalist in 1971 (as John was the following year) George Harrison has gone on to gain a mighty reputation as a solo artist. Like John and Paul who have both written songs about the trouble in Northern Ireland (and been banned by the BBC for being so naughty) George has, since the Beatles split, become interested in what's going on in the world. In 1970 he became involved with the Hare Krishna movement and his single 'My Sweet Lord' was one of the results.

But his greatest social achievement was the concert he gave in aid of the children of Bangla Desh with Ringo, Dylan, Leon Russell, and sitar player Ravi Shankar. The concert, the album of the concert, and the film of the concert raised no less than £6,000,000 for the refugees. The single 'Bangla Desh' came out in July 1971, and in June this year 'Give Me Love' was released. His albums have been 'All Things Must Pass' (November '70), the Bangla Desh album (January '72), and now 'Living In The Material World'.







In 1970 Paul McCartney shocked and saddened the pop world by leaving the Beatles because of a dispute over management. Now another change in management has made the possibility of a Beatles' reunion more likely than it has been for three years—and Paul seems to be the one who's quietly pushing towards it. After the split it was sometime before Paul regained his confidence, but then with the formation of his band 'Wings', Paul got back in his stride. With a TV spectacular under his belt and a 'Wings' album 'Red Rose Speedway' recently released, things are looking good. Paul has also been busy writing the now familiar theme for the latest James Bond film 'Live And Let Die'. It was Paul who split with the Beatles, but when he was asked recently about their getting back together he said, "Providing everything was all right and planned properly, I can't think of any reason why they shouldn't."





BEATLE REUNION

Recently an album has been recorded with all four Beatles featuring on different tracks. Will they reunite? Apart from Paul's comments recorded above he also said in May, "We may do one or two projects together although we will not tour." Last December, Ringo said: "We're together again. Not as a band. We're not going to be a band again." And in November, John said: "None of us would ever think of playing together again until somebody asked us." Look-in's guess is that they will record with each other and for each other—but there will never be a Beatles band again. That's cool. You get more for your money the way it is.

New Prisoners in the Tower



The Tower of London has held many famous prisoners since it was founded, traditionally, by Julius Caesar about 2,000 years ago. (Although Caesar's part in the business is a legend, it's certain that the White Tower, completed under the Normans in about 1097 A.D., was built on the remains of a Roman fortification). But the new 'prisoners' who may arrive there this summer needn't fear that they'll share the fate of Sir Thomas More, Anne Boleyn or Sir Walter Raleigh—who all lost their heads on Tower Hill!

For the new arrivals will be joining a small and privileged company. They'll find friends of their own kind waiting to welcome them: 'Merry', 'Hectora', 'Kala II', 'Jarvey', 'Crora', 'Jet' and 'Grogg'. In case you haven't already guessed, these are the *ravens* who share the duty of guarding the Tower with the 'beefeaters'.

Maybe you've read newspaper reports about the raven chicks rescued in Anglesey, after their nest had been destroyed and their parents driven off by vandals. It's not absolutely certain—at the time of writing—if these chicks will go to the Tower: the Governor of the Tower intends to consult the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, to see whether the young birds would have a chance of survival in the wild, before taking them on to his staff.

The raven, a member of the crow family, is now quite rare in Britain—although it is hoped that the population, mainly concentrated in south-west England and Wales, and notably, on the Scottish Islands, is now increasing once more. You'll have little trouble recognising a raven if you're lucky enough to see one in the wild: it is much larger than a crow or rook, with a massively powerful beak and glossy black plumage with a purple sheen.

The raven's Latin name, corvus corax, sounds as ugly as its harsh croaking cry. The bird has an ugly reputation, too: its English name comes from the belief that, as an eater of carrion, it made a habit of following armies marching to battle, in order to 'raven' (to feast greedily) on the bodies of the slain! The bird's popularity can't have been helped by the fact that the banner of the Danes who terrorised Saxon Britain was a raven-embroidered flag carried at the head of their armies.

In fact, the raven—which feeds on small mammals as well as carrion—is an extremely intelligent bird. Like the parrot and jackdaw, it makes an affectionate and faithful pet—and can be taught to 'talk'. But don't get too familiar with the 'tame' ravens at the Tower of London: 'They know me well," a warder who feeds the Tower ravens their regular ration of raw meat told LOOK-IN—"but I wouldn't advise anyone else to try to handle them!"

You might be interested to know that the ravens have been there *longer* than the Tower itself. What is now the East End of London was once a great forest, and when men first began to build there, the fortifications attracted the ravens who saw them as good nesting-sites. So closely are ravens connected with the Tower that there is a belief that if they fly away, the Tower will crumble to dust!

Not that 'Merry' and company are likely to leave . . . even if their flight pinions were not clipped to discourage them from taking wing. They have too good a life, with the admiration of thousands of tourists every year. A long life, too (although stories of ravens living for over a century are just fables).








