



# JOLLYHOOKBYSTICKS!

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

# THE FLYING DUTCHMEN!







# MUSHROOM AND PASTA SOUP

(serves 4-6)



1 onion

4 rashers bacon

125g (4oz.) button mushrooms

1 stock cube

25g (1oz.) butter

25g (1oz.) flour

300ml ( pint) milk

salt and pepper

# 425g (15oz.) can spaghetti in tomato sauce

Skin and chop the onion. Cut the rind off the bacon and chop the rashers. Wipe the mushrooms and slice them. Boil 300ml ( $\frac{1}{2}$  pint) of water, crumble the stock cube into it and stir until it has dissolved. Melt the butter in a frying pan and fry the onion and bacon gently for a few minutes. Stir in the flour and cook for 1 minute. Gradually stir in the stock and milk. Add the mushrooms and salt and pepper and simmer (keep the heat low so that it doesn't boil) for 15 minutes. Stir in the canned spaghetti and heat through. Serve with small crusty rolls or fingers of toast.

orget those nasty rumours you've heard that, in the wake of the New Wave, the supergroups have had their day.

Queen's loyal subjects would like you to know that Queen and Freddie Mercury reign supreme. And who's to argue with that when, on their British tour before Christmas, Queen played to record crowds? In Birmingham, for example, their show was the largest standing indoor concert ever in Britain — 14,000 of the faithful crammed into the National Exhibition Centre to pay homage.

With their absences from the British charts being rare — the latest single, Save Me, is another big seller — it's hard to believe that the group have been at the top for eight years, since their first album Queen in 1973. Few bands can sustain that kind of popularity for three years let alone eight. But Queen have evolved as the classic, electric rock band, shrewdly switching from one style to another (often in the same song). Queen are masters of impromptu, often abrupt changes in mood, tempos and sound levels.

The band came together ten years ago, when they were still at college. Brian May (guitar) and Roger Taylor (drums) had been with a band called Smile, before enlisting the unique Freddie Mercury. They spent six months auditioning bass players until they found the right one — John Deacon.

There were no public performances then, just occasional concerts before select audiences of friends. For 18 months, the band worked on their act until they could go out with the highly polished show which was to rock the world.

If you dream of being a star, Queen are an object lesson in how to make it in the cut-and-thrust rock business. There was no big management behind Queen in the beginning - just the band and John Harris, their trusty roadie and sound mixer. Various friends were pulled in to work on light shows (very basic in those days) and design the outlandish costumes for which Queen are now notorious.

The band laid down their first record tracks at the DeLane Lea Studios in London, and the four demo tapes led to a contract with EMI and heavy promotion for Queen. The album turned out to be a killer — Queen became Glam-Rock's heroes overnight.

Freddie Mercury is outrageous in concert. He has a taste for strutting about the stage in skin-tight leather and sunglasses or sequinned jumpsuits — in 1980 it's easy to forget that Freddie was one of the first to create this visual image — a fantasy — and he lived up to it.

His posturing gyrations soon had audiences at his feet. A strong front man with a bunch of excellent musicians — the formula couldn't fail.


In 1974, their single Seven Seas of Rhye topped the charts, and then Killer Queen went gold in the States.


Their greatest achievement is still probably the ambitious Bohemian Rhapsody — not so much a single, but more an epic which actually had the nerve to quote opera among its four movements. The single stayed at No 1 for seven weeks, something which hadn't happened with any other single for six years.

We Are The Champions/We Will Rock You shot to No 2 here and No 1 in the States, France, Holland, Israel, South Africa and Brazil.

In eight years, Queen's audience has grown from a handful of people in a small London lecture theatre to multiple sell-outs of 20,000-seater venues like the Los Angeles Forum, New York's Madison Square and Tokyo's Budokan. In 1976, they played to a staggering number of fans — 150,000 in Hyde park.

→ The last tour saw Queen playing much smaller venues. "We decided we should actually visit the people again," says Brian. "Unless the fans see you in their own towns, it can almost seem that you don't exist. Having done the big barns, it's nice to be somewhere where they can actually see and hear you."

The smaller halls have meant fewer seats for fans, but Queen are happy that the quality of the show has improved — more ingenious light shows, better sound.

Queen are continuously developing imaginative stage props and back-drops. The "crown" which was introduced at their Earls Court show three years ago was modified for touring and is said to be the largest ever made. Cleverly designed to conceal a special light show, this prop is 20ft high, 5ft wide, 46ft deep, and, weighing 5000lbs, must be the roadie's nightmare.

When not on the road, or in a studio, Queen even help to design their own album covers. Freddie designed the Queen crest himself for A Night At The Opera and A Day At The Races, while Roger had positive ideas about the News of the World Sleeves.

Brian and Roger are both compulsive science-fiction fans and Roger remembered an old magazine illustration showing a giant robot with a bloodstained finger, holding a limp man. They traced the illustrator, Frank Kelly Freas, to Virginia. Although Freas had done the illustration in 1953, he agreed to redesign it for Queen. It's little, original touches like that which helped make Queen into a supergroup.

In spite of their chart success, Queen tell you that they don't see themselves as "a singles band", although they realise that their forty-fives have brought many of you to them, and they're grateful.

The last single, Crazy Little Thing Called Love, was one of several songs recorded at Munich's Musicland Studios after their summer European tour. The sessions were the first time the band had been able to record them without the pressure of deadlines - a new freedom for them, resulting in even broader creativity. Another track recorded then was Save Me — their latest hit single

Although being essentially a live band, Queen are also an accomplished studio group. So much so that with the money their highly successful Jazz album brought them, they bought their own studio in Switzerland.

The studio's profits go back into the long-term development of Queen — in tours and making films. Queen were one of the first to see the potential in the Video Revolution, and the Bohemian Rhapsody video, made for TV, is now a rock classic.

They're are currently recording their new album for release in the summer. Having witnessed the success of their previous albums, no-one can deny that it's destined to be a hit even before it's released.

The band have outpaced the changing styles of fashion and musical tastes, always being ready to try something new and exotic, however outrageous, always with an element of surprise.

Queen don't intend to be deposed for a long while yet...







Suddenly, the male dominated world of rock music is filled with the

sound of girls' talk . . .

Debbie Harry is the undoubted reason for Blondie's success, Chrissie Hynde has taken The Pretenders to number one in both the singles and album charts and Annie Lennox is emerging as the focal point of The Tourists.

But there is one girl who paved the way for this new generation of female front people — and she is also enjoying the current trend by scoring high in the charts herself. Suzi Quatro.

Suzi started playing bass guitar 15 years ago, but she first found fame when she left her native Detroit to come to Britain in 1973 - and promptly had six successive chart smashes, including Can The Can, Devil Gate

Drive and 48 Crash.

She has recently been in the charts again with If You Can't Give Me Love, She's In Love With You and Mamma's Boy - and she has proved that she has a natural ability as an actress, by winning a part in the top ITV show Happy Days, playing opposite the heart throb of millions of girls, Henry Winkler.

"I think that it is a fad at the moment to have girls in bands. It will come and go like all the other crazes," Suzi told Look-in reporter John Palmer.

"I'm still around after seven years because I don't think that I am a fad. It's interesting to see our audience when we play, because we have whole families coming.

She really rocked the pop world when she

There had never been anyone like her before, and she had to be extra confident and aggressive to prove to the men that she was as good as they were. It was because of that image that she landed her role in Happy Days.

looking for someone to play a kind of female Fonz, tough on the outside but soft underneath. She is called Leather Tuscadero, and she's an 18-year-old just out of reform school. who is the Fonz's friend. She's also one of the few women who can make the normally confident Fonz a little wary — it's a really meaty

"They had auditioned lots of actresses, but could not find what they wanted so they decided to start looking at singers, and my old agent in America told them about me, sent a picture and they asked me to audition. When they met me, they said 'that's the girl' and I got the part.'

She had never done any acting before, but she was used to working on television because she had appeared so often with her band, yet she was a little nervous of her first

dramatic appearance.

"I was not frightened by the cameras, but as far as the acting went, I just watched everyone else, and asked them if they could help me out. They were all marvellous to me . . . and working with Henry was so easy because he's such a nice person. He's only small, like me, and we get on really well together and have a lot of fun making the programmes.

"So far I have appeared in eleven episodes I'm learning more all the time about acting, and I suppose that singing on stage is a per-

formance in the same kind of way.

Suzi was due to go back to America to record some more Happy Days episodes at Christmas, but was too busy to go then, although she'll be crossing the Atlantic again soon to appear in another series.

"One thing about the show which is really great is the way the audience get behind the characters. You know when they whistle and cheer, that's all for real, they aren't prompted or anything, and it certainly adds to the atsomething suitable."

Did she feel that being in Happy Days had boosted her singing career, because until recently she had been going through a quiet period in Britain?

"I suppose everyone's career goes through ups and downs, but although we had a quiet time in Britain, some of the songs we released were very big hits everywhere else.


"There was one year, 1976-77, when we took a break from working with Mike Chapman and Nicky Chinn, who wrote the singles, because we felt that we needed time off - but now we're back together again. They have the knack of coming up with good pop songs ... although Mamma's Boy is one of my own!" she said.

"Being in Happy Days can't be a bad thing, but If You Can't Give Me Love was a hit here before anyone had seen me in Happy Days, so I suppose everything helped everything else.'

Whatever inspired the revival, Suzi has certainly been kept busy. "There are the Happy Days recordings to do, and we are planning to tour Britain in either the spring or the summer. We also have to record another album, and we are busy writing songs for that. Mike and Nicky write the singles, but most of the album material is our own, so you can see that it's going to be a busy year."
