

I've got a mixture of musical styles for you this week, kicking off with some great country sounds. 16 Number One Country Hits Volume 2, on the CBS label. features well-known songs from some of the biggest names in the music business. including Tammy Wynette's D.I.V.O.R.C.E., El Paso City by Marty Robbins. One Piece At A Time, by Johnny Cash and Candy Kisses by George Morgan.

Also from CBS is the latest album from Billy Joel, Glass Houses. His last two albums, The Stranger and 52nd Street, sold nearly ten million copies and now this one looks to be heading in the same direction. It contains ten new songs, with

words and music by Billy himself, including his recently released single All For Leyna and B-side of it Close To The Borderline.

This Is Soul, on the Atlantic label, is exactly what the title says. A popular re-release, it features twelve tracks from some of the most established performers of soul music, including Mustang Sally from Wilson Pickett, When A Man Loves A Woman from Percy Sledge and Knock On Wood from Eddie Floyd.

Finally we come to one of the great masters of rock 'n' roll, Chuck Berry. Mods & Rockers (Chess) is a live recording of many of his famous hit numbers.







Each competitor will normally walk the course at least three times before he or she is absolutely sure how he, or she, will tackle it. A knowledge of the geography of the course will tell the rider just how fast he should complete the course without, ideally, picking up any penalty points, and tiring the horse too much. The second walk is usually the longest, taken with a companion to discuss and work

companion, to discuss and work out how the fences are to be jumped. Some of these require a great deal of thought, especially the water. The final walk helps to finalise the exact route that horse and rider will take. Richard Meade (right) even tests the depth of the lake at Badminton!




HE first Badminton Horse Trials were held in 1949 and to this day remain the major Spring Trials in the Eventing calendar.

Coming early in the year as it does. Badminton is used to determine which horses and riders are best fitted to go on to represent Great Britain in the major International Trials that year. This year, with the Moscow Olympics in mind, the organisers aimed to make it that little bit more demanding of both horse and rider.

Most stables begin to prepare their horses for Badminton in early January. The build-up is slow but sure, with plenty of walking and trotting on roads and up and down the local hills, the emphasis always on building up stamina.

Whilst it is the spectacular cross country course that tends to capture the attention of the general public we must not forget that dressage and show-jumping play an equally important part in the Trials. For this is what the sport is all about, recognising the values of speed, endurance, obedience, and mobility in the horse, as typified in Paul Revere's Ride, back in 1775, when the American set off around the New England countryside, alerting his fellow countrymen, and the local leaders, that the British troops were coming!







CRISPY STUFF

(makes about 20 squares)



2 Mars bars

75g (3oz.) margarine

15ml (1 tablespoon) golden syrup

75g (3oz.) Rice Krispies

Roughly chop the Mars bars. Place in a large saucepan with the margarine and golden syrup. Heat gently until the Mars bars and margarine have melted. Remove from the heat and gently stir in the Rice Krispies until they are well coated. Turn the mixture into a lightly-greased shallow, oblong baking tray, press mixture down and level the top. Leave to cool and cut into squares.



NTIL a few weeks ago, that rascally old scarecrow Worzel Gummidge thought that the Top Ten were the acres on Ten Acre field where he lives.

Now he knows differently. For Jon Pertwee, who plays the unlikely hero of the extremely popular Southern Television comedy series, soared as high as the crows he is supposed to scare with a song much more appealing than the crows' call — Worzel's Song.

It is the latest novelty record to capture the imagination of mums and dads as well as yourselves, and no-one was more surprised by the disc's success then Jon himself.

In fact, he was not even aware that the song had made Worzel a pop star as well as a famous television personality. He was on holiday taking a well-deserved rest after the end of the filming of the second Worzel series, and his gruelling pantomime season as King Satupon in Jack and the Beanstalk at Croydon.

"When my wife Ingeborg and I arrived back at the airport we were greeted by some press photographers, who told us that the song was in the charts," said Jon.

"It was an amazing but very pleasant shock. I couldn't believe it. I thought that the song might be popular, but I never expected this reaction."

Yet there does seem to be an eager audience for good novelty records, because at the same time that Worzel was rising in the charts, actor Keith Michell was enjoying incredible popularity with the Beaky Freakies and his tale of Captain Beaky, while a few weeks before, that school choir who adopted the name The Ramblers flew to dizzy heights with The Sparrow.

Occasionally, similar unexpected chart success has come for equally unusual releases, and they've brought a touch of zany

humour to a sometimes-too-serious pop chart.


Benny Hill, whose comedy shows have just brought him enormous numbers of fans in America, reached the top of the charts in 1971 with his tale of Ernie (The Fastest Milkman In The West), and a few years earlier he had been in the charts with a comedy caper called Harvest of Love.

The Goons crept into the Top Ten twenty-five years ago with the Ying Tong Song, a record which is still regularly played on request programmes, and goon Peter Sellers had us all laughing a few years later with two more comedy classics — Any Old Iron and (with Sophia Loren) Goodness Gracious

Another comedian, Charlie Drake, rebounded into the charts in the early 1960s with My Boomerang Won't Come Back and Mike Sarne had all our sympathy when he tried to persuade Wendy Richard (who, years later, was to become Miss Brahms of Are You Being Served?) to Come Outside in 1962.

More recently, Arthur Mullard and Hilda Baker told each other You're The One That I Want, and found themselves following John Travolta and Olivia Newton John into the best sellers' lists, Laurel and Hardy set out on The Trail of the Lonesome Pine, Ray Stevens giggled about the latest craze of the time, The Streak, and Lonnie Donegan told us My Old Man's A Dustman, while The Cats told of their adventures at Luton Airport. And, of course, we shouldn't forget The Smurfs, who, with Father Abraham, had hits with The Smurf Song and Dippety Day.

But how did Jon Pertwee come to record Worzel's Song? He explained: "The theme music became popular during the first series of Worzel Gummidge last year, and it was during that first series that Worzel put on his singing head in one episode to teach his friends John and Sue how to speak Worzelese, the language of scarecrows, using that theme tune.







instructive song, but when we thought of doing a record, I thought that the verses should deal with the characters in the television programme. So I got together with George Evans, my writer, and we came up with Worzel's Song.

Worzek Gümmidge and a dashing, shiny car? Somehow the two don't match.

"It's about Worzel, and he sings about himself and the things that he does. I would think that the character of Worzel would be befuddled by the song's success, and if he understood it he would be very pleased."

Jon is also very pleased, because it is his first chart success and although he is not sure if there will be another Worzel single, there will definitely be an LP.

"Worzel is going back into the studios to record an album of all new songs," said Jon, who predicted that the LP will be out later this year.

"I have also recorded cassettes of the Worzel Gummidge adventures, on which I play all the parts, with different voices," said Jon, "and they will be available soon."

Work also begins soon on filming the third series of Worzel adventures, and there are plans to repeat the first series of Worzel Gummidge — so if you missed his television debut you will be able to catch up with them.

One pleasing aspect of the series for Jon is the number of his showbusiness friends who have asked him if they could appear in it.

Already Bill Maynard — best known as Selwyn Froggitt — Barbara Windsor from the Carry On gang and John Le Mesurier from Dad's Army have all enjoyed playing guest roles.

And Worzel will be on stage at the Birmingham Repertory Theatre with his own Christmas Show in December.

Turning Barbara Euphan Todd's storybook character into a television personality was an idea that Jon had nursed for years, and now he feels justifiably proud of Worzel's achievements.

As for Worzel himself, his efforts to move into new pastures have opened a completely new field for him. But will it impress Aunt Sally?



ost bands would love to be sure that they were always playing to full houses, being mobbed in the street, asked for autographs and having chart-topping records.

But all those signs of success are proving more of a hindrance than a help to The Jam, as John Palmer discovered when he spoke to the band recently.

Paul Weller, Bruce Foxton and Rick Buckler have been together as The Jam for four years, and they could honestly be said to have been ahead of their time.

Paul, the band's guitarist, singer and main inspiration, was a devoted follower of early sixties Mod bands like The Kinks and The Who — and much of the early criticism of The Jam was based around Paul's similarity in style to Pete Townshend of The Who.

The Jam were Mod when it was fashionable to be punk. Now that the Mod revival has grown in strength, The Jam have moved on.

"I don't think that the Mod revival has helped us very much, although we do get Mods in our audiences," said Paul. "We wouldn't describe ourselves as Mod, anyway. We don't make a conscious attempt to exclude anyone from our music, or to be at the front of any kind of musical movement. Our music is developing and moving on all the time."

In terms of wide appeal, they progressed enormously with the smash hit single Eton Rifles, which, up to their latest release, Going Underground, is the biggest hit they have ever had, even though previous singles, like Down In The Tube Station at Midnight and The Modern World reached the charts.

Yet that hit brought them unexpected problems, as bass player Bruce Foxton ex-22 plained: "On the tour we did before Christ-

mas, we found that a lot of people were coming to see us just because we were in the charts, but they didn't know who we were, or anything about our music.

"Some people even asked us where the fourth member of the band was! We can do without that.

Paul agreed: "We hope that the people who want to see us know what our music is about and can understand what we are saying. I'd prefer it if they did not come at all, if they aren't going to listen.


"If they only want autographs because we are a chart band, then I wish they wouldn't bother. I'd like you to put that in print, because you would be doing us a favour.

"We don't mind talking to anyone if they are really interested in talking to us not as just another hit group, but as The Jam.'

They proved that point on the tour, because when they found a group of genuine fans who had been waiting at the stage door for hours to see them arrive, they invited them inside to listen to the rehearsal before the show.

They also brought backstage some other fans who had not been able to get tickets for the concert, and Paul spent a long time chatting to them.

What is it that The Jam want us to hear in



their music? Their songs often show a despair about the class system in this country, which — according to The Jam — allows no hope for the poor.

"Most of our albums have had a theme running through them, but they are not concept albums. Setting Sons, our latest, isn't a concept album, but the songs relate to each other in some ways, and Smithers-Jones, which was written by Bruce, fits in with the others.

"Maybe our songs are pessimistic and offer little hope — but they are honest and real. If you don't remain honest, you can end up with something like Vera Lynn singing There'll Be Bluebirds Over the White Cliffs of Dover — that was one of the biggest lies of all time. Thing's weren't all going to turn out alright in the end." That's Paul's view, anyway.

The Jam's ideas on a civil war in Britain in the future, as presented on **Setting Sons** certainly is not a cover up, with its frankness about the horror and brutality of war.

"We don't say that we have the answers, but we try to show the problems. We are not going to change the world, but we do think that certain barriers need to be broken down, "said Paul.

That is why success causes unexpected problems for the band. The very fact that they have been elevated to star status means that they are pushed away from their grass roots identification with their fans — by those very fans themselves.

Drummer Rick was serious when he said: "A lot of bands would thrive on what's happening to us now, but it's not what we want at all.

all.
"We've been offered all kinds of things, like films about a local band making good, but we don't want anything like that either."
But as Paul says: "We get lots of girls

But as Paul says: "We get lots of girls grabbing us now, and screaming during live shows. How can we break out of a system which allows that to happen?"

Jam's Success

If the normal ideas of success do not appeal to The Jam, what would they regard as 'success'?

"Getting a record in the top ten isn't everything. If we can break down the star system, that would be success, because we would be doing something really important," said Paul. "At the end of the day, I'd like to think that we had actually achieved something."

Rick chipped in: "I think the more successful you become in the public's eye, the more difficult it becomes to keep to your ideals, and you are treated in a way that people like to see their heroes treated."

Record companies take a lot of the blame for that from the whole band, because of the kind of publicity campaigns they mount to promote particular groups.


"We have a good relationship with our record company, Polydor, because they have not tried that with us, and it's not been too bad. I'm pleased to see all the small labels emerging now. That's very good," said Bruce. "We've been thinking of doing something about starting our own label, but it's getting the time to do it which is the problem."

Finding time is a difficulty which has beset them since they gained widespread popularity. They recorded **Setting Sons**, immediately went on an extensive British tour, then returned to the studios to record the new single, before going off on an American tour.

"When we first went to America, they didn't understand what our songs were about. We never got anyone from Harlem or areas like that coming to our gigs. In Britain the kids from the poor areas do come, and they know what we are talking about.

"Now in America there is more response and appreciation of what we are saying," said Paul

Of course, if The Jam become enormous stars over there, too, they will have to face even greater problems . . .


