

The day before you can see Arrivals, three more familiar faces return to the ITV screens - James Bolam, Peter Bowles and Christopher Strauli in the second series of Yorkshire's Only When I Laugh. And, as the programme's writer Eric Chappell told Look-in: "It's just about the happiest show I've ever worked on, despite all the ill-health around!"

Only When I Laugh is set, of course, in a hospital ward with three nervy patients getting on each other's — and everyone else's nerves. Said Eric: "They're developing beautifully, because they're all great actors. I really enjoy writing series like this, because it gives me the chance to develop characterisations the little foibles, the family backgrounds. I never really like the idea of writing a single play, because you don't have the time to develop characters.

"I thought a lot of people totally misunderstood the first series of Only When I Laugh. A lot of critics weren't too happy with it, and said it fed on a lot of the old situation comedy ideas. But the point is, when people go into hospital, all the obvious 'bedpan' humour jokes are brought up, because being in hospital is a really earthy place to be."

Some of the earthy situations that are brought into play for this series include a

midnight dance held in the ward, the arrival of an old, eccentric - and rich - patient, a desperate christening, and the effects of smoking on the 'bedfellows'.

"Stories come just from single words that I write on a piece of paper," said Eric. "I'll jot down something like 'Vicar' or 'Superstition' and build up from there. In Only When I Laugh, it doesn't matter if the patients get all their medical references wrong, because most patients tend to diagnose their problems incorrectly anyway ...



gramme. It's a look at exciting performers doing what they're best at . . . entertaining.

"I did Opportunity Knocks for nine years, and I know what effect the pressures of competition can have on performers. It can ruin their act. So when I was asked to do a talent show this time around, I said, 'yes, but no panels, no competitive element, no frontman.' Showbiz is big enough without competition, and we're giving relative beginners a chance to show their ability without fear."

Arrivals has a different format, too. "It's a fast show," said Royston, "we're making the acts move quickly to give viewers maximum enjoyment.


"There are seven acts on each show — the second Arrivals isn't until a bit later — and the artists who will appear in the second show play 'minor roles' in the first, while the headliners in the first will be supporting in the second.'


And the acts have the benefit of a longer stint in the spotlight then they would be allowed on other shows. Says Royston: "An artist will sing, tell jokes, dance, do a whole routine, and then fade into the crowd, to be replaced by another act. We've made the background crowd seem as though they're at the arrivals lounge of an international airport, hence the name of the show."

Royston went on to enthuse again at the behind-the-scenes friendliness of Arrivals.




This week Brian looks at one of soccer's unsung heroes . . . Southampton's Phil Boyer.







If you're a regular viewer of ATV's Saturday morning show Tiswas (it's on in most areas from 10.30 to 12.30), then you'll know that it's not uncommon to see a succession of custard pies whizz across the studio and end their journey on some unfortunate and unsuspecting person's face! If you've ever fancied taking out your frustrations on someone in a similar way, I don't suggest using real custard tarts — it's such a waste because they're far nicer to eat. So here I've given you two custard pie recipes: one is for the throwing kind, made to the exact specifications of the Phantom Flan Flinger, and the other is so delicious it's definitely not recommended for use as a face pack. As Chris Tarrant might put it: THIS IS WHAT YOU WANT..!



CUSTARD PIES-TO THROW

YOU WILL NEED.

a cardboard plate

shaving foam

food colouring

piping bag and star nozzle

Spray a layer of white shaving soap foam onto the plate. 'lace some foam into a bowl and add a few drops of food colouring, mix well. Spread this coloured foam over the layer of white foam. Fit the star nozzle to the piping bag, spray some foam into the bag and pipe large rosettes on the top. The final stage is the best part: choose your target, take aim and . . . SPLAT! Be careful, though — they're very messy!

CUSTARD TART-TO EAT

(serves 6)

198g (7oz.) packet frozen shortcrust pastry


3 large eggs, size 2

40g (1½oz.) caster sugar

300ml (+ pint) milk

pinch of nutmeg

Thaw the pastry at room temperature for about 2 hours. Roll out the pastry to a round 23cm (9 inches) in diameter. Place it over a 20.5cm (8 inch) flan dish, press down well into the base and sides of the dish and trim off any excess pastry by carefully rolling the rolling pin over the top of the flan dish. Stand the flan dish on a baking tray. Break the eggs into a bowl, add the sugar and stir together until well mixed. Add the milk and mix together. Pour the mixture through a sieve into the pastry case. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake in the centre of the oven at 220 deg. C. (425 deg. F.) or gas mark 7 for 10 minutes then reduce the heat to 180 deg. C. (350 deg. F.) or gas mark 4 for a further 20 minutes. The custard should be set and the pastry golden brown. Cool before serving.



AKING waves in the charts at this moment are The Nolans . . . and when you look at their family musical tree, it's easy to see why they're not all at

musical tree, it's easy to see why they're not all at sea about showbusiness!

As an act, the Nolan Sisters have been singing together in their own right since 1974. In that short space of time, they have established themselves as one of the most dynamic groups around, and, needless to say, one of the most in-demand, for bill-topping appearances on television and in concert and cabaret.

But, of course, that's not all. In recent months, they have also emerged as quite a force-to-be-reckoned-with in the British Hit Parade, enjoying a lot of success with such singles as Spirit, Body And Soul and I'm In The Mood For Dancing, which became a top three chart-buster a couple of months ago. Now, with Don't Make Waves, the five young ladies from the Emerald Isle are on the way to becoming a top attraction in the early eighties.

Their recent success isn't just confined to the singles charts, though—they've had success with their albums 20 Giant Hits and The Nolan Sisters which have both been into the Top Ten

It's an amazing success story for attractive sisters Anne, Maureen, Linda, Bernadette and Coleen. Yet the story goes a long, long way back. Indeed, before the girls were born, their parents Tommy and Maureen Nolan were stars in their own right in Ireland. Tommy was a regular radio performer and later became the first singer to appear on Radio Telefis Eireann, the Irish TV Network. Maureen also sang, and was dubbed the 'Irish Forces Sweetheart'. So, when they teamed up to become a successful singing duo, it was natural that they should take the name Sweetheart Singers.

Tommy and Maureen always wanted to take their music to England and reach a much wider audience. So in the early 1960s the family moved to Blackpool - and it didn't take them long to establish themselves as a very successful act.

"My parents used to take the children along to shows," says eldest sister Anne. "And before long, we'd be up on stage singing with them. As we all became more and more interested in showbusiness, the entire family was worked into the stage act as each new arrival came along."

At one time, all nine members of the family were on stage together mum and dad (Tommy and Maureen), sisters Anne, Denise, Maureen, Linda and Bernadette, and brothers Tommy and Brian!

The Sweetheart Singers worked extensively throughout Britain, appearing in clubs and hotels, and they soon built up a healthy reputation. But, as time went by, the five girls became the mainstay of the act . . . and it was natural that eventually they would go out on their own

The move came in 1974 and mum, dad and the two boys decided to step aside and leave the stage free for — the Nolan Sisters.

Shortly afterwards the family moved again, this time to London, where the girls landed a lucrative contract to star in cabaret at the luxurious London Room in Drury Lane.

Then came the big showbiz breakthrough. They were chosen to appear throughout the entire series of BBC TV's Cliff Richard Show, and almost overnight the Nolan Sisters were household names.

Since then, they have more than consolidated that success, starring extensively on television on such shows as The Harry Secombe Show, Wednesday At Eight, London Night Out, Seaside Special, The Vera Lynn Show, two series of The Musical Time Machine, The Two Ronnies, Mike Yarwood In Persons and (phew!) several editions of Top Of The Pops.







In 1975, the girls were selected to accompany superstar Frank Sinatra on an extensive European tour, during which time they appeared with enormous success at London's Royal Albert Hall, as well as singing in some of Europe's most prestigious concert theatres.

Then three years later, in the spring of 1978, sister Denise decided to leave the group in order to concentrate on her own solo singing career. However, now down to a four-piece, the girls went on to even bigger successes.

For the 1978 summer season, they joined The Bachelors to star in the show Holiday Startime at the ABC Theatre, Blackpool, which proved to be one of the most successful shows ever staged at that venue. They later undertook a heavy schedule of British concert and cabaret engagements, before starring in their own show for the Christmas season. But the highlight of 1978 came in November when they were chosen to appear in the Royal Variety Show at the London Palladium. Says Anne: "I found it to be a really nerve-racking occasion. I really thought that I was going to sing out of tune, but in fact the only thing that did go wrong was when I curtsied at the end of the performance. My knees were like jelly, and I toppled over!"

During 1979. the Nolans continued to top cabaret and concert bills all over the country, while in May they starred in the BBC's spectacular show to celebrate 25 years of Eurovision, which was recorded in Montreux. Says Anne about touring: "Generally when we're away from home, Maureen and I share a room, and Linda and Bernadette another. But if we get on each other's nerves, then we'll swap around just for a change of face. Normally, though, we all go to discos and cinemas together."

What of younger sister Coleen, who is just 15? "She's too young to rehearse and play the concert halls and cabaret clubs with us. But next year she's going to become a full member of the group. At the moment, she joins us on recording and TV dates.

"She'll be able to help us with the suitcase packing for tours. That's one thing we hate doing — we take turns to pack each other's cases."

The Nolans aren't altogether happy about the time they get to learn new material for recording. "We're booked up until the end of this year at least," says Anne. "and that means that we really have no time to learn twelve or thirteen new songs, which is really what we'd like to do. But we've got an agreement with our record company, Epic, that our next LP will contain all original songs.

"That booked-up year takes in dates all over the country, and we particularly like playing in Lancashire. In Yorkshire and Birmingham, the audiences are harder to please, but somehow Lancashire is always easy to play."

"When we play in London, you find that a lot of the time the audiences include lots of foreigners who don't know what we're singing about, so we find it's just as important to have a good production set-up—lots of bright colours and lights.

"That doesn't work in Yorkshire. They're only there to hear exactly that you hit the right notes all the time..."







If you've been watching ATV's The Further Adventures Of Oliver Twist, the sequel by David Butler to Charles Dickens' The Adventures Of Oliver Twist, then you'll know a little about what life was like in the early part of the nineteenth century. Here's a brief but fascinating insight in to what your lives might have been like if you'd been born at around the same time as young Master Oliver . . .



A DICKENS OF

Your lifestyle would have differed greatly depending on which class you had been born into, for the difference between the classes was immense. If you'd been born into a landed aristocratic family you'd never have wanted for anything. These families possessed great wealth, which they increased by taking government jobs, by marriage with rich

merchant families, and by increasing the production from their lands. Many owned magnificent houses built in the classical style, with proper drainage, hot and cold water and special French stoves to heat the long cold passages. They spent a great deal of time entertaining others of their social status and their vast armies of servants served elaborate meals on glittering silver

As the son of a nobleman, you would first have been taught by a governess at home and then sent to public school, followed by a spell at university. Having completed your academic training you would most likely have gone on the Grand Tour of Europe to complete your education, particularly by studying the classical sculpture and architecture in Italy. On your return to England vou would follow the life of a gentleman by marrying a wealthy young lady, setting up your own home and pursuing whatever pastimes you fancied; perhaps collecting valuable works of art for your private museum. or travelling. hunting and visiting spas (very fashionable meeting places where you would 'take the waters' for good health).

If you'd been born a girl. you'd have been educated solely by your governess at home and devoted your life to becoming accomplished at various arts such as embroidery. water-colouring, singing and piano playing with which to entertain your guests. These social graces were essential, as was the ability to oversee the servants, for the business of getting a husband. Another asset would have been a tiny waist, for you would have grown up in the time of the unenviable fashion of the corset. The aim was to achieve a 37cm (15 inch) waist and in doing so, many women suffered fainting attacks because it made breathing impossible except from the upper part of the chest!

Your lifestyle would have been almost as comfortable (apart from the corsets!). though not as lavish, if you'd been born into a professional, middle-class family. Doctors. lawyers, clergymen, writers and architects, as well as the less rich manufacturers and increasing number of shop keepers, also

kept as many servants as they could afford - the more you had, the more 'respectable' you were - and their sons, too, went to

grammar and public schools for their education. As in the upper class, the women stayed at home to learn the social graces in order to win themselves 'good' husbands.

NOT SO GOOD

But had you been the child of a working class family, your lifestyle would have been a million miles away from those we've just described.

If your father was a skilled labourer there would be a strong chance that he could find regular employment. For example, if he was a hewer at the coal-face in a mine, a skilled textile worker, dairyman or cowman, he would have been valuable enough to his employer for him to provide a house or extra fuel in order to induce him to stay. If he was an unskilled, casual labourer, however, you would be more than likely to suffer if there was a bad harvest or trade slump.


You, your brothers and sisters and your mother would have been forced to find work wherever you could, so you wouldn't have had much of a childhood. If you were a boy, and depending on where you lived, you might have found work in factories, down a mine pushing the trolleys of coal around, or as a chimney sweep (actually climbing up the stacks to clean them). If you were a girl you may also have worked in a factory, but more than likely gone 'into service' as a scullery maid in one of the grand homes of the aristocracy. Your mother might have supplemented the family income by spinning, lace-making or straw-plaiting.

With little more than rags to wear, it would be most unlikely that you'd receive any education and you'd be raised on a diet of potatoes, bread and cheese (eaten from wooden plates with wooden spoons — only the rich could afford china and cutlery), if

you were lucky. All this, however, would depend on whether you'd actually survived past infancy — there was much disease and tragically early deaths owing to poor, overcrowded living conditions and lack of sanitation.


Take, for example, the area of London then known as the Potteries and Piggeries. situated near what we now know as Shepherd's Bush. It was a colony of brickmakers, producing tiles, flower pots and drainpipes, and pig keepers, who collected kitchen waste in horse and donkey carts from houses or hotels in the West End. When they got the waste home they would turn it over, eat the best of it, sell some of it to their neighbours, boil down the fat and give the remainder to their pigs. The women and children toiled alongside their men, too, of course. There were about 260 hovels in the area and it's said that there were over 3,000 pigs and 1,000 humans living there. Consequently it was hit by many cholera epidemics. Dickens himself described the Potteries and the Piggeries as 'a plague spot scarcely equalled in insalubrity by any other part of London'.

So perhaps it's just as well that you weren't born in Dickens' time — and just think: there was no such thing as **Look-in** in those days, either!




