




Brian Moore takes to the pits to give you the background to this colourful event . . .

MONTE CARLO OR BUST!

The twisting, bumpy circuit around the ancient principality of Monaco is a great leveller amongst the world's fastest Formula 1 racing cars. In terms of speed, quite often it is the tortoise that emerges the victor whilst the hares have long since called it a day! With all those twists and bumps the suspension systems of the competing cars are put to the ultimate test. Not all make it!


With so many severe corners on the circuit it's no wonder that the history of the race has seen many multiple collisions. As early as 1936 six cars were eliminated on the second lap and in the 1950 event no fewer than nine cars, including two of the three works Alfa Romeos, ended in a first lap pile-up. Incredibly, despite the dangerous nature of the circuit, only one driver has ever forfeited his life.

After winding their way through the town, the cars plunge into the famous tunnel, to emerge seconds later alongside the harbour. Some very notable cars and their no less famous occupants have taken an early "bath" in the waters of Monte Carlo Harbour!

The most successful driver at Monaco is the late Graham Hill, who won on a total of five occasions. With the exception of 1957, when the race distance was a staggering 205 miles, the event was until 1967 held over 195 miles but as a result of Bandini's death that year (reputedly through fatigue) the race's length was reduced further to 156 miles. However, that is still 80 laps of arguably the toughest Grand Prix of the year!

First Monaco Grand Prix winner was W, Williams driving a Type 35B Bugatti (below) seen here at the Corner of the Tobacco Shop.







Paella is a traditional Spanish dish which is usually served in the large, shallow metal pan in which it is cooked and from which it takes its name. The middle regions of Spain use vegetables, meat, chicken and sausage in their paella whereas the coastal regions specialise in combining sea foods with chicken and vegetables in the rice base, a simplified recipe for which I give here.



3 chicken joints

1 large onion

1 clove garlic

1 green pepper

60ml (4 tablespoons) olive oil

350g (12oz.) Patna rice

2 chicken stock cubes

pinch of saffron powder

30ml (2 tablespoons) tomato puré e

50g (2oz.) frozen prawns

salt and pepper

Cut the chicken meat into large bite-size pieces. Skin and roughly chop the onion. Skin and finely chop the garlic. Wash the pepper, cut in half and remove the seeds, slice into strips. Heat the oil in a paella pan or very large frying pan. Add the chicken and fry for 5 minutes until golden brown. Add the chopped onion, garlic and pepper, fry gently until the onion is soft. Stir in the rice and fry for 3 minutes. Dissolve the stock cubes in 700ml ($1\frac{1}{4}$ pints) boiling water and add to the pan with the saffron. Add some salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for about 20 minutes, or until the rice is cooked. Stir in the tomato puré e and prawns, simmer for a final 10 minutes. Serve immediately.

















CO, THE HIDS TELL COE says Jimmy Pursey




Recently, Jimmy — leader of **Tell The Children** rock heroes Sham 69, of course — spoke to Richard Tippett about his expectations for the new extravaganza that begins in a fortnight's time. "The job on Fun Factory came about when I went to Granada TV to do a show called **Top Twenty Silver Discs.** I did the show, and they said they really loved it and that they'd seen me on some different programmes before, and would I be interested in doing a new series called **Fun Factory?** They wanted me to do a pilot film, and I said that would be okay, but if I was to do anything, I would want the show to be for the people I was singing to — namely, kids. But I didn't want it to be like **Runaround** or **Tiswas**, which are great for the kind of thing they are putting across, but this show, if it was going to be me, had to be what I wanted to get across; I didn't want to be slung into a clearing and left in no-man's land, reading things off auto-cues (the machines from which newscasters etc. read on the screen) like I've had to do before and which I am against.

"So they came up with this idea for a pilot where I went and spoke to a group of kids about what they wanted to see on a TV programme, and from that we worked on the idea of **Fun Factory**."


Did Jimmy accept this new role readily? "Only after interviewing the kids, and making sure that they wanted me to go ahead with it, rather than someone who wasn't really going to care. I think they don't want sixty-year-old men condescending to them all the time."

But Jimmy has other commitments, and these take up precious time. "I have millions of commitments — nearly every hour I have one — so that was something else I had to take into consideration. But another of the things that swayed me into accepting the role is that the show will be going out at a good viewing time, (10.30 in the morning) when people are just getting up, so they can turn the telly on, and there I'll be!"

The members of Sham 69 don't mind about Jimmy's newest venture. "Anything that I do reflects on the group, anyway.

GOING GOLD! THAT'S QUO

Although Status Quo have had to postpone their scheduled world tour until October, due to guitarist Rick Parfitt's cartilage trouble in his right leg, you can console yourselves with their recently released Greatest Hits album Twelve Gold Bars, which has been right up to the top of the charts and goes to prove what super staying power the band has.

Quo have been around now for over seventeen years and are still one of the most popular rock bands in the country. Their big breakthrough came back in 1972 with their **Piledriver** album and since then the South London boys have sold millions of records worldwide.

'The Boys' are — and always have been — lead singer Francis Rossi, drummer John Coghlan and guitarists Rick Parfitt and Alan Lancaster. Quo credit their success to their fans, the majority of whom happen to be male. Says Rossi, "We're a band that appeals mostly to guys. We think that's better because girls are too fickle, they change their loyalties too quickly. We know because we appealed to the girls when we first started and got nowhere as a result. But if a guy likes a group he's faithful for ever."

Seventeen years is a long time for all those Quo fans to have stayed faithful and frontman Rossi is as surprised as anyone that the band have managed to stay together for so long. "We were surprised at still being around five years ago," says Rossi. "There was nobody less likely to break in the business than ourselves, everyone thought that. And having broken, it was even unlikelier that we'd be able to sustain it. But we somehow managed it; there was chemistry there that the kids obviously went for, and so the music became commercial, saleable, popular, or whatever you want to call it."

As all Quo fans well know, their heroes' great strength is in their fabulous live performances, but

as the boys get older tours seem to get longer—and more dangerous! Now in his thirties and living in the splendid surroundings of a new home in deepest Surrey complete with sauna, swimming pool, music room and six-and-a-half acres of land, Rick tells of some mad moments from gigs gone by: "In Munich one time, Francis Rossi was leaping around when he slipped and knocked himself out and was promptly carried off on a stretcher. The house lights went up with the audience obviously thinking it was the end of the show when we all came dashing back on with Francis reeling from the results of being brought around by a huge dose of smelling salts.

"Then another time in Germany, Francis and I both crouched over our guitars. I straightened up before he did and my head crashed into his nose. What a mess! Blood everywhere. It was great, very spectacular."

It seems amazing that Quo, who are as popular throughout Europe as they are in Britain, have never really conquered the American music scene.

"We'd like to break there," says Rick Parfitt. "I know that Quo is good enough. The band, what it plays and how it performs is comparable to any rock band in the world. If we broke there we would sew up the whole world."

Along with the likes of The Rolling Stones. The Who and the Kinks, Status Quo are proud to have survived for so long, and they've had no thoughts of disbanding just yet. Explains Rick, "We honestly haven't had enough yet — there's still a lot to do. The thought of solo ventures has crossed our minds, but we don't want to distract from Quo. When Status Quo eventually does come to an end, which it must do some day, then we might do something else, but not at the moment. I think if we split up a lot of people would be very upset about it — our audiences are very devoted people."

So the good news for all you Quo fans out there is that the boys are going to be rockin' for a long time to come!





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
