



ith just one team from each group going forward to contest the final, (the second placed teams from the groups meet in a third spot play-off match), it's going to be tough for all the teams in the competition but perhaps even more so in the first group with so little to choose from between West Germany, Holland and the present champions, Czechoslovakia. Only Greece appear to be rank outsiders in this group, the very first occasion that this country has reached the final of a major competition. Manager Altekas Panagoulias has been in charge of the national team for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years and to his credit has brought a determination and discipline, previously lacking, to the squad.

Dangerously underrated, Czechoslovakia still retain six survivors from the 1976 campaign. Although Viktor has gone from goal, Ondrus, that giant central defender, is still present, so is Masny, now operating in midfield, while Zdenek Nehoda is still playing well in the number nine shirt. The team plays a patient waiting geme, building up through midfield, pushing the ball out wide with the final thrust coming from the wings taking the form of low, piercing


crosses. Czechoslovakia will play attractive, forceful soccer, for their boss Josef Venglos thinks along much the same lines as England's Ron Greenwood.


West Germany have just suffered a major blow to their chances with the loss of centre forward Klaus Fischer, who broke his leg in a league game. Boss Jupp Derwall may turn to Dieter Muller as Fischer's replacement but the big question mark will be over whether West Germany can maintain the impressive progress they have made since ex-manager Helmut Schoen retired.


Holland almost went out of their qualifying group, but achieved a dramatic eleventh hour reprieve by beating East Germany 3-2 after being two goals down. Under the leadership of veteran Ruud Krol, Holland remain a formidable force in world soccer, an astonishing achievement for such a small country. Dutch team manager, Jan Zwartkruis, will not be afraid to blood young players if necessary and could include Ipswich's Frans Thijssen in midfield. There promises to be some marvellous football in this group to decide who goes forward to the final!





BRIDGNORTH STAMP COLTD

Introduced by Kathie Webber, Cookery Editor of TVTimes

Following my special feature last week on the milling of wholewheat flour, here's a simple step-by-step recipe for you to make your own nourishing and delicious bread.

1 tablet 50g (2oz) vitamin C

15ml (1 tablespoon) brown sugar 25g (oz) dried yeast 900ml (1½pints)warm water, made by mixing 600ml (1 pint) cold water with 300ml (2pint) boiling water 1.4kg (3lbs) Wholewheat plain flour 15ml (1 tablespoon) salt 25g (1oz) fat



Step 1. Crush the vitamin C tablet. Place in a bowl with 5ml (1 teaspoon) of the sugar and the dried yeast. Add 300ml (½ pint) of the warm water and whisk together with fork. Leave in a warm place for 10-15 minutes until frothy.




Step 2. Grease two 450g (11b) loaf tins. Set a cupful of flour aside and tip the rest into a bowl with the remaining sugar and salt. Rub in fat with your fingertips and stir in water. Add yeast mixture and stir well to bring the dough together.



Step 3. Turn bread mixture onto clean work surface sprinkled with flour and knead. Push it with knuckles or heel of hand to stretch dough, then fold over and repeat. Use rest of flour to stop dough sticking.



Step4. Kneadfor 10 minutes until dough becomes smooth and elastic. Divide into four and keep two aside to bake in tins after first two loaves are cooked.



Step 5. Flatten one piece of dough into a rectangle as wide as tin. Fold into three, place in tin with fold at bottom. Cover tin loosely with plastic wrap, leave in warm place to rise, about ½ hour. Heat oven to 230 deg. C (450 deg. F) or gas mark 8. Remove covering. Dough should have risen to about $1 \text{ cm} \left(\frac{1}{2} \text{ inch}\right)$ above the sides of tin. Bake in preheated oven for 30-35 min. Turn oven lower if loaves brown too quickly.










Well, at least he thinks he is! More Smurfery in next week's instalment.

HE Emerald Isle has recently produced some sparkling pop groups who have added a touch of the Blarney to our charts: The Boomtown Rats and Stiff Little Fingers have both found favour on this side of the Irish Sea, but another group from Ireland — The Undertones — seemed at one time to be missing out. They were every disc jockey's tip for the top, and their singles received constant backing on the radio, yet none of the songs was a massive hit.



Now though, everything has changed for these five lads from Derry. Their new album **Hypnotised** leapt straight into the charts at number six, and the single **My Perfect Cou**sin has been their biggest hit to date.

In addition to that, they have developed into one of the most dynamic live bands around, judging by their full house performances on a massive British tour which began in April and ends this week.

So after a lot of hard work, things are looking up for The Undertones — but were they worried at any time that they were going to fail?

Feargal Sharkey, the group's singer, who has a distinctive waver in his voice and which has become the trademark of the band, thought not: "Actually, the way things happened was probably better for us. We had a lot of support from the media, but the public response has been slow.

"That has given us the chance to improve,

and to gain a level of experience that we are grateful for.

"We may not have had enormous hits," he continued, "but I'd rather have a record around the middle or bottom of the top twenty which stays there for weeks and is regularly played, than to have one which comes in at number one and goes straight out again."

They learned how to bide their time when they were struggling for recognition in Ireland, where they soon discovered that life on the road is not all that it is sometimes cracked up to be.

"We came together in 1976," said Feargal, "but it was very hard to get work because our music was completely different to that of the pub and club bands on the circuit.

"All our equipment was bought on hire purchase or with loans, which we had to pay back bit by bit every week. We've still got a lot of that stuff in a room at home, and we can't bring ourselves to throw it out even though not

much of it is working."


When they were given their chance, at a pub called the Casbah in their hometown of Derry, they soon established a regular following.

"In spite of all the difficulties, we decided to stick to what we wanted to do. One showband suggested to us that our image was wrong and that we ought to change our name to the Supertones because it was more commercial."

Their confidence had grown by 1978 for them to chance recording a demonstration tape. "We did it on a four track recorder," remembered Feargal, "so it wasn't really very good, and we sent it to a lot of record companies, including Stiff, Radar and Chiswick—but they all turned us down.

"Eventually we went to Belfast to record an EP for a local record company called Good Vibrations."

That EP was called **Teenage Kicks**, and the band sent a copy to disc jockey >>> to p.18







Tom p.15 John Peel because he has a reputation for playing music by good new groups on his late night radio show.

John, who has proved the guiding light for a number of now successful bands, played **Teenage Kicks** regularly on his show — and Sire Records immediately moved in to sign The Undertones.

"Other disc jockeys picked up on us — we were pretty lucky that way — but to be honest I think that at that stage we were probably getting praise which we did not deserve. We were still learning and would not have been ready had we been pushed into the limelight then," admitted Feargal.

On their way into that limelight, they released singles which were catchy and instantly hummable, including Get Over You, Jimmy Jimmy, and You Got My Number, all written by John O'Neill, who plays guitar in the band, with his brother Damien (known as Dee). Mickey Bradley plays bass and the drummer is Billy Doherty.

All of them still live in Derry, where they are determined to stay.

Feargal explains: "We don't see any point in moving. We like living at home, and John says he writes better when he is at home. At one time everyone was saying that you had to move to London if you wanted to succeed in the music business, but that is no longer true—the 2-Tone bands have proved that."

What kind of reaction do they get when they play at home these days? "It's so different from the days when no-one wanted to know us," he smiled, "one telephone call fixed up the whole of our Irish tour in April.

"Being successful over there doesn't mean a thing when you come to England, though. It's like starting out all over again. We were lucky in England, and now we are going to America in the middle of June... and that's like starting all over again, too.

"We've been there before, with The Clash, and the Americans are beginning to accept our kind of music now. For a long time the successful bands in Britain made no impression over there, but it is changing ... we hope!"

One advantage about The Undertones' songs is that if you aren't particularly fond of one number, it does not last very long.

"Our songs are short because we'd get bored with them otherwise," said Feargal. "We believe that if you have something to say you should stand up and say it, and then shut up. We couldn't play songs which lasted twenty minutes, or anything like that."

But their shortness also creates a problem. It means that they must have a lot of material to fill an album or to present a live show.

Feargal agreed: "The new album has 15 tracks, but it was not a case of putting on any old song just to fill it up.

"We operate a very strict system of quality, control, and we could go through a hundred songs, playing them and discussing them before deciding if they are good enough. We discard a lot more than we keep."

The album also contains a surprise, a

revamped version of the old hit from The Drifters, Under The Boardwalk.

"We included that because in our live shows we often play cover versions of other people's hits to break up the set, and this was one that usually goes down well," said Feargal.

"When we recorded the album, we did some extra tracks which we thought might make B-sides for future singles, and Under The Boardwalk was one of those, but we thought it should go on the album."

The appeal of their songs seems to be that their audience can appreciate what the band are saying, and that is something which they are anxious not to lose.

"We are only ordinary people, and if being successful means that we change, then it's our fault and we deserve to be criticised for it," said Feargal.

At the moment there seems to be little danger of that happening. Feargal was still excited when he spoke to Look-in because he had heard earlier that **Hypnotised** had gone straight into the charts at number six. "That's fantastic — my feelings when I heard that are something I shall remember for the rest of my life," he said.

If you were faced with the prospect of your favourite meeting place — in this case an old tree in a playground — being demolished by the local council and replaced by a concrete monstrosity, what would you do? Stand back and watch it happen — or fight for its salvation? This is the problem that faces five young people known as The Latchkey Children, individually Froggy, Goggles, Ben, Duke and Etty.

Left to their own devices most of the time - hence their name — the only place for them to meet and play is the playground, or, much less desirable, the streets. So when they hear of the Council's plan to remove their tree and replace it with a concrete 'engine' for them to play on they decide to fight the authorities. They go about it in a very adult fashion, by going to the Houses of Parliament, the Greater London Council and writing letters of protest. But they don't get very far until they accidentally meet up with a Thames Television film crew in Battersea Park.

The series has been adapted from the late Eric Allen's prize-winning novel of the same name which was published in the sixties and is still used in many schools' timetables. It has had to be slightly updated for television but much of the filming was done around the actual setting used in the book — the Churchill Gardens estate in Pimlico, Lon-

Froggy is played by 15-year old Peter. Harrison, who, up until now, had only appeared in TV commercials and done some stand-in work for a TV film. "It gave me experience." says Peter, "and that's what I Latchkey Children; the children were good, the production team were brilliant and the director, Horace Ove (whose daughter Indra, incidentally, plays the part of Etty) was great. He used to encourage us all the time."

What about the character of Froggy?

"Well," says Peter, "he's got no dad and his mum is a bit naggy. She's out at work all day and doesn't have time to talk to him about his problems so he fantasises a lot. About spaceships and things. He's also very emotional always thinking about his dad. And he loves fighting. I think it's through this that he gets rid of his home problems."

At the moment Peter is appearing in the West End musical Barnardo's which opened just over a week ago, and one of his co-stars is 13-year old Bobby Collins, who plays the

part of Ben in the series.

Bobby is quite an old hand when it comes to television work, for he's appeared in numerous commercials and such programmes as George And Mildred, The Sweeney and Grange Hill.

"Ben is the posher one of the gang," says Bobby. "He lives in a house in Pimlico whereas all the others live in council flats.'

Bobby can also be heard singing on the title song, along with co-star Ian Roberts, who plays the part of Duke.

"It's quite a good bouncy record," says


Bobby, "up to the latest style.

Ian agrees whole-heartedly and thinks the single stands a good chance of getting into the charts — at least he hopes it will! Ian was really glad when he heard that he'd got the part because he's only been an extra in the past. How would he describe Duke?

"He's not like the others," he says, "because he's very quiet. He wants to mix with people but he never pushes himself. He does things like laughing loudly, hoping that others will notice him and say something. I'm nothing like him really - completely different; in fact, I'm very extrovert!"

And Ian's different from his co-stars in real life, too: whereas they all want to continue to follow careers in acting, he wants to make a name for himself as a recording star. So the theme song from The Latchkey Children must surely be a very big step in the right direction for him!

And the last word must surely go to Goggles, played by 14-year old Nigel Hayward, who summed up his feelings about the series very concisely: "It was fantastic!"






