





# EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP COUNTDOWN @ PART 2



A youthful exception in Italy's side is midfield star Antognoni (left), who will be looking to set up those devastating through passes to his side's strikers.

Enzo Bearzot has problems as Italy's national team manager. A lot of people don't like his preference for attacking soccer, and the bribery shock that has swept Italian football won't make his task any easier.

Spain do have some useful players,

especially Real Madrid's Juanito

(above), a really speedy winger.

This Championship could be goalkeeper Dino Zoff's last major tournament. He found the going a little hard in Argentina, when he couldn't cope with the long range shooting of Holland.



If the record of past European Championships, and indeed World Cups, is anything to go by, host nation Italy must be favourites to win the competition. Team manager Enzo Bearzot has stuck largely to the side that finished fourth in Argentina. A criticism of the present Italian side is that most of the players are getting a little past it. 'Keeper Zoff was in the side that last won the European Championship, and that was back in 1968. However, Bearzot is quick to defend his selection by retorting that he has no better alternatives, especially with the staggering news of the widespread bribery scandal that has hit Italian league soccer, and the controversy surrounding star striker Paolo Rossi. With the group fairly evenly poised between Italy and England, the country that finishes top of the group, to qualify for the final, may be the one that can pump most goals past Spain and Belgium and England look the better bet if that situation arises! Belgium could be a tough nut to crack, especially if veteran midfielder Wilfred Van Moer gets going. A sort of continental answer to Archie Gemmill, take Van Moer away and the side's effectiveness is greatly reduced. But look out for clever strikers Van Der Elst and Jan Ceulemans, who is good in the air.

Spanish boss Ladislao Kubala (left) will be especially anxious for Spain to do well. His contract expires in June and he is keen to lead the national team to 1982 when Spain act as hosts for the World Cup. However, Spain will have to improve dramatically on their form of late if they are to make any impression.

England will have cause to remember Bettega (below), who headed Italy's second goal, when England were beaten in a World Cup qualifier in Rome, back in 1976.






A few weeks ago I gave you a recipe for the traditional Spanish dish paella, so this week let's move across to Italy where canneloni is a favourite. It's rapidly becoming popular in this country, too, and it consists of squares of pasta cooked in boiling salted water which are then rolled up and stuffed with a savoury filling and topped with a

(serves 4)

## **INGREDIENTS**

1 medium-sized onion

1 medium-sized carrot

50g (2oz.) butter

450g (1lb.) raw minced beef

45ml (3 level tablespoons) tomato puree

1 bay leaf

pinch ground nutmeg

pinch mixed herbs

salt and pepper

225g (8oz.) lasagne squares

1 packet cheese sauce mix

(25g) 1 oz Parmesan cheese.



#### **METHOD**

Skin and chop the onion. Peel and grate the carrot. Melt 25g (1oz.) butter and fry the vegetables lightly for 10 minutes. Stir in the beef and fry for 10 minutes. Mix the tomato puree with 45ml (3 tablespoons) cold water, add half to the saucepan. Add the herbs and salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Place 2.3 litres (4 pints) of water into a large saucepan. Add 5ml (1 level teaspoon) salt and bring to the boil. Add the lasagne and cook for 20 minutes or until soft. Make up the cheese sauce mix according to the directions on the packet. When the lasagne is cooked, drain it. Place some meat mixture on each pasta square and roll up like a swiss roll. Grease an ovenproof dish and lay the rolls of pasta side by side in it. Pour over the cheese sauce. Pour the rest of the tomato mixture over the top. Sprinkle with a little Parmesan cheese. Place under a hot grill until golden brown.

To every young girl working hard at dance classes and learning music, the story of Kate Bush's rise to fame must seem like the ultimate fairy story. Few may look as striking as Kate, and it's unlikely that many have her incredible vocal range, but her rise to acclaim gives us all a model to aspire to - showing just how much sheer hard work is involved in reaching the top.

HE story of the discovery of Kate as a vocal 16-year-old phenomenon would inspire anyone who dreams of making the big-time as a star . . .

While she undoubtedly was showing enormous musical talent and self-taught musical flair by the age of 10, Kate had never attended a dance class until she was about 16. Her unusual stage act has evolved, combining voice, movement and mime imaginatively, but the effect was something she worked hard to create.

Kate first took classes at the Dance Centre in London's Covent Garden. Although she stood alongside similar novices, some of them had such a fluid style and technique that, Kate says, "It was really awful during the first few weeks. So many people were so much better than I was, and I had to work really hard." But who can deny that Kate's dedication paid off?

When you see the spectacular-looking Kate Bush on stage, or look at the pictures of her on album covers, it's hard to imagine that she could ever look anything other than perfect. Does she ever feel that she has to look wonderful all the time?

"Just like everyone else, I look a little tired sometimes especially after a long, late rehearsal. But I'm sure that people understand, and realise I'm only human."

When someone is as distinctive as Kate, does she ever get tired of being recognised by people in the street?

She answers, "Of course I don't mind. Why should I? I think it's really nice — these are the



people who have gone out and bought my records and who have helped to put my music in the charts. I'm very grateful to them.

"I think it's my hair that gives me away really. But sometimes I tuck it up under a hat, and go out on my bicycle, and no-one knows it's me."

Until Kate Bush arrived on the music scene, it had been a long time since any musically talented British lady had made any great waves. Probably not since Dusty Springfield in the Sixties had a girl singer made such an impact. In fact, in 1978, when Dusty made a rare visit to Britain after long exile in America, Kate's single Wuthering Heights had just been released. Dusty was one of the first to tip Kate for a lasting career, saying that her voice was exceptional. And, from a singer like Dusty, that was praise indeed.

Kate is still only 20 and many feel we've only just scratched the surface of her talent.

She was lucky enough to have been born into a family who loved music and whose musical tastes were many and varied. By the time she was 11, she had actually taught herself to play piano, and had even written her first songs.

Throught her songs, Kate is developing into one of the most inspirational poets of her generation, and her mature & lyrics draw on the emotional ups and downs of life. She wrote The Man With The Child In His Eyes when she was just entering her teens, and the lyrics printed in her albums give you an opportunity to appreciate fully what she is saying.

guitarist and singer with Pink Floyd, who was most impressed with her songs and her style. On her first album, she paid special tribute to him: "Much thanks and love to David Gilmour for 'rolling the ball' in the beginning

Under Gilmour's guidance, Kate produced a demo tape with Andrew Powell at Air Studios. That demo soon brought the interest of one of the most prestigious record companies in the country — EMI. They were quick to see Kate's potential and signed her for a recording contract, something which they obviously weren't going to regret.

Such was EMI's faith in Kate that they kept her under contract and paid her a retainer, encouraging her to develop her writing and expand her musical ideas. During those two years, she left school, and started to learn how to dance, knowing that the skill could add another dimension to her songs on stage.

She studied with many teachers, including the famous master of mime and dance, Lindsay Kemp. From him, she learned many aspects of visual communication and movement which she now relates to her own work. Kate has developed a way of incorporating music, poetry and movement so that you can relate to her songs on more than one level.

In 1978, EMI decided that the time was right and, at last, the world was ready for Kate Bush. They released her memorable Wuthering Heights — Emily Brontë's beautiful, moody love story about Heathcliff and Cathy which had inspired Kate as a child

That single stayed in the Top Twenty for several weeks, and charted high in Europe as well as Japan, Australia, Canada and South Africa. That year, she earned the title Best Female Singer/Best New Artist and collected many other awards including the Tokyo Music Festival Silver Prize and the coveted Dutch Edison Award.

With the impact of Wuthering

Heights, Kate's future looked guaranteed, and her debut album, The Kick Inside, was released. This collection of her own highly original compositions not only illustrated her unusual vocal range, but also the wide emotional and intuitive range of her poetry and her interpretation of music.

Her second single, The Man With The Child In His Eyes, must surely be one of the most beautiful ballads ever written. Her second album, Lionheart (which she helped to produce), was received by ecstatic music-press reviews, going into the album chart the first week of issue, eventually going gold.

For someone as young as

Kate to play the London Palladium was quite an accolade and a tribute to the mark she had so quickly made in music. The unusual stage presentation was something which had never been attempted before, and the dramatic costume changes added to the overall visual effect.

Kate is renowned as being one of the hardest-working people in the music business and has been putting in 18 hours a day on her new album. (Her third album is due out this month.)

Her most interesting project to date is her latest single, the thought-provoking **Breathing** with its spine-chilling lyrics written around the theme of our age — pollution. The production is certainly interesting, incorporating the use of synthesiser techniques to create a most original and eerie effect.

The music world awaits Kate's new album with great anticipation — an album which, on the strength of **Breathing** promises to be more interesting than even the last.

In four years, Kate Bush has gone from schoolgirl with talent to successful recording artist with phenomenal ability. And there's no doubt about it — we can still look forward to much, much more from this decade's most exceptional lady of music.

his Friday (6th June) we say a fond farewell to Thames Television's Magpie, the magazine programme that has graced our screens for twelve years. Let's take a look back at some of the happiest, funniest and most hair-raising moments that made it one of the most popular children's shows in the history of television...

The first team of Magpie presenters consisted of TONY BASTABLE. PETE BRADY and SUSAN STRANKS, who spent three years together visiting such far-away places as the Philippines. Hong Kong, Bavaria, New York and Holland.

Tony has fond memories of his time with the programme, as he told Look-in's Terry Tatnell recently:

"I'm very sad that Magpie is finishing because I spent such a long time doing it and because, in a way, it's become an institution. But everything has its season and Magpie has certainly had a good run for its money.

"When we started it was technically very challenging and we got up to all kinds of things. I did the world's first underwater broadcast and I didn't discover until I did one feature that I suffered from vertigo (a feat of heights). I had to climb up a ship's mast and I'm afraid I froze half way up.

"Once we had a fully-grown puma in the studio and it behaved itself admirably all through the item. But when the credits came up it took a swipe at Susan and missed her by about half an inch.

"Another time one of the Magpie researchers, in fact the lady I eventually married, went to see some lion cubs as a possible item for the programme. She reported that they were about the size of large domestic cats. The item, however, was cancelled and it wasn't until some weeks later that it was decided that they should appear. A small pen had been built for them but when they arrived they had grown to about the size of small domestic horses!

We had a very difficult time trying to restrain them!"

No doubt Pete still has nightmares about the time he was a target with only a plate of toughened glass between himself and a hail of bullets.

And Sue must remember the first-ever **Magpie** with a bit of a shudder. She was flying in a balloon which exploded as she landed. On another occasion she diced with death as a trials driver!

Pete left the team in 1971 to be replaced by DOUG RAE.

Puff the Magpie pony was the fourth member of the team in those days and at one time they all went to Calgary in Canada where Puff was presented with a rosette almost as big as himself for being the best-looking horse at a rodeo. Whilst they were there Doug took the opportunity











of going up into the Rocky Mountains to have a go at one of the Canadian Youth Cadets' assault courses — climbing up ropes, rock faces and narrowly missing a fall into the river! But his most dangerous moment was when he fell over 15 metres (50 feet) down an ice-face in Scotland, to be saved in the nick of time by his safety rope.

A year later Tony dropped out of the team to be replaced by MICK ROBERTSON, who has, of course, lasted up to the present-day through a safari in Kenya, a hotel blaze in Arizona and a journey through Peru, amongst other things. And in 1974 JENNY HANLEY took over from Sue.

In Jenny's first nine months with the show she had to do everything from washing a baby elephant ("Baby? It was enormous!" she says) to racing a windowless, roofless, doorless auto-cross car and riding a wild horse bareback across country through floodwater in the

swamps of Southern France!

In 1977 TOMMY BOYD stepped into Doug's shoes — and promptly got wet! He was in Holland and joined some floating dustmen on their barge. He took the enormous punt pole, got stuck on the end of it and finished up in the canal.

Magpie has also been famous for its many charity appeals and year after year they have smashed their own records.


One of the first appeals was for sixpences (in pre-decimalisation days) and the target was 100,000 of them. But within just ten days the target had been passed and the grand total amounted to 300,000 sixpences — over £7,500. This bought much-needed equipment for mentally-handicapped children throughout the country, including two minibuses.

Two years later, Magpie viewers raised over £77.000 for children suffering from the crippling disease Spina Bifida and in 1979 more than £100.000 was

handed over to the National Deaf-Blind Helpers League.

Another important feature of the programme has, of course, been the many animals who have guested. One visitor who is best forgotten was a young wolf brought along by animal expert Martin Lacey. Nobody realised until it was too late that the wolf had ripped Martin's arm from elbow to wrist just before they went on air. But, as always, the show went on!

Until now, that is. But don't despair, there are some great new programmes to replace Magpie. During the school holidays there will be a show especially devoted to spare-time activities with ideas for how to fill your days. One of the Magpie spots will be filled with a new programme magazine-type which will be run like a club, and the other will be filled with a show which will be giving a lively introduction to how everyday things work.







Magpie has also been famous for its many charity appeals and year after year they have smashed their own records.

One of the first appeals was for sixpences (in pre-decimalisation days) and the target was 100,000 of them. But within just ten days the target had been

over £7,500. This bought — over £7.500. This bought much-needed equipment for mentally-handicapped children throughout the country, including two minibuses.

pling disease Spina Bifida and in 1979 more than £100,000 was

handed over to the National

handed over to the National Deaf-Blind Helpers League. Another important feature of the programme has, of course, been the many animals who have guested. One visitor who is best forgotten was a who is best forgotten was a young wolf brought along by animal expert Martin Lacey. Nobody realised until it was too late that the wolf had ripped Martin's arm from elbow to wrist just before they went on air. But, as always, the show went on! Until now, that is. But don't despair, there are some great new programmes to replace Magpie. During the school holidays there will be a show especially devoted to spare-time

especially devoted to spare-time activities with ideas for how to fill your days. One of the Magpie spots will be filled with a new spots will be filled with a new magazine-type programme which will be run like a club, and the other will be filled with a show which will be giving a lively introduction to how everyday things work
