

After a tournament that had produced a breathtaking feast of attacking soccer (the best possible advertisement for the game to be broadcast to a world audience), the final itself ended on a controversial note — the trophy's destiny being settled by penalty kicks.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA 2 WEST GERMANY 2


Although West Germany had lost two of its great stars, Gerd Muller and the clever Jurgen Grabowski, most fans felt that they would get the better of their opponents Czechoslovakia, the surprise team of the tournament.

Czechoslovakia took a calculated risk against West Germany. Realising that their opponents were further weakened by the loss of striker Jupp Heynckes, the Czechs pushed their defenders up into attack, always risking the counterstrike. It was a tactical decision that payed off handsomely. The Germans couldn't cope with the extra men to mark and the Czechs were soon two goals to the good, through Svehlik and Dobias. Indeed, Masny could well have put the result beyond doubt with an effort that skimmed the far post with Maier well beaten.

But as the Czechs tired in the later stages of the match, West Germany began to gain confidence. Young striker Dieter Muller pulled a goal back, and, in the very last minute, with the Czechs desperately holding out, 'keeper Viktor missed a corner from Bonhof and Holzenbein nodded home. No goals came in extra-time so it was all down to penalties. The vital error came from Uli Hoeness who blazed his effort over Viktor's crossbar. Justice was seen to be done and the Czechs were the popular winners.

1968 ITALY 2 YUGOSLAVIA 0 (after a final replay)

The tournament grew in importance in 1966, when it was reorganised along World Cup lines, adopting the formula of qualifying groups. Just two years after their triumph in the World Cup, England went out to Yugoslavia in the semi-finals. Italy were the other finalists, inspired no doubt by the knowledge that the final would be staged on Italian turf. In front of a 60,000 crowd in Rome, Italy were somewhat lucky to force a 1-1 draw with their opponents, with a late goal coming from a free kick. 48 hours later, the Italians looked a far better team and coasted to a two nil victory. Luigi Riva struck Italy's first goal in the final replay (below).



1972 WEST GERMANY 3 RUSSIA 0


With England on the wane in Europe, it was the turn of West Germany to don the mantle as masters. They had come to Wembley for a quarter-final match (a two-legged affair) on a wet and gusty April night and had overrun a poor England team by three goals to one, a victory that effectively put Germany into the semis. On that night at Wembley, Beckenbauer and Muller were world class and Gunter Netzer played the international match of his life in midfield. Belgium proved tougher opponents in the semi-finals but the Germans triumphed by the odd goal in three and qualified to meet Russia in the Final. Only Russian goalkeeper Rudakov stood between his opponents and a cricket score. In the 27th minute who else but Gerd Muller opened the scoring. The Russians could offer precious little in attack. Wimmer added the second and Muller rounded it all off. As Helmut Schoen received the trophy he no doubt thought ahead to the 1974 World Cup Finals, to be held in his own country. The European Championship had helped him build a side that would capture the World Cup and establish West Germany as new World Masters for a time.



The 1972 match has become known as the Gerd Muller Final.



1 slice bread

1 tomato


1 egg, size 2

25g (loz.) butter

pepper and salt



METHOD: Place the slice of bread under the grill to make the toast. Toast one side, then turn over and toast the other. Place the tomato in a small bowl of boiling water for 1 minute. Remove from the hot water with a spoon and place into a bowl of cold water for 1 minute. Peel the skin off the tomato. Placing the tomato in hot water makes it easier to remove the skin. Cut the tomato into slices. Heat half of the butter in a small saucepan and cook the tomato in it for a few minutes. Beat the egg in a small bowl, add some salt and pepper and pour over the tomato in the saucepan. Stir until the egg turns thick and creamy. Spread the remaining butter over the slice of toast. Spoon the egg and tomato onto the toast.


















THE FARDING

The Vapors still can't believe the enormous success of **Turning Japanese**. "No-one was more surprised than me," says its writer and the band's rhythm guitarist — the shy, dark-eyed Dave Fenton — shaking his henna-tinted head. "We couldn't believe it when they phoned us and said. 'Hey, it's Number 73 ..., "says drummer Howard Smith. "Then it went ... 59, 45, 34, 18, 8, 4, 3!" they chorus.

"We couldn't understand why that should have taken off more than our first single Prisoners," says Dave. "We thought that was just as good as Turning Japanese." Would they consider re-releasing that first single? The answer is an adamant and unanimous "no". "It wouldn't be fair to the fans who bought it the first time round," explains bass player Steve Smith.

On the strength of **Turning Japanese** becoming a silver disc, The Vapors' first album **New Clear Days** was issued at the end of May. United Artists has staked much faith

on the bunch of guys from Guildford who hogged the radio request-spots for weeks.

Often when a band has a hit, a record company leans on them to come up with more, new material — fast.

"We know it's no good putting out a bad product," says lead guitarist Edward Bazalgette. "We would resist that kind of pressure but this company knows, too, that duff material is no good anway, so we wouldn't be put in that position. What's important, you see, is the quality control..."

"Quality control" is an expression they use frequently. They believe it's important to write good, original songs — recording and performing them well — and no way are they prepared to compromise.

But just how do you go about writing a hit single as good as **Turning Japanese?** Dave Fenton admits he has no blueprint for songwriting. "I sometimes just wake up in the night and think, 'That's good — I must do

something with that . . . , and I write down the basis of a tune or a lick. It's easier to get a chorus first and work backwards from that."

The Vapors were originally spotted at a local club by The Jam's Bruce Foxton and he offered them two dates with The Jam in May last year. The record companies weren't far behind, and competed with each other to sign the promising support band.

Had The Vapors ever tried to put out an independent single? "We did think about it," says Dave, "but we decided against it. We didn't want to get too tied up in an independent company's contract — we were right to wait." They are happy with their company, United Artists, which allows them total studio involvement in their recording, and the conversation — wouldn't you know it? — came back to their favourite subject — quality control.

"It's important to be consistent," explains 8

Edward, who tends to be the >>>10,518 15





band's spokesperson most of the time. "Some bands are only as good as their first album. The Only Ones, for instance, had two great albums and now have slipped into being a likeable band who don't sell many records. We want to avoid that."

"The problem comes when you change between albums," adds Dave. "Whether people will follow the change or not."

With the new album under their belt, The Vapors were just about to appear on German TV's answer to Top Of The Pops before their long-awaited British tour in June. But they laugh at the suggestion of playing the country's big concert halls at this stage in their career. They still regard themselves as a small-club band.

"Look," says Edward, "we've only had the one hit single..."

Only? But surely that means they're famous?

"Famous? Us?" says Steve, as though they still have much to prove to the world. "One hit single doesn't make a band famous really. We play clubs which hold 800-1000. We can't pull in many more than that . . . yet."

The airplay **Turning Japanese** received is an object lesson in how a hit record is made. "John Peel played it first," says Howard. "Then Dave Lee Travis played it — he said a few words about it afterwards — and it took off from there. That led to sessions for Kid Jensen and Mike Read." Since then, they've appeared on **Top Of The Pops** and made a video for **Tiswas**.

Talking of videos, could we see a video disc from them soon? "What, like Blondie's Eat To The Beat video, do you mean? No — not us," says Edward. "Bands like The Sex 18 Pistols opened up music to everybody. There's

a danger in video discs that ordinary albums become second best. The exhorbitant price of video discs makes them available only to an elite. Music shouldn't be that exclusive. It should be for everybody."

As yet, **Turning Japanese** hasn't been issued in the States, although it's available as an import there and, much to the band's delight, is being played on radio stations. "And," announces Steve, proudly but shyly, "we're No. 8 in Israel and No. 29 in Australia."

The Vapors have very strong views about the current club scene — something they know well. Many club owners expect struggling semi-pro bands to play for next to nothing in return for the so-called exposure. Did the band think that the public should be prepared to pay money for the privilege of seeing new, undiscovered bands? "I think bands have to prove themselves," says Edward resolutely. "If they're good, they'll succeed and people will gladly pay to see them. I don't agree that people should automatically have to pay to see new bands — some of them are rubbish."

But they agree that the public doesn't

realise that many new bands are exploited in this way. "It's not right, but it's not going to change until the public are aware it's happening." The band are often approached for advice by young hopefuls, but mostly they're asked to give them support spots. Recognising that this is how they were discovered. The Vapors have used some of these bands as supports. "We reckoned a band called Future Fun — a really original three-piece..." and they, along with The UBz and The Classics, may well be future chart-toppers thanks to The Vapors' generosity.

The main advice The Vapors offer to young bands is "write your own material". "Who wants to see 30-year-olds playing Johnny B. Goode for the umpteenth time? There are a lot more interesting things a band can do than that," says Edward scathingly.

The Vapors own music is undeniably original. How did they rate the current Heavy Metal revival, for instance? "Well, it's the first time round for many of the young kids. Heavy Metal relies on unsubtle, screaming guitar feedback and lyrics which I think are awful," says Edward.

We talked about sometimes going to a concert by a legendary superstar and the disappointment when he or she doesn't come up to expectations — the legend evaporating before your eyes...

"Sort of 'vaporises', you mean?" smiles

Well, one thing is for sure — there's little danger of The Vapors vaporising. They're too concerned with their future, their music and that 'quality control'. Judging by their new album, just for starters, The Vapors are working on being here to stay.

The world of sport at your fingertips.







The design, creation and filming of the special effects in Mission Galactica required an army of artists and technicians to work in the huge sound stages at Universal Studios, where millions of dollars were spent on installing computers, flight simulators and background scenes.

But the visual spectacle of the film — the exploding stellar hardware, the space combat against bat-winged Cylon vessels, hurtling squadrons and the gigantic battlestar, *Galactica*, itself in flames — wouldn't work effectively without the human (and, indeed, inhuman) element.

Commander Adama, played by Lorne Greene, who for many years was the head of the Cartwright family in the TV western series **Bonanza**, is back at the helm of the mighty *Galactica* and faced with a daunting prospect: the battlestar, protector of a convoy of civilian craft in search of an habitable planet, is stranded in space, helpless without fuel, and open to attack from its arch enemies, the Cylons. The attack has been masterminded by the Imperious Leader's treacherous underling, Count Baltar (played by John Colicos), who is aided and abetted by his untrustworthy, red-sequinned side-kick, Lucifer.

Adama is both overjoyed and astonished when he learns that accompanying his son, Captain Apollo (played by Richard Hatch, whom you may recognise as Dan Robbins from the TV series The Streets Of San Francisco) and Lt. Starbuck (Dirk Benedict) on their return from a mission is Cain (Lloyd Bridges), Commander of the Battlestar Pegasus, believed lost in the far reaches of space.

Cain is a legendary hero amongst the surviving humans, being a

stubborn leader and mighty warrior who commands unflinching loyalty from his people. He devises an outrageous plan to launch an immediate attack on the Cylons, a plan that is strongly supported by *Galactica's* warriors, but Adama, totally opposed to Cain's thirst for blood and battle, has to relieve him of his command of the *Pegasus* because he realises that such an attack would leave the helpless mothership open to destruction.

While this internal friction is raging, on the Cylon planet Gomeroy, Baltar is gleefully planning his final assault on the *Galactica* in a bid to annihilate the last remaining humans and make the Cylons


lords of all the galaxies.

When a Galactica-Pegasus strike force, led by Cain, goes in search of Cylon fuel ships to capture for the needy Battlestar, its efforts are wasted because the impulsive Cain blows them up in order to force Adama to adopt his own more desperate measures. Adama, therefore, has no choice but to send Apollo, Starbuck and Cain's warrior daughter, Sheba (played by Anne Lockhart) on a guerillastyle raid to Gomeroy where they must neutralise the Cylon assault batteries and obtain access to the fuel dumps for the Galactica-Pegasus fleet.

And so, with the Cylons in disarray, the scene is set for a confrontation of mammoth proportions to decide once-and-for-all who

shall rule the galaxy . .


