You may think this spicy Lasagne sounds tricky, but don't be nervous — follow our recipe and you'll find it's quite simple really.

SPICY LASAGNE



2 medium sized onions

50g (2oz.) bacon

50g (2oz.) vegetable oil

450g (1lb.) minced beef

142g (5oz.) can tomato puree

380g (14oz.) can tomatoes

salt and pepper

5ml (1 level teaspoon) dried oregano

35g $(1\frac{1}{2}$ oz.) butter

 $35g (1\frac{1}{2}oz.)$ plain flour

600ml (1 pint) milk

75g (3oz.) Cheddar cheese

10ml (2 level teaspoons) French mustard

5ml (1 teaspoon) oil

175g (6oz.) lasagne verdi

Skin and finely chop the onions. Remove the rinds from the bacon and cut into small pieces. Heat the oil in a saucepan and gently fry the onions and bacon until softened. Add the mince and cook until just browned. Drain off fat. Reduce the heat and stir in the puree and tomatoes. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover the saucepan and simmer for 40 minutes. Stir in the oregano. Grate the cheese. Melt the butter in a saucepan, stir in the flour and cook for a minute until bubbling. Remove from the heat and gradually stir in the milk, a little at a time with a wooden spoon. Cook, stirring until thick. Add half the cheese and the mustard. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Bring 1.8 litres (3 pints) of water to the boil in a large saucepan with a teaspoon of salt and 5ml (1 teaspoon) oil. Add the lasagne and cook for 10 minutes. or until just soft. Drain carefully in a colander. Rinse well in water then drain on kitchen paper. Grease an ovenproof dish. Line with a third of the lasagne, top with half the meat sauce and one third of the cheese sauce. Cover with half of the remaining lasagne, the rest of the meat sauce and one half of the remaining cheese sauce. Finish with the lasagne and cheese sauce. Sprinkle with the rest of the cheese. Cook in the oven at 180° C (350° F) or Regulo gas mark 4 for about 40 minutes.





Every aspiring pop group should take heart from the way in which The Selecter burst onto the rock world late last year. Their first recording was an instrumental, also called The Selecter, but it was released as an "A" side. Instead it was tucked on the "B" side of The Specials' smash hit debut single, Gangsters. Even though it was a flip side, the track created a lot of interest in the music world, partly because people did not know how genuine The Selecter were!

Actually, at the time of recording, the band was not genuine at all, as producer Roger Lomas explained. "The number was written by guitarist Neol Davis, and he played it with The Specials' drummer John Bradbury when we recorded it in my shed in Coventry which I have converted into a studio.


"We had been playing around with a few ideas for something to put out on The Specials' single. As you know, The Specials have their own label, 2-Tone, and they want to use it to give up-and-coming bands a chance to record, so this was the first opportunity."

Although there was no permanent band then, Neol had no difficulty in persuading some of his friends who were playing ska, bluebeat and reggae in various Coventry bands, to join him.

Now the band consists of singers Pauline Black and Gappa Hendricks, keyboard man Desmond Brown, drummer Charles 'H' Bainbridge, guitarists Neol and Crommie Amanor and bass Charlie Anderson.


Singer Pauline Black took up the story: "It all happened so quickly, because we were already known before we had actually recorded anything ourselves."


When they did record in their

own, right, they found an eager following and their first "A" side On My Radio went storming up the charts.

"That song was also recorded in Coventry, but not in Roger's shed, although he still produced the record. We moved to Horizon studios, where The Specials had recorded Gangsters. We are also recording our album there and it should be out in February or March," said Pauline.

"We wanted to stay in Coventry, because it is where we come from, and we saw no reason to move away. One band, The Flys, were probably the first to emerge from Coventry, but they went to London and they seemed to get lost in everything else that was happening in the music scene there."

"We decided to build a reputation for ourselves outside London, so that those people in London who see and hear so many groups would have to be really interested in coming to see us."

"That's why The Specials' idea of launching their own label is such a good one. It has shown that there are a lot of good groups outside London — in the Midlands alone there are a lot. I know that The Specials are signing a Birmingham band called The Beat, and there are plenty of others around. There must be groups all over the country who don't want to go to London, but who deserve a chance to release a record."

Did she think the The Selecter would have been successful if it were not for the interest which had been focussed on Coventry because of The Specials?

"I suppose we were lucky because we happened to be around at the right time, but I don't think that the reason we are doing well is because of The Specials. Of course it 18 helped at first, but The Selecter have their own

sound, and we are very different to The Specials — as people find out when they hear us."

One of the reasons for their contrasting style is in the composition of the group. They are mainly West Indians who were born in England, but there is a rastaman, too, and of course, Neol, the only white member, but definitely the band's greatest influence.

"The variety of backgrounds contributes so much to the band", said Pauline, "but we hope that the music we play is enjoyed by all kinds of people, who will realise that there is not that much difference between them just because they are a different colour, or a different age."

However, there was one difference that Pauline was anxious to point out. "I've heard, and read, people comparing us to Darts. All that is based on is the fact that both bands have a black female singer, but I should think that Rita Ray and Darts are as Keen to put an end to the comparisons as we are. Our music is a long, long way apart."

If you saw Pauline and Rita together, there is no way you would think that they were similar. Pauline often wears tailored suits, buries herself inside a long, thick overcoat and is rarely seen without her hat. "My clothes have always been a bit individual; I've always dressed like this. Fashions change, and I must admit that I notice more people around wearing this style of clothes, but I've always worn what I felt comfortable in. The hat is the latest addition, and I bought it because I liked it," she said with a smile.

Pauline and the band remain unaffected by all that has happened to them in such a short time, but she admitted that they have not really had the opportunity to sit down and take everything in. "It's strange to think that a few months ago we were playing in small clubs, mostly in our own area. Some of the best places we did were social clubs."

Then they found themselves on the enor-

mous 2-Tone tour, which took them to the top venues in more than forty towns and cities — some of which they had never even heard of! The fans had heard of them, though, because every night on that round-Britain jaunt they were playing to full houses.

"We were moving so fast from gig to gig that we didn't really appreciate what was happening".

"We were on the tour with The Specials and Madness, and all of us had singles out during the period, so it was really exciting to hear the new chart every week, to see who had gone up the most places." The Specials' release at the time was A Message To You, Rudy and Madness were challenging the charts with One Step Beyond.

"There was a lot of friendly rivalry on the tour coach when the new chart was announced on the radio," said Pauline. "It was great fun going on that tour, but we still haven't had time to rest because we've had the album, and our new single, to record.

"We're not complaining, though, because we enjoy working, and we get a lot out of seeing other people enjoying themselves. The venues on the tour were all dance halls, and it was really great to see everyone dancing.

"Our music is dance music — it's based on the old ska and bluebeat rhythms, but it's updated. We hope that people will also listen to the words, because they express how we feel, and how we hope many of them will feel too."

Some of their songs, like Every Day Things Get Worse and Too Much Pressure are fierce and defiant, telling stories about people who are standing up for themselves no matter how bad the times may be.

Indeed, The Selecter are more than standing up for themselves, and they seem certain to make a big contribution to the style of music in the 1980s.

And that's most certainly the case with Tom Baker, presenter of Yorkshire TV's The Book Tower, which started a second series recently (on Wednesdays at 4.45). Tom is the latter-day Dr. Who, of course, and he sees his role in The Book Tower as an interesting alternative to his very famous role as the time-travelling doctor.

BAKER'S BROUGHT TO BOOK!

How did the Book series come about? "It was all the brain-child of Joy Whitby and Ann Wood," said Tom. "Joy is the head of Children's Television there (at Yorkshire), and Ann is a freelance producer, who is an expert

on children's books. Also Joy has been responsible for such programmes as Jackanory on the BBC, amongst several other things, and the two suddenly had the idea to make a programme devoted to children's books, the first four of which we did last year. It won for Joy The Eleanor Farjeon Award for services to Children's Books, and quite rightly so.




Does this mean that Tom is always being 'hounded' by authors anxious to have their works spotlighted on a successful TV series? "Well, I'm very hard to contact," he replied. "I think that if I put myself around, an awful lot of publishers and authors would be interested in talking to me. I've had lovely letters from several of the authors I reviewed last year, but if I encouraged writers to get on to me, I'd find my letter-box full of new books, which is something I don't want. I'm not responsible for the selection, anyway; that is the responsibility of Joy Whitby and Ann Wood, who are the experts.


"Of course, they consult me quite a lot of the time, because they respect my views, otherwise they wouldn't have employed me. But the main reason why I couldn't really influence the choice of books is the simple volume of them: I think that there are 1,700 new children's book titles a year. No way at all could I begin to sift through that lot, what with my other commitments."


So how did Tom manage to get his hosting role for **The Book Tower?** "I'm not really sure how it came about. I spend a lot of my time promoting Dr. Who, and I think somebody had seen me at some school or other, and thought that I had a rapport with children that could be turned into a nice little programme."

What of the 150 dictionaries? How did Tom come to collect them? "I'm very interested in reference books of all kinds, particularly dictionaries. Whether it's some kind of inadequacy I don't know — I certainly don't want to suggest that I'm any kind of expert on words. I just like having them around."

As in the first series, the odd animal makes an appearance in **The Book Tower**. Says Tom: "I remember in that series being very nervous of a crocodile which appeared on the show. About eighteen months ago, I was bitten very badly on the top lip by a dog while I was sitting in a pub. I was reminded of this terrible fright when we had this baby crocodile in the studio—I hope my fear didn't show too much. I was in a low chair, and had to get up very







It may seem strange to you that the dashing timelord Dr. Who should experience any kind of fear from animals, especially as his faithful aid in the popular science-fiction series is K-9 — itself a 'dog' (though admittedly, a robot one!). How did the viewers take to Tom in The Book Tower, after getting so used to him as the Doctor? "The reaction was utterly, utterly positive." he replied. "For example, we put out rather nice posters to promote this series, and these went into libraries and schools. Before any of the shows actually went out, we had something like 8,000 requests for the posters, which indicated



a marvellous advance interest in the series."

But, whatever else he may get involved in, Tom Baker is primarily known for his marvellous playing of Dr. Who, a role he has enjoyed now for four years. Does he feel that the Doctor is a part of him?

"He feels entirely a part of me, because Dr. Who is an acting part in the traditional sense. By that I mean that the character of the doctor can't actually change very much, and you feel you know him even before you've played the part. I act the script out as well as I can, and I meet the audience on a big scale; I've been to lots of places in the U.K. meeting the audience, and the character clicks with them."


What is it about the Doctor that is so special? "I think the first thing that is special

about the programme is that it has no opposition — there's no other that you can compare it to. Secondly, there's the expertise involved in making it — it is still the big frightener for a lot of children.

"I'm very interested in what frightens children. I deliberately try and find the points where they will be frightened—I think sometimes I can locate the points in the script where young viewers will be ducking behind the sofa, or under the table, or hiding behind cushions. I also add humour to the situation, of course, so the children are confident that behind the trouble I might be in, I'll get through in the end. Heroes always do."

So whether it's as Timelord or bookworm, Tom Bakers is certainly a hero to million.
