



# THE KRYPTON FACTOR CHALLENGE

A cold, miserable, windy, Lancashire moor. A group of grown-ups is running, jumping, swinging, clambering, and crawling over, under, across and through an assortment of frames, logs, pipes, tyres, bricks, pools and ropes.



Recognise the scene? You will if you're a fan of The Krypton
Factor, now well into its fourth series (on Mondays at 7 p.m.), that unusual show designed to produce a champion combining physical ability, mental agility, intelligence, observation and general knowledge. A real superman (or woman) in fact. And yes, that is why the programme has such a funny name: the fictional Superman was born on a planet called Krypton.

It's the physical ability that's on test on that Lancashire moor, on a £30,000 assault course designed by Captain Denis Sears of the Army's Physical Training Corps (he's the man with the gun who starts things off on screen each week) in conjunction with Granada TV.

When it's not being attempted by **The Krypton Factor** hopefuls, the course is used for the rest of the year to train teenage cadets and other members of the armed forces. In case you think it all looks very easy on TV, Captain Sears

is quoted as saying it's the toughest assault course he's seen outside the Commandos! And the point is reinforced by many of the Army's PT experts, who volunteer to be on hand to instruct and encourage The Krypton Factor's contestants. They stress just how dangerous and exhausting some of the obstacles can be without proper supervision: a punctured lung and a badly sprained ankle were two of the injuries in the preliminary stages of this year's contest.

No part of the body escapes punishment, either. The course was designed to test and strain the whole range of muscles, and brute strength isn't enough. Overall fitness, stamina and what the show's creators call 'courage' are all essential.


With the contestants' ages ranging from 21 to 47, the time taken to complete the course varies a lot: from under three minutes to well over five. And they must seem very long minutes indeed when you're hanging by a thumb caught in

some ropes ten metres up in the air (yes, it did actually happen)!

What does the show's presenter, Gordon Burns, think of the course? "Well, I've run it on three occasions previously, when we were doing the earlier series, just to prove that I could do it, and after the last time I vowed 'never again!' It's more difficult this year, too: those tiring scramble-nets are included in the heats now, whereas before they had only been used for the finals.

"In fact, I've been banned from doing it this year, for insurance reasons until the whole series is complete, so I suppose that's a kind of blessing in disguise!"

When it's all over, the contestants are allowed to keep those natty **Krypton Factor** tracksuits as mementoes of the most gruelling few minutes and 250 metres most of them can remember. For several days, though, they won't need any such mementoes to remind them of their performances — the aching muscles will do that for them!



# PICNIC SQUARES



### INGREDIENTS

300g (11oz.) cooking chocolate

225g (8oz.) roasted peanuts

60ml (4 tablespoons) sultanas

### METHOD

Place the chocolate in a large bowl over a pan of simmering water until melted. Stir until smooth. Add roasted peanuts and sultanas and stir until combined. Line a swiss roll tin with greaseproof paper. Pour in the mixture and smooth out evenly. Put the tray in the refrigerator until set, about 1 hour, then remove and cut into squares or bars. Store in refrigerator.





Of all the glamorous rock bands to have ascended and glittered over the past decade, Roxy Music are still shining as one of the brightest. While many so-called superstars glimmer for just a year, the individualistic Roxy — fronted by the extraordinary, fashion-innovating Bryan Ferry — seem content to burn for ever, as their latest single Oh Yeah goes to prove.



efore a fateful November day in 1970 when the band was formed, the world of rock — although quite used to the bizzare and outrageous — had never experienced the like of Roxy Music . . .

While their musical achievement can never be under-estimated, the sound-andvision fantasy of Roxy Music exploded on the music scene with a bang.

BRYAN FERRY — a miner's son from County Durham — originally studied fine art, planning to become a painter. While at Newcastle University, he fell in love with rock and roll, and formed an 8-piece soul band called Gas Board. Music opened up a whole new world for him. He saw it as a medium through which he could express his personal and stylised vision of the world.

Ferry became fascinated by the outrageous clothes of futuristic fashion designer Anthony Price and paraded on stage in some of his wildest gear, but it had such style that it went rather well with the band's image.

Ferry had an enormous influence on unusual stage costume and once explained his interest in his stage clothes.

"For a long time I couldn't really decide which I was more interested in — music or visual arts. I'd always wanted to be a painter and, as a music fan, I always preferred to see the more exotic black American bands. They always presented themselves so . . immaculately. That's why Roxy Music pays so much attention to presentation on stage, and packaging for records." And, without doubt, Roxy Music's album covers, with their beautiful artwork of exotic ladies, are so

striking that, once seen, they remain with you for ever, even if you never actually buy the record! Roxy Music album covers still stand out in record-shop windows.

Ferry's early dream of forming a completely new and different band attracted the equally revolutionary musicians and thinkers ANDY MACKAY (saxophone and oboe player), BRIAN ENO (an indisputable innovator in synthesiser techniques) and guitarist PHIL MANZANERA.

Their musical restyling of the Fifties' feel


revamped in Roxy Music's distinctive,
classy way — earned them an enthusiastic
following of fans, and gained them their first
chart hit single Virginia Plain.


Hand in hand with their musical approach was the band's unique visual appeal. We were to see a constant stream of fashion vogues modelled by Ferry, rock's most eligible clothes-horse. He went from one extreme to another — through a period of cool elegance, then into the bizzare South American "gaucho look", into his most arresting uniform of all time . . . his modification of Elvis Presley as he had appeared in the film **G.I. Blues.** 

But always underlying Ferry's outward displays of fashion eccentricity is an artist and musician of great sensitivity and a talented composer. Without Ferry there would be no Roxy Music.

He has been accused of being unemotional and even aloof with some he meets, while others say he's just reserved and modest. Indeed, Ferry is very modest about his own, not inconsiderable,

>>> from p.15 ability as a musician/writer.

In 1972, Roxy Music did their first official gig - at the Lincoln Festival - and by June, their first album (now a collector's item), Roxy Music, was released, reaching No 6 in the charts. By the autumn, they were ready for their first nationwide tour, then concerts in the States, a European tour, and another hit single Pyjamarama.

In March 1973, the band's second album, For Your Pleasure, climbed to No. 3. By the summer, Roxy Music were awarded the prized Grand Prix du Disque at the Montreux Golden Rose Festival for "the best album of the year".

Roxy Music just couldn't lose. In the November, Bryan Ferry's first solo album proved a significant milestone for him -These Foolish Things went straight to No. 1, and Roxy Music's memorable single Street-life was a hit.

While the line-up of Roxy Music has often changed from their beginning, kingpins Ferry, Mackay and Manzanera have remained constant. In 1973, a series of differences about the direction the band was taking led to Brian Eno leaving to pursue a successful solo career. His place was taken by an energetic, 18-year-old, Eddie Jobson (violinist and keyboards wizard, formerly with Curved Air).

The first album to feature the dynamic Eddie was the third - Stranded - and, while Manzanera and Mackay made a more upfront contribution assisting with lyrics, Ferry's typically English style still dominated.

The fourth Roxy Music album followed the next year - Country Life. But it was reported that Manzanera was not entirely happy with the album and there was a period of friction between him and Ferry, and for a while they worked on some interesting solo projects.

Mackay wrote the music for ITV's hit series Rock Follies, elevating him to a superior slot in rock music.

Manzanera went off and recorded his Diamond Head album, temporarily reforming his old band Quiet Sun for a one-off gig.

But soon Roxy Music were back in the studios together again. This resulted in the success of one of their best singles Love is The Drug — a hit here and across the Atlantic. The single, and the success of their album Siren, at last won them the right to play full-size rock venues in the States, although they still seek the ecstatic acclaim in the States that they receive on home ground.

In 1976, one of the band's finest albums was released — the live album Viva! marking another era in their career.


That, of course, means their latest album the seventh — called Flesh and Blood from which we have already had two sparkling hits Over You and Oh Yeah.

In 1976, rumours of internal disagreement and the band splitting up, threatened us with the end of Roxy Music. That summer, they announced a "trial separation" and they did for a while - go off and develop individual projects. But, such obviously compatible and mutually inspirational musicians like Ferry, Mackay and Manzanera couldn't stay apart for long, and, fortunately, came back together for their most productive period.

Roxy Music have succeeded where many others have failed, in their refusal to be restricted to the obvious limitations of one style. They have always been ready to experiment, and expand their musical directions so that, even ten years on (long enough to burn out the most dedicated of musicians) they're still with us.

Meanwhile, from July 23, Roxy Music's fans will be turning out to support this most original rock music act on their national tour, and on August 1 and 2, the long-awaited culmination will be their appearance at London's huge Wembley Arena.

For the summer tour, Ferry, Mackay and Manzanera are augmented by bass player Gary Tibbs, Andy Newmark on drums (re-

placing Roxy's drummer Paul Thompson who broke his thumb in a motorcycle accident), guitarist Neil Hubbard and Paul

As Roxy Music play their nationwide concert this month, adoring fans will go to each gig secure in the knowledge that this time will be just as fascinating as the last with just as many surprises, just as revolutionary as ever. That's the promise . . !

### THE KRYPTON FACTOR CHALLENGE

A cold, miserable, windy, Lancashire moor. A group of grown-ups is running, jumping, swinging, clambering, and crawling over, under, across and through an assortment of frames, logs, pipes, tyres, bricks, pools and ropes.



Recognise the scene? You will if you're a fan o'The Krypton Factor, now well into its fourth series (on Mondays at 7 p.m.), that unusual show designed to produce a champion combining physical ability, mental agility, intelligence, observation and general knowledge. A real superman (or woman) in fact. And yes, that is why the programme has such a funny name: the fictional Superman was born on a planet called Krypton.

name, the inclonal superman was born on a planet called Krypton.

It's the physical ability that's on test on that Lancashire moor, on a £30,000 assault course designed by Captain Denis Sears of the Arm's Physical Training Corps (he's the man with the gun who starts things off on screen each week) in conjunction with Granada TV.

When it's not being attempted by The Krypton Factor hopefuls, the course is used for the rest of the year to train ternage cades and other members of the armed forces. In case you think it all looks

In case you think it all looks very easy on TV, Captain Sears

is quoted as saying it's the toughest assault course he's seer outside the Commandos! And the point is reinforced by many of the Army's PT experts, who volunteer to be on hand to instruct and encourage The Kryton Factor's contestants. They stress just how dangerous

Kryton Factor's contestants. They stress just how dangerous and exhausting some of the obstacles can be without proper supervision: a punctured lung and a badly sprained ankle were two of the injuries in the preliminary stages of this year's contest.

No part of the body escapes punishment, either. The course was designed to test and strain the whole range of muscles, and brute strength isn't enough. Overall fitness, stamina and what the show's creators call 'courage' are all essential.

With the contestants' ages ranging from 21 to 47, the time taken to complete the course.

ranging from 21 to 4/, the time taken to complete the course varies a lot: from under three minutes to well over five. And they must seem very long minutes indeed when you're hanging by a thumb caught in

some ropes ten metres up in the air (yes, it did actually happen)!
What does the show's presenter, Gordon Burns, think of the course? "Well, I've run it on three occasions previously, when we were doing the earlier series, just to prove that I could do it, and after the last time I vowed never again! "It's more difficult this year,too: those tiring scramble-nets are included in the heats now, whereas before they had only been used for the finals." "In fact, I've been banned from doing it this year, for insurrance reasons until the whole series is complete, so I suppose that's a kind of blessing in disguise!"

When it's all over, the contestants are allowed to keep those natty Krypton Factor tracksuits as mementoes of the most gruelling few minutes and 250 metres most of them can remember. For several days, though, they won't need any such mementoes to remind them of their performances — the aching muscles will do that for them!
