# THE BEST OF ENEMIES!

In the world of athletics, two men, as different as chalk from cheese, have had the eyes of the world focussed on them this summer. Steve Ovett, who shuns television reporters and newsmen, and Sebastian Coe — the triple world champion who, amazingly, seems to find both the time and inclination to make himself available to those who ask for an autograph or interview.

HILE it was Coe who re-wrote the record books last summer, in the space of 41 incredible days, with world record performances in the 800 metres. Mile and 1500 metres, it would be folly to discount the bearded Ovett. In fact, many experts believe that Steve could become Britain's greatest-ever middle distance runner — the only man currently standing in his way being Sebastian Coe!

Steve's attitude is thought to be strange to say the least. His coach, Harry Wilson, tries to explain this: "You must remember that you are dealing with a unique person. There never has been an athlete like him, and there may never be again. Sometimes he can't understand why running and racing come so easily to him when others have to struggle to achieve less. This has been apparent from the first time we met. He has felt from the very beginning of his athletics career that he had no limitations."

Winning a European Junior Champion-ships gold medal at the age of 17 back in 1973 against youths two years older than himself, followed by a string of senior international honours seems to prove his theory correct: indeed Coe, despite holding the world record for the event, has been quoted as making Ovett favourite for 1500 metre honours. "Taking into account Steve's collection of 1500 metre times," says Coe, "and his long experience at the distance, how could anybody make me favourite? My experience at that distance is minimal. My best before the world record was 3 min. 43 secs."

These statements were, most journalists believe, not intended as a psychological ploy by Coe. Nevertheless. Sebastian's world record breaking run, at Zurich on 15th August last year, demolished the existing best to an unbelievable 3 min. 32.03 secs. — an improvement of an astonishing 11 seconds on his previous performance!


Steve, though, is not to be taken lightly. He is a champion himself — having won the 1500 metre gold medal at the last European Championships in Prague in 1978. While, admittedly, there was no Coe in the line-up there, it was a brilliant run by Ovett — and a chance for revenge over Olaf Beyer, the East German, who had pipped him for the 800 metre title just a few days earlier. Seb Coe ran in this race, too, finishing in third place, behind Steve, and is the last time that they


have run against each other. In typical fashion, Steve, up with the leaders as the bell sounded the last lap, looked up towards the scoreboard, held his position down the back straight, and then made his bid for glory. It was to be a successful one as he almost literally 'burned-off' his fellow competitors — covering the last 200 metres in a staggering 24.8 seconds.

# RIVALRY

Inevitably, much has been made of the rivalry between Steve and Seb. A rivalry enhanced, not always accurately, by the press. "When one country has two outstanding runners in the same events it's only natural that the media create a rivalry" says Coe. "It's not a bad thing. The sport must benefit by the interest it generates." As those comments suggest, most things that Seb says, and does, are well calculated. His early season training this year is a perfect example.

After that record breaking 41 days, spread between July and August last year, Seb, and his father/coach, decided that if they were to get some peace and quiet from well-wishers and continue his training for 1980, then they had to go further afield than the family home of Sheffield. Consequently, they found an exclusive estate in Italy, which contained roads, fields and a forest and,






therefore, provided the ideal training facilities that Peter and Seb felt was required for a serious challenge on this summer's titles. "My athletics has always been a family affair." says Seb. "My Dad does the coaching and I run. Emma, my younger sister, and Nick, my younger brother, also do their share by answering the phone and helping with the mail." As an athletics partnership, the Coes have been together for 11 years. Seb joined a club in Sheffield but Peter felt he could help nurture his 12-year-old's talent.

"I looked at the coaching and thought there had to be more to it than that," says Peter. "I read up as much as I could, medical books as well as coaching material. We have an athlete-coach relationship and it works. I toldhim early on that if he wanted a different coach there would be no recriminations. We work well together but then he is sensible and knows what has to be done. Part of my job is to keep the pressure off him. I have to be a buffer. We get so many invitations to functions and races that I must know when to say no. Too much and he could give a sloppy performance.

"I knew I had a worldbeater and now it has been proved that I have. He will get better."

Steve Ovett, like Sebastian, is supported wholeheartedly by his family who are in business in Brighton and doesn't have any worries about getting time off work for training — a major problem for many British athletes. But unlike Sebastian, he rarely allows himself to be quoted. Indeed, on hearing news that Coe had set a new world record in the mile, his only comment was simply: "It was a great piece of work!" Preferring to let actions speak louder than words is very much what Steve is about, and seems to be quietly confident that he can beat Coe.

In fact, in an unforgettable night for British athletics in Norway recently, Steve actually beat Seb's world record for the mile. But, incredibly, Seb had already set a new world best time in a storming win in the 1,000 metres — his fourth world record run in less than a year!







# Has Papa Smurf solved his problem?









FTER their enormously successful debut American concert tour last year, followed by an ecstatic return to Britain for some shows, ABBA seemed to go into hibernation. But although everything seemed unnaturally quiet from their Swedish camp, they were, in fact, involved in a frenetic buzz of activity — and now, of course, they're back on the airwaves with Winner Takes It All.

They went 'into hiding' to record a new album, which is to be released later this year.

"When they decide to do a record, they lock themselves away from everyone, and no-one hears from them until they are satisfied with what they have recorded," says a spokesman for their record company in Britain, CBS. So, as yet, no-one outside the ABBA camp has any idea what the album will be called, or if the songs will show any change of direction from their previous releases. However, if their most recent

recordings can be taken as a guide, it would seem to be a reasonable bet that the new material will be flavoured with a heavier rock appeal.

It is well over a year since they released an album of new material, but that album, **Voulez Vous**, showed some noticeable changes from their previous formula — with the introduction of musicians from outside the band, and a conscious effort to include some strong rock numbers.

Their single Gimme Gimme (A Man After Midnight) also showed how they are willing to adapt and change with the times, because it owed a lot of its infectiousness to a powerful disco-style beat.

The need to be a little heavier is something that Benny has been quick to admit: "It's difficult for us to write up-tempo songs, because we have no great rock and roll tradition on which we can draw in the way that British and American musicians can," he says. "We have to battle against the traditional Swedish styles in our efforts to compete in the world-wide market. That is why we are particularly pleased >>>10 PAIS





>> from p.15 with the way our music is received in Britain. Everywhere in the world, Britain is seen as the home of modern pop music—especially pop groups, because of The Beatles. So there is something special in being accepted by a British audience.

"In fact it was **John Lennon** and **Paul McCartney** of The Beatles who encouraged us to start writing when we did. We thought that if they could do it, why couldn't we?"

Benny and Bjorn have regularly proved that they can, in partnership with their manager, **Stig Anderson** — the man known as 'the fifth member of ABBA'. But although their sound is light and easy, a lot of sweat and toil goes into getting it right.

# PERFECTIONISTS

When they are recording, they stick rigorously to a 12-hour-a-day routine, working from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. Bjorn says about recording sessions: "We cannot go into a studio and bash out a record in no time. It takes us an enormous amount of preparation and hard work before we get the result that we are all happy about.

"We're perfectionists, and getting everything about a record right really drains us, so we need a long rest when we finish recording." And those recording sessions can last for anything up to six months.

"They are so hectic, that if anyone saw us working it would be easy for them to get the wrong idea about us," smiles Bjorn. "We disagree a lot, especially about the singing — because there are, of course, four different points of view on how each song should be presented. Yet it is those very differences of opinion which — when put together — are responsible for the ABBA sound."

They expect to have the new album ready by November, and the only break they are taking is to enjoy a restful summer holiday in August

In the meantime, a new ABBA album has just been released—but you won't see much of it in Britain: it's a 'greatest hits' album sung in Spanish! Including **Knowing Me, Knowing You, Fernando** and **Chiquitita**, it's only meant for South America and the United States where ABBA have a large Spanish following.

Such care and concern has proved strong enough to help ABBA weather the storms which threatened them last year when Bjorn and Agnetha were divorced, and when she said that she would stop touring to devote more time to her children, Linda and Christian.

Touring had never been a regular occurrence for ABBA anyway, and Agnetha claimed when she made her announcement that her decision would not affect the group's plans to record and to make the highly successful promotional videos which certainly go a long way to ensuring the popularity of all their single releases.

The fact that they are now recording shows that Agnetha can take care of her working and home arrangements without disrupting the group . . . and she is confident that she will still manage when her daughter Linda starts school in August.

So, although it may be a long time before we have the chance to see them performing live again, we can still look forward to seeing them on our television screens in promotions to which they give as much care and preparation as recording a single.

They work in their own television studio, and are determined to get everything exactly right to reflect the mood and style of the song which accompanies the video. Nothing they do is without careful thought and planning.

The group have even offered their fans a consolation for the lack of future concerts. They made a television special of last year's tour, which features back stage scenes and highlights from the concerts at London's Wembley Arena. It has already been shown in some countries and should be shown in Britain quite soon.

And if that were not enough, they have put together seven of their home-made promotional films on a video cassette which will soon be available.

No doubt the television show and the cassette will be particularly well-received in America, which will give ABBA a special satisfaction.

America was the one big market which they had not conquered, and they were genuinely concerned about how they would be received there. Says Benny: "We had, of course, been on television specials and they had seen our videos, but we had to wait until the mood was right for us before we performed live there."


Because of the size of the country, it took a lot longer for ABBA to have as great an impact in the States as they have had elsewhere — but once they had made that impact, the size of their following was gigantic. Demand for tickets well exceeded the supply, and ABBA had built up a phenomenal atmosphere even before they had taken the stage.

It was like starting all over again for Benny, Bjorn, Agnetha and Frida, and they did not disappoint their audiences — nor were they disappointed by the response they received from those lucky enough to get tickets for the shows. Now, everywhere they go they hear their music on the radio, television and in clubs and discos.

That, according to manager Stig, is a wonderful feeling: "Hearing that music takes us right back to Stockholm, even if we are thousands of miles away. It's a comforting feeling of being at home."

Which is why they are often to be found locked away in an effort to keep those home fires burning with some sparkling new songs.





# THE MANINSIDE THE METAL!

Where does a neurotic, highly strung and very lovable robot flee to when he and his friends are chased from a galaxy far, far away? For C-3PO escaping by the skin of his metal teeth in **The Empire Strikes Back**, it had to be somewhere he could avoid the eternal bleepings of R2-D2 and, of course, recharge his fevered batteries.

So he chose a quiet part of London, not half a day's clank from Borehamwood, Herts., where he was first programmed with that high-pitched public school accent and scholarly brain.



And that's where we found him, living in an elegant terraced house, surrounded by modern paintings, and listening to classical music. No marvellous mechanical gadgets, space fighters, weird galactic monsters or futuristic villains. It is light years away from the action-packed adventures of **Star Wars** and **The Empire Strikes Back**. And after traipsing across deserts, disintegrating and being re-made, Anthony Daniels, who plays the world's favourite robot, was glad of the rest.

"Playing C-3PO is great fun, but really hard work," he says, without a trace of the bossy voice that keeps R2-D2 in his place.

"The first time I put on C-3PO's outfit it took two hours — thirty minutes for the head alone. It was tike trying to work a complicated machine without the instruction manual. And once inside, I had to stay there for the day's filming because it would have taken all lunch-time getting dressed and undressed. As it was, I found it impossible to raise my hands to my mouth, so people had to feed me — it was like being a 30-year-old baby."

Although C-3PO has achieved world fame, receives a mammoth fan mail — including a proposal of marriage from a 12-year-old — and has even conducted the London Symphony Orchestra, Anthony Daniels bills himself as "the biggest anti-climax in the world".

In fact, he's nothing of the sort, as C-3PO, who knows class when he sees it, would be the first to point out. A shy, slim young actor dedicated to his profession, Anthony Daniels lectures on acting, is an accomplished Shakespearean player, very interested in charity work, and a great believer in the anti-smoking commercials C-3PO does with R2-D2.

He also laughs a lot at the problems of playing C-3PO, a role he finds enchanting, although enduring a plaster body mould for the robot suit was, he says, no joke.

"If ever there were limits on an actor, I've got them with C-3PO," he says. "Imagine, your face covered up and your hands unusable. And C-3PO is so clumsy. I bump into things, fall over, and get covered with bruises. When he tap-danced on **The Muppet Show** I was so cut off inside that outfit I couldn't hear the music.

"Then there are the problems of seeing. C-3PO can only see forward, so simple actions are difficult, particularly opening doors and going through doorways. I also found it hard going when Princess Leia ordered C-3PO to be switched off during a sequence in **The Empire**. They told me to stop breathing . . . if you see the film, you might notice very shallow breathing — well, there are limits!"

# SPANNER IN THE WORKS

Anthony Daniels' troubles weren't over when he finished filming. On a tour of America to promote **The Empire Strikes Back**, he was taken ill with suspected influenza and rushed to hospital.

"Then they discovered I had blood poisoning and said I could lose a leg. It was the night before the film's world premiere but the doctors seemed more excited at the prospect of removing a robot leg...

"In fact, I cheated them of that and had a good time in hospital, with five nurses to look after me. Mind you, it wasn't very restful because the Americans are particularly fond of C-3PO and I had a constant stream of visitors asking for autographs."


Back in England, Anthony Daniels was a great success in **The Streets of London**, at Stratford East Theatre, but found time to buy and help to renovate his house, with a skill C-3PO would be proud of, and to write stories and music for children (watch for his **Ali Baba** on TV in the autumn). He also travels a lot and finds that a picture of C-3PO tucked into his passport is a great conversation piece at the Customs. But in the not-too-distant future, it will be time for C-3PO to travel even further and join Luke Skywalker, Han Solo, Princess Leia, R2-D2 and the other freedom fighters in the third galactic film battle against Darth Vader and the evil forces of the Empire.

"There are to be nine adventures in the saga." says Anthony, "and provided C-3PO doesn't go to pieces again, and I continue to play the role, I shall be over 60 when the galactic wars are finally fought!"


And will he retire?




