












AFTER-MAGPIE IDEAS



THE CENTLE CLANT

A 2 metres tall (6ft. 7in.) giant in jet-black cape, his eyes black pools of hatred beneath a sinister helmet. The man whose word brings fear throughout the universe. No prizes for recognising Darth Vader, the villlain whose power has dominated Star Wars and The Empire Strikes Back. But what his adversaries don't know is that this would-be lord of the universe is really a gentle giant.



ARD to believe if you remember Lord Vader's ruthless pursuit of the freedom fighters, his savage laser beam duels with Ben (Obi-wan) Kenobi and Luke Skywalker, and his cruel treatment of Han Solo. As C-3PO, the inoffensive, fussy golden robot of the Star Wars series, might have whispered confidentially to his little metal friend R2-D2; "That Lord Vader really is no gentleman."

But when Darth Vader leaves that distant galaxy and flies back to earth, he is a changed man, even if he does keep his hand in by occasionally hurling 82 kilo (13-stone) heavies around. For here on planet Earth, Darth Vader becomes Dave Prowse, an amiable actor who likes nothing better than writing books for children, teaching people how to keep fit and advising youngsters on road safety. In fact, the Green Cross Code Man is none other than Darth Vader, alias Dave Prowse.

But it's as a powerful villain that Dave has made his name. Not surprising when you learn he was British Heavyweight Weight Lifting Champion three times, once entered the Mr. Universe contest, and won third place in the World Caber Tossing Championships.

"Whenever strong arm stuff is called for,

they send for me," says Dave Prowse. "Like a recent role where I had to lift a 13-stone man above my head before dashing him to the ground. That takes some doing . . . you have to be pretty fit."

Keeping fit is something Dave takes very seriously, so seriously, in fact, that he has his own gymnasium where his clients include a millionaire. "By showing other people keep fit exercises, I keep in shape myself," he says.

Supremely fit though he is, even Dave's bulging biceps and barrel chest couldn't win him the film role he has always wanted to play — that of Superman. Not that it was his super strength that was at fault — it was his voice. A Bristolian, Dave's West Country accent didn't go down too well with the film-makers, who thought Superman should be an all-American product. Although he lost the part, there was some compensation, however, when Dave was hired to train and build up Christopher Reeve, the eventual choice as the hero of Superman — The Movie.

Even in the depths of space, Dave Prowse couldn't find his voice. "I recorded Darth Vader's script for the film," he says. "Then it was decided to substitute the voice of James Earl Jones. That, too, was changed for the final version of the film, James' words being slowed down and processed electronically."

But almost everything else you see in Star Wars and The Empire Strikes Back is genuine Dave Prowse. And he needed all his strength and agility for the part of Darth Vader.

"The suit alone weighed 40lb," he says, "which took some carrying around. I also trained with the British fencing coach for the duelling scenes. That was hot work because it's very steamy inside Lord Vader's headpiece and I needed to stop every so often and wipe my eyes."

Back on earth, Darth Vader's fan mail is only matched by that of the Green Cross Code Man, and the children of the neighbourhood regard their double wonderman with awe. In fact, the only locals who haven't joined the Dave Prowse Appreciation Society are his own children, 15-year-old Steven, James (12) and Rachel (9).

"When I was filming Star Wars," says Dave, "I invited the boys to spend a day on the set, told them they would see all the action, and meet the stars for lunch. Their only reaction was, 'Do we have to come? Okay, then, but can't we go out and eat at a MacDonald's?"



If the young Prowses have grown used to Dad's Darth Vader stardom, they will soon be able to see him in a variety of other roles. He is to play the strong-arm cousin of a private detective in the three-part BBC TV production. The Rose And The Medallion; has appeared on Saturday Night At The Mill; and is to make a film, The Orion Project. Dave is also touring the country as the Green Cross Code Man and lecturing on all aspects of road safety in 16 cities. And he has written a book on that subject, to be published later this year, in which the Green Cross Code Man shares comic strips with stars such as Morecambe and Wise, Kenny Everett. Cliff Richard, Henry Cooper, and the big names of Star Wars.

After that, it will almost be time for Darth Vader to head back to the Empire — and as the galactic wars enter another thrilling phase, the black-caped villain of the universe won't exactly be lecturing Luke Skywalker, Princess Leia and their friends on road safety..!

Summer Pudding is one of the loveliest and easiest to make of traditional dishes and the summer fruits can be varied according to what is in season. Honey is used in this recipe instead of sugar to sweeten the fruit. This pudding needs to be made the day before you want to eat it, so you have to plan ahead.

SUMMER PUDDING



 $15g(\frac{1}{2}oz.)$ butter

8 slices white bread

750g (1½lb.) mixed summer fruits e.g. raspberries, blackberries, loganberries, red and black currants, apple slices

60ml (4 tablespoons) clear honey


150ml (4 pint) double cream

15ml (1 tablespoon) icing sugar

Grease a 1 litre (2 pint) pudding basin with butter. Cut the crusts off the bread and arrange six slices of the bread, slightly overlapping, around the bottom and sides. Put the fruits and honey in a saucepan and gently stew for 10 minutes. Strain off some of the juices and pour over the bread in the basin. Put half of the stewed fruit into basin. Cover with a slice of bread then add the remaining fruit. Cover with more bread. Place a small plate over the top of the basin with a weight on the top to press down the fruit and bread. (Use a can from the food cupboard if a weight is not available). Stand the basin on a plate in case any juice is squeezed out. Chill overnight in the refrigerator then turn out onto a serving dish. Whip the cream, stir in the icing sugar and serve this with the Summer Pudding.
































In Paul McCartney's hit single Waterfalls, he advises us not to go chasing polar bears in the great unknown. But he says nothing about being chased by polar bears — and Paul found out all about that a few weeks ago when he was making a

special video film to go with the single . . .

A 2.5 metres (8') high polar bear was hired from David Chipperfield's Circus to be deposited on an Arctic scene (made of three-and-a-half tons of polystyrene!) to provide the appropriate background for Paul's film. As you must know, polar bears are vicious animals and during the course of a long day's shooting (from eight in the morning until late at night) this particular bear became rather tired and irritable. But he did appear to like Waterfalls as every time it was played he perked up — though unfortunately he didn't take too kindly to its composer and, yes, you've guessed it, insisted on chasing him. Consequently, even though the bear was kept well under control, Paul had to keep looking over his shoulder to make sure that he wasn't running up behind him to give him a hug. The bear-faced cheek of it!


Waterfalls is the only track on Paul's latest album, McCartney II, that was written before he started on the LP. And McCartney II is his first solo album for ten years — so what made him decide to do it?

"After we'd done the last Wings album, Back To The Egg," he says, "I was fed up with the idea of 'making albums', churning them out. So I hired a 16-track machine and a couple of microphones to plug straight into it, and I put it into the front parlour of this old farmhouse near my home in Scotland. I had no mixing console. It was just like a great big cassette recorder. I wanted to have some private fun, and I thought I'd produce a cassette we could play in the car.

"I was in total control. I had no echochambers, no trick machines. I'd play the snare drum in the tiled kitchen to get an echô, or fiddle with the machine and guess what interval was needed on my voice to do the effect. I made up everything, except for Waterfalls, as I went along. I'd go on my bike last summer to the farmhouse, and a song might spring out of what I'd seen on TV the night before. It was like being a sculptor, chopping and changing as I went along."

Waterfalls is, in fact, a song that was left over from the last Wings album, but how did it come about?

"It could have been called I Need Love," says Paul, "but that would have been too ordinary. I just had this waterfalls and lake idea, from the notices you see in American tourist resorts. That's how I did Eleanor Rigby (an early Beatles hit). I just had the first line in my mind, and it developed from there. The lyrics to Waterfalls were working lyrics, gut lyrics, just spewed out. I thought I'd have to get serious and sensible and change them. Lyrics like that I >>>top.19









Just like all the others have worked, in fact, and made Mr McCartney a millionaire a couple of times over.

"Linda is the lucky one," he says. "She could just sit on the farm and be very content. But I'm a bit fiddiy and have to go off in a corner and write a song to get the grey matter going. It just doesn't occur to me that I've made so much money I could retire.

"One of the reasons I got into songwriting in the first place was through looking at old films. A lot of them seemed to have this character who is a songwriter who sits at home and is a bit of a laugh. That's really what I've always tried to imagine myself to be."

And not only is Paul a stay-at-home songwriter, he's the father to four children, too, and a little while ago it was the eldest, his 17-year-old step-daughter Heather, who led to him taking a good look at himself — what he was and what he wanted to become. They'd had a bit of a row, she left the house for a while and when she came back they talked about it and made up. Then Heather told her father what her friends had said. Paul explains:

"They were all the sons and daughters of famous and influential people and they'd said to her 'You've no need to worry about your Dad' and she'd asked 'Why?' and they'd said 'Because if he gives you any more trouble you can tell the newspapers'.

"Just realising that she was mixing with children who had this mentality was very worrying. It was the thing that sparked off a whole change for me."

In fact. Paul moved the whole family out of their £300,000 home in St. John's Wood, London, into a two-bedroomed cottage in a Sussex forest.

"In the country they had to go through a week of walking to school with the other kids singing Mull Of Kintyre, but it's still a much better life for them than in London.

"The kids learn about flowers and Linda cooks, and I tinker about in the garden building chicken hutches. I like all that. I never did it as a kid.

"But it keeps my feet on the ground. When you're the father and someone says 'we need a chicken hutch', you go out and get some wood and some wire and you put one up.

"We've got horses, peacocks, geese, chickens, hamsters, turtles, doves. Heather totalled it up and including the goldfish we've got sixty-five pets!





Ten years ago, a young Londoner named Mike Borne achieved national fame when he appeared with Out Of Town's Jack Hargreaves — that hardy perennial of the TV screen — in a refreshing series that taught a cockney lad the tricks of the rural trade.

Mike enjoyed himself enormously, and learnt a lot, too. The experience also affected Jack in a big way, and recently the germ of the Country Boy idea reached fruition when the Out Of Town Centre opened in Beaulieu, near Southampton — and Jack's dream of a venue giving town children a first taste of farming life at last became reality.



HE Centre was founded by Southern TV and the Inner London Education Authority with the support of the Beaulieu Estate, after an initial struggle by Jack to raise the money and get planning permission.

Now hundreds of schoolchildren from London and urban areas in the South are benefiting from the sixty-acre farm-holding alongside the estuary of the Beaulieu River. They generally spend a week at the Centre, and get involved in all varieties of farming life, including milking goats, feeding horses, cows and poultry, and planting vegetables.

Richard Tippett paid a recent visit to the Centre, and asked Jack about its purpose.

"The Centre has an absolutely specific object, which is to show urban children what lies behind the food they eat. Many are really surprised. I remember when we were doing Country Boy Mike Borne's jaw dropped when he first saw that new potatoes were actually dug from the ground!"


The Centre is adequately populated animal-wise, but Jack is looking for more. "We've got a nice beef cattle herd who've just calved for the first time; we shall have at least a couple of dairy cows; we shall have three or four young sows; we shall have lots of poultry, and a work-horse which at the moment is up at my place. We'll have rabbits, goat's — and bees."

That's looking ahead to the not-too-distant future, but Jack's more than delighted with the present position of the Centre. "It's

working absolutely marvellously," he said with enthusiasm. "The experience it's providing for the kids is out of this world. They come here from the towns on a Monday morning and run away from the animals, but by Friday they're getting up from bed early so that they've got an extra chance to feed them.

"And the letters that we receive from the schools after they've been here...!

"One of the most rewarding things about the venture has been the way in which the




country people, too, have taken it to their hearts and worked with it. You see, on our farm, you view things in miniature — you can't understand a big poultry enterprise unless you've seen a broody hen with chicks; you can't understand a modern dairy parlour unless you've seen a cow milked by hand.

"So the children do see these things in their small basic state at the Centre, then we send them on visits to see them on a bigger scale, and the local farmers have been absolutely wonderful — they've helped the children at the cattle market and in the big dairy parlours.

"The fact of the matter is that what we provide is the original baptism to the idea that there is another world. All I can say is that when they come here they don't know that there is such a thing as an agricultural life; by the time they leave a lot of them have got the taste to come back again, and you can't say more than that."

But the greatest vote of confidence in the Centre is that it's booked up for school visits for the next five years to come!






