When I go and investigate UFO sightings I take a special report form for the observer of the UFO to fill in and then I look for evidence.





In the week of the AAA championships at Crystal Palace we look at the Olympic achievements of some of the sport's top British stars...

MOSCOWMAGICI

With the Moscow Olympic Games a thing of the past, we can all look forward to Los Angeles in 1984 when the Olympic flame will once again illuminate the world's greatest sporting occasion. In the meantime we'll be able to look back and savour those very special memories of some awe-inspiring performances by British athletes in Russia.

The title of 'the greatest all-round athlete in the world' now rests on the broad shoulders of **DALEY THOMPSON**, (our back-page pin-up) after his popular decathlon gold medal win. Even though Daley beat Russian Juri Katsenkov into second place the partisan Soviet crowd took the extrovert Thompson to their hearts.

Daley could now earn himself a fortune in the same way former Olympic champion Bruce Jenner has done in his native America by endorsing various products and appearing in films.

So what does the future hold for 21-year-old Daley — will he carry on in athletics or will the big money lure him away? Says Daley, "Obviously, everyone would like to earn a living doing what they do best, but for my own conscience I think I'd prefer to say at 35, 'well, I gave it my best shot and got the best out of myself before I gave up'."

Success

His success story is an object lesson for all sporting hopefuls, for at the age of 16 he was told by a top coach that he would never make a decathlete because, although big and fairly fast, he didn't seem to have the all-round co-ordination and dedication. Says Daley, "Really, I was only messing about at athletics in those days. Soccer was the game for me. I just joined the local athletics club at Haywards Heath for something to do." Eventually athletics took over from football bringing a reward of nearly every major honour possible, including, of course, that priceless gold medal.

Scotsman ALLAN WELLS arrived home from the Moscow Olympics to a civic reception in which thousands of people turned out to greet their hero, for 28 year-old Wells had just become 'the fastest man in the world'.

It was a desperate dip of the head that won him the gold medal in the 100 metres final forcing the favourite, Silvio Leonard, of Cuba, into second place.

Funnily enough, it wasn't until just four years ago in 1976 that Allan took to sprint-

ing. Before that his main event was the long jump, his best jump being 24 ft ¼ in. Although not world-class, he was not as bad as some people have been led to believe. In fact, it was his sprinting that let his long-jumping down. Sprinting plays a very important part in the long jump and Allan explained, "I didn't know anything about sprinting then. I didn't know anything about power and strength. To be honest, I was afraid of sprinting because I didn't like the thought of being beaten by five men all at once."

Performances

SEB COE and STEVE OVETT did as well as everybody expected, winning four medals between them, but the performances of two aspiring young track stars were equally as rewarding. DAVID WARREN raced out of his skin to join his two superstar team mates in the final of the 800 metres, and in reaching the final of the 1,500 metres 19 year-old blond giant STEVE CRAM showed that Seb and Steve will have to keep a watch on his progress in the future.


Another performance of great character was that of **GARY OAKES** who surprisingly qualified for the 400 metres hurdle final. Who would have thought that this virtually unknown North London athlete would bring home a bronze medal?

Polish 'queen of athletes' Irene Szewinska was winning medals the year LINSEY MACDONALD was born, and if it wasn't for a tendon injury midway through the 400 metre semi-final it's doubtful that Linsey would have qualified for the final itself. But let's not take anything away from the little 16-year-old Scot, for she also showed her great potential in the women's 4 x 400 metres relay team with DONNA HARTLEY, JOCELYN HOYTE-SMITH and MICHELLE PROBERT, which captured a well-earned bronze medal.

KATHY SMALLWOOD reached a very strong 100 metres final, while she was joined by BEVERLEY GODDARD and SONIA LANNAMAN to give us three representatives in the 200 metres final.

These performances, plus those of 400 metres finalist **DAVID JENKINS** will hopefully provide the inspiration for youngsters all over Britain.


Elsewhere, England's Soccer team start their World Cup qualifying programme against Norway at Wembley on Wednesday. Look out for action — and lots of goals.



harvest Time

September is the time for harvest and for some of you this probably means a Festival service in church where the congregation donates gifts of food, especially fruit and vegetables, to be distributed to various charities. But did you know that many years ago, before mechanised equipment was used, the farmer and his helpers had to reap all the



corn by hand? When the reaping was finished the helpers made a corn dolly with the last few stalks and this was taken home with the last load of corn in a big cart decorated with flowers and branches of oak and ash. This cart was pulled by four or six horses which were decorated with garlands of flowers and ribbons, and the helpers rode on top of the load, shouting, singing and blowing horns.

That evening a special Harvest Supper was held for all who had helped with the harvest. It usually consisted of food such as roast meat, plum puddings, pies, lots of apples and never-ending supplies of cider or beer. Honey was very popular, too.

The following recipe has a lovely taste of harvest about it as it uses two of the Harvest Supper's chief ingredients: 'cider' and honey.

harvest Chicken

(enough for four)

4 chicken portions
4 onions
40g (1½0z) butter
25g (10z) plain flour
salt and pepper
600ml (1 pint) non-alcoholic 'cider',
(or apple juice)
30ml (2 tablespoons) clear honey
450g (11b) carrots
30ml (2 tablespoons) soy sauce
30ml (2 tablespoons) top of the milk

Peel the onions and carrots and cut them into quarters. Melt the butter in a heavy saucepan and cook the chicken and onions. When golden brown on all sides sprinkle over the flour, salt and pepper. When the flour is slightly brown pour over the 'cider' and honey. Add the carrots and soy sauce. Put the lid on the saucepan and cook on a very low heat for 45 minutes. Just before serving stir in the top of the milk and add more salt and pepper if needed. Serve with boiled rice and a salad.

Earlier this year we looked at some of the Heavy Metal bands that had been taking the charts by storm. Since then, of course, those powerhouse HM sounds have been heard more and more on the nation's airwaves and we've seen the arrival of several new outfits and the revival of some 'old faithfuls'. They all have their own particular character, naturally, but there's one expression they'd all be happy to go along with . . .

PLAY IT

A look at the line-ups for all of Britain's top open-air pop festivals this year — including the recent Bank Holiday celebrations at Reading — will confirm one loud and clear fact about the current rock scene: Heavy Metal music has powered back with a vengeance which has astonished the critics who had written it off just a few years before.

Now, though, a whole new crop of heavy metal bands is storming through other passing musical fashions to make a mark among the most popular and revered groups of the day.

IRON MAIDEN'S debut album called Iron Maiden, hammered its way to number four in the charts, and their singles Running Free and Sanctuary both pounded into the top 30. Steve Harris, of the band, explained why he thought the new wave of heavy metal groups was so popular. "Heavy metal music never went away but some of the big bands became too big, and they are now too distant from their fans. Bands like us are more easy to identify with, because we are the same age as our fans.

"It's like the punk thing in the sense that when the kids see us playing, they feel that they could do the same, and more of them get together to form bands of their own and have a bash.

"A couple of years ago it was hard for us to get gigs because we were not playing punk. But we were determined not to change to fit that fashion — now our faith has been rewarded," said Steve.



Iron Maiden are undoubtedly one of the most popular of the new wave of heavy metal bands, and so are a group of five down-to-earth Yorkshire lads, who call themselves **SAXON**. They have been together for three years, and they also regard themselves as a working band, who are happiest when they are on the road. It was a tour as support to heavy metal giant **MOTORHEAD** which really established them on a nationwide scale.

"It was a great tour for us," said Bif, Saxon's explosive singer. "We knew that if the Motorhead fans did not like us, they would really give us a hard time — after all they had come to see Motorhead, not us. Fortunately, we went down really well, and now both bands have a lot of the same fans."

Saxon's second album Wheels Of Steel heralded their





www.fromp.15 arrival into the top leage of heavy bands, and at one point this year they had three singles in the charts at the same time, with Wheels Of Steel, 747 and Big Teaser/Rainbow Theme.

While Saxon and Iron Maiden have been around long enough to remember the not-so-good-times, some of their contemporaries have been fortunate to arrive as the heavy scene is buoyant. Among those is Samson, who are being tipped by many as the band to watch this year, following the release of their debut album Head On and the double A-side single Vice Versa Hammerhead.

Samson are a four-piece band, who developed quite a cult following on the strength of an independent album which was released last year. Then they toured with ace heavy guitarist Robin Trower. "It was the first tour on which everything was really positive and exciting," recalled guitarist Paul Samson. "We had been feeling each other out up until that point — and suddenly we felt really confident with that tour."

It's noticeable that all the bands mentioned so far have adopted names which represent fierce, warrior-like characters — a mood



which is reflected in the loud and proud music they make. Yet not all the heavy bands are so blatant.

Take GIRLSCHOOL. They are acknowledged as Britain's best all-girl heavy metal group. The current line up of Kim McAuliffe (vocals and guitar), Enid Williams (vocals and bass), Kelly Johnson (guitar and vocals) and Denise Dufort (drums) came together in 1978, and they, too, spent a long time on the road before cutting an album Demolition, which has recently been released, earning praise for Kelly's high powered guitar work and Kim's distinctive vocals.


Girlschool began to make a name for themselves at the beginning of 1979 when they released a single **Take It All Away**, which sold over 8,000 copies despite the fact that it was produced on an independent label and had no national distribution. Not bad for starters!

The single release resulted in Girlschool going out as support to heavy rock favourites Motorhead on a massive UK tour — the first time that they had played in major venues.

That was the spark that ignited the flame; Bronze Records saw the girls, signed them up, and now they're really on their way, with the hit-parade success of **Race With The Devil.**

GIRL, another band who are tipped for stardom, are, confusingly, all boys, and they laid the foundations for their success with some energetic performances in support of UFO on a recent tour.

Australia has not produced many rock stars, but one outlandish band from the outback play with enough excitement to keep us all hopping like kangaroos! AC/DC. The band suffered a tragedy when lead singer Bon Scott died earlier this year, but after a lot of searching they have found a replacement singer, Brian Johnson. Brian comes from the North East of England and used to be with GEORDIE, who enjoyed moderate success a few years ago.



He has a lot to live up to in following Bon, but AC/DC have a new album **Back In Black** (which, astonishingly, entered the LP charts at No. 1!) showing that they have lost none of their aggression and they will be touring this month, when no doubt guitarist Angus Young, who dances around on stage dressed in schoolboy uniform (complete with short trousers) will once again set audiences alight.

The revival of popular support for heavy sounds has resulted in a revival of the fortunes of a number of bands who never went away completely, but whose careers had lulled. **BLACK SABBATH** have come screeching back and they have weathered the departure of popular vocalist Ozzie Osbourne by brining in an equally effective singer, Ronnie James Dio, who used to be with **RAINBOW**.

Özzie is hoping to prove that he made the right decision in leaving Sabbath, by starting out with a new heavy band of his own, called BLIZZARD OF OZ, and meanwhile Sabbath have crashed into the charts with two albums Heaven and Hell and Live At Last.

Rainbow, the band that Ronnie James Dio left, are still doing well, under the guidance of Ritchie Blackmore, who is a former member of one of the best respected heavy metal bands of the 1970s, **DEEP PURPLE**, themselves recently at number one in the album charts with a 'greatest hits' compilation, **Deepest Purple**, and high in the singles chart with rivived HM anthem, **Black Night**.

Since Deep Purple broke up, the individual members have gone on to establish themselves all over again in new bands.
