Her family and friends used to laugh, so she started building up an act until she made her first stage appearance at the age of 9 at the Arnold Liberal Club in Nottingham, Crackerjack was her first television appearance when she was 10, and she also would have appeared on Opportunity Knocks but they found out she was too young to appear!

Her next chance—the big breakthrough! - came in 1979 when she auditioned for Tiswas. Chris fell about laughing at her impressions and she soon became a regular face on the show. In this series, she's going through the whole range of her impressions: Maggie Thatcher; Shirley Bassey; Cilla Black; Peters and Lee: Kate Bush: Debbie Harry; Magnus Pyke; Bill and Barby from ITV's Love Thy Neighbour; Michael Crawford; Lena Martell; Crystal Gayle; Ken Dodd; Rigsby from Rising Damp; Pat Coombs; The Glums; The Liverbirds; as well as sound effects at an airport!

# OH, GOODY-AND SMITH!




Starting this Tuesday at 4.45 is the first instalment of a super new six-part comedy series from Thames TV called Smith And Goody.







No two ways about it, the most successful record-selling newcomers last year were The Police and Gary Numan.

Odd when you think that, so far this year, both seem to have been relatively quiet. Strangely enough, Gary Numan couldn't have been working much harder.

1980 has seen him take the show he presented here last autumn to the States, Europe and Japan, and there's also been the release of a video cassette made on his UK tour along with We Are Glass. Plus the recording of his recent single, I Die: You Die and album Telekon. The video tape (the first of its kind) lasts just under an hour and features a special film of Cars, the rest of the tape being made in concert. The single has already been a chart success and Telekon looks set to repeat the success of his previous albums. Apart from that, Gary's done very

Seemingly instant worldwide success and all that goes with it leaves its mark on many stars, but Gary has made a conscious effort to keep all the trappings of the music business firmly at arm's length. In fact, ever since Are Friends Electric roared, unexpectedly, into the number one position in May last year, he has constantly hinted and warned through songs and interviews that he will not be doing this for ever. Although whether or not his current burst of activity is his last remains to be seen.


### **PRESSURE**


Gary has remained a little nervous, bewildered and, indeed, wary of anyone or anything in the music world. As he says: "It's all just a job, no matter what," and feels his newer songs are not quite as good as those written when he started. "I write now because I have to, there's always a pressure on you to get stuff out." The problem of staying a top songwriter seems one which bothers Numan and obviously explains his hints about not wishing to remain a recording star forever.

Songwriting aside, though, Gary's flow of musical ideas seems unstoppable. Talking about Telekon, he points out that the heavy synthesiser sound which dominated his album The Pleasure Principle has made a little room for some guitar as well as his new interests, piano and violin (check out his recent B-sides). He also says the responsibility for this must rest with Billy Curie of Ultravox, who worked with him last year.

Gary starts a full British tour this month with a stage show promised to be even more spectacular than before, while Telekon and I Die: You Die seem destined to keep his name prominent for months to come.

Whether Gary continues to record or decides to follow his interests in flying, books or films remains his decision, but then, of course, no-one's ever quite been able to predict the workings of that intangible Numan factor . . .

# ANIMAL ALLSORTS

It is very difficult to imagine a world without animals. Even if we live in a town and have no pets we are still in close contact with creatures, quite often in ways which we have not really considered.

What, for example, are you wearing just now? A sweater, perhaps made of wool from a sheep? Or leather shoes? Remember, leather was once the skin of an animal. Are you by chance drinking a cup of tea — with milk — as you read this article? Or eating a cheese sandwich? Perhaps you are even tucking into a plateful of bacon and eggs! Well, we all know that milk comes from cows, that chickens lay eggs and that bacon is from pigs — these are all farm animals. Of course, there are also vast numbers of pet animals of various kinds which help keep us company and share our lives; it is important that, as far as we can, we try to treat these animals sensibly and without cruelty. This week we've got a recipe for fun party rolls which make a change from the more usual hot dogs. They're fairly inexpensive to make and are ideal for a party because the rolls can be prepared and filled in advance and popped into the oven as your friends arrive.

# SPAGHETTI AND BANGER BOATS



10 bread rolls

75g (3oz.) butter

Two 447g (15\frac{3}{4} oz.) cans spaghetti hoops in tomato sauce

6 cooked sausages

50g (2 oz.) grated cheese

Cut a slice from the top of each bread roll. Carefully hollow out most of the centre of the rolls (this can be saved and made into breadcrumbs). Spread the inside of each roll generously with butter. Place in the oven at 180 deg. C (350 deg. F) or gas mark 4 for 10 minutes to crisp the rolls. Slice the cooked sausages and mix with the spaghetti hoops, divide amongst the hollowed rolls. Sprinkle the grated cheese on the top. Place rolls back in the oven at 180 deg. C (350 deg. F) or gas mark 4 for about 20 minutes so that the spaghetti is heated through.

### HIGHBOARD DIVING

It is at the beginning of his dive that the diver is travelling at his slowest speed so he tries to get as high off the board as he can and get into his dive pattern as soon as he can.



Even with a good take-off a diver has just 1.75 seconds before he strikes the water. The best divers get as high up off the board as possible, giving themselves precious extra fractions of a second. They'll be entering the water at around thirty miles per hour so a clean entry is essential, as near vertical as the dive allows, the body extended along a 'straight line', the fingers clenched in a fist to 'punch' an entry into the water.

There are around seventy different dives possible, split into six groups. For the Highboard these are:

Forward Dives
Back Dives
Reverse Dives
Inward Dives
Twist Dives
Armstand Dives
(Highboard only)

Let's start with this week's National Highboard Diving Championships...

# PLAIN AND FANCY!

IVING is really a sport of the 20th Century, that has escalated in popularity with the development of safe, sturdy diving platforms and totally enclosed diving pools. Have you noticed the strong similarity between gymnastics and diving? This is no coincidence. Early in the 19th Century gymnasts used to perform their exercises over water, in favourable weather, preferring to get wet rather than to break their fall on the more unyielding gymnasium floor! Diving involving gymnastic routines became known as Fancy Diving. Plain diving, or plunging, was the straightforward dive off the side of the pool.


In 1895 the first World National Graceful Diving Competition was held, open to all-comers and staged by the Royal Life-Saving Society at Highgate Pond, London. The 10 metre board, the first ever to be erected in the world, was a temporary wooden structure, erected just for those favourable weeks each summer, and then dismantled. Indeed there seemed to be more risk at stake climbing a thirty foot vertical ladder in windy weather, up a shaky wooden tower, than the ensuing dive into freezing water!

Highboard Diving finally moved indoors in 1934, when the Wembley Empire Pool was opened. The same pool also staged the first indoor Olympic Diving Competition in 1948 after which it was sadly converted into an ice rink! No official would dream of such a decision today with diving established as one of the world's most exciting sports!

# THE FIRST STEPS TO DIVING...

Getting used to being in and under the water, building up your confidence before you learn to dive, is absolutely essential. Holding your breath and opening your eyes under water is something that you should really learn to do. Only try these exercises when you can swim and when you feel confident. The easiest way to float face down is the Tuck float (1). By trying to touch your toes under water your feet will rise to meet your hands and you have the Pike Float (2). Now try gliding (3) to the bottom of the pool, touching it with your fingertips. Once on the bottom of the pool try to crouch on the balls of your feet and push off (4) for the surface...

It's much safer to learn to dive off the side



of the pool before venturing onto even the lowest springboard! Always dive into a depth of water that is equal to your own height. If you are 1.37 metres (4' 6") tall get used to floating and gliding in that depth of water before you dive into it! Begin with the low falling dive from a sitting position entering the water at 45 deg. and diving to the bottom. Next try the Sitting Spring position straightening your legs and pushing your hips up as you bend towards the water. The Spring will give you that first thrill of flight!

The next step is the standing dive. The Pike Fall is very important. Try to enter the water as a diver who has completed his dive would do, in a straight line, your body entering the water through the 'hole' your hands have made. Keep your body slightly bent at the hips until your feet are under water.

The Spring Header is the first real standing dive. Move your weight onto the balls of your feet, bend your knees and spring, driving your hips up and moving your shoulders forward. Bring your hands together just before you enter the water. The angle of entry should be near to vertical but never past it.

Chris won gold at the 1978 Commonwealth Games springboard event — with a points total that was higher than any achieved before by any diver in international competition. Moreover he also won the Commonwealth title in the highboard at which he was comparatively inexperienced. At this weekend's National Highboard Diving Championship, Chris, if competing, will be the one to beat. Not bad for a young man Chris, if competing, will be the one to beat. Not back for a young who, as an 11-year-old living in Hornchurch, Essex, took up diving "just for something to do rather than play about on the streets."
