Give Mum or Dad a hand this weekend by making some tasty soda bread for lunch or tea. It's quick and easy to make and delicious eaten with a warming mug of soup.

Country Herb soda Bread



1 large onion

3 sticks celery

50g (2oz.) Cheddar cheese

225g (8oz.) plain flour

225g (8oz.) wholemeal flour

5ml (1 level teaspoon) salt

5ml (1 level teaspoon) bicarbonate of soda

25g (loz.) butter

5ml (1 level teaspoon) mixed herbs

30ml (2 level tablespoons) chopped fresh parsley

or 15ml (1 level tablespoon) dried parsley

225ml (½ pint less 4 tablespoons) milk

10ml (2 teaspoons) lemon juice

a little milk for brushing

Skin and grate the onion. Wash and grate the celery. Finely grate the cheese. Sift the plain flour into a large mixing bowl, stir in the wholemeal flour, salt and bicarbonate of soda. Rub the butter in with the fingertips until the mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the onion, celery, mixed herbs and parsley. Mix the milk and lemon juice together, stir into the dry ingredients with a palette knife to form a soft dough. Turn out onto a floured surface and knead lightly. Shape the dough into a 22cm (9 inch) round and place on a floured baking tray. Score top into eight segments, brush with milk and sprinkle with cheese. Bake in the oven at $200\,^{\circ}\text{C}$ ($400\,^{\circ}\text{F}$) or Regulo gas mark 6 for 30-35 minutes, until well risen and golden brown. Serve spread with butter or cream cheese.







Look-in's Peter Jeffries talked to them recently while they were still enjoying the success of their fourth hit I Wanna Hold Your Hand, following in the footsteps of Shooting Star, Who Were You With In The Moonlight and Love's Gotta Hold On Me.

Both Thereze and David have vast experience of the entertainment world, including dancing and drama, but it was in the field of music that they felt most comfortable. With fame and fortune thrust upon them so early in life with their success with Guys and Dolls, was it a hard decision to quit the group? "Not really," answered Thereze. "We weren't very happy with the type of music the band were doing. It was too middle of the road for us and it was making us feel quite old. We were keen to better ourselves musically and do some good, young, pop-disco sounds.

"For about nine months after we made that decision we really hit an all-time low, but, funnily enough, had some of the best times of our lives while we were struggling to re-make a name for ourselves. But in all that time we never regretted making the break. There was no real animosity between us and the other members of Guys And Dolls but we haven't spoken to, or kept in touch, with them. We were determined to make it a clean break."

With that clean break came the need for a completely new image and, indeed, a new name. How did they arrive at Dollar? "Well," replied David, "we were sitting

around one day trying specifically to think of a good name. We didn't want to be called Guy. And Doll or Boy And Girl or anything like that, so we had this crazy idea that we could keep our identities secret if we called ourselves the name of a band, then nobody would know we were the two from Guys and Dolls. We even went as far as the American sounding name of Dollar but, unfortunately, it didn't work too well. In fact the D.J. who played our first record on the radio let the cat out of the bag straight away, introducing us as 'ex-Guys and Dolls members, Dollar'."

Both Dave and Thereze are very conscious of the need of a good image and in this way think that they're a little bit different from the average group. They spend a lot of time discussing what to wear and feel that a bit of glamour is necessary in their business. "We like to look a bit special," said Thereze, "because when the public pay a lot of money to see you it's very important that you look the part. We try to keep up to date with the latest fashions and wear the trendiest clothes."

"At the moment," added Dave, "we're really into mod type gear; we're not mods, it's just that I like to wear Ben Sherman shirts, small tie knots and things like that. We put even more thought behind what we were going to wear for I Wanna Hold Your Hand because we wanted to capture some of the feel of the early sixties era when the song first came out."

talent has also meant that the twosome have also been able to write a lot more of their own material. "Yes, that's true," said Dave. "sometimes you can just sit down and force yourself to write, but the easiest ones come when you're just walking down the street, or something like that."

"When I used to go out shopping," added Thereze. "I would think of a complete song, the words, the music, everything, but by the time I had got back home I'd have forgotten the whole lot. So I decided to get a tiny cassette recorder and then everytime I'd get an idea I'd sing it into the cassette. Trouble was that the silly thing was always breaking down!"

You'll be able to hear a lot of their own songs on a great new album that they're planning for early this year. What kind of music can we expect on it?

"Gosh, we don't really know ourselves yet," replied Dave. "At the moment we've only done two tracks that we know for sure will go on the album, and they are much 'rockier' than on the last one. We're thinking of having a couple of ballads, but I don't know if they'll be like Love's Got A Hold On Me—they'll be more like the kind of stuff Dr. Hook do."

"It'll be a lot more contemporary," added Thereze, "the last album was just a collection of songs that sounded like hits. There wasn't really that much of us involved in it. The new album will, hopefully, be what we're all about and we're very excited about it."

With a British tour planned, we'll be seeing a lot more of David and Thereze in the next few months. You could say that you'll definitely get your money's worth with Dollar...







FROM SPOT TO SPIT

The characters of Spit The Dog and Charlie The Monkey play a prominent part in Tiswas . . . they have done since last April, when Bob Carolgees first became a part of the Saturday morning series (which is now shown in most areas). Recently, Bob spoke to Richard Tippett about what makes his part in the series tick.

"Frank Carson introduced me to it," he said. "He'd seen me in a club and invited me down with the 'monkey', Charlie, and the 'dog', Spit, to ATV Studios. I literally followed Frank into the studio, and started fooling around with Charlie. Everyone loved it, and they all fell about laughing, so within two or three weeks, I was scripted well and truly into the show."

How did Bob get the idea of calling his dog Spit? "Actually," he replied, "it was originally called Spot; the reason I gave him that name was because he didn't have any spots! But when I first started using him in my act, I accidentally called him Spit, and everyone thought it funny. So I added the spitting gesture, and the name stuck. That happened three years ago."

Bob actually made his first puppet six years back, and he's got some nine or ten in his repertoire now, "but I'm always looking for new characters."

He gets some good mileage out of the present ones, though. He explains: "I used to take the monkey into pubs and clubs with me. "On one occasion, in a pub in Liverpool, I wandered around with him, and generally gave everyone a good laugh. But one guy, who'd had a drink or two, thought he was real and squeezed his face. So I lifted Charlie's arm, and made him grab the guy's cap.

"Unfortunately, he was bald and didn't want anyone to know about it. So he took it out on Charlie and started belting his arm, not realising that the monkey couldn't feel a thing.",

Right now Bob has a little problem over his surname. "When the Tiswas team go out together, people can never remember my name, so I'm known as Spit. A recent example—the other day I went into a little shop in a village in Wales, where I was doing my act. Four or five teenagers came in, took a look at me and said, 'there's old Spit.' Still, it's nice to be recognised!"

As you can see from his very popular appearances on **Tiswas**, Bob gets on really well with children. "I started out as an adult entertainer," he said, "but I did children's parties, and got on with them like a house on fire. I like to go out on location with Charlie and Spit, and meet the kids. Most of them get on well with the puppets and either stage friendly fights or fall about laughing at them."

Bob enjoys the improvisation that **Tiswas** allows him, and only has a vague outline of what is going to happen as the show progresses. "I've always enjoyed improvising, and there's no better place for it than **Tiswas**.

"As for the future, I wouldn't mind having my own series, as long as I feel I could cope with it. Lots of things that I do in cabaret you don't see in **Tiswas**, and I could employ mime, gags, tricks and stand-up patter in a series.


