





This Tuesday, 28th October, at 7.30 p.m. Thames TV will once again be setting out to find Britain's Strongest Man — last year the title went to Olympic shot-putter Geoff Capes. So here we take a look at a few facts about some of the strongest, the biggest, the greatest and the most mind-boggling people and events in history . . .

As early as Roman times, there were great competitions to find the strongest, fastest and most athletic men. And as soon as a record had been set, along would come someone else to do just that little bit better.

Compared to the rest of the animal world, man is illequipped for feats of physical endeavour. The strongest land animal is probably the African bush elephant (which also happens to be the largest) standing an average of 3.20m (10ft 6in) at the shoulder and weighing 5.6 tons. Compare this with the heaviest man recorded in the Guinness Book of Records -Francis John Lang of Iowa, USA, born in 1934, who was a mere 538kg (84st 11lb). He was so big that, when he had to undergo medical treatment, he couldn't get through the hospital doors and had to be treated in a caravan in the car park!

The fastest land animal in the world is the cheetah, which has achieved estimated speeds of 60-63 mph, whereas the fastest human runner was Robert Lee Hayes of Florida, USA, who reached a speed of about 27mph in June, 1963. Tortoise-like by comparison, you'll agree!



Fastest runner: Robert Lee Hayes.


Despite the facts and figures that tend to make man look rather feeble, there are 639 muscles in the human body, so there's plenty of scope for physical exertion.

Chest measurements are often used to judge the strength of a man and among the biggest recorded was that of a French Canadian strongman named Louis Cyr: 150cm (59in). Also deserving a mention is Arnold Schwarzennegger (a former Mr. Universe) of Austria, who has a chest measurement of 147cm (58in) and weighs 115kg (16st 8lb). Arnold has been described as 'the most perfectly developed man in the history of the world' but he must have trouble buying shirts that fit!

It is next to impossible to say with certainty who is the strongest man (or woman) in the world because how do you define strength? We do know who the heaviest sportsman of all time is — wrestler William J. Cobb of Georgia, USA — who in 1962 weighed-in at 363kg (57st 4lb), and the heaviest in Britain is another wrestler, Luke McMasters, at 223kg (35st 2lb).

Wrestling is one of the most strenuous of all sports, so perhaps Martin Klein and Alfred Asikáinen, who took part in the longest recorded bout of 11 hours and 40 minutes in the 1912 Olympic Games, deserve the title 'strongest men of all time'. Martin Klein won, by the way.

Weightlifting is another sport that requires super-human muscle-power and it's easier to judge the strongest man in any contest. The greatest weight ever raised is 2,844kg (6,270lb) by Paul Anderson of the USA, the 1956 Olympic heavyweight champion. This was a weight lifted off trestles; the greatest overhead lifts from the ground exceed 254kg (560lb) and are made by super-heavyweights.

Not quite so spectacular, but probably equally tiring, was the record set in July 1979 by 34-year-old Tommy Gildert. He's the world press-up champion, having done no less than 9,105 consecutive press-ups in 4 hours 17 minutes at Burnley Boys' Club. Korean Lee Chinyong holds the record for chinning the bar, having done 120 continuous chin-ups from a dead hang position, in March,


A sport that requires a healthy collection of big, strong, hefty men is tug-of-war. The longest recorded pull under Amateur Athletic Association rules (yes, there are rules!) is one of 11 minutes 23 seconds between Isle of Oxney and St. Claret's at Chertsey, Surrey in May, 1979. There have been longer pulls but these have included par-ticipants lying on the ground or bracing their feet which is strictly against the rules!

Though animals have nature on their side when it comes to strength and agility, there have been occasions when a man has beaten them 'at their own game'. In 1928 a German, Otto Kemmerich, swam with a sealion round and round a pool in a contest of endurance. After almost two days and nights of continual swimming the sealion had had enough but Otto went on swimming for another two

The swimmer couldn't claim to be the strongest man in the world but he could fairly boast to be 'stronger than a sealion'!

Can reigning champion Geoff Capes (pictured here) regain his title of 'the strongest man in Britain'?

Thames TV's Britain's Strongest Man brings together eight competitors (including Geoff, of course) from all over the country, to struggle, heave and grimace over a variety of fiendish obstacles designed to sort out the men from the boys, and the strong from the very strong. Dogs can make wonderful companions, but a good, happy relationship isn't something that just happens; like most good things it requires thought and quite a bit of hard work. If you are thinking of buying a dog, you should really consider the following points first:

1. Have you discussed buying a dog with your family and do they all feel the same as you about it?

2. Will someone be at home with the dog during the day? Don't buy a dog if everyone is going to be out all day, as this will result in the dog being left alone either shut indoors, or locked out to roam the streets.

3. You must decide who is going to be responsible for the dog. Remember, it will need to be fed, groomed, exercised regularly, house trained and obedience trained.

4. Does someone in the family know how to look after a dog or a puppy? If not you will need to learn more about this; your local library will have some books that will help you.

5. Dogs come in various sizes, so consider how much space you have at home. Do you have a garden, and how large is it? Is it securely fenced? Do you live in the town or

6. Can you afford to keep a dog? Obviously big dogs cost more than medium-sized and little dogs to feed, but costs don't stop at food, lead and dog basket. Don't forget the veterinary fees: your dog will need to be innoculated against distemper and other illnesses, and you should also consider the cost of neutering and spaying if you wish to prevent unwanted puppies. Veterinary treatment will also be necessary if the dog is ill.

7. Other costs will arise at holiday times if you need to leave the dog with boarding kennels. Think, too, how you will manage if the family has to go on a long day's outing and you can't take the dog with you.

8. Spend some time deciding what kind of dog you might buy and where to buy it. Don't buy in a hurry and take trouble to ensure that you don't buy a dog with a bad temperament.

Robertson's Golly (that distinctive little character from all those jam jars) is 50 years old this year. To celebrate, Robertson's have produced a poster called Four Seasons With Golly, taking you through Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter, with lots of seasonal ideas for things to make and do. The instructions for all the ideas (there are 20 of them), which include Happy Face Biscuits, Corn Dollies, Cotton Wool Lambs and Seed Necklaces, are in a booklet which comes with the poster.

One of the ideas for Autumn is making Toffee Apples. This is the best time to make them because there are lots of apples in the shops. Our tasty recipe uses honey to coat the apples before dipping them in the toffee: it's slightly different to the one from the Golly poster but

both are delicious!

This recipe is not suitable for you to use alone, as the toffee gets very, very hot and is extremely dangerous. You must be sure that an adult makes the toffee.




8 small rosy eating apples 8, 15cm (6 inch) clean wooden sticks 75ml (5 tablespoons) clear honey 225g (8 oz) demerara sugar 25g (1oz) butter 15ml (1 tablespoon) golden syrup 75ml (5 tablespoons) water 10ml (2 teaspoons) lemon juice

Wash and dry the apples and press a stick into the stalk end of each one. Ask an adult to make the rest of the recipe. Heat the honey in a small pan over low heat until dissolved. Put the remaining ingredients into a thick bottomed medium-sized saucepan and stir over low heat until all the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil, stirring occasionally, and then boil steadily for 10-12 minutes without stirring. Test to see if the toffee is ready by dropping a small spoonful into a saucer of cold water, the toffee should set instantly and "crack" when broken in half. If you are using a sugar thermometer the toffee should be 145 deg. C (290 deg. F) which will probably be marked the "hard crack" stage on the thermometer. Allow the bubbles to subside and then dip the apples first into the honey and then into the toffee, tilting the toffee pan so the apples are well coated. Place the apples on greased greaseproof paper until set — about 30-40 minutes. Wrap separately in plastic food wrap or waxed paper and store in an airtight tin.






# CALLUS, BLONDIE!

You may have noticed that, over the past few months, Blondie haven't exactly been in the limelight — not since their glittering sell-out tour of Britain at the turn of the year, in fact.

At the time of that series of live dates, the band felt that they needed to undertake a tour here as a boost to their confidence, because their singles had not been reaching the chart heights which had been expected of them. So, in that respect, the British tour was a resounding success, with capacity audiences giving them an ecstatic welcome — and subsequently putting two singles, **Atomic** and **Call Me** at the top of the charts.

But what has become of Blondie since then? Call Me reached number one in May, and since then we have heard very little from them. One of the reasons is that they have been hard at work in America, establishing as loyal a following there as they have on this side of the Atlantic. "America is so much bigger that it takes a lot longer for things to happen there," said drummer Clem Burke when the band were last in Britain. "You can be big in one area, only to discover that in another region no-one has ever heard of you." Now, though, surely everyone must have heard of them!

Call Me was the theme music for the big box-office, X-rated film American Gigolo, and the song was included on the soundtrack album which just crept into the charts — which meant that a lot of people who may not otherwise have had a chance to hear the band were introduced to them. And Debbie is currently advertising jeans in America — the manufacturers reckon that the advertising poster featuring her is selling as well as the jeans themselves!

The rest of the band have also been keeping busy since their return to the United States, with keyboard man Jimmy Destri following up the production of an album by a band called The Revlons, whom he discovered, by producing a compilation album, called Nine Times Five, with tracks by New York new wave bands. Clem Burke has been working on producing other bands — and on an EP of his own — and Chris Stein has been working as a producer for some new bands. Blondie members all agree that taking a break to follow their solo ambitions is a good thing for the band, because it means that they stay fresh, can bring new ideas to the group and don't get frustrated.

Now they are back together working on a new album — their first since Eat To The Beat last November — and judging by the >>> to E18














prove that they have not fallen into a rut. Alan Edwards, Blondie's spokesman in England, says: "I'm told that it will have a disco flavour, and when I last spoke to Chris he told me that the most recent music he had been listening to, and enjoying, was Tibetan bells — so it's anyone's guess as to what we can expect!" The recording is shrouded in mystery, and even the release date of the album is being kept a closely guarded secret, with predictions that it could be ready in November. A single is also expected sometime this month, but at the time of writing no title or release date has been announced.

Jimmy Destri and Chris Stein are responsible for most of Blondie's songs, and while they have been helping other bands by producing their records, they agree that the bands also help them, by giving them new ideas and widening the influences in their writing and their partnership with disco-king Giorgio Moroder (the producer responsible for making Donna Summer's music such a distinctive and outstanding success) on the production of Call Me was an indication of their search for new and interesting sounds.

At one time, it looked as if Giorgio would produce the new Blondie album, and they abandoned their recording plans with Mike Chapman — who produced Parallel Lines and Eat To The Beat for them — on the West Coast of America, to return to New York and start work with Giorgio. However, that didn't work out as they had hoped, and they went back to the West Coast and Mike, with whom they are now working. Once the album is completed, it doesn't necessarily mean that the band will follow it with a tour, because they apparently have no plans to do any live shows for the rest of this year. While the recording continues, there is no time to work on a stage show, and rather than rush into anything, they're saying at the moment that they'd prefer to wait until next year before deciding whethere to hit the road again.

They may be producing a video-disc, however, to coincide with the album, following the success of their **Eat To The Beat** video, which was one of the first to be released. Blondie have always been interested in videos, and they are aware of how much TV showings of the videos of their singles helped them to establish themselves in this country, so they take considerable care about getting them exactly as they want them. Now, with the boom in home video cassette recorders, they have been quick to realise how popular video versions of albums can become.

## SILVER SCREEN

Films are another of the band's interests, but as yet we have not had the opportunity to see any of their film projects. Roadie (expected to receive an AA-rating) a film about a member of a rock show touring crew also featuring the larger than life Heavy Metal singer Meat Loaf, has just been released in America, and although

there is no definite release date for Britain yet, it is thought that it will be on the cinema circuit before Christmas. Blondie are in the film for about half an hour, and they enjoyed it so much that they are considering more films, although they have not yet found anything that they want to do.

Debbie, of course, had a leading role in the film Union City, (which has only been shown in the States), which inspired her to write the song Union City Blue, about her experiences of film making, and her performance has encouraged other film producers to try to tempt her back in front of the cameras. She is studying a number of scripts at the moment, but has made no firm decisions — partly because she does not know how much time she will have for filming. Union City has been quite well received in the United States, but it could well be that Britain will not get the chance to see it at all as so far no distributor has been found to release it here, and until someone picks it up, it must sit on the shelf.

Perhaps when the album is ready, and a single is high in the charts, someone will release the film. Then, after what appears to have been a bit of a hibernation, Blondie will once again be seen and heard everywhere around the country.



The HAKA! (above), the traditional Maori dance performed by the side before a match, really does show that the All Blacks mean business!


# BLACKS' MAGICE

The impact of the New Zealand Rugby team's first tour of the British Isles, in 1905, was nothing short of phenomenal. From their first fixture, against a much fancied Devon side that was swept aside by a massive 55-4 victory, the touring team entertained with their scintillating all out attacking rugby, the notable feature of which was the running of the ball from the back. Indeed, one of the explanations of how the New Zealanders came to acquire their nickname was that one newspaper intended to head a feature on the side 'ALL BACKS'. However, because of a typographical error, the headline read 'ALL BLACKS'! The more likely explanation is that the team owe their nickname to the colour of their playing strip, the famous black jersey with the silver fern leaf. The only defeat inflicted upon the All Blacks on that 1905 tour was in the final game, at Cardiff Arms Park, and by the slenderest of margins. The Welsh 3-0 victory was hotly disputed. As All Black Bob Deans was going over for a try, he was tackled. The referee disallowed the try, although he was way behind the play. Both countries viewed the affair, naturally, from opposing standpoints, but the incident helped to establish the splendid rivalry that still exists today whenever the two teams meet.

The 1924-25 touring side were not expected to do well, but in fact went on to become one of the most successful All Blacks sides to visit Great Britain, completing their 32 matches without loss.


It can be said that the legend of the All Blacks was built on the foundations of the 1905 and 1924 tours, and the All Native tour of 1888. However, there have been periods when the All Blacks have lost their way. In the late 1940s and 1950s the glorious attacking style gave way to an inferior defensive alternative, contested between the two sets of forwards. The 1972 tour was disastrous. More matches were lost than ever before and the sending home of Keith Murdoch is still the low-spot of All Black history.






The 1905 Devon result (below) was such an upset, most papers in Fleet Street refused to believe the scoreline and printed their own!









