

## YOUR MIND!

Have you ever picked up a glass, or a glass object, and wondered how it was made? Well, Claire Gibson from Nuneaton had no idea until she spent a morning at the Royal Brierley Crystal works in the West Midlands. The Tiswas team decided to make a film about glass blowing and 12 year old Claire was asked to be the reporter. She'd had her first taste of reporting in June 1979 when she reported on the "Crash Line" at RAF Brize Norton, so her second experience wasn't quite as frightening as the first — not quite.

When you see any of the films made by the **Tiswas** young reporters, you'll notice that they always start by saying an introduction looking straight into the camera. This is very difficult to do. First they have to learn the words off by heart, then recite them, on cue,

from the cameraman and director. Saying things off by heart is hard enough in normal circumstances, but with television lights glaring down on you and a full film crew depending on you — that's much, much harder. But Claire managed it very well and also the interview that followed: she had to ask Simon Williams-Thomas, a director (pictured right) of the firm, all about glass making.

To show how glass was made the firm decided to make a special object out of glass just for the programme. They decided to make that magnificent mutt, 'Spit', and when the filming was over, to give the glass 'Spit' away as a prize in a competition. But Claire found that as well as talking, she also had to do some practical work: she had to actually blow down a

tube and make a shape out of glass! It's a bit like blowing up a balloon. Nothing happens for ages, then suddenly the balloon starts bulging as the air fills it. The trouble with glass is that the material is so thin that just one tiny puff too much and the whole thing shatters into a thousand pieces! Fortunately Claire managed to get quite a decent shape in front of the camera.

Filming takes a very long time and there is a lot of waiting around. Claire's filming took even longer because of a sound problem — but, as they say, that's television. Afterwards she commented: "It got a bit boring waiting for my next bit, but it was great watching the men making the beautiful glass




#### DIFFERENT WORLDS

## ANIMAL ALLSORTS

Some animals are brought to the RSPCA simply because they are unwanted, while others might be strays or perhaps their owners could be ill. There is certainly always much to be done in an RSPCA animal home . . .







The RSPCA staff look after cats, dogs, small pets, and other animals. A dog that is suitable for adoption will have a card on its kennel door. It tells people who want to adopt a dog a little about the animal in each kennel. Sometimes that's not very much; after all, a stray can't tell you its name! Newcomers are talked to to make sure they can offer the dog a good home, and are visited later to make sure the dog has settled in and is receiving good care.

## Cheese Savouries

(Makes 12)

25g (1oz.) butter 3 slices white bread

125g (4oz.) grated cheese 50g (2oz.) soft margarine

1 small egg, size 4

2 slices chopped cooked ham


salt and pepper

#### STEP 1.

Heat the oven to 190°c (375°f) or gas mark 5. Butter one side of each slice of bread.

#### STEP 2.

Cut each slice into four squares and place each piece of bread into a tin, butter side down.





#### STEP 3.

Mix together the cheese, margarine, egg, ham and salt and pepper.



#### STEP 4.

Spread this mixture over each slice of the bread and cook in the oven until golden brown and crisp This will take about 15 minutes.







HARD rocking band who have been conspicuous by their absence from the regular round of touring this year are Status Quo, although, of course, they've had much success with the single What You're Proposing.

The annual jaunts around Britain's halls by the denim-clad, flowing-haired band have become a consistent highlight in the rock calender for a number of years, but in 1980 they decided to break from the tradition. That doesn't mean, though, that they haven't been busy, as lead vocalist and guitarist *Francis Rossi* explained to Look-in's


John Palmer: "We've been recording a new album, and we've had more time to prepare new songs, so we're well on the way to another album, too.

"We found that we were getting into a constant movement from tour to recording to tour again, and we decided that we should take a little break from that routine. Now we feel very refreshed, and it shows in our material. We feel that the songwriting has improved, and it was nice to know that when we were recording the new album we had plenty of material to choose from, and weren't limited to having just enough."

That new album is called **Just Supposin'**, and it was mainly recorded in some relatively new studios in Dublin, at Windmill

Lane. "I was in Ireland, and someone told me about the studios, so we had a look at them, and when it came to recording our album, it seemed to be the right place to do it," said Francis. "It was finished off at my house and at guitarist Rick Parfitt's — we have some equipment of our own and we used that. We're really pleased with it, because we've managed to get the kind of sound that we wanted.

"We were faced with a difficult problem, because we did an album a few years ago called Rockin' All Over The World and a lot of our fans told us that it was far too >>> 10.0.18

\*\* from p.15 clinical — and they were right, really.

Yet that record sold more than our others, so we had to think about what we would do.

"We think that we've solved that on the new album, because although it still has the technical merits of Rockin' All Over The World it also has that atmosphere of noise and excitement that we had on early albums, like Piledriver. Obviously a record can't fully capture the live feeling, but at least we feel that we're a little closer to it this time. That's not to say that Just Supposin' is rougher than the others — it's just that it's not clinical."

Quo won't be promoting the new album with a tour, but they will be going on a world trek early next year, and that will include a series of dates in Britain. "We won't really be ready to do a tour until February or March," said Francis. "There was a time when we

always seemed to be on the road, but now when we go out we want to be able to present a memorable show, and that takes a lot of time—and money—to prepare. So we will be having a short break before Christmas, and hope to get things together soon after. It's not supposed to be good to release an album without doing a tour to help promote it, so it'll be interesting to see what happens to our release without us going out on the road.

"Still, by the time we do our tour next year, we hope to have finished another album. That

will be two albums within six months. The last one we released was Whatever You Want, which came out about a year ago — although there was a hits album of old material after that. But we are looking forward to getting back on the road again. There are bad things about touring, too, but it's all worthwhile when you get a good audience and you feel the atmosphere coming back at you from out there — that's a tremendous feeling."

#### TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY

It's a feeling that Status Quo have known for a long time, because next year will mark their twentieth anniversary in rock! Francis, guitarist Rick Parfitt, bass player Alan Lancaster, and drummer John Coghlan, came through the beat boom and the soul explosion of the sixties to prove that by sticking to their guns they could maintain a following despite the musical tastes.

"Back in about 1965 our set included songs like Rock Around The Clock and when we came back to London after a summer season at . . . Minehead, I think it was . . . we found that there was a soul boom, so we had to change our thinking. But then we thought why should we? We totally rejected the things that we had been doing, and went back to playing the stuff that we really enjoyed. Since then that's what we've always done," said Francis.

By following that policy they have outlived many of their contemporaries, and have still kept together without any rifts to jeopardise the future of the group.

"Because we are working for most of the time, we don't have much of a break away from the band or each other, but we all get on well, so it works out fine — and we do have our own interests outside the band, so it all fits in."

Rick is an avid **Tiswas** fan, and often makes unannounced appearances on the show. "It's not for me, though," said Francis,"...you never know where the next bucket of water may be coming from. But Rick seems to enjoy it."

according to Francis. "It's good to see so many new rock bands coming through, and as they pick up a following, we get associated with them, too, because we're on television and in magazines. We do quite a lot of television, and we make a lot of videos for television to promote new singles. We've been working on some of the new album, and we'll be doing TV appearances in Europe up to Christmas, to help to promote the record."

Francis had already said that he was pleased to see so many new bands coming through, but did he have any explanation for the emergence of heavy metal again? "I'd like to say that there was a resurgence, but I think that the support has always been there. I think that it shows up more now, because of the general state of the record business. There is supposed to be a slump in the record buying



market, but the heavy rock fans are very loyal, and they are still buying records by their favourites. So as a result they show up a lot more in the charts, because sales are consistent. And the new bands can go out and do a tour with confidence, because they will still sell out the venues."

Quo's ability to seek out venues never seems in doubt, and they are having to play larger and larger halls to accommodate the fans' demands for tickets. "We prefer to play in places where everyone can stand up, but in Britain there are very few like that, because the theatres can't take their seats out. There are some good places on the continent, though, where you can clear the floor," said Francis.

"I like playing big venues, which hold between about three and ten thousand people, but some of the gigantic places which take 15,000 and more are far too big. I feel that you're isolated from your audience then, and you can't get across to all of them."

Status Quo have no difficulty in getting across to an enormous audience on record, though, and What You're Proposing has been riding high in the charts. It is one of nine tracks on the album, which has a title posing more questions than it answers.

"That was the idea, really," laughed Francis. "We had a few possible titles for the record, and when we went to the meeting to discuss it, we looked at the picture for the record sleeve, and someone said 'just supposin' such and such happened'. That somehow seemed to fit it. It's saying just supposing... what?" A Quo fan would undoubtedly answer 'Whatever You Want'!



## RALLY ROUND


This year the Rally will have an extra special ingredient, for every winner since 1971 will be competing. The Rally starts in Bath and, four days later, after taking in some of the most varied and punishing terrain that the organisers can dream up, the tired battle-scarred survivors will complete the event back in Bath. They'll then probably want to celebrate by relaxing in a good hot bath!

Roger Clark's win in 1972, in a Ford, the first of eight victories in a row by that firm. makes Ford's absence from this year's event all the more noticeable. Fiat is the other major manufacturer that has declined to enter. However, Roger Clark has switched to the British Leyland three car team, and there will be no shortage of excitement with the likes of the turbo Saabs competing and the Toyota challenge, which is spearheaded by current World Champion Bjorn Waldegaard. Other past champs to enter are Stig Blomqvist (1971), Timo Makinen (1973, 74, 75) and Hannu Mikkola, who has captured the last two events and is gunning for the hat-trick. All the past competing champions have one thing in common. They all agree that the RAC Rally is THE rally to win!

Outwardly most rally entries will look pretty much like some of the sportier cars that you can see every day in the High Street, but they are most definitely wolves in sheep's clothing! At the most exacting end of the sport, absolutely nothing is left to chance.

A standard body shell is strengthened by welding in extra slabs of steel and, likewise, the chassis is strengthened. The roof and pillars of the car have a roll cage built in so that in the event of a car turning over, its occupants won't be crushed. Any vulnerable parts beneath the car, for example the sump and exhaust system, are fitted with skid guards. Absolutely everything that might not stand up to the rigours of rallying will be strengthened or replaced. Seats with extra padding for comfort are fitted, as are hefty safety harnesses. In the works teams, any individual whims of the driver will be catered for. For example, if one wants a little box by his steering wheel to put his sweeties in it will be provided!

A co-driver can't win a rally on his own, but a good co-driver can drastically increase his driver's chances of winning. The best navigators will plan the route to be followed most thoroughly, driving over it beforehand, noting road junctions, bends and surface conditions before drawing up a route guide in large easy to follow symbols and writing notes (see sample page, below) that he can shout to his driver as they hurtle along at speeds over 100 miles an hour! Unlike Formula One, rallying can be experienced at its simplest level by the average enthusiast. That is the beauty of rallying, you don't have to enter the RAC Rally to enjoy it.
