Brinsley becomes involved when he witnesses the kidnapping of Ben, by a ruthless Italian gang, who have the matching half...

Future stories involving our intrepid detective are entitled The Case Of The Arabian Kidnap, and The Dulverton Green.

For Nigel Hawthorne, playing Jukes comes as "light relief" from some heavier roles he has played with great distinction.

For instance, he was Walter Monckton in the highly-praised Edward And Mrs. Simp-


son a couple of years ago, while more recently he played the part of the stern teacher telling potential taxi drivers which London streets were where in the much-acclaimed play **The Knowledge**.

But it's hardly been instant success for Nigel. He says: "I came up rather late in life, like Penelope Keith. I thought I was an outsider. People used to say, 'Why not do something else?'. Acting was the thing I thought I could do so I hung on to it, hoping I might make it one day. I was 20 years in the wilderness before I got my chance."

And to prove that he takes his bike-loving seriously . . . Nigel always cycles to work!


BOOKSHELF



One of the biggest shocks in the first division this season has been the failure of West Bromwich Albion to maintain the devastating form that made them serious championship contenders for much of last season.



Bacon and soured cream add a delicious flavour to baked potatoes, but they need some forward planning as they take about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours to cook.



4 medium-sized potatoes

1 medium-sized onion

175g (6oz.) bacon

25g (1oz.) butter

150ml (5 fl. oz.) soured cream

salt and pepper

2.5ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ level teaspoon) dried mixed herbs

10ml (2 level teaspoons) mustard

small bunch of parsley

Scrub the potatoes well, prick with a fork and bake near the top of the oven at 200 deg. C (400 deg. F) or Regulo gas mark 6 for $1 \cdot 1\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until soft when gently pinched. Skin and slice the onion. Reserve 4 nice lean pieces of bacon and cut the rest into small pieces with scissors. Heat the butter in a frying pan and fry the onion and bacon together until crisp. Stick the reserved pieces of bacon onto cocktail sticks and grill until crisp. Cut a 'lid' from each of the potatoes, scoop out the potato carefully, so as not to split the skin, place into the frying pan and mix with the bacon, onion, salt and pepper and mixed herbs. Add the soured cream and heat gently. Refill the potatoes. Top each with 2.5ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon) of mustard and the grilled bacon rashers. Garnish with parsley and serve immediately.



The dictionary definition of a scarecrow reads: "a figure set up to frighten away crows and other birds from crops; anything terrifying but without real danger; a miserable-looking person in rags."

But there's no way that description could be applied to Southern Television's lovable character Worzel Gummidge. Like changing his head in the middle of a programme. But Jon, Keith and Willis worked on it for three-and-a-half years and came up with all the answers.

Aunt Sally, a haughty fairground coconut

shy with whom Worzel falls hopelessly in love, is played by Una Stubbs. With a creaking, stiff-jointed walk who would believe that she isn't really made of wood?!

Barbara Windsor, however, had rather more of a trying time when playing the part of Saucy Nancy in a recent episode. Saucy Nancy, you see, is a ship's figurehead, and figureheads don't have legs. But as this particular one has wanderlust it was necessary to fit Barbara up with a set of wheels that moved along tracks while she was pulled along by a rope or rolled downhill. (The first contraption, operated by remote control, had to be abandoned because it became jammed by radio messages from ships at sea to the nearby coastguard station!)

So the humans appearing with Worzel should consider themselves lucky! Most important of these to Worzel are the Crowman, played by Geoffrey Bayldon, who gives his scarecrows life and makes Worzel new heads when he fancies a change, and, of course. Worzel's two young friends who share his secret and do their best to keep him out of trouble. Sue and John Peters, played by Charlotte Coleman and Jeremy Austin.




















He's been singing since he was five years old, his records have sold well over sixty million copies, he's won more awards than he can remember, and he's also a movie star . . . he's Michael Jackson.

JUST ACKSON!


Michael was born on August 29th, 1958 in Gary, Indiana, but his career began in harmony with his four brothers, Jacko, Tito, Marlon and Randy, when as the Jackson Five they began singing as soon as they could walk. As children the brothers performed in America's biggest and most prestigious showrooms like the world famous Apollo Theatre in New York, Chicago's Regal Theatre and the Uptown in Philadelphia before they were signed up by Motown Records. There they were to rise to become one of the label's biggest acts along with names like Diana Ross and The Supremes, Marvin Gaye, and The Temptations.

In 1970 I Want You Back, featuring Michael's unique searing vocals, bombarded charts the world over and the Jackson Five had arrived. With Michael fronting the band in their time at Motown, they become a pop phenomenon, their talent, charm and charisma winning them friends and fans wherever they performed, and they received keys to cities from virtually all fifty states in America, plus assorted tributes from every continent in the world.


Among hundreds of awards, the Jacksons are recipients of Sixteen Magazine's Group Of The Year Award, Soul Publication's Group Of The Year, two-time nominees of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences Grammy Awards for the best pop song of 1971 (ABC), and the best Rhythm and Blues song of 1976 for Dancing Machine. In 1972 they even received commendations from the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate for their contributions to America's youth!

As you can imagine, there was no shortage











either of gold or platinum record awards for hit single like I Want You Back, ABC, I'll Be There, Mama's Pearl, Maybe Tomorrow, Never Say Goodbye, Dancing Machine, Lookin' Through The Windows and Little Bitty Pretty One.

While the Jackson Five were notching up these hits, Michael was also having some personal success with his solo numbers, including Classics like Got To Be There, Rockin' Robin, Ain't No Sunshine and Ben, from the film of the same name.

Last year saw one of his major ambitions fulfilled when he played a starring role in **The Wiz**, the all-black re-make of **The Wizard Of Oz.** He played the brainless Scarecrow opposite Diana Ross as Dorothy. Critical acclaim was heaped on him from all sides and after his classy singing and dancing performance he was inundated with many more film offers, including lots of musicals. Says Michael: "I love the film, I loved making it, the things I learned! I just hated to end it! The fact that it was my first film didn't bother me at all, in fact a lot of the people involved were old friends anyway. Diana I've known since I was seven years old. Being around with such brilliant people as Sidney Lumet, the director — just conversing with them you learn so much.

"It's a new challenge for me, another world. That's what I love about showbusiness, you never run out of things to do. I always want to go on working all night, work myself to death."

Along with his music, of course, and even before The Wiz, films were Michael's great love. "I adore films," he enthuses. "I wish I could eat them, really. Sometimes I hate to face the reality of everyday

life. There's a reality, of course, in films but it's more of another life. Like playing the scarecrow, when I put on the costume, it wasn't me, it was another person. I look at him on the screen and I see another person. Oh, I hated it when they said 'OK, curtain, time to go home'."

But never fear, Michael is not going to neglect his singing. With the boom of Disco Music over the last few years the Jacksons as a group have become even more popular with foot-tapping hits like Blame It On The Boogie, Shake Your Body (Down To The Ground), and an outstanding album, Destiny, while Michael's solo career is at this moment stronger than ever. Last year his debut solo album Off The Wall was released and it is probably the best thing he's done to date. Michael says about Off The Wall: "We had a ball making the album. It was the smoothest album I have ever been involved in. There was so much love, it was incredible. Everybody worked so easily." But even so, Michael has his own ideas about the disco scene. "I know disco music is bigger than it's ever been but I don't need discos to dance. I dance everywhere — especially around the house. It's always been like that with me. I remember when I was younger and used to watch the old Fred Astaire movies. Whatever he'd do — like dancing on top of tables and up walls - I'd imitate.

"To tell the honest truth I really don't like the term 'disco music'. It's Rhythm and Blues music, and it's been going for years through stars like James Brown and Marvin Gaye. But I am really glad that people are dancing so much these days. Because it really does get rid of all your troubles."

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

If you saw Benny Hill's latest TV extravaganza last Wednesday (February 6th) you won't need reminding that he's still one of the funniest men on the small box.


What you may not realise, though, is that Benny — real name Alfred Hill — has been tickling the nation's funny-bone for a quarter of a century. He was voted Top TV personality of 1954, and since then, instead of having to make two or three 'comebacks', he's remained at the top of the tree with a regular diet of four shows a year.

The rest of the time he travels. Australia, France, Germany. Off at the drop of a hat. But his life, away from the successful glare of the TV cameras, doesn't reflect the good fortune of the last 25 years.

His flat, although a vast luxury apartment, is acres of bare carpet, and Benny sits in it like a man awaiting the removal firm. He was once burgled. "If they came back," he says, "the only item worth stealing would be the television set!"

He has four or five inexpensive suits. He saves up his frayed shirts and worn shoes and wears them when he is on his travels around the world. He doesn't smoke or drink, and has only one rich man's weakness — but unfortunately he's unable to indulge in it. He loves





eating, but is obliged to live on a strict diet, so that the cuddly charm doesn't turn to being plain overweight. Says Benny: "I come from a family of balloons.

"I'm not really a money person. In fact, I'm a very un-money sort of person. I don't care about possessions. I don't even have a car.

"If I'm going anywhere in London, I almost always walk, and if it's raining. I'll take the bus or the tube. I don't like taking taxis. Somehow it seems wrong to me to take up a man's time and his petrol just to make a journey.

"I've always been like that. I can't waste anything. I can't even throw away the leaves off the celery. If I'm leaving a really de-luxe hotel, I'll take my soap with me even if there's only a quarter of the bar left.

"I was brought up to be thrifty, and I still am."

TURNING POINTS

Two turning points led Benny to stardom. The first was when he was 16, and he came to London and slept for three nights on Streatham Common while he tried to get a job in the theatre — and did.

The second was when he was Reg Varney's straight man in a show in Sunderland. He also had his own comic spot in the show, and when he was told it was being dropped he walked out. Says Benny: "Everyone told me I was a fool and said I was a really great straight man, but I still walked out."

He came back to London, wrote some funny sketches, and took them along to the BBC. "Very funny," they said. "Would you like your own show?"


Now, all these years later, Benny is not just a big hit in Britain—he's conquered half the world, including America. 50 shows have been bought from Thames Television by United States TV to be shown to 80 million viewers. And Benny laughs when asked the secret of his success: "It must be because I've kept my figure. I haven't let myself go like some others."







