

This idea is from Natalie Spicer (aged 12), of Romford, Essex, and her model is wearing a red jumper, green pedal-pushers and pink socks:





GREAT SCOT!







Baked beans are almost everybody's favourite, but they do get a bit boring served simply on toast. This beany casserole is a super way of making them much more interesting and served with jacket potatoes it makes a very satisfying meal.

BEANY GAMMON CASSEROLE



6 potatoes

450g (1lb) gammon or bacon joint

4 sticks celery

225g (8oz) onions

1 red pepper

1 green pepper

30ml (2 tablespoons) oil

447g (15oz) can of tomatoes

447g (15oz) can baked beans

30ml (2 tablespoons) Worcestershire sauce

salt and pepper

Scrub the potatoes, prick with a fork and place in the oven at 200 deg. C (400 deg. F) or gas mark 6 for 1 hour or until soft when gently squeezed. Place the gammon or bacon joint in a saucepan of cold water so that the joint is just covered with the water. Bring to the boil, put the lid on the saucepan, lower the heat and simmer the joint for 20 minutes. Remove the joint for the saucepan. When it is cold, cut it into 2.5cm (1 inch) cubes. Wash and slice the celery, skin and slice the onions, wash and cut the red and green peppers in half length-wise. Remove the core and seeds with a knife. Cut into thin strips. Heat the oil in a large saucepan. Add the onions and celery and fry gently for about 5 minutes until they are soft. Add the sliced peppers and fry for a further 2 minutes. Stir in the baked beans, tomatoes, gammon cubes and Worcestershire sauce. Add some salt and pepper. Transfer into a casserole dish, put the lid on it and place it in the oven with the potatoes for 30 minutes.

group that has had hits
with The Prince, One Step
Beyond . . . and recently My Girl.
They've got a hit album to
their credit, too, also
entitled One Step Beyond . . .
but the band are definitely . . .

ONE STEP AHEAD



Mike first invited guitarist Chris Foreman and sax player Lee 'Kix' Thompson to join in around the piano in the sitting room of his Crouch End (North London) abode where they worked up what he

remembers as 'an awful noise'!

The drumming personnel changed several times with both Chas Smash and the band's manager. John Hassler, having a bash, so to speak. Chas was moved from the 'skins' to bass guitar and when that didn't work out he started to introduce the band at gigs and then gradually developed his own special style of fancy footwork — now a firm trademark of Madness at their live performances.

The band really started to take form at the end of 1977 and the early part of 1978 when Graham McPherson, commonly known as Suggs, fell neatly into place as the lead vocalist, his cockney accent being the perfect complement to the band's music. (On one occasion, however, he was sacked for going to a football match instead of rehearsals! But he was such an important feature of Madness that he was re-instated shortly afterwards.) In September 1978, Dan 'Woods' Woodgate joined them as drummer, and Mark 'Bedders' Bedford

took the place of bass guitarist.

Very little happened for Madness for over a year until The Specials began to hit the headlines and they got to know their keyboards player, Jerry Dammers. When doing interviews, Jerry often mentioned Madness because they were the only other British band remotely like his own. And then things really started to happen when The Specials set up their own record label, 2-Tone, and invited Madness to sign with them. In April'79 their first single, The Prince, (written by Lee Thompson is a tribute to Prince Buster, whose song Madness had inspired the name of the band), was released and it generated a lot of interest amongst other record companies, who were eager to sign them. Stiff Records clenched the deal and One Step Beyond . . . was released as the follow-up, reaching number 7 in the national charts, and then, of course, My Girl.

Madness attribute their popularity to what Lee has christened 'the

nutty sound'. He explains: "It's a sort of happy fairground sound with jokey lyrics. Almost like Steptoe and Son music!"

Nutty it may be, but it's still a very distinctive sound with its roots in ska/bluebeat.

"I'd like to think that we're influenced by other people," explains Chris. "We're influenced by ska, we like a lot of Motown stuff and Kilburn and the High Roads (who developed into Ian Drury and the Blockheads).

"But I'd rather have our own sound than something that someone else has already got. One critic called us a rude boy ska band, but we don't really want to be categorised like that."

But does it worry them that the current interest in ska/bluebeat could be just a passing fad?

"That's the one thing that does worry us," says Suggs. "We could get labelled as just another ska revival band and get our own ten minutes of fame like that. At the moment, it doesn't matter what sort of music you play. You're on vogue for ten minutes and than that's it.

"We've been getting as much publicity as some bands who have been slogging around for years. It makes you wonder if you'll be back down there again next week."

"That's one of the reasons," adds Woods. "that we don't want to be labelled as a rude boy ska band. We want to get across to as many people as possible so that they can all have a good time."

And that's just what their audiences do, enjoy them-







selves, and Suggs hopes that it will supply them with at least twenty minutes of glory! He feels that if and when all the fuss surrounding the ska revival dies down, the band's individuality will stand them in good stead, and allow them to branch out on their own. This was one of the reasons for their break from 2-Tone after their first single.

Says Suggs: "It wasn't because we were ungrateful or anything we probably owe most of our success to The Specials — it was just that we couldn't stay under their wing forever. We had to break out on our own, develop our own style.'

The others are equally optimistic about their futures, but what about Chas, who neither plays an instrument nor is a vocalist (apart from the odd shout)? Can he hope to last?

Well, he's got it all worked out. Although he is now a firm fixture in the band, he and his younger brother started up the band's promotion marketing — T-shirts, ties, nutty badges and posters, porkpie hats like Chas's, and there's a Madness fan club in the pipeline.

But don't be put off if it looks like they're perhaps not taking the band seriously enough. As Mike says: "When you mess around, you've got to do it seriously, or it's not worth doing. Like when Chas is dancing, he's being funny, but he's really serious about what he's doing.

"He's not laughing about it. And we're all playing our instruments

properly all the time.

Let's hope that means that they'll be around for even more than Suggs' hoped-for twenty minutes . . !







KENNY AND CO - Top Trio For ITU!

If, last Monday, at around 7.00 p.m., your set suddenly began gurgling and giggling, flashing strange lights and generally overheating, you may have at first panicked, and dad probably reached for the 'phone in order to ring for the repair man.

Happily, there was no need for fear or fright — it was just blast-off time for the looniest video show around — Kenny Everett's.

Back for a third brain-bending assault on the country's funny-bones, Kenny recently chatted with **Richard Tippett** about his life and times — and his show. Actually, he didn't know all that much about the new series because at the time not all that much had been prepared or recorded! "The guys who do the Hot Gossip tapings — they're done separately — are probably taping away at the

moment," said Kenny.

"Most of the heavy preparation, like the sets and the scenery and the Gossip bits, and some of the artists, come in on reels. But the actual gags, and the props required for them, are left until the last minute, because we only write the stuff at the last minute."

New characters direct from Kenny's magical mind are on parade for the latest series. "We've got a few lined-up, though we're keeping the best of the old ones, the ones that people like best. Such as Sid Snot and Marcel Wave. A new bunch are sharing the spotlight with them, though."

When Kenny actually sees a finished Video Show, with all the bits and pieces knitted together, is it a lot different from the way he originally imagined it? "Yes, it's a constant surprise to me. Because we do it in little chunkettes. Like we'll do six Sid Snot sketches in one go, and then six Marcel

Waves, and they'll be slotted away somewhere for future use.

"Some of them are improvised. For instance, after a couple of Sid Snot sketches, a cameraman might remember a good joke, and so we'll use it. If it gives us a laugh, we'll keep it in. Then we go away after two days of taping per week, and the director, David Mallett, knits it all together. So when I actually see it on screen, it's always a surprise to me."

Surprised or not, Kenny is a true TV professional now, far more so than the notorious early days, when various shows he did for the box were doomed for the scrapheap. Says Kenny: "In the old days we just didn't prepare at all. I just used to think that it was like radio with cameras, but it's not like that at all. You've got to tell people vaguely what you're going to do, so that you'll be facing the right way, for instance, and so that the lighting will be right for where you're







going to run to.

Apart from his TV and radio shows (he's a star on London's Capital Radio) Kenny has an exciting new venture soon to reach fruition. "We're doing a Captain Kremmen cartoon for the cinema, which is going out with a Village People film due for release in July. We've been writing that and putting it together. It'll last for about 28 minutes; a big, spectacular, cinerama epic with lots of movement. Lots more movement than normal, because in the TV Kremmen, it's only the lips and eyes that move. It's cheaper that way.

"It's always a surprise to see what's been done to my Kremmen script for the TV series. When the cartoons actually come down from Manchester, the artists always have a different idea about the monsters from the way I

imagine them."
Was Kenny surprised at the way the Video Show took off to become a firm hit? "I was slightly surprised, I suppose. In the beginning, after the first episode, everyone jumped in and said 'aaargh, take this off.' But we said, 'no, we're going to stick with it.' And luckily we were right.

"I'm better now at knowing what does and doesn't go down well, and how to work with television. It's down to organisation, and experience. A lot of, stuff is cut out, of course; a lot of the stuff that doesn't work, and lot of the stuff goes wrong. Mind you, a lot of that is left in, too . . . "

Sticking with the comedy scene that popular young cockney comedian Jim Davidson stars in a new show beginning today (the 21st) at 7.30 p.m. Entitled simply **Davidson**, it's a six-week series that each week covers a different theme, beginning this evening with — swoon, swoon — Love and Marriage.

In future shows, Jim will be giving his own unique views on jobs, money, travel and holidays, leisure and entertainment, and food and drink.

To add to the theme idea, our intrepid comedian also takes to the streets to interview people on the subject of that evening's show, and producer John Ammonds says: "Jim has that common touch, and people in the streets just warm to him."

Also warming to him will be various guests over the weeks, all of whom partake in different comedy sketches with Jim. Which means that Mr Davidson is not only a stand-up comic and a star interviewer — he's also nifty at "treading the boards".


