



in Soho, where I often meet Acker. 

Let me explain it the way I see it.

see it. There are soutful people the world over who never lifted a finger to earn this description. They're soul-ful by virtue of the way they eat, drink, dance, make love, hugh and cry — without looking over their shoulders the way that most of us do. Though you do have to be

Though you do have to be black to have Soul, you don't have to be black to be soulful.

be soufful. A black saxophonist friend once confided to me that he thought Miss Joplin "had a bit of soul in there," but unfortunately, when most people call her "soulful," they are crediting her with sound-ing plack, which she does

not. On the other hand, poor old damise is probably a damined sight more soul-ful than those phony black singers who are so busy being Soul Per-sonified that they have forgotten what they're out there for.

out there for. You know the type — they used to straighten their hair and sing ballads, now they've got a "natu-ral" and specialise in threshing about the place, yelling and working up a sweat because that's the way you're supposed to do it today. But when you ceally know

any your support to do it today.
 But when you really know hout soul, you know it's something that makes your armpils prickle.
 There is no subsilitute for the truth.
 A couple of weeks back I went to hear Mahalla Jackson. The mighty Gospel singer is well into middle-age with a couple of heart-attacks behind her and obviously has to take it easy So she played It ultra cool. She reached her etimax gently and had the entire

Albert Hall in her hands. And God, she made me feel good inside. Her message hit right home although it was put over with subtlety and none of that costrived discotheque hollerin⁴.

contrived discotheque hollerin'. The truth is that while half the world is trying to get soulful (or should I say Soulful), the other half as busy being it. But only a few of the would-be soulful recog-nise their impotence in this idlion. Some years ago I men-tioned to John Leonon how much I'd liked their version of "You Really Got a Hold On Me." "Oh God," he replied, "I always embarrasses me — it's me trying to do a coloured voice and I can't do that." Lennon had the right idea, but most of then don't. The cry of the Sixtles is "do your own thing," "be your own thing," "be your own thing."

black music has become blacker. I don't suggest that white music should get white - it's pallid enough as it is, but for God's sake stop calling it Soul. Some "Brothers" would say: "Why not? Get back to your 'Early One Morn-ing' heritage and impro-vise on that." But just as they used some European instruments and musical forms to create the framework for their emotions, so I think is the white artist entitled to use Afro-American rhythms and musical forms -- yes, and emo-tions, too. It can be done after all, and a good example of such a successful melange is the Who.

Successful meange is the Who. Granted their music is based on rock and roll, the postwar blues adapt-ed by whites, yet it has a distinctly British accent and lays no claim to being Soul Music. The Who, like the Beatles, are original in their conception and remain basically European in outlook which is, of course, the only way for those who have grown up in a European environ-ment.

ment. And environment is all; it's what Souj is about and the reason why the feel-ing can't be artificially in-duced. After all, I bet Tom Jones doesn't whip down to Briston after the gig for a plateful of curry goat, rice 'n' peas!



JOSEPH G. GLASER, 72, president of the Associated Booking Corporation, died Friday evening at Beth Israel Hospital in New York. He had been confined there since late March, sufconfined there since late March, suf-fering from a paralytic stroke compli-cated by a heart condition and ulcers. Glaser was the last of the great booking agent tycoons Raised in a raw, pitiles society during the Prohibition era, he made no bones about the Chicago origins of which he was a product. His colourful, diamond in-the-rough personality in-spired deep affection among those who knew him best. Foremost among these was Louis Armstrong. Hese was Louis Armstrong. 

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

ON STAGE, in flow-ing musical action, Kenny Burrell gives an impression of unhurried certainty, of tranquility almost. His guitar work bears a deceptively simple look

No hints of a struggle between man and ma-chine leak out - except when the amplifier plays up, and you feel sure that won't be per-mitted to happen twice — and it is necessary to listen closely to the quieter passages to appreciate the nuances which make his music remarkable



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
