ore dates have been announced for the ShockWaves NME Awards Shows 2006, cementing next vear's line-up as the biggest ever, and featuring the most in-demand bands of the moment. Hitting London for a fortnight in February, the run of gigs already boasts a red-hot

slice of talent with **The Magic Numbers**, **Editors** and **The Zutons** confirmed.

Now. NME can reveal that **The Streets**. Hard-Fi, Elbow, The Bravery, The Cribs, Goldie Lookin Chain and The Dead 60s are joining the party which will climax with the ShockWaves NME Awards 2006 on February 23.

Celebrating an amazing 12 months for the band, Hard-Fi's **Richard Archer** has told NME that he can't wait for their show on February 13 at London Hammersmith Palais.

"Last year we supported Graham Coxon, and a year later we're headlining, so it encapsulates the whole year for us," he said. "NME is the place you aspire to be in when you're starting out. So our career to date has been book-ended by these two shows.'

Archer has also revealed that the date will feel like a triumphant return to their roots for the Staines-based group.

"It feels like a homecoming so it will be a really good night," he said.

The frontman also says that even though money may be tight after Christmas, you should save some pennies for the gig.

"It's always worth coming down just to see what Kai [Stephens, bass] says. We did Sheffield recently and there were riot police

all over the town and he gets onstage and goes, 'Hello, Cardiff'. That was interesting." Another artist gearing up for his show at London's Astoria on February 18 is The Streets' mainman Mike Skinner, who took the opportunity to big up one of the bands on the ShockWaves NME Awards Tour 2006.

"Arctic Monkeys! I went to see them in New York. That's how music should be," he enthused. "Because I'm running a label I've turned into an Elton John figure, I'm trying to be aware of everything that is going on.

He explained: "I got into the idea of doing a remix and spin on Arctic Monkeys. It's an amazing thing, the kids got on it before the industry had a chance to talk about it. Then they were Number One. That's what I love." However, following Arctic Monkeys'

spectacular and jam-packed appearance at the Carling Weekend which saw the crowd singing along to every song before the band had even released a single, Skinner revealed that he has realised he will have to raise his game in order to avoid becoming outdated.

"I'm a bit jealous. People used to do that for me. I feel like Cher now, I'm getting old!" he laughed.



eck has "mangled" his latest album for a remix record out next year. 'Guero' has been given a goingover by the likes of Beastie Boy Ad-Rock, Boards Of Canada

and Dizzee Rascal and is released on January 23 as the souped-up 'Guerolito'. However, unlike other remix projects, the tinkering began before the original existed.

'There were artists I'm a big fan of and this was an excuse to work with them," Beck told NME. "We got the remixes done probably about 10 months before the loriginal record came out."

Some of the remixes made such an impression, they even influenced Beck in the studio.

"With the Boards Of Canada remix there were a couple of days where I was thinking of taking the original version off the record and putting that one on," he recalled. "Some of the remixes got me to look at the songs in a new way. It's definitely a weird process, but I don't get too attached to the album versions of the songs anyway. What we would do to the songs live is something akin to remixing the song, I guess."

His first album to be completely remixed, Beck suggested 'Guero''s unique sound could take that treatment.

"I have to admit when I started out I hated remixes," he elaborated, "but they've really evolved into something else."

Having now been the subject of musical tinkering, Beck added that he wouldn't mind having a go himself with a covers album.

"There are some old songs that I'd love to record, songs that are like classics in my mind, that I think have become lost to us now," said Beck. "Just different songs I've done over the years. [Big Star's] 'Kangaroo' I think of as a classic."

photographer **Anton Corbijn** - most renowned for his work with **42** - has asked the legendary Manchester four-piece to contribute songs to the film Control.

The biopic, which is based on a book by Ian's widow **Deborah**, had been planned for a number of years, but the late singer's family had never been happy with the proposals until earlier in 2005.

Bassist **Peter Hook** told *NMF*: "We were asked to do the soundtrack to the film. which I thought was a fucking great idea - for Joy Division to do the music for a Joy

Division film - because we've never really done a soundtrack before.

"It may include new stuff. Anton wants to use songs by Joy Division so that each song becomes a video. Like the way the 'Atmosphere' video was filmed. he wants to write videos that appear in the film.

"Every time we get accolades for Joy Division it makes [Ian's suicide] sadder, especially with the film. It's made the whole thing seem more poignant."

It is 25 years since Curtis was found dead in his home. Throughout 2005 New Order have been playing Joy Division songs live, culminating in a set almost entirely made up of Joy Division songs last month, as a tribute to former Radio 1 DJ John Peel.



Hooky said the band are considering playing all-Joy Division sets at some stage in the future.

"We have actually talked about doing Joy Division sets and gigs, but we haven't found our footing yet," he said. "We did the festivals

and had a bit of time off, but because we've played two gigs recently and had the whole UK Hall Of Fame thing, we haven't really decided what we're gonna do next. If we deem it to be enjoyable then we'll do it." Casting for *Control* is set to begin next spring and the production team are currently looking for a big screen actor

to play the part of Curtis.



You've eaten and drunk until you're feeling bloated – now it's time for the King and Queen's speech

he chug of a lonesome train approaching over snow-dusted tracks. A young boy's face lights up at the jingle of a distant marimba solo drifting through the icy night air. The wail of a coyote-voiced Detroit bluesman hollering "Holidays are coming!" in wired falsetto. Such, in September ad breaks to come, will be the first sign of the festive season, when Jack White has been promoted to the new face of Coca-Cola's attempt to make small children think they invented Christmas. The White Stripes will actually BE Christmas; soaring through the skies on a flying 1920s fruit wagon driven by bowlerhatted reindeer, dispensing raspberry swirls and tribal devil masks to all the ickle kiddywinks of the world. So, enjoying a well-earned feet-up in Detroit, they should surely be practicing their "yo-ho-hos", and not, say, moaning about other bands nicking 'their' colours.

"Recently so many bands have adopted the red, white and black colour scheme that it's harder for us to stand out," says Jack, Scroogishly. "Green Day, My Chemical Romance... there's plenty of them there..."

Bah, and indeed, humbug. But 2005 has been a multitude of triumphs for the Stripes, from crocodile-infested weddings to continent-quaking world tours: you'd have thought that they couldn't be happier as the year draws to a close than if George Bush declared it officially 1937 again. But in festive cheer as much as career, The White Stripes are never ones to pander to convention.

"All the stuff we've done this year has been bad business," Jack points out. "You're supposed to play America and England and Japan first and do as much press as possible. But we didn't. I think with this album we tried to do as a little as possible, because on 'Elephant' we did so much, so we thought it was a bad idea to do all that talking before we went on tour. We wanted to keep the energy alive for the album as long as possible without being cerebral about

it. We have a lot of songs ready for the next record - hopefully we'll be able to do more recording when we get done with all this touring."

"I'd like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas," Jack declares. "I hope that this year all of your readers will take the time off and stop watching reality television for one day to spend some time with their real friends."

"We will be watching reality television though," Meg laughs "Jack especially likes to watch reality TV."

'I would never do such an evil thing," Jack barks, in a spat you'd never see between Liz'n'Phil Windsor. "I would also like to encourage people to pay more respect to their elders. That's always been my attitude: what right do we have to have our photo taken or our name printed without paying our respects to people who did it first and did it better, giving a platform for people who pay attention and listen to what we do? My first instinct is to play them someone else's song rather than my own. But yes: Merry Christmas, NME readers everywhere."

xactly how cool are The Strokes? Well, pretty cool. An example: we're gathered in the reception of Manhattan's über-fashionable

Industria photo studios on a cold New York afternoon to meet the band. Casually hanging out in reception is Kate Moss

Second example: they're the band who not only woke up one morning in 2001 having reinvented rock'n'roll for the noughties, but just-as-effortlessly managed to launch a million catwalk looks and skinny-tied garage-punk spin-offs, inspire the likes of Carl Barât and Pete Doherty to form a band and bag a handful of A-list

Hollywood dates in the process, too. Yep, it's official: The Strokes aren't just cool, they're ice-cold. In fact, they're so saturated in sangfroid, they'd rather die than break a sweat, right?

"Kate Moss is here?" yelps Fab Moretti, a Santa costume under one arm, a gorilla suit under the other and a hugely camp vaudeville moustache sprouting from the middle of his face, as the rest of the band screech into the studio. "We gotta get this done and go meet her!" A mere 45 seconds later he's pulled both ensembles on over the top of each other, shoved NME's thick winter coat up his front to serve as a barrel belly, and is standing proudly admiring his genetically-modified festive man-beast disaster of a reflection in the mirror.

Behind him, notoriously-dapper guitarist Albert Hammond Jr casually emerges from the side of a screen wearing a long blonde wig, Santa hat and aviator shades. He's followed by the ever-louche Julian Casablancas and hopelessly-hip Nick Valensi, the former sporting a jumbosized and tastefully-angled hat of his own and the latter in - oh yes – pigtails. Only Nikolai Fraiture,

dressed in grungey shirt and drainpipes and scowling somewhere under his fake snowbeaten fringe, is upholding the legend of The Strokes by refusing to join in the costume frivolities.

"Can you help me get this snow out of my hair a lot of good."

Nikolai: "It must have done, 'cos
Bob Geldof was recently awarded please?" he demands quietly, before succumbing to a smirk as he surveys the rest of his band. "Then let's get on with these Christmas questions." Yes - and forget the fact that The Strokes' excellent new album 'First Impressions Of Earth' (Albert: "It's so great. It feels so right,") is released next week, or that only a short while ago they had intrepid fans queueing up overnight in the cold to buy tickets for their secret tiny London show - we need to get down to the serious business of talking Christmas. This

we do, pausing every couple of minutes so that Fab (who, by the end of the interview has fidgeted so much he's got a beer bottle label stuck on his forehead and a coat hanger tucked into the back of his T-shirt) can do some impressions

of Freddie Mercury. Which is all, obviously, much, much cooler than it sounds

NME: Do The Strokes usually spend Christmas together? Nick: "We always get together a few

days before Christmas and have a

little Strokes gathering." Julian: "It's called A Very Strokes Christmas." Fab: "It's always held at my house. Well it has been for about the last four years. We do Secret Santa and we have a tradition of cooking vodka rigatoni, which is a secret recipe of one of our friends' mum. I think it's actually going to move this year to Albert's house. I don't know why." Albert: "We're going

to film it this year and we're hoping to air it on TV one day."

What, like MTV's Cribs?

Albert: "No, it's going to be a little bigger than that. Prime-time."

So where will you all actually be this December 25?

Nick: "Probably in New York with family, girlfriend, mothers, sisters.

Julian: "This December 25 I will be...

Fab: "...in your anus." Julian: "Um, I will probably be, Ummm...I don't know.'







He's been dropped by his label, dumped by his friends and hasn't changed his pants for three days. But The Others' Dominic Masters is still doing it for the kids

wo years ago I started hanging out at the Rhythm Factory just around the time that The Libertines were imploding. There were all these new, exciting bands coming out of London and for some reason (ie they wanted to hang out at Pete Doherty's flat! they were all meeting up in the East End. The Paddingtons, Neil's Children, Selfish Cunt, The Cazals, Thee Unstrung: all these bands were friends, did gigs with each other, helped each other out and partied together. At the centre of the scene were The Others and their singer Dominic Masters. The Others were different to most bands. Apart from the famous guerrilla gigs (on a tube train, in the lobby of the BBC, on the dodgems at the Carling Weekend: Leeds Festival), The Others were different because of the way that they interacted with their legendarily loyal fans. Nicknamed the 853 Kamikaze Stage Diving Division, Dominic kept in constant contact with them, organising parties at his flat after gigs, often carrying two phones and a Blackberry to handle all the calls and texts. He also helped some of the bands in the scene get record deals.

There were also a lot of drugs around the Rhythm Factory scene – and Dominic Masters was the most outspoken user, advocating hash, coke and crack use in a notorious NME interview. Rumours had been going around for a while that Dominic was losing the plot, though: that his drug habit was making him increasingly paranoid. First of all he cancelled a photoshoot with NME photographer Andrew Kendall at short notice after Andrew had travelled up to Manchester to take his picture. Then I called him in the middle of The Others' latest tour for a simple catch up and find out what was happening with the band. Instead, (his happened...

Sure. I like you too Dom. I'm worried about you. The last time I saw you was in east London and you said a brief hello, but then you started running up towards



Commercial Street yelling behind you, "Can't stop Andy, I'm off to buy some crack!" So how are you? Are you still doing it a lot? "Well just give me some questions and we'll try and get on with this."

Well I just did: are you still doing crack a lot? I mean, are you OK? "Just give me some questions and we'll try and get on with this..."

Well, how've you been doing?

"Just give me some questions and we'll get on with this."

Er, well, are you OK?
"Yeah I'm OK, things are going pretty well.
We went to Japan Ito play the Summer Sonic festival]. We played to 20,000 people in Osaka then played to 30,000 people in Tokyo. We were the first band on the main stage. We played to 11 people,

sorry, we played at 11am to 30,000 people. Oasis headlined and pulled about 60,000 and we pulled 30,000 people at 11am."

How was the experience of touring Japan?

"Japan was strange. It was really hard to procure cocaine. We managed to get hold of 0.4 grams of cocaine in Osaka which is about half a gram."

How much was it?

"Hang on (Shouts to someone in the background). Hey! How much did we pay for that coke in Osaka? It was about 12,000 Yen [around £60].

THE OTHERS

You might think that's a rip-off, but we're the

only band that's ever scored cocaine in Osaka. It was good coke Andy, it was really good."

Is there a good story behind how you scored it?

"Well, we'd run out of hash, so I really needed something. Some Japanese girls introduced us to this Brazilian guy and we paid 12,000 Yen for 0.4 grams of cocaine. We went back to the hotel and I was very excited. Not much of a story but we were the only band to score in Osaka. I don't know if that makes me like a rock'n'roll star or not.'

Me neither. Anyway, how have you dealt with some of

the negative press

you've had? "Oh no, it's all been positive the whole way. Y'know, I've got to with these answers in that kind of way. You know what the answer is to that question."

What happened with the deal with Mercury?

"OK, this will take a while. We had four singles and one album which was our 18-month

contract. We toured the UK which we felt very privileged to do. We went to Japan and we went all over Europe which we were very proud of doing. Then what happened was that the guy who signed us... (messing around as Dom has to move room) Andy, can you still hear me?

"We went back to Mercury and the guy who signed us got sacked."

How did you feel about that?

"Well you know me Andy, we always plan on things like this happening. We knew something wasn't quite right at Mercury so me and Johnny ended up speaking with the manager, went out and started another tour. Luckily, two labels have come in."

Who's that?

"Andy. I love you and you love me. We've done drugs together, we've partied together but I'm dealing with contracts here yeah? And I'm not going to cause any trouble.'

It's no big deal. The question we need answering for all your fans who may have heard about the deal is are you going to carry on? "As much as I want to, I can't tell you the name of the label yet. The next single may be out in February and the album's out in April and everything will be cool. We're strong. We might hate each other, but we're strong.

How's Johan [Dominic's transsexual boyfriend]?

"He's just been to Thailand to get collagen injections to make him look more like a woman."

And the drugs as well? "Well, my thing's always been to

smoke hash, do a little bit of coke every now and again and, if I'm lucky or I've had a bad day or I'm feeling depressed I'll get some rocks [of crack cocaine]. I have a regulated approach to taking drugs. It's all about keeping working at the same time.'

Have you managed to buy a new outfit yet?

"(Laughs) No. I'm still wearing the same jeans and the same trainers.

I hope you're keeping clean.

Christmas is a time for booze-related bonding. So we got boyhood pals Serge and Tom from Kasabian drunk and made them examine what makes their relationship tick. It's a heartwarming tale of communal showers, wizard hats and man-on-man loving...



years ago there was a school in Leicester, there was a boy called Serge, a boy called Tom, and there

was a games lesson. Aged 11, Serge Pizzorno was a talented young striker, and Tom Meighan was in goal.

"He fucking nutmegged me on the football field," says Tom, "he put a hat-trick past me. *And* he was about 4'3

Serge: "My old man gave him a lift home, and he wouldn't stop talking, and from that moment on he's not stopped talking."

Did you like him?

Serge: "To be quite honest, he fucking bamboozled me, like that game on Ceefax. I've never met anyone in my life...

...that's a shit game!" thunders Tom. "Ceefax is rubbish. Ban it! Fucking ban Ceefax. It's crap, it fucking lets you down."

"Bollocks mate, say to any American, 'One day, your country'll be developed enough to have Ceefax, 'cos until then, you mean nothing' What was I gonna say? At a fucking young age you have mates, but nobody had made me sit back and go WHAT THE FUCK'S HE ON? What planet? And what fucking solar system? He was 11. At 11, you don't fucking know anything, you can't hang around with anyone that's fucking wearing good trainers. And I saw that and went, 'He's fucking insane', but there was something about him... something.

Within minutes, the pair became inseparable. Serge's dad had raised him on The Rolling Stones and Tom came from a Motown-loving family, but as the years rolled on the pair

bonded over rave tunes by Prodigy and Altern8, wearing T-shirts that said things like 'Just Had LSD' and the Superman logo with an 'E' instead of an 'S'. Then Britpop rolled in and changed their lives - and like most teenage boys for those few years, they formed a band with their mates Chris Karloff and Chris 'Dib Edwards. Quite obviously, the hyperactive Tom was the singer and the exotic, now-taller Serge, was guitarist. It was a classic twosome. That band would merge all of those influences together, sprinkle a bit of Sabbath and a bit of Pagan chanting and, as Kasabian, eat the world, leading Serge Pizzorno and Tom Meighan to usurp Pete'n'Carl as Britrock's premier Best Mates. Today

Tom: "He's the boss. Yeah he's the boss, massively. He's the boss. He's

Serge: "It's like that [gritty 1995 Britcop drama] movie ID. I do the reading and writing, he beats people up for me.'

Tom: "Oh fuck yeah. Smelt everything as well. We've lived with each other, so we know everything." Serge: "When we played Leicester University, they had communal

changing rooms."

Tom: "They call them paedophile showers, don't they? You know the film Kes? It's fucking sick. YouknowhatImean, I'm not saying I done anything about it, but '60s showers, it's a bit dirty innit? There's something a bit weird about it, y'know like communal shower, you feel a little bit like, interrogated."

Serge: "'I'm feeling a bit sore.' 'Put some toothpaste on it'. That's a bad idea, youknowhatimean?"

Tom: "Communal showers should be banned. Ban them altogether 'cos they're horrible. They belong in the '60s mate, it's fucking disgusting. Reminds me of Kes, the film Kes. I'm not saying I'm scared or anything, but they belong in the '60s with that

Do you get competitive with each other?

Tom: "Nah man, not really." Serge: "We're more like sisters. It's not like fucking Pete and Carl or anything like that, it's real life. Look

at this guy, he's like my sister." Tom: "I'm not gonna come out and read a poem and go, 'Why, the leaf fell down off the holly tree, and I drank some more wine, and we went, "Chip, chip, chip, away!" and Peter and Carl flew away!'. I'm not one of those guys who's gonna pull a poem out 'cos they think it's romance y'know? We're not like that. 'Fly away Peter! Fly away fucking Carl. Come back Peter! Come back Carl!' We're not like that, y'know? Obviously they did love each other, y'know, respect man. You look at that and you just think fuck, they vouch for each other, it's horrible, and I'd do the same for him, and I can see where they're coming from. I can

vouch for any of these If one of you two did a Doherty, what would happen?

Tom: "Oh they'd get beat up. One of us'd get beat up.

Serge: "No-one'd even know about it because we'd keep it together and sort it out. It'd be done within the group, y'knowhatImean? And no-one else'd know about it. You'd never know."

So maybe it already has! Tom: "You don't know a lot of

things!"

Serge: "We've done alright, but from what we've been through man, we wouldn't even be here. The whole point, and I'd say it's a primal thing, the band's only there 'cos we're together. You're with each other all the way, it's the most powerful thing. Individually we're all very different and maybe if there wasn't a band we







all wouldn't hang around together, but when we're on that stage and we're fucking brothers together, it's the strongest thing, and there ain't many bands that can actually look in their bass player's eyes or their drummer's eyes, or their singer's eyes and say, 'I'd fucking *die* for you', and that is the power we have, and that is why we're still making records.... Although we've only done one..."

At this point, Tom gets up to go to the toilet, so we use the opportunity to quiz Serge on Tom's most annoying

"I tell you what it is, with alcohol, or tiredness, there's a dark hour that Tom has when he's had a few. He has a dark hour when we're having a great time, and there's an hour when his eyes turn funny, he flips, and you just get out of the room. But I think we all have that. Everyone fucking annoys you in some way, but as

other that; as friends, you accept it. That's probably one of the biggest differences we have. What I've found being British and travelling round the world is mates here, we accept each other's flaws, and I think in most other countries it don't happen so much. You've always got one mate that's a fucking knob, but you love him, and if he weren't your mate, you'd think he was a knob. We're probably the only nation that has that, you just accept people's fucking twattishness, and I think we've got that big time. Because I know for myself and the mates I've got."

Tom arrives back from the toilet, highly amused by a piece of toilet graffiti in the expensive members' club's gents.

What's been the best thing to happen to you during 2005?


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
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Day lived the life of a freshfaced punk-rock group - a shadow of the band that they would, in time, become,

A product of San Francisco's tight-knit punk scene, Green Day were based at the cooperatively-run youth-club-cumcommunity centre 924 Gilman Street (no racism, sexism, or homophobia), reported on by influential fanzine Maximum Rock And Roll (no barcodes, major labels, or compromise) and had their records put out by regional indie label Lookout! (no solos, fourth chord, or hippies). It was a time of squat parties, limited vinyl releases, fanzines and pot.

Green Day recorded and released two albums and a clutch of singles for Lookout!, being successful enough in a low-key kind of way to head to Britain for their first tour in the winter of 1991. They made their way around the UK in the back of a rusty transit van, living hand to mouth, sleeping on floors and hooking up with various Brit punk bands for company along the way.

One of these bands was London-based punk drunks Wat Tyler. Taking their name from the 14th-century peasant revolutionary, Wat Tyler had a reputation of being the jokers on the mostly po-faced British underground punk scene. Needless to say, they quickly became fast friends with the prankish Californians in Green Day.

By the time that they hit England, Billie Joe, Tre Cool and Mike Dirnt had already weaved through mainland Europe - but as massive fans of The Who they were nervous about their first dates playing on the same soil as the birthplace of their heroes. Their debut UK appearance coincided with the release date for their second album, 'Kerplunk!', leading to an impromptu launch party at the gig in Southampton. "It was a great show," recalls Billie Joe, "although I fell off the stage."

But it was a few days later, on December 21, 1991, that Green Day staged one of the most infamous punk gigs in history. Up there with the Sex Pistols' jubilee boat cruise or the first time that the Ramones played New York dive CBGBs, many thousand more people will claim that they saw Green Day play in the unlikely surroundings of Wigan Bus Drivers' social club The Den than were actually there.

onstage nativity scene, complete with rice pudding, carrier bags of soup, and drummer Tre Cool as the Virgin Mary.

"It was this small working men's club, with a tiny stage and about 200 people," says Bruno Davey, now the promoter of East London soul and funk night Swell!, but then a fan at the gig. "It was a benefit for Childline, and the punk scene was quite tight at the time, so everyone in the room knew each other. The first person I saw when I walked through

the door was Tre Cool standing by the merch stand, in a black beret and a black leather jacket, looking extremely effeminate."

'We were playing with [Wigan punks] Jailcell Recipes," Billie Joe remembers. "And as it was Christmas every band decided to do something special. They came out dressed as the Sex Pistols, I think another band came out as Kiss, and for our thing we decided to do the nativity scene in its entirety. Tre was the Virgin Mary, Mike was the anorexic Santa Claus narrator, and I was the schizophrenic three wise men. Our friend Aiden was a midwife and our friend Sean from Wat Tyler was Jesus because he had really long hair.

"He came out between my legs," adds drummer Tre. "We had ketchup squirting everywhere all over my nice Virgin Mary outfit. We also made a placenta with rice pudding and tomato sauce and threw it out into the crowd."

"We'd been through the entire scene, Jesus had been born, and I came out saying, 'It is I, Santa Claus, that is the true meaning of Christmas'," savs bassist Mike Dirnt, "Jesus


came out and said the same thing, then fucking Sean from Wat Tyler came out dressed as the Faster Bunny. He ran around knocking everyone's beers out of their hands, shouting, 'Straight edge!' at them. Tre was up on the table with his legs spread out giving birth to Sean, who was under the table with a plastic carrier bag that was full of a bunch of ketchup, tomato soup and rice pudding, which we then threw on the audience. Some of it landed on this poor guy wearing glasses. Some people were eating it. We just thought it was fucking funny.'

"I remember lots of offal being thrown," recalls Bruno. "And that it was cool around that time for boys in the punk scene to wear dresses. Then they played for about an hour and a half, and people were sitting around onstage, dancing, and having a fun time. Green Day were good like that. NOFX had played recently, and they were rockstars. But Green Day didn't give a shit about that stuff. They were cool with people hanging out with them and talking between songs. Onstage they kept breaking into [Lynryd Skynyrd's '70s redneck anthem] 'Sweet Home Alabama'!"

Of course Green Day operate on an altogether larger scale these days - a world of MTV awards and red carpets far removed from the DIY punk network that sustained them in the early '90s. Yet in many ways they're the same doofus punk band that rocked the shit out of a Wigan working men's club in 1991. Billie Joe still runs the vinyl release-only Adeline records, while the band made sure that they held onto the publishing rights for their first two albums with Lookout! when they signed to a major label, effectively subsidising the San Francisco label and allowing it to keep trading until the present day. More than that, though, Green Day are still the kind of band who'll happily forsake a few sales for the sake of a laugh.

You can see it in drummer Tre's manic bodywrecking madness. You can see it in the man-sized bunny rabbits running around onstage. And of course, you can see it with their attempt to restage the birth of little baby Jesus 14 years ago.

ooze – it's the gift that keeps on giving, a crucial Christmas ingredient if you're not to go completely

insane. It's also something much loved by The Magic Numbers. You join us in the dressing room of the Mercury Lounge, New York, where siblings Michele and Romeo Stodart (bass and guitar) and Sean and Angela Gannon (drums and vocals) are having a few pre-show liveners before bewitching yet another audience with their dreamy, creamy, harmony-garlanded pop. Since last night's epic drinking session ended at nine o'clock this morning, hair of the dog is more than in order ("Coming out of that bar and it was daylight – I thought I was going to cry," wails Angela).

They've got plenty to celebrate. The end of the year which has seen them wow the festivals, sell albums by the cartload (400,000 in the UK) and get acclaimed by megastars like Brian Wilson and Noel Gallagher. not to mention showing Top Of The Pops and Richard Bacon where to stick it. New York, too, is the place where Romeo and Michele spent their formative years, between childhood in Trinidad and

adulthood in London.
Before all that, however, as New York outside gears itself up for its annual seasonal frenzy, it's time to talk Christmas. "It's always a big deal in our family," twinkles Michele. "Our uncle always bought the biggest tree. One year he had to drill a hole in the ceiling to get it in.'

We didn't have to put an angel on the top because no-one could see it,' elaborates Romeo, whose beardness and good vibes make him the nearest we'll get to an indie Santa.

The Gannons' Christmas seems somewhat more hedonistic. "On Christmas Day," announces Sean, the Numbers' most raffish character, "what I normally do is get up with a hangover because I've been out with friends the night before. Then I go to the pub until about three o'clock...

...get in the pub as soon as it opens," comments Angela.

A former barman, Sean once got sacked on Christmas Eve. "I was working in a restaurant and by nine o'clock I couldn't stand up. So they told me to go home and never come back. So I got even more drunk so I wouldn't have to worry about it.'

Then there's presents. The best gift Sean ever got was, "a green stretch monster. It was jelly stuff you could stretch from there to there. But I left him on the fuckin' radiator one day. I got a pool table once too. My parents tried to hide it from me by covering it up and putting it in the spare room. I went in one day and had a little peep and that's how I found there wasn't a Santa Claus. I went, 'Dammit! No Santa Claus. I'm going to tell my little brother.'

"I had a doll called Suzie Snapshot which was pretty cool," muses Angela. "You'd point a camera as she moves and poses. But I found that in the cupboard under the stairs. That's how I found out. I do think it's a terrible lie, though, Santa Claus," she laughs. "It breaks

kids' hearts when they find out."

"I got a four-track when I was about 15," says Romeo, the band's songwriter. "It was on a list. We'd make lists of things we'd like..."

...and leave them in obvious places," laughs Angela.

"My favourite Christmas present was a very belated one – an acoustic guitar," adds Michele. "They always told me I'd get it for Christmas but I didn't, then I'd wait another Christmas and I still didn't... I was 17 when I got it and maybe 10 when I asked for it. I'm very patient, that's the best thing about me.

For Christmas this year, Romeo wants a new iPod, Michele wants recording equipment the band can use on the tour bus and Sean wants a parachute jump – "We fly a lot so just in case anything happens on the plane, I can be like, 'It's OK, man, I can fly'." Angela's undecided.

"Hair straighteners?" asks Romeo.
"No, I've got about 10 of them," says Angela. "How about a dog?" asks Sean.

"No," says Angela firmly. "Our dog died last week. You can't replace her that quickly. I'm going to get a tattoo of her name, Katie – please put that in so people don't think I'm a lesbian." Everyone falls about.

Like anyone else with taste in music, The Magic Numbers aren't particularly bothered by what's going to be Christmas Number One. They've got their minds on higher



things, such as writing a song for the Trinidad football team, who qualified for next year's World Cup.

'In 1990," says Romeo, "they were one game away from getting into the World Cup. Then to celebrate, the whole team and manager went out drinking, and then the next day when they were due to play the final game they were all too wasted."

'A bit like us today," smiles Angela. This talk of drunken tomfoolery can't go by without a mention of Sean and Angela's uncle. "He was over from Australia and he hadn't been to England for years, remembers Sean. "It started snowing and I just remember him getting really drunk and going into the garden at night and just flinging

himself in the snow."

"We'd just jam and make a silly Christmas classic and release it," she chuckles.

Sean, however, would spend Christmas trawling the bars of the Big Apple with Shane McGowan, who co-wrote The Magic Numbers' all-time favourite Christmas song, The Pogues' 'Fairytale Of New York' (which the band have been known to perform at karaoke nights). "I've had a couple of drinks with him before," reveals Sean. ¶ met him last year at Glastonbury. He gave our mate Steve £20 and aid, 'Get as many vodka and tonics with that as you can'. It would be a reat Christmas – although I might not make it to the New Year."

There's only one question left to be asked – what would The Magic Numbers get Richard Bacon for Christmas? "I was waiting for that," croans Romeo. "I think we've got enough presents to buy already but ff anything comes to mind I'll let you know."

"He doesn't need to enter our life any more to even think about buying him anything," adds Angela serenely. And with that, bonhomie is restored and The Magic Numbers set about preparing for their gig, where they'll spread peace and goodwill to (nearly) all men in the inexorable march to Christmas.



I got the visual idea from two places. The first is a Neil Young album called 'American Stars'n'Bars'. The cover has a shot that is underneath a bar looking up while he is face down on it and there's a girl standing on it. It's a weird angle. The second is one of those wind-up toys you had when you were a kid. It's like a revolving storyboard that you have to constantly wind to keep the story going round but it can stop at any point that isn't necessarily the start.

We used motion-control cameras for the shoot, which made things difficult. It's essentially a camera that is used for postheavy shoots when you are going to add a load of layers. It allows you to capture the same shot over and over again. It was more like physics than film-making, trying to work out distances and angles.

The good thing is that it doesn't matter where you come in or out because of the constant movement so you can blow things up and it looks like different shots.

The band were great too. They were very, very professional, no freak-outs. They went off to make their second album the next day.

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


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




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

ranz Ferdinand playing four nights at Ally Pally is the end-of-year party to end all end-of-year parties. In the year that British music ate the world, chewed it for a bit, spat it out, danced

on it until it felt a bit woozy and had to sit down like it had too many shandies at a family wedding, Franz Ferdinand are the natural hosts for what feels like Hogmanay come early. This is the year Franz made their second album, and leapt from art-rock stylistas to mainstream straddlers without losing an ounce of their cool or mystique

To celebrate four nights of the bombastic, they've brought a spinning wheel of ecstatically eclectic support bands, but it makes sense considering this is the band who list Kanye, Kylie and Joseph K among their influences. On the first two nights

The Rakes play, taking Franz's angular template, and adding a touch of Epworth angst and hey-young-London dread, they are anchored by singer Alan Donohoe's schizo dance moves and shout outs to kebab shops in Turnham Green. Editors' muscular thrash-pop has turned librarianon-holiday singer Tom Smith into a guns blazing frontman of Clark Kent/Superman proportions.

On Friday the The Long Blondes are monumental. As Kate Jackson sings about stupid girls and immature boys on the likes of 'Autonomy Boy' and 'Giddy Stratospheres', she commands your attention like a proper star pricking youthful pretence in the eye. Sadly, Roots Manuva goes down less well. In the age of Fiddy, his daisy age eight-piece collective mish-mash of DJs and new age talk of the "boat that brought us to life" smacks of the dated touchy-feely vibe of Stereo MCs circa 1990.

As Franz come onstage to the gyrating wail of 'This Boy' it's clear they are intent on working the sheer audacious bigness of Ally Pally. It's The 'Franz! New Stadium Size' show, with the slick stage-dressing making it feel like a '70s Saturday night game show. As the curtain falls down to reveal a huge red flashing question mark during 'Do You Want To' - our favourite use of grammar in indie since ¡Forward, Russia! - you half expect Bruce Forsyth to leap out of the

awning and turn round a giant spangly four of diamonds card. This is amplified by judicious use of the spotlight, huge banners sporting black and white photographs of the band, and Alex Kapranos' cheesy Vegas-style band introductions during '40ft' and 'Michael'. Long gone is the singer's skinny-tie ice cool - he's now the Alpha leader, often dressed in Dior, and his Jarvis Cocker-isms and vocal tics suggest nothing less than a bona fide star. But the band are still the gang you want to be part of - as Alex, Nick, Bob (and "fifth Franz" Andy Knowles) do a tribal huddle around Paul's drumkit during 'Darts Of Pleasure' it seems 6,000 people want to leap up onstage and join them.

Songs from new album 'You Could Have It So Much Better' take pride of place in the band's set and outshine their former glories; 'This Boy' out-pops 'Jacqueline', The Fallen' gallops over 'Darts Of Pleasure' while 'Walk Away' and 'Eleanor Put Your



Boots On' are milked for all their subtle charms. When 'Do You Want To' rings through the auditorium, propelled by Nick and Alex's double-fretted guitar posing and Bob's amp mounting, the whole

crowd sing the "DOO/DOO/DOO"s in their matching Dennis The Menace shirts. It's an unforgettable moment of 2005, and a vision of a band at the very peak of their powers. **Priya Elan**

How does it feel to be playing Ally Pally four nights in a row?

Alex: "It's pretty intense. It's amazing. You never know what it's going to be like in a venue of this size."

How do you think the newer material is going down?

"A lot of the newer songs are going down better than the older songs. It's weird, some of the songs, like 'Walk Away' and 'Eleanor Put Your Boots On' that I didn't expect to go down well live are going down amazingly."

Is there a concept behind the stage show?

"(Laughs) It's partly to make a spectacle and partly to put on a show. We wanted to make this bigger and grander without being too fussy. We've always gone for simple colour schemes and dramatic effects and it's a continuation of that. As for the TV screens, we've gone away from that glitzy festival vibe and gone for something that resembles something out of a science fiction film."

How did you choose the support bands (The Long Blondes, The Rakes, Editors, Roots Manuva, The Cribs and Unpoc)?

"We made a list of the bands who we wanted to see ourselves and then from that list we phoned up people to see if they wanted to do it and were available. The Rakes and Editors are both wonderful bands and great guys to hang about with. Last night was the first time I've seen The Long Blondes and they were amazing. Roots Manuva went down so well with the audience, yet he's from the British hip-hop scene, which is a different scene than the one we're from. It's a good time for British music and it feels good to embrace it."

How do you feel about everyone co-opting your stripes-on-top style?

"There's a sense of unity in the audience, which is the way we feel as a band, like a bit of a gang. It's good to feel like the audience tunes into that."



ast your mind back to that glorious night in September; a night when corporate music men (and it's always men), identikit indie losers, and their filthy, industrysoiled champions took a battering by a lolloping, impeccably turned out young man called Antony Hegarty. A man with the physique of a rugby prop, and a voice that marked the mid-point where jazz goddess Nina Simone's quavering falsetto stopped and the sound of a dying swan's last gasp began. Remember the longing smile you shared with every freak, weirdo and misshape as they hoiked their hopes and aspirations on the ample shoulders of this curious creation. Remember the night individuality won.

Felt good didn't it? And tonight, on the first appearance of a two-night stand in London's plush Shepherd's Bush Empire, the Mercury Prize winner is still cradling the burden of selfdom with flexed muscles and a bumbled smirk. That he arrives onstage in what appears to be a fluffy, green, oversized baby's romper suit only underlines his desire to be the being he is. To be himself and himself only. Is he a man? Is he a girl? Nah, he's a human being, and tonight, one that commands reverence with each stab at the ivory keys that lay at the foot of his chubby digits. As he cues up a skeletal take on 'For Today I Am A Boy',

backed by the deft touches of his loyal foot soldiers, the Johnsons, the sense of hushed reverence that hangs in the air creates a fog that intoxicates every soul in the room. And as he introduces his former mentor Boy George to accompany him on his achingly beautiful torch song 'You Are My Sister', it's actually the ex-Culture Club singer who plays the subordinate role – himself seemingly in thrall to the gentle (green) giant sat there beside him.

You'd imagine in his darkest hours that Antony dreamt of finding a place like tonight

You'd imagine (with weary resignation) that a being like Antony has had a rough time in life. You'd imagine in his darkest hours – like anyone who doesn't quite fit the homogenised mould our society expects – that he dreamt of finding a place like tonight, in the looming surrounds of the Empire, where he might find space to run around, play, and be free. His playthings,

the heartstrings of his assembled, respond with unconditional admiration, bookending his interpretations of obscure NYC street poet/wino Moondog's 'All Is Loneliness' and Canadian bard Leonard Cohen's 'Guests' with absolute rapture. Meanwhile, his hushed reading of the Velvet Underground's precious and pretty 'Candy Says' throbs with longing, and heartbreak – and ultimately – hope. It seals our love with tempered, touching grace.

Tonight, for the multiple same-sex unisons that fill the room (proof more than anything that Antony's magic is reaching those rarely reached out to) the big, the small, the short, the tall, the white, the black, and all the beautiful variations inbetween Antony is our champion. On nights like tonight, we're still winning, James Jam

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
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
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
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
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















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
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
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
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
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NINE BLACK ALPS



A million miles from the rest of the Manc scene, Nine Black Alps were reared on American grunge and hardcore... and singer/guitarist Sam Forrest will admit to a history of Aerosmith and Ugly Kid Joe covers.

"I like to physically tweak pedals as I'm playing - it's a lot more fun," says guitarist David Jones, explaining why an all-in-one multi-effects rack just won't do. He runs his Tele through a Crowther Hot Cake. EH Holy Grail. Roland Space Echo 201 and an artillery of other gear, then out to his Orange AD30. "If you've got a digital thing you have to go through menu/sub menu/menu, and then the moment's passed." By contrast, Sam plays his rickety Gretsch Duo Jet and Guild Polara (with built-in stand) through a Marshall Plexi Head and 2x12 cab, with just an Ibanez Tube Screamer for feedback.

YOU PLAY...

IN THE STUDIO

The follow-up to 'Everything Is' will be recorded in the spring with producer Rob Schnapf again, chosen for his work with Beck and Elliott Smith, Schnapf introduced David to the delights of the Robert Keeleymodified Boss Super Overdrive. 'They're great," he enthuses. "It keeps the bottom end, which most distortion pedals cut out."

ON THE STAGE

David is scarcely visible behind a twotier, Rick Wakeman-style pedal board. At a recent show he overloaded his amp so much with distortions, power booster and a delay on full feedback doing the "stupid swoops" at the end of 'Unsatisfied', that it literally

THE TECHNIQUE

"I use the most pedals in 'Unsatisfied' - about six, I think," David ponders. "Delay, reverb, two overdrives, line selector and a MicroAmp to boost the signal, because when you use that many pedals the signal goes down. I use line selectors to break the signal path up a bit so that it's a purer signal and so that if something fucks up you can pretty much guess where it is.

BEST TRICK

"I use drumsticks to do Sonic Youth kind of things in weird tunings, just to keep our techs on their toes. says David... and you might want to grab a pen to figure this bit out. "Everything's tuned down two semitones and we'll drop the top and bottom C. The A goes back up to B and what is now the C goes back up to D to make a stupid barre chord. With the other fingers you can do little melody lines. It's just a Metallica trick, really.

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
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


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
