

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

nprecedented demand has forced Arctic Monkeys to bring forward the release of their debut album. After leaking onto the internet over the Christmas period, the release date of 'Whatever People Say I Am, That's What I'm Not' was brought forward from January 30 to January 23.

"People are always putting albums back so we thought it would be fun to bring one forward," Laurence Bell, the head of the band's record label, Domino, told NME. "We did the same with Franz Ferdinand. The manufacturing went quicker than anticipated and the thinking is that the albums are going to do more good if they are in the shops rather than

"People always put albums back so we thought it'd be fun to bring one forward" Laurence Bell, Domino sat in the Domino warehouse for an extra week. And the sooner people can hear this incredible record the better. It's going to be the soundtrack to 2006.

He added: "Part of the fun of being an independent label is that we can change our minds if we like. We're not burdened by rigid corporate structure."

The change of the album release hasn't affected the band's next single 'When The Sun Goes Down', which is out on Monday (January 16).

INDIE STARS TAKE OVER CELEBRITY BIG BROTHER

The inside story on Preston and Maggot's entry into the BB House

reston Ordinary Boys'
"obsession" with reality TV is
what landed him a place on
Celebrity Big Brother while Goldie
Lookin Chain rapper Maggot did
it because he had nothing better to do.

The Ordinary Boys singer surprised the nation and The Ordinary Army when, on Thursday evening (January 5), he walked into the house alongside household names including shamed TV presenter Michael Barrymore, basketball great Dennis Rodman and MP George Galloway.

On the surface it appeared bizarre that Preston was in the house, and when the announcement was made there was such a huge surge in traffic on the band's official website that it temporarily crashed. But to those who know him, it isn't much of a shock.

A friend told *NME*: "He's obsessed with the show. He's the kind of bloke who watches the live feeds of *Big Brother* on the digital channel. He knows the show so well he's in with a shout."

Preston has also appeared on *Big Brother's Little Brother* in the past. However, the rest of his band don't seem so keen on reality TV. Bassist **James Gregory** told *NME* he won't be watching because it makes him feel "ill", but he gives Preston his full support.

"Preston was asked personally. It was his decision. He really, really wanted to do it because he loves the show, which is a mystery to me. I didn't want to break the poor boy's heart so we said that he could do it," he told NME. "My main fear is losing the fans we already have. They're the kind of fans that hate

mainstream stuff like *Big Brother* and the whole
D-list celebrity thing.

"Hopefully they won't take it too badly, but you never know. It will change how people view him and the band obviously. I think that it could be a good thing or it could be bad thing, depending on how he does."

Maggot, however, has the full backing of his band.

"Now that we've got him in there," rapper **P Xain** told *NME*, "we can get on with recording the next album."

The show is due to run for the next two weeks, with celebrities being evicted throughout that time. The winner will be announced later this month.

PRESTON EXPLAINS HIMSELF...

"By the time you read this I will be incarcerated in the *Big Brother* house. Oh my gosh... I know that anyone who loves Ordinary Boys will understand why I'm doing this... I'm well nervous and very excited.

"I need the army to get behind me... this is a rally cry! I want door-to-door campaigning, flyering and fun runs!

"It's not for fame and the money goes to charity. I'm going in because the lines between alternative and mainstream are so blurred, this is the final taboo... plus they phoned me up and asked me and if I said no I would be a bitter old man! I hope you are all as excited as I am. Fucking mental!"

were still known as On A Friday have appeared on the internet, and give a unique insight into the band's early days. The first leaked recordings were made way

back in 1988, four years before their first official release, and are the earliest known Radiohead tracks in the public domain. Made at Woodworm Studios in Oxfordshire,

the demo contains three songs, 'Happy Song', 'To Be A Brilliant Light' and 'Sinking Ship'. Sounding nothing like Radiohead, 'Happy Song' has a xylophone solo and a saxophone part, while the others are only recognisable by **Thom Yorke**'s voice.

The second recordings were made two years later in 1990, when the band were taking their summer break from university. Containing an album's worth of material, the demo has 15 songs and sounds primitive at best. Some of the tracks have drum loops sampling Public Enemy and Soul II Soul, others have a ska influence, while

until now, especially the first demo from 1988. All of these songs were registered with the band's publisher a couple of years ago. At that point it wasn't sure if these titles were tracks for the then-upcoming album 'Hail To The Thief' or demo tracks. It turns out to be the latter. Apparently, the band realised that

Other songs on the demo include 'Climbing Up A Bloody Great Hill', 'Somebody', 'Mr B', 'What's That You See?', 'Everyone Needs Someone To Hate', 'Upside Down', 'The Greatest Shindig Of The World', 'Give It Up', 'How Can You Be Sure?', 'Life With The Big F', 'Keep Strong', 'Rattlesnake', 'Burning Bush', 'Tell Me Bitch' and 'New Generation'.

Radiohead continue to work on their new album, the follow-up to 'Hail To The Thief'. Next month they'll go back into the studio with producer Mark 'Spike' Stent, who has worked with Madonna, Björk and Oasis, among others.

Guitarist **Ed O'Brien** revealed: "We've got some great songs but we won't release something we're not happy with. The thing with Radiohead is that each record has a different sound. It's hard finding something that's different and sits well with us.'

A tour of UK theatres is set for spring to showcase the new material, with talk of a download single around the same time.



Band say they'll continue as a three-piece, as Pat Walden walks out

abyshambles founding member and guitarist Patrick Walden has walked out on the band. Walden, who was in the original line-up with Pete Doherty, did not appear with Babyshambles for their Christmas show at London's Rhythm Factory (December 22). Bassist Drew McConnell confirmed that he is no longer a part of the line-up

'He's left," he told *NME*. "It was always totally amicable. He felt that it was the right thing for him to leave. We're all gutted. We don't think it's going to be the same without him, but if that's what he wants then we have to respect that."

Though not willing to comment on Walden's reasons for leaving, McConnell explained: "He's our mate and we have to support him whatever he decides to do.'

A friend of Pat's added: "I spoke to him quite recently and he said that he's just keen to do other things. He's got offers

from other labels, wants to build his own studio, and branch out as much as he can."

Walden, a seasoned session musician, first anneared on record with Bahyshambles playing bass on the limited-edition single 'Babyshambles', released through High Society in May 2004.

As lead guitarist, and along with Doherty, McConnell and original drummer **Gemma** Clarke, the band then toured and released the second single 'Killamangiro', produced by Paul Epworth.

As with the explosive relationship that characterised Pete's partnership with Carl Barât, Walden at times came to blows with his frontman. The pair launched into a fight with each other onstage during the band's show at London's Brixton Carling Academy last year (February 22) after Doherty accidentally unplugged Walden's guitar. The two musicians were escorted offstage and soon returned to complete the set. Babyshambles' debut LP 'Down In Albion'

featured co-songwriting credits for Walden alongside Doherty on 'Fuck Forever', 'Pipedown', '8 Dead Boys', 'In Love With A Feeling', 'Loyalty Song' and 'Up The Morning'.

Speaking about what the future holds for Babyshambles, McConnell revealed that for the time being, the band will be carrying

> on as a three-piece - with Doherty taking over on guitar duties. Despite the ongoing problems behind the scenes, it didn't stop Babyshambles announcing an impromptu tour last week. As NME went to press they

were due to head off on a short UK tour calling at London KOKO (9), Sheffield Plug (10) and Stoke Underground (11), having played a set at London's Jazz After Dark festival on Saturday (January 7). As a result of the rejigged line-up featuring Pete on guitar, the band's set will also change.

'We've done a few shows as a three-piece - we played in Ibiza as a three-piece, too," McConnell said. "It's more of a ramshackle set and normally when it's just the three we'll throw in a few covers and Libertines songs. So I guess if we continue without a replacement guitarist then we might have to tighten a few nuts and bolts.'

What happens after the shows remains to

"We don't really have a plan," McConnell said. "We're just going to see what happens and hopefully a plan will formulate itself."

Babyshambles' next single is likely to be 'The 32nd Of December', to be released on February 27.

Could a graffiti'd wall in his flat hold all the answers?

Fans who turned up to Pete's London flat on New Year's Eve were given a sneak preview of his debut solo album. One fan said: "Pete played for about 45 minutes before treating small groups of fans to requests in another room called 'The Grotto'.

A wall in the flat was daubed with a proposed tracklisting (far right), which could be the song selection for the record.
The fan added: "There was writing all

over the walls and he changed the title of the tracklisting from album to 'albium' which was cool - a bit like 'albion'."

he long-awaited collaboration between **Jack White** and **Brendan Benson** is to be launched with a limited-edition vinyl single -making it an instant collectors' item. The pair have teamed up to form **The Raconteurs**, with the line-up completed by fellow Detroit residents Jack Lawrence

Raconteurs, with the line-up completed by fellow Detroit residents Jack Lawrence (bass) and Patrick Keeler (drums) from The Greenhornes. The new outfit will release the limited-edition seven-inch in February, a source close to the band has told *NME*.

"The original idea was to get it out before that," the source said, "but now the single will be out on vinyl in February. Jack's just making the final tweaks to it."

Speaking recently about the project, Jack White said: "People keep calling it a side-project, but that's really insulting to those [other] guys. I really want to stress that it's a whole new band – a dual attack, with dual guitars, dual vocals, and dual songwriting. It's me and Brendan Benson, a singer/songwriter you may have heard of; and Patrick and Jack, who played with me on Loretta Lynn's 'Van Lear Rose' album. I can't wait for people to hear it."

NME has heard five of the album's tracks. There are surefire singles in the anthemic, Kinks-y rock of 'Steady As She Goes' and the balladry of 'Together'. 'Store Bought Bones' and 'Broken Boy Soldier' recall '70s rock in all its pomp, while the swirling psychedelia of 'Intimate Secretary' brings to mind The Beatles at their most experimental.

The songs which will appear on the vinyl release are unconfirmed, but it's thought they will both be taken from the LP. The asyet-untitled album was actually recorded in 2004 at Brendan's home studio in Detroit. Its release was delayed as Benson toured his third album, 'The Alternative To Love' in 2005, while The White Stripes recorded, released and were then on the road with 'Get Behind Me Satan'.

There are likely to be a series of low-key live shows in the UK before the album's expected May appearance. Strong rumours abound that the band will be making at least one headline appearance at a UK festival this summer.






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f you go down to Eel Pie Island today, you're sure of a big surprise. Among the boat workers built

Along with Pogues-esque weirdos Larrikin Love and acoustic bass-plucking Jamie T, they are the torch bearers of Thamesbeat, the crazed, big, experimental sound emerging in response to east London's increasingly leaderless

ystery Jets are more than their match when it comes to doing stuff you wouldn't expect of teenagers. As well as singing, Blaine also bashes a set-up that includes "a sampler... drum machine, a mixer, a loop peddle, granite blocks" and, sometimes, "colanders". His compadres-in-prog include acidguzzling boy-genius guitarist Will, wideboy hippy Kai and Kapil Trivedi on drums, who will reveal later that kids round his way have started referring to him as the "indie Hindi". The band's lynchpin however, the man who gave his chromosomes to the lead singer, nurtured the lead guitarist from the age of eight and the only band member to make the NME Cool List, is 55-year-old architect-cumguitarist Henry. He's like Pink Floyd's Roger Waters, Sarah Beeny from *Property Ladder* and Serena and Venus Williams' dad Richard all rolled into one.

Blaine, Henry and Will started making music together over a decade ago, when Henry realised there was some cosmic connection between the three of them.

"Yeah, very, very sad," admits Henry in hindsight about collaborating with two eight-yearolds, "but I did it because it felt like the most incredible thing. So when the other kids were

doing normal shit like listening

to Whigfield and Scatman John, Blaine and Will were rocking out to King Crimson, Pink Floyd and Queen. And as Blaine and Will got older, they were hidden away from horrid things like Britpop.

Blaine: "I remember one conversation where Henry brought over a magazine and showed us a picture of Supergrass. He said, Guys, this is what we're never gonna be - this is evil!' We were only nine!'

hough Blaine and Will had spent their formative years suckling at the teet of overblown time signatures, Kai and Kapil, who joined later, brought broader musical influences (Kai: The Libertines, Kapil: jazz and John Coltrane). The end product is Thamesbeat's first album, 'Making Dens'. It's a mind-frazzling mix of The Coral, Dexys Midnight Runners and scrap metal being beaten as percussion. Theirs is a world



he other bands on these pages may be riotous or foulmouthed or blissfully young. But Nashville's

Be Your Own Pet are *all* these things at once, flung into a snarling, sweating, sex-stained heap. Their forte is short, sharp shocks of underage shag-pop that involve bottle-blonde singer Jemina Pearl shrieking things like, "I want to steal your virginity!" By rights, they should strike fear into anyone left holding a Coldplay record by the time the year's out. So lock up your daughters! And your sons! 'Cos Be Your Own Pet's mission, as Jemina points out, is to "FUCK SHIT UP!!"

Since she formed BYOP – along with Jamin Orrall (drums), Nathan Vasquez (bass) and Jonas Stein (guitar) – the band have become well acquainted with the art of, um, fucking shit up.

fucking shit up.
"Our band's about rock'n'roll and a totally kick-ass live show," says Jemina. "Oh, and a lead singer who pukes, like, all the time..."

Oh yeah, the puke. Anyone who decided to pop along and check out Be Your Own Pet at last year's Carling Weekend: Reading Festival will have been rewarded with the sight of Jemina hurling her lunch up into a white towel and then lobbing it into the crowd.

"I've only done it, like, two or three times," she laughs. "And now at almost every show people are cheering me on to vomit! I had no idea people liked puke so much!"

Such carelessness for the contents of one's rider stems from a childhood spent listening to Iggy Pop and legendary US punk bands, from the Ramones to Television. But these young tykes have more strings to their bow than bad behavin'. Jamin runs his own micro-label, Infinity Cat, which put out the first BYOP record ('Damn Damn Leash'), while their self-titled debut LP, out this year, sounds so pent-up with teenage frustration it makes the Yeah Yeah Yeahs seem like hoary old rock dinosaurs. Being so young, however, does have disadvantages

"We've had to *fight* to play shows in the past," grins 17-year-old Jemina, mindful of the stoopid age restrictions in many US venues. "Sometimes we have to wait outside until it's our turn, then go back out when we're done playing. Most of the time, though, we just lie about our ages."

Right... and when you play, what does the average gig-going audience actually think when you start yelling, "I want to steal your virginity" at them?

"I don't know," she shrugs, before breaking into a smile. "They probably just think I'm really gross."



gang-swagger, sledgehammer them into the kind of ripe guitar-pop gems indie disco dancefloors were designed for, and what have you got? Boy Kill Boy – the only band with enough screamalong anthems at their disposal to give Arctic Monkeys a run for their fanbase this year. From the splintered, Smiths-on-spin-cycle moment that was their Fierce Panda debut 'Suzie' to the bombastic headquake that is forthcoming single 'Back Again', it's no wonder bassist Kevin Chase is declaring them ready to "save rock'n'roll in 2006".

Originally from Leytonstone, east London ("Yeah, we're from east London, but we're not part of that scene 'cos we're not on crack," clarifies brooding drummer Shaz), Boy Kill Boy – Kevin, Shaz, plus frontman Chris Peck and keyboardist Pete Carr – found themselves playing together when "everyone else we were in a band with ended up getting proper jobs and we were the only ones left". What followed was not a ragsto-riches fairytale but six months of hard graft – made bearable only by the knowledge that every step was a move away from their nine-to-five drudgery.

"Those first six months were awful," recalls Peter with a shudder. "I was working in a post-room and my boss was an ex-army sergeant major."

It's little surprise then that among their earlier supporters was one Richard Archer from Hard-Fi. Recognising in them the same desire to escape suburbia that first drove him to form his band, Archer gave them the opening slot on Hard-Fi's first UK toilet tour and now declares them "ones to watch".

"They [Hard-Fi] have grown up so much. Richard's gone through a lot this year and yet he still hasn't changed at all," says Chris.

Early next year sees the release of BKB's debut album. Helmed by Razorlight and Oasis producer John Cornfield ("He's recorded our fucking heroes," says Pete), the band are taking their main influence from one of Britpop's classics.

"They toured with us earlier on this year and you could tell they were going to go on to bigger things" Richard Archer, Hard-Fi

"We want to make our 'Parklife' – a semi-concept album that takes you on a little journey," says Chris. With their razor-sharp commentaries and perfect indie alchemy, could BKB be embarking on their own trip to the top? We're betting a white picket fence on it.

THE VOUNG KNIVES

After The Libs' bitter end, after debilitating illness, after Pete's tabloid frenzy, this is what Carl Barât did next...

"W

aitress! More Norks!" Down on Santa Monica Boulevard, the English sun is

shining and the rude boys are on the run. In a Godfather-dark corner booth of LA's Jones restaurant, four swarthy young night-crawlers are cackling vampiric laughter and eyeing the bar staff hungrily. It's 6pm and they're still bleary-chopped from the eternal Night Before and ripped to the, um, tits on Norks a whiskey-based concoction that Carl Barât invented 15 minutes ago in order to make lewd, Carry On-style suggestions in the guise of drinks orders ("May we sample a couple of your finest Norks please, Miss?" etc). Three weeks now they've trawled the city's sultry December nights from studio to sambuca bar to their shared apartment off Sunset, trailing crocodiles of hangers-on thanks to their selfdiagnosed 'Pied Piper Syndrome'. Dirty Pretty Things: a seductive stain on Hollywood's moleskin undercrackers.

"It's a weird place for a band like us to be," says Carl, happier than he's been since he last rocked the Albion Rooms. "But for me it's unusual to have so few fights. I end up fighting with myself because I've got no-one else to fight with now."

They laugh with all the wanton delirium of any new band let loose to record their first album in LA. Because the Dirty Pretty Things are A New Band. A New Band, alright? Yes, drummer Gary Powell bears a striking resemblance to the Gary Powell who drummed with celebrated indie shamblebottoms The Libertines. OK, guitarist Anthony Rossomando has a name and facial features in common with the Anthony Rossomando who

played guitar on the last tour with famed alternative heroes The Libertines. Yup, his own mother couldn't tell singer Carl Barât from the Carl Barât who formed half of the integral songwriting partnership behind fêted guitar legends The Libertines. And bassist Didz Hammond is the spitting image of the Didz Hammond who pressed a button that went 'NER-NUH' with nu-punk front-runners, um, The Cooper Temple Clause. But make no mistake: Dirty Pretty Things are no

Libs rehash 'supergroup'. They're so much *more* than that.

"It's a new band," Carl presses. "I'm moving on and drawing a line in the sand behind me. I feel like the chocks have been pulled away and I can proceed, I'm not lugging around this Libertines millstone. I've spent so much time tying up loose Libertines ends, fulfilling tour dates and stuff." Carl takes a sip of his Nork and chuckles. "I did get a bit off-kilter."

He can laugh about it now, but at

otty Pete Smacks Slack

would be forgiven for thinking that
The Libertines' story was a slurring,

blurring car crash that ended its days mangled into Rav's tattle pages. Not so. Way back behind the headlines, The Libertines were dutifully fulfilling their live dates to support second album 'The Libertines', with Carl Barât at the helm right up until December 2004. And a cracking job they did, too. "I think we held it together

"I think we held it together blindingly," Carl recalls. "It was an awful experience because part of me didn't feel right and I was worried about what happened with Pete and


I didn't wanna dishonour him. It was our thing and I didn't want to rob him of his part in it. But at the same time we sold a fair few fucking records by doing it, which I'm sure he thanks me for. I believe that everything I did was the right thing to do. I upheld all that I felt the band to be about for the fans and I did a good job of it, even though it was tearing me apart inside."

Did you know during that tour that The Libertines were

Carl shrugs. "The Libertines still aren't over in my heart, really. Even if we never play again, it's not the sort of thing that dies, it's that important in my life."

To the outside world, though, the point which ultimately signalled the end of The Libertines was the 2004 NME Awards, when Carl turned up hoping to meet Pete there to discuss the future of the band, but Pete never showed. So as The Libertines' dates fizzled out and Babyshambles' pap-boosted career burst took hold, Carl was forced to wake up and smell the solo artist contract.

"We played the last date in Paris in December and it suddenly came crashing down that I wasn't sure what I was going to do," he says. "I'd made a resolution for Pete's







sake not to carry on as The Libertines and John [Hassall, Libertines bassist and Yeti frontman] was off on his own way and I came to the realisation that I had to leave my own band. Then the solo artist thing came up, but I wasn't into that. I wanted to be the last gang in town."

There followed what the romantic poets might call a long dark four

months of the soul.


"I was a bit of a mess, really," Carl admits. "I'd shut down my creative output and I had to get it flowing again. It took a while. Writing songs I could see bits where Pete would've fitted in. I was playing games in my head. Too much going out and I was scared because of the pressure.'

Enter Didz Hammond: touring acquaintance, understanding shoulder and spare-ish part in The Cooper Temple Clause. He consoled, revived and inspired Carl out of his four-month funk; here, in all his wonky-haired glory, was the perfect sidekick Carl needed.

"I wanted someone to be a foil to me because that's the only dynamic I know, really," Carl says. "Didz gave me a lot of counselling through my darker periods and then he just decided he was the man, he didn't even ask. I thought, 'You cheeky swine!' But that was the attitude I wanted, that decisiveness. And Didz is such a strong, good-hearted person he filled the part completely."

owards the end of 2005, DPT decamped to LA to begin recording their first album (produced by Dave Sardy). NME finds them six songs in - they fly back to the UK the following week to complete the record in an as-yetundecided studio and hit some provincial toilets in a secret gig blitzkrieg. The songs *NME* hears (a sea shanty-ish rollock with the working title 'Deadwood', a mournful epic called 'Gin And Milk' and DPT's signature tune 'If You're Wondering', written, when they first hit LA, around the line "The English sun is shining and the rude boys are on the run") reveal a more refined, sparkling take on 'Up The Bracket'. They are, according to Carl, "born of depression, frustration and agony. We're doing things The Libertines didn't. Some of it's a lot harder, more gritty, less romanticised. I'm still writing about things I love - England,





people, stories - and I'd say this is a lot closer to 'Up The Bracket' than when we did 'The Libertines'. With this album, a big point was to start on a completely blank page. I don't want to live through Libertines misery any longer, I've done it for so long."

This, perhaps, explains Carl's reluctance to fully answer *NME*'s questions regarding Dirty Pretty Things' first internet release, the 'Boys In The Band'-esque 'Bang Bang You're Dead'.

See, to the untrained ear this is the most blatant reference to the schism between Pete and Carl since 'Can't Stand Me Now', and might as well be called 'Bang Bang, Pete's A Smackhead'. How, for example, do you explain lines like "The weeds that grew in your heart"?

"It's when you see somebody who's got a disease and is likely to die," says Carl. "It's the death of a dream." Is that a Pete reference?

Carl gives his trademark shrug. "No. I've had a hundred relationships in my life, it could be about anything. I wouldn't be so brazen. How could I keep my mouth shut for two years, then release a song completely about that? That's not gonna happen." How about "The factions that

formed to tear us apart"?

Carl: "I can't get out of this, can I? That is Pete-related. You think you've got something together, that it's going somewhere, then people tear it apart."

"I gave you the Midas touch" – didn't you teach Pete to play guitar? Carl is suddenly angry. "Goddammit! It's about twists of fate. It could be related to so many situations. I'll give you an example. 'Jack and Jill went up the hill', that's Pete and Carl formed a band, 'to fetch a pail of water', to write songs, 'Jack fell down', Pete did some brown and Carl came tumbling after. It's exactly

the same, if you pick it apart. What about "There was nothing but spite, fury and lies/In the words that you read"? "That's about the tabloids." Which can ONLY refer to Pete.

Didz steps in protectively. "There's an element of Carl's life that everyone knows everything about, but there are other levels to Carl's life as well." Carl nods. "He's got a point. If it was about Pete, it'd say 'Bang Bang Pete's Dead'. It does reflect situations that have occurred but it's not specifically about Pete. I don't like airing my dirty laundry in public at all. It's personal stuff. I feel a bit sick.

Nauseous work, drawing lines behind you in the sand. But drawn - here, today - they are. Forget everything you think you know: Dirty Pretty Things are A New Band and as Carl takes a final slurp of his cocktail he senses old wounds closing. a fresh chapter opened.

"Miss," he calls to a passing waitress, "these Norks are flat." What was it some band once sang? "Don't look back into the sun"...

Why the bassist left proto-Kasabian indie rockers The Cooper Temple Clause for Carl

Didz: "I didn't want to leave The Cooper Temple Clause. We'd been together since school and lived together as brothers for six years. If I'd have thought they couldn't carry on without me then I wouldn't have left, but I knew they were able to do stuff without me.

"I was in a different situation from the rest of the band. I didn't feel detached

from it, but I was living in a different situation - they all lived in Reading and I lived in London, which isn't to say that I was living some sort of hoi polloi lifestyle and they were all living in the sticks, but I suddenly had this great opportunity to do something where I could help my friend out and have a good time doing it and, when I thought about it, I didn't think they'd miss

"I think they were hurt that we couldn't have had that conversation of, 'I'm thinking of doing something else, what do you think about this?' I'd kind of made the decision on my own and they were upset, but they understood and we're all still good friends."



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

ne of them's a kickboxing techno health freak. One's a hyperactive runaway from the Greek army. One's done his time playing polka music in a circus. One has a tendency to dress like an extra from Goodnight Sweetheart in tribute to his grandad. And one's quite normal, actually. "Five square pegs in one round hole," reads Captain's MySpace profile and wrong it ain't: it's like five random plane crash survivors have decided the best way to escape from a desert island is to form a sublime '80s waft-pop band and float back to the mainland.

"The '80s thing is something that just happened," says singer Rik Flynn (demob suit, luvs 'is grandad). "A lot of the bands people are comparing us to I've never heard. Aztec Camera, Prefab Sprout [Late '80s Scottish indie types – Late '80s Scottish indie Ed] all those sort of bands. It wasn't a purposeful thing. It's celebratory," he adds. "We want the whole album to sound as hopeful as possible. Whether the music's melancholy or

"The overall sound is epic and it's emotional and euphoric," says pixiecute keyboardist/singer Clare Szembek (violent sports, history of dance vocals). "Singing 'Frontline' is such an uplifting thing. I sing it and I can't stop smiling."

Ditto a lush pop-starved nation once 'Frontline', their first single, starts oozing like musical marmalade from its radio speakers. ome bands bring the re-ignited hopes of a million Libertines fans to 2006, others a Welsh Valleys emo revolution or a tremendous set of colanders. And

GoodBooks?

"GoodBooks are not just another indie guitar band," declares hirsute bassman Chris Porter. "GoodBooks

bring the party."
"We're into the whole spectrum, from classical music to beeps and clicks and stuff," expands frontman and Harry Potter doppelgänger Max Cooke. "But making people dance is what really gets us off.'

Three teenagers and a spectacularly-named drummer (Leo von Bülow-Quirk) from Sevenoaks in Kent, GoodBooks are an unsigned timebomb in possession of a synthesizer, some smashing A levels and what is, quite possibly, the most brilliant bedroom demo (the 'Valves & Robots EP') ever recorded.

"The most exciting new band I've seen in months. None of their songs sound like anything else. They'll keep you on your toes!" Michele Stodart, The Magic Numbers

In recent months they've jetted out to support The Magic Numbers in Sweden at Romeo Stodart's personal request, bagged a slot on one of the upcoming ShockWaves NME Awards Shows, and had their floor-filling, anti-war protest anthem 'Passchendaele' compared to the nation's favourite ever song (Max: "My dad said it was better than 'Imagine"). Not bad for a band who only have six songs they like well enough to play live under their belt, and didn't even have a name this time twelve months ago.

"I was at an NME show last January," says Max, "and got talking to Holly Willoughby from kids' TV show Ministry Of Mayhem. I didn't really know what to say to her, so I asked her what I should call my band and she said, 'GoodBooks'."

Next month heralds their very first release 'Walk With Me'. An early contender for single of 2006, it's a slow-burning punk-funk wonder which sort of sounds like Morrissey whacking a cowbell while The

America's underground success story gears up to conquer the rest of the world

ome people are remarkable in their own unremarkableness. Alec Ounsworth, singer with Brooklyn-based five-piece Clap Your Hands Say Yeah, is one such example. Upon first meeting him, wandering in circles around a French aircraft hangar, lost in his headphones and more concerned with half-inching cigarettes than the pressing matter of his missing passport, it strikes NME that 'Clap Your Hands Say I Suppose So' might have been a more apt name for his band.

By now, however, you should be familiar with the reasons why that

isn't the case – they may not talk the talk, but CYHSY's genre-defying music, coupled with Ounsworth's opinion-dividing warble, might just become the soundtrack to your 2006. Or you could end up wondering, "What the fuck was *that* all about?" Either way, you'll have an opinion.

"Oh, I wouldn't even try to describe our music," smiles Alec wryly. "All the descriptions I've heard in the media have been far too simplistic. I don't pay attention to any of it." And why would he when CYHSY—completed by Robbie Guertin (guitars/keyboards), Sean Greenhalgh (drums), and identical twins Lee (keys/guitars) and Tyler

Sargent (bass) – had already sold 25,000 copies of their eponymous debut album *before* they'd got a record deal, and had each of the dates on their debut UK tour last November upgraded to bigger venues? Clearly, you lot love them already.

"The venues were upgraded?
I didn't know that!" he exclaims.
"Wow. The fans were great. I think
—I hope—everybody left the shows
interested. Or at least curious."

"We saw them in Seattle and the singer has that psychopathic intensity which I love" Alex Kapranos Indeed, how could you not be curious about a band who write songs called 'The Skin Of My Yellow Country Teeth' and 'Upon This Tidal Wave Of Young Blood'? It was enough to attract musical luminaries of no less a calibre than David Bowie and Alex Kapranos to their shows – not that this was a particularly big deal to Alec.

"To be honest, I'm comfortable hanging out with anybody. It doesn't matter whether it's David Bowie, or my neighbour. I respect them, but they're no different."

That's a pretty remarkable statement, and CYHSY are a pretty remarkable band. Love them or loathe them, as with all the best bands, you can't *not* have an opinion on them.

THE SPINTO RAND

The Spinto Band may have spent the last few years spinning yarn after yarn about their colourful history to susceptible journos, but these facts are indisputable: they're all frighteningly young, they've got seven home-made albums under their belt and they make the most wondrously woozy, off-kilter pop this side of Pavement. 



Arctic Monkeys

Whatever People Say I Am, That's What I'm Not



t's hardly surprising that the first words to tumble out of Alex Turner's mouth on this record are "Anticipation has a habit to set you up/For disappointment". I mean, can you imagine how it feels to be in Arctic Monkeys right now? Great, obviously, seeing as they've filled the gutter-rock gap left behind by the imploding Libertines, gatecrashed the proper pop charts with their debut single and been declared Our Generation's Most Important Band™. But you've kinda got to feel for them. They've only released one proper single and the world awaits excitedly for the greatest album since God plugged in his Fender and started jamming with Joe Strummer. What's more, these boys have got an instant handicap. Loads of us have already heard half these tracks from the internet demos which beloed build their fanbase. The tidier production here fails to add any more life to those snarling versions (although any more life and they'd have escaped from the case and gone joyriding around Shire Green). But that's enough doom-mongering. After a while the hype and expectation is going to

fade away and, when it does, all you can really judge Arctic Monkeys on is their haircuts. Sorry, I meant their music. And even if you've been fortunate enough to live with these tracks over the last year or so, they still sound more vital, more likely to make you form your own band than anything else out there.

Essentially this is a stripped-down, punk rock record with every touchstone of Great British Music covered: The Britishness of The Kinks, the melodic nous of The Beatles, the sneer of Sex Pistols, the wit of The Smiths, the groove of The Stone Roses, the anthems of Oasis, the clatter of The Libertines.

Of course, the Monkeys actually spent their teens listening to hip-hop. But where that really shows is in the lyrics and the frenetic pace at which Alex hurls them out of his gob.

This record couldn't be any more Saturday night unless it woke up, bleary-eyed next to a 16-stone munter with herpes

> He's a master of observation. Unlike, say, Morrissey or Jarvis, he doesn't use his eyespying skills to strike a blow for the freaks and misfits of this world. And that's exactly why they work so well. They're songs for everyone - from the shy romantic whose hopeless with the opposite sex, to the guy who'd still take you home, even though he "can't see through your fake tan" ('Still Take You Home').

> What Turner does have in common with Mozza and Jarvis is that he's a funny little fucker. And his humour is so easy to identify with, that mere observation serves him more

than adequately. Forget the flowery fantasies conjured up by Dickensian Doherty - these are tales of the scum-ridden streets as they are in 2006, not 1906.

So you get the tongue-tied tart in 'Dancing Shoes', the bored band-watcher in 'Fake Tales Of San Francisco' and the guy whose girl's got the hump in 'Mardy Bum' - all sung with a voice so authentic it could land the lead role in the Hovis ads. This record's heart lies in Yorkshire, and it's usually down the local Ritzy disco, getting the cold shoulder off the bird it fancies and ending up in a scrap by the taxi rank outside. It couldn't be any more Saturday night unless it woke up, blearyeyed, next to a 16-stone munter with herpes.

The knock-out punch is saved for the finale, though. And when it comes, it smacks you

three times. Just to make sure, like. 'When The Sun Goes Down' is the sound of the streets long after the Ritzy has kicked out for the night, 'From The Ritz To The Rubble' is a three-minute blast that dares to take on that most grotesque of creatures (nightclub bouncers, not Kerry Katona). The clincher, though, is 'A Certain Romance'. As perfect a pop song as you could ever hope to hear, it rivals even The Streets in its portrayal of small-town England, a place

where "there's only music so that there's new ringtones". Alex's message is compact yet delivered with dazzling poetic flair: "All of that's what the point is not/The point's that there ain't no romance around here".

By the time it finishes, you don't feel sorry for Arctic Monkeys any more. They might have been swamped in more hype than Shavne Ward ballroom-dancing across the

set of I'm A Celebrity... but all of that's what the point is not. The point's that there ain't no disappointment around here.

South Coast saps suffer identity crisis

You might think that by their third album - and a full five years after their highly acclaimed first effort - Hove's Clearlake would have solved their identity crisis. However, this latest offering dithers

between drone rock ('No Kind Of Life') and harmonica-driven indie-strut (the exhumed-Charlatans stomp of 'Neon'), while epics like 'Widescreen' see Clearlake turn Oceansized. It seems they're prepared to have a stab (in the dark) at anything, but it's on the title track that they come closest to finding their niche, and it's a dank and depressing little crevice. So when it all shuffles to a halt on 'It's Getting Light Outside', we're left feeling that we too have been up 'til 6am, chatting to the most depressing lunatic at the party. Administer with caution. Originally known as 'Scummy', in its earlier incarnation it didn't even feature the line "over the river going out of town" - a direct reference to the now-infamous red-light district location of band's rehearsal space in the Neepsend area of Sheffield.

Fake Tales Of San Francisco A marker of how far the band

have come in the past 18 months, this demo lacked the bass oomph of the later versions on the 'Five Minutes With Arctic Monkeys' EP and the album. It also sounds like Matt Helders' drumkit has been

swapped with a biscuit tin. Alex was also slightly less scathing of the "band with the trilbies and glasses of white wine who are "fucking wank" according to the newer version - they were merely "not very good" at this demo stage.

A Certain Romance

Another of the 'Beneath The Boardwalk' demos, even at its earliest stage this was earmarked by the band as a natural album and set closer due to its neat summarisation of every aspect of the Arctic Monkeys' universe.

I Bet You Look Good On The

Much like 'Fake Tales Of San Francisco', the original 'Beneath The Boardwalk' demo sounded like it needed a dose of steroids to catapult it to its jawdropping Number One-stealing zenith.

Vampires Is A Bit Strong But...

A proper demo version of this never surfaced, with fans instead swapping bootlegged live versions. This is probably because the song - inspired by smallminded members of their High Green local community sneering at the lads' dreams of rock stardom - was written while the band were already well into their ascent.

In winter 1987, when he was barely 18, James Roberts' first band, The Sea Urchins, released their debut single, the tremblingly beautiful 'Pristine Christine', the very epitome of late-'80s shambling indie chic. Now, almost 20 years later, after a hundred other small victories and the multiple tragedies of Roberts' later band, Delta, comes a record more immediately, breathtakingly wonderful than even that original small slice of heaven.

To orientate yourself, think Richard Hawley's 'Coles Corner' album. 'Everything...' is a similar thunderbolt from the sidelines, another man's private labour of love that's developed into something so much more, but while Hawley dressed his songs in rich humour and lush, late-'60s pop, Roberts' songs have room for dub, tiny washes of electronica, propulsive, jittery drums and even some semi-lucid clusters of house-tinted piano to colour his languidly dilated melodication.

'Sun Somehow' is blissful, early-'70s

freak-folk raised in the mellow fire of LA's Laurel Canyon stoners, 'Anyway I Lie' rides huge, sea-faring strings and Roberts impassioned, arcing vocal. 'If Time Was All' is high enough to veer right off the disc, 'Laughing Mostly' is Gorillaz wrecked on cheap wine and bad spliff, 'The Way' is so Paul McCartney circa '71 it ought to come with its own beard and farm attached.

The song itself led us to the idea. James [Walsh, frontman] repeats a line in the chorus saying 'I won't let it kill me this time'. It was a strange thought about overcoming death again and again and it led us to the chaos theory and the butterfly effect - you know the idea that if a butterfly flaps its wings in Beijing it affects the weather on the other side of the world. So we started rolling this round and into a story. The idea, essentially, is how something really dramatic - in the video, the actor being hit by a train - can be changed by something really minor. It was the most elaborate video we had ever tried to make or had been allowed to make. Immediately, we thought it should be shot way up in the north of Canada. We wanted the band in an old-fashioned, small-town radio station playing the song and have it broadcast out - they were connected by radio waves. Stephen Shore, the photographer, was a big influence. 



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iant Drag singer Annie

Even while literally spitting up bile, in a baggy black cardigan with chipped red nails, singing a bad '80s song, Annie Hardy is our new icon.

And if Annie is our icon, we want The Like to be our brand new friends. Far from imbibing urine, backstage the trio are in fact throwing on clothes and preening like Topshop models. Their ages combined equal that of a single Rolling Stone, and their pop is pretty perfect, which will make it hard for cynics to see them as much more than a good-looking young girl band. Screw the cynics, we say. The Like might be sweet but they're not precious. And hey, we guarantee that any boys with either eyes or ears will love them.

Your bedroom wall, soon

"You bitches ready?" asks bombshell singer Z Berg, before launching into single 'What I Say And What I Mean'. It sounds like a modern rewrite of new wave classic 'Echo Beach' and it's brilliant. Drummer Tennessee looks like a young Nico, while bassist Charlotte pouts and poses like Melissa Auf Der Maur. But Z is the real star. Her voice is a mix of husky worldliness and sad sass, and she's magnetically confident. But then, this is a girl who's played with Coldplay and toured with Kings Of Leon, all at the ripe old age of 19.

Tonight's venue is a dusty, seated theatre where the Oscars used to be held, and it's decked out with fairy lights and packed with family, friends and well-wishers. The Like a sonic

Annie's found the right mix of DIY simplicity and good-vibeology

efore Madonna rediscovered her NYC disco biscuits down the back of her manor's reconditioned sofa, and before art rock transformed itself into art-grot rioting (complete with severed toes), Annie's 'Anniemal' album

began art pop's move into the wild. Following in the grand tradition of Europop heavyweights like Moroder, Abba and Kraftwerk, her winking, witty pop zoomed from

the Fjords straight to the hearts of many. Hipsters loved the fact that it referenced the right Smash Hits centrefold stars of yore (Bananarama, Tom Tom Club, The Human League) while dance titans like DFA 1979, Epworth and Tiga couldn't resist the Norwegian's naughty naïve melodies and Day-Glo charms. So really, the only question that remains to be asked tonight is: do Annie's cheek-chewing pop anthems

With her heady arsenal of should-havebeen-hits, the answer is a definite "yes". From the moment the "Brrrrrrap!" of real drums shocks opener 'Always Too Late' into submission, it's clear that Annie and her two-piece band (a chubby cowboy-looking DJ wearing bondage and a drummer/

guitarist who looks like Mick Hucknall) have found the right mix of DIY simplicity and atthe-Danceteriain-1982 goodvibeology. "London.

I want you to dance for me tonight!" she whispers in her Nordic lilt, before launching into an irresistible version of her Richard X-assisted triumph 'Chewing Gum', and the crowd can't help but oblige. You won't find any syncopated dance routines here - that's why she so ably carries both the X Factor-character desperation of 'Me Plus One' as well as the Minipop's sweet-16 angst of forthcoming single 'Crush'.

A one-woman Girls Aloud armed with the formidable likes of the Visconti/Bowie tick of 'The Greatest Hit', the conga-line fury of 'Come Together' and the sleazy 'The Wedding', her dazzling array of pop jewels shine like stars tonight. And as the crowd get sucked into her vortex of fun, the only question that remains to be asked is: "Madonna who?". **Priya Elan**

THE SOUND

"The Velvet Underground's Sterling Morrison is one of my favourite players," says guitarist Nick Valensi. "He didn't care if something was off, or he hit a wrong note." New album 'First Impressions Of Earth' takes a grittier approach. "To have mean, don't-give-a-fuck guitar parts is important," Nick reckons. "Our music is all about tension, tension, tension, and then release."

THEKIT

While Albert Hammond Jr works Strats as a nod to Buddy Holly and uses the middle pickup almost exclusively, Nick's had his own signature model built by Epiphone. This handsome hollowbody is fitted with P-94 single coils and joins his Gibson Les Paul Junior with stacked P-100s and a Custom P-90 Epiphone. Both guitarists use Thomastik-Infield George Benson Series 012-052 Jazz strings, for a fat, heavy sound. "It sounds so much better when you're bending notes," Albert says. "You can really feel what you're doing

because it hurts so much." They also both opt for Jekyll & Hyde pedals, selecting the "Hyde" channel for light distortion, as well as the natural distortion from their Fender **Hot Rod DeVilles. MXR MicroAmps** then act as a boost for solos.

IN THE STUDIO

To get that Casablancas vocal distortion that dominates the first two albums, producer Gordon Raphael would either get Julian to intone through an Audio-Technica 4033A mic through an Avalon 737 tube preamp and add a truckload of compression, or would set up a Peavey practice amp for him to sing through, mic'ing it with a Neumann TLM103.

TECHNIQUE

The Strokes' dual guitar lines are instantly recognisable, but it's Valensi who brings you the descending solos, with Hammond providing raucous blues licks. "I like the idea of my shit collapsing," Nick says. "In the middle of a lead part I often have the urge to take my hands off the fretboard, just because it sounds cool." To have a go at the surfy 'Juicebox' bass riff, whack up the distortion on your amp and play on your bottom E string: E, E, G, E, then B and A on the A string, finishing with G and F back on the E string.

BEST TRICK

To get the classic distortion Nick pulls off on '12:51', choose a raunchy amp like a DeVille and select the drive channel, cranking it up to eke out its natural distortion. Turn the tone on your guitar right down, select the neck pickup, compress to fuckery and vou're away.






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NOEL GALLAGHER'S 10 POINT PLAN FOR NEW BANDS





DO
