




THE VERDICT

Pete was sentenced to a 12-month community order and is required to undergo a non-residential, 12-month drug rehabilitation programme with "a view to ending his dependency". Additionally, Pete will take a drug test

once a month for the next year. He was ordered to pay £129 in costs. The situation will be reviewed on March 8 at Thames Magistrates' Court, and Pete was warned if he broke the conditions of his order he would be



ith Pete Doherty walking free from court last week, Babyshambles have vowed to get back on the road to repay their fans' support. Having pleaded guilty to a series of drugs charges, Pete was given a community order at Ealing Magistrates' Court on February 8 requiring him to undergo a 12-month rehab programme and submit to monthly drug tests - but crucially, he avoided prison.

A custodial sentence had been a possibility after Pete had admitted to multiple charges of possessing controlled drugs, including heroin, crack cocaine and cannabis, but instead of sending him down, magistrate Ann McLaughlin gave the singer a chance to end his "drug dependency". Pete, who appeared in the dock wearing

two strings of rosary beads around his neck, was watched by his Babyshambles bandmates Adam Ficek and Drew McConell, who immediately pledged to get the band back into action.

"It's brilliant," drummer Ficek told *NME* outside the court. "It was quite tense in there, but the judge seemed quite fair, so we were quite positive. There's a challenging time to come now, I think."

Pete had spent two weeks in prison on remand ahead of the hearing, forcing the postponement of gigs in Glasgow, Bristol and London's Shepherd's Bush. But with these being rescheduled for later on in February, the drummer said he was keen to get the band moving forward again.

There had been nervous moments at the west London courthouse for Pete and around 50 fans who turned up to support the former Libertine, his case being delayed for nearly an hour and the magistrates then taking around 20 minutes to decide Pete's sentence. However, when he eventually emerged - around an hour after learning his fate - he saluted his fans with a smile.

"We really want to thank the fans for their support, as always," added Ficek. "It's really important to us, it warms us."

Pete and the band celebrated his freedom that night with an impromptu show at north London pub The Boogaloo Bar (see panel) and speaking later to Radio One, the singer insisted he could beat his drug addiction.

"As far as crack and heroin are concerned [I'm determined to stay off the drugs]," he explained. "I'm getting an [Naltrexone] implant in four days. As far as drugs are concerned, it's simple: I'd rather be on the outside with no smack than on the inside with no smack.'

Pete added that his stint in prison on remand had been particularly disturbing.

"What do you think I've been doing for the last 12 days, picking tulips?" he said. "I've been sat in a cell sweating it out, fully aware of the circumstances, but I've also been with murderers and on occasion a couple of walls away from paedophiles. I'm not a threat to

society, I'm not selling drugs to anyone's children, I'm not encouraging and never will encourage anyone to take drugs."

Along with the Boogaloo gig, Babyshambles made an unscheduled live appearance at Club NME in London on Friday (February 10), playing to thrilled fans at the KOKO venue. It's believed they intend to play several more low-key shows ahead of the rescheduled tour dates.

The rearranged UK tour dates are: London Shepherd's Bush Empire (February 20), Bristol Carling Academy (21), Newcastle Carling Academy (22), Glasgow Barrowlands (24), Leeds University (25) and Manchester Academy (26). All original tickets are valid for the rescheduled shows and there are also some extras available.

Just a few hours ago, Pete Doherty was standing in the dock of Ealing Magistrates' Court, the threat of prison hanging over him. Eight hours later, he drifts through the crowds at a buoyant Boogaloo Bar in a pale grey suit, clutching an acoustic guitar, and the sense of relief is overpowering.

The 12-day Pentonville diet has produced strange dividends: the haunted look is back, and he's wearing enough mascara to make a panda laugh. But his presence alone sends a shiver through the crowd. We're a long way from the euphoria of the Chatham Tap'n'Tin, when he played with The Libertines after getting out last time, but he's here: that's enough.

"I've come to play you a few songs," he says in a whisper. "Obviously I'm still a bit weirded out from what's happened lately, so bear with me.

With that, the band embark on an opening 'Pipe Down'. It's raw and brittle, but when he launches into the ghostly "La, la-la, la la" chorus, the intensity in his voice could charge the national grid. Nirvana's 'Live And Unplugged' is all you can liken it to.

Songs come and go, self-combusting in traditional fashion, but after a singalong 'What Katie Did', The



ROCK GIANTS TAKE TE

It's the US Vs the UK at Scotland's premier festival

ed Hot Chili Peppers and The Who will headline this year's T in The Park festival, NME can exclusively reveal.
Both are officially confirmed to play at the bash in Balado, near Kinross, over the weekend of July 8-9. Rock legends The Who will close the event, and there's talk that a studio album from the band could also be released in the summer – the long-awaited follow-up to 1982's 'It's Hard'.

"There will be a tour. We have European festival dates slotted in for June and July," guitarist **Pete Townshend** said recently.

As predicted in last week's *NME*, the festival's opening night will be headlined by the Red Hot Chili Peppers (July 8), who are touring in support of forthcoming album

'Stadium Arcadium', out on May 8.

Arctic Monkeys will also play, after the band told *NME* last month that they'd take their mates to the festival if they sold more than 60,000 copies of their debut album! Other bands already confirmed include

Primal Scream, Kaiser Chiefs, The Ordinary Boys, Sigur Rós and Felix Da Housecat.

Organisers are currently working to confirm more bands, ahead of the official announcement this week. Check NME.COM for the most up-to-date news.

Richard Archer celebrates his best ever year with an NME Awards Show and spills the beans on those Scarlett Johansson rumours

ard-Fi frontman Richard Archer has said being asked to headline a ShockWaves NME Awards Show is one of the band's live highlights so far.

The group's gig at the Hammersmith Palais (February 13) marks the year anniversary of the Staines group's ascent as a band - recently crowned by debut album 'Stars Of CCTV' scoring a Number One - and the singer admitted that returning to the London venue is special.

"I'm really pleased we're doing it because we played in the same venue a year ago. We were first on for Graham Coxon and we had no idea of what was to come," he explained. "To go back to the same venue and headline it is great. I enjoyed playing there last time, it was our first taste of a big gig. Also, it's nice to have a show now because we don't have any UK dates until the tour in May.'

The ShockWaves NME Awards Shows kicked off with dates from Clap Your Hands Say Yeah (February 10) and The Dead 60s (11) and Archer was quick to praise the fans the gigs attract.

"Those NME shows are good because the audience are always up for it," he said. "People come along not just to see the headline band, but thinking, 'There are four bands on here and they're all going to be pretty decent, let's check em out.' I remember when we were first on - it wasn't full by any means, but the people there were really up for it and were appreciative."

Hard-Fi have also just returned from their American tour. "It's nice to come home. It's good to be able to go and wash your pants," smiled Archer. "But America was really good. The crowds at the gigs have been really responsive. A

guy who was 21 and just had a kid with his girlfriend came up to me in Kansas City and said, 'I just get it - you're talking about my life.' This is a guy who's the other side of the world from Staines. That was always the point.'

However, news of Hard-Fi's American success caused some to jump the gun and, on his return to Britain last week, Archer was surprised to read in some newspapers that he's dating Lost In Translation actress Scarlett Johansson!

"What can I say? She was short of cash

at Christmas so she took a Saturday job at Boots in Staines and I met her and have been having an illicit affair! (laughs) It's absolutely crazy!" joked the singer. "Don't get me wrong, she's hot, but what are people talking about? It was an eye-opener

as to how much the band's life has changed.

"Firstly, that people will go as far as running things about us like that and secondly. that I could be knocking off Scarlett Johansson - it's really funny! I can imagine [Johansson's bovfriendl Josh Hartnett might have been miffed, but what's he worrying about? He's the one sleeping with her!"



WON'T WIN A BRIT"





ane Lowe has revealed he's in a band - and their album will be released in the UK next month. The Radio 1 DJ is the guitarist in Breaks Co-Op, and their album 'The Sound Inside' is set to be released in the UK on March 27. The album is actually the group's second, and was initially released in Lowe's native New Zealand last year. However interest has slowly picked up around the world and this will be the first anyone outside of NZ has heard of his band.

The UK thing only started to happen last year. The record was out in New Zealand, and that was good enough for us," Lowe explained. "But people in other countries started to say they liked it. I never expected it. I never made the album with any expectation of getting it released outside of New Zealand."

In the band Zane does some singing too - however, the group insist they are not a rock band in the traditional sense; their roots are based in hip-hop, old soul records, samples and acoustic guitar.

"If I sat down and analysed the energy I put into my radio show and put that into my album, I'd be sitting there wondering, 'How am I going to get my song on my radio show?' and, 'How's it going to reflect on everything else?'. I'm not a simple, onetrack-minded person. Getting on the radio is something I look forward to, but there's sitting in the studio with an acoustic guitar too... that's something that fulfils me.

"I'm sure people will expect reference points to the songs I play on my show and I think there are. What you get in José González, in Jack Johnson, Shortwave Set and various artists like that, you can apply parallels with Breaks Co-Op. I like the fact it's going to floor a few people and better that than people say, 'It's what I expected."

The trio are completed by Lowe's friend Hamish Clark and singer Andy Lovegrove, but the DJ stresses his band won't capitalise on his contacts in the music industry.

"Those thoughts cropped up during the making of the record, when you have late The band are really good and there's so many people involved in Breaks Co-Op that if I was to sit there and continually worry about my involvement it would be arrogance beyond belief. It's a great group of musicians and a deep soulful record. They want me onstage, but I'm committed to finding new music as well and I don't feel like it compromises my role in the band. Everyone's happy with it.'







Toung Knives

Say hello to Oxford's angriest bunch of young men, doing a great line in suburban pop satire and retro '70s suits

computer firm who first told Henry Dartnall that he was a terrorist. "It's management speak for

someone at work who says, 'Oh, fuck this, I don't wanna be here - this is all fucking bollocks!" swears the singer and guitarist from indie-pop voyeurs The Young Knives. That, in the open-plan office, is, apparently, as bad as a mad bomber. The incident, along with a few others involving his tosser of an ex-supervisor, has since found its way into the lyrics of a Young Knives song, 'She's Attracted To...' - just one of many tunes on their forthcoming album inspired by idiots.

From Oxford via obscure Leicestershire market town Ashby de-la Zouche, The Young Knives are the greatest purveyors of weird, beautiful, moronstrewn suburban hate-pop this country has seen since Jarvis hung up his anorak. In fact, you could go as far as to call Henry's tongue-in-cheek witticisms and social

> criticisms the semi-posh South's answer to Alex Turner's. Except, rather than railing against such Sheffield staples as scummy men (Arctic Monkeys) and swingers (Pulp), the Knives are instead taking a swipe at managerial jobsworths and Sunday supplements.

'Those papers sum up everything that's banal and bollocks," spits drummer Ollie Askew, becoming visibly agitated.

"The worst bits are the lifestyle sections. Are sun-dried tomatoes better than sunblushed? Then Jenny Eclair talks about her lovely flat. I mean, isn't she supposed to be left wing?

One look at their thick-rimmed NHS specs and '70s tweed suits and it's clear that they're certainly not fans of the fashion pages either.

"At gigs, if we don't pick up our stage passes quickly enough, bouncers don't believe we're in a band," says Ollie.

"Or they say, 'No suits mate,'" adds Henry.
"I got that at Notting Hill Arts Club. They told me to take my tie off. Why? I'm only going to put it back on when I go onstage." Yet, rock's best new contrarians thrive on being difficult. Take bassist The House Of Lords, for example. Christened Thomas Dartnall by his parents, he was given his nickname by Henry and Ollie after he chose to veto everything from proposed song titles to drum sounds - much like Westminster's stuffy second chamber. Then there's the Knives' counter-intuitive choice of video producers. Shot on location in Wakefield Town Hall, their recent promo video for new single 'Here Comes The Rumour Mill' (a damningly dry, wonk-rock satire of social politics) was shot by

a Leeds firm which, to the Knives' delight, specialises in cheap double glazing ads. But being wilfully belligerent buggers hasn't harmed The Young Knives' reputation yet. Having finally jacked in their nine-to-fives in June last year, the trio have since been on tour with The Futureheads, signed on the line with label of the moment Trangressive and had Gang Of Four legend Andy Gill produce their debut album. Due for release in May, expect more small-town

tales of curtain-twitching and office tedium from Henry's seemingly endless arsenal of cringey anecdotes.

"This guy once sold me a car CD player because it didn't match the colour of his new car's dashboard," he groans, "You can't guite believe human nature when you're working with the IKEA generation. The Young Knives are about everything that they aren't."

Junior executives, nightclub Gestapo and Sunday supplement jerk-offs had better all watch out, lest they get cut down to size during a night of The Young Knives this spring. Alex Ravner





Radio Luxemburg (www.radiolux.org) make sort of scuzzy-prog pop not dissimilar to Gorky's Zygotic Mynci, and The Hot Puppies (www.thehotpuppies .com) have recently released a single on the Fandango label. It's really stylish, femalefronted, classy sort of music - try and track a copy down if you can.

Das Wanderlust (www.daswanderlust .co.uk) are a band from the North East of England who got in touch with me through MySpace. I've played their demo a few times on air and it's always had a massive, brilliant reaction. It's really fast scruffy punk with both female and male vocals, but it's a little bit more raw than, say, The Research or The

Chalets. They've got an EP out on - now here's a wicked name for a label - Don't Tell Clare Records. I've booked them to come in for a Maida Vale session soon, where I'm going to introduce them to the rest of the world. It's nice having my job when you get to do things like that!





Cockerish raconteur onstage, keeps banter to little more than some town-on-town teasing about Sheffield in Leeds and about Liverpool in Manchester. He and Jamie do a bit of Beatles-like sharing of the mic. And, of course, it goes without saying that the audience are as rabid and rapturous as in the Fab Four's early days.



'We are ambassadors," booms Chris Cain, moustachioed bassist with We Are Scientists, "of ill will!"

Fair enough. Just weeks after NME declared all non-British music in 2006 officially dead, New York's poppermost soldiers of spidery punk-funk are the tour's sole American dignitaries - and thus out to make a good impression.

"I think you're right ultimately," he continues, "but we did get a call from the secretary of state on the mobile before we left while we were at JFK airport. The secretary of state said to us, 'Guys, guys, please.' Miss Rice – Condi, as we call her -said, 'Listen guys, can you

try to put a positive spin on this whole America thing?' And we said, 'Probably not, but we will do whatever we can.' Frankly, the money just wasn't there.'

So you're doing the opposite? "I wouldn't say we are out to spite America. But we are out to represent our vision of America, which is an America absorbed by Canada."

In reality, our threesome have been burning craters through the UK in much the same way as most US exports worth their salt these days -by sounding British. Onstage, they're smooth and no-nonsense, letting their thunderous new wave riffs do the talking and making hits out of 'The Great Escape' and, er, 'It's A Hit'. Offstage, they're the touring party's comic relief.

On the wall of their Leeds dressing room is a flipchart booming, 'WHY DOGS! ARE NO LONGER!! ALLOWED IN THE DRESSING ROOM!!!' (chief among reasons: 'Dogs eat people's shoes and then reproduce them in a form both vulgar and soft'; 'Dogs, when you have honey on your face, will try to bite your face'). Discipline and humour are plainly their deepest held virtues, and as the 'exotic' contingent, their ears lie behind every wall. So what better place than here, sweat dripping from their brows, to take a temperature check on how everybody is getting on.

"Mystery Jets," demurs frontman Keith Murray, "deeply romantic, and veering heavily toward the carnal.

Chris: "Thoughtful, but only in sexual matters.

"They like to touch." Keith: "They like to touch,

not listen." Chris: "Arctic Monkeys!" Keith: "Cordial to a fault. To a



misunderstood each other, I'm sorry... To find someone who's essentially sitting on top of the world so humble is a bit maddening."

Would you expect them to act in a different way? Keith: "We almost demanded of them: we'd given them capes and crowns and sceptres, we were like, 'MAKE US BOW BEFORE YOU!' And they won't do it! Whenever we pass them in

the halls we fall to our knees and slap our palms to the concrete and they just walk up and gently place their hand on our shoulders and say, 'Rise, my son.' I will be honestone time I did see the glint of mad power in Andy [Nicholson]'s eyes. I could see, like, they were almost like flames, 'Yes! Yes! I see!' and Matthew [Helders, drums] shook him and was like, 'Andy! Please! Remember the pact!!' And he sort of juddered and nodded, 'Yes, yes of course."

Chris: "Maximo Park!" Keith: "Now *they* are marshall in the extreme. They rule with an iron fist." Chris: "They demand that everyone stay on a schedule. They demand that everyone have a good time."

Keith: "Yeah, they're benevolent dictators to be sure. The borders are sort of a paternal thing, everything's in our best interests. 'Rock! Smile! Clap, dammit! Have fun! Get drunk!""


Chris: "Where your parents might say, 'All I ever want from you is that you should achieve to your potential and have a good

time doing it,' the Maximo Park guys put in a little twist, they say, 'All that I should *demand* of you – at knifepoint – is that you achieve to your potential and have fun doing it.' That's their pleasant little twist."

ON THE WRONG TOUR WITH KAISER CHIEFS

The Leeds leg also demonstrates in spectacular fashion the unity of our indie nation. It's not even nightfall before we come across our first









Kaiser Chief, Ricky Wilson, who has puzzlingly turned up at catering for a tour he was on *last* year. Home for a rare period of

writing, they're enjoying only having to work for five hours a day rather than the 25 they endured last year. Last year they were the tour's success stories, opening the show before The Killers and going on to eat the world. All five have turned up tonight to pay their respects or, as Nick Hodgson puts it. "to check out the competition. Put that in your magazine!" Whitey keeps up a lie about the Monkeys'

manager pinching their demo for 'Fake Tales Of San Francisco' three years ago for an impressive four minutes. He's about 12 times as animated as we ever saw him on tour, though he's probably just pissed. And they all revert to the default expression of seeing the Monkeys live for the first time: head slightly cocked, mouth agape, puzzled eyes screeching, Oh, I seeeeeee.

After the show, it's Club NME and New Yorkshire is out in force. Nick's downstairs' neighbour is repeatedly mistaken for "his bodyguard", and neither of them, it turns out, can fathom how Deal Or No Deal works either. Across the room is Whiskas from iForward, Russia!, plotting how they are going to sign their record deal (with themselves) up in the Arctic Circle (more on that soon). Maximo singer Paul mans the decks, in-between wearing a blue baseball cap and climbing about the

barriers, still trying to come down

from the show. "It's like this is the

natural time in our lifespan for

this," he pants. "Every night we

push harder, I wonder where else I can go from here. You jump around like a fanny, but you've still got to sing the song. And 'Apply Some Pressure' is like going to the gym."

In less than a year, Maximo Park have gone from opening the NME New Music Tour to supporting Kaiser Chiefs on the NME Rock'n'Roll Riot Tour to headlining the daddy of them all. That's headlined above the band who've just sold 350,000 records inside a week. Which would be pressure on its own, but ever since The Great Extremo Walkout of 2001, where

bands and grabbing hold of it, waving it around their heads and zapping people with it like it's a big whip made of fire.

The rest of the band have taken notice of Paul's Looney Toons stage routines, Duncan [Lloyd, guitars] and Archis [Tiku, bass] in particular spending most of the show spinning round like they're trying to reach the optimum speed for time travel. This stage is theirs. Paul's hands are scarred from bleeding, he just found out his blood pressure is up, his hearing is shot and he's started to be charged for broken microphones, there's been so many of them. But he's loving every second.
"It's been exciting," he grins, "it's

nice to be back on the road. From a personal point of view, I'm always thinking that if we've made a good album then we need to go out and play it to people. We just want to destroy the stage in a progressive, passionate, fiery way!"

Academies-full of Lostprophets obsessives (who'd nabbed all the tickets) walked out on poor Andrew WK, all eyes have been on the headliners, and gangs of the more bullysome Arctic Army have been putting it about online that ver Park have been playing to empty halls. Untrue. "I think something was reported online," says Paul, "I know that a few people had gone off to get their last train as always happens at the end of a gig and especially after three bands, but it's crazy to see lies in print.

Still, this week might be the Monkeys' trial by fire, but it's Maximo's coronation as part of the big league. Lesser bands would get bored with playing the same songs for 18 months, but like the Kaisers before them, their stint on the road has buffed them up. Never shy of putting on a show, they gleam in front of showbiz light blocks, taking the fever whipped up by all three

THE BEGINNING OF THE END

How do you see this ending? Keith Murray, We Are Scientists: "I'm gonna start instigating a trapdoor policy. What's that? Well, we're going to build a huge trapdoor onstage and sit there with a little trigger to activate it. Like, 'Click! Goodbye Kai! So long! Oh and you took Blaine with you...' 'Alex, you're walking away from that mic, eh? Click! Whoosh!' We're gonna have a grinder down there under the stage. But we're not gonna have it on, we don't wanna harm them. 'Cos then we're gonna have a slide down to a chocolate pool. A happy ending.



After 10 years of cultdom, Belle & Sebastian are finally ready to delve into their hidden past

n their own quiet way, Belle & Sebastian are the greatest pop band this country has produced since The Smiths. Over the last decade they've released seven albums and nine EPs' worth of peerless music;

literate of lyric, joyful of tune and rife with the little things that make good songs great (handclaps, fingerclicks, female singers). Nevertheless, despite a few close calls, they've still to make the jump from a cult to a commercial concern. Admittedly, not talking to the press for the vast majority of those 10 years hasn't helped, but with new album 'The Life Pursuit', they're attempting to redress the balance.

They won't thank us for saying this, but 'The Life Pursuit' – recorded in LA, and arguably their best record since 1996's 'If You're Feeling Sinister' - is the sound of a band eager to dispel the myths that surround them: namely that they're a bookish bunch of pop elitists. On 'We Are The Sleepyheads', frontman Stuart Murdoch even goes so far as to sing, "People look at us and they think we're doing fine/People look at us as though they see us all the time/ But they never take to us/We've been in this town so long we might as well be dead". Add to that the glam rock reinvention they've undergone on 'White Collar Boy' and 'The Blues Are Still Blue' and you've got a band who, 10 years on, are still squirming out of their pigeonhole. Would B&S

ever sacrifice artistic integrity for cold, hard commercial success?

"Absolutely," replies Stuart firmly. "We've tried it all. We've signed to a bigger label, we've tried to write proper singles, we even got in Trevor Horn to produce our last album! When I compare ourselves to really popular groups who've had loads of hits, it just makes me feel like we've done nothing, achieved nothing and are nothing. But that's

a way to drive yourself on." He's being modest, of course; Belle & Sebastian have achieved more in their time together than most. As

> patriarchs of the Glaswegian indie scene, they've won Brit Awards, essentially founded All Tomorrow's Parties, been voted the greatest Scottish band of all time and inspired Morrissey-esque devotion among their small army of fans. Backstage at the ABC, *NME* meets people who have moved to Glasgow from as far afield as Tokyo and New Jersey because, in their own words, This band are my life.

"When we started the band,"

we'd appeal to a certain group of people, and I was right. I'd had ME for seven years. It quite often affects people in adolescence, and that's a time of your life when bad stuff can happen and maybe with guidance, you can keep people from going off the rails. Maybe it's a bit conceited for us to think that we can make records to help people, but that was the general feeling at the start.'

In return, people have been good to Belle & Sebastian; in 1999, when they picked up a Brit nomination for Best Newcomer, the fans voted them to victory ahead of Steps, much to the chagrin of Pete Waterman, who accused them of vote-rigging.

We've still never come face to face with Pete Waterman," smiles bassist Mick Cooke. "He's written about us in his autobiography and he's still bitter and twisted about it. I think that's a good thing, because people like him just expect it all to come to

old, they're not going to pick up a phone to vote for you.'

"It was a great pop moment," concurs guitarist Stevie Jackson, "It was a wake-up call to the industry with regards to the internet. At the time, I was dismissive of it, but looking back, I'm really proud."

In 2004, their fans voted them the greatest Scottish band of all time in a poll run by magazine The List. The band are predictably modest about it: "They'll do another vote next year and Franz Ferdinand'll win it," is Jackson's take. But Stuart Murdoch's concise answer says it all: "We are the greatest, though.



of The Kooks, should by rights be clinking glasses and putting the ska-rock coloured bunting up. After all, his band has recently scored a Top 20 single ('You Don't Love Me'), a slot on TOTP and an album that has "been selling more than the Arctic Monkeys" (in their hometown of Brighton). But something heavy weighs over his curly-haired head. Pritchard, normally a bundle of enthusiasm, is pausing to ponder the absence of bassist Max Rafferty, who temporarily left The Kooks at the end of last year. After a night of partying, Max left an apologetic note on Luke's bed explaining that he would be exiting the band at the end of their tour. So what's up?

uke Pritchard, singer

"Max had to take some time off because he's a bit of an animal," says Luke. It seems that the two years of non-stop touring had worn the bassist down. "I was sleeping in the same room as him and woke up and found the note. But by the time he got to the train station, he had a change of heart and said that he wanted to stay on the tour. But he was too exhausted and had to go home.

In these *Defamer*-gorging times where a celebrity being struck down

with "exhaustion" usually means that they can't speak because their crack-pipe has become lodged in their oesophagus, it's easy to question Luke's explanation. But it seems he's telling the truth.

"Touring is so fun and at the same time so weird," Luke says. "It's not because you're travelling a lot, but more because you're out every night.

"It's a whirlwind of girls and drinking. But you can't do it for too long" Luke Pritchard

It's like nothing you've ever experienced." And the perks of playing under bands like Editors and The Dead 60s also became apparent.

"When you're a support band you have it, man! You get off early and you can do whatever. It's a whirlwind of girls, drinking and everything. But you can't do it for too long. You think you're invulnerable, but you're really not."

Inevitably, Max's fragile personality cracked under the combination of too much pot and partying and not enough sleep or food.

"Max was completely tangled up." Luke says. "He's got to sort out his own demons. We sent him to a place where he could get some help, but he left because it was horrible."

It sounds as if Max's "demons" are

very much in the present tense.
What if they forced him to leave the band permanently?

"Max will never leave," Luke says, "he's at the creative heart of our band, he's a genius songwriter. He just needs some time to sort things out. It could take a week, it could take a year, but he will never leave."

The band ambled on with temporary bassist Pete Denton joining Luke, guitarist Hugh Harris and drummer Paul Garred. But the pressure of dealing with this threelegged dog combined with a history of respiratory problems got to Luke. He was close to collapsing at the aftershow of their victorious gig at London's Garage in late 2005.

"In the future, I think we'll do less touring," he sagely admits.

Later on that day, NME witnesses their album launch at the Audio club in Brighton. As the band launch into a joyfully shambolic version of 'Eddie's Gun' on bass is... Max. He may only be back for one night, but behind his dripping golden-brown fringe, he's smiling.




JARVIS RUSHES THE STAGE AT THE BRITS

Monday, February 19, 1996 The Pulp frontman upstages

Michael Jackson by shaking his rump





y 1996, Britpop was at its peak with Blur, Oasis and Pulp forming a trinity of best-selling British bands. It had taken Sheffield's Pulp a long time to become the decade-defining pop legends that we now know, and with his sharp lyrics and geek-chic appearance, skinny singer Jarvis Cocker was always an unlikely pin-up. But with the 1996 Brit Awards, Cocker was about to be transformed into a national hero by pulling a legendary and controversial stunt.

While Pulp were becoming famous for singing about supermarkets and side of the Atlantic.

middle England, on the other Michael Jackson was an untouchable global superstar. Jackson's selfpromotion had already seen him float a 60-foot high statue of himself down the River Thames to promote his best-of compilation 'HIStory'. His ballooning ego went to new levels when on February 19, 1996, the King Of Pop was miming an outrageously indulgent performance of 'Earth Song' with heavy religious overtones. Surrounded by kids, Jackson struck a Christ-like pose and appeared to be healing the children of the world, as well as kissing a Rabbi (in an attempt to discredit accusations of anti-Semitism after remarks he made in an interview). As NME reported at the time, Jackson was even "hoisted aloft on a crane

with a wind machine blowing his hair".

It was at this point that Jarvis Cocker, who

> was in the audience, decided to register disapproval by storming the stage and shaking his bottom in Jackson's direction. "He entered from stage right, walked to the middle and looked out at the audience," ran NME's news story. "He was chased back

by a security guard, but eluded him and ran back to centre stage. A security guard dressed as one of Jacko's dancers made a grab for the Pulp singer, attempting to push him away. Cocker then ran offstage. He was arrested, questioned until 3am and released on bail without charge". Bob Mortimer, half of the comedy duo Vic & Bob, Brit attendee and a former defence lawyer, sprang to Jarvis' aid.

Jarvis Cocker later released a statement: "My actions were a form of protest at the way Michael Jackson sees himself as some

kind of Christ-like figure with the power of healing. The music industry allows him to indulge his fantasies because of his wealth and power. People go along with it even though they know it's a bit sick. I just couldn't go along with it any more." The following night at a Pulp gig in Cardiff, Cocker told the crowd: "I haven't got a personal crusade against Michael Jackson. I'm not even religious. But when someone appears onstage and wants to be Jesus, I think it's a bit off."

Epic Records said that Jackson was "sickened, saddened, shocked, upset, cheated, angry...", while tabloids across the world reported on the "screaming" and "bleeding" kids huddling in "terror".

Although the footage was edited out of the tological based in the screaming of the screaming of the screaming in the television broadcast of the Brits, it transpired that nobody was hurt. As for Jarvis, he would go down in history for waggling his rump at the world's most paranoid and deluded popstar.

Harmonies For The Haunted (RCA)

hen you Arctic Monkeys their release date by a few months. The are composing a review former option means they might die on about any record Arctic their arses and vanish in a puff of smoke, Monkeys that has come the latter pins its hopes on everybody having short memories and not thinking they're big wusses. And if you really believe in what you do, you take option one.

So well done, Brooklyn's Stellastarr*, for inching out under that spotlight and giving it a pop. And you could even extend that 'well done', if you were being kind, for proffering a solid (ugh!), cohesive (yuk!) set of literate guitar pop tunes. But - you probably sensed there was a 'but' coming this month, said set feels as flimsy as a bonsai tree in a category four hurricane. It's not their fault that someone else released The Official Fifth Best British Album Ever™ a few weeks back, but by God, they're suffering for it nevertheless.

'Harmonies For The Haunted' (dreadful title) has its moments - 'Sweet Troubled Soul' (dreadful title - you'll notice a theme developing shortly) is a rip-snorter of a song, all galloping drums and barely restrained histrionics in the 'Crocodiles'-era Echo & The Bunnymen style, while 'When I Disappear' is a lovely, delicate thing. And the closer, 'Island Lost At Sea' (worst title of the lot - how can an island get lost? Islands don't move) is a noteperfect Massive Unsubtle Album-Closing Big Rock Classic. But, talking of subtlety and the lack thereof, man alive, the bulk of it is about as subtle as the enthused foreplay of a bull elephant - 'On My Own' is the worst offender, and believe us when we say that it is possible to close your eyes and imagine that it's Simple Minds right there in the room with you, stinking up the place with flatulent blasts of bombast. The problem is Shawn Christensen's bellowingly unsubtle vocal style, which batters every last vestige of restraint out of its way as it strains for greater heights of veins-bulging volume-as-passion. One imagines Mr Christensen takes himself terribly seriously, with his lost islands and his haunted harmonies and all - it's just a shame he chooses to convey this seriousness by approximating a klaxon horn.

So it's max points for putting up rather than shutting up, but only four points for quality, and those are the only points that count. Still, at least we didn't mention Arctic Monkeys.

Record label compilations are notoriously hit-and-miss affairs. Designed to show how 'eclectic' (translation: "We signed an acid jazz act in 1994 and can't get rid of them, but they're still big in Germany") the label is, they tend to oscillate widely between an ace remix of a track you already know and a ropey track by a ridiculously named band who were possibly signed for a bet.

DIY label Moshi Moshi began life as labour of love, formed by record biz bods who wanted to work with non-mainstream acts. Consequently, 'Can You Hear Me Clearly' has the feel of a house party - heartfelt, homespun and ever so slightly crazy. In fact, it feels like the best compilation tape your bezzie never made you. When the biggest

acts on your label are Bloc Party (even after all their success they are *still* a delightfully odd proposition) and The Rakes, you know you are in for some leftfield top trumps.

And sure enough, it jumps through genres with skill and pop nous. The post-Epworth indie kids dancing faction is accounted for by the likes of DIY dance monkeys Hot Chip ('Baby Said'), artonistas Roland Shanks ('Anniversary') and Lo-Fi-Fnk ('Change Channel'), while the anti-folk, anti-Blunt contingent makes a great showing in the form of arty sleazers Tilly And The Wall ('Nights Of The Living Dead') and Beck-ites Sukpatch ('Bottom Of The Well'). Meanwhile, the 'ones to watch' box is ticked by LA's Foreign Born - their 'We Had Pleasure' is the Psychedelic Furs-riddled '80s power anthem that Delays dream about writing every night on their Multi-Coloured Swap Shop pillowcases. Ending with Yeti's delightful 'Never Lose Your Sense Of Wonder', 'Can You Hear Me Clearly' is a rarity - a compilation that doesn't force you to grimace and reach for the skip button once, and for that we should be grateful. Bella Union was founded by Cocteau Twin Simon Raymonde and, tellingly, the label's most high-profile act, the excellent Howling Bells, retain some elements of the Twins' ethereal bluster, showcased here on 'Setting Sun'. However, as 'Beneath The

Surface' shows, the label is not just about

bands who force grown men into stupefied, gurgling messes lying on the floor in the foetal position.

Glasgow's My Latest Novel channel Arcade Fire's ashen grandeur with a Scottish brogue - their 'Wrongfully, I Rested' is like a slowed down Sons And Daughters without the scary ladies. It's chamber pop at its best. Speaking of which, The Dears - the Canadian band that started all that post-Romantic Canuck brilliance - are represented by the mournful new demo 'There Goes My Outfit'.

With more eyelid fluttering and wrist flashing than two cowboys on *Brokeback Mountain*, the rest of 'Beneath The Surface' flirts with alt.country. Texan quintet Midlake come on Wilco-like with 'Roscoe' (yawn), while Fionn Regan does his best 'Heartbreaker'-era Ryan Adams impression on 'The Underwood Typewriter' (excellent, but surely one musical progeny who shits out records faster than you can say "No. Really. Stop. I haven't listened to the concept album about the afternoon you spent playing billiards with The Strokes yet" is enough?).

'Beneath The Surface' does not have the same thread of brilliance running through it that 'Can You Hear Me Clearly' does. Though the dour undercurrent may make it easy winter listening, it's not quite Moshi Moshi's essential party mix. But since it's the price of a single, think of it as Howling Bells with a surfeit of bonus tracks. **Priya Elan**

Comprised entirely of musicians from established American hardcore/thrash bands (the best known of whom are masked-mentalists The Locust), the five members of Some Girls have a vicious sonic

pedigree akin to that of musical pit bulls. Indeed, by their own admission, the band's reason for existence revolves around the charming desire to "brutalise people" and it's something they do with an unrelenting amount of power. The 13 songs fly by in 25 minutes, each a more glorious violation of the senses than the last and by the time it's over, you feel like someone's ripped your head off and used an electric sander on your lugholes. Yes, it's that good.

Snap's entertainment

Expanded 'Best Of' tells the real story of Weller's first band



The Jam

Snap! (Polydor)

t's a popular misconception: that Paul Weller is some sort of 'proper music' godfather, the ultimate nuts'n'bolts borerocker. But if you overlook the 10 years of turgid solo albums, the patronage of Ocean Colour Scene, the guitar solos and the Jools Holl... oh alright, so maybe it's not a misconception at all. But whatever he might have done or may do in the future, there's no way that the Modfather could ever taint the achievements of his first band. The Jam were about youth, energy, fire, passion; they were about socially observant lyrics, obsessive fans, singles that flew into the charts at Number One and were influenced by funk as well as punk. Paul Weller was 19 when they released their first single. Sounding familiar yet, Arctic Monkeys fans?

Speaking of misconceptions, this rereleased compilation at least addresses a small one. On its initial transfer to newfangled compact disc from vinyl 'Snap!' was, due to space restrictions, stripped of eight of its tracks, becoming a mere singles collection rather than an accurate portrait that, by bringing fan favourites and B-sides to the mix. shows The Jam to be a group of light and shade. Take 'Smithers-Jones'. previously left languishing on the B-side of the 1979 single 'When You're Young'. Penned by bassist Bruce Foxton, it's one of The Jam's finest ever songs and deserves this new limelight. Similarly the swirling, Kinks-esque 'Man In The Corner Shop', from 1980's 'Sound Affects' album rubbishes claims that Weller only ever wrote singles, while 'The Butterfly Collector' (B-side) of 'Strange Town') is almost goth.

Less successful is the bonus live disc. originally a limited EP included with the initial release. Recorded at The Jam's farewell gig at Wembley Arena in 1983, it features faithful-but-pointless versions of some Weller faves-to-this-day.

But, of course. The Jam secured their place in British musical history with a staggeringly-great run of singles and they're all here, in all their magnificent, unrivalled glory: 'Going Underground'

a rejection of mainstream culture that's as relevant now as it ever was; 'Down In The Tube Station At Midnight' both a feat of studio innovation and a thrilling pop nugget; 'Town Called Malice' easily a match for any of the classic Motown singles it apes and 'That's Entertainment' (written in 10 minutes after a drunken night out) still as perfect a picture of closing time chaos as anyone before or since has managed.



NME feels like a grandad as Tennessee's finest play for their own age group. And sell 'em T-shirts

onight, Jemina Pearl starts the evening selling T-shirts to underage fans. The 17-year-old nymphet singer of Be Your Own Pet is working on the merch stand, taking time before their first all ages show to meet her fellow under-18s.

"We wish we could play every show all ages," says Pearl, between signing seven-inch singles for adoring scenesters. "A lot of our fans are the same age as us or younger and we wanted them to get a chance to see us." The atmosphere at the usually geriatric Bush Hall is duly transformed, and you can't just blame the alcopops. Nashville quartet BYOP's spunk'n'junk, elastic chords and boundless bounciness has attracted a crowd who are defiantly Up For It.

Jemina's Memphis-bred boyfriend **Jeffry Novak** provides their first support. Like Tom Vek after being repeatedly hit in the face with a sequencer, he's the most exciting one-man band since Dan Sartain. Mixing punky lo-fi production with hi-fi songs, he wins the crowd over with his John Lydon meets Bo Diddley sneer.

Unashamedly retro mop-tops Harrisons maintain the excellent reputation of Sheffield bands with the mod-punk of recent single 'Blue Note'. Sarf-London four piece Good Shoes are announced by their MC chucking the contents of their rider (oranges, water bottles, a pizza box) at the audience. Singer Rhys Jones might look like a geography teacher in training, but their post-Bloc take on geekoid Talking Heads pop soon charms the audience. From the artdisco pop of 'Small Town' and 'Nazanin' to, um, 'Happy Birthday' (sung to bassist Joel Cox), it's a sprightly dance party come to life. Clap Your Hands Say "Hmmmm!"

"We're called the Sugababes!" Jemina Pearl lies before **Be Your Own Pet** launch into a ferocious psychobilly version of 'Bicycle Bicycle, You Are My Bicycle'. And it's clear that they are not the band we thought they were. If you were thinking these deep-fried Nashville teens were the *Minipops* version of Yeah Yeah, then think again, dufus. Can you imagine Bonnie Langford-like Jemina being hailed as a Sevigny-type high fashion icon in the

Before Jemina disappears into a sea of hands during a tightly chaotic encore of 'Bunk Trunk Skunk', she says, "Thanks for being our pet." 

London noise merchants find their niche in a mid-afternoon youth explosion

can already guarantee you all that this will be soooo much better than the show tonight!" grins guitarist Rory Atwell, prompting a chorus of screams that is both ecstatic and glass-shatteringly high. Taking to the stage for the first of their two shows today at the super-ungodly hour of four o'clock on a Saturday afternoon, Test Icicles are facing a matinée crowd and man, are this soda pop-charged, stupidly young 600 pleased to see them.


There may have been whispers recently of a potential split after their South By SouthWest appearance this April, but onstage the London trio look like they're having the time of their lives. It's not hard to see why: Test Icicles are about excitement, noise, sarcasm, showing off, short attention spans and a complete contempt for seriousness. And, today, their schizophrenic disco thrash-punk racket has found its perfect home, being taken at gloriously ridiculous face value by a bunch of 14 and 15-year-olds with just one thing on their minds: having fun.

So this afternoon, 'Circle Square Triangle' is met less with self-aware industry mutterings such as, "Hmmm, this is like Gang of Four being played by a more fashion-conscious Cramps with Robert Smith on vocals," and more with the screech-along and fit of group pogoing it deserves. Elsewhere, 'Your Biggest Mistake' is bludgeoned to death and 'What's Your Damage?' tossed off with genuine don't-give-a-shit abandon. No-one's after perfection here, and floppy-fringed Iciclein-chief Sam Mehran is in his element - his every between-song-goofaround, (involving comedy riffs on Michael Jackson's 'Black Or White', getting the band's iPod operator to play snippets of Creed and telling his disciples that they'll "all be getting an A+... in ROCK!") greeted



with yet more screams. Though this is mainly because he's playing to people who realise just how oh-mi-god gorgeous he is. Guitarist/keyboardist Dev asks how many people present are members of "the global phenomenon that is MySpace" and the uproarious reaction says it all. Test Icicles are here playing to the ultimate home crowd, a bunch of kids who think that name is bloody brilliant, actually, who have the same obsessions as them and who completely understand that there's nothing to 'get' here - no 'message', no 'concept', just a total disregard for anything that is in any way boring.

"Oh my God that was AMAZING!" gasps one girl of no more than 14 years afterwards, throwing her arms around her friend, who she no doubt lost in the moshpit about 10 seconds in. If these three beautifully odd young men do split up then she may well have forgotten them in two months. But that's kind of the point: for Test Icicles and all who follow them, there really is no time like now. Hamish MacBain

Snapping at the crowd, exposing his beer belly and turning up for his own gig. Justin Hawkins' mistakes just roll on and on

music journalism. Well. how about some friendly advice first? DON'T EVEN FUCKING THINK ABOUT IT. Oh, sure, you get your good days - the days where you get sent free Rapture T-shirts or get to "hang" with that Preston off *Celebrity Big Brother*. But then you get the days where you get told to review The Darkness. The days where you're politely informed that the band are still so miffed about a live review written in about 1943 that they'd sooner you propped up the piddling ticket tout trade outside the gig (only a tenner each!) than put you on the guestlist. And the horror hasn't even

I'm not talking about the awful music, the Alan Partridge-style 'banter' or the kiddy-KISS attempt at pyrotechnics. I'm not even talking about the moment that snaggletoothed gristle-brain paraded his sexual insecurities by floating over the crowd on a wobbly podium shaped like - titter! snigger! - a pair of woman's breasts. Then he finally cracks: "Oh come on for fuck's sake!" he yells when the crowd don't cheer loudly enough. One song later, the gig crumbles to an end and the band walk off.

Does this review sound harsh? Listen: you weren't there. You didn't see what I saw. You never witnessed Justin warning us he'd got fat before revealing a gigantic beer belly and making the crowd cheer whenever he bloated it out. The horror!

Justin Hawkins, with all his splendidly revolting physical features, is responsible for everything bad that festers in the pits of the human soul. You heard all that little Johnny?

I WANT TO SOUND LIKE...

MYSTERY JETS

THE SOUND

Mystery Jets sound like they've just harmonised their way out of an Enid Blyton novel. They'd be the local lads who foil the smugglers with a combination of winning progrock bonhomie and ardent tunesmithery. And the odd cravat.

THE KIT

"We're not tech-y," says guitarist William Rees, "we just feel our way around equipment." He plays his old Jaguar through a Fender DeVille for a classic, boxy tone. He'll then use an Electro-Harmonix Polychorus for songs like 'Purple Prose', and an **EH Polyphonic Octave Generator,** which makes his guitar sound like a Hammond by embellishing each note with three extra octaves. He's into his loop pedals, too: a Boss delay and a Line 6 DL4. Then there's a rare MXR Blue Box that makes his guitar sound like a distorted synth. Meanwhile, Henry plays an Epiphone Les Paul through an old Vox with a spot of distortion and tremolo, and also takes care of the piano, Korg MicroSynth and a MIDI keyboard that connects to Blaine's sampler. Blaine's also working a Korg Prophecy, a drum pad and a mixing desk.

IN THE STUDIO

"I reckon he's what Brian Eno would have been like," says William of producer James Ford (Test Icicles, Duels), who abandoned his Hackney studio for the more makeshift arrangement at Eel Pie Island. "It's basically a room filled with instruments and old toys. We had a box of old BBC mics and mic'ed anything up that we thought might be interesting." Everything was recorded onto Pro Tools, although



much of the album was bounced onto tape afterwards to give it a vintage finish. 'Soluble In Air' was recorded in the boatshed itself. "The bell is the church in Twickenham. If you listen carefully you can hear the birds nesting in the roof of the boathouse."

THE TECHNIQUE

"I fingerpick because I was classically trained," says William, and you can hear this most in tracks that were written on the guitar, like 'You Can't Fool Me Dennis' and 'On My Feet'. "On 'Little Bag Of Hair' I played the solo on a 12-string through a chorus pedal, but when we play live I try new stuff each night. I've got a delay setting that, when I switch it on, the delay instantly feeds back like a dub record. For a new song called 'Diamonds In The Dark' I've developed a synthy guitar sound by running the Polyphonic Octave pedal through a delay for a gated sound.'

BEST TRICK

Playing in a junk-filled boatyard has its uses: "I've started using a tom-tom on stage and Henry uses jingle bells and maracas. Blaine uses aluminium woodblocks, an old mailbox and a pan with a mini mic on it that goes through a delay. It's all very Einstürzende Neubauten!"




