
Franz Ferdinand You Could Have It So Much Better

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THE NEW **IAN CURT**

Indie frontman wil play Joy Division singer in new biopic

ere's the man who's set to play Ian Curtis in the Joy Division movie Control. He's Sam Riley, a re ative unknown who has bagged the part that was rumoured to be going to Jude Law. Riley. who is also in the band 10,000 Things, got the nod after auditioning for a part last year. He had looked to acting to make a living after his band failed to make the impact he hoped they would.

Not really knowing which role in the film he wanted. Riley rehearsed for the part of Joy Division/New Order drummer Stephen Morris, but ended up going one better.

"I told them I could play drums I figured I could learn the basics - then they called me back, but to read for tan, which was a bit of a surprise," he said. "I went back and met Anton Corbijn, the director. They rang me up on my birthday, January 8, and

told me I'd got the part. I thought they were having me on!"

Control is based on Curtis' widow Deborah's book Touching From A Distance.

Riley continued: "It pretty much follows that story from just before they met to the obvious conclusion. I'm going to be speaking with Joy Division

Bernard Sumner. but it's essentially Anton's interpretation of it. He moved to England because of Joy Division, left the Netherlands in the '70s hecause he fell in love with the band."

'Control' will start filming in May, with a release likely next year.

"I went to audition to play the drummer in Joy Division, but I'd been beaten up in Leeds the night before, so I had a big black eve." he

laughed. The director [Michael Winterbottom] thought I looked more like [The Fall singer] Mark E Smith. I got the part of him, but it was edited out of the final cut. I took a load of mates to the cinema and never made it to the big screen!"

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V FESTIVAL HEADLINERS CONFRMED



"HELLO WORTHY FARM, WE MEAN V FESTIVAL"

Radiohead's appearance at V is the first time the band have played a UK festival outside of Glastonbury since 1996.

You have to go back to T In The Park in July of that year to find a festival appearance other than that on Worthy Farm. A year before the release of 'OK Computer' a handful of songs from their now-classic album were played - but the main set focused on tracks from their first two records.

From there, Radiohead played their legendary set at Glastonbury in 1997, and returned in 2003 to showcase their last album 'Hall To The Thief'. In between they resisted playing anywhere else, and in 2000 hired their own big top to play 'no logo', ad-free gigs of their own.

And NME was right - Radiohead and Morrissey are playing the August bash

orrissey and Radiohead have been confirmed as headliners of this year's V Festival.

As revealed exclusively by NME way back in November, the Oxford band will play at Chelmsford on the Saturday night (August 19) and Stafford on the Sunday night (20). Morrissey will headline on the opposite nights.

They'll be joined by **Bloc Party** and **Kasabian** while **Faithless** and **Fatboy Slim**also join the bill. More of the
70 acts playing will be
announced soon.

"We're very proud to be presenting one of the most important bands in live

music today as headliners for this year's V,' explained Festival Director Bob Angus of this year's bill. "And to secure Morrissey, a man who has influenced so many great artists, as the other main stage headliner."

Radiohead have been in the studio since last year and it's expected the band will use their appearance to preview tracks from their new album, due the summer.

The group recently revealed that they are working on 'Nude', a lost track from around

the time of 'OK Computer' but which the band have never recorded properly.

Similarly, Bloc Party will air songs from their second album, though singer **Kele Okereke** admitted he was more excited about sharing the bill with Radiohead.

"I'm completely stoked, Radiohead have always been one of my favourite bands and I'm really looking forward to hearing

them do new stuff, "he said. ""V was the first festival I ever went to so it's nice to play it this year on the main stage. We're pretty excited. V is kind of a family festival, so I'm not sure how much new stuff we'll play but we will drop the odd new song in the set. We're going to have a good time."

Tickets for both V Festival sites - Hylands Park in Chelmsford and Weston Park in Staffordshire - go on sale from 9am on March 3.



ALEX JAMES, BLUR

These days he lives in a house, a very big house in the country

lex! Where are you? 'I'm at home. Obviously I've got this very big house in the country which is in some ways embarrassing, but it's very hard to know how to grow old gracefully as a bona fide gentleman of rock. I've sold the aeroplanes - they were a bit shameful."

To whom does someone like Alex James sell an aeroplane?

"I so d them to Dave [Rowntree] - he fucking heat me down! He's a tough old bastard, Dave. I flew them down to Marrakech for recording there, and that was about it really."

You've invented a new pop group called Wigwam with Betty Boo. Tell NME readers all about it.

"We're rocking! Betty's having lunch with my mum and dad at the moment. We've been doing some amazing work today it's been a nine out of 10 kind of a day. I know I'm not very newsworthy these days - I'm married now with children so I have to make sure the records are brilliant. There's no point anymore in making something that isn't completely fucking brilliant."

Happily, however, you're in the news section of NME. So you are newsworthy, to an extent.

'That's great. I'd given up hope of ever being in NME again. I must say I'm verv pleased. We all still read it - Damon gets very upset when the NME's horrible about him! (Guffaws) It's the one thing that still gets to him. The writers know which guns to use. Anyway I'm blowing hot air up your arse but cheers anyway. Thank you. This record could have been the stupidest record anyone had ever heard.

It almost is.

'That's what we set out to do - to be on the edge of acceptability. It's about 90 per cent sugar and 10 per cent cheese. You see, who would have thought that people would be listening to Chic, instead of Genesis? This means that hopefully in 20 years people will still be talking about Wigwam, because it is a completely stupid load of nonsense, but cool as well. It's like Crazy Frog but cool. We don't want to be accused of jumping on the Frog bandwagon."

So is that it for Fat Les? People are begging for a new single.

"Blur's new sound is pretty tough. Foo Fighters are going to wet their pants"

I was sort of joking.

"Ahahaha... Well, quite. I've got a message on my answerphone from Keith [Allen] - he wants to change the verse lyrics to something German. He did sing me something down the phone, which is probably unprintable. I think that's... well, Fat Les: it was great. Better off remembered than revived.

Won't you get the twinge when the World Cup kicks off?

"Well, that's the test. I must say I have been having slight twinges. Ian McCulloch's got a good idea for one - you know the Bryan Ferry song 'Let's Stick Together'? Well, lan's idea is to sing along to the chorus: "C'mon, c'mon, vou fuckin' England",

be amazing. That's a cool song, you see. But it's walking on thin ice doing a football record, isn't it? Maybe it's best just to leave it - we pulled it off once. It's like doing a magic trick twice."

Will you have a new look for Wigwam, or will it be fag-out-of-mouth-innonchalant-fashion a-go-go?

"I just called Vivienne Westwood's office and said. 'Send me a fucking skirt, darling - this one's going large!' (Long pause) I've got a fag on now. It still works, doesn't it?"

Are Wigwam better than Gorillaz?

"Well, let me ask you this: who would you have sat next to at school - Betty Boo or Damon Albarn? But I fucking like Gorillaz. I mean obviously Damon's a cunt - don't write that - but they're great."

You sound like you're saying that through gritted teeth.

"We'd definitely beat them at football. The thing is, if Gorillaz were an undeserved success, that would be one thing. But it's great! He's worked so fucking hard on it! I mean he's a genius. He's confronted all his weaknesses and galvanised himself. And nothing helps you to be successful like being a bit successful. We did a few

days in the studio - a Blur session - before He's on fire! It gives you a certainty of touch when you get the feedback that you're right. And I'd like Graham to do well, too. I mean part of me wants Graham to be a fucking disaster so that he'll come back, but I think it's good for all of us."

On the basis of those sessions, will there be an amazing new direction for Blur?

"It's pretty fucking tough-sounding. Foo Fighters are going to wet their pants when they hear it."

Are you good at tennis?



Armed with beer-soaked tales from Sheffield, it's no surprise Alex Turner can't stop raving about them...

hen Arctic Monkeys were asked to reveal their favourite llew band for NME's

Recommender page last week, all manner of to-ing and fro-ing ensued as to who to choose. Convincing cases came forward for fellow spike-punk Sheffieldites Milburn and Harrisons, while even Liverpool indie hopefuls The Little Flames seemed like they were going to get a look-in at one point. Eventually though, it was three speed-punk nutjobs called Bromheads Jacket who won the day. "They're three kids from Sheffield. The singer's very good at writing about what he's seeing. And they're just right funky," Alex concluded.

The Bromheads' fan worship doesn't stop with Arctic Monkeys, either. New Yorkshire stalwart Jon 'The Reverend' McClure recently invited singer Tim Hampton to guest on his all-star debut album (his ex-bandmate Alex Turner also makes an appearance). Meanwhile, infamous Sheffield scenester Mark 'The Sheriff' Bull - the man landed with a £900 bill when everyone downloaded the Monkeys' demos from his site last year - has risked further financial ruin by hosting 10 free-to-

download tracks. So what exactly is it about this lot that sets them above the current crop?

"Maybe it's 'cos I'll tell you about something in a song like I would over a pint in the pub," muses singer Tim Hampton. "Like one day I was getting some serious road rage on the way to McDonalds, which inspired 'Trip To The Golden Arches'. 'Celebrityism' [sample lyric: 'Look 10 years vounger just like Kim Cattrall/A very strict



diet of lettuce and Canderel/Have Brad and Jen finally split?/Get a beach body just like Brit'], came from flicking through Heat and writing a line per page."

Or maybe it's that, amid a deluge of post-Arctic Sheffield gunslingers with their second-hand sports shirts and guitar riffs. Bromheads Jacket - Tim plus bassist Jono West and drummer Dan Potter - are the scene's anomalies. Not only do they sound nothing like the rest of them (imagine The Clash joyriding with Buzzcocks), but they're not actually even from Yorkshire (rather, Yateley, St Albans and St Helens, since you ask), having all met when they moved north to study at Sheffield University.

"We like being the outsiders." Tim admits. "And I truly believe that even if we were living somewhere else, y know. somewhere like Bognor Regis, we'd still be getting noticed."

Things haven't always been so promising. though - until a year ago they were still making grunge metal under the name Fixated ("It was more like muscle-rock actually," admits Tim sheepishly). Thankfully, about a year ago they changed their name to a reference to Michael Came's character in cult flick Zulu (Jono: "He's so proud to be British he refuses to take his jacket off. Not that we're xenophobic, we just thought that sort of commitment to the cause was cool,"), their riffs got faster and punchier, and Tim switched from a rawk roar to spitting

a unique style of speed-rap that falls somewhere between The Streets' Mike Skinner, Supergrass' Gaz Coombes and Channel 4's Peep Show. With a recently inked single-by-single deal with cool new London Imprint Marquis Cha Cha, Bromheads Jacket are busy loosing their tales of dodgy car washes ('Pinch of Psalt'), smalltown meatheads ('Lesley Parlafitt') and Surrey girls "off to get their wotsits waxed" ('Woolley Bridge') into the mainstream. First up was January's 'What Ifs And Maybes' – a shoutalong instant classic that saw Tim cram his entire life into one-and-a-half glorious minutes and still find time to wonder where be'd be if he was "a lot better looking" and had headed to London to be a "DJ superstar".

Where would he be? Well, not at the forefront of the most exciting music scene on the planet, that's for sure. **Rick Martin**

Has this most celebrated of abstainers *really* got his hands on some mammary glands? Or is Morrissey just toying with us?

ADIES AND
GENTLEMEN..."
a Brylcreeme'd
presenter, reeking
of some longforgotten
Eurovision, barks
into camera, only in Italian.
"It's my pleasure to present to
you... MORRISSEY!"

The grainy lens pans to a Des O'Connor-ish stage set. Morrissey fingers his acrylic, broad-winged shirt collar while a bumbling, Alan Bennett like technician in patched tweed and NHS glasses fumbles with a camera last used to film Coronation Street in 1968. Outside in the balmy Roman suburbs one assumes it's still January 2006, but inside Opus Studios we've stepped through the screen into some lost Channel 9 variety show from 1971.

Besides pandering to Moz's recent passion for revisiting the tacky television of his youth - he's also playing three Sunday nights at the London Palladium - we're here to film videos for two of Ringleader Of The Tormentor's first three singles, intended to mimic the two songs that bands would play on '70s chat shows. Right now we have green felt and 'You Have Killed Me' – a classic Mozpop mic-lead whipper in the vein of 'Alma Matters' which leads off with the line "Pasolini is me/ Accatone you'll be", referencing controversial Italian director Pier Paolo Pasolini and his debut 1961 film about a Roman pimp.

So Morrissey, what exactly was it that first attracted you to antiestablishment-homosexual-withwork-including-movies-in-whichpigs-eat-people Pasolini?

pigs-eat-people Pasolini?
"I understand him and I appreciate his art," Moz winces, "but we weren't scrubbed off together in the same bathtub. And believe me, that's nothing. You know absolutely nothing about Italian life, that's de rigeur! If you've seen any of the films, they're stunningly beautiful. They're not oozing all the things you've just listed – if you scrape away at any body they can seem quite sordid or subversive because we're all, privately, a bit sordid."

He was an artist who had to shock in order to push art forward, facing vilification and prosecution because

of his work – is that a way you relate to him?

"I think all people who make a difference have to push and exaggerate," Moz considers, "and have to almost say too much in order to get a certain degree of attention."

Is that something you've done He raspherries. "Oh, ppfftt. Hither and tither."

LOUDER THAN BOMBS

Certainly the opening track of 'Ringleader...' will raise a few eyebrows at M15. A more extreme sister-piece to 'You Are The Quarry's 'America Is Not The World', 'I Will See You In Far Off Places' opens with an imposing Arabian pipe refrain and what could

be the sound of Scuds striking mosques, going on to ally with the Iraqis in lines such as "If your God bestows protection upon you And if the USA doesn't bomb you'l believe I will see you somewhere safe".

Was that intentional?

A nod. "Absolutely, yes. I do feel very sad for the people of Iraq having been invaded by Bush and Blair — so many people have unnecessurily lost their lives and Bush and Blair don't care. But within the song I feel there's a certain spiritual sensation whereby, although we know that life will end we all have a feeling that we will meet again. Now why should we

have that feeling? If we realise that everything is temporary, why do we all have this innate feling that we will be together, in some place?"

The song seems to be a message to the Iraqi dead, that you will see

them in this far off place.

"I hope so and I understand that that's what they believe. The country's a mess and all we see in response to that is Blair's Cheshire Cat grin all over the place. 'Victory!' Great, all these dead Iraqi children and persecuted people, and every day in Iraq there are 40, 50, 60 dead in car bombs, et cetera. Yet in Los Angeles they don't even bother to mention it. They're absolutely preoccupied with whether Brad and Jen will get back together."

You predicted attacks in the UK. How did it feel to be proved right?

"My view was how would anyone he remotely surprised? It's an obvious retaliation against Blair's intentions. And you can't refer to these things as being terrorist attacks and yet assume that the actions of Blair and Bush are not terrorism. They're worse than terrorism. They're the actions of egotistical monsters. Bush views Iraq and thinks, 'Well, we will control this country eventually anyway so it doesn't matter how many innocent people we kill."

WILL (POSSIBLY) NEVER MARRY

Which brings us to the prickly subject of 'Dear God Please Help Me', Morrissey's most blatant reference to sex on record "Now I'm spreading your legs With mine inheliceen") and including the line "Then he motions to mei With his hand on my knee 'Dear God, did this hind of thing happen to you?" — the root of the renewed speculation on his sexuality which has made recent interviews difficult for him Hmm, now how to tackle this...

How's the whole 'celibacy' thing working out for you these days, Mozzer?

"Well I'm not celibate. I only used the word 'celibate' in August 1984 and it's haunted me like a soothsayer walking behind me everywhere I go. I'm not celibate and I haven't been for a very long time, but before you ask me any questions even my GP wouldn't ask, I'm not answering them."

It does sound like you've realised shagging's brilliant.
"Yes, well, I'm 87. If that is the realisation then surely it's about time, and just in the nick of time!"

The character in the song appears to be undergoing a personal battle between homosexuality and religion. "No, I don't think homosexuality is mentioned in the song."

Well, there are blatant sexual references and the only gender mentioned is in the line "His hand on my knee", so the inference can be taken. "Well, there are 'he's all over the place. It's a matter of having interest from someone who is a 'he', which one can't help and one can't orchestrate, and so turning to God and saying, 'Did this happen to you?' We don't really know much about His (point, upwards) personal relationships but he must have had a few. Somebody must have put their hand on his knee."

How do you feel when people constantly question your sexuality?

"Sometimes it's interesting, but it's not interesting when people don't question it and just assume, because it seems as if they know more than I do – then it's quite boring. We all have sexuality and why is mine so unique? So I very childishly feel inclined to say nothing at all and often wonder if I did say to people that I am very close to somebody who is female, what would the reaction be?"

Probably utter shock.
"Well, there you go. So it's best
I say absolutely nothing."

How do you feel when gay groups get angry that you're not saying anything as if it's almost your duty to define your preferences? "(Splutters cocktail) My duty to do


"(Splutters cockloit) My duty to do what? To speak out at what? From where? To whom?"

There are people who believe it'd be beneficial if you were to say you were gay.

"How would that help anybody? I do often find that people who listen and who are homo, or however you'd like to say it, want to believe in that aspect of the songs and people who listen and who are hetero – it's cringeworthy using both terms but how else can I say it? – they want to believe in that aspect of the songs. It's all down to the ear of the beholder. I'm not going to interfere."

What did you think of Elton's marriage?

"I was a bit shocked by the menu, which wasn't remotely animal friendly. Paté de fois gras, which is horrific and lamb! Would you serve curried child at your wedding? Lambs are simply children. But that aside I think it's a good thing and I think it's historic and it proves 100 points."



HOLD ON TO YOUR FRIENDS

A shuffle, an inward shrink, an eye to the door. Morrissey swerves the conversation on to a message he recorded on a Dictaphone for *NME*'s ill girlfriend three years ago and hands down Moz judgement on Arctic Monkeys ("Some Clearasil would be nice"); still chatty, cordial and comfortable, but happier to wind up our allotted hour talking about anything but himself. But before we go, and with *NME* Moz batchets firmly buried, it's perhaps time to grasp the thorny root of grievance. So, Finsbury Park – do you think

So, Finsbury Park – do you think an error of judgement was made?
A crumble of the brow. "By NME?"
By both sides.

"No, I don't."

Do you not think that performance,

in front of a Morrissey crowd who understand that 'National Front Disco' isn't a racist song, would have been taken in the manner it was intended, but by performing it to the average Madness audience member who was simply seeing a man waving a Union Jack and singing "England for the English", you were open to gross misinterpretation?

"No. because the audience didn't review the night, NME did, and one would like to assume NME knew the song. I don't get out of bed for the average Madness audience member. I'm not the kind of person who throws something out to the lowest common denominator—I like to assume that somewhere along the line everyone has a basic gist of intelligence."

And there we leave Il Mozalini,

perched on his Roman parapet; fitter, happier, less reclusive. Assured that the glories and tragedies of life are still close bedfellows, at peace with his wandering soul and proud that 'Quarry...' is no sharp up-peak in a dying career, but that stage two of Moz solo is gloriously, unstoppably underway and may well remain spectacular to the grave. Even if, according to 'Ringleader...', that will probably be about April.

But what of the voices, Moz? The head voices that told you to move to Rome? Are they telling you anything now?

Morrissey consults for a second.
"No, no communication."
He grins broadly. "There
must be a fault on the line."


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

t the global crossroads of London's Oxford Circus, techno junkies lurk on every corner. PlayStation fanatics push past teenage text addicts and MP3 zombies scrolling through an 8,000 song script.

"iPods and cell phones are all part of the same communication revolution," drawls Johnny Walker, singer with garageblues rockers Soledad Brothers. in a bar five minutes from thi mael trom of modernity. 'The trouble is that they build a barrier between you and your surroundings and how can that be a good thing?"

"Someone wise once said, the internet is a great source of information, but it's a greater source of information overload," adds multi-instrumentalist Oliver Henry.

"You can have the two," mediates drummer Ben Swank, "but if I've got the choice of hearing learly 19th century bluesman! Big Bill Broonzy on an iPod or on a 78", I'd play the 78". It just sounds better."

The other Soldedads nod sagely.

Four years ago the 'Dads were an integral part of President Jack White's landslide rock'n'roll election win, which saw back-to-basics authenticity re-established. Now, with twitch-rock flirting ever more closely with the charms of the sampler, they provide a parable of the fickle nature of modern pop life.

> Kaise Chiefs wrote those songs because he wanted to have hits," sighs Ben Swank. "He actually said that! I get really grumpy about it."

"Musically we're aware that we're out of step with what's going on now," adds Johnny. "But we're not about to change."

To play the blues properly you need to have suffered, to have experienced heartbreak which enables you to reach beyond the gizmos of the 21st century to a resounding truth. Such is the case with the Soledads' new LP 'The Hardest Walk': basically an account of the break-up of Johnny's long-term relationship against a feral backing. As sad as Spiritualized ('Dark Horses') and as bitter as the Stones ('Downtown Paranoia Blues'), it is their masterpiece and will do more for rock than a sniper trained

on James Blunt.
"The record is about being stuck in the ninth circle of

hell," continues Johnny.
"I'd been away supporting
M. 5, and when I got back,
all my bags had been packed
for me. I just poured out all
those feelings of hurt and
betrayal into the music."

"When he first played us the songs we were like, 'Do you really want to say this?'" adds Ben. "But all the songs about his relationship ended up being on the record."

"We played 14 hours a day for 28 days and every single note on slide guitar, sitar, theremin, the lot is played by us," adds Johnny.

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53 Years of NIME Awards Anarchy



a potted history of the greatest pop show on earth

Il hail Arctic Monkeys. the latest in an illustrious line of NME Awards winners at the world's longest-running music awards ceremony.

Established way back in 1953, the first ever NME Poll Winners Concert was held at the Royal Albert Hall in London when 7.500 readers assembled to witness the cream of Britain's jazzers strut their stuff. The Beatniks ruled until 1958, when a new phenomenon called rock'n'roll hit our shores, "There were times when the singing was drowned out by continual screaming and shouting from the fans," grumbled one NME reviewer, as the kids went crazy for the new breed of writhing rock stars, represented by the wildest of wild men, er, Cliff Richard.

Cliff was still headlining in '63 when this new beat group called The Beatles appeared way down the bill, performing their current hits 'Please Please Me' and

'From Me To You'. Our reviewer was impressed enough to comment that they "look like being poll residents for many vears to come"

He wasn't far wrong. They were back headlining in '64, presiding over a bill that included new beat revolutionaries The Hollies and this scruffy new R&B rabble called The Rolling Stones performing 'Not Fade Away' (although our reviewer sadly "couldn't hear it through the screams").

The year 1966 went down in rock legend as the time psychedelic blues maestros The Yardbirds joined mod heroes The Small Faces, kings of auto-destruction The Who, and white soul queen Dusty Springfield in supporting the Stones and The Beatles their last ever public show in the UK.

In 1968 the Stones were back for the last time, appearing unannounced to debut

Jones was there onstage, bombed out. It was the last show he ever played with the band before being sacked and then drowning in his swimming pool. The end of the '60s also brought with it heavy rock supergroup Cream debuting, Eric Clapton wearing "a white embroidered dangling cape that looked like my Aunt Jemima's Christening dress" and The Beach Boys, without the freaked out Brian Wilson, doing 'God Only Knows' and 'Good Vibrations'.

The parties were pulled in the '70s when most of the big names were too hung up on ego battles over who should headline. The poll continued though, readers voting for glam heroes T.Rex and David Bowie, rock monsters Led Zeppelin and Deep Purple and prog dinosaurs Emerson Lake & Palmer and Yes until the Sex Pistols, voted sixth best newcomer in 1977, heralded the onslaught of punk. 1979 belonged to

The Clash, '80-'83 was dominated by The Jam and then The Smiths took over, topping the poll until The Stone Roses and Happy Mondays reigned supreme into the '90s.

NME reintroduced the awards show in 1994 on the back of heavy criticism that the Brit Awards were not truly reflecting breaking British talent. Christened The Brats, we attracted the likes of Radiohead. Suede, Pulp and a tearful John Peel (voted Godlike Genius). In a sign of things to come, Blur beat Oasis four awards to three; a defeat that Noel took graciously enough but Liam, at his belligerent best, refused to be snapped for the cover with Damon. "I'll tell ya. To your face. Your band's full of shit... I m gonna have the arse and balls to say so." he informed the Blur singer. Thus the great Britpop war - which climaxed when both bands decided to release singles. on the same day the next year - had begun.

In 1997 it was Noel's turn to shock the nation by declaring that doing drugs was just like having a cup of tea. Other winners as the century came to an end were Manic Street Preachers and The Verve.

Although there were no performances at these ceremonies, separate NME tours of breaking ta ent stampeded around the country, showcasing the fledgling talents of Coldplay, Supergrass and - deep

apologies go out here - Stereophonics. Sir Paul McCartney returned to the Awards in 2000, collecting on behalf of The Beatles who were voted The Greatest Band Ever and he turned up again in 2005 alongside Michael Eavis to pick up Best Event for his performance at Glastonbury, U2, The Strokes, Kylie and The Clash were all honoured in the new millennium, by which time live music was back on the agenda.



Mystery Jets Making Dens

irst, the blurb; if Mystery Jets didn't exist, there wouldn't be psychotropic substances strong enough for anyone to invent them. Hailing from Eel Pie Island, a ghostly landmass that time

forgot and a former haunt to names as illustrious and longdead as Henry VIII and Charles Dickens is off-kilter enough, but that's not nearly the half of it. Not when you take into consideration the fact that their cards have been marked by the long arm of the Eel Pie law for continually pissing off the island's 120 inhabitants with

their now-legendary riotous gatherings at the boathouse where they rehearse. Or, for that matter, that they look like a rag-tag band of villamous tinkers from an old episode of Scooby Doo. think nothing of bursting into perfectly-harmonised four-part Gregorian chants and were weaned from an early age on the belief that all records made after 1975 are inherently evil. More intriguing still, in an age where describing a band as 'prog-rock' is regarded as an insult on a par with calling their mothers cock-munching concubines of the behooved one himself. Mystery Jets actually revel in the improbable time-changes and illimitable guitar solos of

terminally uncool bands like King Crimson and Yes, it's also probably worth mentioning at this point, in the extremely unlikely event that you're completely unaware of it, that their frontman's 55-year-old father is also the rhy hm guitarist.

All of which should add up to Mystery Jets being the least-likely heirs to the non-existent crown of 'The Future Of British Music' we've seen in many a long year. Except somehow, it all works. Right down to the Gregorian. chanting. This is probably because there's nothing enforced about Mystery Jets' oddness; they're quite simply just that way inclined. And when all panderings to convention go out the window, imagination runs rint to wonderful effect

They acknowledge this themselves on the album's first line: "You can do anything you want/As long as it makes sense', sings Blaine Harrison self-mockingly, a deft nod to the

fact that writing a whims cal tale about cats

Similarly, they venture into the indie discofriendly realms of space-rock with first single 'Zoo Time', doffing their crash helmets on the way to Can. Einstürzende Neubauten and Pink Floyd's 'Astronomy Domine', before weirding us out with the eerily haunting hospital tales of 'Little Bag Of Hair', possibly inspired by Blaine's suffering of spina bifida (a spinal defect that means he has to use crutches to get around), possibly not. "Lused to have a little bag of hair and wish it was my head", he coos over a slow-burning waltz. "My dad would bring me Airfix fighters, the glue would get all over them/At my fingertips. enough morphine to put me in a death".

It's 'Alas Agnes' that's the clincher, though. Sounding a bit like Shane MacGowan picking the crumbs out of Merlin's beard on some seriously good speed (if you will), it gallops along at a frantic pace, each member seemingly more eager than the last to get

down to some Gregorian chant action. Prog-rock? Nothing on 'Tales From Topographic Oceans' sounded this urgent.

If there's a lesson to be learned from 'Making Dens', it's that there's nothing to be feared from pushing the pop envelope that little bit further. If you expected the sands of time to shift between

guitar solos, you'll be pleasantly surprised: if you expected a ramshackle, half-baked melting pot that was weird for weird's sake. you'd be flat-out wrong. Indeed, if there's a recurring niggle with this album, it's that it raises more questions than it answers: where in the name of Great Odin's raven are Mystery Jets going to go from here?



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



t some point in the last 40-odd

years, 'mod' became a dirty word. Blame Paul Weller, blame Oasis, blame bleedin' Ben Sherman, but somewhere along the line mods (originally nancy boys into cool clothes and ac Tuttin Tedge music) became synonymous with either a) Alpha male football hooligans in expensive shoes or b) snobby stuck in-'65 revivalists to whom the term 'modernist' could not be any less appropriate. And so the late Steve Marriott, placed on a pedestal by these people as the ultimate mod, gets tarred by not one but two terrible brushes. Treat both of these groups of numbskulls with the contempt they deserve - that's fine. But don't call them mods. And don't let them cause you to overlook Steve Marriott.

As singer/guitarist with the Small Faces, this 5ft 4in former child actor (the opener here is an amusing version of 'Consider Yourself' from Oliver!) may have started off doing what every other Rolling Stonesinspired teenager was doing at the time and appropriating American R&B records ('Whatcha Gonna Do 'Bout It'), but by the time the group peaked Marriott was, on the likes of 'Afterglow (Of Your Love)' and 'Tin Soldier', actually equalling the vocals of Otis Redding, Muddy Waters and all the other legends that inspired him. His Jaggerdwarfing soulful rasp on its own would be enough to command a place in musical history, but couple it with the songwriting prowess evident here even on obscurities such as 'Can't Dance With You' and you have, genuinely, far. far more than a caricature Cockernee modicon.



In another case of history being rewritten. Steve Marriott's second band are now 'remembered' by many to be a bloated pub-rock band. Also nonsense: certainly Humble Pie were not as successful or accessible as the Small Faces, but there are, on the second disc here, many moments of brilliance, if not mod' brilliance. But then wanting to be a mod is not the reason to buy this anthology. If that's what you want to be, fuck the Small Faces Convention, swap those silly pointy shoes for a pair of K-Swiss and go to a grime night. You'll find sharply dressed. frustrated and - yep - violent young people forging their own rough n'ready take on the most innovative, unashamedly commercial music

on the planet (the only difference being that the black Americans now making it are Pharrell Williams, Dr Dre and Timbaland rather than Motown, Stax and Chess). They are the mods and their godfather - not sonically and stylistically, but in attitude and spirit - is Steve Marriott. And that. rather than the yawn-a-minute classicists' nonsense, is why you should tune in to this 'Tin Soldier''s frequency. Hamish MacBain

Harry Potter And The Goblet Of Fire won Best Film. Are you proud?

"We're only in the film for about four seconds and we're just standing on the stage shouting, so it's nowt unusual."

Where do you think you'll be in a year?

I'll be here picking up the Best Album award hopefully - I'm just about to start doing a record. It's songs, it's not like 15-minute sonic poems with me talking over the top, it's songs."

Who would you give an award to?

"I know Antony [Hegarty, from Antony And The Johnsons] probably wouldn't want another award but I think he should probably get one. He's already got a few awards, so he's probably not so bothered.'

If you could redesign the NME Award, what would it look like?

"A peace sign would be nice, or even a thumbs up. If it was a peace sign, then for people who want it to be 'Fuck off', you could turn it around and have the good old fashioned English 'Fuck off'. It's a choice.'

So, finally, how would you sum up what's happening in Yorkshire?

Well, I've personally always known that Sheffield was the centre of the universe, but it's just taken everyone else all this time to catch up."



eing raw and raucous showcases of new talent. the ShockWaves NME Award Shows are not for the faint of heart. Tonight is no exception, with the promise of four of the most aggressively-fuzzy and stylish rock'n'roll bands around peddling their wares.

Sheffield's **The Long Blondes** are first up, with their seductive blend of punk-rock pop and Marlene Dietrichmeets-rockabilly chic. Unlike fellow New Yorkshire-ites Arctic Monkeys, the Blondes are a tad gentler on the optical nerves – singer Kate Jackson being this season's latest fashion icon. As sultry frontwomen go, she has the arrogant strut of Chrissie Hynde and the acidic tongue of a Dickens heroine: 'Different Strategies' has the ability to entice vulnerable indie boys

Not to be outdone in the acrimony stakes, Orange County's **Giant Drag** pull no punches either. "This is a song about

only to spit them out with utter venom.

my ex-boyfriend from eight years ago. He stole this song from me and then got really famous," jokes Annie Hardy before ripping into Chris Isaak's 'Wicked Game' with such a grandiose and expansive sound that it beggars belief. But it's not all doom and cover versions. The unique 'You Fuck Like

My Dac ¹b. Ings a smirk to many a face, while an element of utter euphoria grips tonight's crowd during 'Kevin Is Gay', a song laced with grungey guitar riffs and aching Tanya Donelly-esque vocals.

Cardiff's **The Automatic** up the ante even further and provide an aural kick in the teeth. From the start it's clear that synth-wielder Alex Pennie is having the time of his life as he gyrates his hips and demonstrates how one ought to practice drum gymnastics. Recent single 'Recover surprisingly receives the biggest roar of approval and inspires the first of many crowd-surfing casualties.

Not long after their departure, a buzz of hushed excitement washes over the Astoria, as the crest of Jarman is unveiled in hetween an array of glitterballs, signalling the arrival of Wakefield's most auspicious brothers. They may have gained the Peel seal of approval back in the day, but **The Cribs** have been heinously underrated since the release of their debut. Tonight, the trio set right such wrongs by storming through a string of old and new songs such as 'Mirror Kissers', 'You & I' and recent hit 'Hey Scenesters!', fusing Dinosaur Jr riffs with raucous pop sensibilities.

As Gary and Ryan both yelp, "I know that will change/When it's cool to be an outsider" on "I'm Alright Me', it appears as if The C bs luck is looking up – the Astoria has become a frenzied mass of over-exuberant youths. The set culminates with Ryan ripping off his T-shirt and raging into the crowd like a bull seeing red, only to be thrown back onstage by fans itching for an encore that is sadly denied them. It's probably for the best – tonight we ve had all the excitement our faint hearts can take. **Ash Dosanilh**

here may have been a hugely varied array of bands on display at the ShockWaves NME Awards Shows these past two weeks but, really, there's little doubt that tonight is the king of all diverse bills. Headlined by Guy Garvey and his self-proclaimed "daddies of modern indie music" (@ last week's NME), it boasts an assorted support bill of demented disco and dark rock that's kicked off in fine style by young upstarts Larrikin Love. Grinning and fiddling their way through 'Happy As Annie', they're like a Coral you can dance

stupidly to, providing a country/ska/skiffle/ rock mesh-up that brilliantly succeeds in being as flummoxing as it is fun.

:Forward, Russia! look ready to eclipse the achievements of their Yorkshire rivals over the next 12 months. They've streamlined their disco-noise and sound gargantuan, lending the likes of last single Twelve an anthemic quality that wasn't present before. It's the first time they've played in front of this many people for a while - and it suits them.

Having played a headline show at this venue all by themselves not so long ago. The Duke Spirit look aloof and at ease with a crowd of this size. They punctuate a powerful set of highlights from the now-nearly-a-year-old 'Cuts Across The Land' album with four new songs, of which 'Neptune' is the pick. Last year they were mere contenders; now they're confirmed highlights of any bill they may find themselves on.

But of course, the night really belongs to one band, and **Elbow's** set is the embarrassment of riches you'd expect. 'Station Approach', a delicate 'Fugitive Motel', 'Mexican Standoff' and even

an "experimental" new song are all greeted by this scarily devoted crowd with an attentive silence, broken only by Guy Garvey's wisecracks. "We respect the French... and therefore the encore," he reassures them before an epic, set-closing version of 'Newborn'. Returning to the stage, he's nearly conned into resurrecting the band's Radio 1 Live Lounge version of Destiny's Child's 'Independent Women Part 1' by his disciples' playful jeering, but a sweeping, suitably climatic 'Forget Myself' more than suffices. The young blood did good tonight, but by the end it's pretty clear who the daddies are. Hamish MacBain

nusual openers for tonight's very rock bill, **The Like** appear as cynical as the hardcore Biffy crowd before them. "Thanks for being here, even though it's not for us," they announce, citing "jet ia," as a reason for their insouciance. Still, with some primal rhythms from the drummer (hair in face, arms flailing wildly) and Z's Courtney growl they warm the cockles with 'What I Say And What I Mean' and other lethargic ditties that could soundtrack a million lonely night-time drives

The drumkit quadruples in size, effects pedals multiply round the stage and the energy levels hit the roof as Oceansize step up. Swathes of guitar echoes are propped up by baffling time signatures and Tool-esque stop-start attacks from their octopede sticksman. Last year's 'Heaven Alive' demonstrates a more angsty Oceansize than that of old - perfect for

tonight's crowd. "We've played with other bands and their fans aren't as good as Biffy fans," gushes Mike Vennart. He's not wrong, and this is all about one band tonight.

The Biffy Clyro flag unfurls, the theme tune to Curb Your Enthusiasm plays, and the cult of Clyro prepare for some devout worship. Singer Simon Neil, despite possessing a mean howl, needn't have turned up tonight; the army of supporters fill in wholeheartedly on 'Wave Upon Wave Upon Wave' and we reach near-epiphany on 'Justboy'. Even when venturing into new territory the band still feel the love, as they air 'Semi-Mental' and other new and equally tricky shoutalong anthems from the Grohl school of rock: ie they come from the heart rather than the crotch. As the UK braces itself for a new pandemic of wniny US emo, BC are here to remind us that the British Isles still does this thing hest. Tim Chester



VENUES

 haun: "The small venues are great, but there aren't enough of them. Eamon Doran's and Voodoo's

(Arran Quay) are good for local punk bands. Normally we'll play at the **Temple Bar Music Centre** (Curved Street) or at **Whelan's** (Wexford Street, which the band will virtually raise to the ground when they play later on that night). We like the smaller, 400-capacity venues, but now we're playing to maybe 600 people. The shows are always rammed. Whelan's is probably our favourite, though. It's really small and intimate, it's beautiful, the sound is great and there's always a really good vibe from the crowd."

ublin: city of poets and politicians, populated by numerous Nobel Prize winners, bewhiskered, Joyce-spouting barflies and multiple stag parties. And right now, a thriving nexus for a new breed of Irish rock'n'roll, from Toboggle-eyed punk, to 's funky art rock, to the classicist rock'n'roll frenzy of our guides Humanzi.

Born out of a Red Bull and vodkafuelled fight outside a city centre McDonald's and comprised of frontman Shaun Mulrooney, guitarist Colm Rutledge, bassist Gary Lonergan and drummer Brian Gallagher, they're Dublin's bright new hopes, and ideally placed to show NME the ropes.

"For a long time," muses Shaun,
"what people saw of Dublin music was
the singer/songwriters. But right now
there's an amazing scene full of great
bands who sound nothing like each
other, and it's really refreshing. You've
got Stagger Lee, Twin Cranes, Jape,
Mainline, Zealots... if I've left anyone
out, I apologise. There's a sense among
us all of, 'This is fucking great, we're all
starting to come through."

"Dublin has its downsides like any other city," adds Gary, "and if you're a new band, it's really difficult to get noticed outside of Ireland. But at the end of the day, we wouldn't be the band we are if we hadn't come from working class Dublin. And also, Dublin's the kind of city where you can go out for a night on the town and then not come home for about four days!"

In that case, let the fun begin...



REHEARSAL ROOMS

Shaun: "The Temple Bar Music Centre is where we rehearse mostly, but Dublin Isn't good for rehearsal space. But if you rehearse with shit gear and a shit sound, you'll be a much better band."

Gary: "The Factory (Barrow Street) is probably the best place in Dublin, but it's really hard to get bookings for. David Bowie and U2 and even Britney fucking Spears have all used it, but that's only because there's nowhere else. It's not a place, there's just nowh

Sean: "The best record shop in Dublin is **Citydiscs** (Temple Bar area).

is **Citydiscs** (Temple Bar area). The guys who work there are really friendly, whereas most of the people who work in record shops are snobby arseholes. And you'll find the weirdest music you'll ever hear in there, fucking Norwegian electro from 1983 or something. The guy who runs it looks like Axl Rose, but it's a great little shop. **Road Records** (Fade Street) is fantastic as well."

Gary: "One of the downsides to Dublin is that it's really expensive. A new CD could cost you almost €25. It's even more expensive than London, so you should really try to stay clear of the big chain stores and just buy second-hand from the smaller shops."



BARS

Sean: "Normally all the bands will get together somewhere like **Carnival Bar** (Wexford Street) or **The Dice Bar** (corner of Queen St and Benburb Street) to get pissed. Our mate Derm, it owns those bars, so we'll get to DJ for a bit, get a couple of free drinks and maybe a lock-in till 10am. It's just a really good vibe, everyone just gets together and has a good time. And if you're looking for the perfect pint of Guinness, try **Grogan's Castle Lounge** (South William Street)."

Gary: "Another great place to drink is Eamon Doran's, on Temple Bar. That'd be where the band started off, where we played our early gigs. It doubles as a great little venue, because it's really small and smelly... it's horrible, actually!"

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
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
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
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I WANT TO SOUND LIKE...

PAUL WELLER

We can thightight Paul's career as beautiful as his hair, but we will declare him the greatest thing to come out of Woking since the Quo...

After an early flirtation with a Hofner Violin Bass, Weller switched to a 330 semi-acoustic guitar. For most of his solo career he's used a Liteburst Epiphone Casino, although he'll also use a Gibson SG for whammy attack and a '52 Telecaster reissue. He plays through two early '70s Marshall Bluesbreakers and often uses a Vox Wah-Wah and a Boss BD-2 Blues Driver.



The Jam were sponsored by Shelly's and Joe Strummer immortalised their modness in The Clash's '(White Man) In Hammersmith Palais': "They got Burton suits/Huh, you think it's funny? /Turning rebellion into money".

Paul's 2000 album 'Heliocentric' was named after Heliocentric Studios in Rye, and the backing tracks were recorded on a Helios desk, designed by an Abbey Road engineer in the '70s.

Weller recruited a backing band with Steve Cradock and Damon Minchella of Ocean Colour Scene and they back (without upstaging) Paul. "Because I'm singing the tune my guitar is always backing my voice," Paul once told Guitar. "Steve's lead guitar plays around the tune."


YOU PLAY...

THE CHINIOUT

Weller's keen on open chords, so he'll often use a capo, although you won't need one to try 'The Changingman'. The riff that you first hear is based on a four-chord progression, with plucked arpeggios of C, Bb, A and Ab. As well as dallying the odd drop-D, as in the case of 'Sweet Pea, My Sweet Pea', Weller tries out a Nashville tuning (the three bottom strings tuned an octave higher), influenced by Ronnie Lane. You'll have to use thinner gauged strings for this, to avoid straining the neck as you tauten them.

Look out for a mystery chord Weller's fond of, it's influenced by 1930s and 1940s songs, and is "like an Am with an F# bass note," according to Paul. "It's also in 'Windmills Of Your Mind'."


