

# DIRTY PRETTY THINGS WREAK HAVOC ON FIRST UK TOUR

#### Fans go crazy as Carl Barât and co embark on sell-out jaunt

Il eyes were on **Dirty Pretty Things** this week as the band stepped out on their first ever tour. Until now, **Carl Barât**'s new band have kept a low profile, limiting themselves to secret gigs, shows in Italy and Brazil and the odd internet download. As a result, fans have largely been left in the dark as to what the former Libertine was doing next.

It was no surprise, then, that Dirty Pretty Things' tour was an immediate sell-out or that their first date at Oxford's Zodiac on February 26 was so eagerly anticipated.

With ticketless fans trying unsuccessfully to sneak into the venue, even the band themselves - Barât plus former Libs drummer **Gary Powell**, guitarist **Anthony Rossomando** and ex-Cooper Temple Clause bassist **Didz Hammond** - admitted the night was memorable.

"It was always going to be different for us in some respects because of Carl's history,"

admitted Hammond. "We booked a tour that we hoped we were the equivalent to. So we warmed up in Cork the other night, and with Oxford tonight we seem to be matching our expectations."

The band played a 14-song set including new single 'Bang Bang You're Dead' (released April 24) and 'Dead Wood', which they also played at last week's ShockWaves NME Awards (February 23), plus three Libertines songs – 'Death On The Stairs',

'I Get Along' and 'The Libertines' bonus track 'France'. The audience had clearly done their research, with singalongs breaking out for the better known numbers. Meanwhile, new tracks including 'Playboys', 'You Fucking Love It' and 'The Enemy' provoked a bout of crowd surfing and an attempted stage invasion.

"It's nice to get the new songs across," said Hammond afterwards. "It's not all 'I Get Along' and I think we showed that. All we've asked for is the platform to show people what we are.

"The songs are great and we know that. We wrote them and if we didn't believe in them we wouldn't be playing them - we'd have done a set of old Libertines songs with a few Cooper Temple Clause numbers thrown in, but we've written something we believe in. We have to hone our stagecraft, but it seemed to me people are enraptured by it already, so it can only get better."

The band insisted their decision to play the three Libertines songs was all down to keeping the fans happy.

"People see 'I Get Along' as Carl's





anthem," declared Hammond, "'Death On The Stairs' is a song we all like, and I spoke to [former Libs bassist] John Hassail the other night and he said I was pretty good on it, so I've done my homework.

'But one thing I didn't want to do was step into [Pete] Doherty's shoes. I was conscious of that when I joined the band. The Coopers recently asked me how it was going and wondered if it was a co-lead singer thing. I said, 'I wouldn't want to step into those shoes,' and I don't, but where it's appropriate I'll sing. Everything is really natural. It's not quite, 'If you write it, you sing it,' but everyone is chipping in. It's a real communion of writing and singing."

The results of this collaboration are almost ready, with DPTs' debut album - possibly to be titled 'Britain For Sale', according to the band - due out on May 8. And the group revealed they only finished recording on the morning of the NME Awards.

"We did the last vocal at 8.30 that morning," recalled Hammond. "We're waiting to see if we have any more to do, but I don't think so, we're pretty solid."

He added that with sessions taking place both in Los Angeles with Oasis producer Dave Sardy and in a UK studio, the album possessed very distinct dynamics.

\*Our album is a record of two sides, explained the bassist. "We have faith in it. We wrote it and we believe in each other as good writers and performers. It's varied not in a Cooper Temple Clause way, there's no Aphex Twin musical tracks on it - but it covers a lot of bases. The Libertines spirit is there through the whole thing."

The band are now set to share a tourbus on their first extended launt and insist their new-found camaraderie makes them more than just Carl Barât plus backing band.

"We got together because we were friends," said Hammond. "I've been running into Carl and Gary for many years. I'd never met Anthony before the band, but he's easy. That's part of the formation of the band, we know each other - particularly me and Carl - and me and Anthony get on really well now, we're very fast friends. It gelled very quickly, which is why we had so much faith and why it's come to fruition



# RACONTEURS CONFIRM DEBUT DETAILS

#### Yes, the wait is almost over for the Jack White and Brendan Benson-led project...

ack White and Brendan Benson's new project The Raconteurs have released details of their debut album. Entitled 'Broken Boy Soldiers', the 10track record will be released May 15. The album follows the highly limited-edition release of double-AA single 'Steady, As She Goes'/'Store Bought Bones' last month, copies of which are already being traded online for in excess of £40. Both those songs appear on the album, along with the title mack and 'Call It A Day' and 'Blue Veins' (see panel for full tracklisting), all of which are White and Benson co-creations. Completed by bassist Jack Lawrence and drummer Patrick

**Keeler**, The Raconteurs have announced details of their first UK tour, kicking off at Liverpool Academy on March 20 (see *NME*. *COM/GIGS* for the full tour), but are awaiting the return of Jack White, who is currently finishing off The White Stripes' world tour for 'Get Behind Me Satan' in Japan.

Speaking via his band's official website, White explained: "I'm headed to Japan soon for the last



performances of 'Get Behind Me Satan', looking for a place to store the marimba afterwards. Maybe Meg's basement."

White also used the internet posting to question the influence of critics and respond to British artist and garage rocker **Billy Childish**, who attacked The White Stripes in a recent interview.

"As for Billy Childish,

"After the Stripes' tour I'll need a place to store the marimba" Jack White

Meg and I really feel sorry for you," wrote White in response to Childish's suggestion the duo had a "big problem" wanting to be pop stars. "It must be lonely sitting in all of that garage rock bitterness Billy. You know children, when you take someone else's music and put your own lyrics on top of it, it's still called plagiarism."

# THE RAPTURE LINE UP BIG NAMES FOR RETURN

## The New Yorkers are putting together the ultimate "night-time" record



New York indie-disco pioneers **The Rapture** have recruited a host of influential producers for their second album.

The band, whose 2003 **DFA**-steered album 'Echoes' saw them acclaimed with The Strokes and Yeah Yeah Yeahs, earning them a slot on the NME Awards Tour 2004, expect to release the currently untitled record later this year.

Having spent 2005 writing - save for the odd gig, including a riotous affair at New York rave Crash Mansion - the band have linked up with Bloc Party and Futureheads collaborator **Paul Epworth** and Chemical Brothers producer **Ewan Pearson**. They are also set to head to Los Angeles in April to complete the album with **Danger Mouse** once he finishes work on Damon Albarn's solo album.

"The people we're working with we've known for ages," said Rapture leader **Mattle Safer**.

"In the time we've been away, our friends became the top producers."

Although their initial mentors DFA won't feature, the band have played down talk of a split. "A little bit of shit went down that we both could have handled better, but we're still friends," said Safer. "I'm sure we'll work together again."

As for the songs, Safer added that he expected this to be more upbeat. "it's going to be a fun record, a lot of this is made for the night-time," he said. "We're cutting loose. We're comfortable expressing joy."

The Rapture plan to release a comeback single in August, with the album to follow.

Bobby Gillespie and co ditch the art and go back to basics on new record

rimal Scream have gone back to basics on their eighth studio album. Recalling the Rolling Stonesinfluenced sounds of their mid-'90s efforts, Bobby Gillespie and his band have turned their back on the sonic experimentations of recent albums in favour of a gonzo live approach.

"I think we're one of the best live bands in the world and I wanted to capture that," said Gillespie of the shift in styles. "The last two albums have been all loops and drum machines - for this one we wrote euphoric rock n'roll songs. I wanted to capture that

> euphoria and I think we did it. It was a great time making it, fucking great!"

The raw approach has triggered speculation the band have fallen out with My Bloody Valentine mainman and recent collaborator Kevin Shields - and even Gillespie is currently unsure of the situation.

"Kevin only ever played with us live," he explained. "He mixed a lot of songs but he never played guitar on the albums. Is he still involved? I don't know, he didn't play at the last gig in Glasgow three weeks ago. He never made that gig because he was working on a Sofia Coppola movie."

Instead, on the tracks *NME* has heard, including 'Nitty Gritty', 'Boogie Disease' and forthcoming signal to the control of th forthcoming single 'Country Girl' (due May 22), there is a far more controlled, classic guitar sound to the album. Indeed, the band generally seem more restrained than they were the last time they were in the public eye - at Glastonbury 2005.

There, the band courted controversy during their Sunday night slot. Following Kylie Minogue's withdrawal due to her breast cancer treatment, Gillespie told fans of the singer to "fuck off", before organisers pulled the plug on their chaotic set.

However, the Scream's biggest problem at present is naming the album they recorded at London's Olympic studios last year.

"We're the worst at picking titles," said Gillespie. "I came up with 25 ideas, but nobody else likes them. We've got the artwork and everything but we always have this fucking problem. We'll come up with something, I'm sure it's obvious, but if you've got any ideas let us know."

Guests on the album, due out June 5, include The Kills' Alison Mosshart, Echo & The Bunnymen guitarist Will Sergeant and Nick Cave collaborator Warren Ellis.

However despite the more conservative rock'n roll approach, Primal Scream are not totally controversy free: fans have already started speculating that the title characters in LP track 'Suicide Sally And Johnny Guitar' refer to Kate Moss and Pete Doherty.

"That's a classic rock'n'roll song," said the singer of his self-proclaimed favourite on the album. "The title just came out of my imagination. Are they based on anyone? I don't know, they might be. I might have met them in a previous life (laughs). I don't know, the songs aren't autobiographical."

#### PRIMALS LIVE

Primal Scream have also confirmed a small UK tour ahead of the festivals. They play London Astoria (April 6). Wolverhampton Wulfrun Hall (26), Manchester Ritz (27), Glasgow Queen Margaret Union (28). "It's a good rock'n'roll show," said Gillespie. "It's fucking perfect, the setlist is amazing, there's no messing about."

#### Franz Ferdinand

Double A-side single 'The Fallen'/'L.Wells', will be the third single to be taken from Franz "s current album 'You Could Have It So Much Better', 'L.Wells' was recorded in Melbourne while the band were playing the Big Day Out festival. Released on March 27, the single will feature the B-sides 'Brown Onions' - an instrumental recorded in New York and 'Jeremy Fraser', sung by guitarist Nick McCarthy.

#### Nine Black Alps

The track has already been posted on Green Day fansites for download. Live Freaky Die Freaky features Armstrong as the voice of serial killer Charles Manson.

#### The band plan new songs just three months after debut album

rctic Monkeys are set to release an EP of new material, just months after their debut album. Following in the footsteps of Oasis, Razorlight and The Smiths, the band are set to follow the success of their debut with a brace of new material. The band plan to release 'View From

The Afternoon' as their next single in April, but are hoping to expand the release into a full EP with new material that they've been working on

between tours. Speaking at the ShockWaves

NME Awards, guitarist Jamie Cook revealed the band have already been back to the studio. "We've been there earlier on today. We're doing an EP for the next single, whenever it's going to be. It's going to be new 'uns," he explained.

Although a full EP release is yet to be confirmed, the band are hoping that new material - not contained within the demos that appeared online last year - will see the light of day soon.

"We're going to record the new songs, then we're going to play them live and stick them on a CD," said bassist Andy Nicholson. "It's probably going to be an extended player, I'm not joking, five songs. Hopefully out in April, fingers crossed."








# Regurgitator show that the recording glass box is no smaller verage tourbus



ston on CBB was only the start - now music stars are set to record album in a 'bubble' for new show

orget Preston's Celebrity Big Brother gamble - rock'n'roll reality TV is set to hit the extreme with new series Band In A Bubble.

The show, a kind of rock mixture of Big Brother and Pop Idol, will follow one band's efforts to record an album this autumn - the twist being that they do it in public, in a transparent box, à la David Blaine.

The programme can already boast one success story; Australian band **Regurgitator** became household names in their home nation after spending the whole of September 2004 inside a see-through recording studio in Melbourne's Federation Square while they recorded album 'Mish Mash!'.

According to Regurgitator's lead singer Quan Yeomans, who came-up with the concept, the band are hoping to export the format to the UK, possibly by this September.

"There is something in the works at the moment," said Yeomans.

London's Trafalgar Square is rumoured to be the favoured location for the transparent studio. And, according to a TV source, the British version of the show could star a supergroup of famous musicians.



ack when The Beatles Were making girls wet their knickers, there was a rule on how best to play live: gorge yourself on amphetamines 'til your eyeballs bulged, play for 15 minutes and then bugger off, leaving everyone wanting more. While we can't comment on The Upper Room's methods of self-medication, the Brighton quartet are to be saluted for keeping things old school regarding set-length. They play just a handful of songs, yet by the end, their quintessentially English cinematic rock'n'roll has won them a

room full of converts. Pitched somewhere between epic '80s soundscapes and rittery new-wave pop, songs like debut single 'All Over This Town' and the stunning 'Combination' sound utterly huge. By the time the final notes of 'Black And White' ring out, we're left wondering how long we can bear to wait before our next 15-minute fix.

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## NME spends 48 intimate hours on The Strokes' greatest ever UK tour as the band get stoned, ogle Lindsay Lohan and throw up in the toilets

lbert Hammond Jr
is just another gut

again. He's

anxiously stalking the backstage hallways of the city's 8,000-capacity Point arena, a victim to the mystery gastronomic illness that's decimated the stomachs of The Strokes, their support act Adam Green and the tour's road crew. He's due onstage in a matter of minutes, but it's clear from his gaunt demeanor, bleary eyes and stealthy avoidance of NME's lurking photographer, that playing to a baying crowd of thousands while his innards are doing cartwheels isn't his idea of a great way to spend a Monday night. His bandmates hardly seem any healthier or happier; all four are currently ensconced in their dressing room, moodily sucking on cigarettes and affording only the merest of acknowledgements to everyone around them. The Strokes are in their own very private universe and invites are not forthcoming. In two hours' time, they'll roundly proclaim tonight to be the best show of an 18-date tour of the UK and Ireland, but right now, that scenario looks about as likely as a Babyshambles booking in Norwich. Resigned to the fact that we've joined the party at the tail-end of the tour, when everyone's tired, emotional and their bodily orifices are working

overtime, NME downs our beer and heads out to the front of the crowd, convinced that the Strokesian magic of old that kicked this stormy five-year love affair off in the first place will not be rekindled tonight. How

wrong we are.

"Holy fuckin' mother of
Mondays!" blurts Julian
Casablaneas – tonight
elegantly attired in a
'mugger chie' black
leather jacket and frayed
hoodie – as he ambles on
to the stage and registers
the frenzied welcome
from the crowd.

he first thing you need to know about this First Impressions Of Earth tour is that it's the polar opposite of the

band's last visit in 2003, when they played a handful of below-par shows in cavernous ice hockey arenas. Not that the band descend on to the stage riding a pair of giant fiberglass tits, or that mounted cannons spew forth massive licks of fire every time Nick Valensi takes a solo, but it's

a little more complex than the old five-guys-standingon-a-stage routine. Neon lights oscillate, while a giant inverse pyramid hangs above their heads, projecting psychedelic swirls and flashes of lightning, but all that is incidental to tonight's performance, which is little short of revelatory.

From the opening notes of 'You Only Live Once', you know that all worries of gastronomic nastiness have gone out the window; tonight is pure old school. Albert bobs and sneers simultaneously, 'fro bouncing in the spotlight.

bouncing in the spotlight.
Fabrizio is all flailing limbs and
winning smiles, while Nick twists,
turns, poses and preens. At the far
side of the stage, Nikolai remains as
stoic and solid as ever, and thankfully

rid of the aberration that was the sweathand and sunglasses look that marred their performance at T in The Park 2004. And Julian? Julian's just Julian. He lurches around the stage like he's trying to find his way out of the drunk tank, only now he doesn't mumble – he roars.

By the time we get backstage, we find Albert sitting at the bar, nursing a pint and looking rather pleased with himself, while a steady stream of lans come up to him bearing pens and cameras. Back at the hotel (where the band have jokingly checked in under assumed names such as 'Michael Corleone' 'Chuck Taylor' and, best of all for those of us who remember David Hasselhoff's heyday, 'Michael Knight') we find Julian, Nikolai and Adam Green devouring a pepperoni pizza and smuttily discussing the finer points of Lindsay 'Freckletits' Lohan, as they ogle a magazine cover that she's on (Green will later discreetly slip said magazine into his bag and disappear off into the night). You get the feeling that everyone's thankful to have Green and his nefarious anecdotes around; he joined the tour at the halfway point when, as The Strokes' tour manager Richard puts it the next morning, "Everyone was getting sick of the sight of each other, then Adam came in and revitalised us. He's always on form."

evitalised' is the buzzword for the next day in Belfast; with the Dublin gutrot now a distant memory, by the time the band arrive at the hotel late in the afternoon, they're surprisingly relaxed and chatty, despite the fact that in-between ordering dinner and its eventual arrival (a pasta and chorizo dish that Nick Valensi

and quietly pushes to one side) they have a rapid-fire 15 minutes in which they somehow manage to conduct two radio phoners and an NME cover shoot. Over what few mouthfuls of food he has, Valensi enthuses about the previous night in Dublin and the tour in general, which winds down tonight.

"The whole thing has just been spectacular," he gushes. "Last night was great – the best crowd of the tour. I was feeling sorta sick yesterday – everybody was sick – and I didn't have high hopes for the show, but once we did one or two songs, it was just easy. My job was so fucking easy last night. We've had a lot of days off on this tour, so we've kinda taken it easy. This was our first jump back into touring, so we felt the initial lunge should be a little more laid-back.

"It's been really different from what it used to be," concurs Fab, who's currently sketching a biro portrait of NME, similarly disappointed with his pasta. "It used to be a painful thing. It was hard for us to tour and leave home, so we didn't do so many shows in the UK last time, and we really felt the absence. It's one of the more fun places to come and tour.'

Do the band consider these gigs atonement for the less-thansensational shows of the 'Room On Fire' tour, where they bore the distinct look of men who would rather be anywhere else?

Nick takes a drag on his cigarette and considers the question. "We were all just kind of ... you get to a point sometimes where you're on tour and you've done so much and you've

so much more, and you've got yourself in over your head. We'd turn up and do the shows, and the shows would be OK, but no-one really wanted to be there. We had to tone it down a bit. We had a really long break, between the 'Room On Fire' thing, and this album coming out, it was a really long time. But personally, now I'm feeling really energized and up for it. We're even gonna

come back here for more shows before

we start recording the next album."
"'Atonement' is the right word,"
considers Nikolai. "It's not that with
the last tour we didn't give a fuck, it's just that we were exhausted. We were at the end of our line. Norway would phone us up and say, 'Hey, do you guys want to come play over here?"

and we'd agree to that, then get the same call from Australia and have to fit that show in as well. If we'd kept it up at that rate, the third album wouldn't have been made."

That it was made and that it was so bloody good – is possibly down to The Strokes finally emerging from the troubled waters of rock adolescence. The bratty party animals of

boyfriends jealous and journalists salivate, have matured; they're all involved in long-term relationships (although NME's mate is convinced that Amanda De Cadenet has been making the eyes at us all night), they've cut back on the booze, and most crucially, no longer have to deal with the pressure of being the future of rock'n'roll. the cure for cancer, and the solution to Third-World debt

rolled into one immaculatelycoiffeured package. It's a change for the better, as Valensi testifies.

"I've been antagonized in London several times," says Nick. "People get very drunk in the UK, and they get violent, but nothing like that has happened on this tour. Those situations are a two-way street: people

don't pick on you for no good reason. I was probably being obnoxious to them. I'm less obnoxious now, so it happens less.

"You know what's funny?" interjects Fab. "Anyone who said that we're the next big thing - we proved them wrong, dude! None of us has a mansion in Key West. Nick still doesn't have his cattle ranch out west. Old ladies don't know our names!"

Casablancas' name, but such is the extent of The Strokes' influence, you can bet anyone who's started a band in the last five years will be pretty familiar with it. He does interviews on his own, not because he's too special to eat chorizo with the rest of them, it's just become a habit. He can go from charming and witty to sullen and obtuse at the turn of a phrase, although you sense he's not trying to be difficult – he just is, quite literally, hard to explain. He's ambivalent about more or less everything, except music – when NME tells him that we used to listen to 'Is This It' five times a day, every day, for an entire year, he seems genuinely chuffed that his songs had the same effect on someone that Nirvana's had on him. But asked why he's recently given up alcohol, he's much more nonchalant. "I dunno," he drawls, "I guess some

people care about that stuff, but I don't. I've just been getting stoned more. Alcohol didn't get in the way of shows, it just got in the way of songwriting and in the way of being a normal person, you know? You don't want to be thinking crazy shit

24 hours a day."

Now rid of the distractions that a bottomless well of free booze can bring (seriously, they've got so much vintage champagne, their tour manager has to give it away), Casablancas is already planning the band's fourth album, which UK audiences should get a taste of at this summer's festival dates. "I'm looking forward to them," he enthuses.

# THE STIROKIES' SECRET PHOTO DIARY The Strokes' tour buddy Adam Green talks NME through the pick of his private snaps

New York indie crooner Adam Green has been best mates with The Strokes since they first started coming in to the vintage clothes store where he used to work in their pre-fame days. Since then they've taken him on tour countless times, first as one half of gross-out comedy duo Moldy Peaches and, more recently, as a solo star in his own right. So when Green joined the New Yorkers on their current UK tour, who better was there to go undercover as a secret NME photographer and snap New York's finest behind the dressing room doors? After all, isn't that what friends are for?

"I've known The Strokes for years. I claim sole responsibility for them - I'm a bit of a Svengali." cackled Green on delivering his rolls of illicit film to us. "Now everyone will finally

know who's really at the controls."



Adam Green: "That was a pretty wild night in Wolverhampton. That's genuine sick - Nick had to hold my hair while I puked. I guess he's got good experience as he's grown his own hair out. He's told me he's working up to the Slash look (laughs), he's on his way to being a guitar god. There was a lot of bodily fluids on this tour - everyone was suffering from explosive diarrhoea, it was terrible."



AG: "I know it looks like I'm humping Fab, but I was actually helping him lookfor his drawing pen. Fab likes to draw a lot on tour and in that picture I was helping to look under a cushion. He does a lot of portraits and pictures from magazines but changes them to make his own kind of thing. He can draw anything though, he's pretty good."



AG: "This is a picture of Jack from my band and Fab pissing! If you zoom in reafly close you can see the beads of Fab's piss. That's really cool – you guys should run a close-up. I was unaware that piss came out like that. The plss comes out as lots of beads!"



AG: "We were a total draw, the exact same strength level. It was impossible to tell who was the winner. We arm-wrestled for 10 minutes. Julian was the judge and declared we were equally matched. Fab is the best arm wrestler because he's so strong."



AG: "NME readers wouldn't believe how much those two eat - tiger prawns, Hibachi, Mexican food, marzipan, dried figs, sardines on toast, toffee chews, light fish, malted milk bars and extra-strength liquorish... My favourite touring meal is spaghetti and meatballs hands down - but if I can get them, I prefer veal testicles."

# Battle Tendency



From singer, swinger and soul conductor of The Stone Roses to solo star and freedom fighter, NME presents the Ian Brown story, in his own words

ast night was a buzz, man," says lan Brown the morning after being crowned Godlike Genius at this year's ShockWaves NME Awards. "I'm buzzing. I haven't drunk in nine years, and yeah, I smoke weed for energy, but I'm buzzing." What follows is King Monkey's account of how this buzz came to be built ..



#### DICTIONARY

Believe it or not, long before they invented Pollock-splattered psychedelia, The Stone Roses wore black leathers and played angsty goth rock. Don't believe us? Check out their first single, 1985's 'So Young'.

"We weren't goths, but the guitarist wore a frilly shirt and I slicked my hair back because I thought I was Robert De Niro. We were just trying to find our own thing. The press got it wrong, but that didn't matter because we were playing to 30,000 people in our hometown. We used to get called scallies and all that in the press, but you don't get that so much any more. I guess a few northern writers have come in and got their own back."



#### THEY ADORE YOU

What Woodstock was to the original Summer Of Love in the '60s, so Spike Island was for the acid house era. On Sunday, May 27, 1990, on a reclaimed toxic waste site in the middle of the Mersey near Widnes, Cheshire, The Stone Roses put on the defining gig of their generation.

"There were 30,000 people there, but it wasn't the event people have made it out to be. The PA wasn't good enough for a start. Do I meet people who were there? All the time. I met a few at the Awards. The guys from Shaun Of The Dead [Sirnon Pegg and Nick Frost] were both there. I met this guy who'd escaped from jail to be there. He'd jumped over the fence and got impaled. Left his balls on top of the railings.

#### **LOVE SPREADS**

In 1991, the Roses signed a megabucks deal with US record giant Geffen. Where other bands squandered their huge advances on sex, drugs and rock'n'roll, man of the people Ian Brown strolled around the streets of Manchester handing out wads of cash to homeless people from a Tesco carrier bag.

That was something I wanted to do ever since I heard about James Brown giving out \$30,000 mink coats in Harlem. We didn't just give money to bums though. We gave it to kids' homes and hostels and projects. How much did we give out? I'd rather not say. There are buildings that have been built in Manchester that I know wouldn't have been without the Roses. If you put love in, you'll get it back."

#### FOOLS GOLD

Five years in the making, 'Second Coming' - the most-anticipated second album in British rock turned out to be an overblown, Led Zeppelin-aping letdown.

'Looking back now, it was a chance for (guitarist) John Squire to shine. I think he felt a bit put out because he co-wrote the tunes and designed all the sleeves, but the crowds would be wearing hats like the drummer. He wrote most of the second LP on his own and my way of thinking was, 'We've got another three LPs on our contract - we'll just back him up.' I didn't realise at the time that would be our last one. I just think it's boring now and it reminds me of an unhappy time. Around '93/'94 we were falling apart. We were all on different drugs, and we definitely stayed in the studio too long. I wish I hadn't sung his songs for him, because

#### **GOING DOWN**

In October 1998, Ian Brown was sentenced to four months in Strangeways Prison after being convicted of threatening to chop off an air stewardess' hands on a flight from Paris to Manchester - something he has always denied.

"Prison was no fun, but what got me through it was that I knew I'd been stitched up. I went away for saying words, yet I got the same sentence as Gary Glitter, who'd downloaded 4,000 disgusting images. The words they attributed to me I'll still say I never said. I never swore at the woman, but the captain was a magistrate and because of the climate of air rage at the time it was good publicity to put me away. I was there scrubbing landings with people who'd burgled old ladies' houses. I was like, 'Get fucking scrubbing, you deserve it.' But





I wasn't there to do any scrubbing. Did I meet any Roses fans inside? They put me in a cell with a lad who only had one tape. A Stone Roses tape. I didn't really want to hear that in there. The lads treated me great though, and I got the things you can't get in there – like an apple, or a smoke of tobacco, or a phone card. Do I feel angry now that I'm out? I feel like I got my own back by being more successful than ever."

#### MONKEYS WERE WIZARDS

Goaded by his children, King Monkey made his film debut playing a wizard in 2004's Harry Potter And The Prisoner of Azkaban.

"The director, Alfonso Cuarón, is a friend of my wife and he said he had a cameo role for me. I've got three sons and they were a lot younger then. They said, 'Yeah, do it Dad.' I've no desire to do any more acting though. An actor is a puppet saying someone's lines. It's why they always want to be rock stars—they can see we're free. We get adulation from gigs every night, they only get it at premieres or whatever."

#### SECOND COMING?

Rumours still abound that the Roses will reform if they're offered £1billion and a small island each.

"if I was in the gutter and my kids were on the curb, I'd sooner get a job in B&Q. I've been there, done that. I'll only Daddy my own sons now – I won't Daddy anyone else. The Roses were a buzz, but I'm buzzing off my own thing now. We had our shot and we blew it and that's it. I don't see what the upside of a Roses reformation is, aside from we all get a load of cash. That isn't enough."

#### THE GREATEST

Following a 20-year career spanning baggy, Britpop and the rebirth of British rock, Ian Brown is crowned Godlike Genius at the NME Awards 2006 in front of an audience including The Strokes and Arctic Monkeys.

"It felt great. That award tells you that if you do great work, you will get rewarded. It means something picking it up in front of your peers and other music makers. It means something that all these new bands cite me as an inspiration – that's what I wanted to do all those years ago. Inspire people. Arctic Monkeys? Nice northern lads, good band. It's a big thing that they've done. How many bands manage to inspire their own generation?"







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

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# DAVID BOWIE FLIRTS WITH FASCISM

Sunday, **M**ay 2, 1976

Morrissey and the Mayor of London aren't the only ones to have spiced up their care ers with some extremist controversy

avid Robert Jones
has assumed many
personas in his lifetime,
morphing from Major
Tom to Ziggy Stardust to
Aladdin Sane over the years, but neoNazi was one he probably didn't plan.

Bowie was never exactly a stranger to controversy. He's admitted and then denied being bisexual, given interviews to *Playboy* claiming his penchant for 19-year-old Japanese boys, played disastrous shows, including Earls Court in May 1973 where the audience couldn't see the stage, split with the Spiders From Mars and announced retirements only to return months later.

The descent to arguably the lowest point of his career started in 1975 when he released 'Young Americans' – a dire flirtation with vapid Philly soul.

Things went from bad to worse as Bowie parted ways with long-time manager Tony De Fries, upped the cocaine abuse and developed his love for the occult, in particular Kabbala and the writings of sex-mad drug fiend and mystic Aleister Crowley. In an interview with the troubled star in NME, journalist Anthony O'Grady remarked, "The next word on Bowie was that he was huddled in a room drawing pentangles, burning candles, chanting spells," and it was during this chat that Bowie famously declared: "Rock'n'roll is dead... a toothless old woman. It's embarrassing." When asked what the next step was, he answered: "Dictatorship. You've got to have an extreme right front come up and tidy everything up. Morals need to be straightened up... they're disgusting." To Playboy he went as far as saying, "Britain is ready for a fascist leader."

# BOWIE EXPLAINS HIMSELF

In 1980, Bowie recalled his 'fascist years' in NME "I was out of my mind, completely crazed. I know this sounds terribly naive but none of (the racist implications) actually occurred to me. I'd been working with black musicians for the last six or seven years and we'd all talk about it together

 about the Arthurian period, about the magical side of the Nazi campaign, and about the mythology involved."



# HEIL AND FAREWELL

Despite all of this, several thousand people still turned up to Victoria Station in May 1976 to welcome him back after nearly three years in America. Having travelled by boat due to a fear of flying, he swept by in an open-top vintage Mercedes and greeted the crowd with what was widely reported in the press as a fascist salute. Later, Bowie denied he would be that 'foolish', saying that the photographer caught him

in mid-wave, but eventually retracted his comments, claiming his judgment had been affected by substance abuse.

The Hitler-in-high-heels quickly hot-footed it over to Berlin to live and work with ambient pioneer Brian Eno, and assumed his 'Thin White Duke' persona. Eventually pulling himself together, Bowie went on to create "Heroes" and his misdemeanours were slowly forgiven.

In a year of naive remarks, Eric Clapton also dabbled in casual fascism, claiming that Enoch Powell was right following his 'rivers of blood' anti-immigration speech, comments that prompted the formation of Rock Against Ray Istin, But even since then rock stars have

continued to land themselves in trouble - in 1992 Morrissey shocked a nation by wrapping himself in a Union Jack and performing below a picture of a skinhead girl at a Madness gig, while modern and latter-day punk icons Martin Tomlinson of Selfish Cunt and Sid Vicious have both dabbled with far right imagery. As Prince Harry found out to his cost last year, if you want to shock, get a swastik. Actually, on second thoughts...

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# **Graham Coxon Love Travels At Illegal Speeds**

ne of the most abiding memories of Britpop, more so than Noel quaffing champers with a fresh-faced Tony Blair and more so than Jarvis' Jacko-baiting at the Brits, is Blur's performance of 'Country House' on Top Of The Pops. They were the victors of this greatest-ever chart battle: Damon Albarn avoiding the grasps of

teenage girls, his competitive urges satiated, albeit temporarily; Alex James grinning at the thought of all the, "Oh, what a card you are!" comments his Oasis T-shirt would command that evening; drummer Dave Rowntree, er, drumming, anonymous as ever.

And cowering in the corner of the stage was Graham Coxon, miming along to a contrary, disjointed solo more suited to a Sonic Youth experimental album than this most vulgar of Blur moments, knowing, just knowing, as the other three would years later sheepishly confirm, that all of this was wrong.

No surprise therefore that subsequent Coxo outings, whether with or without his now most-definitely former band, were to veer as far in the direction of the lettfield as the politics of that now most-definitely former drinking buddy of Gallagher Sr would to the

was the sound of this shellshocked guitarist forcing his bandmates to flick through his Pavement and Dinosaur Jr records; '13' became Blur's 'experimental' record (and Graham's last with the band), while his initial solo releases were lo-fi and proof of this recovering alcoholic's reclusive tendencies.

But then, seemingly in a flash, everything changed. 'Parklife' producer Stephen Street was called, wilful obtuseness was ditched in favour of tunes (2004's 'Happiness In Magazines' and specifically 'Freakin' Out') and before you knew it Coxon was onstage with Carl at his Dirty Pretty Things night, inviting Pete to play 'Time For Heroes' with him at his own gigs, getting asked to tour with

me". This is, as advertised, an album about love, but one by a now-single 36-year-old expop pin-up that's full of the same frustration. worries and confusion that defined early Buzzcocks (the most obvious musical touchstone here). 'Don't Let Your Man Know' fantasises about being a bit on the side to some girl on the streets of Camden, 'What's He Got?' gets baffled by inferior men with way-out-of-their-league ladies and 'Gimme Some Love', the heaviest moment here, is about exactly what its title implies.

If all this sounds a bit mid-life crisis then... well, it isn't. The Pete Townshend, in-frontof-the-mirror powerchording is offset by the genuine innocence of a man only just finding

> his feet in adulthood, more clearly visible in downbeat moments 'Just A State Of Mind' and 'Don't Believe Anything I Say': lovely, emotionally open acoustic guitaras-comfort-blanket confessionals that paint as important a part of this self-portrait as the adolescent pop-punk thrills of the likes of " Can't Look At Your Skin'. Best of all is the closing, mini-epic 'See A Better Day'("I feel like I can fly"),

one of Coxon's finest ever songs, on which Stephen Street's subtle, Beatles-esque production touches perfectly complement the sense of optimism. It's a fine end to a fine album that, while not likely to win any prizes for Gorillaz-style innovation, will resonate, both musically and lyrically, with fans young rather than old. It may be Blur's lead singer's 'project' that's got the grown-up broadsheet critics gushing and the Grammys rolling in, but it's their ex-guitarist who still, in the eyes (and hearts) of the kids, is alright, And that, frankly, matters much, much more,

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

# Nowhere men

One of the best British albums ever\*, not bad for Oasis' bassist

ide's debut was aptly titled. The three teenage art students and a kid from the local Our Price record shop had come from out of nowhere (as pre-Radiohead Oxford was known) in 1990 with two incredible EPs and a nice line in T-shirts. A youthful mixture of the feedback frenzy of My Bloody Valentine and the '60s pop of The Byrds, they briefly, brilliantly threatened to fill the vacuum left by the then-AWOL Stone Roses before grunge and then Britpop diverted attention away from the Thames Valley. But 'Nowhere' (which is now available as a digital download, along with the band's three other albums) still sounds incredible over 15 years later. The fact that there are clubs from London to LA still celebrating the so-called "scene that celebrates itself" and that the band's influence can be heard in everyone from the dark and dirty Howling Bells to skyscraping soundscapers Engineers is testament to this.

The cover is the first thing you notice. A wave breaking on a blue-green sea, at once beautiful but foreboding, a metaphor for the music contained within - a sea of sound, to borrow a title from Ride contemporaries the Pale Saints. The opening track, however, soars high above. 'Seagull' begins with cymbals, feedback and an elastic bassline from Steve Queralt. then drummer Loz Colbert comes crashing in and the maelstrom begins. There's over a minute of Mark Gardener's droning rhythm guitar and Andy Bell's chiming lead before the duo's angelic harmonies take the song skyward. For any other band this would be an album closer - it's Ride's 'I Am The Resurrection' - but as it speeds up to its screaming conclusion you really believe their claim of, "We know there's no limit".



The effects-laden 'Polar Bear' is so good there's still a record shop of that name in Oxford today, 'Decay' is the missing link between Joy Division and Editors and 'Dreams Burn Down' sees Colbert morphing into Led Zep powerhouse John Bonham. There are moments of beauty too, namely the weepy 'in A Different Place' and the mournful cello on closer 'Vapour Trail'. (The CD now includes three tracks from 1990's 'Fall' EP and four from 1991's 'Today Forever'.)

The lyrics are so guileless as to be almost childlike, but, drowning amid the noise and confusion, the innocence becomes addly affecting, lending 'Nowhere' a melancholy feel that was at odds with the ecstatic pop of the time. Their record company, Creation, even hoped that they would go on to become The Cure of the 1990s, with







# Fanclub show finds Sunderland's finest looking to the future

azz! It's 10 minutes before stagetime at Oxford's Zodiac and the capacity crowd is being treated to the smooth sounds. of broketooth trumpet legend Chet Baker. Yes, to tie in with the title of their forthcoming album (that's 'News And Tributes') each date on this low-key club tour is being staged as an homage to one of The Futureheads' musical heroes. Over the next week they II salute artists as varied as Captain Beefheart and Bruce Springsteen, but strewn all over the venue tonight are postcards with a black-and-white photo of Baker on one side and a tribute penned by 'heads guitarist Ross Millard on the other. "The thing about Chet," Ross says, "is that he was a modern-day troubadour - more 'punk rock" than most punk bands." It's the first night of a fanclub-only tour and the band have aiready proved themselves to be the biggest fans in the room. It's a sweet touch.

But this is more than just an exercise in blind idolatry: despite the fact that they dress like slightly dissolute chemistry teachers, The Futureheads have always proved themselves, like Chet, to be more 'punk rock' than most punk bands. From dressing up as robots at

early gigs to playing a tour of run-down old working men's clubs, in the six years since their first rehearsal in guitarist Barry Hyde's parents' garage they've studiously avoided cliché and convention. This means that, when their sharp-elbowed jerk-rock sound started to be aped, they retreated to a farmhouse to record an album inspired both by AC/DC and standing on cliffs watching the tide come in.

The set they play tonight, then (bootleggers take note: the new album in its entirety, plus a handful of old songs), is what rappers call

Some new songs have an organic, almost rootsy feel

Some Serious Next-level Shit. If your frame of reference for The Futureheads' sound consists solely of Gang Of Four and Kate Bush, you're in for an entirely pleasant surprise. Many of the songs tonight have an organic, almost rootsy feel to them - far removed from the bitter, edgy band we previously knew them to be.

Many, but not all: muscular opener
'Yes/No' sounds like the incidental music
from Queen's soundtrack to Sunday
afternoon TV staple Flash Gordon.
Likewise, the already notorious 'Return
Of The Beserker': in line with its Dungeons
& Dragons title, it's steamroller metal with
a Lightning Bolt guitar break of the kind that
got Graham Coxon fired from Blur. If this is
what touring stadiums with Foo Fighters does
for you, we should prescribe it to more bands.
Imminent single 'Skip To The End' is

a slippery hybrid of The Clash and The Cars – its choppy guitars make it the most obvious bridge between the old material and Futureheads Version 2.0. The ballads ('Back To The Sea', 'Fallout') have a woozy, English psychedelic edge to them that's affecting enough to overshadow the old material. Well, almost: the biggest

crowd reaction is reserved for 'Hounds Of Love', the song that'll still be played at indie discos when we're all dust. The Futureheads don't need to worry though; if they keep writing songs like the ones they played tonight, then before long people will be lining up to pay tribute to them. **Patlong**

ayne West doesn't do things by haives. When he's talking up a new album, then music's very future depends on it. When he sees injustice and speaks out there's no scribbling on his hand, he embarrasses the American president on live TV. And when he brings his Touch The Sky tour to the UK... well, you know something special is on the cards.

The first indication that something's different is the stage itself. Usually minutes before the lights go down you can see roadies wandering about scratching their arses. Tonight the stage is covered by a giant grey skirt hinting at surprises behind. The second odd thing is the audience. Middle class couples mix with soccer hooligans, Dizzee Rascaldress-a-likes char with indie kids doing their best to resemble Conor Oberst. West clearly has defied genres and pigeon-holes, a man for all record collections. The third special thing tonight - well that's the transformation of Kanye West himself.

Backed by an all-female orchestra. backing singers and DJ A-Trak, West - dressed simply in jeans and a white shirt appears and before a rhyme is rapped his disparate audience are united in pandemonium. He deserves the response. Stalking the stage like the best of his hiphop peers, dropping his words right on cue. The slightly awkward be-suited man who appeared at Abbey Road last year has been refined into a smooth moving, smart talking star.

Tracks from 'Late Registration' are deliberately given a roughed-up live edge, as 'Drive Slow' never sounded groovier. while the enhanced bass on 'Gold Digger' shreds the venue with a power that would put most metal bands to shame.


Indeed, despite the dolled-up orchestra. the video screens and West's costume changes - he compulsively swaps sports jackets between songs - the glitzy production avoids becoming Kanye: The Musical. Breaking the evening with skits, West firstly allows his strings to iam out a bit of The Verve's 'Bitter Sweet Symphony', before A-Trak treats us to a selection of his



With 'The College Dropout' cuts getting props too, 'Jesus Walks' sounds truly mighty while the urgent desperation of 'All Falls Down' sees West ending the song on his knees, pleading with the audience.

Concluding with a euphoric 'Touch The Sky', West again works his diverse followers into an ecstatic union. Whatever your musical persuasion, it's Kanye West's world - we just live in it. Paul Stokes

# Smile like you mean it, Editors and co are here to make you happily miserable

or the first two thirds of tonight's ShockWaves NME Awards Show, it's hard to tell whether we're in the centre of London, or at a meeting of some kind of Nu-Nashville Society.

An awed silence takes over the crowd as Howling Bells' Juanita Stein struts onstage in her white stilettos, tidy polka dot dress and long fringe glancing her smoky eyes. It's obvious we're in the presence of someone special. The group's eerie Aussie spook and western is headed up by her voice that can growl sweetly and put the fear of God into you with a mere falsetto.

Next up are Brakes, fellow worshippers at the temple of Tennessee, a group whose witty buzzsaw indie is laced with potent dashes of jangly hillbilly and wry humour. Singer and ex-British Sea Power twig brandisher Eamon Hamilton's voice is raw,

punchy and, on tunes like the excellent 'Hi How Are You', more immediate than a slap in the face with a bucketful of wet fish.

Looking sharper than ever in their trademark monochrome get-up, Editors' clothes may be black and white, but tonight their music is far from simple. Tom Smith is so damn earnest that's it impossible not to be dragged along with him on each morose yet thrilling mini-misery epic. When he starts twiddling with his ear piece during the disco chiller 'Camera' he becomes the English Michael Stipe; a touch on the skinny side, sporting a buzzcut, and more introspective than a month-long self help course at The Priory. Along with the occasional lapse into classic U2 power rock, it's clear Editors are set for stadium-sized things. It may be miserable, but as long as someone keeps on pissing off Editors, we'll keep on smiling. Leonie Cooper





# Two Gallants

# Forget the coffee shops, this San Franciscan folk-punk duo are the most intoxicating thing in Amsterdam tonight

t could partly be down to the hazy delights of the local delicacies, but tonight NME doesn't half enjoy the sound of Two Gallants tuning up. For five blissful minutes after the duo amble onstage, single guitar notes echo occasionally around the room, cymbals are gently brushed until slowly – very slowly – the sound mutates into a deathly, funeral-paced blues. By the time this becomes recognisable as 'Steady Rollin", Amsterdam is finally introduced to Adam Stephenson's throat-shredding rasp and the Paradiso is locked in, entranced. It may not be the most instant impression ever made, but man, is it effective.

See, as a live act, San Franciso's Two Gallants are an entirely different, infinitely superior proposition. They may already be tired of the lazy White Stripes comparisons (being a blues-folk two-piece and all), but one thing this pair definitely do have in common with Jack'n'Meg is a healthy disregard for the established structures of their songs. Often tonight, Adam and Tyson are off, twisting their creations into new shapes. 'Long Summer Day' is strung out

way beyond its familiar confines, while the ferocious, howlin' wolf of a single that is 'Las Cruces Jail' is led through time changes that make Adam's screeched verses more striking still. And that's before he even gets to the whistling solo.

Really though, this unwillingness to simply reproduce is where the vague similarity to Detroit's finest ends. For starters, Tyson Vogel certainly doesn't subscribe to Meg White's, erm, 'stripped down' school of drumming, Rather, he compensates for his band's lack of numbers with astonishing power, at one point playing with two sticks in one hand, a tambourine in the other.

Tonight, we see that Two Gallants are as much a punk band as a folk-rock duo, as intrinsically linked to Led Zeppelin as they are to Woody Guthrie and Johnny Cash.

"Here's another real cheery song," smirks Adam in a rare moment of between-song chat, before a stunning 'Linger On'. His sarcasm, as with many of his intricate, story tellin' lyrics, may not quite make it through the language barrier, but the look in his eyes is universal. During the encore of 'Waves Of Grain' he appears on the verge of losing himself totally, his rage barely contained, his pretty eyes popping out of his head. The reference points may all be rooted in a far off land, but what is clear is that these are sad and lonely songs being sung by a man who has clearly experienced both of these emotions in droves.

Barely 20 minutes after coming offstage and Tyson and Adam are in their van, off to Paris for a 9am radio session before continuing on to Brussels for another show. They may, like some of their heroes, be set on doing things the hard way, but tonight Two Gallants made many new friends. Only a fool would bet against them making a few more tomorrow. 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
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


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














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# **ECHO & THE BUNNYMEN**



### THE SOUND

Formed amid the Liverpool postpunk scene by Will Sergeant and Ian McCulloch, the Bunnymen influence extends to Editors, Coldplay and British Sea Power. New recruits will find the vintage-sounding ninth album, 'Siberia', a good place to start.

### THE KIT

Guitarist Will Sergeant is the greatest champion of the echo effect since Duane Eddy. After trading his Roland Space Echo for a leather jacket (and regretting it), he's switched to a Boss GT-8 - a processor crammed full of effects and amp models. He's also swapped his trademark Rickenbacker (not good for "big fat sausage fingers", apparently) for a brittle Phantom 12-string for that Byrdsian jangle. Then there's the Phantom Mandoguitar, great for trilling high notes, and a Tele for occasional Television-style chiming. "My only amp is my old Fender DeVille," says Will. "It's so loud. Live, I have it on number two, and everyone still moans."

### IN THE STUD O

'Siberia' was produced by Hugh Jones, who engineered the early albums. 'We recorded most of the backing tracks onto two-inch tage, which we had to send off for," Will says. "Then we moved it to Pro Tools. I couldn't tell the difference myself - Pro Tools is so good these days." Programs like Logic are great for adding reverb, although for 1984's 'Ocean Rain' everything was run through an ancient plate reverb a wooden box with a plate inside that vibrates when you feed in the signal. They also had this echo chamber that vas a tiled room with a ladder into it, and a speaker and a mic on the other side. I played my guitar down there."

### TECHNIQUE

"The solo of 'The Killing Moon' is just my Vox 12-string mic'd up," Will reveals. "It's not even through the amp. On the choruses I used an Autoharp with a reverse reverb." There's also reverse guitar on 'Siberia's 'Stormy Weather'. "I used a Line 6 Delay Modeler, but in the old days I'd just turn over the tape! It's a lot easier on ProTools though. You can edit and reverse each note in order."

### BEST TRICK

Since 1982's 'Heaven Up Here', the Bunnymen have incorporated Eastern themes. "We used guitars laden with echo and reverb; scratching the strings, playing in weird ways," says Will. On the following album, 'Porcupine', he utilised that most naff of gadgets, the EBow. "I was into having the D string droning. Then Big Country made it sound like bagpipes, which put me off."

"This was my favourite when we were over in the UK. Completely insane, it could never exist in America. There were guys just naked on TV with a drill sergeant screaming at them. Amazing."








