about a new move," says Yano. "It's not the 1990s so it's not only CDs; we'll do the festival and tours and create new music communication."

Expanding on this, McGee says: "It's gonna have to be more of a communication company than a record label. We've got to go into business with bands because I don't think it works to just sell their CDs and downloads any more. I hate to call it a 'lifestyle brand' because I don't mean it like that, but you're getting the idea.'

The new model will also get a new name: "We threw away the idea of Creation pretty immediately because Creation was Creation - it was what it was but it's done. I felt uncomfortable after I thought about it, calling it Creation," he adds.

As for new bands, McGee says there's "about four new bands I'd definitely sign and about three old bands - when you say 'old', they've been around for a bit - that have great attitude and I would do them as well. But it's conjecture at the moment."

One thing that is set in - rather ancient - stone is the location of the as-yet-nameless label's HQ. "There's this little town about five miles down the road from my house in Wales and I bought its chapel in an auction," he explains. "I bought it for next to nothing, about 30-odd grand, and that's going to be HQ when we get around to doing the label. I'm half thinking about buying the mental institution! It'd be amazing to go,

'Gillespie, d'you want to put a gig on in a mental institution?' I'm sure they'd be up for it."

Given McGee's new Japanese connection and

# McGEE'S GUIDE TO

# STEP ONE: GET INSPIRED

Early 2012: McGee meets Tokyo festival promoter Takashi Yano to talk over potential label ideas. "Takashi's flying the flag for all of us," McGee says. "He thinks left-of-centre but thinks big. I went Yeah, OK, I'll do it with you because you're a fucking headcase!""

# STEP TWO: GET INVOLVED

May 2012: After being out of the rock circuit for a few years, McGee DJed at Tokyo Rocks 2012: "The Primals played and 30,000 people showed up, it was nuts," he says.

Aside from Takashi. McGee's putting together a motley crew of collaborators including "a great guy I found that owned a studio".

# STEP FOUR: GET A CONCEPT

After realising that the traditional record label model wouldn't work for them, the group are planning on overseeing a business partnership with bands, becoming a badge of affiliation rather than a distributor of CDs and downloads, and taking in tours, festivals and communications.

Or, in McGee's case, buy an actual chapel in deepest Wales. "I've got a graveyard!" he says. "I've got to cut the grass though, keep the locals happy. It's fucking massive!"

# STEP SIX: GET BANDS

Although he's keeping it under his hat at the moment, McGee's plotting to get some big bands: "There's bands I really believe in that I think have got a great attitude and have got tunes, but let's just see where it goes."

X Factor culture; rock'n'roll culture is still massive. They've still got a rock'n'roll backbeat to the music." One major act leading Japan's new rock charge is Illion, second on to MBV at the festival, and the solo

project from Japan's biggest rock star Yojiro Noda, whom McGee describes as "Kevin Shields from Asia".

"If I'm going to do music I want to do it

outside Japan as well," Yojiro says of his music, which marries the esoteric rock of Local Natives with Radiohead's electronica. "Of course I'm influenced by music from the UK but I have traditional Japanese sounds as well and I'm confident that I can do well in the UK too," he says.

Before the new label can properly get up and running, however, McGee is hard at work finalising the Tokyo Rocks bill, working on a new film called Kubricks with writer/director Dean Cavanagh, compiling his memoirs and setting about "suing the News Of The World for phone hacking". But despite this flurry of activity, he's not about to jump on his former party bandwagon and return to his hedonistic ways.

"I'm in the middle of doing the chapel up," he laughs. "I'm going to put on old-age pensioner tea dances there. The local OAPs have asked so I'm gonna let them do their tea dances there. I go from rural Wales to stadiums in Tokyo - somewhere there's a join!"

# **SHAUN RYDER:** WHY I LOVE UFOS

Happy Mondays singer makes TV show to prove existence of aliens

've been fascinated by UFOs since I was a kid. In 1978, I saw something that defies physics - an object flying around the sky at about five or six thousand miles an hour. I was in Salford on my way to work as a post boy. I wasn't high or nothing. And it wasn't just me that saw it. There were a couple of girls that'd seen it, and a schoolboy.

"I've been away the past few weeks chasing UFOs around the world for a TV show, Shaun Ryder On UFOs [due next year on History]. My recent investigations led to me to Chile, which was great because Chile don't keep any of this shit secret. I've got pilots flying to the Chile airports telling me they've seen things that, you know, aren't from this world. The Chilean military are so fucking inviting to you - 'Come in, we'll show you all our files and our secret films, have a cup of coffee'.

"I've seen one film that looks like fucking Starship Troopers coming out of the sky on pogo sticks, right? And they're going towards the ground coming out of the sky, and when they've spotted people taking film of



them, they disappear back up in the sky. That's authenticated film.

"So I'm a believer. You'd be pretty stupid if you thought we was all alone in the universe. But I wouldn't say I'm a ufologist. A lot of ufologists, are fucking up it, mate. They're not ufologists, they're just fucking raving bonkers, just absolute knobheads. Then you've got some that are really smart and intellectual - scientists.

"A lot of musicians are into UFOs - it's because we've got incredibly intelligent brains. Robbie Williams loves them and he's fucking, you know, genius! I have no idea what I'd do if I actually made contact. I probably wouldn't like to talk to an alien. I'd probably die of a fucking heart attack."

# PETE'S NEW FILM IS A CRAZY SHAMBLES

'Confession...' comes out to awful reviews and Pete doesn't show up at the premiere

urfing into London's Leicester Square on a tide of extremely scathing reviews, Pete Doherty's film Confession Of A Child Of The Century is out in cinemas now. Naturally, Pete failed to turn up to its premiere in the UK capital last week (December 3).

# 'I'M BRINGING **MYSPACE BACK':** CANJUSTIN DO IT?

Justin Timberlake has bought a significant stake in Myspace. Can he save the ailing social network from oblivion? **Luke Lewis** and **Al Horner** battle it out



AL: If anyone can bring sexy back to Myspace, JT can. After all, just like his new purchase, Timberlake's second

coming - from cauliflower-haired 'NSync pin-up to solo megastar - wasn't supposed to amount to anything, but look how that ended: one of the landmark pop records of our time, with a whopping 11 million copies sold worldwide. While the ability to mount a monumental chart comeback isn't the same as rescuing a dying social media brand, Timberlake has proved he's the master of reinvention and knows exactly what people want.



LUKE: You're pinning your hopes on a former member of 'NSync? The artist formerly known as Trousersnake? People

have this idea that Timberlake is some kind of digital guru, purely because he played one in The Social Network. It's insane. Beyond enabling a hundred "bringing sexy back to Myspace" headlines, what's he actually good for? But that's precisely the problem with the Myspace 'comeback'. It's all style, no substance. The other month they produced a fancy, expensive-looking demo and everyone went 'Oooh!' But it didn't answer the fundamental question: what role is Myspace supposed to fill in our lives? What on earth do we really need it for in 2012?

But if they were to release a new album tomorrow I'd give it the respect of an open mind because, like Myspace, they had a huge impact on my teen years. Plus, Facebook and Twitter might not exist had Myspace not led the way with social media. Think about that before your next hilarious anti-Myspace status update.

LUKE: Yes, Myspace was big when you were a teenager. But so were Razorlight. Do we really need to go back there?




Myspace thrived for a simple reason: it was where you went to hear free music. That was a novelty in 2005. Now we have YouTube, Spotify, Deezer and numerous other places, all competing with each other. There's no gap in the market for Myspace to fill - things are overcrowded as it is. Again, they're doing things for the right reasons and it's inspiring. Hopefully, it's the start of us getting away from celebrity culture and fame for fame's sake, and we can get back to people being known for being good.

"As for me, I'm at home for Christmas with the twins John Paul and Bowie, born in January this year, but in terms of 2013, I don't know. I've been working on a soundtrack thing, for a British film. I don't wanna say too much about it yet 'cos it's early stages, but I'm really excited about that, about doing a whole soundtrack. I'm also gonna do a couple of bits on Miles Kane's album - his new stuff sounds great. And I want to do more gigs, just because I'm still really into the live thing. I just feel like generally it's a good time at the moment. And next year will be as well.

# "CHRISTMASES? I DON'T REMEMBER A LOT OF 'EM..."

After two incredible 50th anniversary shows at the 02, **Keith Richards** is on a high. He tells **Hamish MacBain** all about his plans for Christmas and, more excitingly, how he's expecting to have a busy 2013 with the Stones


ow strange. It is Friday, 5.3opm and, rather than doing what I'd normally be doing at this time – taking Alt-J off the office stereo and replacing it with the somewhat more mood-enhancing sounds of The Rolling Stones – I'm sat by the phone, waiting for one of The Rolling Stones to call. And if I were to tell you that it is THE Rolling Stone then... well, the picture on the opposite page has given the game away, but even if it hadn't, you'd still know who I was talking about, right?

Whenever we're talking about who we should put on the cover of the Christmas issue of NME, we always figure it needs to be someone who has owned the last 12 months, but also someone who'll make everyone smile and make everyone excited about what's happened this year and what is going to happen next year. Now, up until last week, had you asked me what the event of 2012 was I'd have said the Olympic Opening Ceremony or The Stone Roses finally playing together again or whatever. If you had asked me what my gig of the year was, I'd have said Pond somewhere in Texas, The Stone Roses in Warrington, or Palma Violets in their house. But then, right at the end of November, I found myself in the O2 Arena, witnessing the Greatest Rock'N'Roll Band In The World, 50 years young, ending a year of rumours, retrospect and near-riots over ticket prices, by being just that. The Rolling Stones felt vital. And all of a sudden, everything else I just mentioned above seemed to pale in comparison.

So we decided that on the cover we wanted the man who for half a century has been the beating heart of the Stones. Here – just behind the beat, as ever, at 5.31 – he comes. If a picture is worth a thousand words, and '(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction's riff is worth twice that, then that instantly recognisable, beautifully guttural croak of laughter is a whole novel. And a novel which, as Keith Richards will explain, is still a long way from its conclusion.

NME: So it's the evening after the night before: you played your second and final O2 Arena show last night. How do you feel? How do The Rolling Stones feel?

Keith: "Oh, the band's riding high, man, it's been a couple of great shows. It was a real kick in the pants for us all. And it seems to have all gone down well. After being off the road for


five years... we were having a ball up there, but it was relaxed and everybody was on form. We all enjoyed ourselves like mad. It was great to play with Bill [Wyman] again – to look round and see the man-mountain there was quite a turn-on onstage. And Mick Taylor, playing his arse off, it was a real joy to play together again. I mean, it's been 40-odd years since I played with Taylor."

That was not something I, or many people, imagined they would see.

"Well, there you go. The Stones will always pull some surprises."

How did you go about sorting out what to play?

"We thought, 'It's 50 years, so let's not get chronological, but let's bear it in mind, so let's



mad! The whole point of rock'n'roll is to be a little free and easy, and have some fun at it and take a few chances with it. I mean, you're not in the bloody army, you know?"

On both nights, Mick made a joke of all the kerfuffle there has been over the price of the tickets. On refection, do you think the prices were fair?

"Whatever the market will bear, man. You know, whatever came through, we chose the best deal ticket-price-wise that we could. Anything else that was on the table would've been even more. So we're just doing the best we can. It takes a lot of money to put those shows on, and we live in those kind of times. At the same time, those tickets were snapped up in four minutes, so it obviously ain't too painful, is it?"

You had Florence Welch on one of the nights doing 'Gimme Shelter'. You a fan?

"I've never met her before or seen her work, but I just went, 'Wow, there's a strong voice'. And as it turned out, she's a hell of a performer. I mean, she gave Mick a run for his money! And she can move. Great fun, lovely girl. We'd do it again."

Is there much other new music that floats your boat? Do you keep up with it? "There's this one cat called K'Naan, from Somalia, now works out of New York, who's got some good stuff going. But I don't play keep-up, no. If I hear something that I like, I say that's nice, and I'll chop the track out. But otherwise, I just listen to what I've always listened to, which is rhythm and blues and blues, that's my staple diet. And a dose of country music, and a touch of Mozart." A big music story this year was The

A big music story this year was The Stone Roses getting back together. Do you know their stuff?

"No, I don't. I know they're a pretty good band and everything, but look, the only







Stones I've been involved in this year has been The Rolling Stones. So great that they've reformed, and I hope that they enjoy it as much as we do."

What about the Olympics? Did you watch much of it?

"I watched nearly all of it, as much as I could. There was a lot of it! And hey, what about Bolt, from Jamaica, my other home island! He was amazing. I saw the Queen jump out of the plane, which I thought was great... but otherwise this year I've been slowly working on constructing what we've just put together. Pulling the band together at the beginning of the year..."

Naturally, with the 50th anniversary comes a lot of looking back. There's 'GRRR!', the new greatest hits collection; the film Crossfire Hurricane; you did the book the year before... is reflecting on all that you've done

something you enjoy?
"Of course it is! Yeah. I wouldn't be here talking to you if I didn't enjoy it. Ninety per cent of the element of what we do is: you've gotta enjoy it, you've gotta love it, and that's the way it is. You don't get this for free, you know?" You went to the Crossfire Hurricane premiere, and sat and watched it with Mick, Charlie, Ronnie and Bill Wyman. What did you all think of it?

"We felt that Brett Morgen had done a great job, and found some incredible footage, and stuck to pretty much the story of the band, without getting carried away too much with, er... extraneous affairs."

Which is not to say they were not included...

"There was a lot of footage I hadn't seen before, where I was like: 'Oh, I didn't know there was a cameraman there!' But a good cameraman, you don't notice them: they're your friend, so you can capture moments that you're unaware of, which can be fun." What do you think now when you see the 18-year-old Keith Richards

"I just wish him well, man. It's a long road!" On 'GRRR!' all those riffs are collected once again. Which, to you, is the best?

"You gotta say that '... Satisfaction' grabbed the whole thing. But to play? 'Jumpin' Jack Flash' is a killer guitar rock'n'roll riff to play. It just floats there, baby."

If you're ever just sat around at home, on the sofa with a guitar, do you ever just play 'Jumpin' Jack Flash' to yourself?

"Oh yeah. Sometimes just to keep my hand in. But if I sit around and play guitar I play other people's stuff: old Buddy Holly, or Everly Brothers, and just figure out some chords. But usually what happens if you do that, after a little while something else crops up, and then you find you're on the trail of a song somewhere. That's what I do. You sit down and play and, some days, an idea pops up, and you nag it to death."

Speaking of which, the reaction to 'Doom And Gloom' was great. Is there more new Stones music on the way? "Oh yeah, why not? That's what I mean. We got two tracks there, within a month.

Anything's possible now. This whole thing just seems to be gathering momentum again. So, at the moment, we've got these shows, and then you're into New Year and I guess everybody's... well, without saying anything, everybody's thinking."

So more gigs? Can you tell us anything? "There's some more things in the works, definitely, I get the feeling now, yeah." We keep hearing rumours around these parts about Glastonbury.

"That's a good one. I'm really going to be guilty here of leaving that one up in the air. I mean I'd love to. But look, I don't know

anything about next year at the moment, I really don't. We're just getting this year under our belts. But anything's possible, that's all I can say. But if it could happen, I'd love to." The Rolling Stones were 50 this year, but NME was 60...

"Oh, so you got 10 on me, huh? Heh heh..." Did you read it when you were younger?

"Yeah man, I probably had the first issue. It was about the time when I was starting to get into music, and into the charts, and musicians and stuff. I guess I started reading it around '57, '58... I was a regular subscriber for many years! And to go from one minute reading it, to the next minute being in it... there were amazing things happening. It all happened at once and you're only 19, and you think you've gone to heaven."

On the second night at the O2 Mick said: "This is close to where Keith and I grew up in Dartford, but it seems a long way from exchanging records at the station."

Have you still got that Bo Diddley record, Keith? Any idea where it is?

"You know what, I think he stole it back. Or Brian Jones nicked it. I could never figure out where it went. When were all living together all the records went into a communal pool..." I think my 'Sticky Fingers' LP went the same way a few years ago.

"So you know what I mean, right? It became a game of, 'Where's my, where's my...' It was all very communistic when we were starting out as a band."

So what does Keith Richards do for Christmas? Any plans?

"Christmas Day, I'm going down to the islands. I'll see everybody up on New Year's, but on Christmas Eve, I'll get out and get some sun..."

Do the Stones exchange Christmas gifts? "Oh yeah. Sometimes they don't arrive actually on Christmas, sometimes before, and sometimes afterwards. But we always exchange something. It's normally something you see or you pick up and you think, 'Oh Charlie'll love that.' But it might not be exactly at Christmas, because we're not that punctual!"

So what's the best gift Charlie, Ronnie or Mick has ever given you?

"Wow, that's a rough one. Let me think... Charlie's given me some incredible things over the years, but they're silly things, like in-jokes and stuff. I can't remember the best one I got, but I remember I once found a Biggles puppet, with a parachute, beautiful '20s job with all the gear on. And Charlie and I have always had a thing about Biggles, so I sent him that. It's still dangling from his ceiling somewhere."

What's the wildest Christmas you've ever had?

"Oh Christmases, I don't remember a lot of them. Because if it's a good one, you're not allowed to really, are you? Heh heh heh!"


#### THE NEVERENDING BULLSHIT THAT IS TURKEY

PAUL McCARTNEY: "That song was one of my little home efforts, just me on my own, as I was doing around that time, with all kinds of synths and things on it. It was

good fun to make. The video was great, too: we went out to some pub somewhere, and so that was a laugh... we just ran out of the pub occasionally, filmed a bit, and then went back in the pub. So that was quite a nice evening!

"For a while it sort of got on my nerves, that song – something like that will, because it gets played a lot. I go on and off a few of my songs, and I think 'It's not really that good', but then what will happen is other people will like it, and I then re-evaluate through other people's eyes. I go, 'You know what? He or she is not thick, so what are they seeing in it?' And then eventually I'll go, 'Oh yeah, that's what I wanted it to be'. Ît's just a Christmas party song, after all. Don't get too heavy on it, you know? It really is just a drinking song. If we're playing somewhere around Christmas, we always wheel that one out. And when I go back to it now, I think, yeah, this is pretty cool."

on toast once and I realised that I'd had it playing for half an hour and it hadn't pissed me off yet, so it must be good. It wasn't meant to be a Christmas single; the A&R department said we should stick some bells on the end, but that's as much as it touches on the old ho-ho-ho stuff. I thought they was all mad.

"The song is about my brother Ollie, who committed suicide when I was younger. I'd grown up with the other guys in the band, so

they knew it was about him, though it wasn't something I told anyone about until people started asking about it in interviews. People know about my brother now, but what they don't know is that it's also about a good friend of mine who lost her father, and as he was dying in his hospital bed, he woke up and came back for another 24 hours. When people are leaving, you always wish that you had one more day with them, and that's where the title came from.

"Every year I say I'm never gonna perform it again, and eventually there will come a point where I'll stop doing it. As I've got older, I've lightened up about it, although I did find it weird when Girls Aloud covered a song about my brother's suicide.

"I recently had a look for the furry white parka from the video, but I don't know where it went. We looked like a bunch of fucking Eskimos, but it was one of those moments in time, wasn't it? I do wonder where it's gone. It's gotta be in my garage somewhere.'

## **"WE GOT** THROWN OUT OF THE PRECINCT"

#### THE POGUES

FAIRYTALE OF NEW YORK

Is this 1987 classic the greatest Christmas song of all time? Quite possibly



SPIDER STACY, GUITARIST: "Shane [MacGowan] started writing the song two years before it was released. It had some roots in The Pogues' first trip to New

York in the mid '80s. The city is exactly as you imagine it to be from all the movies you've seen, but it's also so much more than that. That was probably rattling around in Shane's head.

"Kirsty MacColl came to sing on it by accident - originally Shane and Cait [O'Riordan, former Pogues bassist] were going to do it, but then Cait left. Steve Lilywhite [producer] took it home to Kirsty and asked her to sing on it, to get an idea of what the female part would sound like. When we heard it back, that was our eureka moment. The song sounded so right.

"There was a bit of trouble when we were filming the video in New York - we ended up getting thrown out of the precinct house we were shooting in. We were being too loud and too drunk and not taking our presence behind the NYPD's hallowed walls seriously enough for their liking, and the police threw us out.

"The song just missed out on being Christmas Number One to Pet Shop Boys' cover of 'Always On My Mind'. None of us believed that it would get to Number One, but we were all gutted when it didn't. I bumped into Neil Tennant recently and I mentioned that song to him and he went, 'God, are you still banging on about that?"

MIDGE URE: "Bob [Geldof] and I wrote it separately. After the initial discussion, I went home and wrote the melody, and Bob turned up later with this

half-baked song The Boomtown Rats had

turned down years before that he'd probably reworked in the taxi on the way over. I then spent four days working on the track, trying to turn it into a palatable song while Bob was on the phone. On the day of the recording, we were stood outside an empty studio, hoping all these people would turn up.

"We had 24 hours to record and mix it, and it was a bit of a bunfight. Trevor Horn showed up - it was his studio we were recording in - and had this idea of doing a madrigal, all these vocals cascading over one another. He spent an hour of our very valuable time trying this and eventually

Until Elton John's 'Candle In The Wind 1997', this was the biggest-selling single in British history, shifting 3.7 million copies

The song was recorded in one frantic 24-hour burst, starting on November 25, 1984. It hit

re-recorded twice by Band Aid II in 1989, and Band Aid 20 in 2004 I had to say, 'Look Trevor, thanks but no thanks.' There was a bit of a party going on too - apparently Status Quo brought a big bag of cocaine, but I was behind the desk for the entire day, so I never saw any of that first-hand. It was only afterwards that I heard Duran Duran and the Quo were the ringleaders - I was stuck in the control room all day doing the job!

"It was all very good-natured though; people generally got on with each other. The only person I lost my temper at was Bob. He's not the world's best singer, and it's intimidating for any artist to stand in a studio with a camera in their face, singing a song they've never heard while their contemporaries look on through the control-room window. The last thing anyone needed was Bob singing the wrong melody at them. Eventually I snapped and went, 'For Christ's sake, I know how the melody goes, let me tell them!"

## "OUR PRODUCT IS PEACE"

#### JOHN LENNON AND YOKO ONO

HAPPY XMAS (WAR IS OVER) World peace was the goal in

1971. Radio play at Christmas is the result 40 years later

"In today's society," John Lennon said in 1969, "advertising is the thing that politicians use

and companies use. The Beatles use it, and John and Yoko should use it. Our product is peace." Midge Ure and Bob Geldof may have perfected the art of the Christmas single as political statement, but 'Happy Xmas (War Is Over)' is where, knowingly or not, they got the idea. The only thing lacking was timing: the song arrived two years after John and Yoko had plastered 12 cities around the world with posters declaring 'WAR IS OVER'



#### DID YOU KNOW?

- The single's UK release in 1971 was delayed over a legal dispute, but it was eventually November 1972, peaking at Number Four
- Despite its similarity to the song 'Stewball', Lennon claimed he'd based it on the Paris Sisters' Phil Spector-produced 1961 hit 'I Love How You Love Me'
- The cities targeted by John and Yoko's poster campaign were New York, LA, Toronto, Rome, Athens, London, Amsterdam, Berlin, Paris, Tokyo, Hong Kong and Helsinki
- Phil Spector used the Harlem Community Choir to sing the climactic "War is over/If you want it" coda
- The song was written in a New York hotel room shortly after John and Yoko had moved to the city

and its eventual recording in late 1971 meant its release came too late to make much of a dent in the charts.

"I was sick of 'White Christmas'," Lennon quipped when asked about the song's genesis, and though it's since become a festive staple, back then, there had never been a Christmas song quite like it. The song, whose chords and melody borrow heavily from the US folk standard 'Stewball', was written in collaboration with Yoko and recorded with Phil Spector, a man who knows a thing or two about Christmas records. And yet it's not really about Christmas at all. Lennon's main fixation was the ongoing war in Vietnam and the idea "that we're just as

responsible as the man who pushes the button. As long as people imagine that somebody's doing it to them, and that they have no control, then they have no control."

Though it disappointed commercially (and politically; the war continued for another four years), the song is now a seasonal standard, almost as ubiquitous as 'White Christmas' itself. The message behind it, however, is evergreen: "We wanted to get at least one plug in for peace on Earth at Christmas," Lennon explained. "That implies no violence, no starving children, no violent minds, no violent households, no frustration and no fear."

## CHAMPAGNE SPECTOR-NOVA!

It's been a year to celebrate: who knew London scenesters Spector would end 2012 as bona fide chart stars and festival heroes? Ben Hewitt pops his cork

et's put it this way," booms Fred Macpherson triumphantly. "I heard that Geri Halliwell wrote on a picture of her dead father and this ties in with a lot of Noel Edmonds' theories about cosmic ordering, too - the five things she wanted to achieve: have a Number One single, meet George Michael, blah blah. All those things happened in a year.

"On the back of a scrap piece of paper, which I think was the packaging of a Star Wars toy I found in my old bedroom at my mum's house, I wrote down five things I wanted to achieve," he continues. "And without saying what they were, we as a band achieved four of those things."

Fuck the naysayers! Cast out the cynics! String up the grinches! After hurtling into 2012 pegged as everything from buzz band to calculated jokers, Spector are ending the year as A Big Deal. And Fred is the jesterturned-indie-king, holding court in the band's French dressing room and showing us the official Spector calendar (best picture: Fred staring balefully down the lens, rubbing a kitten against his face). "I'm glad you're here to celebrate with us in what feels like a cold psychiatric unit," says Fred of the soulless Zenith De Paris arena they're holed up in, supporting Florence + The Machine. "Hopefully there might be free soup."

nector have racked up an impressive record of achievement over the past 12 months. There was the early performance on Later... With Jools Holland; slaying the crowds at Reading And Leeds Festivals and the Isle Of Wight. And throw in a bizarre foray to the Far East, too, where they were handpicked to launch Topman in Kuala Lumpur (Fred: "I don't know if we had Goebbels doing our press... we had to take some competition winners shopping, and I got a 40-year-old engineer who decided he wasn't interested in silk floral shirts and wanted some work trousers instead"). But, beyond all the big talk, 2012's been massive for Spector because of the music: the album 'Enjoy It While It Lasts' may have

been gift-wrapped with an insurance policy of a title, but tracks such as 'Friday Night, Don't Ever Let It End' and 'Chevy Thunder' have become bona-fide indie disco staples, and the album debuted at Number 12 in the UK charts. "I'm so proud of making that album," says Fred, suddenly serious. "And in doing so, we weren't just fulfilling our aims now - it was fulfilling all the teenage dreams we had."

# 'D NEVER SLEEP

MACPHERSON

"If I had an airhorn and was listening to it, there's at least five or six moments where I'd be smashing it. Just massive moments," he continues. "I can see why they're irrelevant to some people - certain tracks seem like things from another time - but it's psychology: like the Stereophonics once said, you've gotta go there to come back. And you can't put it better than Kelly Jones, a true wordsmith."

f there's a rub to all this, of course, it's what becomes of Spector now they've smashed through to the other side. As Fred says: "I grew up





in the London indie scene. For us, getting a gig at The Rhythm Factory supporting someone who once met one of Babyshambles was as good as it got." Now he's something of an indie celeb himself – spouting witticisms on Never Mind The Buzzcocks and inspiring at least one person to tattoo himself with pictures of Fred's face. So the question is, what comes next?

"The best moments of the year haven't been people coming up to me in HMV when I'm trying to buy *Cool Runnings* on DVD, saying 'Were you in that band on TV?" he insists.

And there's no lustful groupies, either. "I would never sleep with

Pricey champagne is small beer for the newly minted Spector someone who paid to see a Spector gig," deadpans Fred. "The fame or any of the trappings don't add anything to the creative process. When you're in your bed – however many supermodels are in it – the thing you think about before you go to sleep is whether you're doing what you want to do. And the second we're not, we'll dust off the old CV. I haven't opened my CV since I had Windows 95, but at least I'll be able to put a couple more things on it now, if and when I need to get a job. No doubt I will..."

Somehow, though, it's unlikely Fred and his bandmates will need to pop down to the Job Centre just yet – they're too busy taking over the world, one indie hit, fan tattoo and kitten calendar at a time.



## "I NEED TO FIND A WIFE..."

#### BE A NICER PERSON

"When I spoke to MME last year, I said my New Year's Resolution was to be more obnoxious, because obnoxious people do better in life. We've done well and I've been obnoxious, so this year I want to try and do some good deeds. I want to be nicer to people and the ones who care about me the most. I played the wanker card a lot, and now it's dog-eared. But I've got a deck of 52 cards and I'll be playing the Mr Nice Guy one."

## 2 CATCH UP ON SOAPS AND GET MARRIED

"I need to find a wife and catch up on EastEnders. I'm 35 episodes back, but due to BT Vision - it's a Sky-like digital thing that records every episode of your favourite programme - I have them saved. Each one is half an hour long, and I have 17 and a half hours to watch. Where I'm at, lan Beale is only just back from being a tramp, which shows how far I am behind. And I want to find love in a hopeless place. If anyone wants to come round to my house, I can guarantee I can provide the hopeless place, if not quite the love."

#### 3 MAKE BETTER MUSIC

"We're going to make better music. That's our promise. We've made some pretty good tunes. Sure, 'Chevy Thunder' is a banger. Maybe it gets the kids going wild at your northern indie disco. But let's be honest: we've only written some quite good songs. And I believe in this band we have at least one, if not two, of the nation's premier songwriters. Spector will make better music in 2013. I don't know when we'll get to release it – sooner rather than later, hopefully. But we'll make a great record."

### 4 BE MORE HONEST

"The other resolution is to work out what Spector actually is. People say you have your whole life to make your first album and only however long to make your second one, but I'm actually excited by that, because taste-wise we've cleaned out all of the... what's that spiky insulation stuff called? Asbestos. We've cleaned all the asbestos out of the loft, and we're ready to have a spring clean. Maybe make room for the baby - that's a metaphor. So I think we'll be more honest. And more real. And continue to enjoy it."



With sellout tours, an Arctic Monkeys hook-up and his biggest album yet, Richard Hawley has just nailed 2012. Lisa Wright joins him by the fireside to toast his year with a thousand pints of Guinness

espite clocking up more than two decades in the music business, Sheffield don Richard Hawley has had his best year yet. From January's collaboration with pals Arctic Monkeys as The Death Ramps on 'You And I', to his adored, Mercury-nominated album 'Standing At The Sky's Edge' and its brave new psych-buzz direction, to a slew of sell-out tours, Hawley upped his game from smartly tailored, string-laden crooner to something more important. So, to toast the singer's mad 2012, we settled him next to the roaring fire of his local boozer The Scotsman's Pack, opened up the mince pies, lined up countless pints of Guinness and got him to ruminate on his recent past. "The Brits are offensive, they're just full of cokedup, fat old white men," he lilts, taking a slug on his pint. We might be here a while...

NME: It's been a pretty manic year. Did you expect 'Standing At The Sky's Edge' to go down so well?

Hawley: "You have to be brave and push yourself. With this record I knew I was going to be challenging people. I've always had quite low expectations, which is healthy in a lot of ways, but pretty much everywhere we've played this year has sold out and, considering that we're living in pretty tough times, that's amazing. People are really nailing their colours to my mast... excuse the euphemism."

You got nominated for the Mercury Prize again – are you sad you didn't win?

"I didn't give a fuck. Some people have told me that it's good that I've been nominated twice, but I'm genuinely not arsed. My wife got absolutely rat-arsed there, she picked up the little award you get [for being nominated] and it just fell apart in her hands. I've now got a carrier bag under the bed stuffed with bits of Mercury award. I try to avoid the whole celebrity thing; you don't want to become bigger than your own music. It's not necessary for me to appear on Strictly Come Fuckwit; that's got nothing to do with why I've got a guitar in my hands and why I'm singing my heart out."

Any memorable touring adventures? "Well, on the second day of the first tour I broke my leg. I slipped on a marble

staircase in Barcelona after visiting my friend's newborn son; I was being such a good boy as well. I did the whole 15-date tour in a wheelchair completely and utterly out of my brains on tramadol and red wine it was like a little sojourn back into the old days. I remember Guy Garvey pushing me onstage at Latitude wearing one of them hi-vis jackets. The minute my wife found out I was enjoying temazepam she threw them all down the toilet."

Any plans to take that Arctic Monkeys collaboration further?

"Yeah, I enjoyed that. We've talked about

Now you've got time to relax, what are you going to be up to this Christmas?

"I try and keep the whole corporate horror of it all as far away as possible. We're getting another dog this Christmas, though; he's going to be called Alfie Bone, like Alfie Boe the opera singer."

There was shit flying at us, rockets aimed at the house, and we were all pinned to the wall like being in a war zone. Terrifying."


Presumably things have calmed down a bit since then...

"Kind of. When you get older you just want to shut the doors a bit more. A few years ago me and Chez, who plays guitar in our band, had done a world tour from January to December and we played a gig in Ireland right at the end. We were fucked. When you're on tour it's like an egg frying in a pan for too long - it looks like an egg, but you don't wanna go there. We turned up at the Benners Hotel and Pete from Elbow called me and asked if I was alright, and then by the Christmas tree was all the Elbow boys, Billy Bragg, Hugh Cornwell from The Stranglers and two pints of Guinness. I nearly wept."

That's the spirit. And any New Year's resolutions for 2013?

"Never done it. I'll not keep them. I'd like to give up smoking... well, Î sort of don't want to... ah, fuck it, I love smoking and drinking. They're my last bad boy vices..."

True to form, five hours later we're still firmly in the pub. Pies have been pushed to the side, pints have been treated in the opposite manner and Hawley's recounting the kind of tales that could make for one of the most ridiculous biographies in history. For example, there's the time Joe Strummer sprinkled a gram of cocaine on his fish and chips. Why? Because he had to "use it up somehow". Of course. Let's hope next year he gets round to writing a book.



**CHRISTMAS RULES** DECCA

*In trying to recapture the golden age of Christmas songs,* this mixed bag of hipsters and old-timers forgets the fun





he golden age of Christmas music is behind us. That's why, at this time of year, radio stations turn into Dave Lee Travis-era Radio 1. Step forward Macca and your 'Wonderful Christmastime'. Hello Slade, s'been a while! 'Step Into Christmas', Elton. Back away, Gary Glitter, your 'Another Rock'n'Roll Christmas' ain't welcome no more. People have tried Christmas songs since the '70s and '80s, of course, but never with quite the same gusto. Meekly adding the cheerful tinkle of sleigh bells to a tune does not a Christmas corker make. New comp 'Christmas Rules' tries to set the record straight, charging a mixture of current artists, oldies and the ubiquitous Macca with the task of recording a Christmas cover each.

Probably assuming that people will listen after Christmas dinner and fall asleep halfway through, it's toploaded with the bigger names. Up first are capitalletter-evading popsters fun., doing 'Sleigh Ride' - which they manage to make sound far less fun than an actual sleigh ride. Then The Shins do their tuneful indie thing on Paul McCartney's 'Wonderful Christmastime', closely followed by McCartney himself doing 'The Christmas Song (Chestnuts Roasting On An Open Fire)'. Neither are especially pleasurable, and the latter only confirms the

fact that male pop singers of a certain age are as irresistibly drawn to covers of 'standards' as toddlers to an unattended chip pan, with results almost as disastrous. At least Rod Stewart had the good grace to confine them to his own Christmas album

Standards dirty the album like yellow snow. Rufus Wainwright and Sharon Van Etten (or Von Etten as the sleeve has her) get all Tom Jones

and Cerys Matthews on a smug 'Baby, It's Cold Outside'. It'd have to be minus 50 outside for me to stick by that piano. The cancer turns malignant with The Head And The Heart's 'What Are You Doing New Year's Eve?', on which the Seattle indie-folky-pop plops channel Michael Bublé like hapless horror-movie teens summoning the devil on a makeshift Ouija board.

The other foul thing about this album is its sense of worthiness: The Civil Wars are po-faced on 'I Heard The Bells On Christmas Day', and Punch Brothers treat 'O Come, O Come, Emmanuel' as if it were scripture. There's nothing wrong with a bit of spiritual calm around Christmas (I believe there is some kind of religious aspect to the season) but there's also a reason why Slade's 'Merry Xmas Everybody' is practically a carol. It's because it has a Brummie man screaming "IT'S CHRISTMAS!" like a pissed boss at an office party and it's brilliant. Artists on this album: think more like Noddy Holder. It bloody well is Christmas. There will be presents, and sickly drinks, and you may well cop off with somebody. Cheer up. So who is this album for? Some of these bands are hipster faves, or former hipster faves now in that position where the fickle barometer of hipsterdom doesn't quite know whether they're still cool or not (hello, Holly Golightly). Then there are those oldies - the brilliant Irma Thomas doing 'May Ev'ry Day Be Christmas'; the aforementioned Paul McSanta. And lots of sundry Americana acts straying in like lost exiles from a Wilco house-party. Is it for you? Is it for your mum?

Is it for your cousin who works in graphic design? The answer to this question is: all of them and none of them. It's produced in collaboration with Hear Music, the label owned by Starbucks. It is, essentially, background music to soundtrack your next mince-piechoco-chai-nog latte. But what, ultimately, does this leave us with? Just a compilation that's not as clever as it thinks it is, or as joyful as

it should be. And next time, Starbucks, have some respect and get Cliff Richard involved. Jeez. Dan Stubbs

## SUFJAN STEVENS

SILVER & GOLD ASTHMATIC KITTY

Yuletide's indiest champion roasts us a darker chestnut this year, but it's full of freaky festive flavour



Sufjan Stevens really likes Christmas. The Michigan maestro's obsession with all things Yuletide has now spawned 100-odd songs and two collections, the last of which-

2006's 'Songs For Christmas', has become as much a staple of any hipster's festive listening as Bright Eyes' 'A Christmas Album' and Low's 'Christmas'. This follow-up sees Sufjan's festive fascination darken. "Advent is ultimately about death. The end is near. You are going to die. Happy Holidays," read the liner notes.

Last time we heard from Stevens was on the chaotic future-pop thrum of 2010's 'The Age of Adz,'an album so disorientating and intense it was little surprise to hear the 37-year-old's next move would be a return to the relative fun and simplicity of his Yuletide recordings. Echoes of that album linger here - in particular on the woozy electronics that turn 'Î'll Be Home For Christmas' into a codeine-fucked Christmas trip and the haunting upset of sinister acoustic guitar ballad 'Let It Snow! Let It Snow! Let It Snow!'. The darkness that gripped Stevens during his last outing seems to be still tugging at his heels. But compelling as those moments are,

more fun are the tracks where he puts his expansive imagination to use and lets go a little

- 'Christmas Unicorn' for instance, which, as batshit insane as it is irresistibly infectious, opens out into a 12-minute tangle of drummachine noises, symphonic flourishes and luminous synth melodies like a knot of treelights going haywire, before morphing into a cover of Joy Division's 'Love Will Tear Us Apart'. Elsewhere, The National's Aaron and Bryce Dessner turn up to cast their spell over 'Gloria', while 'Do You Hear What I Hear?' counts not just among Stevens' best Christmas songs, but his best songs full-stop.

In a career of constant reinvention that has seen him dally with folk, throbbing electronica and experimental future-pop, Stevens' fixation with Christmas has been one of two constants -the other being the unerring brilliance of his output (not counting his 2010 misstep, the 'All Delighted People' EP). Accompanying this release is a lengthy essay that attacks the concept of Christmas trees: "The Christmas tree has become nothing more than a symbol of environmental bondage," Stevens writes. "In a word, the Christmas tree is our bitch." And so long as he's making music this magical, if not entirely merry, we're all Stevens' slaves. Al Horner

oals' idiosyncratic way of warming up for new album 'Holy Fire' is a tour of towns they've rarely had cause to visit, playing venues about a tenth of the size they'd normally fill. We've missed them, the contrary buggers.

Filing onto The Leopard's tiny stage, only Yannis and fellow guitarist Jimmy Smith are able to fit at the front; their bandmates are stacked up behind them,

disappearing into the low ceiling. They're flanked by a couple of bouncers on a fruitless mission to prevent the capacity crowd from spilling over.

Twinkling arpeggios propel the slow-burning instrumental opener 'Pavlov', a song that offers a slightly misleading introduction to Foals 3.o. It's only when they launch into a rejuvenated 'Balloons' two songs later that the influence of the 'Holy Fire' sessions becomes apparent: the riffs are that much beefier, the pace less frenetic, and the emphasis is on funky, muscular

rhythms rather than the twitchy, fretwork-led Foals of old. Recently they told *NME* their new album was "swampy" with "grooves that are quite stinky" and that their "indie disco stuff's dead and buried with a chain of garlic around its neck". At the time we weren't quite sure what they were on about, but tonight all becomes clear.

Then comes 'Cleaver', which has Yannis imploring, "I'm an animal, just like you/Oh Lord, what can I do?" against a backdrop

of scurrilous rock riffage. During the song's lascivious instrumental break he finds himself clambering up the back wall, standing with arms aloft, lost in the ecstasy of it all, while the band continue to unleash merry hell onstage. It's Foals' weirdest direction yet, so far from their math-rock beginnings you have to wonder if it's still them. But they still

have the courage of their convictions – Foals have always been a band ready to speed off in the opposite direction from everyone else. Somehow, they always end up somewhere brilliant.

My Number' deviates less from the sonic blueprint established on the first two albums, coming on like a tropical cousin of 'Miami' from 'Total Life Forever', played earlier alongside a masterful

'Spanish Sahara', for which Yannis barely needs to sing, such is the volume of the crowd's accompaniment. Debut album 'Antidotes' is well represented too, with the aforementioned 'Balloons' as well as 'Electric Bloom', 'Olympic Airways' and a raucous encore of 'Two Steps Twice', which ends with both Yannis and various microphones surfing above the crowd.

We might only get to hear a measly four 'Holy Fire' cuts tonight, but there's plentiful evidence to suggest that 2013 is in safe hands. It's a brave man indeed who'd bet against Yannis' post-Inhaler' assertion that the third coming of his band is going to "smoke some bitches up, yo". Robert Webb.

Sheffield's techno-dub showman brings his multiple talents to London's rock'n'roll heart for one helluva party

he 100 Club wears its heritage on its sleeve. The walls are plastered with photos of blues pioneers, punk legends and, er, The Hives. It's a nook for stars on their way up and Toddla T - Thomas Bell to the taxman - is climbing that pole.

For the past two years, T's performed an impressive manoeuvre that has seen him go from poster boy for Sheffield's flagging UK bassline scene, to a bigname Radio 1 DJ with a sideline in producing massive pop albums. This past 12 months have seen him take his dancehall roadshow from Washington to Croatia, start work on a third album, and cap it all off by siring a child with his Radio 1 co-worker Annie Mac.

Mac's here tonight but keeping out of trouble as Roses Gabor offers gnarly support, spitting old-skool rhymes in alarmingly laddered tights and flashing the bling like Roxanne Shanté in cryogenic limbo from the '80s. It's a raw, engaging start, but Toddla T blows all that away with a video intro from fellow Sheffield folk hero Jarvis Cocker.

Toddla T – who is he?" drawls Cocker, as laconic as he's contractually obliged to be. Suddenly T's bopping behind the decks, looking like Example in a wind tunnel. His shtick's all techno dub - fiery, relentless and fun. Favourites such as 'Cherry Picking' are chucked

away early on like so much deep cut detritus. MCs Serocee and DRS vibe off each other to whip up the party.

A guest on last year's 'Watch Me Dance', '90s Brit soul star Shola Ama has become a bit of a muse to T and she rattles through her own hits 'You Might Need Somebody' and 'Taboo' as well as her Toddla collaboration 'Take Me Back'. Together they threaten to exhume UK garage in 2013. That might not even be a bad thing.

There are cheeky throwaways to keep the joint jumping, with DRS and Serocee freestyling over Sean Paul's 'Gimme The Light' and The Specials' 'Ghost Town'. But the control remains entirely in T's hands. He mugs and waves, ostentatiously twisting fictional knobs and pulls in the young, the old, the bearded and the bobble-hatted.

For years, Toddla T has been bringing the carnival to the people. Tonight he proves he's deserving of a framed snap behind the bar. Matthew Horton

The thing about being an internet sensation - something Abel Tesfaye (aka The Weeknd) has been for two years - is that you only exist on the internet. So in terms of experiencing his music you're contained within the realms of speakers and iPods. It's a solitary enjoyment. He has the added obstacle of total invisibility; besides one or two B&W images of his face obscured by a puff of smoke, the audience know nothing about him, other than perhaps he's a really stoned Wizard Of Oz.

So tonight, this crowd finally feel the music... together... in a room, where the 22-year-old from Ontario will perform. Is he half-man halfmachine? Is he a zitty geek? Does he have FIVE limbs?! No. Tesfaye is a humble yet cocky R&B vocal acrobat, here to get babies MADE.

He performs cuts from his first three free-download albums, now available physically and for money as 'Trilogy'. The set is heavy on the first and best LP, 'House Of Balloons', and climaxes during 'Wicked Games' and the title track, a drum-filled party jam sampling Siouxsie And The Banshees which is all the more thrilling given the stadium rock feel of his live band. here are few bands who can pull off being funny while actually being good. But Foxygen have got this nailed. The Cali quartet are not ones to take themselves too seriously. Their between-song patter is gloriously ridiculous, their music is giddy, exuberant and face-achingly infectious and they're not trying to be hilarious, see, they're just a bunch of wonderful weirdos and it tumbles out of every pore. Defying those boring conventions of 'traditional song structure' and 'not using your forehead as a percussive instrument', Foxygen

This was a support show for a band called Hundred Waters (no, us neither) but by the time Foxygen's 30-minute slot is over, it's clear who owned the night. They leave, joshing they have to make way for "a real band instead of this shit". Best. Fun. Ever. Lisa Wright



THE FORUM, LONDON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 25 oul singers of this calibre often have a hype man to

welcome them onstage. But Womack doesn't bring on the usual zoot-suited speed addict spitting a Pentecostal introduction along the lines of "Are you readah for tha GRAND DADDY OF SOOOOWLLL". Instead, Damon Albarn jogs onstage, whips up the cheers, and claps through Womack's opening acoustic gospel 'Deep River'. For a minute you wonder if you're here to watch Womack's latest and greatest reinvention or Damon loving it.

Albarn has been credited as the backroom architect of Womack's latest record 'The Bravest Man In The Universe', a record that revisits the raw grit of the earliest soul through minimalist fuzztronica and rap scatterbeats. But he's also Womack's most enthusiastic cheerleader, punching the air through the chilling subterranean throbs of 'Whatever Happened To The Times' and singing Lana Del Rey's parts on the chemical shuffle of 'Dayglo Reflection'. He's clearly in awe at breathing the same stage-dust as Womack.

After that half-hour preview of what Royal Albert Hall soul gigs will sound like in 2187, Womack returns with his full band to crack through an hour of classics such as 'Across 110th Street' and 'California Dreamin" in his traditional brass-blasted style, but even then Damon bops in the wings, high-fiving trumpeters, beckoning on the bongo solos and kneeling in honour as Womack leaves the stage. The new album's title track claims the bravest man in the universe is "the one who forgives first", but Damon's a constant reminder that it's the 68-year-old legend who quits a comfortable furrow to embrace edgy new textures. 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


