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

Broken belle

Despite a foot injury, Florence + The Machine build up to their huge summer at a tiny NYC gig

aving broken her foot during an energetic Coachella performance last month, Florence Welch's first New York show in three years saw her swapping flamboyance for intimacy. Spending the entirety of her 14-song set at Brooklyn's Music Hall Of Williamsburg last week sat on a stool, she showed off the contraption supporting the metatarsal injury sustained after jumping off the Californian festival stage. "I've upgraded – or rather downgraded - to a smaller mini-boot," quipped the Florence + The Machine frontwoman politely. "Thanks so much for understanding and for being so nice."

The 28-year-old singer and her band only announced the concert the day before the show but played to a sold-out crowd of 550. Proceedings started quietly, with just Welch, a harpist and guitarist onstage for opening tracks 'Cosmic Love', 'All This And Heaven Too' and 'Breaking Down'. Swelling in sound and size to 12 people for 'Ship To Wreck', the new song was the first of four from forthcoming third album 'How Big, How Blue, How Beautiful' – out June 1 – the others being the title track, 'St Jude' and set-closer 'What Kind Of Man'. She also aired her cover of 'Hospital Beds' by Cold War Kids and debuted a rendition of 'Only Love Can Break Your Heart' by Neil Young, who, Welch told the crowd, had thought she was a "man with a high voice" before they actually met. The fiercest audience reaction of the night came for the climactic, shamanistic stomp of 'Dog Days Are Over' - "the culprit of the broken foot" - but the mood was one of high-octane, excitable energy throughout, and even as Welch was carried offstage, her smile was one of triumph. ■ MISCHA PEARLMAN





ugust 16, 1980: a Saturday that will live in rock infamy. It was the day Jools

Holland quit Squeeze, Franz Ferdinand's Robert Hardy came into the world, and a young Sheffield band called Pulp played their first ever gig while smelling slightly of cabbage. Last Monday (May 4), Jarvis Cocker and co were honoured with a PRS for Music Heritage plaque commemorating the 35th anniversary of their live debut at the place where it all began, the Sheffield Leadmill. After the unveiling ceremony, NME caught up with the band to take a walk down memory lane and find out what the future might hold.

What do you remember about your first gig at the Leadmill?

Jarvis: "It was a festival and we were the second band on in the afternoon. It was the first time we'd been on a proper stage, and when our bass player started experiencing feedback he didn't know what to do, so he started walking towards the front of the stage and fell off it. People found us entertaining,

but only because we were a bunch of mad kids who didn't know how to play. We also made one of the best entrances of all time. There was a man across the vard with a mobile grocer's van, and we used that to transport our equipment.

We stunk of cabbage. I certainly wouldn't have thought that, 35 years on, there would be a plaque commemorating such an event!"

What makes the Leadmill so special to Sheffield? Steve Mackey: "If you were a local band, you felt that you'd at least be noticed if you managed to get a gig there. Back then, getting a spot at the Leadmill was how bands like us managed to get out of the rehearsal room."

Jarvis: "It seemed massive as well, didn't it? There was only one other place, The Limit,

which was just a small underground club. If you played at the Leadmill, that was a big, posh, proper concert. Some of our best concerts and some of our worst concerts took place here."

Go on, tell us about the worst one.

Jarvis: "The one that's in the film [Pulp: A Film About Life, Death & Supermarkets] happened here. That was when we tried to have the whole multimedia extravaganza, but the video projector was broken, so we had to have a telly with tinfoil on it. The bass player had put all these coloured things on his fretboard to make it look like a rainbow, but he'd covered all the dots up, so he kept playing wrong notes all the time. It was horrible."

And the best?

WAY FORWARD

FOR PULP NOW"

Jarvis: "We did a Christmas concert here in '89 where we gave everyone bingo cards when they

came in. Cleverly, we'd put all the same numbers on them, "PLAQUES ARE THE the same numbers on them, but they were all jumbled up in different orders. So when we read the numbers out onstage, everybody shouted 'House!' at the same time. and we went straight into 'This House Is Condemned'. Very high-concept stuff!"

Jarvis: (shaking head) "Steve and I are DJing here in four hours, so that's our next gig. But I'm thinking we might do a tour of venues we played 30 years ago, and just go around the country unveiling all these plaques; the next one will probably be the Adelphi in Hull, and we'll just go in chronological order from there. I think plaques are the way forward for Pulp now..." ■ BARRY NICOLSON

"A Black Widow movie would be cool. I'm always happy to put the catsuit back on. From your lips to Marvel's big-pocketed ears..." ■

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

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

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Deftones

t's a few days after the second anniversary of Deftones bassist Chi Cheng's death, and singer Chino Moreno is feeling "emotionally very heavy" having just laid down the vocals for the group's first album since Cheng's passing. Critically injured in a car crash in Santa Clara, California in November 2008, Cheng never regained consciousness, staying comatose until he eventually died on April 13, 2013.

"For five years I watched someone I'd grown up with and known my whole life - living in each other's pockets doing this band, a guy so full of expression and life - in this in-between state, just staring into nothing," says Moreno

sadly. "In the end it was kind of a relief. At least I know he's not suffering any more. There isn't a day I don't think about his vibe and his contribution to this band and my life."

As on 2010's 'Diamond Eyes' and 2012's 'Koi No Yokan' - with Sergio Vega standing in for Cheng on bass - the Sacramento alt-metal band have declined to deal with their loss in song on their as-yet-untitled eighth studio album, due out in October. "I think some of the feeling of missing him seeps into the music," says Moreno. "I've never gone into writing a song thinking, 'This is about this special person,' or anything like that. But naturally the feeling feeds through. We've all been affected."

Moreno describes the record as "out of the box" and full of "keyboards and a lot of cool, spacey low frequencies". Recording began in Los Angeles, where Moreno and his bandmates, for the first time, came to writing sessions with no ideas or parts. Instead, they let the songs spill out of "these organic jams... it was exactly how we had to do it, a clean slate. I've been on this crazy Morrissey tip recently - totally obsessing over his solo records - so I brought a lot of that to the table. On those early solo records, he uses this awesome, Elvis-v delay on his vocal that I've been ripping off a ton." He laughs. "He's always been a favourite lyricist of mine - the beautiful, poetic melancholy of it all."

Don't expect guitarist Stephen Carpenter to switch up his usual low-slung riffs for Smithsy jangles, though. "There are definitely heavy elements to the album," adds the frontman.

"But, as usual for us, the jagged and coarse bits only make the sweeter

parts even sweeter."

"It's cool to still be doing this after two decades. We didn't mean for this record to coincide with the 20th anniversary of the first album. but that's really cool."

Produced by British engineer Matt Hyde best known for his work with Slipknot - the album is still coming together. "I wish I had more for you," says Moreno. "But no album title, no track titles. The music's there, but the rest is still coming together. I've got nothing. Sorry!"

Its planned October release coincides with the 20th anniversary of Deftones' first album, 1995's 'Adrenaline'. Are


there any throwbacks to that album's leaner. more straight-up metal sound to mark the occasion? "No. Don't get me wrong, it's an awesome thing to think about, but to look back and try to recapture who we were then for nostalgia's sake? That'd just be awkward."

For the same reason, there'll be no anniversary tour, and no recreating the album in full. "We're happy looking forward," confirms Moreno. "I'm really excited for people to hear the new record. It's another chapter." ■ AL HORNER

THE BACKGROUND

An icon he may be, but sometimes Paul McCartney doesn't get the respect he deserves, maybe because next to sarky, saintly Lennon he can't help but seem a bit of a sentimental old softie. Yet, as a fan of experimental composer Stockhausen in his youth and a dabbler in electronica as one half of The Fireman in his autumn years, Macca has always been an experimenter, keen to embrace new techniques and unafraid to appear a little silly in the process. That, in a nutshell, is the story of 'McCartney II'. In 1979, with Wings gradually disintegrating, McCartney sat alone in his farmhouse in East Sussex surrounded by some state-of-the-art equipment - new synths, sequencers, and a hired Studer 16-track tape machine. The self-produced and largely self-performed result was experimental and playful - and greeted with a decidedly mixed reception.

FIVE FACTS

1'McCartney II' was originally conceived as a double album, comprising 20 songs that McCartney recorded between East Sussex and his farmhouse in Scotland. In the end, only 11 songs made the cut, but many of the outtakes were restored in a 2011 reissue.

The looping electronica experiment 'Secret Friend' (B-side to 'Temporary Secretary'/bonus track), is the longest solo Macca track of all time, clocking in at 10 minutes and 31 seconds.

The song Dogs, was inspired by Fungus The song 'Bogey Music' The Bogeyman, Raymond Briggs' popular 1977 picture book about a green monster. Lead single 'Coming Up' features McCartney's voice sped up and run through an echo machine. It was a Number Two hit in the UK, but in the US a Columbia record executive decided that Americans wanted to hear "Paul McCartney's real voice", so the record's B-side, a rockier live take of the song by Wings, was pushed out to radio stations.

Often disparaging of Macca's post-Beatles output, John Lennon declared 'Coming Up' "a good piece of work", and it reportedly prompted him out of retirement to make his final album, 'Double Fantasy'.

LYRICAL ANALYSIS

"Mr Marks, can you find for me/Someone strong and sweet fitting on my knee" - Temporary Secretary

The "Mr Marks" refers to a real recruitment agency, Alfred Marks Bureau, which amused McCartney because its proprietor shared his name with a comedian who worked alongside Peter Sellers and Spike Milligan.

"Don't go jumping waterfalls/Please keep to the lake/ People who jump waterfalls/ Sometimes can make mistakes" - Waterfalls

A mistily beautiful love song that would provide a lyrical cue to the TLC song of the same name.

"Check my machine/ Check check check my machine" - Check My Machine

A freaky reggae lope echoes Macca's state of mind as he rolls up his sleeves and gets stuck into his new technology.

WHAT WE SAID THEN

""McCartney II' isn't worth the plastic it's printed on. Neither is Paul, but he'll go on doodling and fooling his public because they're too frightened to ditch him and his past and he's too rich to be stopped" – Danny Baker, NME, June 21, 1980

WHAT WE SAY NOW

Wonky and experimental it may be, but 'McCartney II' feels ahead of its time. 'Front Parlour', a dreamy excursion on synth and drum machine, feels uncannily current, while the limber Talking Heads funk of 'Coming Up' and the dotty synth-pop of 'Temporary Secretary' demand a place on any solo Macca playlist.

FAMOUS FAN

"I grew up listening to 'Check My Machine' and generally dancing round the living room to it as a four- or five-year-old. I still listen a lot to the album now." — Alexis Taylor, Hot Chip

IN THEIR OWN WORDS

"I was fascinated with these things called synthesizers which had appeared on the scene – particularly with sequencers, I loved them. It was all new technology and I just wanted to see what it was all about, and have a go, and see what I can do with it." The Quietus, 2011

AFTERMATH

Despite mixed reviews, 'McCartney II' topped the UK charts, and Macca entered the '80s on the right foot, facing a new, synthesized future. 'Temporary Secretary' became a favourite at '00s hipster nightclub Trash, was brilliantly overhauled on 2005's remix album Twin Freaks and has been covered by Darkstar with Wild Beasts' Hayden Thorpe.

Wirral slackers carving out a niche – with a little help from Robbie Williams

n his day job, Hooton Tennis Club bassist Callum McFadden is a hydrographic surveyor, whose tasks involve mapping the riverbed along the Mersey. Today, the band are on his boat, filming a potential video for their single 'Katherine Sat On

The Arm Of Her Favourite Chair', as Journey's 'Don't Stop Believin' blares out of the speakers.

But rather than power ballads, the fast-rising quartet are purveyors of lo-fi slacker brilliance.

"We're inspired by the new garage explosion and the way Deerhunter and Ariel Pink work," says singer Ryan Murphy. "Just press record and make it up as you go along. It doesn't matter about mistakes – keep them in, because that's part of the charm."

The school friends were in various teenage bands together, before deciding to record "scuzzy, Jesus And Mary Chain-influenced noise" in the summer of 2013. The poppier, Pavement-esque 'Katherine...' – originally on an EP of "overly long song titles with girls' names"

– started life like several of their current tracks: it was an idea sung into Ryan's phone when he toured Europe with Robbie Williams. "I was working for this company recording bands live and then selling the CDs straight after," he explains, adding: "I went hiking with Robbie, got pally with [support act] Olly Murs. Taught him the difference between ice cream and sorbet."

Scouted by The Farm's bassist Carl Hunter, and signed to Heavenly after three gigs, Hooton gained

attention with debut single 'Jasper', all chiming Byrds guitars and somersaulting melodies. Bill Ryder-Jones – tagging along today and miming oral sex on a nearby pirate statue – is producing their debut album, 'Highest Point In Cliff Town', for which the quartet are attempting to retain their DIY spirit. "We used to do vocals in a wardrobe and made a snare mic out of a coat hanger," recalls guitarist

James Madden. "Going into a studio was intimidating, but Wild Bill built up our confidence by having us rerecord 'Katherine...' at his mum's house, surrounded by her chinchillas, geckos and dogs."

And that name? It's from a road sign for the Little Sutton-based tennis courts. "None of us are particularly good at topspins," admits Callum. ■ GARY RYAN

1 New material

The Libs have already got an album's worth of new songs ready, and they're planning to field test some of them. "We're making a record and coming up to test it out on Scotland," said Pete Doherty following their T In The Park booking.

2 New festival anthems

Of all the tracks they've spilled the beans on so far, 'Woke Up Again' seems the most likely to go down well under moonlight. Carl Barat has described it as "bouncy" and says it packs a "big singalong chorus".

3 They've got a lot to prove

First time around, The Libertines never made it to festival headliner status before imploding. Their 2010 Reading And Leeds reunion show saw them playing second fiddle to Arcade Fire. This time – finally – it's their name at the top.

4 They'll be trying to outdo Metallica at Reading And Leeds

"Reading has always been a special festival to me – it's where I misspent a lot of my youth," Carl said of the band's slot. "It's pretty dizzying to be headlining alongside Metallica – I used to love them when I was a kid. They were up there with Michael Jackson and James Dean."

5 Anything could happen

"We're absolutely honoured, but we haven't even thought about the festival shows yet," says Carl. "The album is the big thing right now, and then after that the big thing will be these gigs. I can't start thinking about what Gary [Powell, drummer] is going to wear onstage just yet."

▶Work a bar

If you fancy making some money off your festival blag, Barcode recruitment (barcoderecruitment.co.uk) are looking for bar staff to work at T In The Park, Latitude, Cornbury, Reading And Leeds and V Festival. Most positions are minimum wage.

CATFISH AND THE BOTTLEMEN

Van McCann had one instruction for his booking agent regarding festival season: say yes to everything. Kevin EG Perry meets up with the man fronting the band of the summer to talk sex, drugs and sticky toffee pudding

At first, he thinks it must have started raining. It's August 2014, moments before Catfish And The Bottlemen are due onstage at Reading Festival, and Van McCann can see crowds of people running towards the tent, pushing forward to squeeze inside. Then he looks outside and sees sunshine. "That's when I knew it was real," he says. "I thought they were coming in because it was pissing it down, but it was sunny. When we went on they knew all the songs. Our album wasn't even out yet. It was *mental*."

After tearing through their set, Van walked offstage and noticed the band's management team were crying tears of joy. "I think everyone was kind of taken aback," he says. "Playing T In The Park and then Reading and Leeds last year were real game-changers for us. Before that we'd been playing 50–100-capacity venues, and they'd been crazy – but then at the festivals it was just as crazy and there were 4,000 more people."

A lot has happened since then. In the past six months, the band released debut album 'The Balcony', which duly hit the Top 10 and went gold. Meanwhile, their live reputation has grown to the point that they sold out two nights at London's 5,000-capacity O2 Academy Brixton this November – within nine minutes of tickets going on sale. "That's 10,000 tickets," marvels Van. "Could we have sold 20,000 in 20 minutes? You're on your way to stadiums then, aren't you?"

Ahead of this summer, Van had a simple instruction for the band's booking agent: 'Say yes to everything.' You'll therefore be able to see Catfish And The Bottlemen at Glastonbury, Radio 1's Big Weekend, Rock Werchter, Bilbao BBK, T In The Park, Latitude, Longitude, Boardmasters, Festival No 6 and Reading And Leeds. If your town's got a village fête, they'll probably turn up and play that too.

"I love festivals," says Van. "We started the band when we were so young that we always said: 'We're not going to that festival unless we play it.' We never went to Glasto or Leeds or anything like that. I never really liked them until we played them last year. You always have to drag your gear through the mud and you're never allowed into the posh

bit where the Arctic Monkeys are eating. Now we've earned our way into different areas. Now we're having sticky toffee pudding for dessert... and more!"

When Van arrives in east London on the day of his first *NME* cover shoot he's clean-shaven, grinning from ear to ear and already buzzing about the summer ahead of him. "I had a big ginger beard this morning but I've just shaved it off. I've got loads of cuts. I look like a mug," he says. "I can't believe I'm doing a cover shoot. That's mad. I'm well too ugly for cover shoots, me."

We head to a bar, where he orders a pint of Guinness and heads outside to smoke in the sun and reminisce about bygone festivals. Having spent his teenage years on tour, Van's only real memory of going as a punter was V Festival in 2009. "I only went to that because it was close and all the girls at school were going," he says. "We got a lift off one of them and bought one ticket between eight of us so it was only a tenner each. We

passed it through the fence." It meant he got to see his two favourite bands: The Streets and Oasis. The Gallagher brothers played their last ever show together that weekend. "They sounded class," says Van. "I love bands like The Strokes and Arctic Monkeys, but they don't come close to Oasis for me. They sounded enormous."

At Catfish And The Bottlemen's own festival shows, Van wants to keep things simple. "No pyrotechnics, no big light show, just the hits," he says. "Live is our thing. I'm not saying no other bands can touch us, but that's our expertise. I think there are so many bands who are better than us as at recording, writing songs, singing and playing guitars or whatever, but in terms of creating an atmosphere I think we're the best. At this year's festivals, no band will throw a rave like we can."

He thinks part of their appeal is in knowing exactly what the audience want.



"I like playing the singles," he says. "I don't understand why Radiohead don't want to play 'Creep'. I remember Caleb from Kings Of Leon kicking up a fuss about 'Sex On Fire'. He was throwing his guitar down onstage and saying, 'You're only here for one song.' It's like, so? You wrote it! Don't put it on the fucking album then! Don't buy nice jackets with the money it's made you. You love some aspects of it. I'd love to get three albums deep, if the fans believe in it enough and the songs are right, because our Glastonbury headline set would just be greatest hits. No album tracks, no B-sides, no messing about with the shit songs."

It's Van's relentless ambition that's got Catfish And The Bottlemen where they are today, and he won't be truly happy at festivals until he's headlining the Pyramid Stage. "I like it when a band just takes headliner status, instead of being bestowed with it just because it's about time," he says. "No band since the Arctic Monkeys has done that. With us, the fans have made us and I want that to continue. I'd love for Glastonbury to say: 'Well, it has to be them.' I'd love for it to not even be rumoured. They'd just say: 'Well, it has to be them because of what they've done this year, and what their songs have done.' I'd love it if we could force our way in."

In keeping with his 'just play the hits' philosophy, don't expect to hear any of the band's already-written second album this summer. "New tracks are worse than playing album tracks!" says Van. "Nobody will know them."

He will say that he's confident the next record, when it does come out, will comfortably surpass the youthful exuberance and teenage wet dreams of 'The Balcony'. "I think a little bomb will go off in the music industry and people will go, 'Who's making all that racket?" he says. "It's miles better

than the last album. The band's 10 times better, the crew's 10 times better, we're all 10 times better looking. I wanted to make a life-affirming record for normal heads. People who get up and just want to have a good day. They'll put this on and think, 'Fuck, this feels mint.' It's proper arms-out music. I want to make you feel the way The Strokes did, but with the enormity of Oasis and the lyrics of The Streets."

One thing he can confirm is that there'll be no wanky guitar solos. In fact, Van might ditch his guitar altogether because the band's guitarist Johnny 'Bondy' Bond is "so good he plays like there's 10 of him anyway". As for Van: "I've hated guitar since I started. It hurts my hands. It's heavy. It cost me money to buy when I was a kid. They break. They all sound shite and out of tune anyway. I hate face-melting guitar solos. Why would I want to melt anyone's face? I got into music to make lads bounce, girls blush and my dad feel proud. I didn't get into it to melt someone's fucking head off."

Van McCann on his favourite festival memory

"We played at the Governors Ball festival in New York, I saw OutKast and I remember seeing Jack White walk past with his security quards around him like the Red Arrows. It was also the first time I ever saw The Strokes. That was a big moment for me. I was 21 and in New York, it was roasting hot and I'd found something to smoke. I was loving it. They played 'Someday' and I was just thinking, 'This is it! This is my fucking tune!' Me being me though, I was also thinking, 'Julian doesn't really get the crowd going, does he?' He was smashed. I wasn't into that. It was amazing to see them, but I wasn't going, 'Oh my god, The Strokes!' It wasn't quite everything I dreamt it would be, but it was still mega."

me. I definitely do fancy models though, if that's what you're asking."

Van can always rely on his "shitty cottage" in Chester to bring him back down to earth, as he explains: "We got home at four in the morning for our night off and we had no electricity. It was ice cold, pitch black, I had six jackets on and I was eating tagliatelle on the floor getting stoned with no music, no phone, no internet, no nothing. I was thinking, 'Is this how Kings Of Leon did it?' This was months after we'd sold out Brixton Academy. I was thinking, 'Are we doing this right?' Larry was giving it the 'Ah, but we're keeping our feet on the ground'. I said, 'Isn't that what rock'n'roll's about? Aren't you supposed to lose your feet for a bit?"

We finish our pints and head over to the photo studio where Van will have his portrait taken for this magazine. There's no rest for the wicked: after this, he'll be rejoining his bandmates for more live dates in America and Europe, and then heading into a studio in the next couple of weeks to start recording demos for the second Catfish And The Bottlemen album. Right now though, Van is putting on The Streets and putting aside any worries about looking like a mug. He laughs when he sees his leatherclad image flash up on the photographer's laptop. "Fucking hell," he says, "am I the bad boy of rock?" At least he's got his shades on, which is handy. Whatever the festival weather this summer, Van McCann is gonna spend his days in the sunshee-iiiine.

▶Think local

'Chances are Jack White's agent isn't even going to acknowledge your emails. Support your local scene by booking bands and DJs from the area."

▶Get a licence

'We didn't have one in our first year, and got away with saying it was a private party, but activities like selling alcohol or the performance of live music need a licence. You can apply for these from the local council, who should give you free advice.'

▶Buy loads of booze

"A surefire way to end a party is to run out of stock, so make sure you've got plenty of booze."

▶Beg, borrow, build

"With a bit of ingenuity you should be able to beg, borrow or build most things you need. We used an old trampoline

for our stage and got a soundsystem from our school. The caretaker let us wheel it up the road in a shopping trolley in return for a case of beer! You can get a Portaloo craned into your garden for under £100. Not only will this legitimise your operation by providing an authentic festival experience, it will save you a momentous plumbing disaster."

▶Promote it the old-school way

"Social media has a reputation for encouraging gatecrashers. Word of mouth and small DIY posters are the best way to spread the word. You'll most likely want to name your festival after yourself. It's hilarious at the time, but will get embarrassing if it grows into something bigger. I should know...? Leefest is taking a fallow year in 2015 but will return on a grander scale in 2016.


►Wear anything offensive

"We've got a new structure for the other stage. Currently it's the standard dome stage, which you see everywhere. The new one is a rectangular stage, which hasn't been seen anywhere, and then on the front of it, Joe Rush has done an amazing installation. My project is to try to give The Other Stage its own identity because it's an amazing stage with so much incredible music on it."

▶Prince isn't playing

"Every year people say Prince is playing. He's not."

►There'll be flying Mexicans

"We've got Mexican aerialists coming – some of the team found them at a festival in Mexico. They do this incredible show suspended from a 20-foot pole, and dance around in the air at a great height. For the welcome ceremony on Wednesday afternoon, we're having a procession to the Theatre and Circus field, where the pole will go in and stay for the rest of the weekend, and they'll do a show every day."

She had death threats over Kanye

"I had death threats after Kanye was announced. It got quite heavy on Twitter. But we looked into that whole petition against him headlining and it turned out that most of the



people on it were in America and they didn't even know what Glastonbury was. They're just anti-Kanye. We all know his set will be an incredible moment, and I've got no doubt he will pull out all the stops."

►The line-up is about to get much bigger


"There are thousands of acts still to announce. We've only given you 75 names so far, and I think we've had the most positive response to the line-up in a long time."

Selfie sticks are welcome – for now

"The Isle of Wight is a magical place. People love the adventure of getting on the ferry, the escapism of leaving everyday life behind. Maybe

it's not as exotic as Ibiza or Croatia, but it has its special brand of exoticism, and on an island you get the feeling people can't get to you.

This year's theme is Summer of Love, because last year there was so much bad shit going on, and there still is. From earthquakes to shootings to UKIP, it's kinda bleak. We don't wanna come over as airy-fairy, but we think the 50–55,000 people who come to Bestival are active and want change. So on the one hand it's a jokey, Woodstocky vibe, but on the other it's serious: we don't have to live like this.

We've got a new fitness area called Slow Motion – yoga, chanting, meditation, fitness classes, wild runs, stuff off-site like mountain boarding and rock climbing. It's an antidote to the insanity of the 24-hour Bestival experience. People can still party and rave, but you might wake up on the Saturday and go, 'Wow, I need a change of pace.' Or you could just spend the whole weekend there!"

He's one of the world's great performers

The Yeezus tour was a conceptual extravaganza inspired by Alejandro Jodorowsky's 'The Holy Mountain' and centred on a 50ft-tall volcano. His festival shows have previously involved full-face masks, ballet dancers and gigantic ancient-Roman imagery. His Brits performance has already gone down as one of the rawest in the show's history. Whatever he's got up his sleeve for Glastonbury, it won't be run-of-the-mill.

There'll be new material

We've got a title and a possible cover, but still no release date for Kanye's incoming seventh album, 'Swish'. If it doesn't drop before Glastonbury, we should at least come away with a better idea of what it will sound like.

▶Macca

The yearly speculation over who'll be joining who on the Pyramid Stage usually comes to nothing because everyone wants to show that they're able to pull off a headline set in their own right. Kanye, though, is unlikely to be approaching this gig from a 'prove yourself' perspective, and recent collaborator Paul McCartney is free that weekend...

▶lt's way overdue

It's been seven years since Jay Z smashed through the glass ceiling, but Kanye is the first

but kanye is the first hip-hop headliner to follow in his footsteps. His booking has caused controversy, but in truth it's long overdue. The biggest rapper in the world should be headlining the best festival in the world.

"Over the years, I've played Rockness, Bestival, Latitude, Reading And Leeds and Hydro Connect - which I would like to go on record and say was a bag of shit, and I'm glad it's dead. I don't know if 'raucous' is the correct term to describe festival crowds, but at a normal gig there's far less chance of some guy wandering in absolutely off his face on ecstasy. At regular shows, you'll go on at eight in the evening and everyone is there to see you, but at a music festival you're not the main event. Realistically, you're a break in the day: people will come and see you because they're hungover and they want a 25-minute break from listening to drum'n'bass, but you can totally turn that to your advantage if the crowd are in a party mood, you

can leave the stage feeling like a god.

If someone's being drunk and mouthy, musicians have an obvious advantage because they can play their guitar louder and no-one will hear them, whereas we have to rely much more on timing and silences. That said, I can definitely call a punter a cunt in more creative ways than a musician can: I played Latitude when I was 19, and even though I was having a pretty good gig, some guy kept calling out, 'You're shit! You're shit!' and I can't remember exactly what I came back with, but it was something to do with his uncle fucking him. I wasn't overly intelligent with my heckle retorts back then - it was more about going for the jugular and shutting them up as quickly as fucking possible."

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

▶Cut travel costs

"If you're going to one of the big festivals, find people sharing lifts online and split the cost of petrol. If you're taking the train, try to book at least 12 weeks in advance to bag the cheapest tickets. See if buying an annual railcard is worth it – most will give you a third off. Pay for petrol and train tickets on a cashback credit card to regain some of the cost, though always remember to repay in full."

► Head to the pound shop

"It's not worth kitting yourself out with top-priced essentials when the likelihood is they'll get muddy or get lost. Head to the pound shop for cheap torches, batteries, ponchos and bin bags. If they only last you the festival, you've not lost much."

▶Bulk buy toiletries

"Baby wipes and dry shampoo are the extent of washing when it comes to festival stays, but buying small packets and cans can be pricey. Club together with friends to spot bargain buys and two-for-one offers and share the costs."

Don't take your smartphone - go retro

"A muddy field, dancing around without a care and sleeping in a potentially damp tent don't add up to an ideal environment for your smartphone. Don't take the risk – many of us will have a

classic Nokia lying around.

If it still works, grab a
cheap Sim and party

Isaac Holman: "We've got a good feeling!" Laurie Vincent: "You earn the chance to showcase your band at festivals; it's like your vegetable you've been growing all year and you're taking it on show. We definitely weren't ready for a while, but when we got the chance we took it and now it's building. You can't beat the feeling of someone singing your songs back to you. We have the potential to gain 10,000 new fans on these big stages, do you know what I mean? Turn Slaves up on the NME/Radio 1 Stage and the whole campsite's gonna be hearing our music. I used to camp in the yellow area at Reading, so I know."

Give us your best festival survival tips then...

Laurie: "I find festivals really hard, a proper marathon - by the end I'm not drinking

or anything, I literally get headaches. You don't drink water; you just wake up and drink beer. For some reason you act like a fucking freak."

Isaac: "Why would you do that? Because you're in a field with loads of people, so you're allowed to? I've definitely lost my marbles at a few festivals. They're dangerous, man. My advice is: be careful." Laurie: "I think my tip is it's good to watch it on TV at home and not go!" Isaac: "Don't just sit in the campsite and not be bothered to move, that's another one." Laurie: "But that's so fun sometimes."

You're snappy dressers. How do you maintain that in the mud?

Laurie: "It's shit - this year I'm just gonna dedicate myself to ruining whatever I wear, I think it looks cool. I'm gonna get a fresh white outfit for each one and see how fucked it gets. Julian Casablancas used to do that, didn't he?"



Isaac: "Maybe a coat stand. That's probably it. We'll put a couple of rain macs on it."

It'll have the feel of a boutique festival

"We're not making it smaller. The term I'd use would probably be more 'picturesque'. It's surrounded by mature woodlands and the topography is different, whereas the old site was flat as it was an old airfield. There are a lot of rolling hills and you've got a castle, so people will be watching the Main Stage with a castle in the background. It is a country estate - it'll have that feel to it. So I was trying to be evocative of

a boutique festival, but no, we're not making it any smaller. It's still going to be T In The Park. It's got the same energy, passion and vibrancy that we've always had there, and that's

because we've got the same audience and it's the audience who bring that energy to the party."

You get to camp at Strathallan Castle

"The camping arcs around the arena, and it sets in where the castle is as well, so guite a lot of the campers will see the castle and the lake from where they are. It's a beautiful location. There'll be more than one entrance to the campsite, so people may have less walking to do, but being part of a festival is just wandering about and discovering new things and meeting new people."

It'll have a similar vibe to Glastonbury's Shangri-La

"The new location gives us more scope because we've got copses to create things around - a mix of lighting, seating and music - and dress it all up and put in that kind of vibe. This site lends itself to that. We're not going to mirror other festivals, because we'll still be T In The Park, but it allows us to be creative. The old site was too open to create."

"However, early indications for the upcoming summer suggest that June, July and August will see temperatures around or slightly below average for the time of year, with rainfall perhaps above average, particularly in the south of the UK."



"You should invest in a few extras: groundsheets tend to get the most wear, so a separate groundsheet to go under the sewn-in one can help to extend your tent's life. And buy some extra pegs – these are easily lost and most tents only come with the minimum number you'll need."








Aided by '80s soft-rockers, a
Pet Shop Boy and a Haim, the
Killers frontman dives back into
the dry ice on solo album two

Ex-cons, lost angels, stalkers, the struggling, the lonely and the damned. If Brandon Flowers' 2010 solo debut 'Flamingo' celebrated home, faith and the romance of the Mojave Desert, his second, 'The Desired Effect', takes a grittier view on Fabulous Las Vegas. On 'Diggin'



Up The Heart', a housebreaker returns from the state pen tormented by dreams of damnation and unable to change his criminal ways. 'Lonely Town' sees a jilted loner break into his ex's house, knife in hand and reason running red. A hooker from a broken home – "born lost and dirt blonde" – sneers at the kerb-crawling traffic during 'Never Get You Right'. Throw in a terminal illness and some hard drugs and HBO would be biting Brandon's hand off to make it into a mini-series.

But if the lyrical content reads like a full-length cinema cut of 'Hot Fuss' opener 'Jenny Was A Friend Of Mine' (which told the story of a man being questioned about a woman's murder), musically it sits at the more recent end of The Killers' oeuvre. Having lived out all of his Bono, Morrissey, Simon Le Bon and Springsteen fantasies with his main band, the 33-year-old Flowers has been using his solo albums to explore the slicker, cornier US mainstream end of the '80s. 'Flamingo' emulated Fleetwood Mac, Heart, Kate Bush and Tom Petty, and this time he mullets to the max, rolls his blazer sleeves to the elbow and throws himself even deeper into the dry ice. With the help of some authentic '80s soft-rock names such as Peter Gabriel bassist Tony Levin and Kenny Aronoff, drummer for heartland rocker John Mellencamp, he and Haim producer Ariel Rechtshaid out themselves as true Friends Of Foreigner on the plush, misty likes of 'Between Me And You',

FLOWERS ARRANGING

Neil Tennant

Neil and Brandon have history – they've been friends for some years and Brandon sang with Pet Shop Boys at the Brits in 2009. So when Flowers needed a spoken-word part for 'I Can Change' he texted Tennant asking him to record himself speaking the chorus line on his phone and send it on. It took roughly 20 seconds.

Danielle Haim

Last summer, Danielle made a surprise appearance with The Killers on drums in LA; now Haim's lead guitarist crops up drumming and providing backing vocals on 'Lonely Town' and 'I Can Change'.

Bruce Hornsby

Once the frontman of Bruce Hornsby And The Range and then a regular touring member of The Grateful Dead, Hornsby is a bona fide '80s legend thanks to his sizzly soft-rock classic 'The Way It Is'. um pads and guitar riffs designed to sound like Lear jets buzzing the Grand Canyon. Retro synthpopper 'I Can Change' samples Bronski Beat's 1984 hit 'Smalltown Boy' and features Pet Shop Boy Neil Tennant intoning backing vocals.

Flowers finds wriggleroom to experiment though, particularly on the more thematically colourful tracks. On propulsive opener 'Dreams Come True' he assumes the role of a dusty busker fantasising of the limousine life to the sound of blazing horns, Paul Simon bass and crisp modern beats. 'Still Want You' declares its unflinching love in a world of "climate change and debt" over tin-can percussion and synthetic marimbas. The murderous stalker of 'Lonely Town' breaks into his ex's place to Auto-Tuned gospel refrains; the ex-con holding up a bank clerk in the cracking 'Diggin' Up The Heart' makes his escape to pulsing pop synths and line-dancing country-rock hooks; and the snarling prostitute of 'Never Get You Right' turns her tricks to serrated slashes of heavily treated strings.

For all its slavering

over '80s production cheese, 'The Desired Effect' is an impressive collection that even includes an uncharacteristic wobble of faith. "Everybody's sitting around waiting for the Son to come again", he croons on the swelling country of 'The Way It's Always Been', "and hoping that he's really got the power to save us from these sins". But even if the big JC lets us all down, Brandon's own Second Coming undoubtedly delivers.

Its touchstones - hints of Bruce Springsteen on 'FFwd To The Freeze Frame', Ryan Adams on 'Tyrekickers' run the gamut of heritage rock, and despite its diversity, its experiments feel predictable. 'Just Above Midtown', which has Blood Orange's funky exuberance, is a welcome curveball, but too often 'Motorcade Amnesiacs' watches interesting ideas fly by as it cruises down the middle of the road. The centrepiece is a 10- minute swirl of three-note guitar and Mark E Smith's vocal inscrutability called 'Auto Chip 2014-2016' ("How bad are English musicians?" he snarls). Elsewhere, the sextet's belated embrace of new media - they launched their first official website in January - is balanced by 'Quit iPhone"s consumertech disgruntlement and an enthusiastic paean to social-media malcontents called 'Fibre Book Troll'. Marvellous.



The Las Vegas singer's debut digs into Prince and '80s dance bangers, but with a fresh slant

For someone born in 1994, Shamir Bailey has managed to absorb a hell of a lot of the soulful plasticity of music made in the '80s. The Las Vegas singer's debut contains all the ingredients of vintage dance bangers: metronomic drum machines like Chicago DJ Jesse Saunders ('Head In The Clouds'): melodic synth lines punctuated by bursts of dissonance reminiscent of Frankie Knuckles' 'Baby Wants To Ride' ('Make A Scene'); androgynous vocals that borrow from gospel like Prince on 'When Doves Cry' ('Hot Mess'). For all that, this record still sounds fresh, full of warmth, spontaneity and spark. It helps, too, that 'On The Regular', 'Call It Off' and 'In For The Kill' are stone-cold pop anthems, bouncing between Azealia Banks hip-house, elastic disco and the strut of

a drunken Hercules & Love Affair. 'Darker', meanwhile, is a brooding ballad of strings and drums that shows another side to Shamir, making 'Ratchet' the perfect summer soundtrack.

While the nuances of 'Warm Palms' and the gloopy '3D Milk' - on which Nathan Hewitt dreamily sings "Sleep for hours" - are buried beneath fragmented studio treatments, closer 'Wash Out' ensures the record finishes on a disorientating high. 

guarantees vou a million-seller, Muppets songwriter Paul Williams makes a strange match for hip French electro - there was another compelling discovery: live drums still sound fantastic on a dance record. Daft Punk had Michael Jackson and Miles Davis collaborator Omar Hakim doing the business: Hot Chip have their rather less starry touring member Sarah Jones, but the effect doesn't waver. Powered by Jones' beats, the quintet's sixth album, 'Why Make Sense?', has an organic power that puts it a cut above their previous machine-driven efforts.



This fresh muscle shows that, 15 years into their career, Hot Chip are making an explicit attempt to capture their live energy and change their approach. Who wants to be static anyway? The group's new, natural sound is most obvious on the title track -

a churning groove amplified by churchy organ – and on first single 'Huarache Lights'. On the latter, fat, chewy beats ground a sweet tale of singer Alexis Taylor's joy at going out DJing ("I know every single we play tonight will make the people just bathe in the light"), an unexpectedly exciting sample of Philadelphian disco group First Choice's 1977 dancefloor classic 'Let No Man Put Asunder', and a lot of larking about with a vocal-distorting talkbox.

They use the talkbox – a funk favourite of the 1970s when chipping out old-school R&B matched by disco strings on the fluid 'Love Is The Future', which features De La Soul's Posdnuos rapping over an itchy, hyperactive rhythm. The lope of 'White Wine And Fried Chicken', meanwhile, may have Marvin Gaye's children making fantasy royalties calculations. Hot Chip indulge Clavinet – think Stevie Wonder's 'Superstition' – on the clipped, funky 'Started Right', before rediscovering their modern touch for the garage house of 'Need You Now', a song apparently inspired by the threat of terrorism that laments "a world that's just gone wrong" over sparse electro beats and bleeps.

It's a rare paranoid moment on a record that mostly finds Hot Chip carefree, revelling in the absence of layers of electronic adornment. Stripped back to basics and muttering against the machines, they've never come on so strong. MATTHEW HORTON

'Beautiful' are deliberately jarring, and don't necessarily equate to a pleasurable listen. 'So Happy So Sad' is full of dense, claustrophobic synths and 'Keep Up"s frantic pace is exhausting. When the pair aren't trying to be smart - as on the summery acoustic jangle of 'Just Fine' or the '80s newwave bounce of 'Catch Me' - this fourth album works. but enforced darkness just doesn't suit them. that the dog has eaten your homework, Becoming Real (aka Toby Ridler) says his debut is late because he lost the files for a nearcompleted album back in 2013. For the love of creating music that sounds fresh and well edited, starting from scratch is no

bad thing, and these 12 short tracks mark a giant leap forwards for the Glasgow-based producer. Flashes of electronic R&B ('SPS 7', 'Only Real') meet with bleepy techno ('DARE', 'Rude'), dubbed-out soundscapes ('Comets Pull', 'Tibetan Moves') and ambient house ('Kick Flip', 'Pure Apparition'). If Sheer Mag's debut seven-inch didn't alert you to their

Back To Milk

Beth Jeans Houghton reemerges with a cock-rock image and songs that snarl like the Arctics and The Runaways

Reinvention is the 2015 thing to do: we've got Mumford & Sons kitting out at World Of Leather and pawning their banjos, The Vaccines jacking up on candy pop at Dave Fridmann's studio and Laura Marling channelling Dire Straits. None of them, however, have attempted guite such a complete and total rebirth as Beth Jeans Houghton, whose reincarnation as Du Blonde spins the Newcastle-born, LA-based singersongwriter's look, sound and attitude on its head.

The 25-year-old's debut album, 2012's 'Yours Truly, Cellophane Nose', cast her as a pop star spawned from the imagination of Phoebe from Friends, an unabashed uber-kook with a band named The Hooves Of Destiny



and a penchant for mindbending pixie pop. To see Beth in her new incarnation, you'd assume Du Blonde killed and ate the old Houghton in a forest, and took the face to wear as a mask. That's her on the cover under Cali-punk lettering, rocking a bleach-blonde merkin

and looking like the hell spawn of Dave Lee Roth. Even the song titles come straight from the cock-rock handbook: 'Raw Honey', 'After The Show', 'If You're Legal', 'Mr Hyde'.

The music reflects this new image, bringing in snarling, Runaways-style vocals, raging guitars and thunderous drums, a stall set out neatly by the riotous, Arctic Monkeys-like opening track 'Black Flag' and 'Chips To Go', which follows it with funk-rock flavour and the screaming chorus line "If love is just a word for us, then why did I goddam let it hold me down?"

Clearly, Houghton's found fertile ground in connecting with her inner rage monster, but there's a different side to the album too: anthemic glam rock reminiscent of Bowie's work with guitarist Mick Ronson. It's there in spectral power ballad 'Hunter' and 'Five Years'-like 'After The Show' and, towards the end of the album, in 'Mind Is On My Mind', which Future Islands'

Samuel T Herring guests on, his vocal booming in like a communiqué from deep space. There's a clear kinship: Future Islands have managed to sneak something out-there into the mainstream. Thanks to this strong set, Du Blonde should do the same. DAN STUBBS

King Gizzard & The Lizard Wizard

Quarters! Heavenly



'Quarters!', King Gizzard & The Lizard Wizard's sixth album,

consists of four 10-minute songs and has cartoonish drawings of crocodiles and dragons adorning its sleeve. Fans of last year's brilliant 'I'm In Your Mind Fuzz' album will be enticed by how odd that sounds, but musically 'Quarters!' misfires. The Australian psych sevenpiece remain immensely tight, but scattershot riffs and breakneck drums have been replaced by slow guitar noodling and muted basslines. Wandering in on a jazzy riff, opener 'The River' ensures a drowsy start. 'Infinite Rise' and 'God Is In The Rhythm' are better, powered by harder-hitting drums and the fuzzy funk of Unknown Mortal Orchestra. But things unravel again on loose, crawling finale 'Lonely Steel Sheet Flyer', which ends this surprisingly sedate record with a whimper.

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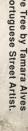
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Lambert

& Stamp

An illuminating doc nails the tale

of The Who's charismatic managers

It's ironic that Kit Lambert and Chris Stamp, the subjects of this hugely entertaining documentary, got

into the music business because they thought they'd find the subject matter to realise their real dream of making a movie. Lambert and Stamp started managing The Who in 1964, and here, first-time director James D Cooper tells the tale of the odd couple who guided the band to fame and fortune.

Cooper's friend Chris Stamp, the younger brother of actor Terence and the son of a Thames tugboat captain. was raised in the working-class environs of London's East End. He met the more erudite Kit Lambert, whose

father was a classical composer, when they were both assistants at Shepperton Studios in the early '60s. Despite their different backgrounds, the pair bonded over a love of French New Wave cinema, and trawled the pubs and clubs of London looking for suitable silverscreen subjects. After finding The High Numbers (as The Who were known then), Lambert and Stamp were able to get around their lack of money, connections and prior experience by acting on their

instincts and passions and showing a commendable disdain for conventional thinking. As The Who's guitarist and main songwriter Pete Townshend puts it: "I loved them immediately. They changed my life forever." He also says that his only problem with Lambert's homosexuality (still illegal back then) was that he never made a move on Townshend himself.

The film is at its best when concentrating on the turbulent and tumultuous '60s. With the help of some

incredible archive footage - witness Townshend hesitantly unveiling 1967 track 'Glittering Girl' on acoustic guitar for his bosses - and extensive interviews with Townshend and The Who's only other surviving member, Roger Daltrey, we get an insider's view of Lambert and Stamp's role in their rise: placing the band at the heart of the mod movement, settling internal scraps and, in Lambert's case, pushing his dad's collection of classical LPs on Townshend in order for


> success with the likes of Jimi Hendrix and The Crazy World Of Arthur Brown.

Cooper's movie understandably gets darker when, after the release of 1969 rock opera 'Tommy', money, drug addictions and disputes over who should make the cinema version wrecked the group's relationship with their bosses. Stamp's drug and alcohol addictions saw him end up in rehab, while Lambert's descent into heroin

abuse started a downward spiral that led to his death from a cerebral haemorrhage sustained after falling down the stairs in his mother's house in 1981, aged 45. Towards the documentary's close, Stamp mentions letting go of his teenage dream of making a film, his acceptance all the more moving as he, too, passed away in 2012. It's heartening to know, however, that Lambert and Stamp have finally got what they always wanted. ■ ALAN WOODHOUSE

In 2010, English folk singer Steve Tilston found a letter John Lennon had

The story inspired this directorial debut from Dan Fogelman, starring Al Pacino as Danny Collins, a fictional rock star who realises his career is "bullshit" after receiving a decades-old letter from the Beatles legend. Though riddled with clichés (Collins likes drink, drugs and younger women), there are memorable performances from Pacino, Annette Bening as his lover and Christopher Plummer as his sardonic manager. The soundtrack features nine Lennon songs and a score co-composed by Ryan Adams, who supplies the lovely ballad 'Still, Was'. ■ NICK LEVINE

Wyrmwood: Road Of The Dead



In February. Wyrmwood: Road Of The Dead was the most illegally downloaded film

in the world. It's clear why. This hot-blooded debut from Australian brothers Kiah and Tristan Roache-Turner is grimly enjoyable. The pair conceived their crowdfunded flick - starring little-known Aussie actors - as a mix of Dawn Of The Dead and Mad Max, but its pace, intensity and shock value give it its own niche. The plot - mechanic Barry (Jav Gallagher) tears around Australia to save his sister Brooke (Bianca Bradey) from the zombies and the experiments of a mad doctor - is patchy, but the action makes up for it. 

Super Furry Animals



Cardiff pop legends play marathon comeback show - and, yes, they brought the yetis too

> For a band with such a forward-thinking outlook as Super Furry Animals, it seemed initially surprising that the *main reason behind their first tour in six years is to mark a couple of anniversaries.

However, the dates - which begin officially tonight inside a sweaty university hall in the city the Furries regard as home - were booked to plug the 15th-anniversary reissue of their Welsh-language album 'Mwng', as well as marking 20 years since their first EP. It's an appropriate time to remind people of the synapse-shredding brilliance of one of the UK's best ever groups, especially as there remains a nagging feeling that their excellence was taken somewhat for granted. As singer Gruff Rhys told *NME* recently, "It's nice to remind people what we've done" - namely recording a peerless back catalogue and developing a reputation for performing astonishing gigs. Their followers' giddy excitement can be sensed the minute you walk in the venue. Many fans are here with their kids, most of

whom will have never witnessed the Furries' magical mayhem.

The band, dressed like mad scientists in white boiler suits, tear through a dizzying blur of frantic psych pop (a demented 'Do Or Die', the naughty glam of 'Bad Behaviour') early on. The crowd show they share their idols' commendable attention to detail by singing along to intricate harmonies, crunchy guitar riffs and even the brass parts that pleasingly embellish the dreamy 'Demons' and 'Northern Lites" crazy calypso - their back-toback airings kicking off a mellow mid-section dominated by a batch of songs off 'Mwng'.

In an act of typical perversity, SFA didn't tour that record in their native country at the time, so bar the odd occasion (such as at their Bethesda show in 2003), the Welsh public hadn't had much of a chance to hear this material played live. In particular the strained beauty of 'Gwreiddiau Dwfn/Mawrth Oer Ar YBlaned Neifon' is a reminder that. for all the inventiveness behind the band's approach to live performance, it's the more simple moments that are arguably the most rewarding.

Having said that, no-one's complaining about the touches that embellish the rest of the evening – these boys don't skimp on the lights and lasers. When set closer (a frenzied 'The Man Don't Give A Fuck') sees the reappearance of the headbanging yetis, which have famously graced SFA's stage in bygone times, we're reminded just how much we've missed them all. See them this summer, because SFA's past still

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

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
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
