Mancunian art-rockers Everything Everything will support, taking the tour from excellent to unmissable.





Small venues are the lifeblood of the UK music scene. They're where every band starts out, growing as performers and building a fanbase. They're places where you can get up close and personal with future megastars, and say you were there first - win-win. This weekend alone, you will find: bundle of fun The Big Moon at Sunflower Lounge in Birmingham, acid punks Bo Ningen at Abbeydale Picture House in Sheffield and grime MC Stormzy at Open in Norwich.

They support brilliant local talent

Sometimes headliners take new bands on tour with them, but often it's up to venues and promoters to fill support slots. That's great for local bands, who get exposure to a bigger band's fans. It's how everyone develops. Coldplay and Muse would be nowhere without the Cavern in Exeter, and the early Arctic Monkeys shows at the Leadmill in Sheffield are legendary.

They're where the greatest indie discos happen

What's more fun than dancing to Pulp on the sticky floor of a sweaty room with all your mates? Small venues put on the best indie discos, from The Home Of Rock'N'Roll at Sheffield Leadmill to High Pressure Nights at the Green Door Store in Brighton. Check local listings for info.

You'll meet friends for life

Go to a night in a small venue and it'll be full of people like you - full-time music fanatics with whom you can heatedly debate your favourite (or least favourite) bands. You've then got a gig buddy for life.

Occasionally, massive bands play there, too

For example, The Libertines recently played a secret show at the Dublin Castle in London and Blur warmed up for their Hyde Park shows in 2012 with a gig at the Winter Gardens in Margate.

As presenter of Radio 1's breakfast show between 2004 and 2012, Chris Moyles was the most listened-to DJ in the country. People loved him. People despised him. But you couldn't get away from him. Then he disappeared. Leonie Cooper joins him as he returns from the wilderness on the newly-launched Radio X



maybe I'm a feminist." blurts Chris Moyles, shocking himself almost as much as he just has NME. It's the week before the most controversial DJ in the country returns to the airwaves on the newly-launched Radio X. For a man previously branded as the bad boy of the BBC, regularly facing accusations of sexism for his behaviour on Radio 1. his admission is something of a curveball. "My manager is female, my assistant is female, my press person is female and my exec producer is female," he continues, before unexpectedly assuming the role of a women's rights activist. "Why do women

have to pay for sanitary products? That's crazy. That would never happen if it was the other way around!"

Moyles' musings are even stranger in light of the fact that Radio X - the successor to beleaguered indie-rock station XFM - is being positioned as 'malefocused'. According to a press release, their target audience is men aged 25-44. In keeping, the vast majority of the new hosts are male, middle-aged and overwhelmingly white. As well as Moyles there's Johnny Vaughan (who'll be joining from Talksport), Kaiser Chief and The Voice judge Ricky Wilson, and ITV face Vernon Kaye, who left Radio 1 in 2012.

Despite being pretty much the originator of blokeish banter culture, Moyles is adamant he'll be bucking the station's lad-leading direction. "It's b***ocks," he says bluntly. "The whole male-focused thing came out of the blue. A load of us presenters went out for a beer the other night and everyone was like, 'This is bulls**t, who said this?' The weird thing is, if that's what they secretly want to go for, they're f***ed, because my audience was always 50/50 male and female, if not with a slight edge towards females. I don't think that will change much."

As he often did at the BBC, Moyles is more than willing to bite the hand that feeds him. At the height of his Radio 1 fame, a staggering eight million

people tuned into his breakfast show. which ran from 2004 until 2012. Alongside the chart parodies, toilet humour and the occasional record, there were Movles' self-indulgent rants, including half-an-hour spent complaining about not being paid by the BBC in 2010, which led to Radio 2 host Chris Evans saying it was time for him

NME meets Moyles four days before his first show for Radio X. In classic heist movie style, he's done his best to get his old team together for his new show, bringing back producer Pippa Taylor and

newsreader Dominic Byrne. 'Comedy' Dave Vitty and producer Aled Haydn Jones will not be returning, but the zoo-radio style of broadcasting - lots of shouty people in a room - most definitely will.

He's just finished a real-time run-through with his team, and in a hotel restaurant across

the way from the Global Radio offices in Leicester Square, a trim-looking Moyles orders tea and toast and explains his return to radio. "I'd said to myself 'never say never' about going back. People thought I'd given it up for good, which I hadn't," he says. In fact last year he said he had no plans to get back into radio in one of his online vlogs. "They approached me," he stresses. "Be under no illusion that I went knocking on doors for work."

Asked to leave Radio 1

in 2012 as part of a drive to lower the average age of the listeners, the station's longest-serving presenter was replaced by chipper 20-something friend of the stars, Nick Grimshaw. The result was either

a success or failure depending on who you ask. As of May this year, Grimshaw's listenership was down to 5.5 million, a record low. Yet Ben Cooper, Radio 1 controller and the man who moved Moyles on, congratulated Grimshaw for shaking off the older listeners, who made up 90 per cent of those who had abandoned the show. "I'm pleased that Grimmy is doing what I've asked of him by keeping his young audience happy and scaring off the over-30s," he said.

Moyles appears casually vindicated by the outcome. "They had to be seen to be making the biggest move they could possibly make to achieve that [younger listenership] because they'd been trying for a while and it'd not happened," he says, "Still not happened!"

After leaving Radio 1, Moyles busied himself on the fringes of the entertainment world. There was a tour with a live band. the role as Herod in a stage production of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Jesus Christ Superstar (which The Guardian branded the show's saving grace) and a sojourn to LA to write a screenplay, which has since been picked up for a development deal. There was the aforementioned crack at vlogging, with Moyles documenting his adventures in Hollywood and Norwich, interviewing the likes of Peter Andre and dissecting S Club 7 performances: "Oh, my failed YouTube attempt, as it got dubbed." There was also controversy with Moyles publicly outed as being part of a tax avoidance scheme. "I didn't break the law, and I paid it anyway," he states.

For a man who's never been shy of the sound of his own voice, Moyles' return to radio is exactly where you imagine

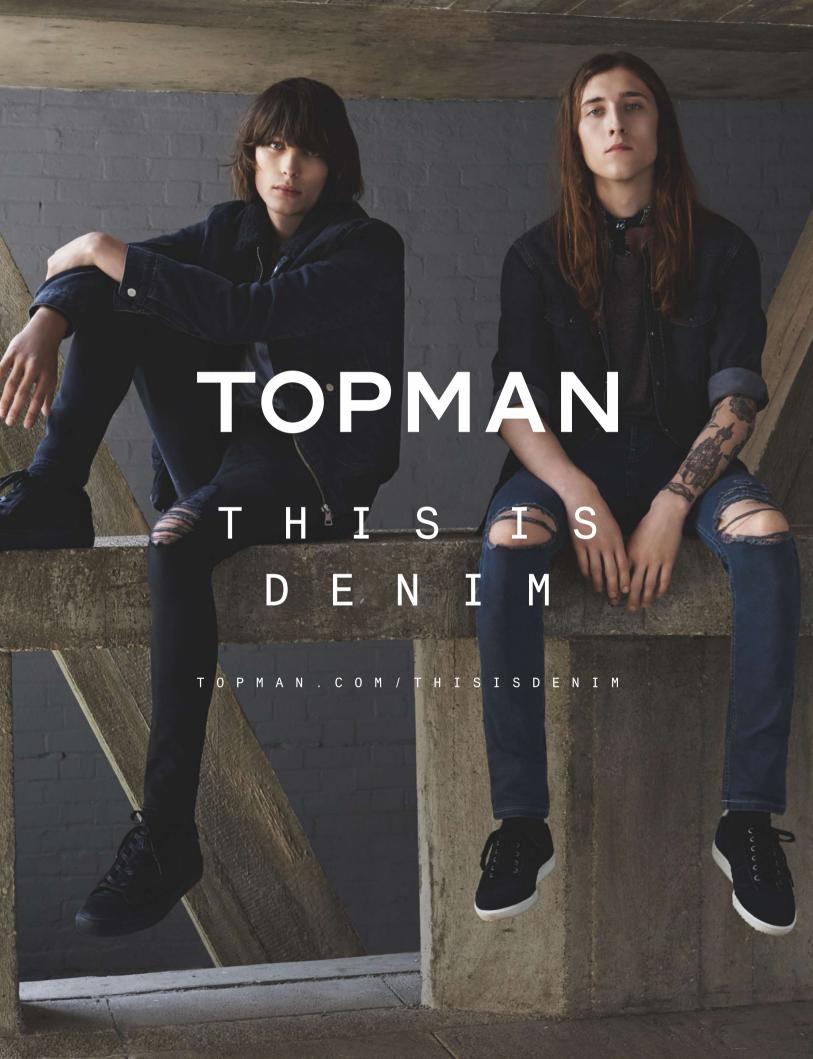
he wants to be, especially seeing as various attempts at a television career have never taken off (see box left). Now, not only does he have the most prestigious slot of the day, he has bosses who call him a "broadcasting genius" (Ashley Tabor, head of Global).

"They know what they're buying," says Moyles. "I don't have to play a number of songs a day, I don't have to do this and that, which is great - it's what I wanted. I'm tired of being told I didn't play enough music [on Radio 1]." It takes him a huge 28 minutes to play the first song on his opening Radio X show the following week.

When I ask which acts will make up his core playlist, Moyles is non-committal. "I just want the songs to be big," he says. "Radio 1 had enough shows where it was about the music - our show was never about the music. And what happens then is people think you don't like music, which is really frustrating, 'cos I do like music." Asked to name his top five bands though, he flounders.

"I'm a little bit eclectic, I love a bit of everything, so my iPod is embarrassingly diverse." Pulling it out of his pocket, Moyles rattles off a list of what he's been listening to recently, including The Strypes, The Rolling Stones, Ed Sheeran, ELO and the soundtrack to *The Book Of Mormon*, the musical from the creators of *South Park*, which Moyles recently saw for the third time. One of the last gigs he went to was Taylor Swift in London's Hyde Park. "I love Tay-Tay, and anyone who says that they don't is a liar," he states. "She writes

"I'm a nice man now. I always was, but now I'm nicer" amazing pop records. I think people assume pop music is cr*p and they're wrong. Pop music is popular music and everyone should calm the f**k down."

Don't, then, expect

to come to Moyles to find obscure new grime artists or cutting-edge psych-rock bands. Radio X has retained new-music champion John Kennedy's late-night *X-Posure* show for that. Moyles is here for the express purpose of entertaining people as they battle hangovers, get ready for another mind-numbing day in the office or peel out of bed before going to college.

"They're like, 'Just do what you do and don't get us fined,'" he comments of his new bosses. Despite all the controversy that surrounded Moyles' time at Radio 1, he was never fined or suspended. "So it's great when you read about how outrageous and terrible I was. I was quite a good little boy, actually."

Of course, there are many who believe he should have been fined, not least for offering to take the virginity of Charlotte Church when she turned 16 – which saw him reprimanded by the Broadcasting Standards Commission. "That Charlotte Church thing, I said once, [but] it's been written about a hundred times, which I find hilarious," says Moyles unapologetically. "I moved on, everyone else still goes on about it." In 2006, LGBT charity Stonewall named the presenter Bully Of The Year, for using the word 'gay' as a pejorative and for comments about the singer Will Young.

"Anybody who knows me at all will say I'm really not homophobic, I'm really not sexist, I'm really not a racist, I'm really not xenophobic," he stresses. "Apart from the French. That's a joke," he adds wryly. "I really don't care. One of my best friends is transgender and I spent the last three years asking every single possible question I could think of about it, because I didn't know much about it. I don't care what you are, as long as you're nice and not an a***hole, that's all I care about."

In his new time slot, Moyles will be going head-to-head with his Radio 1 replacement, Nick Grimshaw. Laughing off tabloid reports of a feud, he's keen to



stress he sees this as a mutually beneficial move. "We'll take a lot of his older listeners and his average age will go down, he'll get patted on the back and we'll get patted on the back – everyone's going to win," he says, confidently. "I don't think anyone can lose in this scenario. Apart from Capital and Heart." he adds with a chuckle.

As with Grimshaw, much has been made of Movles' supposed rivalry with the late John Peel, with Peel once calling Moyles a "DLT-in-waiting", referring to the cheesy - and now Yewtree-convicted -1970s host Dave Lee Travis. At the time Moyles responded by branding Peel "Kenny Everett-in-waiting, because Kenny Everett's dead and it's only a matter of time before John pops his clogs." "John and I ended up having a lovely little friendship, from him thinking I was the Antichrist and me thinking he was a miserable old b*stard," explains Moyles. "The moment we started bonding was when he pinched my a*se in a pub one day when I was at the bar."

At 6.30am on the morning of September 21, Moyles and his team rattle through their first broadcast with a calm confidence and a tongue-in-cheek first track: Girls Aloud's 'Love Machine'. "You're gonna love this, haters," smirks Moyles before pressing play. Much is made on air of Moyles' distaste for the 'male-focused' comments about the station. "I don't care if you're male, female, gay, straight, white, black," he comments, ad infinitum, before making

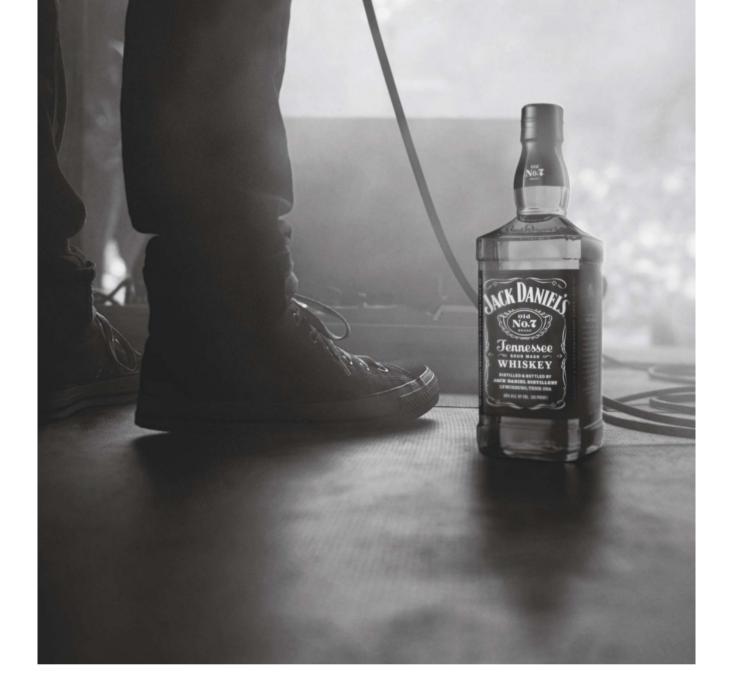
a very public commitment to turning over a new leaf. "I'm a nice man now," he confesses. "I always was, but

now I'm nicer." Before he started his Radio 1 show, he admits he was still out drinking at midnight. But when *NME* checks in with him following his Radio X debut, he explains, "I had a quiet night in, watched a movie, had a vegetable curry and one beer and then went to bed at 11."

That's not to say he doesn't slip back into some of his other old ways on air; he only plays three songs in the first hour, does a spurious Belgian accent and delivers a caustic kiss-off to his old boss, Ben Cooper. "Ben, we can do whatever we like and you can't stop me!" he cackles midway through the show.

"I really enjoyed it," he beams to NME afterwards. He's not the only one. #MoylesIsBack trends on Twitter throughout the show and the Radio X app keeps on crashing due to overwhelming demand. Whether he can stick to his newfound feminist ideology, however, remains to be seen – we'll believe it when we see him campaigning outside Boots for free tampons.

ordes of sweaty fans are milling excitedly outside the front doors of Glasgow's O2 ABC, their faces caked in glitter. From above, the four members of Wolf Alice lean as far out of the dressing room window as safety will allow. "F**k this, I'm going down there," says bassist Theo Ellis. Picking up his plastic pint glass, he leads the rest of the band – singer, guitarist and focal point Ellie Rowsell, drummer Joel Amey and guitarist Joff Oddie – down the stairs and into the crowd. They don't leave until every last fan gets their selfie.

Wolf Alice are not taking success for granted. A buzz band as far back as 2012, the north London foursome took three years to finish their debut album, gigging tirelessly to sustain a loyal following. When 'My Love Is Cool' finally came out in June, shallow hipsters had already dismissed Wolf Alice as last year's thing. But the album's abundance of instant indie-disco classics wrong-footed pundits and it duly charted at Number Two, only missing out on the top spot by 528 copies to Florence + The Machine.

Now there are a whole generation of fans who've grown up with Wolf Alice. At their Birmingham show earlier in the week, the band spotted a regular in the crowd. "It's so weird," says Theo. "In just a couple of years we've watched him go from being a kid to being a teenager. I saw him crowdsurfing and I was like, 'You f**king legend'."

Over seven shows on Wolf Alice's current UK tour, they'll play to nearly 15,000 people – something that would have terrified them a year ago.

Sitting backstage with the band in the past, there's been a palpable sense of nerves. Now, there's just elation. "This is such a celebration for us," admits Ellie.

guitar, making up spoof country songs about whatever's happening in the room.

The band are welcomed to the stage by the entire venue chanting their name to the rhythm of 'Whoomp! There It Is', but Wolf Alice don't launch straight into the obvious crowd-pleasing numbers – tonight's show begins gently with 'My Love Is Cool', before shifting into the intense, swirling 'Your Love's Whore'.

On 'Soapy Water' Ellie puts down her guitar, removes the mic from its stand and positions herself centre stage, utterly transfixing as fairy lights twinkle through the backdrop behind her. Despite earlier warnings from security, Theo jumps offstage into the crowd twice during the set. "As soon as they said not to do that, I thought, 'I'm definitely going in the crowd tonight,'" he says mischievously.

Selfie duties done, Wolf Alice return to their dressing room to polish off a bottle of Scotch, while Theo coerces everyone into doing a bottle of poppers, filling the room with laughter. The band are enjoying touring so much that they plan to stay on the road until well into 2016 – although they're determined not to let that hamper their creativity, fitting in demo sessions wherever they can. "I really want to get some new music up by next summer," says Ellie. "We've been touring some of these songs for so long now."

Joff leans forward.

"Although knowing Wolf
Alice the second album will

probably take five years," he smiles. If it's as good as the first one, we can wait.

Things ramped up in December 2006 when Mexican President Felipe Calderón declared all-out war on the cartels, with the USA providing financial support to help fight their 'war on drugs' along the border. But while there have been several high-profile arrests since, the price has been uncontrollable violence across the country.

3. THE NUMBERS

164,345

According to PBS, between 2007 and 2014 a staggering 164,345 people were murdered in Mexico, and although it's impossible to say how many of those deaths were directly related to trafficking, it would be fair to assume it is a large proportion.

81,636

People killed in Iraq over the same time period.

21,415

People killed in Afghanistan over the same time period.

Lieutenant Colonel Julian Leyzaola Perez

Job: Former head of the Juarez Police Four assassination attempts have been made on this figurehead of anti-corruption. Under his reign in Tijuana he reduced crime and jailed corrupt cops. There were, however, complaints made about his alleged torture of fellow officers.

Jack Riley

Job: Deputy Administrator of the DEA Riley has been in a long-term battle with El Chapo, and put his retirement plans on hold in 2014 when Chapo escaped from prison, so he could re-arrest him.

The Drug Enforcement Administration

Job: America's biggest weapon in the war on drug smuggling

The DEA are a force for good, but not everyone agrees. According to a 2014 article in Mexico's El Universal, they work with the Sinaloa Cartel, giving them free rein in exchange for information on its rivals.



6. MAD **BUT TRUE**

1/ There is only one gun shop in Mexico - the Directorate of Arms and Munitions Sales – and it's run by the Mexican army. Seventy per cent of auns recovered from criminals in Mexico come from the US.

2/ In December 2007, Mexican singer Sergio Gómez was kidnapped and had his genitals burned with a blowtorch, before being strangled with plastic cord. Some think he was killed for singing narcocorridos - drug ballads. He had been warned not to play a show in Morelia, the city where his body was found.

3/ Jesús Salas Aguayo, ex-leader of the Juárez Cartel, is known as 'The Liquidator' because he used to blow up his enemies with dynamite.

4/ Colombian smugglers working with Mexican cartels often build submarines to deliver goods, 'Narcosubs' cost about \$2m to build but are abandoned after one delivery because they carry enough cocaine to make \$100m profit.

5/ The Sinaloa Cartel's El Chapo was the first drug lord to be included on Forbes' billionaire list

5. THE BAD GUYS



Age: Between 58-60 The head of the Sinaloa Cartel, Joaquin Guzmán is Mexico's most notorious cartel boss. Known as 'El Chapo' ('The Shorty'), in 2014 he escaped from prison on a tiny motorbike that he rode down a milelong tunnel from beneath his cell shower.

Age: 54

Reward on his head: n/a Mystery surrounds the Jalisco New Generation Cartel, and Nemesio Osequera Cervantes is its leader. He's reportedly organised the murders of various Mexican politicians, including the Jalisco tourism secretary, Jesus Gallegos Alvarez.

La Jefa

Age: 54

Reward on her head: n/a Enedina Arellano-Félix is believed to be the first woman to lead a cartel. The trained accountant is adept at creating moneylaundering business fronts.



El Mayo Age: 67

Reward on his head: \$5m Ismael Zambada García is El Chapo's second-incommand, and briefly took the Sinaloa Cartel's reins while his boss was in prison in 2014.



Age: 20

Reward on his head: n/a 'Sicario' means 'hitman' in Spanish. One high-profile sicario employed by the Sinaloa Cartel is Felipe Quintero Saavedra (aka 'El Iraqui'), who is only 20, yet has been linked with at least that number of assassinations.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT

Nine years since President Calderón's declaration of war, the US State Department still estimates that 90 per cent of all the cocaine consumed in the USA comes through Mexico. Meanwhile, after two years of declining murder rates, 2015 has seen a new rise. No matter how many resources are thrown at it - and how many lives are lost - the bottom line is that an industry estimated to be worth \$13bn NME a year will always prove enticing.

"We've just always been friends. It's always been there. Jesse is constantly giving me gifts out of nowhere, there's such a steady stream of interesting, perverse and cool things that come to my studio. singer-songwriter bits - supplied by a strong guest cast including John Newman, MNEK and Emeli Sandé – rocketed the four-piece to the top of the UK album chart (with 2013's 'Home') and into venues and muddy fields across Europe. WHEN SERIES ONE OF EMPIRE aired earlier this year, it overtook The Big Bang Theory to become the most-watched scripted programme on American TV. Series two is coming to E4 with new characters and a bold twist, and will be more addictive than ever. Here's all you need to know...

It's a family drama

Empire takes its name from Empire Entertainment, a hip-hop label built by superstar rapper Lucious Lyon (played by Terrence Howard) using the drug money that landed his ex-wife Cookie Lyon (Taraji P Henson) a 17-year prison sentence. Freed at the start of series one, Cookie is constantly scheming to seize control of Empire, but Lucious, who's also battling motor neurone disease, wants to pass control to one of their three sons. As series two begins, middle son Jamal (Jussie Smollett) sits on Empire's throne. Don't expect his reign to last.

They're a complicated lot

Absent for most of their lives, Cookie has a strained relationship with her children, especially youngest son Hakeem (Bryshere Y Gray).

Lucious' relationship with Jamal is equally fractious because he isn't comfortable with the fact his middle son is gay. Lucious may have dumped Cookie while she was behind bars, but the sexual tension remains.

It's really all about the mum Empire is packed with big

characters, but the show's focal point is Cookie, a woman who has the ghetto fabulous dress sense of Lil' Kim and the delicacy of a sledgehammer. Earlier this year, actress Taraji P Henson told NME: "She does and says the things that most people are afraid to do and say, so she's pretty much everybody's alter ego."

This is a soap on steroids

Don't expect the measured storytelling of Mad Men or

brooding drama of Breaking Bad - Empire thrives on thrilling plot twists, conniving conversations and explosive set-pieces. But though it's fast and flashy, Empire never descends into mayhem and the scripts are slick. When a catty rival tells Cookie she isn't "one of her jailbird mates", she fires back with: "I wish you were. You probably would've made a good bitch for me - you look like you got a long tongue."

US R&B king Timbaland is in charge of the music

Empire's R&B-flavoured songs may not be cutting edge, but they at least sound vaguely contemporary. Series one's soundtrack included offerings by Mary J Blige, Courtney Love - who also appeared on the show - and Jennifer Hudson. Nick Levine

TONY HAWK'S PRO SKATER 5 PlayStation 4, Xbox One

FOR GENERATIONS, GAMERS have buzzed off the thrill of becoming a world-class athlete, footballer or wrestler without having to endure hours of daily training. Skating games had added appeal - you only had to watch one video of some boarder's fibula losing a fight with a quarter pipe to realise this was a sport best played from the safety of your living room, largely in your pants.

Hence extreme skater Tony 'The Birdman' Hawk was catapulted from cult hero to video game icon by the first Tony Hawk's Pro Skater game in 1999. ugzy Malone was just a kid when the first wave of grime exploded in London at the turn of the century, but it wasn't the capital that he called home. Two hundred miles away in Manchester, the then

13-year-old was gorging on the seminal *Risky Roadz* DVD series that helped launch the massively influential careers of artists such as Dizzee Rascal, Wiley and Skepta. Inspired, he took his new obsession outside. "We were just kids," says Bugzy of his early days rapping over music played on pals'

phones. "And we'd just be out on the streets, spitting."

It wasn't until 2010, though, that Bugzy started taking music seriously. Since then he's put out numerous mixtapes – including 'Why So Serious' in 2011, 'Lost In MeanWhile City' the following year and 2014's 'The Journal Of An Evil Genius' – plus two EPs in 2015. His most recent release, 'Walk With Me', is the perfect intro to Bugzy's take-no-prisoners approach to the genre.

The highlight is the dark and introspective 'Pain', a bass-heavy song featuring intense self-examination from Bugzy: "Emotionally scarred so bad I was wearing a mask like Bane". "It's a personal track," he says. "It's a tribute to my little cousin who passed away. I wrote it to try and take things to the next level. I'm trying to create art out of the pain that I've experienced."

Bugzy is still based in Manchester, but feels a refreshing lack of affinity to the musical greats who loom over the city's music scene. Mention Oasis and The Stone Roses to him and you draw a blank. "I've not kept tabs on them," he says. "It's different genres of music, innit? Grime music is still a young culture in itself. My goal is to move it on to a more respected place."



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



















