"The victims of the attacks in Paris were doing what Paris does best: laughing, drinking, listening to music. Living and loving. So that's all I could draw today, my heart and love to the victims and to Paris. May we all keep living and loving."

They're The Maccabees, and this year they've released the best album of their career, 'Marks To Prove It'. But what do we really know about this intensely private band? **Leonie Cooper** gets under the skin of each member as they reveal their hidden talents, weird obsessions, and near-death experiences



What was the gig that changed your life?

"I went to see The Vines on my own at Brixton Academy and I thought that was kind of amazing. I hadn't really decided if I liked that kind of music. I started listening to music when I was 18, 19, so I hadn't had that long an apprenticeship."

What took you so long?

"I didn't really know it was around! I assumed that The Beatles was a kind of shared experience that you were just sort of given, like sport. I thought The Vines were amazing, and that's when I really started getting into music. Then I saw Franz Ferdinand play at the Concorde 2 [in Brighton]. Everyone had a big bonfire on the beach afterwards and I thought: this is great."

What's your current musical obsession?

"Last night I stared listening to a guy called Bill Fay. He sounds a bit like Vic Chesnutt, a really fragile voice but with very crafted songs. None of it feels overthought. 'Time

Of The Last Persecution', that's the album I was listening to last night."

Anything else?

"I don't think I could do without Desert Island Discs at the moment. I listen to two or three a day. It's very good company."

What was your first festival?

"Glastonbury, when we played. I must have been 21. It's chaos – I picked up on that pretty quickly! I remember someone having an argument about how old their inner child was and thinking, 'This might not be for me.'"

What do you collect?

"I'm trying very hard to stop collecting. I would end up with so much sh*t – just cr*p off the beach or out of skips. I'd have this room full of detritus... I still have some of it, including my own lapidarium – a collection of stones."

What's your signature dish?

"I like cooking, but I'm no good at it. I make my dad's salad dressing pretty well, but I can't tell you the recipe. There's very little that us Weeks men have in our culinary arsenal, so I can't give it away!"

What's the best advice you've ever been given?

"There's a friend of mine who was in a band in the 1980s called The Jags. He told me that if I wrote something that I didn't record and then I didn't remember it, to not worry about it, because it wasn't good enough. That's always stuck with me."

Will you still be making music when you're 50?

"I think so. I really enjoy writing."

Would that still be with The Maccabees?

"At the end of 2016 it'll be 15 years since we started, so who knows?"

If you had to give it all up tomorrow, what would you do?

"I'll try to make a living making things. That's my life mission – If I can enjoy making something and it pays the rent, then that's it."

What was your first gig?

“I went to two gigs in a week – one of them was Lowgold at Dingwalls and the other was Oasis at Wembley Stadium, so I got both ends of the spectrum. I was a huge Oasis fan, but I couldn’t see or hear anything and it was full of people from London pretending to be from Manchester. I was really in love with the idea of Oasis and being committed to something, but the actuality of that was a real juxtaposition. It didn’t put me off the band, but it made me feel like I didn’t want to be part of that pack mentality.”

What’s your current musical obsession?

“I’ve only got Kurt Vile’s album ‘B’lieve I’m Goin Down’ on my iPhone at the moment. ‘Pretty Pimpin’ is an amazing song. I kind of shied away from it when it first came out, because all the cool kids in Brighton were into it and I decided maybe I wouldn’t like it out of stubbornness. But I absolutely love it.”

What was the last gig you went to?

“Patti Smith at the Roundhouse. It was really wonderful. I saw her at Glastonbury singing ‘Happy Birthday’ to the Dalai Lama. Who doesn’t love her music? I like what she’s got to say – it feels restorative and she’s got a good sense of perspective.”

What’s the one album you couldn’t live without?

“I like ‘Spirit Of Eden’ by Talk Talk a lot. I’d never heard music like that, and that’s quite a rare thing when you’ve been in music for a long time. It’s just totally unique. When we were making the last record, there was a period where it was quite hard and we ended

up getting drunk quite a lot. We’d get back to my house at four in the morning with assorted people and I’d get everyone to lie on the floor, shut up and listen to ‘Spirit Of Eden’ in its entirety. That happened a few times.”

Aside from music, do you have any other creative outlets?

“I write about cricket for *The Guardian* and for specialist cricket magazines. A cricket magazine came to our studio a few years ago and asked me to write a couple of pieces and it just went from there.”

What do you collect?

“I’ve got 15 big books of Polaroid photos and gig tickets – but the older I get the better it feels to get rid of stuff. But I’ve just moved house and I was going through my old stuff and found a shirt I wore at the Café de Paris gig in 2006, which is one of the first times we were in the *NME*. I just couldn’t get rid of it. In my head that’s a museum piece.”

What keeps you awake at night?

“At the moment, baseball. I fell in love with baseball in America recently, and when I got home it was still going, so I’ve been staying up to watch it until seven in the morning.”

Will you still be making music when you’re 50?

“Yeah, definitely. I dunno in what capacity, but I absolutely think it’s something I won’t get bored with and give up. The Maccabees has taught me that if you really want to, you can do something that excites you and that you’re interested in. You can make anything happen.”



Which TV character do you most relate to?

“Some of my friends say I’m Jerry Seinfeld. I don’t think they mean it in a nice way. But I would never wear my jeans that high.”

What was your last big adventure?

“When we finished the last record, I went on my own to Australia for the Cricket World Cup. It was great being somewhere I didn’t have any connection to anyone. That was quite an important time for me, wandering around Melbourne on my own. I didn’t have tickets to anything, but I ended up in Sydney at Kevin Pietersen’s hotel because Marcus Mumford had managed to sort a match ticket out for me. Having been sleeping on floors I ended up at the poshest hotel in Sydney looking like I’d just been washed up on the beach.”

What was your first gig?
 "It's really embarrassing. Limp Bizkit in some arena. I felt no connection to it whatsoever."

Who are your all-time favourite band?
 "The Clash. The intensity of it, the group thing – very different characters put together to create something that's more powerful than it would be if they hadn't met."

What was your first festival?
 "Reading Festival. I don't know if I should tell you this story... I was probably 16 and we broke into the festival! Someone found a gap in the fence and we legged it in. It was really amazing, actually. I don't remember any of the bands!"

What did you want to be when you were younger?
 "I used to ride BMX, but the band started rehearsing so much that music took over. Then as we got more serious, the thought of

breaking an arm would have meant I couldn't do the band. I was quite good – I used to travel to skate parks all over England."

What's your favourite Maccabees song?
 "'Grew Up At Midnight' has had this whole new lease of life, because it's in the *Steve Jobs* film. I went to see it in a cinema in New York and the way it's placed is ridiculous – the whole film leads up to that scene and they play the whole song. I wrote the lyrics for that one as well, so to go from writing lyrics in my bedroom to watching it in a cinema in New York was a special moment."

What's it like being in a band with your brother?
 "It's quite natural, really. Felix and I have never been big fighters; we don't even argue."

What's your karaoke song?
 "Alanis Morissette's 'Irony'. I do the verses, keep it real cool, don't have to strain, and then I get a guest to do the chorus and they have to belt out this thing they can't sing in tune. Florence Welch did it once – she did a good job of it, actually."

What's your order in the pub?
 "I don't drink, so lemonade. I stopped nearly two years ago. I love it. Sober gigs means everything's clearer – it's nice to feel like you still know what's going on!"

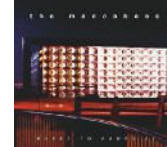

What was the gig that changed your life?

"Fleetwood Mac a couple of years ago at the O2. I don't really go to see many old big bands, but it showed how great they are. It was at the time we were writing the last record – I was inspired by it. They absolutely smashed it."

Who are your all-time favourite band?

"It's a real cliché to say, but The Strokes had such a big impact on me as a teenager. I still go back and listen to their records. We supported them before we even got a record deal. People say you shouldn't meet your idols, but they were lovely guys."

What's your current musical obsession?

"Most played on my iPod at the

moment is Creedence Clearwater Revival's 'Bad Moon Rising'. Years ago, someone did a mash up of our song 'Precious Time' with it. That sparked my interest in them. It's really hard to find, but it's awesome!"

What's the best advice you've ever been given?

"We supported the Arctic Monkeys the week they first got to Number One. As we were lugging our gear through Brighton in the rain, Alex Turner goes to us: 'It's gotta rain before a rainbow.'"

What do you do when you're not making music?

"I like fishing. I take my rods on tour. When we were in Tampa, Florida, I caught a 100lb sand shark. I convinced the rest of the band to come out on a boat, but they don't share my enthusiasm. I don't like eating fish though – so most of the time it's catch and release!"

What was your first gig?

"When I was very young I went with my parents to a festival in France where James Brown was playing. It was great – it was in a supermarket car park!"

What's the last gig you went to?

"Father John Misty at Shepherd's Bush Empire. He's better live than he is on record. He's got great stage chat."

When did you start playing drums?

"I was about 11 and I was living in France. We had a neighbour who had a home studio and was a session bass player on cruise

ships. He went on tour and said 'borrow whatever you want'. So I borrowed his drumkit."

What was the scariest moment of your life?

"We all nearly died in a tour bus crash in Spain a few years ago. I think our driver fell asleep at the wheel and crashed into the central reservation, chucking everyone out of their bunks and writing off the bus. We were all alright, but it could have been a lot worse."

Have you ever been starstruck?

"Recently we were at Pukkelpop and Radiohead's Colin Greenwood just casually walked over and started chatting to us. Radiohead would be in my top five bands."

What would you be doing if you weren't in The Maccabees?

11:45 Frontman Oli Sykes steps off the band's giant tour bus outside Vienna's 3,000 capacity Gasometer venue, closely followed by keyboardist Jordan Fish, guitarist Lee Malia, bassist Matt 'Vegan' Kean and drummer Matt Nicholls.

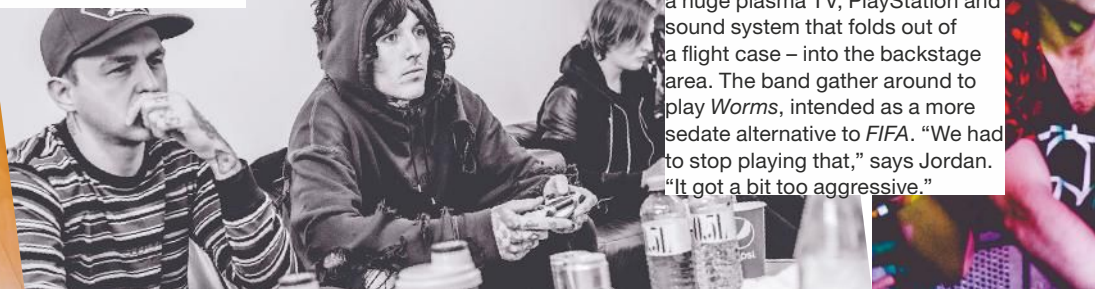
12:03 "Working out is one vice we all share," says Oli, gesturing to the tubs of protein supplement lying around. Normally at this time the band are being put through their paces by personal trainer Tom, but today there's no workout – the band have just broken their weights.

13:25 Lunch is a healthy one; the band request avocados, fruit and vegan meat substitutes everywhere they go. Oli, Jordan and Matt follow a vegan diet, but Jordan insists, "We're not crusaders." The BMTH rider also used to include "a local porno mag" – these days, though, that kind of flesh is off the menu too. Jordan seems miffed. "Maybe our manager took it off because he decided it was time to grow up."

16:14 With the soundcheck over, the band head into Vienna for a meet-and-greet. The 300-strong queue is largely made up of old-school BMTH fans – tattoos, piercings, dyed hair – but given the poppier sound of new album 'That's The Spirit', the band's demographic is widening. "Once, you could spot a BMTH fan a mile off," says Oli. "Now it's anyone's guess."

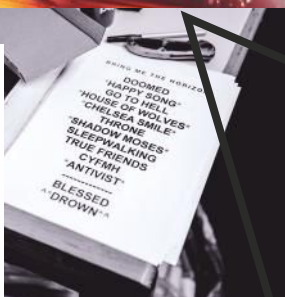
17:02 As the signing gets emotional, the band receive a box of homemade vegan cupcakes. "Can I hug all of you?" one girl asks, waving away tears. "It's quite typical to hear we saved people's lives," Oli says.

18:37 Back at the venue, the band's crew haul their 'entertainment cage' – a huge plasma TV, PlayStation and sound system that folds out of a flight case – into the backstage area. The band gather around to play *Worms*, intended as a more sedate alternative to *FIFA*. "We had to stop playing that," says Jordan. "It got a bit too aggressive."



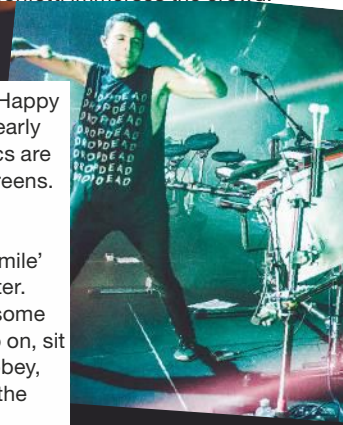


20:38 A final check of the setlist reveals only two songs pre-dating 2013's 'Sempiternal'. Are the band renouncing their metalcore past? "There's people that would like to hear summat off our first album," Oli admits, "but it's so far removed from what we do now, it'd just be weird."



22:44 Rebel anthem 'Antivist' sees Oli orchestrating a room-wide circle pit, roaring "Back the f**k up!" until the central floorspace is entirely exposed. Then at his command, 3,000 people rush to fill the empty space, causing a spinning maelstrom of limbs.

23:01 A second encore. Grasping their opportunity, several fans mount the stage to high-five Oli on his left hand, which conveniently bears a 'HIGH FIVE?' tattoo. As 'Drown' ends, a sea of black confetti immerses the crowd.



21:50 Showtime. 'Happy Song' is an early highlight – its chantable lyrics are played across the giant screens.

21:45 The band emerge from their dressing rooms transformed. Oli's removed the tattered hoodie he's had on all day, revealing the curly, jet-black mane beneath. He and Jordan sport sleek vest tops – the rest of the band are in baggy tees.

22:23 Old song 'Chelsea Smile' prompts Oli to turn ringmaster. "Vienna, we're gonna have some fun!" he yells. "Sit down. Go on, sit the f**k down!" The crowd obey, before leaping up as one in the ultimate Mexican wave.

23:15 "I feel amazing," says Oli, heading straight for the shower. The rest of the band enthuse about the audience's handmade signs – 'Lee Malia is Jesus' reads one – and the best crowdsurfers they've had so far. "We saw one with no legs," enthuses Jordan. "I don't know how it was happening but you saw him fly over the top."

23:34 Before they board the bus for an overnight drive to Würzburg, the band discuss their plans for even bigger shows in 2016. Dismissing the idea of returning to Reading & Leeds, Jordan reveals: "We're hoping to do a big festival that isn't the kind of thing that we would normally do." Glastonbury? "We can't say, obviously," he smiles. With three more legs of their world tour to come before then, that protein supplement is going to come in handy.

Girl on fire

The *Hunger Games* film series may be finishing, but Jennifer Lawrence's greatness is assured. Nick Levine explains why the 25-year-old actor is now the most powerful player in Hollywood

She earns more than any actor except Robert Downey Jr

From August 2014 to August 2015, Lawrence raked in a massive \$52million – a total Downey Jr only beats because of his astonishingly lucrative ongoing Iron Man deal. Money counts in Hollywood, but Lawrence's position is unique because she combines across-the-board marketability with widespread critical acclaim. In fact, she's the only actor in Hollywood's top ten earners to have won an Oscar (for 2012's *Silver Linings Playbook*).

Winning the Best Actress Oscar, Feb 2013

Franchise films haven't affected her credibility

Lawrence has appeared in six franchise films in five years. Yet no casting director would dream of pigeonholing her. Her roles in smaller films – a widow learning to dance in *Silver Linings Playbook*, an unhinged '70s housewife in *American Hustle* – have been just as memorable as her turns as Katniss in *The Hunger Games* and Mystique in *X-Men*.

She's turning a story about a mop inventor into Oscar bait

January brings the UK release of *Joy*, Lawrence's third film with director David O Russell. She stars as Joy Mangano, the woman who invented the Miracle Mop. With virtually any other actor in the lead role, this film would be a hard sell. But with Lawrence's name above the title, it's already being tipped as an Oscar contender. If she makes the shortlist, it will be a remarkable fourth Oscar nomination in six years.

She's creating her own roles

This summer Lawrence announced that she is writing a comedy film with *Trainwreck*'s Amy Schumer. It was Lawrence who made this collaboration happen. "I watched *Trainwreck* and I was like, 'Yep, we're made for each other,' and then I reached out and everything just happened so quickly," Lawrence explained on *Entertainment Tonight*.

She avoids social media without seeming aloof

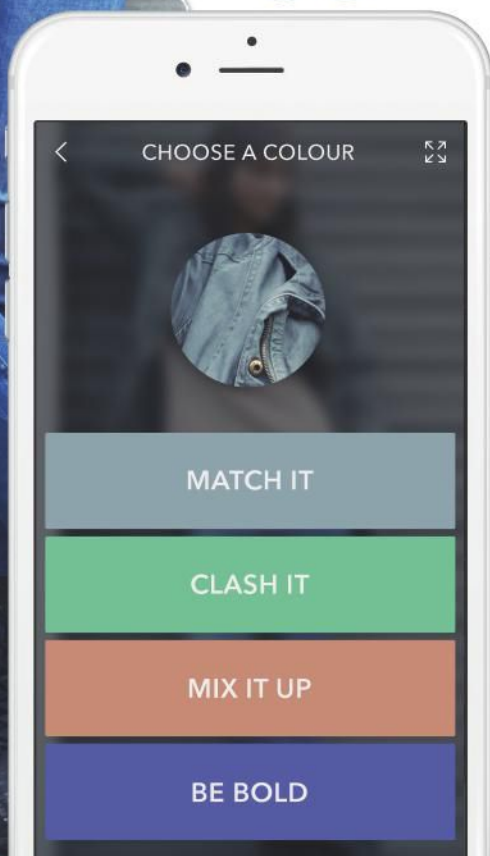
This August, Schumer posted snaps from her holiday with Lawrence in the Hamptons. The pictures soon went viral, partly because they showed two huge stars having a blast together. But they also dominated our Facebook feeds because catching a glimpse of J-Law on social media is so rare. She's managed to stay off Twitter and Instagram without seeming out-of-touch because during interviews she's frank, funny and utterly down-to-earth.

She's tearing down the Hollywood pay gap

Lawrence is using her clout to influence Hollywood's ongoing discussion about the pay gap between male and female actors. In an essay for Lena Dunham's *Lenny* newsletter, she expressed her dismay at discovering she'd received a smaller cut of *American Hustle*'s profits than her male co-stars and vowed to negotiate harder in future. "I'm over trying to find the 'adorable' way to state my opinion and still be likeable!" she wrote. "F**k that." For her next film, space romance *Passengers*, she's pocketing a reported \$20million. That's \$8m more than her male co-star Chris Pratt, even though he fronted this year's biggest film, *Jurassic World*. It just goes to show that in Hollywood in 2015, Jennifer Lawrence is in a class of her own.

LESS THAN five minutes into 'Purpose' Justin Bieber claims, "My life is a movie and everyone's watching". The 21-year-old Canadian has spent the past few years p*ssing – literally in some cases – on the squeaky-clean image that propelled his first three records to more than 15m combined sales. This fourth album is his



chance to say sorry. "Let's get to the good bit and past all the nonsense", he sings on 'I'll Show You', one of five tracks produced by Skrillex. The EDM giant's presence – along with Rick Rubin and Kanye

West who were involved in an advisory capacity – shows the music is changing, too.

'Mark My Words' is a burst of apologetic promises ("Mark my words, they're all that I have"). 'Company' is a hit-in-waiting, while 'No Pressure' is darker, a sprawl of bassy beats and personal epiphanies reminiscent of The Weeknd. Elsewhere, 'No Sense'

sees Texan rapper Travis Scott bring the same slurring malice he brought to Kanye West's 'Yeezus'.

It doesn't all work. 'The Feeling', featuring New Jersey pop sensation Halsey, and 'Love Yourself', written with Ed Sheeran, are more traditionally Bieber, and their big pop hooks are out of place here. Then there's 'Children' – Bieber's own 'Earth Song', which asks "What about the children?" before a hyperactive EDM drop from Skrillex. A good question about responsibility – but one that'd probably be better coming from a dude who didn't abandon a pet monkey in a German airport in 2012.

But by the time 'Purpose' ends with a spoken-word segment about how Bieber "wasn't

necessarily put in the best position to make the best decisions" recently, it's clear plenty of good choices have been made here. It's not quite redemption – only time will tell if he'll curb the recklessness – but it's certainly a start at reinvention. **Al Horner**

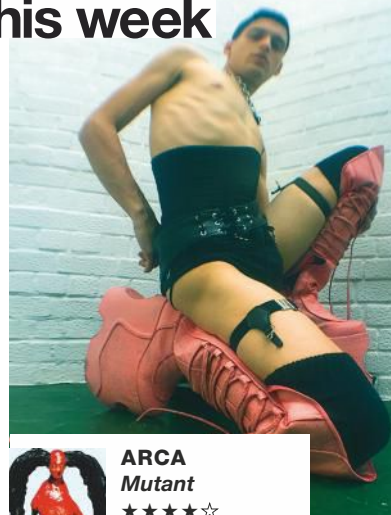

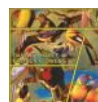

Thug life

Indiana rapper Freddie Gibbs looks back on his troubled past on a gritty third album

FREDDIE GIBBS Shadow Of A Doubt



HIP-HOP GANGSTA LIFE

ON NOVEMBER 4 2014, someone tried to shoot Indiana rapper Freddie Gibbs while he was sitting in his car outside the Rough Trade record shop in New York.

"They tried to kill Tupac. They tried to kill me. But I'm still living," Gibbs told the *New York Post*. Asked why someone might want to kill him he responded, simply: "I'm Freddie Gibbs."

The incident feeds into Gibbs' third album, which has the 33-year-old glancing back with gritty honesty at a gangsta life he thought he'd escaped, but still seems tangled in.

After growing into action with the menacing 'Rearview', on 'F***in' Up The Count' he wonders if this life was always his destiny: "Freddie, where your bills at? Teacher told me to get a job, I said 'where the scale at?'". And on the even darker 'Extradite', a track reminiscent of jazzy experimental producer Flying Lotus, he asks: "Trying

to understand why I want to kill a man/ Ever seen a dead body in the streets then eat breakfast?". The pace drops later with the autotuned double-header of 'Lately' and 'Basketball Wives', but the overall impression is a bruising one.

Last year, on his second album 'Piñata', Gibbs struck up a powerful alchemy with Californian

producer Madlib. The beats were versatile – synthy prog, R&B funk – and it went deep on Gibbs' hustler narrative (its original title

was 'Cocaine Piñata'). 'Shadow Of A Doubt' is more introspective and subtler, thanks to a cast of producers including Kanye West collaborator Mike Dean, Drake and Nicki Minaj fave Boi-1da. Or, as Gibbs says: "'Piñata' was like I went in the gym with Madlib to train. Now I'm ready to box, like Apollo Creed." The resulting album is a total knockout. **AI Horner**

Games over

Jennifer Lawrence stars in a strong, but not quite bombastic, farewell for the high-octane action series

THE HUNGER GAMES: MOCKINGJAY, PART 2

ACTION FIGHTING J-LAW SADFACE

WHAT DO YOU WANT FROM the final chapter of *The Hunger Games*? A faithful recreation of the book, which is widely considered the least enjoyable of the trilogy? Or something that's less respectful of its source material but offers the triumphant end deserved by perhaps the smartest, most ambitious film franchise of modern times? Director Francis Lawrence has gone for the former, which was probably the only choice he could reasonably make. *Mockingjay, Part 2* is an excellent adaptation

of Suzanne Collins' 2010 novel, but it does not overcome a lot of that book's flaws.

If you don't remember what happened in the last film, which would be understandable because after all the colour and dash of the first two, *Mockingjay, Part 1* was a grey dawdle: Peeta (Josh Hutcherson) has been rescued from the dastardly Capitol but torture has left his brain on the wonk. Katniss (Jennifer Lawrence) is more furious than ever with Snow (Donald Sutherland), the Capitol's head, and determines to up the

campaign to overthrow him and free the downtrodden of Panem. This is the final push and it ain't gonna be a clean fight.

When the book gives him something juicy to work with Lawrence cherishes it. His vision of a mutant attack in the sewers is a harrowing self-contained horror movie, while for the

story's climactic event he creates something that looks like a slightly camp Nazi rally. And the script makes strongly, but subtly, clear the story's sophisticated themes about the fallibility of heroes, the manipulation of the media and the impossibility of being wholly good when you're fighting a war. This franchise has never dumbed down its complex messages and that's to be applauded.

And yet the story doesn't build to a big finish but digs itself into a mass grave. The final four half-hour is mostly a test of how many ways Jennifer Lawrence can do sad-face (a lot, all of them commendable). A strong farewell, then, and given the material it had to work with the best it could have been, but still somehow less than we might have hoped. **Olly Richards**

Stranger than fiction

SCI-FI WAR RADICALISATION

BACK IN FEBRUARY, THE PILOT for *The Man In The High Castle* became the most-watched in Amazon Studios' history. It's easy to see why. Based on Chicagoan sci-fi legend Philip K Dick's 1962 book, the show's executive producer is Ridley Scott (who turned another of Dick's stories into the seminal *Blade Runner* in 1982) and it's written by *The X-Files* don Frank Spotnitz. Set in occupied USA in 1962, it stars Alexa Davalos as Juliana Crain, a woman scooped up into the resistance fight, and Brit actor Rupert Evans as her boyfriend Frank Frink. We spoke to Evans about radicalisation and what it's like to work surrounded by

What with current world events – occupation and surveillance – the show feels particularly timely...

"The great thing about it is that not many TV shows will attempt to depict something like this. It makes us look at bigger questions, like freedom and how it feels to live under occupation. Those things are happening now, whether it's Syria or the Arab Spring. At this very moment the British Government is dealing with a bill regulating our telephone calls and storing information about us."

Your character Frank Frink undergoes quite a change...

"He becomes radicalised. People ask me about it and I'm cautious to say I recognise parallels with what is happening today and used that, but the truth is any good story has parallels. The reason it's a good idea is because people identify with it. We all know the cliché of history repeating itself."

The swastika is one of the most taboo images of the modern age. How does it feel walking around a set where it's everywhere?

"Shocking. Just very, very weird. There were days where

there would be supporting artists all in Nazi uniforms. But what was equally shocking was how quickly you got used to it. Going on to a set and seeing a huge portrait of Hitler, it's weird. But you become numb to it. It's terrifying how normal a situation can become, like living in a repressive regime. It's part of life and people accept it."

Do you think that's how it would be, had the Nazis won? Did Dick get it right?

"There are many of us who would love to think if we were occupied, that we'd be brave and join the resistance. However, the reality is there are many people who wouldn't. I'm not sure I would. I don't know how brave I really am. Frank tries to toe the line. But then he is radicalised by the very actions of the regime he's trying to toe the line with." **Ben Arnold**

PUZZLES BADASSES EXPLOSIONS



IF YOUR INTEREST IN *THE Rise Of The Tomb Raider* revolves primarily around how, um, anatomically convincing Lara Croft has become on the Xbox One, you've completely missed the point of the finest platform series in video game history. The franchise began in 1996, and early *Tomb Raider* games were a lengthy, challenging and deeply involving series of chamber puzzles, trap-foiling, deep exploration and intricate gymnastics.

A reboot prequel strand, begun with 2013's *Tomb Raider*, was pretty impressive but relatively insubstantial. Seemingly influenced by

Camilla Luddington, who plays Lara, spent a whole day doing motion-capture death scenes to cover all the ways you can die.

Uncharted – itself a dumbed-down, battle-weighted *Tomb Raider* tribute – it was shorter, focused heavily on character development as Lara gradually learned her *Tomb Raider* skills and shunted the (vastly simplified) puzzles off into bypassable tombs so as not to scare off the *Candy Crush* generation.

At 30 hours plus, this follow-up

redresses the balance brilliantly. Lara's still scavenging for weapon upgrades and learning on the job. But as she races a shadowy, brutal organisation called Trinity to reach the 'divine source' through a densely-packed Siberian landscape full of savage wolves and patrolling badasses, she's offered copious opportunities to explore hidden crypts, search out clue-riddled relics and tackle tomb

puzzles that require some truly outside-the-box reasoning. These are by far the game's crowning moments: fathoming your way round the rigging of a ship encased vertically in ice, manipulating runaway mine carts or flinging explosives between chambers of a flooding cavern. It's like the killer from *Saw* got a job designing *The Crystal Maze*. Add in an involving cinematic storyline full of double-crosses, gripping action sequences and more cliff-hangers and cave-ins than a *Libertines* tour schedule and you have a next-gen *Tomb Raider* truly worthy of the name. **Mark Beaumont**

"I have no interest in being concertedly alternative"

Danny L Harle

The twisted pop genius taking PC Music into the mainstream

POP MUSIC USED to be a side-project for Danny L Harle, one of the key players in dance label PC Music. He spent time in an improvisational jazz band, studied for a masters in classical music and scored a Jane Austen documentary.

However, his hyper-active, neon-flushed music has caught on so much now, that his hobby has become his main interest.

"I'll always make classical music," Harle tells *NME*, "but electronic is my most immediate and pure form of expression." His debut EP 'Broken Flowers' is the perfect introduction. With its skippy synths and oddly pitched vocals, the whole thing is underlined by a sense of experimentation and a love of melody.

Harle says he dreams of working with Nicki Minaj, Justin Bieber and Ariana Grande, but he's not chasing the mainstream. Instead, he's waiting for it to catch up with him. "I have no interest in being concertedly alternative," he explains.

"But I can't write music that I think other people will like. I was once asked to DJ at a trendy nightclub and I tried to play Queen's 'Gimme The Prize'. Me trying to please an audience does not work!"

PC Music exploded in underground circles earlier this year, as fans latched on to its mainstream-parodying sound and aesthetic. But now, it's partnered with major label Columbia, something Harle sees as being evidence of the wider world waking up to the label's unique vision. "Being part of PC Music is to do things others don't expect, and this is in keeping with that," he says, adding "there are no limits" for the ambitious label now.

Harle can dissect what he does to a microscopic level, but when you ask him to sum up new track 'Forever', he lands on the heart of his music almost by accident. "I like the relentlessness of it," he says. "It's just a big, catchy tune." **David Renshaw**

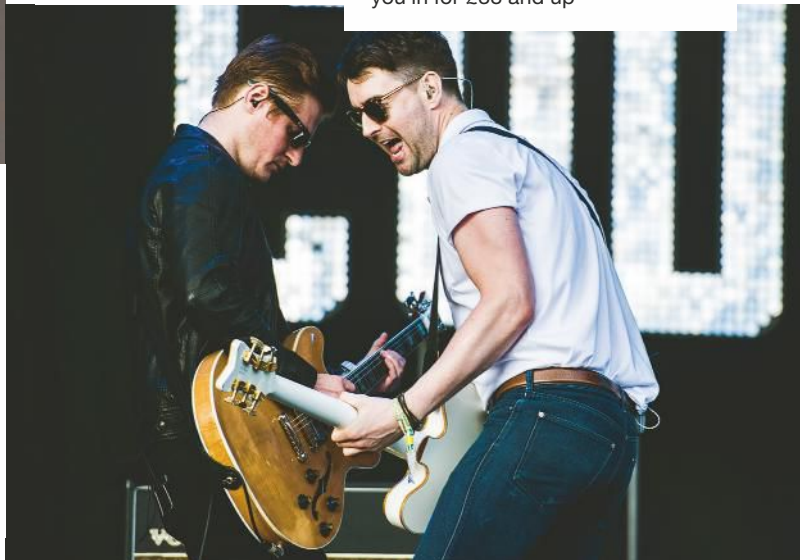

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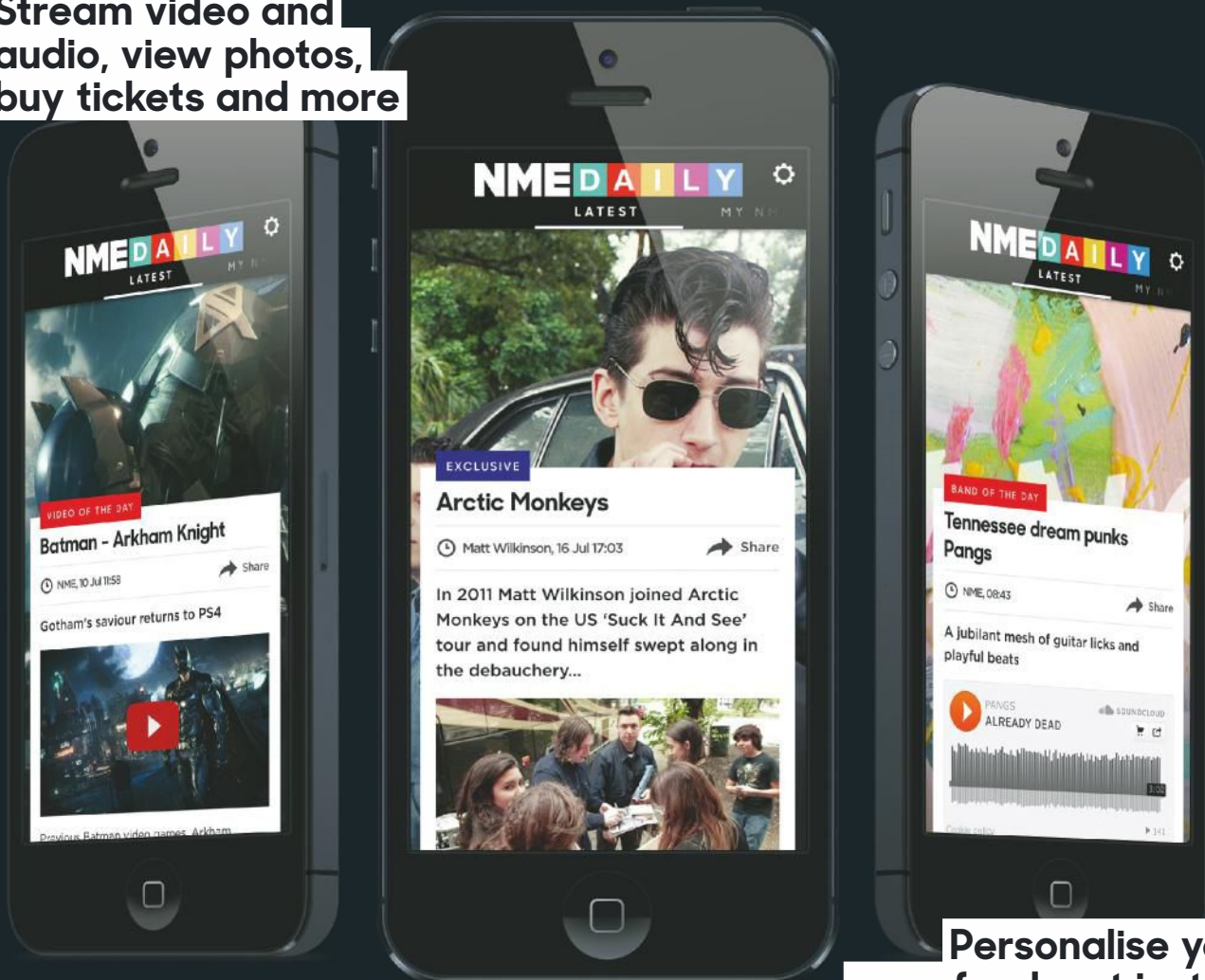

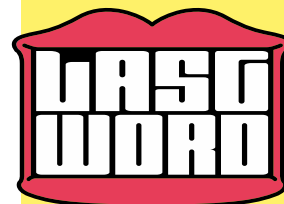
