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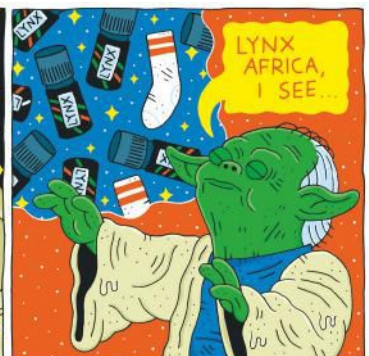
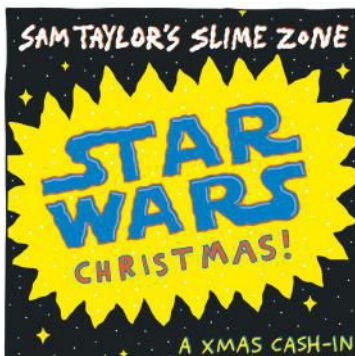

How do you go about writing these songs?

"Usually I write them with someone in mind that Brent's ripping off. 'Free Love Freeway' was a Springsteen song, and

'Slough' was meant to be Bowie or Radiohead. I sent 'Slough' to Bowie, and he said, 'It's great, I'd like to see a whole album of you singing about the towns of Great Britain.'"

Do you enjoy coming up with the music?

"I love it. And there's such a get-out clause because we've got irony on our side. We can sing crass lyrics or use derivative chords that haven't been used since the '80s, but they're so much fun!"

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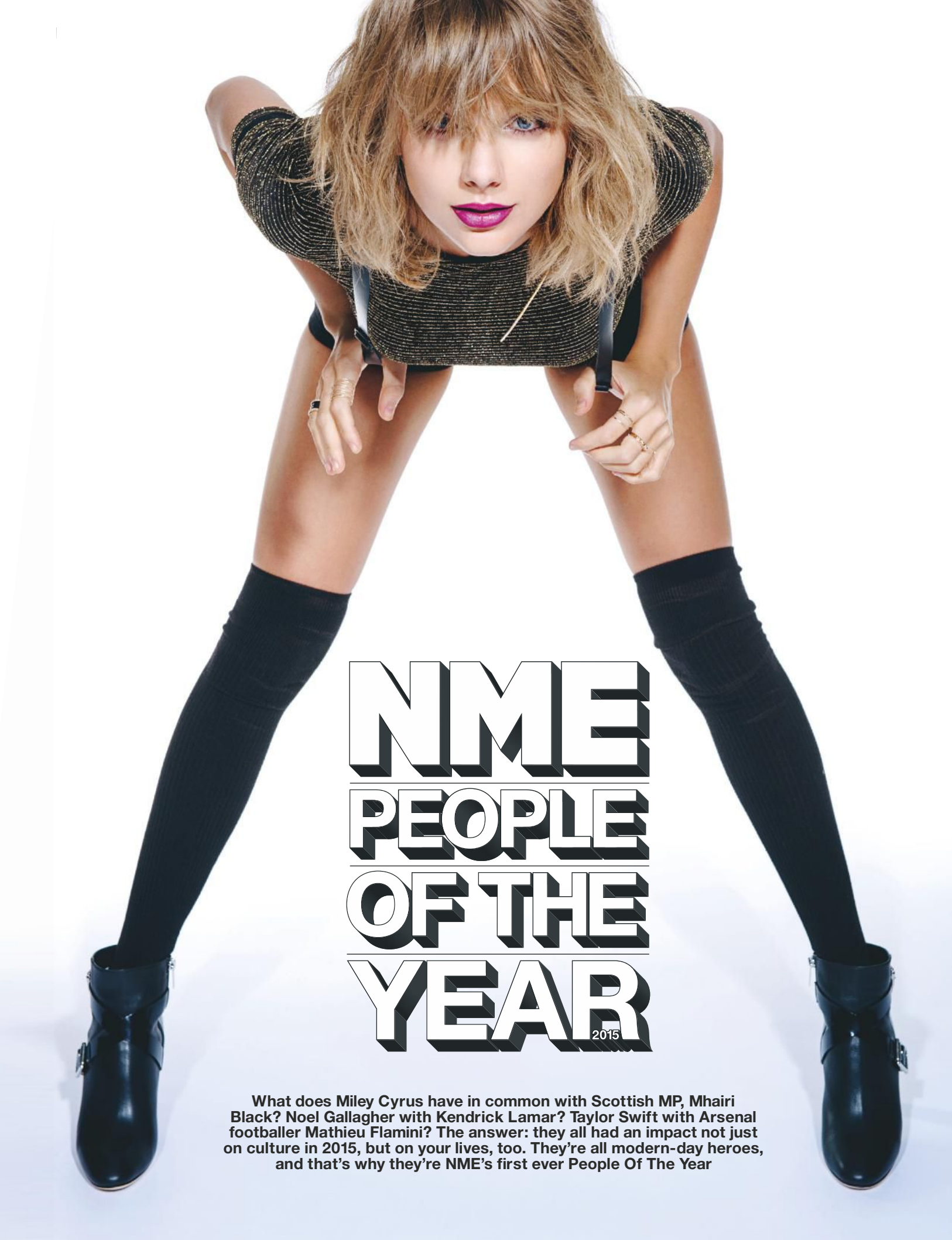

What does Miley Cyrus have in common with Scottish MP, Mhairi Black? Noel Gallagher with Kendrick Lamar? Taylor Swift with Arsenal footballer Mathieu Flamini? The answer: they all had an impact not just on culture in 2015, but on your lives, too. They're all modern-day heroes, and that's why they're NME's first ever People Of The Year

For becoming the most powerful pop star on the planet

Taylor Swift

WHO: The former teenage country music singer became the biggest – and most influential – pop star on Earth after the enormous success of her ‘1989’ world tour.

WHY: You could argue Adele saved the music industry in 2015. Or you could take the stance that this honour falls to the seven-times Grammy-winning pop-cultural force that is Taylor Swift – the artist who took on Apple and won. The trillion-dollar company was about to introduce its streaming service Apple Music, promising users a free three-month trial, with the caveat that artists would not be recompensed during this period. On the morning of June 21, Taylor published an open letter on her website, politely stating her case. “We don’t ask you for free iPhones,” she wrote. “Please don’t ask us to provide you with our music for no compensation.” The letter went viral. By the evening, Apple had announced that artists would indeed be paid during the trial. That, friends, is the influence of an NME Person Of The Year.

Yet Tay would be in the running even if she hadn’t pulled off that considerable coup. Her album ‘1989’ came out in late 2014 (selling 1.287m copies in its first week in the US) but continued to dominate music throughout 2015. That’s thanks to her stellar stage show, which featured a parade of powerful guest movers-and-shakers. From Mick Jagger, Beck and St Vincent to Justin Timberlake, Fetty Wap, Haim and the entire World Champion US women’s football team – not to mention *Friends* star Lisa Kudrow for a duet of ‘Smelly Cat’ in Los Angeles – her Swifties were treated to a special show every night. By September of this year, the ‘1989’ World Tour had grossed \$130million.

There was also a veritable celebrity pile-up in the massive video for her single ‘Bad Blood’, released in May and featuring everyone from Kendrick Lamar to Cindy Crawford. But there’s more to Taylor Swift than celebs and cash (*Forbes* reckons she’s worth \$200m, since you asked). She’s more indie than most indie bands, as she retains the masters of her music and controls her own distribution. Tay’s also helping to promote fourth-wave feminism, having experienced what she called a “feminist awakening” after becoming friends with *Girls* creator Lena Dunham.

Which brings us to the overarching theme with Swift: she is just bossing life. Reading an interview with Tay is like reading a self-help book. It makes you want to be a better person – more assertive (as she was with Apple), more generous (she shares her stage with pals) and more self-sufficient (ain’t no record label gonna tell Taylor Swift what to do).

Many of us make New Year’s resolutions to just be better. Looking back at Taylor Swift’s 2015 would be a good place to start.

WHAT SHE SAYS: In October, Taylor told the *NME*: “Not to try and sound like the good witch in *The Wizard Of Oz* or something, but I really do want to do good things with what I have, and that’s it. I don’t think my brain could cook up very shocking things for the sake of being shocking.”

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT HER: “But seriously, @taylorswift13 is the leader of a great and beautiful galaxy that I’d live in forever.” – Lorde

For making rap righteous again

Kendrick Lamar

WHO: The 28-year-old Compton rapper behind epic game-changer ‘To Pimp A Butterfly’.

WHY: Kendrick began 2015 discussing Michael Brown, the unarmed

18-year-old African-American gunned down in Ferguson, Missouri the previous August. “What happened should’ve never happened,” he said. Similar criticisms of America’s institutional racism coursed through ‘To Pimp A Butterfly’, an album full of vital G-funk, spoken-word and jazz that followed two months later.

The popularity of his music has meant Kendrick’s been forced to confront the US right-wing establishment head-on. His performance at the BET Hip Hop Awards in June saw him rapping atop a police car during a performance of ‘Alright’ (a song containing the lyric, “*We hate po-po, wanna kill us dead in the street fo’ sho’.*”) The sight had Fox News host Geraldo Rivera sputtering, “This is why I say that hip-hop has done more damage to young African-Americans than racism in recent years.” A few days later, Kendrick offered a calm riposte. “How can you take a song that’s about hope and turn it into hatred?”

As if to prove the point, the song’s chorus, “*We gon’ be alright*”, was taken up as a chant by protesters against police brutality after a 14-year-old boy was arrested by police at a Black Lives Matter conference in Cleveland. That’s the power of Kendrick.

WHAT HE SAYS: “I definitely think God put something in me I’m not even aware of. I know it’s there and it has the power to not only conquer what’s going on in LA, but also a little deeper than that.”

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT HIM: “Kendrick is an inspiration... Your meaning, message and execution are gifts to the world.” – Kanye West

For the year's most beautiful (and unlikely) comeback

The Libertines

ne'er-do-wells Pete Doherty and Carl Barât. Not forgetting John and Gary.

WHY: 2014 might have been when Doherty and Barât wowed London with a batch of brilliant comeback shows – headlining a thriller of an evening at London's Hyde Park to 70,000 fans on a balmy summer's night, for instance – but 2015 was the year British rock's most fraught duo finally patched things up properly and got back to some serious, music-making business.

Decamping to Thailand early in the year to write their first new songs together since 2004, they set the pace for a manic 2015 that few initially thought the band would be able to keep up with. A huge record deal was signed, a new album recorded, Glastonbury was wowed by a surprise Pyramid Stage set and a worldwide tour was booked. In all, the band only missed two shows of the entire run (at London's Electric Ballroom and Manchester's Ritz in September) after Doherty – still dealing with a decade-long addiction to heroin and crack – went AWOL. We'll forgive him that, because the last few times we've interviewed him he's looked, sounded and seemed a

million miles healthier than at any time during the previous decade.

Recovery's a long road, and this is where the rejuvenated Libertines really come into play. John, Gary, Pete and Carl are tighter than they've ever been right now, both as friends and as a band. Onstage in Mexico in late November, they appeared closer in spirit to The Beatles than the Sex Pistols, with all the nihilism of 2002-2004 swapped for a purity and 'love conquers all' attitude. They took a collective bow at the end, and it even seemed touching. It's a new aesthetic for The Libertines, and one that suits them.

What it really boils down to, though, is this: way back in 2002, the reason why so many people bought into Pete and Carl was because they offered something different to the commercial, money-minded attitudes that were flooding pop culture. In 2015, even though they're undoubtedly making a pretty penny out of this reunion malarkey, that sense of friendship, unity and admiration for each other still really rings true. Together, they remain an inspiration.

WHAT THEY SAY: "When Carl looked me in the eye and actually believed me when I said I was going to give it a f***ing go, it was like a miracle. Everything else was forgotten." – **Pete Doherty**

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT THEM: "[Pete] was just such an icon in my teenage years and still is to me. I'm so glad he's alive. I really am – there was a long time there where it looked like he might not be." – **Daniel Radcliffe**

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For showing that YOU can change politics

Mhairi Black

WHO: 21-year-old Scottish Nationalist MP – the youngest in the country since 1667 – who's putting the world to rights.

WHY: Politicians aren't meant to look like Mhairi Black. The SNP MP for Paisley and Renfrewshire South isn't one of the careerists who normally clog up the Commons – her last job was working in a chip shop. Her victory on May 7 made Black Scotland's youngest MP since 1667, aged just 20 years and 237 days.

Her youth is always the first thing people mention about Mhairi Black, and given the current Government's all-out war on the young (cuts to welfare and housing benefits, no 'living wage' for anyone under 25, raising the cap on tuition fees), it certainly carries a symbolic significance – she is, after all, "the only 20-year-old in the whole of the UK who [George Osborne] is prepared to help with housing". In her maiden speech in the House of Commons, Black made an eloquent, impassioned case against Tory austerity and became a viral sensation: the speech was viewed more than 10m times online.

By her own admission, Black is "fundamentally uncomfortable" in Westminster, and that's precisely why she deserves to be there – she might be an atypical politician, but these days, such people are needed more than ever.

WHAT SHE SAYS: "People realise it's more about the quality of your argument and the quality of what you're saying. They can see past political spin, aesthetic, ages, gender – I can't help what I am. They see it more as a breath of fresh air."

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT HER: "I don't like piling pressure on her, but she's so incredibly talented. If she wants to be, she's a future SNP leader." – **Nicola Sturgeon, leader of the SNP**

HOW SHE MADE THE WORLD A BETTER PLACE: By showing that if you're good enough, you're old enough. **Barry Nicolson**

For taking grime global

Skepta

WHO: Kanye-approved MC from Tottenham, north London. 2015 has been by far the best year of his career.

WHY: Skepta began the year much like he would any other: by

minding his own business and working on new music, in this case his upcoming fourth album 'Konichiwa'. His 2014 single 'That's Not Me' was heralded as spearheading a grime revival, but holed up in his parents' Palmers Green house, the 32-year-old rapper (real name Joseph Junior Adenuga) wasn't thinking of world domination.

But on February 25, Skepta found himself at the centre of a flamethrower-touting mob of UK grime MCs (including Novelist, Stormzy and Skepta's brother JME) surrounding Kanye West onstage at the BRIT Awards. That performance thrust Skepta under the spotlight, where he'd remain for the rest of the year. When Kanye followed it up by admitting he and Skepta had been hitting the studio together, the buzz intensified.

In April, Skepta and his mates brought a corner of east London to a standstill with a guerilla gig in a car park to celebrate the launch of 'Shutdown', which went on to be named NME's Track of the Year.

Last month, Skepta tried to explain his seismic year: "I've grown up with all different cultures. Somewhere inside I've always known people all over the world would understand me."

WHAT HE SAYS: "I believe in my talent so much, it's crazy."

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT HIM: "Watching Skepta is a reminder that whenever you think you're good at what you do there's most likely people out there that will yam your food." – **Drake**

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For refusing to conform, and celebrating diversity

Miley Cyrus

WHO: Pop star and LGBT rights activist who really doesn't care what you think of her.

WHY: Miley Cyrus is proof that not all former child stars end up in thrall to bad drugs or glumly wading through scripts

for afternoon telly dramas. The 23-year-old formerly known as the wholesome Hannah Montana has spent the last few years getting as far away from her whitebread Disney roots as possible, but this year she rose above the controversy to become a sensitive, generous – and above all, fun – spokesperson for the diverse, varied and boundary-pushing youth of 2015 and beyond. Sure, there are limits as to who and what a white, wealthy, Western female can claim to represent – something both Nicki Minaj and Azealia Banks have called her out for – but when it comes to LGBT issues and flicking the Vs at the gross double standards surrounding the way women are represented in the media, she's done a sterling job.

This summer, Cyrus revealed she came out as bisexual to her mother when she was 14, informing the launch of Happy Hippie, her non-profit organisation to create digital support for LGBT youth and their families, with a particular focus on the homeless. Then there was her take on a world where half-naked women are draped across the covers of magazines, but when a woman decides to prance around in the buff on her own terms she's harangued: "I'm a bad role model because I'm running around with my titties out? I'm not sure how titties are worse than guns," she shrugged in a *Marie Claire* interview. Then, to hammer things home, there were Miley's own fashion choices throughout 2015 – plastic boobs, strap-on dildos, day-glo stick-on nipple pasties – attacking a serious issue with a dose of high camp and brilliantly WTF comedy value.

It's enough to make you think that the music became something of a sidenote, but thanks to her intriguing, accomplished Dead Petz collaboration with The Flaming Lips, she managed to impress our stereos as well as our minds.

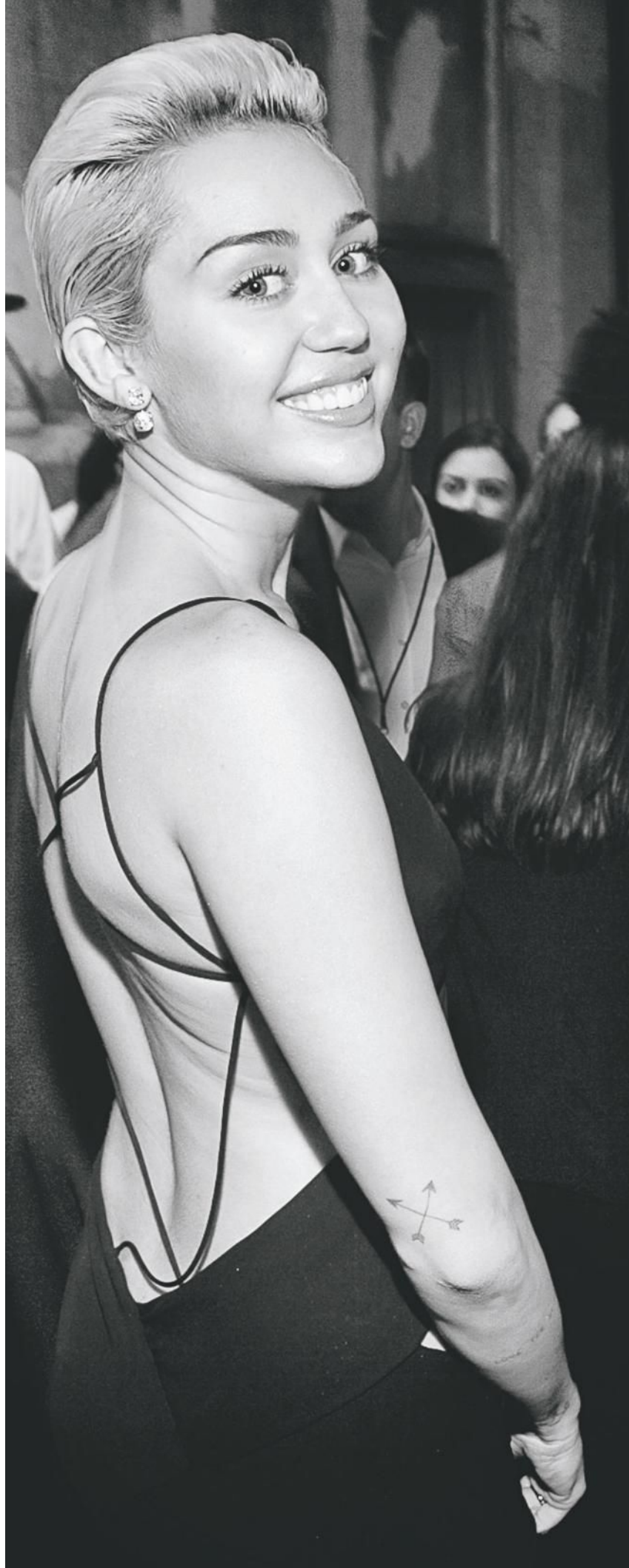

WHY: When the MTV VMAs failed to nominate Nicki Minaj's 'Anaconda' video for their top prize in July, the American rapper dropped a lightning bolt on Twitter, suggesting their decision may have been swayed by her skin colour and body shape that deviates from the Caucasian ideal. "If your video celebrates women with very slim bodies, you will be nominated for vid of the year," she tweeted.

Her ensuing 'Twitter spat' with Taylor Swift doesn't need rehashing here, but the result of their back and forth is important. Tellingly, Swift admitted she had "missed the point" of what Minaj was trying to say about the entertainment industry's ingrained racism, then apologised to the rapper for her ignorance.

Nicki Minaj knows that speaking out about issues can affect how she is portrayed in the media. "*Let me make this clear: I'm not difficult, I'm just about my business,*" she rapped on 'All Things Go'. But she continues to use her voice to try to make a difference all the same. "Black women influence pop culture so much but are rarely rewarded for it," she tweeted in July. Thanks to Nicki Minaj, many more of us are now aware of this problem and seeking to redress the balance.

For using his position to try and save the world

Mathieu Flamini

WHO: 31-year-old Arsenal midfielder trying to halt climate change.

WHY: Modern footballers might be hideously overpaid, but at least Mathieu Flamini is investing

his millions to try and save the world. In 2008 he became co-founder of geo-energy company GF Biochemicals along with his friend and business partner, Pasquale Granata. Over the last seven years, they've invested millions into the hopes of producing levulinic acid – a synthetic oil substitute made from wood and corn waste – on a commercial scale. Their company was the first to discover a way to mass-produce the acid, meaning it can now be used to replace oil in the manufacture of pharmaceuticals, plastics, cosmetics and more.

Until this winter, though, Flamini kept his involvement in the company a secret from everyone, including his friends and family. Not even his teammates or Arsenal boss Arsene Wenger knew about his enterprising sideline.

While the cynical might view the footballer's involvement as a money-making opportunity, Flamini says he's always had an interest in environmental issues, having grown up "close to nature" on the Mediterranean island of Corsica. "I'm trying to give my contribution to climate change," Flamini modestly states of his personal goals.

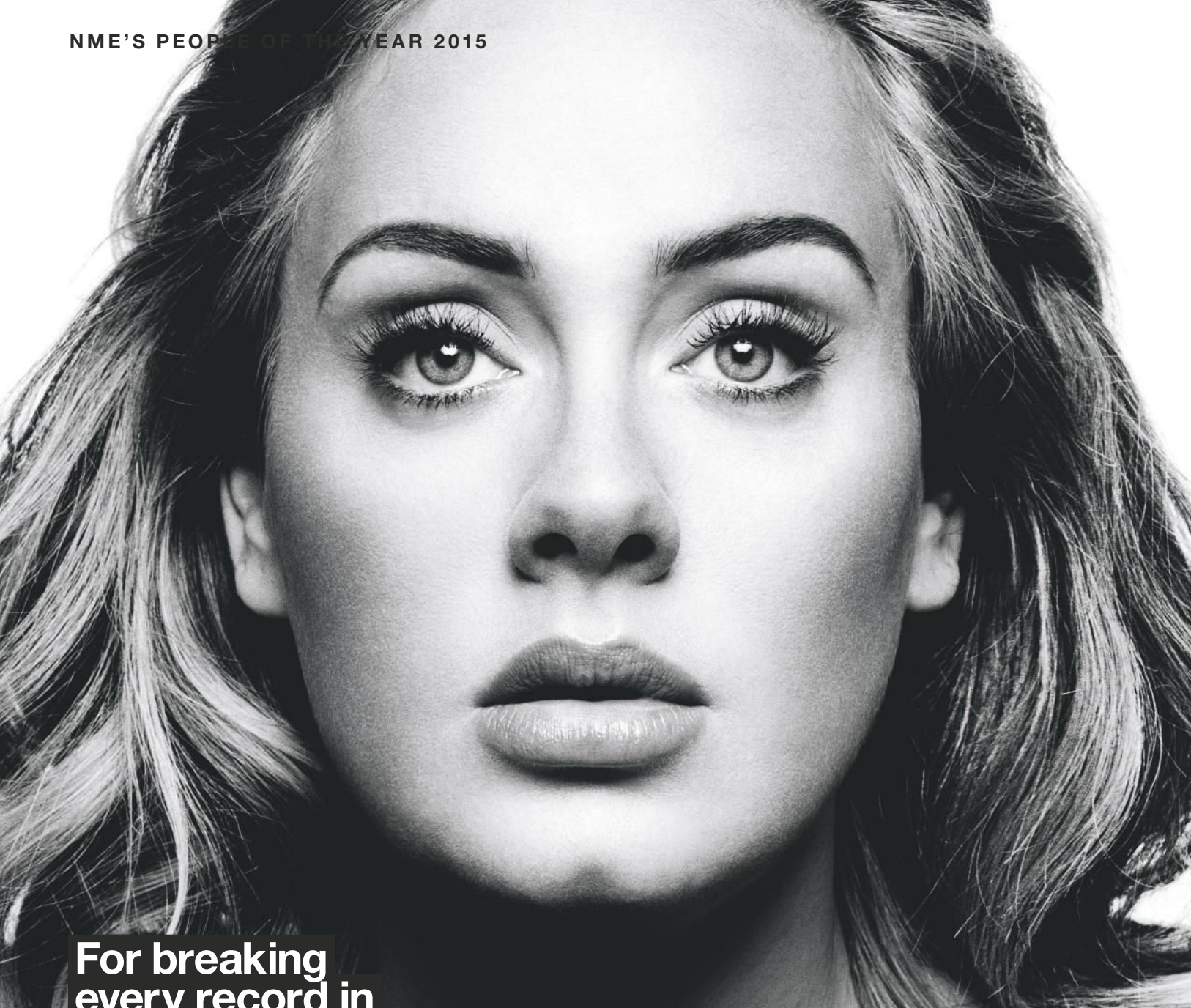
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For breaking every record in music history

In its first 48 hours on sale in the US, '25' was selling 12 copies every second. By the end of the week, it had become the fastest-selling album since American chart records began. Here, it broke the same record, knocking Oasis off their 18-year-old perch for 'Be Here Now'. It sold a million copies in 10 days and became the biggest-selling album of the year. On top of that, she blitzed numbers on YouTube and Vevo and stole records from everyone from Britney Spears to SuBo. The internet couldn't make infographics quick enough. Here's how Adele did it:

She writes brilliant, catchy, authentic pop songs Sounds simple. Really isn't.

She respects your personal space Adele isn't Snapchatting you videos of her pug wearing Santa outfits every two minutes.

WHO: Tottenham singer. Likes a fag and a swear. Sold a few albums.

She's a right laugh Dressing up with a prosthetic chin for that BBC sketch, bashing kids' toys on 'Fallon' and pretending to be a weather forecaster to announce her tour – just a few examples.

She's one of us, man She drives her Mini around London wearing a holey jumper, swearing at other cars.

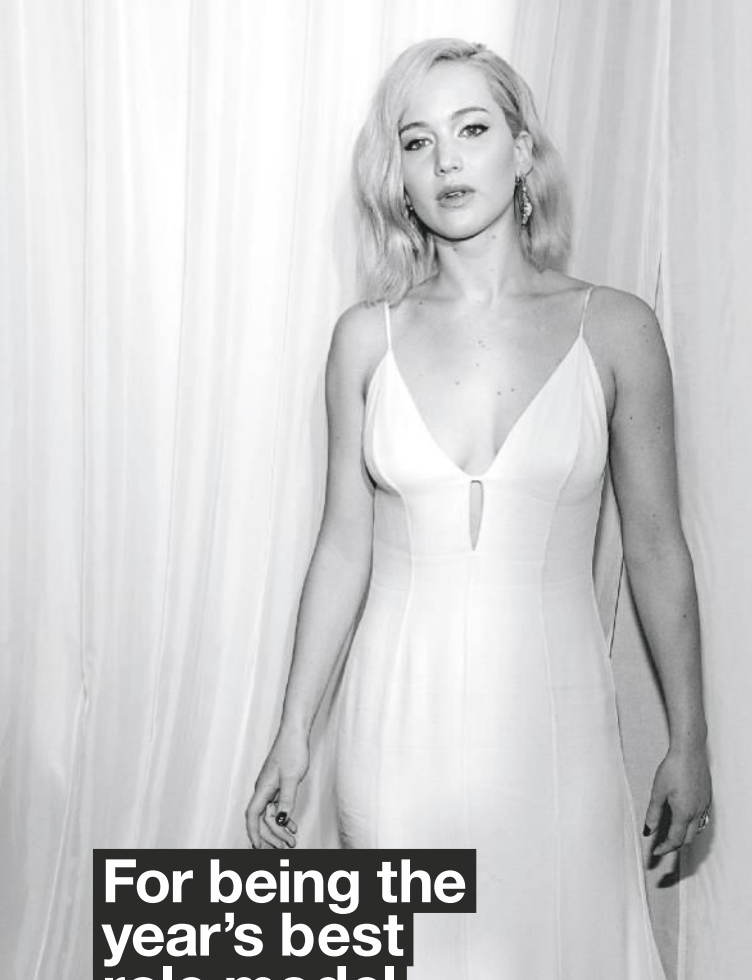
She refuses to play any game but her own Streaming services? "It probably is the future, but eh."

WHO: The most powerful actor in Hollywood.

WHY: In August 2014, Jennifer Lawrence was

a victim of the biggest intrusion of privacy since the phone hacking scandal, when scores of illegally acquired, compromising photos of (mostly female) celebrities flooded onto the web. But instead of curling up into a ball, she's spent 2015 taking zero sh*t from anyone.

In October, she penned an essay on the Hollywood pay gap between men and women in the industry in which she declared, quite brilliantly, that she was "over trying to find the adorable way to state my opinion", opening a long-overdue conversation that's sent ripples throughout the film world and beyond. Lawrence acknowledged it's difficult to squeeze out too many tears for the poor little millionaire ("I told you it wasn't relatable, don't hate me," she said later), but there's a trickle-down effect. How many women, on reading it, looked around their own office and just wondered?

Whether Hollywood sits up and pays attention is yet to be seen. Lawrence is taking matters into her own hands anyway: she's announced she's to direct her first film in 2016 (on "mental warfare in the '60s"). She has, of course, owned the screen this year with the conclusion of the mega-hit series *The Hunger Games*.

Other things she did in 2015: had a chart hit with 'The Hanging Tree', gave comedian Aziz Ansari a piggyback, went for a night out with a drawn-on monobrow and shared almost none of it on social media. Jennifer Lawrence is, quite simply, a very cool film star.

JJ Abrams

WHO: Director of *Star Wars: The Force Awakens*, quite possibly the most anticipated film of the decade.

On the one hand, you're forced to work within the restrictions of one of the biggest franchises in history; but if you produce a film that is anything other than perfect you'll be labelled a disappointment. It's a brave, perhaps foolish, person who takes it on.

This issue went to press before *The Force Awakens* was released, so we'll have to reserve full judgement – but in many respects, JJ Abrams has already succeeded. Over the past year and a bit, he has brought the joy back to *Star Wars*. When the world saw that first trailer, reuniting us with Han Solo, Chewbacca and the Millennium Falcon, grown humans were moved to tears with the rush of nostalgia. He made it fun to be a *Star Wars* fan once more. It almost doesn't matter what the final film is like, the anticipation has been the year's greatest cinematic joy. And we have one man to thank for that.

Blossoms

First Manchester, now the world: this indie-pop five-piece have the tunes to match their ambition

FOR THE RECORD, Blossoms hail from Stockport, not Manchester. Yet their frontman Tom Ogden exudes the sort of ambition typically associated with musical legends from the capital of the North. “We just want to be as big as we can,” he says. “We don’t wanna be underground. We wanna become a big band.”

Tom points out, “There’s no scene in Stockport,” but his group enjoy a devoted following in Manchester, having inherited the streets once owned by The Stone Roses and Oasis. “Every 10 years Manchester produces a great band, and maybe it’s time there’s another one,” he adds. “We’re happy to step up and give people something to believe in.”

There’s Gallagher swag here, though Blossoms’ latest EP

‘Charlemagne’ trades on glittering indie-pop, with more shimmering synths than crunching guitars. The five-piece formed in 2013 and found an unlikely residence in a scaffolding yard owned by bassist Charlie Salt’s grandfather, using a back room as their rehearsal space. “It’s freezing,” says Tom, “but it’s inspired us. We can make as much noise as we want.”

Best track

‘Charlemagne’
A crystalline sliver of synthpop with a slinky bassline. Heartache has rarely sounded as sexy as this.

(Tom promises it’s “full of singles” and reckons it’s due “around summertime”). Skelly was turned on to Blossoms by Alan Wills, owner of Deltasonic Records, who sadly died last year. The Coral singer also produced their ‘Charlemagne’ EP, whose eponymous lead track represents Blossoms’ creative breakthrough.

Tom loves hearing ‘Charlemagne’ at Manchester’s indie clubs. “I’ve been going to those clubs since I was 17, using our drummer’s ID,” he says. “Five years later, we’re playing. It’s surreal.”

Blossoms have already sold out the 2,000-capacity Manchester Albert Hall, where they play in February. Tom may soon find he can’t go clubbing without getting mobbed. **Jordan Bassett**
