

The truth is out there

The case of Steven Avery and his nephew Brendan Dassey, made famous by **Netflix documentary** Making A Murderer, keeps rolling on...

VERY AND DASSEY are both serving life sentences for the murder of photographer Teresa Halbach in 2005, having been convicted in 2007. Since Making A Murderer, the world's eyes have been on the case. Here are the recent developments:

Avery's new lawyer, wrongful conviction specialist Kathleen Zellner, gave her first TV interview since taking the case in an episode of Dateline on January 29. She said that fresh forensic evidence will prove Avery's innocence.

> "The clearest way to [prove his innocence] is with scientific testing," said Zellner. "Am I going to tell you exactly what it is? I am not. But there was a lot that wasn't tested and there have been significant advances in testing since 2007."

Zellner also tweeted about her case, telling followers that she'd taken news of the evidence to Avery. "Third visit to see Steven," she wrote. "He is thrilled about the chance of new forensic testing. Innocent men always are."

> Teresa Halbach's lawyer Ken Kratz, meanwhile, told the documentary Steven Avery: Innocent Or Guilty? it's a load of cobblers that a blood vial – a key piece of evidence in the trial - was tampered with. "How do you think the blood got in there? The blood gets in there by putting a hole in it. There's a nurse who was interviewed and said, 'I'm the one who put the hole in there."

Kratz also said he's writing a book "to prove Avery's guilt beyond doubt". "Somebody needs to stand up for the cops, the courts and the victim by telling the truth and setting forth the vast amount of evidence."





LESSONS LEARNED FROM THE SCHOOL OF ROCK

Between awards shows and a brutal touring schedule, James Bay doesn't have much free time. But he sat down with Leonie Cooper to discuss the records that made the man

NE YEAR AGO. James Bay was just another jobbing singersongwriter: a man with a natty hat, killer cheekbones and a dream. Fast-forward to February 2016 and the 25-year-old from the sleepy market town of Hitchin, Hertfordshire, is one of the most recognisable faces in chart rock; a man whose Number 1 album 'Chaos And The Calm' (released March 2015) was last year's biggestselling UK debut, a man who has fans in everyone from pop's major players (Ed Sheeran, Taylor Swift) to rock's elder statesmen (Keith Richards, Ronnie Wood) and who's in contention for four Brits and three Grammys this month.

It's a chilly winter morning in north London and Bay might be battling serious jetlag - he's just back from LA and is off to Korea tomorrow - but he's working the draughty photography studio like a pro, a bag full of records flung over his shoulder, ready to wax lyrical to NME about the albums that changed his life. Pulled from his own collection, some are stolen from his folks and many were bought from Brighton record shops during his time there as a music student and sometime busker, yet all - dog-eared and well loved - boast the hallmarks of having been played over and over. Proudly, Bay opens the bag and tells all about the lessons learned from his ultimate Top 10.







Fave song: 'Working Day And Night' How it changed my life: "It's the music that reminds me of childhood, jumping around in front of the mirror feeling like I could maybe be a pop star one day – but with no idea what it took. 'Off The Wall' makes you want to get up and dance, so it's a brilliant disco-pop album. This is my mum's copy but I've had it for about five years – she knows it's in safe hands!" For listening to when: "It's time to dance."



THE ROLLING STONES Exile On Main St (1972)

Fave song: 'Sweet Virginia' How it changed my life: "It's one of my dad's favourites. It's about great guitar sounds, great riffs and this amazing story about it being recorded in Nellcote in the south of France, where they didn't see the light of day for days on end. It gave me the confidence and the balls to be a bit more rock'n'roll each time I heard it."



IN A NUTSHELL: You'll recall the Hellfire Club from X-Men: First Class as the amoral millionaire mutants led by champagne-quaffing Sebastian Shaw (Kevin Bacon). Fox's series will keep the movie's swinging '60s setting and centre on a government agent who infiltrates this stylish secret society.

Potential for weirdness: There's no point having a comic-book show set in the '60s if you're not going to take full advantage of its psychedelia and far-out fashion. Further oddball-ness comes from the show's focus on villains - we might be cheering on the baddies for once. Will it be any good? Bryan Singer director of all the good X-Men films and none of the sh*t ones - is executiveproducing, so fingers crossed.

LUKE

IN A NUTSHELL: The third of Netflix's five Marvel series following Daredevil and Jessica Jones, and preceding Iron Fist and The Defenders - Luke Cage centres on a wrongfully imprisoned ex-gang member who gains super strength and unbreakable skin during an experiment gone awry. We've all been there.

Potential for weirdness: Cage (Mike Colter) has already featured extensively in Jessica Jones. However, while Jessica Jones had a pervert super-hypnotist as its central villain, Luke Cage has a violent crime lord named Cottonmouth - so the show may prove to be more bonecrunching than mind-bending. Will it be any good? Daredevil and Jessica Jones were ace, so probably. Watch it: Summer 2016, on Netflix

HELLFIRE

IN A NUTSHELL: One of two Marvel shows currently in production at Fox the other being Hellfire - Legion's titular protagonist is the wayward, megahaired son of X-Men leader Charles Xavier. Legion suffers from dissociative identity disorder and each of his distinct personalities - of which there are hundreds - imbues him with a different superpower.

Potential for weirdness: Legion has long been one of Marvel's strangest and most unpredictable characters. His rotating 'legion' of personas includes the mesmeric Hypnobloke, the emotionamplifying Susan In Sunshine and the acid-vomiting cherub Pukatus Jr. Expect weapons-grade oddness.

Will it be any good? Fargo creator Noah Hawley is writing and executiveproducing, so Legion has a decent shot at being very good indeed. **NME**

Sunflower Bean's debut album 'Human Ceremony' is an instant classic. Dan Stubbs chats fashion, The Strokes and, er, Gary Glitter with New York's next great band oloom

E FIND SUNFLOWER Bean in two parts: the male two-thirds, singer/ guitarist Nick Kivlen and drummer Jacob Faber, are on conference call from New York, where they live; while singer/bassist Julia Cumming is in Paris at Fashion Week, building on a modelling career that's already seen her pose in a Saint Laurent campaign. "I'm not a regular model, you know," she laughs. "I just wear what I want to castings and do my thing - and it doesn't often work."

That do-your-own-thing ethos holds up in the band, too. Nick has a Jim Morrison hairdo, androgynous Julia frugs around stage like a puffed-up rooster and Jacob apparently takes grooming cues from Charles II. Together, they make music that blends the dark-matter

heaviness of Black Sabbath with the new-wave pop smarts of Blondie and The Go-Go's, the floaty, fey romance of 1980s lo-fi indie pop and the insouciant cool of The Velvet Underground.

It came from their dissatisfaction at Brooklyn's musical landscape two years ago: "A lot of shoegaze, post-rock and weirdo noise bands who took everything so seriously," says Nick. "There are clichés that are so underdone they'd stopped being clichés - like having a song that has a guitar solo instead of a feedback loop. We just wanted to do something fun."

The result is 'Human Ceremony', their brilliant, trippy debut album. They've explained the title as 'how Earthlings going about their business might be captured as a picture in an alien textbook', but the result is more terrestrial – a proper, classic debut.

> "Just a time capsule of the band; 11 songs we've been working on for a year and a half," in Nick's words.

Bizarre concepts are a part of the band's language. When Nick and Jacob first heard The Strokes' 2001 debut 'Is This It' in 2013, Nick says

it was such an "instant click moment" that he wrote "a ton of songs directly mimicking the group. I wanted to make a fake rip-off band called The Van Gogh." Julia once went one bigger as singer of Terry Tinsel, a glam concept duo covering the music of - wait for it - paedophile pariah Gary Glitter. Put the pitchforks away. "People are horrified in the UK, but he doesn't mean anything to anybody in the States," says Julia, who grew up listening to his music. "He was in his 30s, he had a hairpiece, he was ugly. A big part of rock'n'roll is taking your ugliness, dressing it up and showing it to the world. I think he's retarded, but the music he was a part of really did change my life." Terry Tinsel was a spin-off from another concept-y group - postmodern teen-pop duo Supercute, which Julia formed at age 13. "It was almost an art project about not letting your age or being a girl stop you from trying anything," she says.

In the UK for their album launch this week, Sunflower Bean's European jaunt winds up in Brighton on February 19. Britain, they say, is already starting to feel like home. "You guys are very excited about rock music," says Nick. "In America, it's been out of the mainstream since I was five years old and any time it's mentioned it's always the same people: Jack White or Dave Grohl. I'm so sick of seeing their faces. One band of 20-year-olds making relevant rock music would be nice. wouldn't it?" Nick, you may have answered your own question.

Zachary Cole Smith has overcome addiction and arrest to make this intensely powerful album

DIIVIs The Is Are

GUITARS FEEDBACK

A JUNKIE, A cliché, a hipster, a brat. Maybe a precociously talented songwriter, or maybe just a heroinaddled Kurt Cobain

wannabe destined for failure. Zachary Cole Smith (who goes by Cole) has endured plenty of mudslinging since forming DIIV as a no-frills punk band in 2011 and releasing narcotic debut 'Oshin' in 2012. His behaviour – and that of his bandmates – since the record came out hasn't helped.

In 2013, alcoholic guitarist
Andrew Bailey entered rehab and
Cole and his girlfriend, pop singer
Sky Ferreira, were arrested for
possession of heroin and ecstasy.
Then in December 2014, after a
stint in rehab for Cole, bassist
Devin Ruben Perez posted sexist
comments on chatroom site 4chan.
The following year saw drummer
Colby Hewitt depart, reportedly
due to his own drug issues. There
was little new music amid the mess.

Cole designed the long-delayed 'Is The Is Are' (which he recorded and produced himself) to be an ambitious and revelatory answer to his critics. Naysayers, prepare for a shock. Its 17 flabfree tracks shift from luxuriant interwoven guitar ('Valentine',

'Dopamine', the magnificent 'Healthy Moon') to blasting noise ('Incarnate Devil', 'Dust') and show there's more to DIIV than reverb, indie-pop and controversy. The

31-year-old also obliterates the idea that his talent has succumbed to smack – these are some of the most powerful, personal and persuasive rock songs you'll hear this year.

DIIV's main weapon is the quitar and it's fetishised here. An amp crackles before opener 'Out Of Mind', which shares an upbeat sensibility with second track 'Under The Sun'. They form a euphoric introduction that updates 'Oshin''s hazy glow with new urgency. 'Bent (Roi's Song)' introduces a muddier sound and tangible despair. Cole mutters despondently about an addicted friend ("I lost you when you said one hit couldn't hurt a bit") over deathly feedback. But his lead quitar evokes hope, cutting through like sunlight between rain clouds. It does the same over the desperate wail of 'Mire (Grant's Song)', one of two homages to Sonic Youth (the other is 'Blue Boredom', on which Ferreira delivers a Kim Gordonstyle spoken word vocal).

It ends after 64 minutes with 'Waste Of Breath', which kicks from slow rumble into shoegaze wig out, steered expertly by Cole's hammering guitar. Its final note lingers, leaving the impression 'Is The Is Are' could be DIIV's definitive statement. Forget all the baggage – this is just a band in a room and the noise they make is thrilling.



SO OFTEN BIG TV STARS struggle to make anything like the same impact in film. Mad Men's Jon Hamm, The Wire and Luther's Idris Elba, the entire cast of Friends - they're A-list award magnets on the small screen but distinctly B-list on the big. Breaking Bad's Bryan Cranston may have made the jump, though, thanks to a stellar performance in this true Hollywood tale. It's already earned him an Oscar nomination.

Cranston plays Dalton Trumbo, a man not particularly well known outside movie-nerd circles but responsible for the screenplays

Helen Mirren as Hedder Hopper

for classics like Roman Holiday and Spartacus. His real life was more dramatic than anything he wrote as he was blacklisted by Hollywood in the 1940s and '50s for his communist beliefs. This was in the time when America thought Russian spies were hiding in every shadow. Trumbo served jail time for refusing to give information to the House Un-American Activities Committee, was banned from working for any movie studios and spent years trying to clear his name and those of his friends. It's a great big chewy role and



Cranston doesn't waste a morsel, playing Trumbo as an egomaniac with his heart in the right place. He's a hoot

The fact that it's a film about a great screenwriter puts a lot of pressure on Trumbo's script to convey that greatness. John McNamara's screenplay is functional with some beautiful lines but it's an A-to-B telling of the story and a lot of underdone characters surround Trumbo, particularly the 'villains' - anyone who's against our hero is painted as moustachetwistingly bad. Helen Mirren has some fun with the sweet-then-sour gossip columnist Hedder Hopper, whose obsession with communists here verges on fetishistic. Elsewhere characters are just

there to set Trumbo up for a zinger, with little sense that they might exist outside their scenes.

If its telling isn't subtle, it's still a terrific story about an entire country swept up in mass hysteria for so many years and Hollywood, mad at the best of times, descending into complete lunacy. And then there's Bryan Cranston in the midst of it all, giving a performance of such charismatic zip it should make him a movie star. Olly Richards

Show Me The Body

Truth-telling, cop-dodging, hardcore New York nihilists

EW YORK CITY IS a disgusting, roachinfested hellhole that punishes and pushes its millions of inhabitants to the very limit. At least, that's the New York that Show Me The Body seem to inhabit.

Theirs is a brand of music that's entirely at odds with the idea of conformity, both in a literal sense - they play shows "anywhere there's a bunch of kids and no rent-a-cop bouncer," according to frontman Julian Cashwan Pratt - and in their actual sound too.

Musically, it shouldn't work: a heady mix of hardcore influences. hip-hop values and, er, banjos intertwine to create songs that feel euphoric, scary and utterly forwardthinking. If pressed, we'd have to put the band in the same bracket as early Beastie Boys and PiL, when both of those bands were still figuring out exactly who they were.

For Julian, 21, who grew up going to shows at ABC No Rio on the Lower East Side ("It's the last real hardcore venue in Manhattan. Extreme bands from all over the country play there. Kids from all

over the city roll through") and cites poets Emily Dickinson and Audre Lorde as influences (Lorde's Uses of the Erotic: The Erotic As Power is "essential reading"), summing up Show Me The Body is a hard task. "Defining or labelling something is the same as making it a commodity. We're in the

business of building our own," he says. "Show Me The Body feels like a gang that doesn't care about money, drugs or turf, just the truth."

They're the most interesting new band America has thrown up in years and this week they hit the UK for their debut tour here. You'd be a fool to miss out. Matt Wilkinson
