DOCUMENTARY MAKER AND actor Alex Winter has raised \$1 million on crowd-funding website Kickstarter to make Who The F\*@% Is Frank Zappa?, a film about the cult musician who died in 1993.



#### Why does the world need this documentary?

"There's never been a full-on doc about Frank Zappa's life from birth to passing. It's important because he was such a seminal artist, composer, wit and thinker."

#### Why has no one made a proper Zappa doc before?

"Until recently Zappa's family didn't have control over his back catalogue, so it was difficult for a documentary maker to use his music. But in a way, Frank Zappa is really coming into his time now. Due to the digital revolution and the way millennials function, a multihyphenate like Zappa is more processable today."

#### You've been granted access to Zappa's hallowed vault. Will the contents surprise us?

"Man, without a doubt, Everything is down there: stuff he did with Captain Beefheart in high school, old notebooks, paintings, the master recordings from his live shows and all these interviews nobody has ever seen. There's more down there than I have time in my life to go through."

#### When will you finish the film?

"Getting access to the vault has added another two years to the project. For the next year. I'm doing nothing but archival preservation. It's a mammoth undertaking. If I didn't love Zappa, I'd shoot myself!"

#### So what's going on with Bill & Ted 3?

"Me, Keanu [Reeves, who plays Ted] and original writers Chris Matheson and Ed Solomon are getting the final touches done on the script. The general hook is: what are Bill and Ted like in middle age? It's Hollywood, so it could all go tits up, but we're basically in the early stages of pre-production. With all the will in the world. we should be able to make that f\*cker this year."

#### Not all men kill you if you leave them

M STILL WATCHING The People V OJ Simpson on BBC2. Of course I am. It's a masterpiece. I catch myself pondering how the series will end, then I remember that OJ definitely didn't murder Nicole Brown Simpson and Ron Goldman. Except that he clearly did. (If you're NME's lawyer reading this and you're feeling very worried, you can relax because I've learned a lot about how to do perjury after watching this thing, so we'll be cool. I'm not sure it'll be relevant in the forthcoming libel trial against us, but I've also picked up a few tips on how to make it look like my gloves don't fit me).

Brown and Goldman were found stabbed to death just days before my 11th birthday. Simpson was a person of interest to police but failed to turn himself in, becoming the object of a low-speed pursuit in his white Bronco SUV. I'm not sure of the level of UK coverage, but it took over every TV channel back home. I was staying at my best friend's house that night, where I was allowed to eat sweets and watch scary films. Amanda's mother bought her books about sex and let her shave her legs. She let us do whatever we wanted when I was over there, so encouraged us to watch the Bronco chase with her as it unfolded in LA. 'He killed her, he f\*\*\*ing killed her!' she screamed,

either down the phone to a friend or directly at the TV screen. Amanda's mother was a beautiful granola eccentric feminist and a survivor of abuse, so she followed her intuition that this was domestic homicide.

When you're little, every experience writes on the canvas of who you are. Simpson was acquitted of all criminal charges in the hugely publicised trial that followed, but I was certain he'd gotten away with murder. A few years passed and a lovely girl I worked with was stabbed to death by her ex-boyfriend - a man I'd seen around often. I ran - actually ran - home to tell my mother after the police had been to inform us at the restaurant. 'Mom, it's the worst thing ever! They'll make a MOVIE about her!' I won't forget the pain on my mother's face when she sat down to explain that: 'No, Katherine. They won't. Because this happens every day.' I'm 32 years old now and I've only just accepted that not every man will kill you if you leave him.

lasting implications. Racism is what acquitted OJ Simpson. In the wake of the horrific beating of taxi driver Rodney King by the LAPD in 1991, Simpson's 'dream team' of defence lawyers (Johnnie Cochran, John Travolta and Ross from Friends) were able to cast doubt by masterfully exposing the systemic racism of the LAPD. Twenty years later, what's changed? American police are still shooting unarmed black men in the street and the Republican front-runner for President, Donald Trump, wants to ban Muslims and Mexicans from entering the country. As my six-year-old daughter put it: 'Why is it these guys against those guys when we should all just be good guys against bad guys?' Because we're just too stupid, honey.



If there's one thing Elba is still wary of, it's in that last sentence. He's still making his peace with the personal attention that comes with reaching this level and being known as much for who he is as what he does. You don't make it to the point of toplining TV shows and movies without the world taking an interest in you personally. There are several points in our conversation when he becomes testy. The questions aren't about his private life or his family but about subjects on which he knows his responses will be widely quoted. And no, we didn't mention Bond. He's taken the position of refusing to talk about whether he wants to be the next 007, which is entirely fair given he's never had a meeting about it and the part is still technically Daniel Craig's. The subject that makes him turn inward is the speech he gave to Parliament on January 19 about diversity in TV, calling on those in power to do more to ensure that the faces on TV and the stories told are more representative of the people watching them. He wasn't

with a memory from filming Luther. "I think you have to re-programme your head a bit. I can't stand heights, but in Luther it seemed like every episode they wanted to put me on the roof," he laughs. "I'd be standing there going, 'Jesus Christ, what am I doing?' But now I don't - well, I don't love heights, but I don't have the same anxiety about it. That makes me a better actor. It's in trying things that you expand and learn. I'm intrigued by people who make things happen and think outside the box. Richard Branson and his whole empire. That's fascinating that he found a cohesive way to make it all work. In England we're usually like, 'Turn it in, you're doing too much,' but he was a mentor, in a sense, for my ambition. I think somehow that's what's happening to me. I've got all these strings to my bow. I'm not Virgin or anything but when I speak to kids, particularly boys of a certain age, they say, 'You're an inspiration.' I don't even know if they've seen my films, but they see I'm doing something."

specifically talking about black actors, but all people of colour, different sexual orientations, disabilities, gender identities. Basically just adding a few more shades to the kaleidoscope besides straight, white and middle-class. It was an important, powerful speech



– he's just been cast as the second lead in the big-budget adaptation of Stephen King's *The Dark Tower*, alongside Matthew McConaughey, in a role that in the book is white – so when and how did he make that change happen? He looks away. "I don't want to talk about that. I know it just gets misquoted and becomes a headline." It's not an unreasonable response. He's right – his opinions on these things do make headlines – but in the context of what he's trying to do for others, his own experiences feel important.

WE'RE MEETING today because he's working with the soft drink Purdey's on a campaign called Thrive On, which launches on April 27. It aims to encourage young people to follow their dreams, to try things they might not think they can do. It's fitting: Elba's success has made him not just a celebrity but a role model. The former is what he struggles with. "I'm still adjusting to celebrity, to be honest," he says, running a hand over his head. "You

can't imagine what it's like until you get there and I'm still there now. I like the work; that's what I like. The celebrity aspect is something else entirely." But does he accept it as part of the price of getting the best parts? "To a degree, yes. But I'm good

at being an actor, I'm not necessarily good at being a celebrity. I don't get a job and then think I need to be a good celebrity that's in *Star Trek*."



With everything he's already achieved, you have to wonder what's left for Elba to try. He has five films coming out between now and the end of summer. There's Star Trek Beyond, on which he's sworn to secrecy, the thriller Bastille Day and three projects that seem very un-Elba, in that they're designed for children: animations Zootropolis (out now) and Finding Nemo sequel Finding Dory, and then The Jungle Book (he voices the tiger Shere Khan – read our review on page 32). "I wanted to

make some things my kids could see," he says, grinning. "They can't watch the rest."

In summer he'll start work on The Dark Tower, his biggest project to date. It's a fantasy Western, Sergio Leone meets JRR Tolkien, with shootouts and magic. "That's going to be a long, technical shoot," he says. "I hadn't read any of the books but I like Stephen King and the director [relative newcomer Nikolai Arcel]." There are eight books in the series, meaning if the first is a hit it's a role Elba will be playing for years. "I like franchises," he says. "Franchises are long-term work. I like to take a character and do as much work [with them] as I can - Luther, the Marvel character... There are actors who prefer to jump from one to the next, but I like the idea of keeping a character going." Surprisingly, the other thing he wants to try is a musical on stage. "I don't know if I've got the chops to sing, but I'd like to explore it." Like he said: fearless.

All this, though, is only the second stage in the Grand Elba Plan. As you'd imagine, he's staked out his final act. "All these things I do are toward at some point less about making a living and more about influencing the next generation," he says. "When I'm acting less and not as popular, I think I could still be a beacon for another generation." Thing is, he kind of still is, even if he's still getting used to all that comes with that.

"Everything starts with dialogue, talking about it and understanding. I think my speech definitely fuelled ongoing debate," he says. 

# What's up

Last week, junior doctors across England held a fourth strike in protest at government proposals for changes in pay, hours and working conditions, which, the medical profession warns, will destroy the NHS. But what exactly are they fighting for? And how will it affect you? Sam Moore goes behind the picket line at King's College Hospital, London, to find out

#### Why are you here?

Because of the Conservative government's imposition of a contract, which we believe is unsafe and unfair.

#### What happens if you lose?

On a macro scale, I don't believe the NHS will be able to sustain the cuts. They're coming for the junior doctors now, it'll be the consultants next, and they're already removing some funding for nurses' training. I genuinely believe they want to break the NHS up, so if we don't succeed the NHS will be sold off to private companies.

#### And for you personally?

I'm not jumping ship just yet. But I have plenty of doctor friends who are leaving the NHS and going to work in Australia, where they treat their staff well, pay them fairly and the general quality of life is much better.

#### Why does this matter?

There's a generation of people who take the NHS for granted in a country where all healthcare is free at the point of entry. If we don't fight now, I don't believe we'll have an NHS worth fighting for in 10 years.




#### Why are you here?

To make a stand against the Department of Health and the government, represented by [health secretary] Jeremy Hunt, David Cameron and the Tories. Their approach to dealing with the junior contract has been completely unacceptable and unfair. Imposing a strike on any group of workers is a dangerous, futile and ineffective means of enacting change. The effect it's having on morale is appalling.

#### Why does this matter?

What's the alternative: do nothing? I'm not at work and I'm not getting paid today. I'm not going to be at home getting on top of life; I'm going to be out here taking a stand. We have a great opportunity at the end of April [all-out stoppages are planned for the 26th and 27th] to make a stand. It's going to crank up the pressure on the government to listen to us. We've got four more months to apply different strategies and we'll do that to the bitter end because we believe in this NHS dearly. To see it getting progressively weakened breaks the hearts of everyone who works in it.

#### What happens if you lose?

The NHS as it is now won't exist. It would be a disaster for recruitment and morale. If you don't have the doctors, who's working for the patients? Also, documents released this week have put in writing that this contract discriminates against women. So as a female doctor, I don't believe this contract should be going through.

#### Will these strikes make a difference?

I wouldn't be here otherwise. This is so important. We have to keep going and we have to stay strong.

#### Are you getting more support or criticism for what you're doing?

The public are mostly very supportive and we feel we're getting the message out there. The public are very supportive of the NHS, so they're behind our campaign.

#### What happens if you win?


We go back to the drawing board with negotiations. I can't predict the finalised contract, but the BMA would negotiate for a contract that's more beneficial for junior doctors and the public. We would save the NHS from what is doomed to happen if this contract goes through.

#### What happens if you lose?

We lose vital safeguards that keep us from being worked for multiple long shifts. It would reduce our pay for unsocial hours and it would increase the amount of time that 'social' hours exist for. It all adds up to us being overworked and patients being seen by doctors who are overworked. We want to avoid patients having a service that's five days stretched out over seven days.

#### Why does this strike matter?

The British public have told us that they care about having an NHS and free healthcare at the point of delivery. We're going to lose that if these proposals go through because we're going to lose doctors. We're looking at the beginning of the destruction of the NHS.





#### A new kind of war film

DIRECTOR GAVIN HOOD'S military drama takes place largely in real time. Colonel Katherine Powell (Helen Mirren) arrives at an underground military base in the UK and receives intel that three of the most wanted terrorists in the world have been tracked down to a house in Nairobi. She speaks to representatives of the UK Government in London and American drone operators to order a strike on the house. All is on plan until a young girl is spotted selling bread within the expected blast radius. Will anyone be prepared to give the order to kill the terrorists, and almost certainly save multiple lives, if it means definitely killing one child?

Working from a sleek script by Guy Hibbert, Hood presents difficult ethical puzzles, but he doesn't get weighed down in chinstroking stodge. This moves with the velocity of a thriller, briskly and clearly edited as we flash around the world, watching politicians pass the buck for fear of being labelled as child-killers in the press and army personnel trying to make them see the larger picture, the time to actually do something

useful quickly ticking away.

As an audience we're given no helping hand in deciding who to side with, because there is no right answer. Launch or abort, both decisions will result in death - but in one case they can see the face of the victim; in the other those faces are not vet known. It's a new kind of war movie. We're used to such things involving men with guns running at each other, but modern war is fought by people with high-tech cameras and long-range missiles watching from miles away.

Casting across the board is first-rate. Mirren is such a capable presence that we feel all her frustration at having her pragmatic approach muddied by people more senior and less intelligent. The late, great Alan Rickman gets lots of opportunity to be withering as a soldier babysitting nervy British politicians. Aaron Paul quietly carries most of the emotional weight as the grunt who'll have to launch the missile. It's a riveting thriller in which nobody's hands get dirty, but everyone's are covered in blood. **Olly Richards**

EVIN MORBY
has always been







