They played Creep!

On a Monday night in Paris, Radiohead played their 1993 track for the first time in seven years

RADIOHEAD'S SHOW AT LE Zénith arena saw singer Thom Yorke joke, "This is for the funny guy shouting 'Creep' – if only to shock you." The band have a troubled relationship with their breakthrough hit. Yorke's called the song "crap" and it's rarely performed live. The Paris show also saw the band play the new version of 'True Love Waits' for the first time. It was first played live in 1995, but only finally released in a studio format for the first time on new album 'A Moon Shaped Pool'.

So f**king special

Five geeky facts about 'Creep'

On its first UK release in 1992, 'Creep' only got to Number 78 in the charts. It took a 1993 re-release for it to hit hard, take off, go to Number 7, and launch Radiohead.

After being relentlessly played on Israel army radio, local fans were so into 'Creep' that when the band went over to promote it they mobbed them and ripped Thom's hair out.

Songwriters Albert
Hammond and Mike
Hazlewood successfully
sued Radiohead after
discovering a striking similarity
between 'Creep' and their tune
'The Air That I Breathe', a 1974
hit for The Hollies. Radiohead's
debut album 'Pablo Honey' now
credits the pair as co-writers.


When 'Pablo Honey' was failing to take off Stateside, US label Capitol called on then-massive cartoon duo Beavis and Butt-Head for help. A subsequent ad for the record read: "Radiohead – better than Butt-Head! Oxford England's rowdiest new band. Huh-huh huh, music that doesn't suck. Featuring the self-loathing

anthem 'Creep'."

In 1996 Radiohead toured America as Alanis Morissette's opening act. To close her headline set, Morissette and her band would perform a bombastic, drumstick-twirling version of 'Creep'.








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right time, it never runs over, it just works. Then you watch Woodstock and there's people just walking about going, 'Are you going on next?' It's that sort of vibe here. We're playing two shows at the stadium and even now that's still being figured out. No one really knows what to expect and that's way more exciting."

Those shows – which take place at the King Power Stadium this weekend (May 28 and 29) – will be another chance for the people of Leicester to celebrate an unprecedented year. "We've got a few little things planned that will make it really special," says Pizzorno. "It's also a chance for loads of our fans from all over the world to witness what's going on in Leicester."

Right now, on the afternoon of the parade, what's going on in Leicester is chaos. There's an estimate that 100,000 people will descend on the city's Victoria Park, but the sun is blazing down and Pizzorno correctly predicts that more than double that will turn out.

"We've no real idea of how many people are going to turn up," he says. "The only things I can liken it to are those Stones in Rio shows where they just go, 'Come down, it's free, it's on the beach...' When you go to a festival they have those 10-foot walls all around, but there's none of that. If you'd been living in a bunker and you were going to the shop, you'd go, 'What's going on over there?' and just walk in. You're in the mix. I've always dreamt of putting on a show like that. That's the ultimate, and to do it in Leicester after they lift the trophy? F**k!"

It feels like the collective dreams of a whole city are simultaneously coming true, making it an emotional day for people like Meighan, who knows in his blood what it means to this community. "We've all grown up with Leicester City," he says. "It goes right back to people like my grandad, who isn't here any more. He used to work with the players in the early '60s, people like Gordon Banks, Colin Appleton and Peter Shilton, when he was a boy. On a day like today you think of absent friends who you wish could've seen it, and what it would have meant to them. Me and my dad and my brothers cried and cried when we won. It's more than football. It's brought people together."

WHAT'S MADE Leicester's success this year connect with so many people is that they've done it without bringing in expensive recruits – most of the standout players have experience of playing in the lower leagues. "It's a team of misfits and rejects," explains Pizzorno. It particularly applies to Jamie Vardy, who just a few years ago was playing non-League football and working as a technician making medical splints.

"The Hollywood film was already on it with Vardy's story," he adds, "But when it started to unfold







that the team was going to go on to win the League... you'd be mad to write it. You'd go, 'That's bulls**t, you can't put that out there, nobody's gonna believe it!'"

Pizzorno spoke to Vardy after Leicester were crowned champions. "He said he wasn't going to take the medal off," he reveals. "I think they're just as blown away by the win as everyone else is."

Next year, the team will play Champion's League football for the first time. For Pizzorno, whose grandad emigrated to Leicester from Genoa in Italy, the promise of seeing his hometown team play in Europe is particularly poignant.

"Nobody's attacked the Champion's League in the way we're going to," he says. "It'll be interesting for those sides who like to keep possession, because our pace on the counter will surprise a few people. We're in Pot One, which makes a difference because we'll

miss a few of the big boys. That gives us an opportunity." Can Leicester captain Wes Morgan keep the likes of Barcelona maestro Lionel Messi in his pocket? Pizzorno

laughs: "It's difficult to say, but I'm quietly confident that we'll represent England very well."

After achieving so much this year, he's already dreaming about next season. "I'd love to see us sign Francesco Totti," he says. "I've heard it being bandied around and that would be the greatest. To see him run out in his low socks would be unbelievable."

Meighan adds: "In football terms, it's changed everything. I think that's great for all football teams, and for fans in general. It was the same old teams in the top four every year. What's happened is a miracle. It's like E.T. landing here, it really is."

That sense that anything can happen now has permeated the whole city and the band say it's sure to find its way into their new music. "Has he told you about the new album?" blurts out Meighan. "I'm not supposed to tell ya, but we've got some new songs and things ready for the future. This euphoria is bound to channel into it. We're in such a good place right now."

The whole town is. All through the season, Leicester fans have hailed goals by chanting: "Jamie Vardy's having a party, bring your vodka and your charlie" – and now the day of that party is here. As we make our way to the park the streets are swamped with fans in blue shirts and every shop in Leicester is displaying some sign of support for their local team.

Everyone has a personal story: Mr. More, owner of an all-you-can-eat buffet, stops us to tell us that he's been for a meal with midfielder N'Golo Kanté, while a waitress shows off a selfie with manager Claudio Ranieri. Today, all the schools in

the city have sent kids home early so they can attend the parade. By the time the team bus arrives at the park, the turnout is thought to be 240,000 – 72 per cent of Leicester's entire population.

The whole day feels like a wild celebration – and often a surreal one. The main stage welcomes cheerleaders, Bollywood dancers and even a gospel choir who sing terrace chants and 'Come On Leicester Boys' to the tune of Slade's 'Cum On Feel the Noize' – surely one for Kasabian's next album.

By far the most deafening roar is reserved for when the team finally appears and Ranieri and Morgan lift the Premier League trophy in front of a crowd that sprawls like Woodstock. After he comes off stage, Morgan reflects on sparking such vast celebrations. "Seeing everyone enjoying themselves just shows how much support we have and what we've achieved this season," he says. "It's fantastic. I'm just trying to let the moment sink in."



They close with 'Fire', the song that played whenever the team ran out for their home games. It's come to mean a lot to band, team and fans alike. Earlier in the season, Ranieri told the press: "I think I know the Leicester fans very well. They're [passionate] supporters and I told my players, 'When you go on the pitch and you hear the song from Kasabian, that means they want warriors.' I want to see them as warriors for the fans."

That's exactly what he got, and the sea of 240,000 people bouncing in unison to it marks the end of a day of celebrations and the start of a night of serious partying. Kasabian finish by hoisting a Leicester City flag between them as Meighan belts out: 'Championes'. When the band return to the King Power stadium for two huge celebratory gigs this weekend, the party will still be in full swing. It seems that for the whole of Leicester, fantasy has become reality and Ranieri's words will still be ringing out: "Dilly ding, dilly dong! Keep dreaming! Keep dreaming! Don't wake up!"

SHE WORKS WITH ALL THE RIGHT PEOPLE

The Weeknd guested on Grande's song 'Love Me Harder' long before he was a global phenomenon, and she lit up Justin Bieber's remix of 'What Do You Mean?' last year. Now, on new album 'Dangerous Woman', she adds vibey Atlantan trap man Future, prolific rap legend Lil Wayne and smoky-voiced R&B star Macy Gray to her roster of collaborators.

2 SHE TAKES THE PISS OUT OF HER SQUEAKY-CLEAN IMAGE

In February, she popped up in Zoolander 2 as a gimp-maskwearing orgy participant. Then in March, when she hosted Saturday Night Live, her entire opening skit was a song called 'What Will My Scandal Be?', mocking Bieber-level PR disasters that could take her career "to the next level". It skewered the bizarre, pearl-clutching reaction America had to the only real scandal she's been involved in so far: licking a doughnut she hadn't paid for in a Californian bakery last July. Also, check out her Snapchat, where you'll find her giggling at extreme close-ups of a horse's knob and doing crap impressions of characters from 1996 revenge comedy The First Wives Club.

3 INDIE HEROES DO HER SONGS AT KARAOKE

Last year The Vaccines frontman Justin Hayward-Young told NME, "She's the most unbelievable singer, so [doing her songs is] always an absolute disaster. 'Break Free' is the one that's really hard. But I'm ambitious."

SHE HATES SEXIST BULLS**T

She responded to media speculation about her love life (after splitting with Big Sean she was linked with 1D's Niall Horan) with a blog post confronting "double standards" and "misogyny", writing: "If a woman TALKS about sex openly... she's shamed! But if a man talks or RAPS freely about all the women (or more commonly used 'b***hes / hoes'... how lovely) he's had... he's regaled." She also made a hapless host on LA's Power 106 radio look like an idiot when he asked her to choose between her phone and her make-up. The 22-year-old calmly responded, "Is this what you thinks girls have trouble choosing between?" later adding, "I think you need a little brushing up on equality over here."

5 SHE WAS IN A LAME NICKELODEON SHOW, BUT SHE MADE IT FUNNY

Grande played Cat Valentine, the Phoebe Buffay figure of Nickelodeon's high school-based Victorious. Valentine was a zany, high-pitched naïf with red hair who would periodically say things like, "Yay! Crayons!"

6 SHE CAMPAIGNS FOR WHAT SHE BELIEVES IN

As a vegan and supporter of PETA, Grande's spoken out about animal rights, encouraging her fans to boycott SeaWorld (inspiring the likes of Harry Styles and *Breaking Bad* star Aaron Paul to do the same). Last year she recorded a song with Miley Cyrus as part of Cyrus's Happy Hippie campaign, which helps homeless and LGBT youth – and this year she fronted a new line from MAC Cosmetics that donates its profits to help those living with HIV and AIDS. Right on.

SHE'S NOT AFRAID TO CRITICISE AMERICA

During the doughnut-licking incident last July, Grande's offhand comment, "I hate America" – referring to junk food culture – was caught on camera and headlines branded her a villain. In her first apology video, she explained

the context, but the apology wasn't enough and for her own good she was forced to record another apology. Many outlets still didn't forgive her, so in October she released a song called 'Focus', in

which she sings, "If my real ain't real enough, I'm sorry for ya, bae".

8 SHE SMASHED IT AT THE WHITE HOUSE

Aged just 20 and surrounded by legends like Aretha Franklin and Jill Scott, she performed 'I Have Nothing' in front of the Obamas for a Women of Soul event. She opened her performance with the query, "Mr President, Mrs Obama – what's up, how are ya?"

9 SHE WANTS TO EMPOWER HER FANS

"I want to be empowering my fans," Grande said of 'Dangerous Woman' two months ago. "To me, a dangerous woman is someone who's not afraid to take a stand, be herself and to be honest." She did the very same last June in an essay about slut-shaming and misogyny, which read, "Being 'empowered' is not the same as being a 'b***h'... I'm tired of living in a world where women are mostly referred to as a man's past, present or future property. I do not belong NME to anyone but myself."

HEN HE appeared on the NME cover back in January 2014, we called Chicago's Chance The Rapper "the

most famous unsigned artist on the planet". Over two years on, 23-year-old Chancelor Bennett's DIY attitude hasn't budged an inch. His stunning third mixtape 'Coloring Book' was selfreleased, like its predecessors, and features a starry cast that includes Kanye West, Lil Wayne and Justin Bieber. Here's how Chance The Rapper made the year's best hip-hop record...

HE OUT-KANYE'D KANYE

Wake up, Mr West – Chance The Rapper is nipping at your heels. Kanye bigged up his latest album 'The Life Of Pablo' as "a gospel album with a whole lot of cursing on it". In truth, the record's uplifting gospel elements were window-dressing to a dark, paranoid work that dealt with self-obsession and the claustrophobia of fame. In fact, its opening track 'Ultralight Beam', sampling the traditional gospel song 'This Little Light Of Mine', was the only one that lived up to the gospel billing. Chance featured as that track's star turn, rapping, "This is my part, nobody else speak".

Chance took those themes and ran with them on 'Coloring Book', effectively making the album that Kanye had claimed 'Pablo' to be. His sunny collaboration with Kanye 'All We Got' (which also features the Chicago Children's Choir) opens the record. Ye recently tweeted, "My brother Chance!!! Thank you for letting me work on this masterpiece. One of my favorite people." Kanye isn't known for his bashfulness. When he defers to you, it's safe to say you've got it made.

HE'S PLAYING BY HIS OWN RULES...

Like London's similarly independent Skepta and Jme, Chance isn't interested in the traditional inner workings of the music industry. He almost signed to a label in 2013, but backed out because he realised they were unlikely to allow him to play 2,000-capacity shows with no official album – only mixtapes – to his name.

Last year he told The Fader magazine, "I've had a lot of advice from people [in the music industry] who wouldn't give me that same advice today. It's not even that they have any ill-will towards me because I didn't take their advice at the time. They're almost like, 'Keep going. You're in uncharted territory and you're helping to shed light on what [the future of the business] will look like... We're all curious.'" Chance, it's your move.

AND DEFYING EXPECTATIONS

He started out typically enough, handing out mixtapes while at school in Chicago.

But when 2013's 'Acid Rap', a jazzy, soulful record that served as a counterpoint to the aggro drill sound his fellow Chicagoan Chief Keef was leading, saw him poised to become a star, Chance retreated into a group scenario as a member of hip-hop/soul/jazz four-piece The Social Experiment.

Their 2015 album 'Surf' was downloaded over 600,00 times in a week on iTunes. True, much of this hype was centred around Chance's involvement, but he was always keen to emphasise the egalitarian nature of the project. The point being, Chance The Rapper does things his own way and he couldn't care less about being a celebrity.

COLORING BRILLIANT ALBUM THAT MAKES YOU **FEEL GOOD**

On 'Blessings (Reprise)', Chance raps, "I speak of wondrous unfamiliar lessons from childhood / Make you remember how to smile good." Forget acting like a badass: Chance The Rapper wants to help you reconnect with the wonder of your early years, when every day felt like an adventure. A list of the nostalgic references he runs through: Harry Potter, Dragon Ball Z, Space Jam, The Lion King and roller-skating. Don't let adulthood corrupt you, Chance is saying, because the dreams you had as a kid are still attainable.

'S AFTER KENDRICK LAMAR'S **CROWN**

It influenced David Bowie's final album 'Blackstar' and set the bar for modern hip-hop - the genre doesn't have to be politicised but Lamar's music certainly sounds like an implicit challenge to the likes of Atlanta rap outfit Migos, whose materialistic rhymes have few hidden depths. And Chance's 'Coloring Book' belongs in the same category as '...Butterfly'.

On his previous mixtages '10 Day' and 'Acid Rap', Chance cast himself as a lovably goofy stoner suspended from school for smoking weed (a genuine anecdote from his adolescence). Here, though, he embraces religion and spirituality. He's tweeted that the track 'Same Drugs' "isn't about drugs". Instead, when he raps, "We don't do the same drugs no more", he's talking about accessing a higher plain through "happy thoughts" and becoming as close to life as possible, living fully in each moment. When it comes to self-actualisation, Chance and Lamar are singing from NME the same hymn sheet.



Vintage Jarvis

The Pulp frontman and foremost writer of dirty ditties has surprise-released four tracks to accompany a new TV show



WHEN JARVIS COCKER recorded a tribute to the victims of the Paris terrorist attacks and broadcast it on his Radio 6 Music show - Jarvis Cocker's Sunday Service - last November, listeners dared to dream he might record new music again. Aside from some deeply experimental cuts for his 20 Golden Greats exhibition, the Pulp frontman hasn't brought out any new music since his 2009 solo album 'Further Complications', suggesting he'd all but retired from recording. Well, fear not, because Jarvis has returned and he's back to his lascivious, brazen best on this four-track EP, written to

Based on four short stories by author Neil Gaiman and directed by lain Forsyth and Jane Pollard (who oversaw the Nick Cave mockumentary 20,000 Days On Earth), the series consists of, in Cocker's own words, "four grubby tales set in all-night cafés, low-rent drinking dens and doctor's surgeries".

accompany the upcoming TV

series Likely Stories.

Cocker's passion for Paris (where he used to live) is evident, with 'Main Theme' undoubtedly influenced by his hero, scandalous French singer Serge Gainsbourg. We've been here before of course, on all of Pulp's 1998 album 'This Is Hardcore' and bits of 1995's 'Different Class', but never quite to this degree of salacity. The roll call of musicians includes Portishead's Adrian Utley on

synths and Scott Walker's percussionist Alasdair Malloy, but it's Jarvis's inimitable spoken word that really gets the hairs on the back of your neck standing

to attention.

"Roundheads and cavaliers," he quivers, "adult themes and childhood fears". Our avuncular protagonist goes on to list a baby in

a jar, an old man in a car and a cow jumping over the moon – and if things weren't surreal enough, he's then joined by a celestial choir. It's a cinematic and slightly troubling creation perfect for a series of small-screen psychological thrillers, but 'Main Theme' stands up on its own as a composition too.

The remaining tracks are scaled-down variations on the same musical theme, including the creepy 'Looking For The Girl', and 'Foraging', where he recites a list of edible fungi found in Britain. It's been a while, but if this taster is anything to go by, you can hopefully prepare yourselves for some more vintage Jarvis in the not-too-distant future.







Almost famous

CATFISH & THE BOTTLEMEN

CATFISH & THE Bottlemen's rise from pub-circuit obscurity to the top of the indierock food chain has been a tale of Leicester City-

esque proportions. With their weird name, laddish leanings and meat-and-potatoes musical philosophy, Van McCann's lot were unfancied and unfashionable from the get-go, but somehow contrived to turn that to their advantage; indeed, their success could almost be viewed as a protest vote against the slow, unheralded demise of the working-class British guitar band. Suffice to say, when it came to the group's 2014 debut 'The Balcony', the people spoke louder than the critics - NME included - and ensured The Bottlemen had the last laugh.

Yet the frontman is also selfaware enough to recognise his limitations. "I call people like David Bowie and Lady Gaga 'artists'," he recently told one interviewer, "but I'm not one." He's a crowd-pleaser, and his second album is engineered to do just that: 'The Ride' is confident, self-assured and terrific fun at times, and harbours no illusions about being anything more than that.

As you might have guessed, then, the order of the day is more of the same. There's a worldweariness that wasn't present on 'The Balcony' - "Larry, call a load of smoke in / I wanna disappear for days" orders McCann on opening track '7', while 'Anything' finds him brooding about how "I don't wanna picture our first-born / If you've stopped discussing names with me" - but McCann's world continues to revolve around airls. gigs and going out. The hooks are plentiful, the energy is palpable and even the quieter moments, like the jaunty acoustic shuffle of 'Glasgow', are delivered with charm and cheekiness.

As on their debut, the sound is slick and polished and the songs are snappy and unpretentious, but there's a lack of wit or invention. More tellingly, while McCann might boast of having written "hundreds" of songs, he's yet to pen a bona fide classic - 'Soundcheck' gives it a spirited go, but The Bottlemen still don't have an 'I Bet You Look Good On The Dancefloor', 'Wonderwall' or 'Time For Heroes' in their arsenal. Certainly, the choruses of songs like 'Twice' or 'Postpone' are impressive in the moment, but they don't stay with you. For a band hellbent on world domination. Catfish & The Bottlemen appear strangely at ease with just being good.



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Alice in snoozeland

Once the thrill of the cast and visuals wears off, this follow-up to Tim Burton's *Alice In Wonderland* is a drag

ALICE THROUGH THE LOOKING GLASS

TIM BURTON'S 2010 adaptation of *Alice In Wonderland* wasn't the freaky masterpiece fans of Lewis Carroll's beloved 1865 novel were hoping for. But the CGI-heavy film was a huge box office hit, grossing over \$1 billion globally to become Burton's biggest ever seat-filler. Even so, Disney could only persuade him to return for this

film as a producer, so James Bobin (The Muppets, Flight Of The Conchords) has been drafted in to direct this even wobblier follow-up.

Based only loosely on Carroll's own sequel book Through The Looking Glass, the story follows headstrong Alice Kingsleigh (Mia Wasikowska) as she takes a second trip to Underland / Wonderland by leaping into a magic mirror after a tense exchange with a business rival. Back in this fantastical alternate universe, she finds her old friend the Mad Hatter (Johnny Depp) suffering from a debilitating case of depression because he's missing his family, who were apparently killed many years before. With encouragement from the kind-hearted White Queen

(Anne Hathaway), she borrows a time-travelling device called the Chronosphere from Time personified (Sacha Baron Cohen) so she can travel back to save the Hatter's family Depp charms again, Cohen is amusing, pompous and self-contradicting and Helena Bonham Carter, given a grossly oversized head with CGI, has fun stomping around as the sadistic Red Queen. There are also entertaining turns from Matt Lucas, as dim-witted twins Tweedledee and Tweedledum, and the late Alan Rickman who, in one of his final film roles, lends his unmistakable voice to Absolem the caterpillar.

But although screenwriter Linda Woolverton paints Alice Kingsleigh as a kind of feminist pioneer taking over the family business from her father, Wasikowska's heroine is less compelling than she should be.

The time-travelling narrative never quite grips either, which means Bobin's film begins to drag once the thrill of the visuals wears off. Alice Through The Looking Glass has some diverting moments, but don't expect to leave grinning like a Cheshire Cat. Nick Levine

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





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
