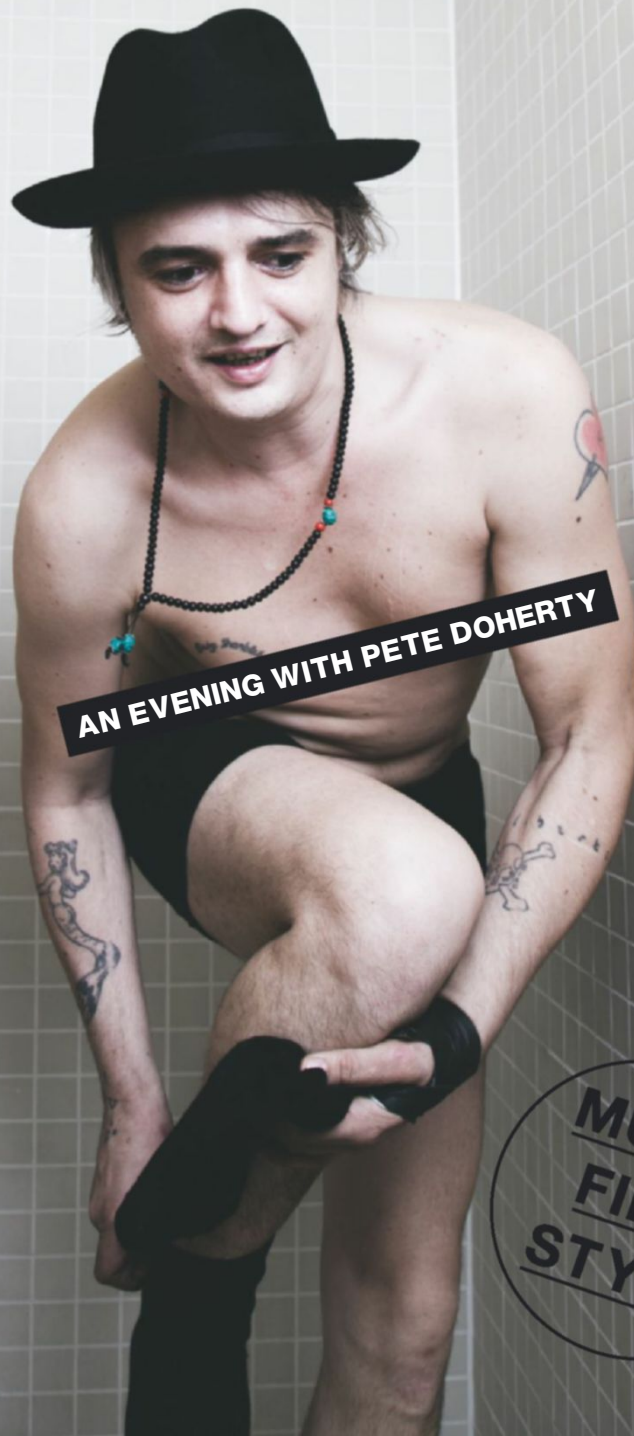

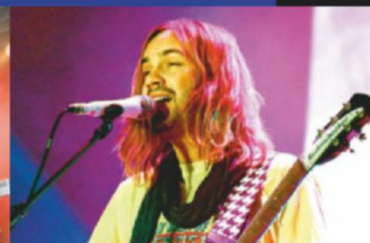

This means war

Moon director Duncan Jones has turned dangerously addictive video game *Warcraft* into a film. Toby Kebbell, who plays the orc Durotan, takes us inside the adaptation

ALTHOUGH FILMS BASED ON video games are often greeted with suspicion, *Warcraft* arrives on a massive wave of anticipation from both movie buffs and the gaming faithful. That's partly because the *Warcraft* franchise has been big business for over 20 years, attracting 12 million online subscribers at its peak. "I was always aware of how truly huge the game was," says British actor Toby Kebbell, who brings the hulking character of Durotan to life with a highly skilled performance. It's also because the film boasts a genuinely credible director: Duncan Jones, the man behind intelligent sci-fi flicks *Moon* and *Source Code*. "He was very capable of making the film he saw in the script – taking it through the

process of production and still coming out with the film as he envisioned it," says Kebbell. In an era of big-budget films being altered in the editing suite, against the director's wishes, that's some accomplishment.

Kebbell, known for his roles in *Dawn Of The Planet Of The Apes* and *War Horse* as well as Charlie Brooker's *Black Mirror*, says he was attracted to *Warcraft* by both Jones and the meatiness of his role. "This was an opportunity to play a character who's trying to behave in a certain way before something big happens and he just flips over," he says. "He's so rich and the beauty of motion capture is you get to play a very detailed character. Once they're not worrying about whether your face sells tickets, you really are in that process of getting to do as much with the character as you possibly can."

Though Kebbell obviously relied heavily on his own imagination while shooting the film in a motion capture suit against a green screen, he says he was helped by a full-sized bust of Durotan that took pride of place on set. "He was very impressive standing at full height. I got into a habit of patting his head every time I walked past."

THE ONE THAT DID EVERYTHING WRONG

SUPER MARIO BROS 1993

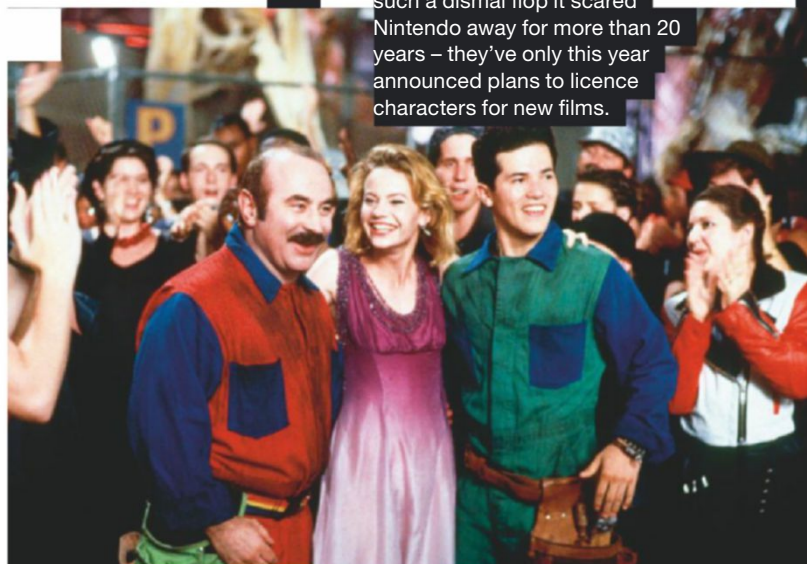
The games: A sprawling, joyful gaming empire that made unlikely icons out of a tubby plumber and his lanky brother, with valuable lessons to teach about the properties of mushrooms, the aerodynamicism of bunny ears and that, while turtles should be crushed, dinosaurs are adorable.

The movie: Load of old goombas. It was rewritten constantly throughout filming, bore only a vague resemblance to the game, and Bob Hoskins (Mario) and John Leguizamo (an unforgivably moustache-free Luigi) found the experience so unpleasant they spent the majority of its filming pissed.

What it did: Hollywood's first foray into video game adaptations was such a dismal flop it scared Nintendo away for more than 20 years – they've only this year announced plans to licence characters for new films.

THE ONE THAT WASN'T CRAP

LARA CROFT: TOMB RAIDER 2001

The games: Released on the PlayStation in 1996, *Tomb Raider* made an instant icon of protagonist Lara Croft, a badass puzzle-solving archaeologist with somewhat polarising anatomy.

The movie: Starring Angelina Jolie, the film went to great lengths – exotic shooting locales, elaborate stunts – to re-create the detailed world. As a result, it was the first genuine game-based hit, making over a quarter of a billion dollars at the box office.

What it did: Proved that game adaptations don't have to stink. Also struck an unlikely blow for feminism, briefly holding the record for the highest opening-weekend gross for a movie with a female protagonist, thanks to its fully-rounded (shut up), three-dimensional character.

THE ONE WITH THE CREEPY CGI STAR

FINAL FANTASY: THE SPIRITS WITHIN 2001

The games: Sweeping and epic, the *Final Fantasy* games combine mythology and technology to tell vast stories of battles between good and evil, with fun stuff like creature-summoning spells.

The movie: The first full-length, photorealistic animated film, *The Spirits Within* was a surprisingly joyless experience despite boasting state-of-the-art effects. CGI protagonist Aki Ross was intended to become a franchisable "actress" who'd star in multiple movies, but this wasn't to be – the film was a critical and commercial flop.

What it did: Proved that humans were still pretty essential to engage an audience.

THE ONE THAT PUT PLAYERS IN THE PICTURE

DOOM 2005

The games: The original *Doom* (1993) pioneered the first-person shooter genre, showing a world of demons, hellspawn and gore through the eyes of its protagonist.

The movie: Remembered mostly for starring Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson, even if he'd rather forget.

What it did: There were two moments in *Doom* that resonated with fans. One was when Johnson declared "Big... F**king... Gun!" using a fan's nickname for the game's "BFG" weapon. The other was a first-person sequence that replicated the look of the game. People spend *hours* inside games' worlds, so homages and in-jokes are always going to go down well.

THE ONE WITH MILLIONS OF SEQUELS

RESIDENT EVIL 2002

The games: Known as *Biohazard* in Japan, the *Resident Evil* series deals with the zombie-fuelled aftermath of experiments by the mysterious Umbrella Corporation.

The movies: The games were used more as a jumping off point for the series, with Milla Jovovich as an ass-kicking, gun-toting amnesiac named Alice.

What it did: The only successful game-to-movie franchise, the series has made a fortune and the sixth *Resident Evil* film is coming out next year. The key to this might be the relationship between the star (Jovovich) and producer (Paul W.S. Anderson) – they're married.

ON JUNE 23, THE UK VOTES on whether or not to remain in the EU. That's the Thursday of the Glastonbury Festival, by which point the vast majority of festival-goers will be on site and high-tailing it across a field because someone said there's a secret Craig David set happening. Glastonbury organisers have already confirmed that there won't be a polling booth on site, but don't worry – you can still party on the farm and get your vote in the EU referendum. Here's how.

1 MAKE SURE YOU'RE REGISTERED TO VOTE
The deadline is June 7.
Check you're on the list at aboutmyvote.co.uk.

2 APPLY FOR A POSTAL VOTE
Use the website to register for a postal vote by 5pm on June 8 (June 3 in Northern Ireland). You need to return your form by 10pm on polling day, so send it before you leave for Glastonbury.

3 MISSED THE POSTAL VOTE DEADLINE? GET A FRIEND TO DO IT INSTEAD
You have until 5pm on June 15 to arrange for someone to vote on your behalf. They must be registered to vote themselves and they can't be registered for more than two proxies.

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EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

Beck in business

Beck is back with the brilliant wild funk single 'Wow'. NME caught up with the maverick American singer-songwriter to find out more.

What inspired 'Wow'?

I was working on a different song – maybe [2015 hit] 'Dreams' – when I had an idea for a flute beat. I picked up the mic and 'Wow' came out totally spontaneously. I forgot all about it until it was on the studio one day and someone said, "You should put that on the record." I went, "I don't think anybody would like this." When the record company said they were putting it out as a single, I was like, "Really? 'Wow'? Huh... OK then."

What's the album like?

It's what exists in the range between 'Dreams' and 'Wow'. I've worked on it with [producer and former bandmate] Greg Kurstin for three and a half years. I was constantly touring while making it, so I was attempting to bring some of that energy into the studio, which isn't always easy. If I get three songs on a record that work live, I'm happy. This time I'm trying to make them all work live.

When will it be out?

Probably in the fall. It's essentially done. I don't have a final title yet.

'Wow' has a hip-hop feel.

Which rappers are making you go "wow"?

That world has so much happening. Los Angeles is having a renaissance with people like Kendrick Lamar. I like the new Chance The Rapper record a lot. Four or five months ago we tried to get Chance on 'Wow'. I'm not sure what happened with that.

'Dreams' and 'Wow' are euphoric. Are you in a happy place personally?

Yeah. I had a spine injury and there was a long period where it wasn't easy to make music. Recovering has made a huge difference.

Since leaving London in 2009 to help kick his drug habit, **Pete Doherty** has led a nomadic existence. **Matt Wilkinson** joins him in a chaotic Hackney hotel room to talk about life, *The Libertines* and his rallying cry against terrorism

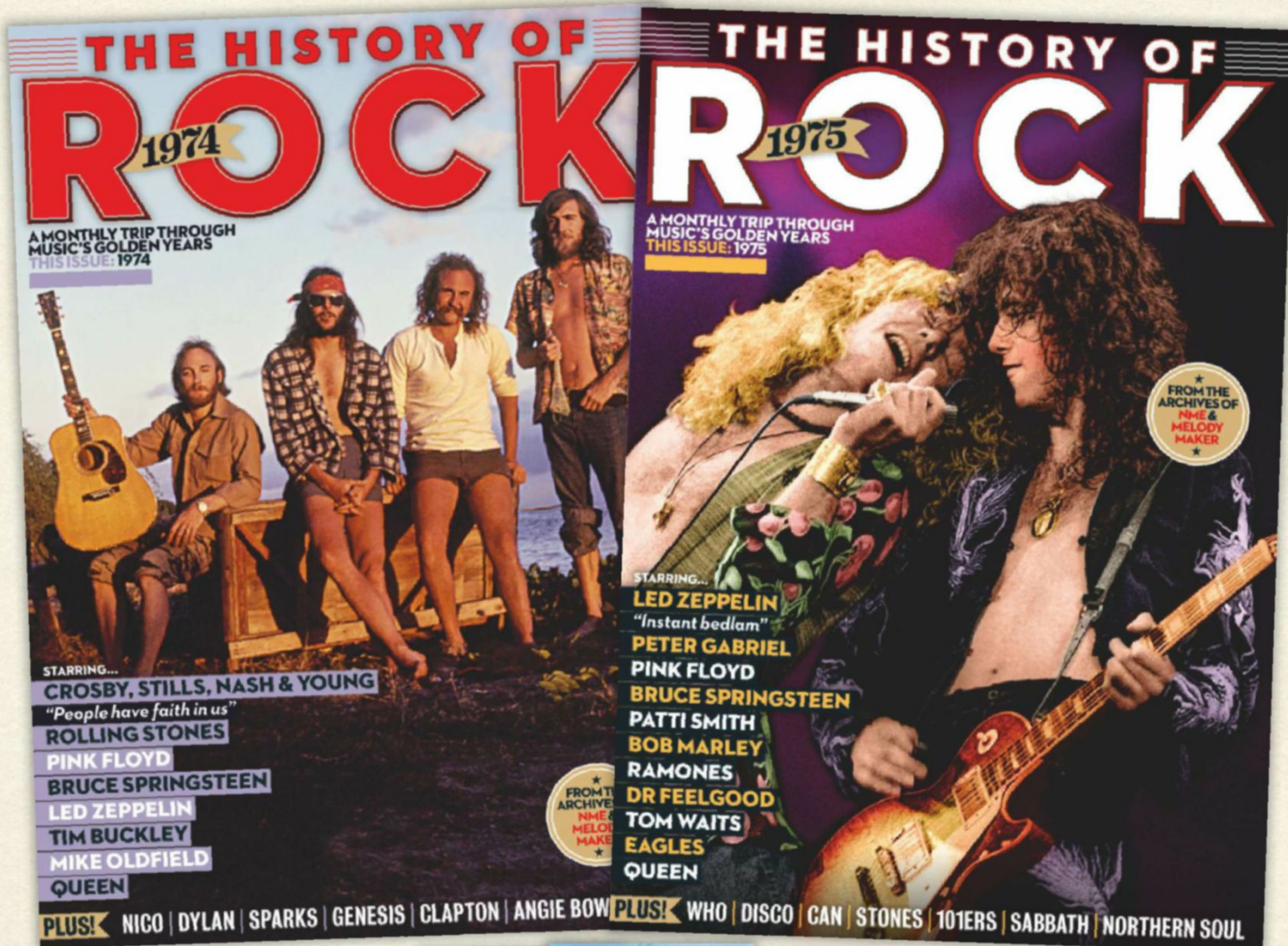

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"OI! MATE! Try not to stand on that, will ya? I know it might not look like much, but a lot of it's important. Just take your boots off!"

IT'S 3AM and I'm edging my way around Pete Doherty's east London hotel room, trying to find bits of carpet underneath the heaving mass of stray guitars, strewn clothes, shoes (no laces), toolboxes, paintboxes, beer bottles, water bottles, lighters, typewriters, ripped-up letters, blood-splattered artworks-in-progress, passports, laptops and other assorted paraphernalia that obliterates every centimetre of the room. It's impossible, so I give up and take refuge on the edge of the bed.

Opposite me, Doherty is leaning on an ironing board that has a pressed shirt draped valiantly off it – a singular piece of perfection among an Aladdin's cave of disjointed personal artefacts. He's just played a solo gig at London's Hackney Empire, larking about in front of the cameras beforehand for *NME* photographer (and long-time Libertines cohort) Roger Sargent. At one point during our shoot, without direction, he suddenly beckons Sargent into the backstage toilets, turns on the showers and strips butt-naked, hat aside. Sargent snaps away while Doherty, much like a naughty, drunk schoolboy, cackles maniacally. The entire room, watching open-mouthed, suddenly erupts with him.

But right now, with his post-show adrenaline rush fast subsiding, he's knackered. He only checked into the hotel two days ago, but this has been his way of living for many years now. Something of a nomad since leaving London in 2009 in a bid to kick drugs, technically Doherty splits his time between Paris and the UK. But he's set up shop anywhere and everywhere over the past few years, thanks to his and girlfriend Katia's beaten-up '80s camper van, which they drive everywhere. This includes the middle of Hyde Park: when The Libertines played there to 65,000 people two years ago, Doherty shunned the offer of a tour bus, instead making the journey himself from

France via Glasgow, where the band had played a warm-up gig. When he arrived, he simply tooted his horn, drove in, parked up next to the stage and played the biggest gig of his life. Then he drove all the way home again.

"I could be anywhere," he says when I ask why he doesn't settle. "I just need my space to work. When I'm here [in the hotel] I live like I do at home, really. I just need somewhere I can live affordably."

DOHERTY WAS in the French capital during the terrorist attacks last November, and was the first artist announced to play the soon-to-reopen Bataclan theatre, where 89 died, a year on from the tragedy. Given his ties to the city, that must have been a no-brainer when the offer came in? "Well, yeah. I went down there [after the attacks] and just sat outside with my guitar. Just to be there. Katia lost about five people she was at school with."

He wonders if the French government

should have paid for the attackers' funerals (he can't decide), and berates the fact that it was young people who committed the atrocities.

"They're declaring war on their idea they've got of the decadent West, and Satan. They just believe that Satan controls our politicians, our production and the decisions that are made by people in power. And they're willing to die for it. They believe they're the victims."

"Anyway," he says, "Let me play you this... It came out of nowhere, *bang*."

Onto the stereo comes a jaunty, Pogues-esque demo of a track called 'Hell To Pay At The Gates Of Heaven'.

It's so simple and immediate that I recognise it straight away from the gig Doherty played with his new solo band a few hours previously, where it had cut through instantly. Although he debuted eight unreleased tracks in total at the Hackney Empire show (all are vying for inclusion on his forthcoming second solo album), there was something bigger about this song, a three-chord, whiskey-drenched waltz complete with impassioned vocals and a brilliant line about John Lennon's favourite acoustic guitar, the iconic Gibson J-45.

"It's about the f***ing Bataclan," Doherty says of the track. "About how we're under attack. At that age, when you're desperate to fight for something it can catch you off balance. When you've got the faith and belief, you'll put as much into it as a lad who's obsessed with guitars. So the lyric is, '*Come on boys, choose your weapons / J-45 or an AK-47*?' Both take dedication and belief. To fight, or to make music."

If he nails the recording properly, 'Hell To Pay At The Gates Of Heaven' has the potential to rival Doherty's greatest songs. Tracks like 'Time For Heroes' (written about the May Day riots in London in 2000) and 'Albion' (which he wrote as a teenager obsessed with William Blake, Oscar Wilde and the idea of total, unabridged escapism from all mainstream realities) stand the test of time not just because they're indie classics, but because they say something meaningful.

But with over a decade of tabloid headlines about him, it's easy to forget just how adept and vibrant a songwriter the 37-year-old is. While his battle with addictions has been well-documented, he says he now has regular bursts where he's able to manage them. "I think I've probably slept 27 of the last 30 nights" is his way of telling me he thinks he's doing OK. His relationship with

What's next for The Libs?

The reunion isn't over yet...

Unofficially, The Libertines are on ice for the next 12 months, while Doherty, Carl Barât and bassist John Hassall all focus on solo projects. There are, however, a few gigs on the cards. "I'm always the last to know, of course, but apparently we're playing some gigs in Chile, Argentina and Brazil," Doherty says. "I've got a feeling I'm gonna love it over there." Fans should keep an eye on their solo shows too – at Doherty's second Hackney Empire gig in May, all four Libs ended up jamming onstage.

his parents, meanwhile – his father refused to talk to him at the peak of his addictions a decade ago – has improved tenfold. “Yeah, it’s f**king great. It makes me wanna try harder. He’s reaching out to me.”

THROUGHOUT IT all, Doherty is always writing music. He shows me his iTunes collection on a battered and blood-splattered laptop, and there are hundreds of unreleased recordings. He’s currently itching to release a few of them as his second solo album, the follow-up to 2009’s ‘Grace/Wastelands’. Whereas that record was a treasure trove of songs that tapped into the collective consciousness of everyone from Gorillaz to Bert Jansch, the new batch are far more simplistic. There’s ‘Kolley Kibber’, named after the Brighton Rock character and with dreamy, Lee Hazlewood-style backing vocals. There’s ‘Birdcage’, which is like a long-lost St Etienne track living inside a garage-rock shell. And there’s ‘She Is Far’, a beautiful, pastoral folk song that was originally written by a teenage Doherty alongside ‘Albion’ back when he was still learning the guitar. It sounds like something Neil Young might have come up with had he moved to London rather than California in the mid-’60s, and was partially inspired by Simon & Garfunkel’s ‘The Boxer’. “Some people have this inverted working-class snobbery where if you like Simon & Garfunkel you have to be put up against a wall and hurt. But that’s a great song,” Doherty says proudly.

Recorded at Hamburg’s Clouds Hill Recordings with producer Johann Scheerer over the past couple of years, the tracks are currently the subject of a record company bidding war – so it’s still unclear when they’ll be released. But Doherty, having grown tired of waiting, has already taken matters into his own hands and formed a new solo band to play the songs live.

“It was only 10 days before the first gig of this tour [he played a handful of UK shows in May] that I decided I wasn’t just gonna do it acoustic. I went for a little relaxation in the camper van with Katia. We were gonna go and see my sister in Madrid, but we stopped off in Barcelona and I met Rafa, who I haven’t seen in years. He’s a drummer – he’s always been looking for a break. He was in a Tarantino covers band! And we had a jam and then we thought, ‘F**k it, let’s do it.’ So Drew [McConnell, Babyshambles bassist] flew over, and then Stefany [Kaberian] came in with the accordion, and Miki [Beavis] turned up with a violin.”

THE FIVE-PIECE are joined on some songs by Katia on keys, and although they’re a mishmash of different styles, there’s a freshness in the way they gel together. While some people might think it wildly uncool for a guy so closely aligned with garage rock to flirt with something that, on paper, seems closer to

Mumford & Sons than The Clash, Doherty has always been a devotee of folk songs (today he’s on a country tip, waxing lyrical about Gram Parsons and Blaze Foley). It’s a far cry from The Libertines’ huge festival fees and travelling crew of 40 roadies.

“People are so far away,” he says of gigging with The Libs, adding that on their last arena tour six months ago he struggled with the lack of interaction between the band and audience resulting from that distance.

“I don’t enjoy it,” he says matter-of-factly, “but I have to do it because it’s in my blood, it’s in my soul, it’s who I am. But I would never use the word ‘fun’ [to describe it].”

I’m surprised by his honesty, and press him on it. He can enjoy playing those huge Libertines shows, he eventually admits, but he has to dig deep. “This is something I have to learn – this is a fault of my own. It’s not an idealistic thing where I think, ‘You should not have fun, you should be serious.’ Not at all. I’d love to go out there and have fun and enjoy it, but I just can’t. It’s not in my make-up. I find it very difficult.”

The new solo band, Doherty says, will provide something of an antidote to all that. “These new songs, this new line-up – I’m part of it, you know? It’s a small group. There’s more people in the band than there are in the whole crew plus management.”

I ask him if he ever finds it difficult to write, and like everybody else I’ve posed the question to – from Paul McCartney to Alex Turner – he says no. He just picks up a guitar, finds a melody and presses record. Where Doherty differs from the others, though, is that he’d be fine if it was all to stop tomorrow.

“I wish that would happen, because I could just crack onto something else. But it just keeps coming. I think I’ve got a lot of wasted... I’ve got a lot of things invested in my songwriting and it drains me. Too many things get in the way of the essence.”

The essence, he continues, is finding that one-in-a-million tune. When it happens, everything pays off. “At the moment, I’m really inside these new songs. I believe in them. And I know if people are into my other tunes it’s just a matter of time. Sometimes people just need two or three listens. Or sometimes I’ll get to the second chorus and that’s it – they know the song and they love it.” With that, he picks up a guitar and sings. “Come on boys, choose your weapons...”

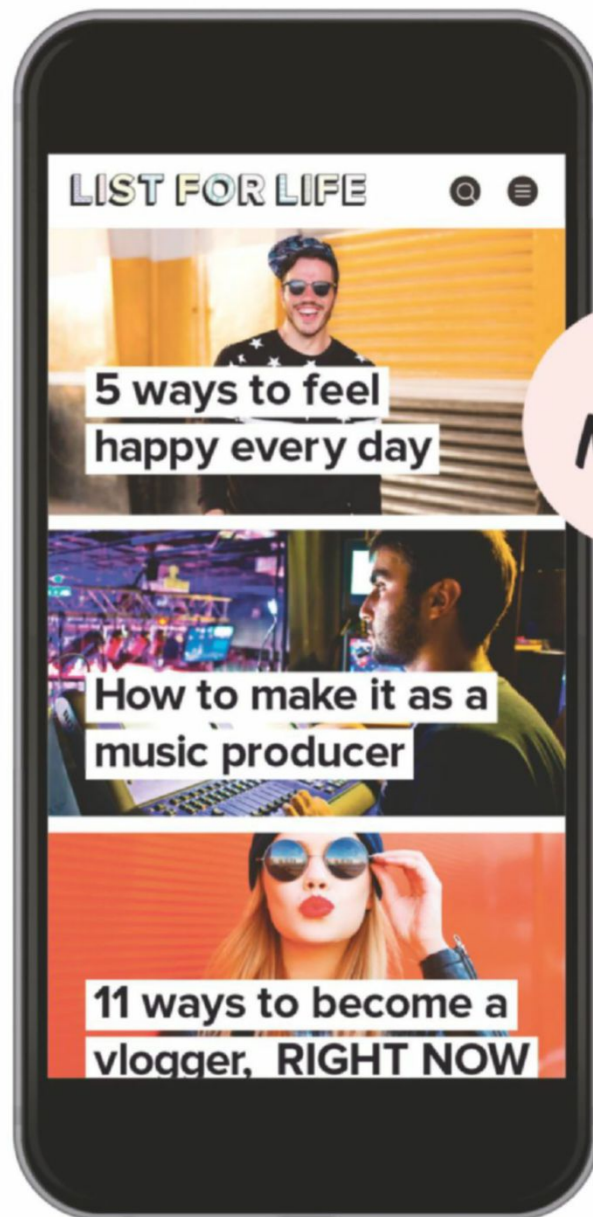

Manchester garage-rockers **Spring King** aren't your average indie hopefuls. They don't drink, they don't cheat and they don't fight. They do play till they puke, though, as Jonny Ensall finds out

Pete

IT'S TEMPTING, seeing how they play, to think of Spring King as a bunch of indie hopefuls who'll fall apart in a spectacular frenzy of drink, drugs and ill-advised tweets – but that's not likely, reckons Pete. "To turn up hungover to a gig is kind of disrespectful," he says. "Also, I'm short and skinny and only have one vein, so I get pissed after a single pint."

If they have allegiance to any city it's not Manchester but Liverpool, where Tarek studied music and where their friends, in bands such as Stealing Sheep and All We Are, hang out. "We'd never fit in with that Manchester scene," says James, the excitable one. "Our look is too nerdy." Style-wise they tread the fine line between grungy insouciance and plain old laziness. Tarek tried to up the fashion ante by wearing a shirt for their recent appearance on *Later... With Jools Holland*, but it backfired. "Elton John was there," he says with a grimace. "He looked me up and down and said, 'At least some of us made an effort!'"

Really, Spring King are just four nice, geeky twentysomethings. They don't drink on tour and they don't fall out – which is handy, because they've spent hours cramped together in Tarek's mum's Honda saloon. Early tours in support of Courtney Barnett and Slaves made them "deathly ill" says Andy, as they struggled to hold down day jobs too. While James worked at an insurance company and Pete at a bakery, Andy had a job cleaning out cages at an owl sanctuary – at least for a while. "I accidentally bashed an owl on the head with a broom and killed it," he says. "I thought nobody would notice, but a few days later I was called into the office. They were like, 'We've just found a dead barn owl with its legs sticking out of a bin bag...'"

It was in June 2015 when things took a sharp turn for the better. Entirely out of the blue, Zane Lowe played 'City' as the first song on Apple's Beats 1 radio station. The phones started ringing, and within months Spring King had signed with Island Records. "It's a crazy story," admits Pete.

Listen through once, and 'Tell Me If You Like To' sounds cheap, dirty and easy – in the best possible way. With Tarek producing, there's just as much scuzz as those bathroom sessions. "I was always limited in the house, and I like that challenge," he grins. Listen again, however, and you might detect a hint of loneliness and desperation behind the poppy front. "Tonight I just wanna be somebody else, somebody new," Tarek wails on 'Who Are You?'. It's a bit like The Beach Boys, I suggest – sad songs that sound happy. "I'll take that," says Tarek. "I love Brian Wilson... I spent years alone, with my parents coming in and out of my life," he goes on. "My dad's always lived abroad. My mum followed him, trying to keep a steady relationship going. I was spending months on my own, with just Pete or Andy coming over. That's why I connected with Brian Wilson, in a way, because he had a bit of a weird upbringing as well. But I don't compare myself to him. The guy's a genius."

Three quarters of an hour before stage time at the Arts Club, Liverpool FC lose to Sevilla and the city stops drinking to celebrate and starts drinking to forget. Inside the venue, Spring King have their own processes to be getting on with – Andy and James do stretches. Pete eats a Pret sandwich he's been saving. Tarek concentrates on not vomiting. The preparations are sober, considering the audience are definitely not.

Eventually, with the small room humming with anticipation, Spring King take the stage. Tarek launches into 'Let's Ride' – the first ever Spring King song – his quiet persona deposited in the dressing room for the gig. Immediately a mosh pit appears. There's sweat – so much sweat – dripping off the walls and ceiling. A crowd surfer rises briefly, before crashing back into the melee. It's chaos, and it couldn't be more exciting. And Tarek keeps the burrito down. It takes guts to be a rock'n'roll star. And he's got them.

When Spring King play live, they play hard. So hard that sometimes frontman Tarek Musa loses his dinner to the floor. "At the 100 Club I chucked over a burrito encore," he recalls

after a gig in Liverpool. "And then at [London venue] Heaven. Backstage, this guy was like, 'Yo, great set!' and I threw up on his shoes." Tarek is Spring King's singer and drummer, and a "burrito encore" ("it's always after a burrito") is what happens when he attempts both with the same furious energy during one of the band's sweat-drenched, 100-mile-an-hour live shows.

If on record Spring King's songs sound like they were thrashed out in a smashed-up bathroom, it's because many of them were. Spring King began when Tarek challenged himself to write and record a song a day in the unused privy of his family home outside Manchester. "I think I racked up about 70 of them," he says. "If I hadn't finished it that day, I deleted the track." The band's debut album 'Tell Me If You Like To', out June 10, is a brilliant edit of his bloodthirsty appetite for songwriting. Standout tracks 'City', 'Who Are You?' and 'Rectifier' are power-punch garage-pop, and so easy to sing along with they make The Stone Roses' 'All For One' sound like a Radiohead B-side.

Tonight, Liverpool is the city doing the singing – but not just because Tarek and the rest of the band (Pete Darlington on lead guitar, Andy Morton on rhythm and James Green on bass) are in town. Spring King's date at the Arts Club falls on the same evening Liverpool FC play in the Europa League final and the atmosphere in the city could be described as "pissed". So it's Spring King vs the football – although Tarek's battle will likely be more akin to *Man V. Food*.

5 REASONS TO LOVE RED HOT CHILI PEPPERS

1 THEY'RE MADE ENTIRELY OF SEX

Well, at least 96.4 per cent. They live in Californication. They're in constant infringement of public decency laws requiring them to wear at least one sports sock each at all times. And, in song, they make Russell Brand look like McLovin – there's so much giving it to your mama and 'zephyr' innuendo going on, you'd think they stole all their lyrics from texts sent in to Babestation. Like Gene Simmons minus the make-up, they're shameless shaggers and that makes their live shows a feral, fundamentally seamy experience that all funky horndogs – which, let's face it, is you and all your friends – can relate to. Don't take a potential partner along before date five, though, they'll run a mile.

2 THEY'RE MAKING THE WORLD A BETTER PLACE

Beyond their Olympic-level bedroom undertakings, RHCP are a social and political force for good. 'Californication', for instance, was more about Hollywood spreading false fantasies of perfection than David Duchovny Netflix-and-chilling his way through most of LA, and such issue-raising bleeds into their activist leanings. They've headlined fundraisers for Barack Obama and Bernie Sanders, spoken out against US gun laws and Native American issues and played charity shows for cancer causes and victims of Hurricane Katrina. Yes, it's like your Tinder hook-up rushing you out of their flat to vote, but we salute them.

3 THEY STILL KNOCK OUT HITS

Like Oasis, every Chili Peppers album comes with at least one certified mega-banger attached. 'By The Way', 'Dani California', 'The Zephyr Song'; even through their 'difficult' third decade the quality of their singles has dipped as little as their sex drives. Even 'Dark Necessities', the Chic-like first single from new album 'The Getaway', has the scent of a RHCP classic, its disco-noir groove giving way to a middle eight so Beatledelic you suspect they intended it to be their 'A Day In The Life'. Or rather 'A Day In Your Wife'.

4 THEY'RE TESTING THEIR BOUNDARIES

Anyone that's sat through one of RHCP's month-long festival jam sets dreaming of a swift and merciful death might think the band are stuck in a funk-rock rut. Not so – with 'The Getaway' they've worked with Danger Mouse to help them out of eight months of limbo in the wake of Flea breaking his arm in a snowboarding accident. "The only way that we saw this working," says singer Anthony Kiedis, "was to have trust in him and get rid of our old ideas and our old way of doing things and say, 'If this is going to work, we just have to throw ourselves off the cliff and see what happens.'" Bungee funk, anyone?

5 THEY KNOW HOW YOU FEEL

Lost a loved one? Half of 'One Hot Minute' was tributes to the likes of Kurt Cobain and River Phoenix. Self-harming due to drug or alcohol problems? That was the other half. Whether in love, rehab, the depths of depression or the heights of coital ecstasy, RHCP have been there and documented it. They're basically your entire life in quick-fire rhyming couplets, with its wang out. Go listen.

5 REASONS TO HATE RED HOT CHILI PEPPERS

1 THEY MAKE BAD SONGS THAT SOUND BAD

Red Hot Chili Peppers are the worst advert ever for musical cross-pollination. They offer rock that does not rock; funk that is not funky; hip-hop with no flow; psychedelia stripped of trippiness. It's a perfect sh*t-storm of plodding riffs, flightless melodies and spiritual-as-a-dolphin-meme lyrics. It's telling that, despite being one of the world's most successful groups for more than quarter of a century, RHCP have proven amazingly uninfluential. Pretty much the only direct RHCP progeny ever were Hoobastank. Remember Hoobastank? 'Course you don't. Not even Hoobastank remember Hoobastank, and they were Hoobastank.

2 THEY REEK OF GROIN

Thrusting groins; sweaty toplessness; "I put my middle finger in / Your monthly blood is what I win." The Chili Peppers are like 14-year-old boys in a boob shop – leering, phwoaring, pungent with a clumsy, macho horniness that's nauseating to behold. "Whatta gat ah gatta give it tuya muthaah!" bawls singer Anthony Kiedis, lunging his 50-something knackers at the audience like some cruel parody of a menopausal surf-jock. He's engorged on Viagra, dizzy on Relentless, gate-crashing a sorority party. Ew. Dude. Put it away.

3 THE NEVER-ENDING NOODLING

Ever seen Red Hot Chili Peppers live? Holy sh*t. They make Muse look like masters of pithy brevity. You know that 32-year-old guy who works in your local music shop? Looks like he's probably called Richard? The guy with the ponytail, Game Of Thrones T-shirt and a vast bunch of keys on his belt? The guy who's forever demonstrating his fretboard wizardry to what he imagines are wowed customers – his eyes closed, lost in soulful concentration, blissfully unaware of all the awks cringe he's generating? Well, imagine there's four of him, and they're onstage at Wembley, and they've been told to faff, noodle and tit about as if their lives depended on it. That is exactly what watching the Chili Peppers live is like.

4 THEY'RE THE SOUND OF GIVING UP

For all their rad tattoos, rehab tales and surf-bro dancing, the Chili Peppers are as middle-of-the-road and crushingly suburban as it gets. They're the band you listen to when you can't be arsed keeping up with music any more; when the joy of discovering the new, the mad and the challenging has long since faded and all you want is comforting aural soup with no unpredictable bits or emotional upheavals. You hum along to the Chili Peppers in coffee shops. They're background muzak as your sat-nav guides you to Worksop. The world turns. Monday's here again. You finger-tap along to 'By The Way'. A sigh. A yawn. A shrug. The grave draws ever nearer.

5 SHUT UP ABOUT CALIFORNIA ALREADY JESUS CHRIST

Every band is allowed to write one song about their hometown. To date, the Chili Peppers have written 3,236 songs about California. Knock it off, lads. Be reasonable.

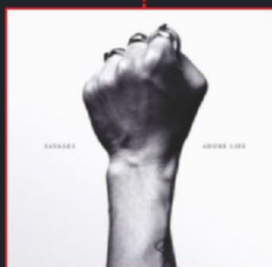

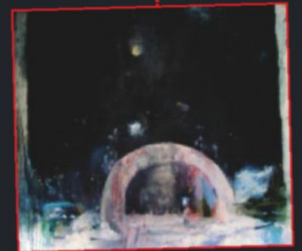


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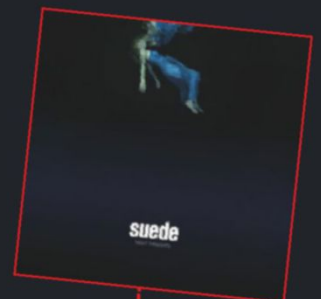

EIGHT ALBUMS INTO THEIR career, Canadian twins Tegan and Sara have made their definitive record. 2013's 'Heartthrob', which boasted the pounding 'Closer', revealed the former indie rockers as a force to reckon with in the pop world. If that album was a surprise left hook, 'Love You To Death' is an indisputable KO.

From the kaleidoscopic swirl of opening track 'That Girl' to the crystalline sheen of power ballad 'White Knuckles', the Quin twins are relentless in their quest to move our hearts and feet – often in different directions. Like Robyn's stone-cold 2010 classic 'Dancing On My Own', these are buoyant pop songs with a heavy heart – their lyrics dealing respectively with "getting sick and tired of things getting tough" and "breaking each other like knuckles in a fight". On first listen, they appear to reveal romantic relationships gone wrong, although the musicians have admitted that they're directed at one another, referencing disputes that nearly broke up the band. Well, it must sometimes get rough when you write, record and tour with a sibling for almost 20 years.

Light, airy ballad of regret '100x' (released with an unbearably cute,

tongue-in-cheek video of pooches enjoying a wind machine caressing their fur in slow-mo) continues in this vein, although the emotional heft of the album is anything but one-note. 'Dying To Know' whirls around the listener like a post-breakup maelstrom of pain and bewilderment: "You hurt me bad / I wanna understand / Hit me back / Because you owe me that." Meanwhile 'U-Turn', clocking in at under three minutes, is glorious, strutting pop-funk, a sassy paean to maturity: "Gonna sit myself down / Rein my pride in / Start to focus / Change who I've been." The latter is directed at a romantic partner whom the narrator has vowed to finally fully appreciate.

It's the shimmering highlight of an album packed with shimmering highlights, though the centrepiece here is the pulsating lead single 'Boyfriend', as Tegan and Sara finger-snap at a same-sex lover unwilling to commit. It's kind of a riposte to Katy Perry's 'I Kissed A Girl'. Katy, here are two contenders for your pop crown.

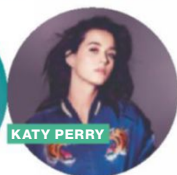

Hitting their peak

SYNTHS HEARTBREAK SLEAZE

THE KILLS HAVE always been underdogs. Even after 15 years together, four albums and a heap of acclaim, Jamie Hince and Alison Mosshart's biggest UK headline show remains a gig they played at Brixton Academy in 2011. Not even guitarist Hince becoming a regular in gossip columns during his five-year marriage to supermodel Kate Moss could shunt them into the bright lights.



On 'Ash & Ice' none of that looks set to change, even though their fifth album comes after high drama for the band. Hince recently shut his hand in a car door, leaving him needing a tendon transplant and having to relearn how to play guitar. To make up for his diminished skills he brought in synths and samplers, making the electronics the duo have always flirted with much more pronounced. It's obvious right from the start, as opener 'Doing It To Death' floats along on a rippling synth line that you'd expect to hear in a tropical club anthem. Despite such flourishes, 'Ash & Ice' still sounds unmistakably Kills.

The guitar lines are as fragmented and fractured as before, still coated in filth and sleaze. Their world has expanded more now, bringing influences of blues ('Hum For Your

Buzz'), gospel ('Impossible Tracks' samples the drums from Mighty Voices Of Wonder's 'I Thank The Lord') and dancehall (the twerking rhythms of 'Days Of Why And How') to the fore.

For singer Mosshart, her lyrics are much more open. Piano and acoustic ballad 'That Love' has her doomed and destroyed ("It's over now / That love you're in is f**ked up"); then she's giving up on 'Hum For Your Buzz' ("I'm a believer, but I can't think straight... / The hum of the buzz, can't take it no more") and resigned on 'Bitter Fruit's twitchy rock ("I am the seed of a dead age"). She sings of a love falling apart but manages to sound stronger than ever. The Kills are finally hitting their peak, but a low-key kind of peak.

IT TAKES A LOT TO BE HAPPY in music. With their new band Whitney, former Smith Westerns songwriter/guitarist Max Kakacek and drummer Julien Ehrlich have hit upon a sweet spot that not only translates when you listen to their gorgeous debut album 'Light Upon The Lake', but also drives everything they do as a band.



Witness the six-piece Chicago act live and you'll see a mesh of stretched smiles as they play their woozy blend of countrified soul.

Positive vibes are as important to their music as their Vox AC30 amps. It's hugely infectious to

watch, because it's been such a long time since anybody else in the indie stratosphere has employed such a trait so believably.

With Whitney, it's as if Kakacek and Ehrlich (who here sings lead and plays drums) are two kids who've come from broken homes and suddenly found their stride again. Both were visibly unhappy when Smith Westerns petered out in 2014, which is perhaps why their initial concept for starting Whitney – the name refers to a fictional character; a 'somebody' of their own making to write songs for – was so appealing. From opener 'No Woman', 2016's most affecting and beautiful song, you're with them all the way.

All 10 tracks on 'Light Upon The Lake' share a serene, peaceful bond, with Ehrlich's startling falsetto bringing to mind Bobby Charles and Shuggie Otis, two genial artists whose personalities have always shone through on their records. Childlike, honest and a touch bruised, Ehrlich joins their ranks as a promising young pretender. Kakacek, meanwhile, was always a gifted musician in Smith Westerns. But whereas

his tightly wound riffs used to pay homage to the powerful techniques of Britpop-era Noel Gallagher and Bernard Butler, here he plays the subtle card to perfection. The whole band do, with a glorious gospel mood empowering and binding them.

Bass, horns, strings, organ and choir provide the backbone, and when Whitney allow themselves to kick it up a gear and really let rip, as on 'Golden Days' (with its cathartic "Na na na" outro) or the George Harrison-meets-The Band magnificence of 'Dave's Song', they're untouchable.

"I may or may not have come close to crying," admitted Ehrlich about recording his parts for the album. Listen closely and you might too.

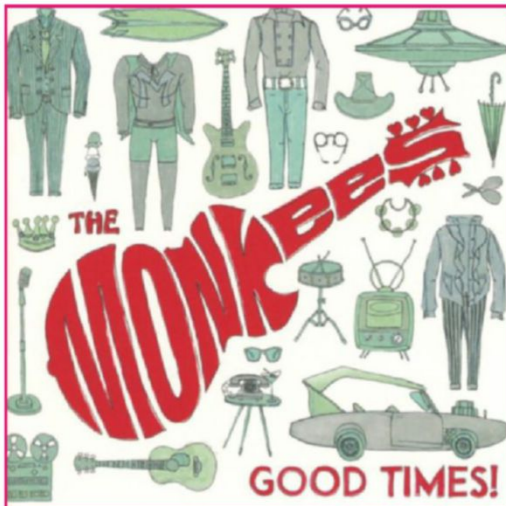

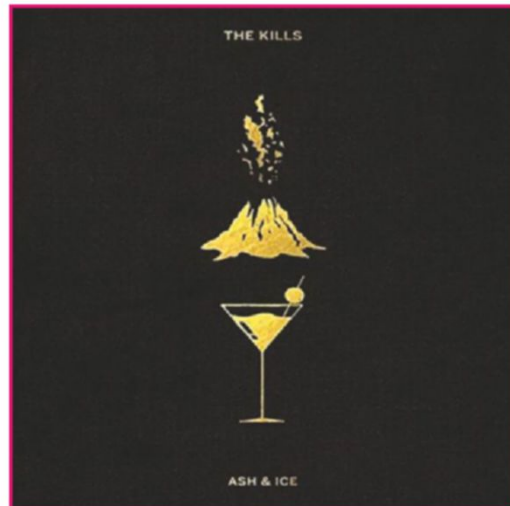

Reinventing Ryan

Ryan Gosling excels as a feckless and cowardly private investigator in a buddy comedy full of wit and energy

RYAN GOSLING HAS BEEN in a dark place for a long time film-wise. Since 2011's *The Ides Of March* he's been mining dark dramas, stepping only briefly into comedy for a small role in last year's *The Big Short*. Yes, his lightest role in five years was in a film about the global economic collapse that nearly bankrupted the entire world. You can see why he'd be keen to decompress.

Gosling lets it all go in *The Nice Guys*, blowing out a comedy performance of screaming, rubber-limbed glee. In leave-it-all-on-the-floor physical terms, it sort of brings to mind Johnny Depp in the first *Pirates Of The Caribbean*, before Captain Jack became schtick. It's that committed.

In this '70s-set new comedy thriller by writer-director Shane Black (*Kiss Kiss Bang Bang*, *Iron Man 3*), Gosling plays Holland March, a goofy private investigator who only takes cases that

involve no actual investigation, mostly from confused, rich old ladies. Being an idiot, he one day takes the wrong case, probing the death of a porn actress, Misty Mountains. Holland's half-hearted sleuthing puts him in the path of Jackson Healy (Russell Crowe) – a fellow PI as rigorous and violent as March is feckless and cowardly – whose own investigation involving a missing girl seems enmeshed with March's somehow. These two completely mismatched men team up to crack this one big mystery, and you can imagine how that goes.

While its Raymond Chandler-meets-*Boogie-Nights* story has all the touchstones of film noir – exploited starlets, corrupt cops,

silent killers – the crime-solving is almost beside the point. The cracking of the case very often relies on fortuitous coincidence, the two men arriving in the right place at the right time or, in at least one instance, the vital clue literally falling on top of them. That's all just grist for a buddy comedy of tireless wit and energy. Crowe happily takes the position of the gruff straight man, which still gives him the most entertaining role he's had in years, and stands aside to let Gosling throw himself bodily into every comic scenario. Let your freak flag fly a while, Ryan. It suits you. **Olly Richards**

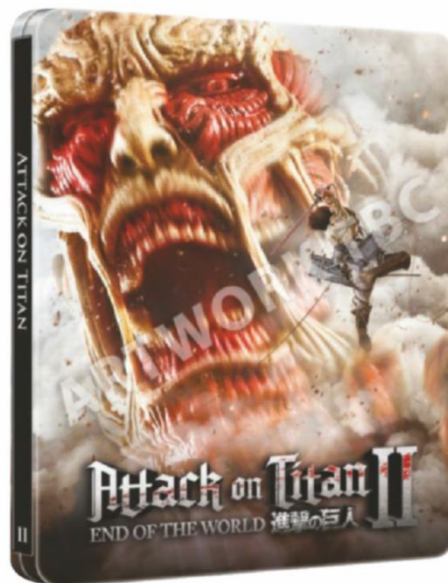


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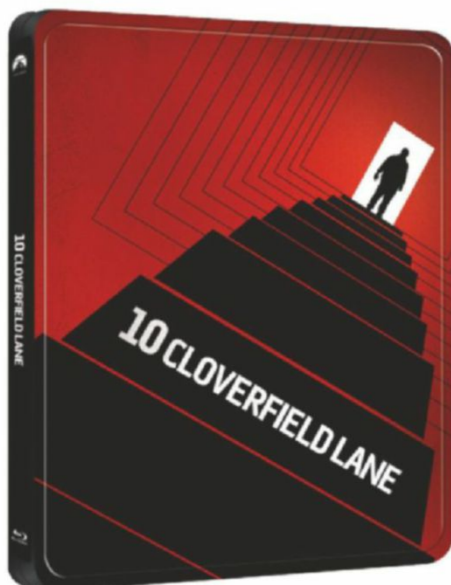

Raising hell

Outcast will fill the *Walking Dead*-shaped hole in your life

EXORCISM HORROR FEELINGS

THE WALKING DEAD creator Robert Kirkman has turned his *other* comic, *Outcast*, into a big-budget US series, mixing *Twin Peaks*' brooding atmosphere with *Exorcist*-style horror – and it's already been renewed for a second season. We asked its cast what's new in the world of demonic possession.

How would you compare *Outcast* to *The Walking Dead*?

Reg E. Cathey: "It's almost like a different guy wrote it."

Wrenn Schmidt: "Robert Kirkman turns a genre on its head with both shows. He makes something that could be very simple much more interesting."

Some of the scenes are actually pretty gruesome, aren't they?

Philip Glenister: "That's the difference between British TV and American TV. In America they just show you that in the first minute. There's not that apologist attitude."

How did you find the Southern accent, Phil?

Philip: "I kind of enjoyed it after a while. I started to believe I was from Rock Hill [in South Carolina, where filming took place]. That was the challenge, trying to fool people who started talking to you in the shops."

Did the comics influence you as actors?

Patrick Fugit: "I drew a lot of mood and physicality from the comics initially."

Wrenn: "It was a really good starting point, getting an idea of the world and then walking away from it."

Kate Lyn Sheil: "Some of the physicality of the characters is there in the drawings."

Philip: "I thought my character in the comic looked like a cross between Elton John and Philip Seymour Hoffman. I nearly walked!"

Tell us about the demons in the show.

Philip: "One of the biggest plot points is the Reverend (Glenister) and Kyle (Fugit) figuring out what the rules are – how the demons differ."

Reg: "Something is happening to this little town that's driving everyone a little mad. And that's scary already. Then when you see what it is, it's *really* scary."

The small-town setting is very atmospheric too – is that significant?

Reg: "I spent a lot of time trying to figure out what it represents to Robert Kirkman. Is it just another small town or is he trying to make another statement? That's part of the joy of the show for me."

Do you think demons exist?

Reg: There are cases where something off is happening to a person.

Kate: There was a moment a few years ago where 'bath salts' incidents were rampant.

Reg: 'Bath salts' is a drug that makes people eat people. And *The Walking Dead* was really big so it was a whole 'zombie drug'. This one guy ate his best friend's face. After he came down, he was just crushed.

Kate: So don't do 'bath salts'...

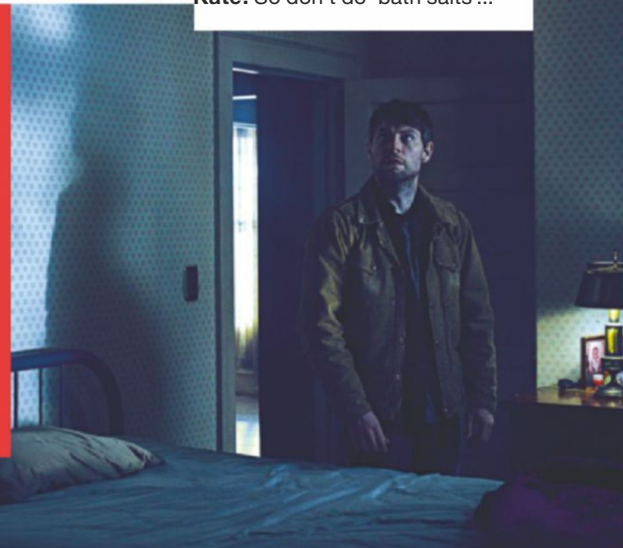

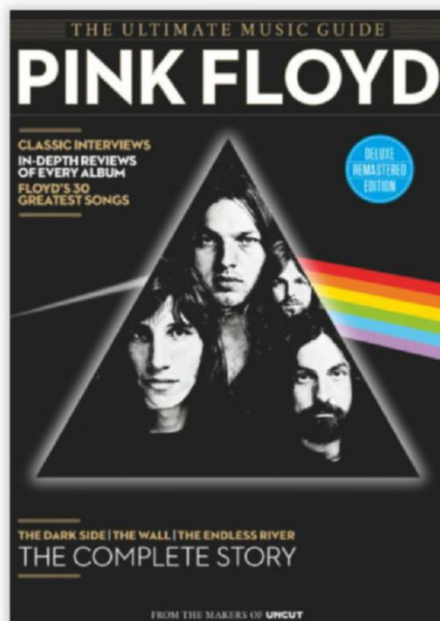
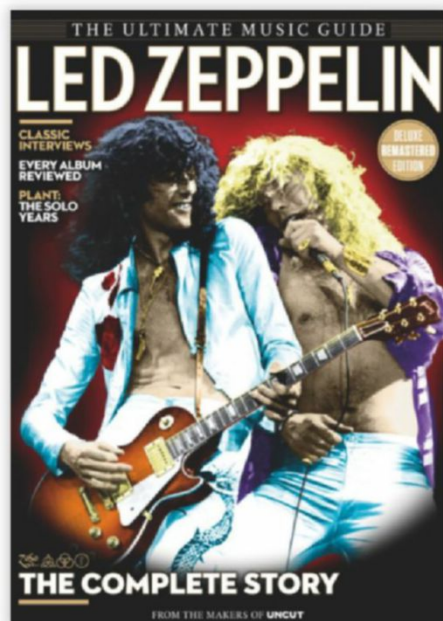

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Allan Kingdom

Rising hip-hop artist who's worked with Kanye West and was rated by Prince

ALLAN KINGDOM, 22, IS A rapper who's been nominated for two Grammy Awards, appeared onstage with Kanye West at the Brit Awards to perform 'All Day' (the fiery, soulful hook of which he worked on) and messed about in the studio with Bon Iver on some as-yet-unreleased tunes.

Things are going well for the guy, but it hasn't always been this way. Born in Winnipeg, Canada, when he was six his dad left him and his scientist mum and moved back to South Africa. Aged eight, Kingdom relocated to Wisconsin, USA, but it was Saint Paul, Minnesota, where he put down roots. This led to a feeling of

isolation while growing up. "I didn't feel Canadian until I went to the US," he says. "But then I felt too Canadian. In Toronto I felt too black, too African. I've always felt stuck in the middle. You can hear it in my music."

Kingdom's latest mixtape 'Northern Lights' is his fourth since 2011. It's full of the brooding, synth-laden, sophisticated hip-hop sound that attracted the attention of Kanye and also Prince. A month before the Purple One died, he went to see Kingdom live in Minneapolis.

It wasn't their first encounter. "When I was 19, he did a show at [his house] Paisley Park and wanted to shoot a video," says Kingdom. "He was like, 'I need every cool creative kid from the city here - I wanna capture them on film.' We went there in my mum's van and, kinda like 'Smells Like Teen Spirit', he did a show for us in a tiny room and he was right in front of us with a mic stand and his guitar." The video never came out, but Kingdom says it was a "mad cool" experience. He'd better get used to those.

I'd started the group with my sister and my cousin a few years before that – we were slowly getting our act together. Originally there were five Ronettes, but their parents didn't want them to sing rock'n'roll."

"Again, it was Frankie Lymon. Nedra [Talley, from The Ronettes] and I went to Philadelphia with my aunt and uncle. In those days they had a dance contest before the show and whoever won got free tickets. Nedra and I won! They were so great. Frankie Lymon had these dance movements that just blew me away. I just loved everything about it."

"When I was real little I remember going to my grandmother's house and I'd sing on the coffee table. It was 'Jambalaya' by Hank Williams, but I never sang the lyrics right. My family, cousins and aunts and uncles would all wait for little Ronnie to sing."

"I could dance to that all night. It's a song I really love. It's the beat – if you want to dance, you have to have a beat."

"I never liked karaoke – I was never a fan. But one time I did it because my friend's mother had just died. He said, 'Can you please come? I'm so lonely.' My husband and I went over to this karaoke bar and for some reason they recognised me, so they put 'Baby, I Love You' on the karaoke machine. I got up and sang. I kinda liked it!"
