MYSTICISM SADNESS WISDOM

T FOR LASHES THE BRIDE

THINK 'DOOMED bride' and your mind might settle on Greek mythology's Ariadne: Theseus dumped her on an uninhabited

island, sailed away and left her to the unsolicited come-ons of the horny wine god Dionysus. Or maybe you'd opt for Kill Bill's Black Mamba: her hubby-to-be is gunned down at their wedding rehearsal, so she turns into a vengeful killer.

Bat For Lashes, AKA Natasha Khan, adds to this long-established canon of cinematic almost-nuptials with her concept album 'The Bride' - but her Groom has a rather less exotic name (Joe) and he's not to blame for the Bride's abandonment: he dies in a crash on the way to the wedding. Khan's story musters the same potent anguish as these ancient tales, but it's not just fury the Bride experiences: grief, reflection and self-discovery are also

crucial to her road-trip parable, which champions self-worth and questions the ideal of finding completion in another person.

This fourth album - her most

ambitious yet - finds her pairing the filmic qualities of her first two (2006's 'Fur And Gold', 2009's 'Two Suns') with the stark maturity of 2012's 'The Haunted Man'. Khan refuses to

yield crossover hits like 2009's 'Daniel' (only the frenetic rhythms of 'Sunday Love' come close) opting instead for a slow style of storytelling that rewards the patient listener.

Opening track 'I Do' darkens its Omnichord with ominous bass as she anticipates her wedding day: "All of the sorrow will drop away... when you say 'I do'." When news of the Groom's death has her fleeing the church in their honeymoon car, she notes the poignant "cans on the road in tail lights". 'Never Forgive The Angels' pays homage to the sombre guitar of Fleetwood Mac's 'Albatross': the bewitching chimes of 'Widow's Peak' have the Bride in a spokenword purification ritual; the bassline of 'I Will Love Again' is simple but transcendent.

Khan opens up this imaginary world with her voice, vaulting tragically high ('In God's House') or turning feather-light for the album's serene resolution ('If I Knew'). There's even a mad ballad about sex with a ghost ('Close Encounters'), but by that point Khan could probably take you anywhere and you'd still be enthralled. Larry Bartleet



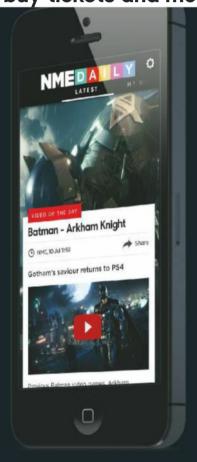




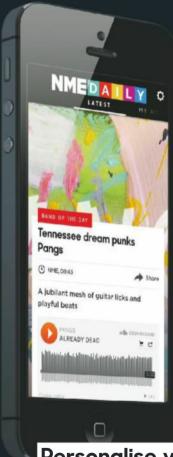

# California dreaming

Are Blink still Blink without Tom DeLonge? The first album with their new singer suggests so

California

IT'S BEEN 21 YEARS SINCE Blink-182 released their debut album 'Cheshire Cat'. Now, six albums later and well into their forties, Mark Hoppus and Travis Barker are starting over without founding member Tom DeLonge, who they called "disrespectful and ungrateful" during his departure from the band in early 2015.

Blink fans were worried about what would happen after DeLexit, but the lads wasted no time filling Tom's whiny Vans with another pop-punk heavyweight: Matt Skiba of Alkaline Trio.

It seems they made a sound choice. Skiba can "na-na-na-na" with the best of them, has a

And rest assured they're still juvenile, fart-joke-loving mischief mongers, as the 30-second tracks about naked dudes ('Built This Pool') and fingering girls ('Brohemian Rhapsody') prove. But without the tensions of a difficult working relationship, they've also managed to recapture some of the early energy that was so obviously missing from their 2011 album 'Neighborhoods'.

There are gems aplenty. 'Bored To Death' is a summer-anthem-to-be, and on 'Home Is Such A Lonely Place' Skiba proves he's capable of sweet vocals not dissimilar to DeLonge on 2003's 'I Miss You'. The upbeat 'She's Out Of Her Mind' will never leave your head.

The artwork for 'California' was designed by London street artist D\*Face, famous for his pop-art-inspired murals.

The odes to their hometown don't quite cut it, though, and 'Los Angeles', 'San Diego' and 'California' all sound cheesy and dated. When you hear lyrics like "Living in the perfect weather / Spending time inside together / Hey, here's to you California", you can't help but cringe at the teenage vibes these middleaged men still radiate.

But the main points Blink had to prove with this record were: that they could write without DeLonge, and that his distinctive voice wasn't the glue holding all the parts together. 'California' is too long, but has the humour, pace, emotion and huge choruses of a classic Blink record. Mission accomplished.

# These songs are important

A bold, challenging album about the social and generational forces that have shaped Dev Hynes' sense of blackness

**BLOOD ORANGE** 

Freetown Sound ORIGINS IDENTITY CAMEOS

THE KEY TO getting your head around Blood Orange's sprawling, hugely ambitious and occasionally unwieldy

third album lies with two songs you won't find on the tracklisting. In his annotations to the lyrics of 'Sandra's Smile' - released last October following the controversial death of Black Lives Matter activist Sandra Bland - Devonté Hynes wrote that the song's themes of forgiveness and black Christianity were "a deeper question, and one I've been writing about in my personal time a lot". His parents' faith, and Hynes' upbringing in it, plays an important role on 'Freetown Sound'. But even more significant is 'Do You See My Skin Through The Flames?', an 11-minute audio-collage-cumtherapy-session, on which he reflected on last summer's racially motivated church shooting in Charleston, the white privilege of his own audience and the slave origins of his surname. "We have to keep deconstructing our past, re-evaluating, and learn

to speak," he concludes. "I'm going to reclaim it and hopefully we'll move on."

Ultimately, that's what 'Freetown Sound' - named after the slave-founded capital of Sierra Leone, where Hynes' father was born - is all about. Hynes has points to make about identity and cultural appropriation - "No one ever really cares what 'Thug Life' means," he sings on 'Chance' - but these songs come from a deeper place than politics. "My father was a young man, my mother off the boat / My eyes were fresh at 21, bruised but still afloat," goes the opening line of 'Augustine', a song which later weaves in references to Trayvon

> Martin and Nontetha Nkwenkwe, a subversive South African prophetess committed to a mental institution in the 1920s. If the connections aren't readily apparent,

they reveal themselves with further listening: in a nutshell, this album is about the social and generational forces that have shaped Hynes' own sense of blackness.

Inevitably, there are a number of cameos along the way - Nelly Furtado on 'Hadron Collider', Carly Rae Jepsen on 'Better Than Me', even Debbie Harry on the lithe disco-funk of 'E.V.P.' - but these 17 songs never truly leave the inside of Hynes' head. The album plays a lot like a mixtape - Beastie Boys' 'Paul's Boutique' has been cited as an influence - whose songs bleed into each other and whose mood is more self-examining than celebratory.

There are isolated moments, such as the luminous R&B of 'But You', where his pop sensibilities shine through; for the most part, though, it resembles a sombre diaristic splurge of thoughts, feelings and observations beautifully expressed, but in such a way that only the author knows how they all fit together. With 'Freetown Sound', he's made something bold, challenging, uncompromising and overlong - an album, like the man who made it, that's the sum of its parts and then some. Barry Nicolson

IT'S TAKEN DIRECTOR Roland Emmerich 20 years to come up with a sequel to his super-sized 1996 disaster film Independence Day. He and co-writer/producer Dean Devlin originally devised a follow-up story told in two parts,

has a plot that doubles as its marketing tagline: "We always knew they were coming back."

Two decades after thwarting the original film's alien invasion, the human race now operates a successful Earth Space Defense (ESD) programme using extraterrestrial technology harvested during the so-called "War of 1996". But as President Elizabeth Lanford (The Day After Tomorrow's Sela Ward) leads a jubilant anniversary celebration, it emerges that the aliens are returning to plunder the Earth's molten core as fuel for their spaceships. Presumably because Will Smith declined to reprise his role as aviator Steve Hiller, it falls to two

along the way by a surplus of half-formed characters. Wisecracking ESD pilot Jake Morrison (Liam Hemsworth) is a reasonably entertaining renegade, but his more sensible rival pilot Dylan

Hiller (Jessie Usher from TV's Survivor's Remorse), the stepson of Will Smith's character from



film where Levinson's father Julius (Taxi's Judd Hirsch) can somehow end up driving a bus full of school kids into the exact patch of the Nevada desert where his son is trying to blow up the aliens' queen.

But despite the prevailing stupidity, or perhaps partly

because of it, Emmerich's visually impressive film is actually pretty fun. While the epic thrills and spills of the original Independence Day were hailed as groundbreaking in 1996, this sequel feels reassuringly old-fashioned in an era of self-important and convoluted comic-book films. **Nick Levine**

A SURPRISE SMASH IN 2013, Now You See Me introduced a fictional crew of superstar illusionists called The Four Horsemen, who climaxed their Las Vegas show by apparently pulling off a massive bank robbery. Imagine a posse of David Blaine types captivating millions worldwide as they're being monitored very closely by the FBI.

This inevitable sequel follows the Horsemen as they're separated from their leader, phoney FBI agent Dylan Rhodes (Mark Ruffalo), and unexpectedly dumped in Macau, "the Las Vegas of China". Here they're blackmailed by an off-the-grid businessman called Walter Mabry (Daniel Radcliffe), who turns out to be the illegitimate son of Arthur Tressler (Michael Caine), a corrupt tycoon seeking revenge after the Horsemen screwed him in the first film.

Mabry issues an ultimatum: steal a super-powerful computer chip on his behalf, or die. Although the magicians initially want to call Mabry's bluff, Jesse Eisenberg's Atlas overrules his colleagues and they accept the job

while hatching a plan to expose Mabry to the public.

As well as being even more ludicrous than its predecessor, Now You See Me 2 is faster, flashier and more bombastic. It's also just as hollow: a subplot pitting Dylan Rhodes against Thaddeus Bradley (Morgan Freeman), the wily old magician he blames for killing his father, succeeds only because of the talented actors involved. The Horsemen's newest recruit Lula May (The Interview's Lizzy Caplan) is a fizzy, subtly feminist addition to the cast. but Dave Franco's Jack Wilder remains a handsome blank and Radcliffe's manic baddie never fully convinces. Woody Harrelson winningly reprises his role as mentalist Horseman Merritt McKinney, but whoever decided he also should play McKinney's evil twin – wearing false teeth and a terrible wig – should do a disappearing act of their own.

Yet despite its overwhelming silliness and the odd dull patch, Now You See Me 2 succeeds as garish multiplex entertainment. The superbly shot scene in which the Horsemen steal the computer chip is a highlight, but the film's main selling point remains its starry cast. Even when the script doesn't really stretch them, which is most of the time, it's fun watching this lot bounce off each other. Nick Levine



#### The bastard sons of Fat White Family find their feet

ENVIRONMENT MEANS everything in music. Put a Pink Floyd gig on at the 100 Club and you're unlikely to hear anything approaching the regal majesty of 'The Dark Side Of The Moon' anytime soon. For aggro-punk five-piece Shame, things didn't click until they set up shop at Brixton pub – and den of iniquity – The Queens Head last summer, also previously home to Fat White Family.

"We used to practise in this detached mansion for a period," says guitarist Seán Coyle-Smith. "The difference in what we wrote there compared to The Queens is... it was just

drony, indie sh\*t." The Queens, sadly, has recently been turned into a gastro pub – something Shame are massively opposed to – but it gave them the start they needed. "Everyone was just flying around on a different type of Class A, walking into rehearsals going, 'Let me play bass, let me play bass!'," recalls singer Charlie Steen. "All our instruments would go missing and come back

blood-splattered." With songs like 'The Lick', recalling the brooding menace of cult punk heroes
Alternative TV and The Ruts,
Shame now find themselves at the forefront of a compelling new scene in the capital, with bands like Goat Girl, FISH and Happy
Meal Ltd being courted by every notable record label in the country. For the first time in years, it feels tangible, too, as if it might gestate into something bigger.

"Putting Ministry Of Sound on the guestlist for Chimney Sh\*tters was probably our funniest moment ever," laughs drummer Charlie Forbes, referencing Shame's crudely named and always-chaotic Brixton Windmill night, where most of the

aforementioned acts played their first gigs. "There's just no community any more," laments Coyle-Smith. "There's too much, 'You have to support this type of band, you have to write this kind of song."
