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

I WROTE 'BE HERE NOW' WHEN I WAS ON HOLIDAY WITH KATE MOSS, JOHNNY DEPP, MICK JAGGER, JERRY HALL...

...and all that lot on [private island] Mustique. There might have been a small amount of cocaine, I couldn't say. Nick Mason from Pink Floyd was on the same island - it was f**king great. When people say, "'Be Here Now', what happened there?" I say, "Well I wrote it on holiday, and let's put it this way, I had a f**king great holiday." I was there for about six weeks, and what we've unearthed is from the end of the holiday when ['(What's The Story) Morning Glory?' producer] Owen Morris came out with a portable studio and I did all the demos. You can actually hear what a great time I'm having on holidav.

IT WAS A GREAT TIME FOR OASIS...

...that tour and the whole experience of making that record was the most enjoyable time I've ever had in the music business, because we didn't give a f**k. We started the tour as the biggest band in the world and finished it outside the Champions League spots. We'd blown it somehow, but it was brilliant.

I REMEMBER THE FIRST GIG OF THE 'BE HERE NOW' TOUR...

...in a massive f**king cowshed [Westpoint Exeter]. Travis were supporting. We turned up at the side of the stage, and they were the first band we'd ever seen do that embarrassing group huddle before they went on. We were looking at each other like, "What they f**king doing?" I said to [Travis bassist] Dougie, "What were you doing over there?" And they were like, "Ah it's, y'know, a group thing that we do before we go on," and we were like, "WHY?" Like a pep talk, like a f**king team talk? You f**king squares. If we'd ever done that it would've just been like... "Where did you get those shoes from?'

TO REDO THE WHOLE ALBUM...

...I went into the studio and after about two days I went back to a couple of things I'd edited and thought, "Nah, they sound f**king s**t, they sound better when there's no singing for three minutes." It's to be accompanied by a crate of beer and a bag of f**king charlie, and don't be making any plans for the next couple of days. That's the spirit in which it was intended. And if you listen to it in that spirit, it might be the greatest album of all time.

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Kind of a big deal

Jemaine Clement on taking on the role of the sinister Fleshlumpeater in *The BFG*

AT 6FT 1IN, JEMAINE Clement is hardly a shortarse. but it took motion-capture technology to transform the Flight Of The Conchords star into a "50ft redhead pile of meat" called the Fleshlumpeater in Steven Spielberg's visually stunning adaptation of The BFG. Clement can remember reading Roald Dahl's beloved novel as a kid but says he always found the story more "delightful" than frightening. "The idea that kids from different countries would have a different flavour to the giants [who eat them] was so silly, it didn't seem like an actual threat," he explains.

Clement admits that working with history's highest-grossing film director initially made him "yery

and sat down with me and the other guys who play the bad giants, and he spoke very naturally, so we quickly got over it," he says.

In real life, Clement speaks in a soft New Zealand accent, but to play the menacing but comical Fleshlumpeater he adopts a distinctive Cockney accent based

So I made the Fleshlumpeater's voice a more accessible version."

As NME chats to Clement, he's midway through Flight Of The Conchords' US comeback tour.

Are UK dates in the offing? "We haven't booked any yet, but we're thinking about it for sure." And how about that long-rumoured movie? "We'll finish the tour and see. You know, about a year ago we were asked about this and I said we'd written down some movie ideas. And they're still written down and they still haven't been made!"



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Above and beyond

Some big questions for Captain James T Kirk and Mr Spock, stars of Star Trek Beyond, which is in cinemas right now

CHRIS PINE

AGE: 35

PLAYS: Captain James T Kirk **FUN FACT:** Pine's dad,

Robert, was in the 1973 film Incident On A Dark Street with William Shatner who was, of course, the first actor to play the role of Kirk.

Where does Star Trek Beyond find Captain Kirk?

"Kirk was driven by the anger of not knowing his father yet living in his shadow. Now 10 years have gone by and he's made his mark, but a great evil has been perpetrated and he's trying to get the family, his crew, back together. I'm not by nature a fanboy but I do think what Star Trek has done is incredible. Back in 1966 [when it debuted on TV], to have the bridge of the Starship Enterprise filled with a Russian, an Asian, a white guy, an African American woman and an alien was pretty ahead of its time."

Are there gags galore in Simon Pegg's script?

"The great advantage is that he's worked with us on the ground - he's not just writing from some box in the sky. And he's funny. Star Trek is '80s pop fun. You go in. Bad stuff happens. You cry. Then you laugh a bunch and leave with a smile on your face. Simon knows that and he protected that. I was worried we'd lose the fun of it because everything nowadays is dark or f**king bananas. We have superfans in our group and those who don't really care, so when you mash those two up something new comes out."

What was it like facing off against Idris Elba [who plays alien villain Krall]?

"It's like watching someone play jazz. He's coming up with all this character stuff in the moment and you have to be alive to that. He's a scary guy to begin with, a very big guy. He's imposing and a charismatic gentleman."

Do you think he could be James Bond?

"Are you kidding me? I think he'd be a kick-ass Bond!"

What's it like playing Kirk on a such a massive Starship Enterprise set?

"I've never been a huge fan of sitting in a chair and playing make-believe, but with all that money behind it, it's like taking a trip on some really good stuff. It's crazy!"

What's the best advice you've had on dealing with it?

"I remember reading Michael Caine's book on acting [1990's Acting In Film]. It's so true when he said, 'Don't ever yell on set.' Because no matter what you're yelling about you'll always look like an asshole. I thought that was very profound, but of course I've still done it."

You once serenaded a fan with Frank Sinatra's 'Summer Wind'. Would you like to play Ol' Blue Eyes on the big screen? "F**k, are you kidding me? That

"F**k, are you kidding me? That would be an absolute dream."

Which song of his would you sing in the shower?

"Speaking as Kirk... It's gotta be 'Fly Me To The Moon', right?"



ZACHARY QUINTO

AGE: 39 PLAYS: Mr Spock FUN FACT: Allege

FUN FACT: Allegedly, Quinto initially struggled to make Spock's trademark Vulcan salute, so director JJ Abrams had to glue his fingers together.

What's the big challenge for Spock in Star Trek Beyond?
"The crew is fragmented and we're working our way back to one another. Spock and Bones [Karl Urban] spend a lot of time together, which is interesting. Spock gets seriously injured so he's got that challenge to work through, along with an emotional one. He's at an existential crossroads, trying to figure out where his energies are best served. On a personal level, my make-up process was challenging."

So you don't get to kick ass this time?

"It's a different challenge to play Spock, who has a rich emotional life inside but isn't able to express it. I think my version of the character is a little bit more in touch with his humanity. I talked about that with Leonard Nimoy. With his [original] Spock the line was always clear between Vulcan and human. The decision to cross that line was never really a part of Leonard's version of the character... When JJ Abrams and I first started developing Spock we wanted that line to be a little bit blurrier."

How did knowing Leonard Nimoy transform the way you approached playing Spock? "At a certain point I stopped thinking about my relationship with Leonard and we just became friends. I'm sure it informed my relationship to Spock because I respected him so much. Now he's gone [Nimoy died in February 2015] I feel a responsibility to the character, to honour Leonard's legacy because I'm aware of the positive impact he had on generations of Star Trek fans. Millions of people fell in love with Spock because of him."

After the origin story of 2009's Star Trek reboot and the chase movie that was 2013's Into Darkness, how would you describe Beyond?

"There's a retro vibe to Beyond. It's a homage to the origins of the story. You get thrills with a strong emotional undercurrent. It's about celebrating the characters. What drives them is the quest for the greater good."

What's the weirdest place you've been recognised thanks to your pointy-eared fame?

"I'm used to getting to the checkout in a store and excited fans greeting me with the Vulcan hand sign."

KEEP ON FIGHTING FOR WHAT YOU RELIEVE

On July 7, Have I Got News For You team captain and Private Eye editor Ian Hislop said this on Question Time, after audience members said it was time for Britain to "crack on" with Brexit rather than opposing the referendum result

"After an election or a referendum, even if you lose the vote, you are entitled to go on making the argument. When a government in this country wins an election, the opposition does not just say, 'Oh that's absolutely right, I've got nothing to say for five years.' So for those of us who were trying fairly hard in the last weeks to follow what on earth is happening in this country, the Leave vote has left us with a group of leaders who - having lit the fire - have all run away saying someone else can clear up the mess. The Prime Minister, who put us in the mess, has resigned. Everybody is gone. All the people that put their cross down for Leave saying, 'This is what we want, they seem to be getting a group of people who say, 'We can't stop immigration, we can't give £350m and, um, by the way, there might be quite a lot of austerity - sorry, bye!"

POLITICAL PARTS

Grime star and former Young Deputy
Mayor of Lewisham, Novelist, recently
joined Labour. He told Complex why
people need to get into politics

"Whether you're grime, football, whatever – state your opinion. Everyone is allowed to have an opinion. People will say that you're jumping on the bandwagon when it comes to politics. But with politics, there is no bandwagon! We're all living it.

"I've always been politically aware. Someone was saying to me on Twitter the other day, 'You've watched one [UK rapper] Akala interview and now you think you're politically active!' I will duppy you now, fam! I do know what's going on. And Akala makes a fair point – but do you think one musician alone should be doing that? No. Talk more. Don't stop talking!

"Nothing's gonna change unless you make it change. I'll give you an example: at school, there's always that one dickhead knocking about, and there's always one younger that knocks them out. So, stand up for yourself. Don't be afraid to change things. Don't think nothing's gonna change just because you've had it drilled into you that it might not. How are you supposed to defend yourself if you don't know what's nappening? It's not something that's taught in the education system in the UK. Trying to get people to engage is key. It's difficult, and I wish more people were on this way of thinking."

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TELL YOUR MP WHAT YOU THINK

Mhairi Black, MP for Paisley and Renfrewshire South, encourages us

"All politics, not just referendums and elections, have a huge impact on your day-to-day life and we must all engage and be active all the time. The best part of my job is corresponding with constituents of all ages, and I would enjoy it if more got in touch.

"You can speak to your MP about any policy you like. I think it's important to mention that there are some things MPs are not best placed to deal with. For example, given that I represent a Scottish constituency, I have no control over devolved issues such as the NHS, or education, so their MSP would be best placed to assist them with issues like that. Also, so many of the things that affect people most directly are dealt with by their local councils, and their councillors are best placed to deal with those issues.

"It is crucial that people contact their MPs. I know that whenever I go to a vote, I always consider the messages I receive from constituents and they play the largest part in my decision, and I'm sure their own MP will feel the same."



Insists Krishnan Guru-Murthy, Channel 4
News & Unreported World journalist

"Time is a great healer. And so is necessity. Most of us don't have the luxury of time to sulk or celebrate, whichever side you were on. We've just got to get on with it. If you fell out with friends or family, you will hopefully find more that unites than divides you in the end. The anger many felt after the result is a'roady fading. And all sorts of things can happen yet. We don't know what kind of Brexit deal will be done, or whether free movement will effectively be preserved in exchange for free access to the single market. And if you're furious with your parents for voting the opposite to you, just don't bring it up for a while.

"There are always reasons to be optimistic about the future. Even if you're devastated Britain has chosen to leave the EU, there will still be loads of opportunities for you to travel, study and work in the EU, just as there were before we joined. If you find the direction of politics depressing, it's up to you to change it. If you find the dominant attitudes towards immigration something you disagree with, then that's what politics and being a citizen are all about. If you were pro-leave, it's up to you to make real what you believed before the referendum. We are, regardless of the EU, a country of culture, knowledge, innovation - and really good music."

"Young people were the most opposed to Brexit and they're the ones who are going to suffer the consequences the most. The polling shows that people are decisively saying they'll be worse off than their parents. It's not happened for a very long time. Now should be a wake-up call.

"Reclaim is a Manchester-based charity giving young working-class people a voice. They do their own manifestos and take their concerns directly to politicians. I'd like a rallying cry that this sort of project is the future, bringing together community organisations and prominent figures young people look up to, to mobilise them on the attack on worker's rights, cuts to services, on the rising threat of xenophobia and racism, and on things like education and housing - in a way where young people who are disproportionately suffering the consequences actually have a campaign based on optimism, spoken in a language people understand.

"I spend a lot of time going to inner-city schools and sixth forms and they're not apathetic – they really care. During the student protest in 2010, some of the most determined weren't the students, but the young people at schools and sixth forms who were going to have their education maintenance allowance cut. They just think politics is divorced from them, not spoken in a way they understand, and from people they're not very sympathetic about. This has to change."

I VOTED LEAVE AND MY FRIEND VOTED REMAIN. **CAN WE STILL BE PALS?**

"It is a positive thing to have friends with different views and opinions, as it can help keep your own thinking fluid and less judgemental. The skill of empathy is an important one. By listening to other views without prejudice we become better at forming our own opinions."

I CAN'T LOOK MY PARENTS IN THE EYE. WHAT DO I DO?

"You need to push your emotions off the field of play. Question your own motivations first. Do you want to explore their opinions or do you want a row? Are you going to share your opinions or be opinionated? If you really want to know why they voted as they did, you need to stay calm. If you're upset and angry things will get heated - wait until you can control vour behaviour."

'M A DEVASTATED REMAIN VOTER. HOW CAN I LIVE WITH THE REFERENDUM?

"Being a critic is far more comfortable than accepting change and looking to make it work, so the righteous 'ideal' right now is to keep criticising Brexit and feel vilified when anything goes wrong. This is the 'I told you so' position. Gloating about financial dips or other types of Brexit fallout will seem hugely tempting. The human psyche means we feel comfortable blaming other people for our problems, and voting Remain offers a huge opportunity to step back and do that. It's an emotional version of sitting back and folding our arms across our chests and refusing to play. The other option is to accept what you can't change, see it as a done deal and work to make the country successful under the new changes."

TURN YOUR ANGER INTO ART

Punk duo Slaves, Laurie Vincent and Isaac Holman, are finding solace in great protest music

LAURIE: "No bands have hit the issues straight on in the way The Specials did [in 1981 with 'Ghost Town']. What's happening now in the world is so similar to what was happening then. I find them really inspiring - I listen to them a lot. It feels like everyone is scared to speak out now. The world we live in is terrifying. Look at Orlando and Paris. Our whole childhood has been informed by terror. Prices are rising and humanity is falling.

"People don't care about each other so much. Look at the Brexiteers: the only thing they talk about is migrants and that's just

embarrassing. How is that inspiring our kids? I'm going to be a dad in

December - it's constantly on my mind that I want to make this a better world for our kids. Watch something, learn something, read a book and work out how our world will be reduced to dust if we keep eating meat. We could feed the whole planet on the soy beans we give to cows, but instead people just sit there on the lefty bench eating beefburgers. There's so much hypocrisy.'



ISAAC: "If you've got a platform, you should use it. Why wouldn't you? But somehow politics is a dirty subject. I hope our music inspires people to go out there and do what they want to do. I want it to have a positive impact, rather than slagging everyone off all the time. That's pointless.'

JPNSGRLS continue their assault on vowels and musical fads. The four-piece - packing angst-ridden, power-chord-heavy rock played at breakneck speed couldn't be accused of following fashion. It's cool to like Justin Bieber; tropical house is creeping like vine over the charts and, at the time of writing, Drake has two of the UK's Top 10 singles. Is there a tougher sell in music right now than being a rock band consisting of four blokes with guitars?

Charlie Kerr, Chris McClelland, Graham Serl and Colton Lauro don't care about all that; they just wanna rock. And 'Divorce' is

backing vocals.

The brittle. staccato bridge of 'A Comprehensive

List Of Things I Love', set to the lyrics, "She likes me better when I'm stoned / I like me better when I'm stoned", effectively conveys emotional frustration before the track gallops to its heady, thrashpunk conclusion. And the looping guitar riff of 'Gap Year' is the kind of addictive indie-pop confection that makes you pine for old-school Strokes; it then gives way to something that sounds suspiciously like steel drums.

So there are gems to mine here. And no one's denying the band's

meaning behind their Googlefriendly moniker. It nods to the female Japanese post-rock band Mass Of The Fermenting Dregs, whose "fervour and energy" informs the kind of music that JPNSGRLS make.

Can you build a music career on conviction and fervour alone, though? 'Divorce' is by no means a bad record, but nor is it a particularly memorable or noteworthy one. On 'Trojan Horse', Kerr sings, "I wanna drop out of school and rap / I see a real future in that". He's not wrong - and that's a problem for a band like JPNSGRLS. Jordan Bassett



His time OF THE WEEK Has come

With Skepta and Stormzy dragging hard lyricism into the mainstream, Flowdan's blunt rap suddenly feels on trend

FLOWDAN

WHILE A FOUNDING
member of Roll Deep
– the east London grime
crew that's seen
everyone from Wiley to
Dizzee, Tinchy Stryder to Skepta
pass through its ranks – Flowdan
has to date lurked around grime's
second tier, viewed more as a
team player than a solo artist.

Deployed right, he's a stick of dynamite: that's him on The Bug's 'Skeng', a volatile concoction of dubstep murk and brutal Caribbean slang that's surely one of the best singles of the '00s. But his debut, 2009's 'Original Dan', flagged hard over its 17 tracks, suggesting the former drum'n'bass MC didn't quite have the bars to carry a full album.

Still, 'Disaster Piece' arrives at an opportune time. With Skepta and Stormzy dragging hard and unflinching lyricism right into the mainstream, Flowdan's blunt Yardie rap suddenly feels distinctly on trend. Helpfully, too, he doesn't have any pop crossover skeletons in his closet and can confidently stake his claim as one of grime's true believers.

On the track 'Grime', Flowdan poses exactly that argument. "Only got time for the certified dons / From back in the day when Rinse was illegal." he

barks, taking shots at parttimers and bandwagon-jumpers over a Dexplicit production of jabbing strings and beats.

If it was all such axe-grinding, 'Disaster Piece' might flag – but it has vision too. Viewed one way, it's a sort of concept piece to surviving hard times, from the brooding 'Judgement' – a veteran's march to war, set to booming drums and gnarly guitars recalling Massive Attack's 'Mezzanine' – to 'Groundhog', a narrative fable of struggle in a cold world, its chilly dubstep throb coloured by the mournful tones of guest vocalist Animai.

It's hardly guest-packed, although Tinchy Stryder pops up on 'Gunfingers', spitting like he never appeared on Top Of The Pops, while 'Dons And Divas' features relatively underemployed Roll Deep MC Manga, whose high-pitched, nasal flow is the polar opposite of Flowdan's. Instead, there's the sense this is a one man show - and luckily, the star is on form. The words indeed flow out of him, whether he's issuing terrifying threats ("Now your wife is a widow / Another man's gonna be sleeping on your pillow" goes 'Flatline') or extolling the virtues of highgrade marijuana: "Bob Marley would be proud of me," goes the purred hook of 'Bob Marley'. Second tier MC? Maybe Flowdan was just biding his time. Louis Pattison





Big and friendly

Spielberg's take on the beloved Roald Dahl novel is restrained, nostalgic and sweetly sentimental

STEVEN SPIELBERG'S adaptation of The BFG needs to please two types of what the title character famously calls "human beans". Some of this film's audience will be young children taking what could be one of their first cinema trips; others will be older viewers who grew up with Roald Dahl's beloved novel and buy their tickets now expecting a nostalgic treat. By bringing Dahl's familiar source material to life in a sweetly sentimental and relatively restrained way, the director manages to succeed on both counts.

Adapted from Dahl's 1982 novel by *E.T.* screenwriter Melissa Mathison, the story follows lonely orphan Sophie (British child actress Ruby Barnhill) as she befriends the eponymous Big Friendly Giant (*Bridge Of Spies*' Mark Rylance) and travels with him to Giant Country. There, the BFG simply wants to get on with his job of catching dreams to give to sleeping children, but he's bullied by a squad of larger, nastier giants led by the Fleshlumpeater (*Flight*

Of The Conchords'
Jemaine Clement) who
enjoy feasting on human
beans like Sophie.
Dismayed, Sophie hatches
a plan to plant a nightmare
inside the head of the Queen
(Downton Abbey's Penelope
Wilton) that will compel the
monarch to send her troops
to capture the spiteful giants.

Although Mathison and Spielberg dodge some of the darker elements of Dahl's story, this is a broadly faithful and visually brilliant adaptation defined by its warm charm. Rylance gives a sensitive motion-capture performance, playing the BFG with a friendly West Country accent and a faint air of bewilderment, and Barnhill is compelling as strong-willed Sophie, a character who could be grating in the hands of a more traditionally hammy child actor. Compared to some summer blockbusters, The BFG might seem somewhat lacking in action: a scene in which the BFG sits down to have breakfast with the Queen is one of its big set-pieces. But Spielberg deserves credit for trusting, rightly, that the enduring appeal of Dahl's characters will be enough to make his BFG a big-screen hit. Nick Levine

Ready for extinction

Please, let this fifth *lce* Age film be the last

ICE AGE: COLLISION COURSE

THERE'S NO MYSTERY AS to why 20th Century Fox keeps making Ice Age films. The last two made over \$850 million. The mystery is why they continue to be successful. A series that started as a gently enjoyable prehistoric buddy comedy has never really become anything more. It hasn't deepened its world like Toy Story or even How To Train Your Dragon. It's just added more thinly drawn characters and stuck with an 'environmental disaster is about to befall our heroes' template, to diminishing returns. We're now on the fifth instalment and it's looking ready for extinction.

Scrat, the sabre-toothed squirrel with a thing for nuts, somehow finds himself on an alien ship and while crashing around the galaxy manages to set a huge meteor on a destructive course towards Earth. Mammoth Manny, Sid the sloth and Diego the sabre-toothed tiger, plus their considerably extended families, mount a quest to divert the meteor and save the world. It's an awkward set-up that begets an awkward story.

The series remains fixated on filling every role with some kind of recognisable name, whether they're adept at acting or not. In the past we've had Nicki Minaj and Drake as mammoths; this time we get Jessie J as a daffy sloth with

an east London twang. On this trajectory, in a few films' time we'll be listening to Lee from Steps trying to summon the motivation to play a sassy musk ox.

All the star power is to little end as it makes no difference how expensive the voice is if the things being said aren't funny, and here they almost never are. There are so many characters crammed in - there are more than 10 in the core group - that instead of trying to give them any kind of real arc they're employed in random, easy skits that neither change the plot nor make much sense in isolation. A weasel voiced by Simon Pegg sings opera for no reason. A pair of possums do a bit about hashtags - it's set millions of years ago. Within about half an hour it has you rooting for the meteor.

Shock treatment

FEMINISM SHAGGING NAUGHTY

IT'S HARD NOT TO FALL IN love with *Fleabag*'s nameless lead character. She half-heartedly runs a café that charges extortionate prices for cheese sarnies, is into casual theft, and likes to w**k to Barack Obama speeches. The show's star and writer Phoebe Waller-Bridge talks us through the genesis of her, and the show.

Who is Fleabag?

"She's a young woman in the city dealing with a whole raft of glorious and nightmarish situations in her life. The concept started as a 10-minute stand-up storytelling challenge that I was asked by a friend to do in London, and then somebody recommended I take it to Edinburgh. The whole one-woman stage show was based on this unapologetic, dry-witted and sexually overt naughty character, but someone who's actually quite damaged."

Was it easy to adapt for TV?

"It wasn't easy at all! But once I'd got the format down and got her talking to the camera, it was much better. In the play, the character was in complete control of the story. You had to take what she said as truth. But when translating that to screen, I had to play around with how she messes with the audience. If we didn't have that insight into her head and what she's thinking, she'd seem like quite a normal, nice person."

Was the stage show more outrageous, then?

"The stage version was a bit more racy, but it was all just verbally communicated. It's a bit different to putting something physically in front of someone. In the play, I could talk about all these sexual experiences Fleabag had been through, but in the TV show I didn't really want to have to show them. She still has the same amount of sex, but it's perhaps not as graphically shown."

The series does start with bum sex. though...

"Ha! That was actually quite a tame sex scene to shoot – there wasn't anything physically exposing in that scene. When the words are shocking I feel totally fine about it, but the idea of actually doing a nude sex scene properly is really intimidating."

What are Fleabag's inspirations?

"I feel like I was striving so much to make her unique from anything that I've seen before, but I'm massively inspired by the outrageous witticisms of *The Thick Of It* and Louis CK's show *Louie*."


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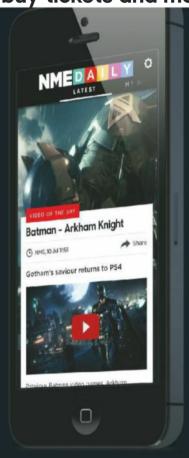




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THE FIRST SONG I FELL IN LOVE WITH

WILLIE NELSON Blue Eyes Crying In The Rain

"It's from Willie Nelson's 'Red Headed Stranger'. That whole album is like a country opera - it's the country music equivalent to The Beatles' 'Sgt Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band'. It's a concept album. It's incredibly simple and pared-down but it feels like one story told from multiple points of view. That song is just so lonely and tragic and heartbreaking and beautiful. I Want You Back

"It's impossible not to dance to that song. I also remember my eighth grade dance – I was dancing with a young woman named Heather Sterns and she was really beautiful. And I wouldn't normally have any positive associations with Bryan Adams, but 'Summer Of 69' was playing and it felt like the most important song in the world."

THE SONG I WANT PLAYED AT MY FUNERAL

BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN *Hungry Heart*

"I want my daughter to sing that at my funeral. I just like that line 'Like a river that don't know where it's flowing / I took a wrong turn and I just kept going'."

"He's such a humanist. I made a CD of his 50 greatest hits for a friend, I call it the Kris Kollection. If you listen to the whole thing on a big car trip, it's like finishing a novel. There's something so literary and so wise about the rhymes. You feel like your heart gets bigger when you listen to it. Most recently I gave one to Chris Pratt. I interviewed Kris for Rolling Stone and directed him in my movie Chelsea Walls. He's a true prince deeply humble, deeply kind and very wise."
