





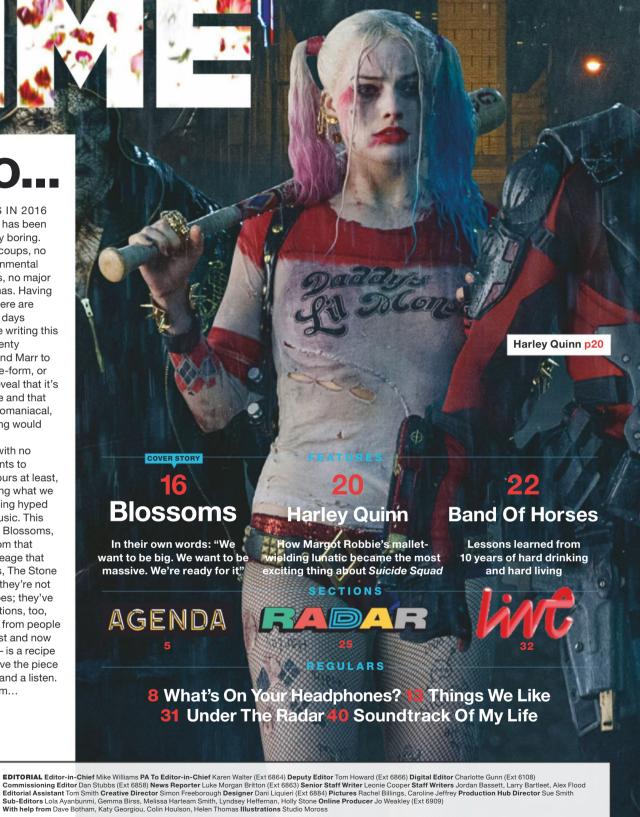
comfortingly boring. No military coups, no mass governmental resignations, no major Kanye dramas. Having said that, there are at least two days between me writing this

# Frank Ocean's album is close

'Boys Don't Cry' will, apparently, be out on August 5. Fingers crossed

IT'S BEEN FOUR YEARS since Frank Ocean's 'Channel Orange' and we're as close as we've ever been to much-hyped follow-up 'Boys Don't Cry' becoming a reality.

Earlier this year, Ocean's website boysdontcry.co published a library card full of crossed-out dates. Release dates that had been and gone, perhaps. Two were in the future: July 2016 and November 13, 2016. It being August, July obviously wasn't meant to be. But it seems he can't wait until November.

Last Monday, a live stream appeared on Ocean's website which showed him doing things like cutting wood and sitting in a chair – anything, in fact, except playing his album. Fans were livid.

But not any more. At the time of going to press, 'Boys Don't Cry' will be out on August 5, exclusively on Apple Music. It's thought that Ocean will release a music video and printed publication alongside the record. Sweet life.

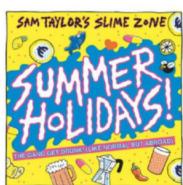

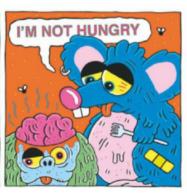

"Good, I should hope so.
Hopefully I'll be part of future Pixar films! It's great because they're the best filmmakers around and have been for the last 15 years. It's a treat not given to most actors.
All the actors in the Pixar films I hugely admire, so it's nice to be among them."

# Did you drop hints about wanting to be in further ones?

"Constantly. But Ellen DeGeneres [the voice of Dory] has been dropping hints about a *Finding Nemo* sequel for 13 years, so it's a long haul."

# Well, you could do a spin-off.

"I know, I've already pitched it. A Rudder sequel. And if you could mention it as well, that would be great."

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# Did you get to go to Pixar **HQ** in California?

"I wish! God, no. I'm dying to go."

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HE OTHER DAY,
Blossoms were on a rare
day off in their hometown of
Stockport when something
strange happened. The five
of them had met up with
some old mates at a butty shop they've
been going to for over 10 years, situated
right next to the school they all went to and
also not far from the houses they grew up
in and the hospital they were all born in.

"So we'd just got a bacon roll and were sat outside," says singer, principal songwriter and speaker in interviews Tom Ogden, "when this car pulls up and someone jumps out to get a photo with us. Our mate, who we've known for, like, 12 years, had to take it. How weird is that for him? Right outside the school we all went to, he's there with people pulling up going, 'You're Blossoms, aren't you? Can we get a picture?' It was surreal. Very surreal."

Maybe so, but it would seem incidents like this are far from infrequent in the band's world at present. Tom describes their spike in popularity and on-street recognition – off the back of extensive radio play for current (and truly great) single 'Charlemagne', a triumphant Jools Holland appearance and

Slottsfjell, there are girls pressed up against the barrier wearing 'I ♥ Stockport' T-shirts (the same design that's owned by one Matt Healy). And not a month ago, they were in the middle of their first mobbing, on a plane on the way to a festival in Spain ("I don't think @BlossomsBand can fly economy anymore", tweeted their tour manager gleefully).

"We kind of take the p\*\*s out of it, don't we?" says bassist Charlie Salt of incidents such as this. "We see the comical side of it; we definitely don't take it too seriously."

"You just go with it," shrugs Tom. "It's fine. Nine point nine people out of 10 just come up and go, 'I love your tunes, can I get a picture?' and that's it. Someone might shout, 'You're s\*\*t,' but that's just funny, innit? It's like, 'You know my name, I don't know who you are, so... see you in a bit!' It's not like we went on a TV show and it suddenly happened. It's gradually happened. You go out, one person recognises you; then you go out and two people recognise you. So we've sort of been edged into it."

It's true that Blossoms' ascent has not been an overnight one. But that's the way they like it, and exactly the way they've planned it. They've more than done their time, as drummer Joe Donovan puts it, "sleeping in the van outside venues, or trying to sneak mates into a Travelodge", so none of what's currently happening has come as an unsettling surprise. "By the time we actually got signed, we were already selling out The Ritz in Manchester," notes Tom. "So we've done it in a kind of old-fashioned way. With the label, there was none of that, 'Oh, what about this

producer in New York?' or whatever that some bands might get. F\*\*k that. We just went, 'We're gonna go do what we've done for the last year and we'll smash it for you'. And that's what we've done." Joe agrees. "You

think that when you're a band who gets signed that it's gonna suddenly be all champagne and caviar," he says. "But it's not. Well, for us it wasn't like that."

efore the ink had even dried on their record contract. Blossoms found themselves in a disused office-cum-studio within the grounds of Stockport County Football Club - a set-up put together by Charlie's grandad, who also owns the scaffolding yard where they rehearse - demoing new songs for the album. "Days after we signed the deal, we were in there," Tom laughs. "We were thinking, 'This is mad - that's happened, and we're just back where we've always known, going to Greggs to get a pie. But it's just that we've got a good work ethic. Everyone who's worked with us has said it's, like, an infectious work ethic."

"Because we all love it so much, it doesn't feel like work, or like you're even putting effort in," Joe says. "When you work somewhere and you get asked to do an extra shift, it's like, 'Ugh'. But when you're doing something that you're really passionate about, you just want to put everything into it."

Blossoms have been working hard for a long time now. When their self-titled debut album lands this week, it will be well over two years since the release of the 'Bloom' EP that introduced them to the world. From that, 'Cut Me And I'll Bleed' still makes the final tracklisting, as do all the truly brilliant singles that have punctuated the time between then and

now – 'At Most A Kiss', 'Getaway', the re-released and all-over-a-radio-near-you 'Charlemagne' – giving 'Blossoms' the feel of a greatest hits before it's even started. "We've never been a band that's relying on one tune," says Tom. "We wanted to write an album full of singles; that's just the way we are, the same as the bands that we're influenced by and look up to. We think our album's timeless, like all those albums they produced."

Those bands are - as you can probably tell from the unapologetic self-belief - The Smiths. The Stone Roses and Oasis. Blossoms like lots of other stuff too ("Everything from Abba to The Doors to Arctic Monkeys to hip-hop," as Joe puts it), but it's the bona fide legends from just a bit further up the A6 that are stitched into their DNA. You can tell by the way they collectively gush when recounting the time Johnny Marr bumped into them in the Arndale Centre and told them he loved "that great pop record" ('Charlemagne'), or when Ian Brown tapped Tom on the shoulder to say hello at a party ("I went, 'I'm Tom from Blossoms'; he went, 'I know, that's why I'm talking to you'"), then asked them to support the Stone Roses at the Etihad last month. It won't be a surprise to hear that after they played, all of Blossoms stuck around to watch a headline show that, Tom marvels, "was already a success before they've even played a note - just because of that euphoria of so many people coming together".

But while they may have inherited their attitude and swagger from these bands, Blossoms have also been smart enough to eschew any retro-classicist tendencies. The shimmering synth line on 'Charlemagne', for example, sometimes feels sonically closer to the out-and-out pop acts it's brushing up against on daytime radio than, say, Catfish And The Bottlemen. To call Blossoms a guitar band or an indie band is, frankly, a little disingenuous. "Obviously we're influenced by a lot of that older stuff," says Tom, "but

ultimately it's 2016 and we want to sound as modern as possible."

Interestingly, a key figure in helping them achieve this has been James Skelly of The Coral, who was onto Blossoms super-early after hearing 'Cut Me And I'll Bleed', quickly becoming their producer. Given his back catalogue, you might have expected Skelly to take them in a more classic, psych-y direction (which, as evidenced by early songs, they can do), but in truth it's he who's pushed them urther and further towards a full-on, polished pop sound. Witness one brand new song on the album called 'Honey Sweet', about whose delirious catchiness Tom was initially slightly unsure. "I thought it might be too far down that road," he smiles, "but James had said, 'You need a tune that sounds like Taylor Swift could sing it', so we showed him it and he went. 'That's boss.' Soon as he heard us, he was like, 'You aren't an underground little psych-y band - you should be all over the radio.' And we were like, 'Yeah!'"

"But we've never, ever shied away from being catchy and poppy," continues Tom (who also, with a straight face, describes another new song, 'Smashed Pianos', as "Lana Del Rey meets Phil Collins"). "It's about tunes you can get up and dance to, tunes you'd have on at a wedding. I used to work in a hotel and I used to work countless weddings there. I think that's subconsciously gone in."

"We've always said we're a pop band," notes Charlie. "But we're not trying to sound like anything else. We're just trying to sound like ourselves."

ackstage at Slottsfjell, Blossoms are fitting in a couple of rounds of table tennis before they get in their van and head off to Austria, then Korea (where they've amassed a decent-sized following), then Australia, then back home. Tom says he's already written a second album and that the plan is to get the second record out quickly ("like Arctic Monkeys did") before going off in another direction entirely. "We don't want to stop. We feel like we're gonna be around for a long time," he says. "So it excites me, thinking about that. Like, 'Where are we gonna be in three years' time?'"

But we're getting ahead of ourselves,

especially considering how exciting the immediate future is going to be. Because by the time of, say, Reading & Leeds (Joe: "That's going to be massive!"), Blossoms' album will have been out for a month and suddenly all the thousands of people they're playing in front of will know all the words to every song, taking them one step closer to the kind of mass collective euphoria they witnessed first-hand at those Roses' shows in June. At present, on the basis of how effortlessly great their debut album's turned out to be, it doesn't feel like it's going to take them long to get there.

Blossoms certainly believe this, regardless of what anyone else thinks. And more importantly, they want it.

"I don't understand why bands wouldn't want to get to that point," argues Joe. "You put so much work into it, you believe in it, why wouldn't you want to get to the top?"

"Everything we say, we believe in," Tom says. "We want to be that big. We want to be massive – we've always said that and we're not embarrassed about it.

"We want it. And we're ready for it."

She's psychotic, cruel and wants to wallop you with a giant mallet. So why has the world fallen in love with Harley Quinn before Suicide Squad has even hit cinemas? Dan Stubbs investigates...

T WAS MEANT TO BE THE Jared Leto show. In December 2014, when it was announced that the actor and 30 Seconds To Mars frontman would be taking the role of the Joker in Suicide Squad, Leto got all the column inches. First, there was a glimpse of him in character: tattooed, crazed, neon-haired and luridly cartoonish, a 180° from the late Heath Ledger's brooding, frightening Joker in The Dark Knight. Then we heard about Leto sending bizarre gifts to his co-stars (bullets for Will Smith, a live rat for Margot Robbie) and remaining so fully committed to his character that Smith recently commented, "I'm looking forward to meeting him. I've only ever met the Joker."

But Leto may be wondering why he bothered, because he's been well and truly upstaged. There's just one reason people will be rushing to see the film this weekend: Margot Robbie's Harley Quinn, just as crazy as the Joker but with multicoloured pigtails and a f\*\*k-off mallet.

A kind of antidote to superhero teams like The Avengers, *Suicide Squad* concerns a bunch of dastardly supervillains forced into teaming up to fight on behalf of the government. Based on a recently revived '80s comic book series, its character list is a dip into DC's bargain bin, pulling out the likes of Captain Boomerang who – well, you can work it out.

But amid the cast of misfits, the film has gifted a long-overdue big-screen moment to Batman villain Harley Quinn. A fan favourite character, she's the runaway success story of *Suicide Sayad* before it's even hit the cinemas, and the lim's makers have noticed – a recent trailer focuses solely on Robbie's character, and a solo

spin-off film was announced in May.

Quinn's influence is spilling out into pop culture too – Canadian musician Grimes said she channelled Quinn for her manic vocal performance on 2016 single 'Kill V. Maim'. "[It has] a Harley Quinn kind of vibe — like just sort of this Joker-y, scary demon chorus," she told Song Exploder.

Google reports that Robbie's Harley Quinn was 2015's most popular Halloween costume – some 10 months before the film's release. And at pop culture mecca San Diego Comic-Con in July, fans cosplaying as Harley Quinn were a ubiquitous sight. One of the Harleys tried to sum up the attraction for *Vanity Fair*: "She's chaotic. She's crazy. She's insane. She's messy. She's psychotic."

arley's appeal is messy. Part of it can probably be attributed to the wave of nostalgia that's seen half the world glued to their phones catching Squirtles for the past month. Unusually, Harley Quinn was invented not in the pages of DC's numerous Batman comic books, but for the honestly-really-good '90s cartoon Batman: The Animated Series, which rendered the dark, dangerous Gotham of director Tim Burton's contemporary Batman movies in bold, art deco-style artwork. Harley Quinn arrived with no baggage, meaning the kids watching the cartoon truly owned this weird new character in a jester suit. She wasn't your dad's Batman villain.

There's also the slow realisation by DC and Marvel that women actually like comics. Market research in 2014 found that 47 per cent of comic book readers are female, but Hollywood's comic-based output has, traditionally, been overwhelmingly white and male. Batman V Superman bored the red underpants off cinemagoers earlier this year, but in a telling survey before its release, a whopping 88 per cent of respondents said they were most interested in the fact that Wonder Woman was in it. One of comic-Con's biggest draws was the trail ng that Wonder Woman's solo movie, p while Bathan and Superman h ıе battle, the mazonian won the

Speaking about the importance of female characters making it to the screen, Margot Robbie told Stylist: I think the industry has recognised that half the ticket sales are female moviegoers. So you need to provide. It's important to have

characters like Harley; it's super-important to be flawed. No one is perfect. It's a bold thing to tackle and I'm glad we did it."

But Harley Quinn isn't exactly a feminist antihero. Her origin story goes like this: Harleen Frances Quinzel works at Arkham Asylum, where the Joker is an inmate. After falling in love with her "puddin'", she gives in to her encroaching insanity and becomes his sidekick-cum-lover; the Joker, in return, treats her horribly. So we have an intelligent career woman gone gaga over an abusive partner. The message? Don't look for one.

There's also been controversy over representations of Quinn through the years. Her Saturday morning telly incarnation wore a modest Harlequin onesie and jester's hat. In her most recent reinvention for DC's *The New 52* she wore hotpants and a corset, boobs squidging out over the top. Robbie's version happily falls somewhere in between: bomber jacket, T-shirt, choker and smeared lipstick; 4am after a big night out with your mallet.

Mostly, Harley's appeal is that she's not Superman. Superheroes are

goody-goodies; they're inherently boring. Harley Quinn is, by contrast, a real piece of work. In the *Suicide Squad* trailers, we see her beating an enemy to a pulp, joyriding with the Joker and stealing a handbag – all with a big grin on her face. "We're bad guys," she says. "It's what we do."

After 2015's paradigm-shifting Deadpool, with its breaking of the fourth wall and Ryan Reynolds' wisecracking, scrotum-faced star, the runaway success of Harley Quinn seems to confirm that audiences are bored with the status quo. In Harley, they've been nally been given a dark, complicated female super-person. Don't bet on her being the last – but do double-check what a veryone else is going as before you commit to this year's Halloween postume.

Band Of Horses' Ben Bridwell tells
Leonie Cooper what a decade of
rock'n'roll has taught him

T'S BEEN 10 YEARS SINCE the hard-rocking, hard-drinking and hard-living US Americana gang Band Of Horses put out their classic debut 'Everything All The Time'. Following a run of triumphant UK shows and the release of their fifth album 'Why Are You OK', we asked frontman Ben Bridwell about the biggest things he's learned after a decade of touring.



# **DON'T BE A VEGAN**

"I've been a vegetarian since I was 19. It was actually a bet. A friend of mine was kinda overweight and he thought it would be a good way to get on a strict diet. So I was like, 'OK, I'll challenge you. Whoever dips out first is a coward.' Then over the years I got used to it. I was vegan for a year and a half, but when I was doing promo in Europe, I was like, 'Oh my God, this is such a drag, I'm just a pain in the balls for everyone else, y'know.' So, finally, we were in New York recently and I was like, 'That's it, I'm getting a piece of pizza!'"

# **SAVE YOUR CASH**

"For the first four years, we were so broke. I was a scumbag. I never had money, so I wouldn't keep it when I got it. Luckily we toured so much we'd always have a meal out, or at least enough to get a pack of smokes. It's funny, the more popular you get, the more things come free. Clothes are free. Some chef wants to take you to dinner. It's wrong; the system is messed up. I'd like to pay for my meal and this shirt. Please give it to the band that can't afford even to eat today."



# **MEET YOUR HEROES**

"Bruce Springsteen came to watch us at the Bonnaroo festival in Tennessee. We were on our last song but our manager was like, 'Bruce f\*\*king Springsteen is here, play some more!' The only two songs we hadn't played were unreleased ones that we hadn't figured out how to do well. But he waited for us, came over and introduced himself. He was so down to earth. We played Coachella a few years ago and when we got done, the security guard says, 'You had no idea but Paul McCartney came to the stage and watched you guys."

# BE WARY OF LOCAL BEVERAGES

"Just recently I had some fermented moonshine from Germany – it was from Bavaria specifically, and it was called Heil something. Little Hitler's brand. So I was like, 'Oh, I don't know about this, guys.' Fun-time juice or whatever the f\*\*k it was. That was strange. We've imbibed for the duration [of the band]. We've gotten all the flavours. You go to Scandinavia and someone gives you Fisk – some weird brand the sailors drink, which is crazy-as-balls tasting. It's like liquorice."



# WATCH WHERE YOU SLEEP

"Our first time in Europe, in 2006, we were at this festival in Sweden and we'd indulged a bit. Someone had some Klonopin or Xanax and

we drank a bunch of beers, and I was just asleep in the grass having a bit of a kip. A random punter didn't see me and stepped directly onto my nuts. And as I look up to be like, 'What the...?' the other foot comes down on my face. I think there's a human imprint still in the grass somewhere in Sweden. It was the funniest wake-up I've probably ever had."



# **DON'T GET TOO WASTED**

"We did Pete Seeger's 90th birthday tribute at Madison Square Garden. That was nothing but heroes: Joan Baez, Richie Havens, all these incredible lifers in the rock world. We were doing a song - 'Turn! Turn! Turn!' - with Roger McGuinn from The Byrds. At moments like that, you don't want to get too drunk and be the wasted guy singing the wrong words or falling down. However, I got really stoned right before we went out to do our first performance. I was like, 'Goddammit man, why did you get stoned right before you step on Madison Square Garden stage for the first time?' I was chewing gum, so they wouldn't smell this, like, Blueberry Kush on my breath."



## IT'S OK TO CRY ONSTAGE

"We were touring with My Morning Jacket and my wife brought

our daughters to a show in Baltimore. My eldest was probably three or four and ran out on stage in the middle of a song. It was so cute. I was so moved by the moment, at her confusion and her innocence, that I definitely shed a tear or two. It was hard to finish the song, for sure. It was a beautiful moment."

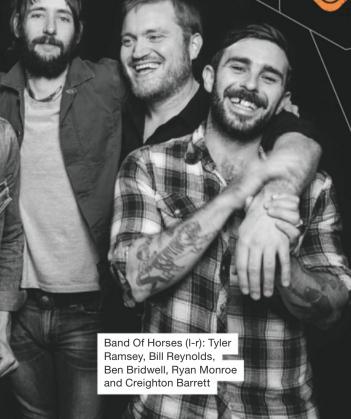
# **DON'T GET TOO NAKED**

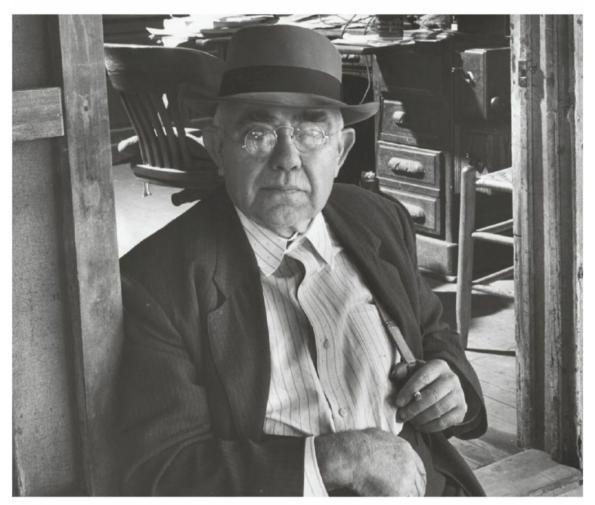

Stepping out

Former backing singer Nao gets her chance to shine on this future-facing pop debut

FLUTTERY SOUL LUSH

THE OSCAR-WINNING documentary 20 Feet From Stardom offers a salient look at the fate of many backing singers.

They might have vocals so bloody strong they could drag a 10-tonne truck, but mostly they end up stuck in the shadows of the big bands and massive artists they work for, the credit for their contribution to some of the world's biggest hits lost in the sands of time.

Nao could have easily slipped into that camp. A former session singer with the likes of Jarvis Cocker, the Hackney-based vocalist only decided to become a solo singer after the person who ended up becoming her manager spotted her singing at someone else's gig and decided she had the chops to go it alone.

At an impressively thorough 17 tracks long – including a couple of brief but lovely demos in the shape of iPhone voice memos – Nao's

debut album certainly isn't shy about setting her out as one of the UK's brightest new talents. The first thing you notice is her

> voice, a fluttery but punchy thing with a propulsive kind of power. Oozing out in-between the bassy beats that kick-start 'Adore You', it's

a magical, helium-enhanced melding of some of Britain's finest: Sade, Kate Bush and, um, 1990s 'Dreams' hitmaker Gabrielle.

Nao's style has been dubbed 'avant-soul', but her music is far more mainstream than that would suggest. It exists in a modern musical landscape that's had its foundations laid down by south London's dubstep wizard Burial and The xx's breakaway boy Jamie xx, whose wobbly party tunes template is now the rule rather than the exception. 'Feels Like (Perfume)' rolls together glitchy club sounds with traditional piano-led jazziness, while 'Girlfriend' boasts a lush spaciousness that belies its somewhat needy lyricism.

Nao's real flair, though, lies in embracing the old school and making it seem fresh. 'Get To Know Ya' and 'DYWM' both re-rub late '80s soul and push it firmly into 2016 with crisp production and an effortless dancefloor feeling. More proof, if it were needed, that Nao – and her odd but addictive vocal – belongs up front.

Wild Beasts' fifth album is a Tindertastic display of carnal desire

SHAGGING BONKING DOING IT

ALBUM OF THE WEEK WILD BEASTS HAVE ALWAYS been highly sexed animals. Theirs isn't the music you casually play on your laptop after you successfully entice a date back

home following a bottle of wine and a moderately priced sourdough pizza. Wild Beasts have long been the actual sound of shagging itself; all fiddly and slippery and

somewhat more complex than you first thought.

The follow-up to 2014's 'Present Tense' is a continuation of the London-based band's neverending shagathon, but this time they've decided to house their fulsome electro-indie randiness in something of a concept album, one that picks apart the idea of

masculinity, stripping it down in an attempt to reveal its hidden depths. Which are, you've guessed it, just as sex-obsessed as what's on the surface.

Consider us unshocked. In last week's *NME*, Wild Beasts bassist Tom Fleming bluntly and brilliantly summed up the premise of the album. "The last record was made up of love songs," he said, coyly. "This one is all f\*\*k songs." That isn't just down to Wild Beasts' own saucy minds, but the enlisting of producer John Congleton, a man known for his fondness of heavy, guttural sound – having worked with the guitar-battering likes of St Vincent and extreme noisemakers Swans.

So alongside the creeping softness of 'Dreamliner' – which is full of Alt-J-worthy waves of sensual electronica – we get the biggest noises the band have made to date. 'He The Colossus' sees them experimenting with brazen riffage as frontman Hayden Thorpe sings the praises of the "come-to-bed eyes" of his "junkie love", like Suede's Brett Anderson

by way of Aphex Twin. 'Get My Bang' is similarly huge, with a beefy bassline underpinning Thorpe's account of how he secures his shags. 'Eat Your Heart Out Adonis' follows the same path, simultaneously shuddering with raw sexuality ("I like it messy / Don't you make it neat") and 'Alpha Female' has hooks and heaviness in equal measure.

If they carry on at this rate, their next album will probably get them arrested. **Leonie Cooper**

Yet nearly a decade later, he and director Paul Greengrass have reunited for this belated sequel. And, sensibly, everyone involved has chosen to ignore 2012's The Bourne Legacy, an unnecessary attempt to continue the franchise with Jeremy Renner standing in for Damon's magnetic title character.

turning fictional social network Deep Dream into a huge global surveillance tool. But, as ever, the story's real meat lies in Jason Bourne's restless quest to piece together his past. When his old ally Nicky Parsons (Julia Stiles) tells Bourne his father may have been more deeply linked to the CIA than he realises, Bourne's pitted against Dewey and his protégée Heather Lee (Alicia Vikander) in a continentcrossing bid to uncover the truth.

Although this set-up feels familiar from previous Bourne movies, Greengrass still manages to build plenty of tension as a CIA

perfectly. When Heather Lee suggests the CIA could persuade Bourne to return to the fold, Damon keeps us guessing as to whether she's right.

Factor in some bombastic set pieces and a couple of slick twists and it's hard not to consider Jason Bourne a job well done. It's no radical reinvention, but Greengrass and Damon have pulled off a broadly satisfying franchise revival.

# Dagny

Scandi ace dishing up icy and euphoric pop, including her worldwide megahit 'Backbeat'

DAGNY NORVOLL SANDVIK hadn't planned to be a pop star, even though music is in her blood.

Her mum (singer Marit Sandvik) and dad (jazz musician Øystein Norvoll) raised her in an "open and free-spirited" household in the small, arty town of Tromsø in northern Norway. She studied music at school and "grew up always falling asleep with music on in the living room, with musicians coming and going" from her house.

Her parents' spirit of collaboration wore off on her and she got involved in the local music scene, "touring and playing and having a good time" with like-minded people.

It was all pretty casual until 2011, when she sang on the slightly plodding 'Run River Run' for the Norwegian rock band Vishnu. But it wasn't her true calling. "I grew up in the '90s with The Spice Girls and The Backstreet Boys, who are just super-pop," she says. "I used to work at this dark rock pub in northern Norway, but pop is my area. I always come back to pop."

In 2012, aged 21, she moved to London. Here, she had fun, performed at shows and got creative. She plays acoustic guitar and when she wrote songs, "It was always the slightly more folksy stuff that naturally came out."

Then she met New Zealand songwriter Sam McCarthy – who wrote 'Don't Let Me Go' with Harry Styles and 'Team, Ball, Player, Thing' featuring Lorde – at one of her shows and they started working together.

"He's funny and unpretentious and we'd go into sessions and have a bottle of wine, and we were just kinda vibing stuff out," she reveals. "We did some really weird stuff before we wrote 'Backbeat' – some, like, talking

songs. Then suddenly 'Backbeat' came about. I knew there was something different about it. It felt bolder and got me excited. It's more energetic and feels a bit more like me."

Now, 20 million Spotify streams later, Dagny's a star. One who "just wants to go up on stage and, you know, let loose", one whose second track, wistful piano-led belter 'Fool's Gold', is as good as her first, and one whose debut EP is coming out later this year.

Dagny's life is about to change. There's just one rule, she says: "I put no limits on it."

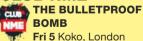

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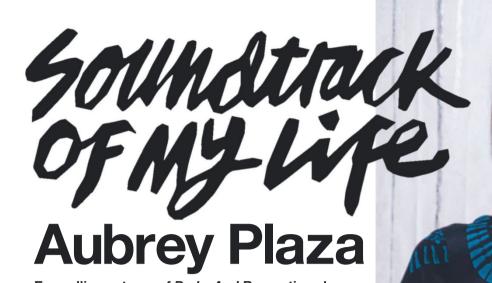
