## Frank Ocean's 'Blonde' bombshell

After four years of silence, the R&B superstar released two albums last week and the internet went into meltdown

FIRST CAME A VISUAL album, 'Endless', which you can only hear by streaming a video of the 28-year-old performing a variety of tasks, including building a spiral staircase. Twenty-four hours later 'Blonde' appeared, with Bowie, Kanye, Jamie xx, Kendrick Lamar and The Beatles in the credits, and a magazine called Boys Don't Cry accompanying it. NIKES

The lead single from 'Blonde', released 24 hours before the album. It's classic Frank Ocean, showing the rapper's adeptness at making pop music with a difference. He sings about the injustices facing black Americans today (giving shout-outs to fallen comrades Pimp C, A\$AP Yams and Trayvon Martin) while touching on the excesses of modern life. Easily the best track he's released since the mighty 'Pyramids' from his 2012 album 'Channel Orange'.

Originally debuted live in Munich in 2013, 'Ivy' sees Ocean spilling his heart out about a failed relationship. "I thought that I was dreaming when you said you love me", he sings over a sparse backdrop. At its climax, his falsetto crackles as feedback cuts through, like a metaphor for how he's feeling.

## 3 PINK + WHITE (FEAT BEYONCÉ)

A song that flows like a summer's breeze. Beyoncé's presence is barely noticeable, which says a lot about Ocean's self-confidence with this project.

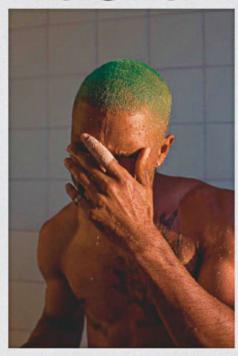
**■ BE YOURSELF** 

A short skit in which Ocean's mum offers maternal advice on a voicemail. "Many college students have gone to college and gotten hooked on drugs, marijuana and alcohol. Stop trying to be somebody else. Be yourself and know that that's good enough."

Preach, Mama Ocean.

Ocean ignores his mum's advice and depicts a drugged-up haze, the subsequent comedown and trying not to end up alone. "We don't gotta be solo," he croons over an organ, elongating the last word to "so low".

## **SKYLINE TO (FEAT KENDRICK LAMAR)**

Lamar chimes in to add emphasis to the odd word here and there, for example "smoke" and "haze". It works, in a low-key kinda way.

## SELF CONTROL

Full-blown love song featuring vocals and guitar from Austin I Feinstein of LA band Slow Hollows. Opens with a squawk of a rap before Ocean strips things back to woo the object of his affection. Delicate and heart-wrenching.

### GOOD GUY

Split into two halves, the first of which has Ocean recounting I a date with a man who "talks too much, more than I do" and sees it as "just a late night out". The song then cuts to two men talking about having "b\*\*\*hes no more" | and getting their hearts "wrecked" by women. A lo-fi piano ballad that looks at two opposing facets of modern masculinity.

## NIGHTS

More late-night diary entry vibes. Part one has Ocean vearning for "new beginnings" and to stop waking up when "the sun's going down", while part two falls back to old ways: "Every night f\*\*ks every day up / Every day patches the night up".

## "Frank makes pop music with a difference"

## SOLO (REPRISE) (FEAT ANDRÉ 3000)

Ocean takes a backseat to Outkast's André 3000 in fullthrottle mode. Includes the aid-back keystrokes of jazzy lounge piano clashing with ittering glitches.

## **PRETTY SWEET**

Sounds like Ocean delivering a soliloquy from the heart of a sandstorm. Soon I a choral section kicks in as the beat picks up and races to I a premature finish. An interlude.

## FACEBOOK STORY (FEAT SEBASTIAN)

A skit on which Ed Banger producer Sebastian recalls being dumped by a girl because he wouldn't accept her as a friend on Facebook. Sounds silly; is actually poignant, touching on jealousy, intimacy and technophobia.

## **CLOSE TO YOU**

Short, Auto-Tuned track that riffs off Stevie Wonder's vocoder cover of 'Close To You' by the Carpenters. The original's familiar tune lingers underneath.

## WHITE FERRARI

Back in November. producer A Trak tweeted, "Mark my words: in a few weeks u'll hear a song called White Ferrari, I can't tell u who it's by but it's the best thing u'll hear this year." It's a slow-burning, minimal ballad that makes reference to The Beatles' '66 classic 'Here, There And Everywhere' and feels like a final open-top car ride as summer comes to an end.

In Frank's own words: "a reimagined part of my boyhood". In it, he promises to "let go of my claim" on a former love interest. A beautiful ode.

### **FUTURA FREE**

Nine sprawling minutes that close the record with Ocean reflecting upon life before emails from Jay Z were dropping in his inbox, and Tyler, The Creator I would sleep on his sofa. The sound of Frank staying true to himself.

## Ready to rock

Biffy Clyro frontman Simon Neil and bassist James Johnston on the many joys involved in headlining Reading and Leeds Festival for the second time

You're returning to Reading and Leeds Festival this weekend to headline it for the second time... Simon: "Ha! Yeah! No pressure!"

How does it feel? Not many bands get asked twice... James: "Like every show, even the smallest show, it's a chance to prove yourself. If, in this instance,

it's a chance to prove that last time wasn't a fluke, then that's what we'll go with. It's always a chance to show the audience a good time and show them what a great band you are. It's easier to think, 'Oh, it's just a gig,' but of course you don't. It's the biggest gig in the country for us."

SIMON NEIL

Simon: "Having done it once, we'll have a bit more swagger. There's something special about it. Last time we were stepping up unproven and this time we're stepping up because we did a great f\*\*king job last time. It feels like we truly belong. We know it's within our arsenal now, which is important. Last time it was like, 'F\*\*k, can we do this?' With new songs and a completely different stage, I think it'll blow last time out of the water."

Will it be a friendly rivalry with co-headliners Fall Out Boy? ■

Simon: "Of course, of course. We'll do 'Sweet Child O' Mine', they'll do 'Sweet Child O' Mine' and we'll see who is best. Last time playing after Nine Inch Nails, one of the best live bands in the world, really put fire in us, and you know what, Fall Out Boy this time will, too. We're both rock bands but we're quite dissimilar rock bands. I think it'll be the perfect combo to end Leeds and Reading. We're looking forward to the challenge of that, definitely. When you're playing with bands like that you have to up the game, you have to bring the show, because they're so used to playing big gigs." James: "It's funny when you look back at the list of previous headliners and all the bands that have been there. It's been a while since there've been lots of British headliners and there really aren't that many bands at all that have worked their way up in the way that we have. I think that's why we feel doubly proud." Simon: "It's our 10th time this time, so it's poetic as well."

## CHEF KING SAYS:

'It's a sweet and sour barbecue dish with hemp seeds and oil. It's like stoner's food hungry, they need that fix.

## Part one: the sauce

### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 small white onion, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 banana shallots, diced
- 1 tsp tomato purée
- 2 cups plum tomatoes
- 1/2 cup cider vinegar
- 1/3 cup rice vinegar
- 1/3 cup molasses
- 3 tbsp vegan Worcestershire sauce
- 3 tbsp raw coconut sugar
- 2 tbsp smoked paprika
- 2 tbsp of sesame oil
- 1 tsp Himalayan pink salt
- 1 tsp ground black pepper • 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
- 2 tbsp hemp oil

## **DIRECTIONS:**

- 1. Heat olive oil in a medium saucepan over a medium heat. Add onions and cook for 4-5 mins until softened. Add garlic and shallots, and cook for a further 1-2 mins.
- 2. Add all remaining ingredients, except the hemp oil, and stir. Bring to a gentle boil, then reduce heat to low and simmer for 15-20 mins until slightly thickened, stirring occasionally.
- 3. Transfer the above to a blender and blend until smooth, before adding the hemp oil. Set aside to cool.

F\*\*K ME, SHE'S A F\*\*KING badass!" yells out a massively excitable teenage fan of Lady Leshurr after high-fiving the Birmingham-born grime-star-inthe-making. We're behind the Red Bull stage at the Caribbean Carnival

of Manchester and the 27-year-old (real name Melesha O'Garro) is taking turns between tap-tapping on her iPhone with perfectly manicured talons, taking selfies with starstruck kids and smiling broadly at everyone. This afternoon Alexandra Park is playing host to battling sound systems blaring out everything from jungle and drum & bass to dub and dancehall. Mixing the old with the new, Lady Leshurr's set fits in perfectly. There's a rowdy cover of Sister Nancy's 1982 reggae classic 'Bam

Bam' - as sampled on Kanye West's 'Famous' as well as her own 'Queen's Speech 4', a hilarious viral hit from 2015 that's sitting at an impressive 31.5 million YouTube hits and counting; and current single 'Where Are You Now?', a punchy, grimepop banger that recalls the unfettered party vibes of Dizzee Rascal's 'Bonkers'.

"Who likes to mosh pit?" asks Leshurr to cheers and flailing limbs, as her backing dancers, both with the word 'Queen' emblazoned on their crop tops, hype up the young audience even further. Before we know it, there's a circle pit worthy of the one Skepta started this summer on Glastonbury's Pyramid Stage.

This Lady knows how to work a crowd, for sure, but just how did we get here? After well over a decade of hard graft, that's how. Before Leshurr's carnival conquest, we find the only quiet place on site - inside a transit van parked next to some tennis courts - to hear about the evolution of one of Britain's brightest talents, who's currently working on her official debut album 'Queen Of The Scene', set for release next year.

It all began for Leshurr at the tender age of six, when she first started writing rhymes, rapping over old reggae numbers for her mum's voicemail. "We used to have talent shows at our house every weekend and I would just rap my little bars," remembers Leshurr

"I just love her visuals, the way she don't care, the way she don't show her body to sell records. She can put on a bin bag and go dancing. I think that's amazing."

in her thick Brummie brogue. She grew up in a house with one brother and two sisters - with a total of 11 brothers and three sisters across Birmingham. Her siblings were making music from a young age too, but Leshurr was the only one to stick with it, attending the youth club opposite her house to hone her skills, not just in front of the mic but behind it too, learning to produce and mix as well as sing and dance. At 14 she released her first mixtape under the name Lady L, the self-produced and self-promoted 'Needle In A Haystack', which she left on buses and handed out in the street. "I was literally doing anything to get people's attention," she explains. It worked, and before she knew it she was asked by Birmingham's iconic Tempest Records - which closed in 2012 - if she wanted to sell her CDs in store. She was so excited that she was happy for them to be given away for free.

et despite her obvious talent and drive, growing up in a strict household meant that Leshurr's father did his best to push his daughter into a more stable career. "He thought, 'What's the point because you're not going to make it.' He used to tell me, 'You'll never make it out of Birmingham - nobody ever makes it out of

Birmingham." In order to appease him, the 5ft nothing Leshurr started work as a security guard, largely because she was told she was too tiny for the job. "But music was always on my mind, so I stopped working," she continues. "I didn't tell my

father. I left the house and kept saying I was going to work, but I wasn't - I was going to the studio."

Back then she was making hip-hop, the kind of music she fell in love with after seeing the video for Eminem's 'My Name Is' on cable channel The Box with her mum at the age of 12. "That was the day that everything changed for me," she

remembers, grinning, "Literally, I knew I wanted to become a rapper. I wanted to be exactly like him. I was studying him. I got all of his mixtapes, I got all his music and I got pictures of him all over my wall. I was absolutely obsessed. I was a Stan."

In recent years however, Leshurr's own sound has become more affiliated with grime than with hip-hop. It was a shift that came about because of Leshurr's own brand of humour, which leaps out of her

> recent releases; all witty asides, fast and furious put-downs and vivid visuals. So for those who continue to believe grime is just a London thing, think again. From Bugzy Malone in Manchester to Leshurr in Birmingham, grime is more of a countrywide movement than many have given it credit for. "It's a UK thing," confirms

Leshurr. "I think there was a time where London kind of gave up hope on grime, but we were still banging it up in Birmingham and Nottingham and Leeds and Manchester. It's not that we revived grime, but I think we kept it going."

Despite this, Leshurr sees herself as somewhat set apart from the rest of the grime community, even



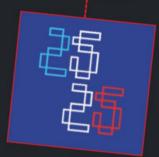

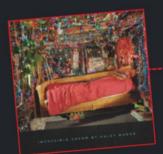

though there's a guest spot from Wiley on 'Where Are You Now?'.

"I don't have anybody y'know - it's really sad but I don't have a circle. I don't have any industry friends, I don't have anyone, literally," she says. It's a situation she's keen to change, but one she puts down to her move to London a few years back. "I thought it was just because I'm from Birmingham and I felt like at the time Londoners were like, 'We can't let anybody from outside of London try to take over our thing." Now settled in Stratford, east London, she's doing her best to make it work, and succeeding - playing sold-out shows in New York, slaying Glastonbury earlier this summer, meanwhile catching the ear of iconic producers like Timbaland.

Now nine mixtages in, she's keeping the details of her debut album on the downlow. What she will reveal is that she's 70 per cent done and currently sorting out guest vocals, even chasing a contribution from Sister Nancy herself. The album title is 'Queen Of The Scene' and with the word also emblazoned on her merch, what does being a 'queen' mean to Leshurr? "Being a queen to me doesn't mean I think I'm the best, but when I was trying to find myself and trying to get to know myself I wasn't confident. But when I started to get more confident I realised I needed to start pushing up my chest a bit. I deserve to be treated like a queen." That confidence can be seen and heard on all five of her Queen's Speech tracks, the first of which appeared on YouTube in February 2015. Name-dropping everything from Nando's and cheesy Wotsits to Rachel Dolezal and Leshurr's own casual aim to win a Grammy, the fast-talking, wise-cracking series showcases Leshurr's humour but also stands out due to her refusal to swear or rap about violence.

"I don't feel the need to swear. I grew up on one of the most foul-mouthed rappers in the world, but it's all about mentality and upbringing," she says. "My mum brought me up really good and I knew my rights from wrongs." Leshurr is adamant that musicians should set a good example to young people. "Parents say that they let their kids listen to me, and that makes me feel good. I've set out to be a role model."

or Lady Leshurr, giving back to the community is paramount. In 2014 she took a year out from making music to help others with making theirs instead. Setting up Lady Leshurr's Rap College, she travelled the country speaking to wannabe MCs, artists and poets. "Adults can look after themselves, but the youths of today aren't getting the right guidance that they should be getting from their parents. It's like they're just allowed to roam the streets. I'm hearing so many kids talking about sex, at the age where I would be playing football or at the studio," she says. "It really gets me upset because I don't know what the world is going to be in the next five years. We need youth clubs to get kids off the street and doing something productive. If we had facilities they would turn to than, rather than violence and drugs."

It's not just giving back to the wider community that's important to Leshurr; it's about something closer to home. When we ask what her favourite track is, she's quick to answer 'Queen's Speech 4', the song that gave her a global platform and her first taste of mainstream attention. But it's not the resulting phone call from Timbaland, shout-out from Erykah Badu or props from Akon she's referencing, but that she was able to use the money to help her mother. "It cured my mum's life. I got my mum a mortgage because of that [track]. That's all I ever wanted." Success for Leshurr isn't about getting her face on billboards and tracks on the radio. "I went into music to get my mum out of her struggle. I promised her when was 12 and it took over a decade, but it's all paid off."

Leshurr's got where she is by refusing to compromise and retaining full creative control. "I'm very sensitive and emotional when

people try to interfere with my music or vision," she states, explaining how she made the beats for all of the Queen's Speech project – by beat-boxing into her phone, then taking the files into the studio to work on. "I know exactly how I want the

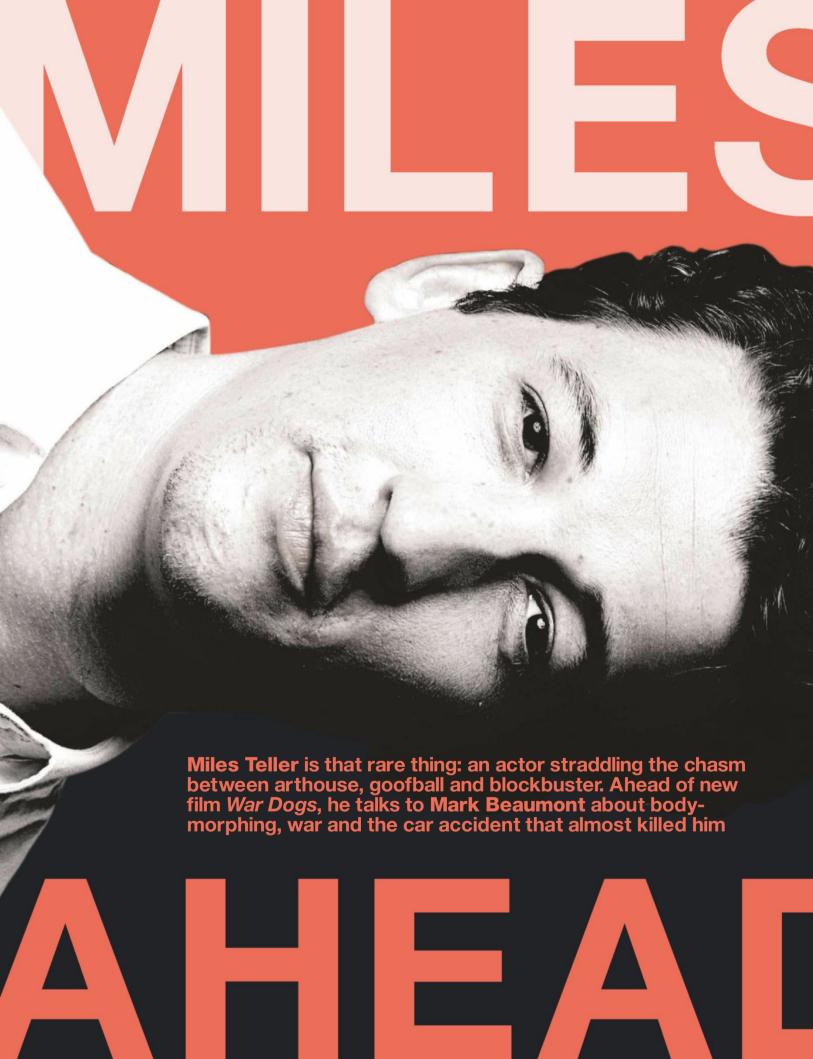

S A TRAINED METHOD actor, you wonder if Miles
Teller – long after his new film
War Dogs has wrapped – is
still in character. The role in
question is that of a rookie arms dealer

question is that of a rookie arms dealer discussing a multimillion-dollar deal with the US military while desperately trying to hide the fact he's a stoner dropout on the blag. It might explain why the famously scar-faced 29-year-old – an actor capable of straddling the chasm between arthouse (Whiplash, Rabbit Hole), goofball (Project X, 21 & Over) and blockbuster (the Divergent series, Fantastic Four) - has his guard firmly up as he meets the press in an LA hotel conference room to discuss his blackly comic new film, in which he and Jonah Hill play real-life amateur gun runners David Packouz and Efraim Diveroli, a pair of chancing-it Florida dudes who manage to loophole their way to a \$300m government weapons contract. Or Teller might be media-burned; the last time he let himself relax in a press interview, with Esquire last summer, his opening small talk – brewskis, tattoos and jokes about his penis - had the writer describing him as "kind of a d\*ck". But ever so gradually, he begins to open up...

## War Dogs opens with a damning indictment of the industry of war. Does it make you despair of modern politics?

"A lot of my buddies are military and I always looked at it in terms of the sacrifice they're making for their country or the guy fighting next to them. But no, I never looked at war the way these guys do. I never thought of war as a way for small businesses to capitalise. There are gun dealers that love when war's going on because they just look at it as dollar signs. It's an interesting variable to add in, but for me war will always be about the sacrifice these guys and women are making and the effect that has on their families."

## You've been drumming since your childhood church band, but how much training did you have to do to become the 12-limbed jazz drum maniac in Whiplash?

"I was definitely not that skilled. I'd never held the sticks like that, I'd never played jazz. I only had about three weeks to turn from a pretty good rock drummer into a highly skilled jazz percussionist. Not as much time as you want but that's usually, from my experience, how these things go."

You're expected to get hugely talented very quickly in one area for one film and then do the same again for another film...

"Yeah, and you lie and say. 'I can do it!'

## HI, I'M MILES TELLER

You might remember me from such films as..

Damien [Chazelle, director] didn't even know I was a drummer when he cast me. He didn't know that JK [Simmons, his co-star] went to a school for conducting. So it was all very serendipitous – everything synced up."

## Have you always been musical?

"Music was always a pretty big part of my upbringing. I started out playing piano when I was maybe five and then played saxophone all the way up to senior high school; I played in a jazz band. Then guitar I picked up because it was lying around the house. I asked for a set of drums when I was about 15 because all my buddies played guitar so I'd be the only drummer. I started playing with some s\*\*tty Florida garage-rock bands and played some shows, had people making some T-shirts, got a little merch."

## How were those shows?

"Fun, man! I remember getting our first mosh pit and we were like, 'Cool!' Just getting people moving and kind of p\*\*sed off was a lot of fun."

## As a result of Whiplash, did you get to meet any musical heroes?

"Yeah, Lars Ulrich. He's a huge fan of that movie. I remember when it premiered at Sundance. I was just talking to my buddy and somebody said,

'Lars is here, he wants to talk to you.' I was like, 'Lars from Metallica?' He just loves movies – he's a film buff, man. We remained close. I love musicians. If I was better, I'd be very satisfied with being a musician. I still play guitar and always have a drum kit set up. I like having stuff for people to jam on if they come over."

## You've developed a versatility that allows you to do arthouse films alongside blockbusters...

"The way the business is now, I think you

have to. In independent films you get very interesting characters; characters that aren't for mainstream audiences because maybe it's so dark. It's really fulfilling work, but you don't make any money. You'd have to make 10 a year to make a college degree income. Then you have studio films that, OK, people are gonna see, but is it a story that needs to be told? That's what draws me to independent films. Money has never chosen a role for me: I've always looked at the role first and foremost. If you find that sweet spot of something that's made at a studio and needs to be told, then great, man - but there are a lot of actors trying to get those parts."

## How do you feel about the transformative extremes actors are expected to go to to win awards?

"The body-morphing thing, like Christian Bale? Well, De Niro was doing it, but these older actors really set a high bar and as a younger actor you look up to these guys, like, 'Oh man, I wanna do that! I wanna change my teeth and do an accent and cut my hair and gain weight!' What you're really trying to do is stop people thinking about you, the celebrity."

## If the role was right and there was no CGI budget, what part of your body would you have amputated?

"I hope I never have to make that decision! I mean, you look at Bradley [Cooper] doing *The Elephant Man* on Broadway. He's doing that just with body work. So I think you can do a lot without having to go to that extreme."

## Do you consider your 2007 car accident a formative experience?

"Oh yeah. I went through a near-death experience at age 20 and less than a year later I lost two of my best friends in car accidents, five weeks from each other. You never think you're going to have to go through that. It changes you forever. At that age you shouldn't have to go through that stuff. But also it's good because there are terrible things that happen to people all the time and you don't know that just by looking at them. It gave me an opportunity to, I guess, be a part of that world."





## PEOPLE JUST DO NOTHING

OU ARE LOCKED INTO THE sound of the legendary Kurupt FM. Hold tight, the Brentford mandem!" Three series in and it's good to know nothing much has changed inside the weed-fogged council flat that Kurupt FM calls home. Grindah is still convinced he's the "greatest MC in the galaxy" despite audience figures that hover around zero; Chabuddy G is failing to seduce his Tinder dates with peanutbased cocktails; and the crew's attempt to record a new track descends into farce when they fritter away their studio time by watching Jean- Claude Van Damme fight sequences on YouTube ("I can't believe he's French!").

The running joke is that Grindah and his hapless cronies, despite limitless reserves of self-confidence, never get noticed. But in the real world it's a very different matter. This year, Kurupt FM have burst out of the confines of their sitcom People Just Do Nothing to become a must-see festival act. The day after we meet in a Camden chicken shop, they appear on the bill at an outdoor show between two of their musical heroes, Wiley and Dizzee Rascal. "It's insane," admits Allan 'Seapa' Mustafa, who in his grey Nike tracksuit and baseball cap is instantly recognisable as Kurupt kingpin MC Grindah. "These people are Gs, man. We looked up to them as inspirations."

Crucially though, Kurupt FM have been completely embraced by the scene they're spoofing. Their Champagne Steam Rooms have featured garage and grime legends like Wookie and Newham Generals, while key UKG producers Scott Garcia and Sticky have volunteered their beat-making services to the show. Kurupt FM now wield such influence within the revitalised garage scene that Craig David even used their 1xtra Takeover last year to launch his comeback ("He's genuinely one of the nicest guys," reveals Asim Chaudhry, AKA Chabuddy G. "And he smells great!")

"There's never been any hostility; it's all love," confirms Seapa. "They can see we're not ripping the p\*ss out of their culture. We were MCs and DJs back in the day - we're part of that whole scene. It's not some tw\*t in a suit who's made this show and dressed them all like f\*\*king breakdancers."

"We're not a novelty act," emphasises Hugo Chegwin, nephew of '80s TV presenter Keith, who plays the ever-loyal DJ Beats. The crew are scathing of the "chav-bashing" perpetrated by some comedians. "Lee Nelson - I'm not feeling that guy," rages Seapa. "He gets it so wrong it's actually offensive."

eople Just Do Nothing feels authentic because, essentially, it's a re-creation of its creators' teenage years. Back in the early '00s. Seapa was an aspiring MC on London pirate station Rampage FM; all of them have experience of the twilight world of hidden transmitters and dubplate pressure. The sitcom is set in Brentford not just for its amusingly mundane location, but because that's where several of them grew up. Their genuine love for the garage scene ensures all the beats and rhymes in the show are tight.

"We are comedians but we're musicians first and foremost," says Seapa. "When someone's f\*\*ked out of his head in the rave, he's not going to pick up on the subtleties of comedy and s\*\*t like that. So you've got to shell down the rave and put a sick performance on." When Seapa comes out with nuggets of street wisdom like that, it's hard to tell where the actor ends and the character begins. "Grindah is 90 per cent me," he concedes, but there's a key difference: "I'm not an a\*sehole!"

Conversely, there isn't much of drugaddled dogsbody Steves in thoughtful English literature graduate Steve Stamp, but it's an acutely observed portrayal.

There's a Steves at every party," he notes. Asian Del Boy Chabuddy G is based on Asim's dad. "He's alwavs had various businesses: restaurants, cab office. Some failed, some did alright, but he's never given up. He's doing a burrito café now. He doesn't know anything about burritos."

With series four already commissioned and another Champagne Steam Rooms tour booked for the autumn, things couldn't be going better for Kurupt FM. But they've been careful not to pass on this success to their sitcom alter-egos. "The heart of it is always anticlimactic," explains Steve. "We'll never have a massive police chase."

"That's why it's called People Just Do Nothing," adds Seapa, "because nothing actually happens. It's the self-importance of their tiny little world that makes it funny."

They promise a darker end to this series, building on the tragicomedy hinted at by Chabuddy's flickers of self-doubt and Grindah's refusal to believe that Angel might not be his biological daughter. "Art, comedy, whatever, should reflect real life," says Seapa. "You're not always laughing, you're not always crying, you're not always w\*nking - you w\*nk sometimes."

There will come a time, probably after the fourth series airs next year, when Kurupt FM takes a break from the airwaves to pursue other ventures: Asim has appeared in Sherlock and Hoff The Record, and Hugo has a sideline writing songs for Sam Smith, Emeli Sandé and Plan B. "Wu-Tang's the analogy," says Asim. "We'll come back together... but it'll never be as good as the first album."

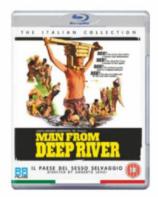

How To Be A Human Being

INDIE ODDBALLS BANGERS

GLASS ANIMALS' 2014 debut album 'Zaba' was like a blissed-out voyage through the Amazon basin. Its trippy tics earned them comparisons to Alt-J and Wild Beasts, and it shifted a highly decent half a million copies. On 'How To Be A Human Being', the four Oxford dudes have found bigger and broader stomping grounds, stepping out of 'Zaba''s intoxicating murk and into the glare of a strange new reality.

The breadth of their new horizons is best shown on

irresistible opener 'Life Itself', a huge summer anthem in which vivid lyrics, like: "Northern Camden's own Flash Gordon," meet sci-fi synths and massive

> drum beats from the other side of the globe. The story here is about a delusional nerd ("She said I look fat but I look fantastic"), but there are plenty

more eccentrics that make up 'How To Be A Human Being'.

It's a concept album, sort of. Each track is a vignette - some funny, some tragic - based around a fictional character invented by frontman and producer Dave Bayley. The former neuroscientist recorded hundreds of strangers' stories in the two years spent touring 'Zaba' and used them to create character studies. These he unravels with cryptic lyrics: "Pineapples are in my head" - and, if you can spot them, significant samples.

soundtracks a useless stoner with regressive synth throbs that wouldn't seem out of place on Super Mario Bros. Bayley's diction shifts accordingly, too. On 'Youth' his falsetto mirrors the lyrics' bereft mother, while on 'Take A Slice' he gives an appropriately lechy grunt ("Gonna f\*\*k my way through college").

It may sound a little highconcept, but its ultimate themes of empathy and diversity are subtly communicated. Glass Animals' melodies have an

immediacy that diffuses any hint of chin-strokiness: that's the reason the band worked so well with NYC rapper Joey Bada\$\$ last year on one-off collaboration 'Lose Control' and it's the reason the drug-addled tragedy of closer 'Agnes' is able to ring true after such a kaleidoscopic, funny ride. ## **Brilliantly silly**

A deeply weird and very funny animation from the twisted minds of Seth Rogen, Evan Goldberg and Jonah Hill



THERE ARE SEVERAL THINGS in Sausage Party - the deeply weird and very funny new animation from the twisted minds of Seth Rogen, Evan Goldberg and Jonah Hill - that can almost certainly claim to be cinematic firsts. A beetroot being publicly f\*llated. Bakedgoods an\*lingus. A lesbian taco eveing up a hotdog bun's buns. And that's not even giving away some of the most oddly shocking sights because we've got to retain a little mystery, haven't we?

This really is the sort of film that you spend enormous stretches of mouth agape, wondering how it got made. Yet you'd have to be very prudish not to be glad that it was. It mostly takes place in a supermarket, where sentient groceries dream of the day they'll be selected by the gods (humans) and taken to The Great Beyond, where they will be liberated from their packages and allowed as

much sex as they want. It's not entirely clear why all food is so horny but there's too much else to unpack here to dwell on that.

Moments before crossing to The Great Beyond, a sausage, Frank (Rogen), his bun girlfriend Brenda (Wiig) and a few other foodstuffs are knocked out of their shopping trolley, perhaps dooming their chances of enjoying the afterlife. As they search for a way back, they learn that the truth about what humans do to food is altogether less cheerful and sexy.

If that all sounds bizarre, then just you wait for what follows. Not to suggest that everyone

indulgent, a private joke given a budget, but it's so creative in its depravity that it's hilarious.

There's a sort of brilliance in how silly it is, a smooth flow to its nonsense. The attempt to weave in some religious-relations social commentary is pretty perfunctory. There's no nutrition here, just the delicious sugar rush of really great junk food. And who doesn't love that? Olly Richards

Andy: "It was a real love of Radiohead and Thom Yorke's solo album 'The Eraser' that was our biggest inspiration when we started writing music." James: "What we took from it was the fact that they moulded their sound every time they put an album out. We were struck by 'Kid A' and the more electronic side of things. It shifted our mentality and took us into wanting to learn more about electronic music."

James: "Ray [the bus driver] told us a funny story. The guitarist [Dimebag Darrell] had one of these plastic clocks on the wall of the bus and after every gig he'd smash the clock. Just punch it. He'd just be like: 'Alright, Ray!' and then smash the clock. Then every day, Ray would wake up and a new clock would be there. This guy had bought a batch of clocks. And he'd do that every day of the tour. Smash the clock and replace it."

James: "Both singles 'Warm On A Cold Night' and 'Someone That Loves You' changed so much from when we first wrote them. The different versions were incomparable. You'd think they were two different bands." Andy: "Sometimes you'd do stuff to them and think, 'My God, I can't believe we nearly put that on the album sounding like it did before, that'd be so embarrassing."

James: "I think that's quite probably impossible." Andy: "I'm going to hunt him down and stick a microphone in his face. The rap on the track will be like: 'Get out of my face!"

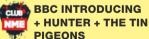
