You've been around a long time. How do you keep your live shows interesting?

"We're humble students of music and always curious about how we can play, perform and connect with people better. It's not a sedentary thing. It's the moving, growing, ever-evolving thing that we're figuring out. I always try to give people the truth of who I am."

It's 32 years since your debut album came out. When you play live, how do you bring the same energy to your songs?

"I'll be playing songs I wrote when I was 20, but also songs I wrote when I was 50. But has there ever been a night when I think: "God, if I play f**king 'Give It Away' one more time, my c*ck's going to fall off"? Like, yes. There are moments of having a hard time finding the spirit of a song but it's all about the people, man. About connecting."

Which new artists inspire you?

"I'm excited about Frank Ocean's new record. I like Anderson .Paak, Kamasi Washington and a band called Bad Bad Not Good."

What is it about Frank Ocean?

"For me, that last record 'Channel Orange' affected me profoundly. I listened to it a million times and it lifted my spirit. His voice goes right through me. I'm a real fan."

Last week Fox News called the Red Hot Chili Peppers the worst band in the world. Do you see that as some kind of compliment?

"I saw a poll that said people who watch Fox News know less about world affairs than people who watch no news at all. It's a funny programme. It doesn't faze me. I heard that. It's funny. I don't care."

You've played bass with Koko the gorilla. What else is on your bucket list?

"To see Koko again. That was a beautiful experience, to feel this powerful animal hold my hand, speak to me and understand what I was saying. It changed my life."

What advice would you give to your 20-year-old self? "Stay off the crack pipe."

Major Lazer, the global fusion dancehall crew led by Diplo, are the busiest boys in music. Kevin E G Perry joins them for 24 hours at London's Lovebox

UTON ISN'T THE MOST glamorous airport in the world. It isn't even the most glamorous airport around London. But it's where Major Lazer find themselves at 1:20pm on Friday July 15, piling out of a private jet and into the first of a fleet of blacked-out minivans waiting on the tarmac. They're already an hour behind schedule. Even private jets have their drawbacks. Nobody ever tells you about the delays.

"I might drink a bottle of rum once every six months," he says. "Then I can't drink rum again.

o far, stuck on the road between Luton and London, the reality of life in Major Lazer isn't quite living up to billing. "As you can see, it's pretty lame," says Diplo. "The three of us in a car, drinking water. Every once in a while we might meet a girl, but we usually don't because we have to go to the airplane." He shrugs. "We're pretty normal guys, you know?"

We're too old to party too hard."

At 2:45pm, we arrive at their hotel in Fitzrovia and Diplo runs in for the

recording with Skrillex as Jack Ü and producing for the likes of Beyoncé and Madonna, he's also still hands-on running his label Mad Decent. He has other investments in companies like Snapchat, and his total net worth is estimated at around £11 million. On top of all that, in a week's time Major Lazer will release 'Cold Water', intended as the first of a series of big singles leading up to their new album next January.

Featuring Justin Bieber and Mø, the laid-back dancehall of 'Cold Water' is a sort of coming together of Diplo's two biggest tracks of last year: Jack Ü and Bieber's 'Where Are Ü Now' and Major Lazer and Mø's 'Lean On'. Weirdly, given that it's now racked up over 1.49 billion views (making it the ninth most-watched YouTube video of all time) and helped push Major Lazer up to the status of major festival headliners, they originally didn't intend to release 'Lean On' themselves. It was offered to both Rihanna and Nicki Minaj, who each turned it down.

"We felt like any song we did would be bigger with a Beyoncé or a Nicki Minaj on it," explains Diplo. "I'm a producer at heart, but I realised that it's way better to do it ourselves. I think the power of the superstar has significantly gone down in the last 10 years. I've



understand it. Now, every song on the radio sounds like 'Lean On'."

Before 'Lean On', it was Beyoncé's sampling of their track 'Pon De Floor' on 2011's 'Run The World' that convinced them that they could have mainstream radio success without compromising their sound. "'Pon De Floor' was never a big hit, it was kinda underground," says Diplo. "It took two years for somebody else to put it on the radio. It made us think: 'Why are we doing all this stuff for other people and then waiting a year to get sampled? Let's just be trendsetters on the radio.' We realised that no one's got an edge with reggae and dancehall, and it's such a massive undercurrent."

At a time when the divisive, racist politics espoused by the likes of Donald Trump are running rampant, it's significant that the music Major Lazer make is a truly global soundclash, drawing on Caribbean and African beats, but also with European, Indian and North and South American influences. For Diplo, this all stems from his childhood growing up as little Wes Pentz in southern Florida, where, he says: "Haitians, Latinos, Cubans, white kids, Jewish kids and hood kids were all in the same neighbourhood and the same schools. Miami is the most diverse place for human beings I've ever been to."

As a white man, he's been accused of



profiting from all these varied traditions. He arques he's simply responding to the music around him. "When I grew up, no one told me what I was supposed to listen to," he says. "On

the radio, Miami bass was always the thing for me, and heavy metal – that was big in Florida too. My parents listened to country. Rap was on the radio. I grew up and I loved music. I didn't think: 'Oh, I'm white, I've got to play a quitar.' I never had a quitar."

He laughs. "I really f**ked that up. only had turntables. I wish I got a quitar, then I wouldn't have so much criticism. For me, the band that's most influential to us is The Clash. Nobody said: 'You're culturally appropriating' when they made 'Rock The Casbah'. I think what makes a great artist is someone who can change the direction of music, not someone who stays the same all the time. Otherwise music would be so f**king boring."

It was in Miami too that he learned how artists could build an audience by hustling mixtapes, not by signing to a major label. He's recently worked again with his former girlfriend M.I.A. on a new track 'Bird Song', although she's struggled to release it due to interference from her label. "Back in the day I told her not to sign that deal with Interscope," he says. "I was like: 'What's the point?' The point was to become bigger and more popular and work with Timbaland and all that stuff, but none of that matters if you own your own music. We're independent. We do our music on our own in America. What you learn in the underground is how to make money out of nothing."

Diplo arrives at Lovebox just after 4pm, the first of the trio to arrive at Major Lazer's backstage village. It's a VIP section within the VIP section, a little

enclave with security at the entrance. separate dressing rooms, offices and even their own catering and toilet. Huge steel flight boxes have been upended and opened up to create wardrobes for the dancers. In the main dressing room, a set of decks has been set up so that Diplo can DJ – and not ust to keep him entertained.

"We're always working on music on tour," he explains. "We have these set-ups backstage so we can play music and fine-tune mixes, work on new music and try different ideas. We cut vocals on tour sometimes. We never waste any lime. We don't have any time to waste."

little after 5pm he jumps onto a chauffeured golf buggy which careens off around Victoria Park in search of his DJ set - except nobody's actually quite sure where it's supposed to be. Somebody told Diplo he was on after Chronixx, but we can hear him disappearing in the distance. Eventually we find the West Stage, one of the festival's smaller venues. "Damn, they're getting smaller all the time," he jokes.

Backstage his decks are being readied. They're on wheels so they can be pushed out onto centre stage when he goes on. Diplo is bouncing around, apparently untroubled by his lack of sleep. Just before his decks are rolled on he dives underneath them so he can be wheeled on unseen. When he jumps out, the crowd erupts and he rewards them with a set that features everything from Kanye and Beyoncé to snatches of Whitney Houston and The Lion King soundtrack. He finishes the set

standing up on the decks, arms outstretched as the crowd bounces to 'Where Are Ü Now'.

The set feels rehearsed and faultless. but afterwards he reveals it was entirely spontaneous. In fact, he's a little annoyed that he couldn't find everything he wanted to play. "I f**ked up and couldn't find a couple of tunes," he admits. "I usually try not to play any Major Lazer, but I dropped one in."

With their headline set just a few hours away, it raises the question of why he bothers - most performers would probably be happy just to take the pay cheque for the main slot and kick back in the afternoon. Back in the golf buggy, he shrugs it off, saying: "Why not? I'm here anyway - I might as well get paid for a Diplo set. What else am I gonna do, sit in my hotel room?"

He adds, though, that he's driven by the desire to cram as much as he can into his career. He spends half his week in LA with his two young sons, Lockett and Lazer, and says he has: "no social life, it's only my kids. I probably won't do this so much when they're older. You only get a short window so I want to do as much as I can."

Back inside Major Lazer's VIP area, Jillionaire and Walshy Fire have arrived and are hanging out with Mø, who'll come on to close the show with them tonight. Just before they go on, Diplo is pogoing around his dressing room, DJing topless. "Building vibes," as Jillionaire puts it.

They huddle backstage dressed in full cricket whites, an idea they picked up after touring in India. It takes less than 20 seconds from Diplo shouting: "London!" until the first volley of pyrotechnics, and soon all you can smell is the metallic scent of fireworks. In front of them, thousands of Londoners lose their s**t to a set that's euphoric and totally unpretentious, concerned only with the making of good times.

Even after the set, their work isn't over. They head straight from Lovebox to Tape, a 250-capacity club in Mayfair, for Diplo's third set of the day. He takes back what he said about not partying hard. "I mean, we do," he says. "We sleep, like, three hours a night. On tour we do everything we can. We want to take advantage of every moment we're out here alive. NME That's our high."



coincidence – but since its initial release last year, the song has taken on a life of its own, landing him the role of Belgium's musical ambassador to the games and ultimately bringing him to the Cidade Maravilhosa – the Marvellous City – itself.

"It started off with the Belgian Olympic Committee looking for a song for their TV advert, but it's turned into something much bigger," he explains. "They opened an Olympic House in Belgium, where they streamed all the games and where I DJ'd at a few parties. I also spent four days at the training camp in Lanzarote doing swimming, judo, table-tennis, badminton, mountain-biking and sprinting with the best from Belgium. When you spend time with athletes who haven't drunk alcohol for six years, when you see the level of dedication they have for their sport, and when you think that some of them will be going back to a normal nine-to-five job once these games are over... it kind of embarrasses you as a human being."

Daenen isn't that sporty (although he was a decent table-tennis player in his youth), but he's full of respect for the sacrifices these athletes make. Are there any parallels between the discipline of an athlete and the discipline of making music?

"There probably are some, but in my job I can shut off for four days if I want to. I can have a drink and not ruin my body. I can have a bad night and it's OK. With these guys, it's completely different. Like today, when we were at the Olympic

Stadium, we saw this poor Puerto Rican guy get disqualified from the 400m hurdles for a false start. I was getting emotional just watching him. He'd spent years training for that moment and his dream was shattered in a millisecond."

Later that night, Team Belgium's musical ambassador holds court at his embassy the Casa Mosquito, a plush boutique hotel whose rooftop terrace has been fashioned into a makeshift dancefloor. Daenen is DJing at Team Belgium's send-off party, capping their most successful games in 20 years, and despite an ill-timed downpour the mood is jubilant, with caipirinhas flowing freely and the president of the Olympic Committee throwing himself fully clothed into the hotel pool. As the evening goes on, we come to discover something important about Netsky: if partying were an Olympic sport, he'd be on the podium every time. His night finally comes to a close around 5am, when he wanders into a random hotel on the Copacabana - via an even more random nightclub spinning trap remixes of Bryan Adams songs – only to be informed that all the bars are closed. By that point, he's been awake for 24 hours.

DAENEN'S REAL discipline,

however, isn't partying but production. With his parents' blessing, he dropped out of university in his second year – after writing an entire album on his headphones during class – and soon landed a deal at Hospital Records, the seminal London-based drum & bass label that released his first two albums, 2010's 'Netsky' and 2012's '2'. Those records made him one of the stars of the genre's resurgence, but as

the stars of the genre's resurgence, but as

he explains: "It was starting to feel a bit narrow for me. I wanted to experiment with other genres, work with other musicians, and that wasn't working out for me at Hospital. I've still got a deep love for the label and the guys who run it, but I wanted to go broader and wider. It's too easy to stay in that scene, making the same music, pleasing the same fans."

In 2014, he signed a deal with Sonv. the first fruits of which - the imaginatively-titled '3' - were released in June 2016. The album - featuring Emeli Sandé, Jauz and Chromeo - is his poppiest to date, but also arguably his best and most cohesive. Inevitably, it's proved controversial with D&B diehards. "I get the most grief of anyone in the drum & bass scene," he groans. "Among the old-skool fans, I'm the traitor who moved into a bigger genre. I guess I felt that way, too, when I was younger: for the real purists, it's something that's a part of their identity and they don't like it when it becomes popular."

The ubiquity of 'Rio' probably won't do him any favours with those purists, but Daenen isn't about to lose any sleep over it. "The guy I wrote 'Rio' with, Digital Farm Animals, has the same mindset as me when it comes to songwriting: we both like to write poppy, positive music. That's what I want to do as a DJ. I'm not a poet; I'm not going to change the world with lyrics. I'm just here to make people smile." Clearly, he's come to the right place for that.



Blondes WEEK have more fun

Finally, musical maverick Frank Ocean drops his second album. Was it worth the wait?

FRANK OCEAN

BLOODY HELL, Frank. When it comes to stressful album campaigns, the epic two-year-long tease for 'Blonde' pretty much takes the cake. Since the release of 2012's incomparable 'Channel Orange', the New Orleans-raised R&B artist has had his devoted legions of fans on the edge of their collective seat, eagerly awaiting its follow-up.

The album was 'nearly finished' in April 2014, was supposed to come out in July 2015 and for the past 13 months we've been poised for a drop at any second. Then, on August 19, Frank offered up the visual-album-cum-intricate-DIYvideo 'Endless' and 48 hours later it finally happened. His second album proper was there, sitting pretty, and exclusively for two

weeks, on Apple Music.

There's no doubt that 'Blonde' is an exceptional piece of work, but those expecting the full-on party bangers and straight up soul-pop hits of 'Channel Orange' and 2011's 'nostalgia,ULTRA' mixtape might be somewhat perplexed. This isn't an album for playing loudly at a club, but one

> to melt into through the medium of headphones. This is music at its most intimate. Previous releases showed us Frank can command a dancefloor with a click of his fingers, but

'Blonde' shows us inside his soul.

Opener 'Nikes' is soft and sensual, but lyrically he's tackling some seriously heavy issues, from the curse of consumerism to the Black Lives Matter movement ("RIP Trayvon / That n**ga look just like me"). The lush, shimmering 'lvy' is every bit as emotive as 'Channel Orange''s stunning stream of consciousness confessional 'Bad Religion' - a track that seems to have been a guiding force over 'Blonde''s slow-burning direction, alongside the soaring 'Thinkin Bout You'.

Even the guest spots are low-key. Beyoncé's vocals are barely perceptible in the sleek groove of 'Pink + White', while you could blink and miss Kendrick Lamar's 'Skyline To' appearance. But 'Blonde' isn't about being flashy. It's about the lo-fi majesty of songs like the hushed neardemo 'Good Guy', the smoky soul of 'Seigfried' and stripped back gospel of 'Godspeed'. This ain't no dumb 'Blonde', that's for certain.

became one of her generation's biggest pop stars as a teen,

suffered a very public meltdown a decade ago, then relaunched her career with a glitzy Las Vegas residency that's now in its fourth year. Yet not since 2007's forwardthinking 'Blackout', which ironically came out as her personal life was crumbling, has she released a truly essential pop album.

'Glory' is no masterpiece, but it's a marked improvement on 2013's 'Britney Jean', a messy attempt to merge thumping EDM tunes with supposedly reflective midtempo songs. A major contributing factor

'What You Need'. But on the other, it makes the more restrained offerings that play to her strengths compelling. 'Just Luv Me' is a cute pop-dancehall tune produced by Kanye West collaborator Cashmere Cat, while the sad-eyed glide of 'Man On the Moon' positions Spears as a kind of Vegas Lana Del Rey. 'Just Like Me', an electro melodrama in which she catches her man cheating with a doppelgänger, shows off the vulnerability in her voice.

Some will complain the lyrics are impersonal and over-reliant on sex - Spears threatens to get her blindfold out on opener 'Invitation' and by third track 'Private Show'

she's offering to perform a strip routine. But for better or worse. sex has been what she sings about since at least 2001's 'I'm A Slave 4 U'. And really, does anyone want to hear her emoting about the tedium of commuting from LA to Vegas?

Perhaps inevitably, 'Glory has moments that recall Spears' hit-making past. The lusty strut of 'Do You Wanna Come Over?' nods to her early-noughties Neptunesproduced hits, while 'Hard to Forget Ya' has a brilliant bridge that could almost be ripped from a very early Britney single. But if any pop star deserves to benefit from a bit of affectionate nostalgia, it's surely Britney Spears. Nick Levine DON'T LET IT OUT

Season two of Narcos details drug lord Pablo Escobar's downfall in spectacular fashion

CABBAGE'S THRILLING debut EP 'Le Chou', which features five twisted post-punk slinkers stuffed with explicit lyrics and Jack White levels of rage, came out in January. They also look good and rock hard live. Singer Lee Broadbent explains what the hell is going on...

First off, why Cabbage?

"It's the best anti-band name and sums us up completely. As a musician, I've always wanted to become a sort of Marmitetype entity and it really works. Some people love it, some people hate it - it's great."

You're vocal about current affairs in your tunes. Do you think it's important for new bands to speak up?

"We're at the forefront of culture, aren't we? So in some respects we need to be at least somewhat topical. We've got a song called 'Grim Up North Korea', which is about going out how Kim Jong-Un runs his business over there, and one about Donald Trump called 'Free Steven Avery'. It's really bad, though."

You have some pretty funky lyrics, for example: "I had a w*nk in the quiche and watched the headmaster get it stuck to his teeth" in 'Dinner Lady'. What's that all about?

"It's just our black-humour way. I don't think we're vulgar people. Maybe some people might think we are. If they've seen us at a festival, they'll probably think we're vulgar."


