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THE ROUNDHOUSE

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IS THERE ANYTHING more exciting than seeing massive artists do their thing in tiny venues? Blur at the 100 Club in 2012, Kanye West at KOKO in 2015, The Libertines at the Boogaloo in

Highgate earlier this year: these are some of the buzziest events in recent musical history.

On September 18 the Apple Music Festival kicks off at the Roundhouse in Camden, bringing with it some giants of modern music. Britney Spears, The 1975, Bastille, Alicia Keys, Calvin Harris and more will perform in this legendary corner of north London. This issue features interviews with and insights into the full line-up, including Matt Healy's justification for smoking and boozing onstage at 1975 shows ("I see everybody having a good time and I want a fag and a glass of wine"), Dan Smith's take on a new Bastille tune ("almost like our own superhero theme tune") and Britney's revelation that she might not be around for much longer. When asked if she thinks she'll have the longevity of her hero, Madonna, she responds: "Nope. Give me five - two? - more years."

Catch her while you can, in a venue that's way too small for her.

# "You've got to find your invisible balls"

After a tricky four years involving a sex tape and convictions for assault and drink driving, former N-Dubz member and X Factor judge Tulisa is back with a cover of the 1999 garage hit 'Sweet Like Chocolate', and she's still a legend

You played at London club G-A-Y recently, working a leather punk-inspired outfit. Is a change of direction afoot?

"It was just for the night, I guess it's a little bit bondage-y. I just wanted to have a bit of fun, but I am a bit of an undercover rock queen. Even [fellow N-Dubz member] Fazer said, 'One day you're going to turn into Pink! You're going to do a rock album,' because I do love my rock music."

# Why did you decide to cover 'Sweet Like Chocolate'?

"It happened naturally. I heard the new Craig David record with that old-school garage sound and I was like, 'Why didn't I come up with that?' I started singing the classics and 'Sweet Like Chocolate' just popped into my head."

### Is an album on the cards?

"An album of singles. If there was an album – which I'm not thinking about – I want to bang out single after single. I'm talking a minimum of six and maybe then we'll think about an album, which I think, unless you're Adele or Beyoncé, is the way it's done. Especially with dance music."

Your last album, 2012's 'The Female Boss', was all about empowerment – what advice would you give to women who want to be more of a boss?

"Look in the mirror, look deep into yourself and find your invisible balls. They're in there somewhere."

# How important is it to you to have creative control over your work?

"So important, and I'm so used to it I couldn't do it any other way. I couldn't be an artist who was told what to do, what to be, what to sing. It would just be a big fat lie. You'd see it in my face as I have to love what I'm doing. It's got to come from me. I'm an intense singer, so I look like I need the toilet every time I hit a high note! It's got to come from the heart and I feel like I'm releasing when I'm on stage."

### You published the biography Honest: My Story So Far in 2012. Will you do a follow-up to talk about the last four years?

"It's funny you should say that because I wrote a book in my time out. I haven't even taken it to the publishers yet. I'm just doing my final edits but I want there to be more happy things out there. I don't want it to be like 'why me?' or dragging on about the past. I want to be in a happy place. It's very much written like Sex And The City, in story form. It was 260,000 words when I finished, and the average novel is 70,000."

# What else is in the works for you these days?

"I want to go back into acting again. I'd like a kick-ass role like Lara Croft in *Tomb Raider*, or *Resident Evil* – just badass. I want to do martial arts and I want to do back flips."

# Here's to hippies and abo concert

What we can learn from the naked flower children of the Woodstock film

LAST WEEK, THE V&A launched a brand new exhibition celebrating the long hair, flagrant nudity and massive tunes of '60s counter-culture. You Say You Want A Revolution? Records And Rebels 1966-1970 is a sprawling, wonderful thing, the highlight of which comes near to the end, after you weave your way past a couple of The Beatles' Sgt Pepper costumes, copies of the brilliantly rude underground magazine Oz and a dusty chunk of moon rock to the soundtrack of cult Radio 1 DJ John Peel's record collection. You enter a spacious room complete with cosy bean bags straight out of the sixth form common room. Said bean bags are scattered across a luscious fake grass floor next to Keith Moon from The Who's drum kit

and above it all, the Woodstock concert film plays out on loads and loads of massive screens. It is an utterly majestic moment, and I'm not just saying that because I downed three cocktails in 15 minutes at the press preview.

But it wasn't the footage of the legendary artists who graced the epic American festival – Janis Joplin, Jefferson Airplane, Joe Cocker, Sly And The Family Stone, etc - that made me want to somehow travel back to 1969. No, it was the sight of a bunch of naked hippies frolicking in a lake on the fringes of the site. Sure, they were totally and utterly starkers, but it wasn't sensational and it wasn't showy - it was just a group of people having a lovely time splashing about in some pretty grim-looking water. Stomach bugs and Weil's disease

"No bags full of wet wipes – just a couple of daisies" notwithstanding, it looked like the kind of thing that all stressed millennials should do every now and again. Unlike today, there was nobody telling them they were too fat, too thin or too hairy; it was body-positive without even knowing what the hell body-positivity was.



# **BRITNEY SPEARS**

# The defining pop artist of her generation is playing the UK for the first time in five years. Nick Levine talks Beyoncé and doppelgangers with the star

RITNEY SPEARS DOESN'T have a squad like Taylor Swift. Or a name for her fans like Ariana Grande ('Arianators') and Katy Perry ('KatyCats'). Or a history of complaining about doing meet-and-greets with fans, like Justin Bieber. Or a list of beefs she's had, even though she broke up with fellow pop superstar Justin Timberlake in 2002. It's hard, too, to imagine anyone doing a Kim and Kanye style 'takedown' of her, because it's just not how she goes about her business.

The 34-year-old is a pop star from another era, but still the biggest of them all. And in 2016, 18 years since her debut single, still so famous that even if you've never heard a Britney album you'll know her lyrics - "Oh baby baby, how was I supposed to know?"; "I'm not that innocent" - and remember her best looks. Everyone recalls her as an air hostess in 2003's 'Toxic' video, draping a snake over her shoulders at the 2001 VMAs or dressing up as a schoolgirl in the video for '...Baby One More Time'.

As Lana Del Rey put it in 2012: "I'm not interested in a ton of female musicians, but something about Britney compels me – the way she sings and just the way she looks."

She's got 'it'. She's a pop star who inspires devotion and obsession, whose fans call her Godney and The Holy Spearit. Down the phone from Las Vegas - where her Britney: Piece Of Me residency has been running since December 2013 - she explains how she feels about those nicknames. It must be weird being called Godney, right? "Yeah! But that's just how the fans are - and I don't want to let them down. At the end of the day, we're all human and we all make mistakes. It's really flattering, but I don't know if I can set my bar that high. I mean, I'm sure a lot of

them have almost felt like they've grown up with me, you know?"

She's being too modest. A generation of fans and musicians have absolutely grown up with her, including Lady Gaga (who said in 2009, "When I was 13 she was the most provocative performer of my time") and Charli XCX, who recently declared herself an "endless fan of Britney Spears", explaining: "She massively inspired me when I was younger and still now. Britney's punk, she doesn't care. She's amazing and her videos are next level."

Her critics have always been pretty merciless. But anyone with a modicum of sense can see that her voice is instantly recognisable, great pop stars don't have to be great songwriters (though Britney's been racking up cowrites for most of her career), and performers with no talent rarely build 18-year careers.

How does she explain her longevity? "I try not to analyse it too much. I love what I do and I think that helps because it speaks for itself when I perform. Seeing other artists continue to do this kind of thing inspires me too. Because sometimes I'm like, 'What am I doing? Like, I could be a teacher.' But then I see other people doing it too and I'm like, 'Well, you know, it's probably all they've known for so long, so it just kind of makes sense.'"

In 2016, she's a bigger live draw than ever. *Britney: Piece Of Me* has been a mould-breaking success. Post-Britney, Vegas is no longer where your granny's favourite singers go to top up their pension, and both Jennifer Lopez and Mariah Carey have followed her to Nevada. Because she's been so busy in Vegas, Britney hasn't performed on a UK stage for five years, but she's preparing to play London's 1,700 capacity Roundhouse for the Apple Music

Festival on September 27.

hat's fascinating about Britney is that although she's been one-nameonly famous since '...Baby One More Time', we don't know much about her. The basic stuff is out there: grew up in the small town of Kentwood, Louisiana, appeared on The Mickey Mouse Club as a teen, transitioned with ease into pop stardom, mum-of-two, two marriages. We've gleaned from pap shots that she likes a Frappuccino and from her increasingly revealing Instagram that she really loves her kids. But that's kind of it.

When asked what she thinks she stands for, she replies: "I guess just a good person. Someone who makes people happy and cheerful, whose music lifts you up." Which is charming, but not too revealing. It turns out the way to access her soul is to quiz her about new album 'Glory', which is her best since 2007's 'Blackout'. The songwriting is surprising, the production on-trend, her vocals a revelation. She sounds like she's having fun again. Why is it so full of life? What makes it different from her last one, 2013's 'Britney Jean'?

"Honestly, this is the first project where I've really been hands-on. I was really specific about who I worked with and I've been learning to say no. I'm a people-pleaser, so that's hard for me – even if I don't like something, I'll do it just to make a person happy. I made sure this album was everything I wanted it to be. I was really selfish with it."


Britney, the pop star who likes performing way more than she likes talking, is spilling her heart out. "The beginning of the project wasn't that great – the songs that were coming in weren't very good. So we got a new A&R girl, totally

turned it around and gave it a profound new direction. I wanted to use my voice more, which is why I'm losing my voice this morning. I did different stuff with my voice, bluesy stuff, urban stuff, and played around with different things."

A standout track on 'Glory' is 'Just Like Me', one of five co-written by B. Spears. It's a catchy but sad ballad about a woman who finds her boyfriend in bed with a doppelganger. Where did that idea come from? "Me and my girlfriend, we came up with that. I was inspired by that Tracy Chapman song 'Fast Car', because it's just her and the guitar. I wanted to do something simple like that. The idea of coming home and seeing the one you love with a girl that looks identical to you is just completely devastating."

Britney's music taste has long been a mystery, so it's surprising when she gushes about Beyoncé's latest album. "Generally, I like songs that are bit different and I like moody stuff. I just listened to 'Lemonade'. I'm a little late on that, but it's good, really angry, a really hardcore album. There are moments where you feel the light, airy Beyoncé, but most of the time it almost feels like a therapy album. I respect that. She's an artist and that's what she needs to touch on at this moment in her life."

Britney's never been shy about her adoration for Madonna, whom she famously kissed on stage at the 2003 VMAs. A year later she said: "I'd rather meet Madonna than the President of the United States." Can she see herself on stage, doing the pop star thing when she's Madonna's age? "Nope. Nah. Give me five - two? - more years, and yeah." She's probably exaggerating for effect, but what if she isn't? Enjoy Britney Spears - the defining pop star of her generation - while you can.

# Singer Matt Healy dissects The 1975 live experience for Rhian Daly ahead of their smallest UK gig in years

HETHER IT'S MATT Healy strutting across the stage sucking on a cigarette and gulping down wine that attracts your gaze, or the dazzling cityscape projected onto the screens behind them, The 1975's live show is a spectacle. The Manchester band can't help but create an electric atmosphere. too, thanks to the hysterical responses that greet their every movement. These days, the quartet are used to gigantic venues (and are playing two nights at The O2 in London in December), but for one night only they'll be doing their thing in the intimate surrounds of the Roundhouse for the Apple Music Festival. Ahead of what's set to be a very special night, Healy dissects The 1975 live experience.

### How do you prepare for shows?

"It depends. We don't have many rituals. I think that stops us being pretentious or something. We went to high school together, so if I was trying to meditate or be Jim Morrison I would get a slap. We don't have any rituals. There's not that much build-up on tour, but the Apple Music Festival gig will be different because we'll be at home. I might get the Tube to the gig, which is always nice."

# How do you feel before a gig? You don't seem like a man who'd get nervous...

"The more intimate it is, the more nervous I get – I suppose because it's not what I'm used to. It's a very lucky situation to be in.

Because we play quite big shows more regularly I'm more comfortable with that. You get nervous for all the big 'uns though, all the big festivals, your Readings and Glastonburys and stuff."

### You smoke and drink on stage. Do these little comforts help with the nerves?

"I'm up there for ages and I'm just like everybody else. I see everybody else having a drink and a good time and I want a fag and a glass of wine. Why wouldn't I? It's nine o'clock, there's loads of people there, I want one. And it's my gig, so I'm gonna have one. I'm not at all trying to emphasise the performance, I just want a ciggie. I don't want to be the odd one out. I feel like I'd be taking myself too seriously if I didn't do what felt natural, which is having a cig."

# Your show's visuals are incredibly striking. What's the idea behind it?

"It was inspired by all of our favourite things. There are obvious references to James Turrell and [Mark] Rothko paintings and a lot of minimalist art references. It's all done with this video content and we use video screens as a light source so you have these silhouettes. We felt very competent expressing ourselves musically, so it felt like we needed to extend that to our live show. Having such a technical show does stop you from being so impulsive, but it does create a more coherent show. It's changing over the next month for the American tour and then the UK tour. It'll be a slightly different set."

### It looks so good, but you ask crowds to put their phones away so they can't take pics...

"I'm more aware of that than anybody. There's nothing I hate more than someone on stage getting proper miffed with it, being like, 'Oh, put your phones down,' 'cause I get it. I'm just as bad as anybody else. Our lives are like a forum now, so we validate our experiences by sharing them. I try not to be a d\*\*k about it."

### There's a lot of hysteria and passion from your audiences at gigs. How does it feel to be faced by that response every night?

"It's quite humbling. The thing that always excited me was when it all first started happening. It felt like it had gone straight from my bedroom into the public consciousness. It amazed me that those ideas had spread out and meant so much to people – and now that's happening on such a large scale, it's still what it comes back to for me. Reading Festival was the perfect example. I was kind of just in awe for the whole thing."

# Do you ever get used to that reaction?

"No, not moments like that. Not those big moments. Of course, you become acclimatised to touring and doing shows and stuff like that, but no, not really, you don't get used to it. You learn how to deal with it and still be a person. I don't take it for granted."

# Frontman Dan Smith tells Hamish MacBain about his band's second album and why he loves small shows

Y THE TIME THEY arrive on stage for their Apple Music Festival show at the Roundhouse, Bastille's long-awaited second album 'Wild World' will have been out for over two weeks. This means their new songs will, hopefully, be bellowed back at them just as loudly as their 2013 smash 'Pompeii', and all the other songs that - even now - are everywhere. Come October, they'll embark on a UK tour of massive arenas. All of which only makes the chance to play smaller shows such as this all the more special - for the people watching and for the people on stage.

### So you're sharing the Apple Music Festival line-up with... Elton John and Britney Spears.

"I know! It's very surreal to be on that line-up. But we're just really excited to be asked to do it: it's a nice opportunity to play a beautiful venue in our home town."

# Speaking of home town shows, what on earth was the idea behind the secret show you played as Chaos Planet the other week?

"I dunno, we just thought it would be nice to be a '90s chillwave band for a night. It was a nice excuse to wear some tie-dye. Any excuse to wear tie-dye is alright by me."

### You've got an arena tour in the autumn. Is there a sense of waving goodbye to being able to do small, sweaty gigs like that?

"I don't think so. There's always the way back down, man."

### Don't say that!

"I'm joking! But they're my favourite shows and I love playing them, so any opportunity we get to play smaller shows, we're going to do it. I guess it doesn't make sense on, like, a money level, but a lot of stuff we do doesn't make sense."

# How do you feel about an arena tour?

"I would have loved to be playing way more smaller shows. But equally, creatively, it's an opportunity to plan a show that's more ambitious and bigger than anything we've done before. Not just in terms of scale, but in terms of – from the minute that you walk into the room, to the end of the gig – everything being engaging and speaking to the themes of the new album."

# The title 'Wild World' is quite suggestive. What are the themes?

"Towards the end of last year, I wrote this song 'Warmth' and it's guite an affectionate song in the context of the madness of the world sometimes, and it made me think that would be the thread that holds this whole album together. The idea that, yeah, the world seems pretty f\*\*ked up, and there's no right or wrong way to react to it. There's no right or wrong answer, obviously, and who are we do anything other than articulate what it is to feel a bit confused? It's not meant to be grand: it's quite everyday. Like, there's a song about freaking out over what's going on and going, 'F\*\*k it, it's not the right thing to do, but let's get s\*\*t-faced.""

# There are also a lot of film references, right?

"Yeah. One song, 'Blame', that's like a scene in a gangster film in my mind. And then there's another that's inspired by part of In Cold Blood by Truman Capote. The song 'Glory', that's like a Wayne's World moment: you and a friend lying on top of a car late at night, looking at the planes flying over. And there's another that's like an ode to Nancy Sinatra and [Quentin] Tarantino, that goes off on this ridiculous over-the-top horn riff - that's like a big nod to hip-hop, but in a self-consciously jokey way, almost like our own superhero theme tune."

# So there's quite a bit of humour?

"I think so. Not that we're not taking it seriously, but I think there's maybe an assumption that we take ourselves much more seriously than we do. That song, 'Send Them Off!', has a quote at the beginning about the most brilliant brain in the world. It's us wanting to have that ridiculous swagger that we definitely don't have. It's like, f\*\*k you, if we want to start one of our songs with this ridiculous brass sound that's not what you'd ever expect from Bastille, we're going to f\*\*king do it. We wanted people to hear a song in isolation and not necessarily know who it is. Until my annoying voice comes in."

Behind the scenes at Apple Music's game-changing Beats 1. Its London star, **Julie Adenuga**, is **Leonie Cooper**'s guide for the evening

SINCE LAUNCHING ON JUNE 30 2015, BEATS 1 HAS exploded worldwide. The station has Elton John, Fatboy Slim, Major Lazer, Dr Dre, Drake and Travis Scott as guest hosts, and broadcasts in over 100 countries, 24 hours a day to over 17 million Apple Music subscribers. The station has three bases – Los Angeles, New York and London – and a main anchor in each city: Zane Lowe, Ebro Darden and former Rinse FM DJ Julie Adenuga respectively. Tonight, Julie is showing us round Beats 1 UK's north London base…



### 5.53PM

Beats 1 is situated in a large Gothic building called The Church in Crouch End, in the same studio complex Adele recorded '25'. Guest Benjamin Clementine fits the aesthetic perfectly, arriving in a floor-sweeping overcoat, even though it's sweltering outside. Julie, dressed in her trademark black with flip-flops, is there to greet him.

### 5.56PM

Benjamin - who won last year's Mercury Prize for his album 'At Least For Now' - begins his interview in the main Beats 1 studio. Introduced by Julie as "a lovely human being", they chat about the Mercury, with softly spoken Benjamin applauding the quality of the list. "I'm very happy I'm not in this year's competition, because I don't think I'd have been on the shortlist," he says, before tipping Anohni's 'Hopelessness' to win. "I hope young people listen to her album, it's important."







Following their interview, Julie has some pictures taken with Benjamin for official Beats 1 promo. "The light's beautiful," comments the photographer. "How about us?!" jokes Julie, before asking if anyone has a pair of high heels she can borrow, as Benjamin looms over her. Then it's time to make some GIFs, so Julie pops her head out from behind a baffled looking Benjamin. It's pretty obvious he's not a GIF man.





# 6.17PM

In the break room, surrounded by healthy snacks, Julie pops her legs up on a sofa and we have a chat about how she got started at Beats 1 - which basically sounds like being recruited to be a spy. "I had these meetings which were like blind dates - no one was allowed to say what was happening! I didn't know what the end game was," she says. When she was finally told what the job was, there were just three rules in place: "The main things were that Beats is worldwide, that we were always on air, and Jimmy [lovine, co-founder of Beats Electronics] wanted us to not be boring. That was it."

### 6.39PM

Before going live at 8pm, there's a run through of the show. Behind her mixing desk, Julie sings along to the new Warpaint song 'New Song'.

### 7.01PM

While Julie and her producers listen to new tracks, a screen above the mixing desk tells us what's playing live on Beats 1 right now. It's 'Mr Beat' by King Gizzard & The Lizard Wizard, in case you were wondering.



### **8PM**

Showtime! Standing up behind her mic, Julie kicks off the with Young M.A.'s 'Ooouuu'. "Don't forget that I am here to play your favourite songs," she hollers down the mic, before segueing into AlunaGeorge's 'Mean What I Mean'.



And not just our fave songs, her fave songs, too. She introduces the Little Simz-featuring mix of Jack Garratt's 'Far Cry' as her "favourite song of the year". In the studio the volume gets turned way up, like it's a club not a studio. All four producers are dancing behind their laptops. It is very, very vibey.

# 8.42PM

When Julie likes a song, she sings along loudly and tunefully. When she drops 'Lock Doh' by Giggs, it's like she's putting in a high-quality audition for *The X Factor*.

### 8.47PM

Julie interviews Jamal Edwards, co-founder of grime site SBTV and all round good guy.



## 9.21PM

As 'Daniella Whine' by Nigerian dancehall artist Patoranking plays, Julie says to her team that she might just dance to it for four minutes at a 70 degree angle rather than going to the gym. "I might start a new workout class now, on Apple Music," she suggests.

### 9.55PM

Tove Lo's 'Cool Girl' starts a near dance party in the studio, with Julie shimmying behind her mic.

In terms of melody, 'Femejism' is a more outwardly pop-leaning record than their debut, but the duo are still as heavy as Black

sees them fly their stoner metal flag, but with a smattering of sequin-studded glam to liven up the deal. There's even a semiballad in the shape of the bitter 'Critic', a hushed riposte to internet trolls hiding "behind your computer". The trippy 'Post Funk' is something different entirely, sounding not unlike early Yeah Yeah Yeahs, which shouldn't be too much of a surprise seeing as the New York garage-punk band's own Nick Zinner helped out on production.

# Almost famous

The Londoners don't quite deliver on their early promise

AFTER PLACING SECOND IN the BBC's Sound Of 2013 poll, AlunaGeorge looked poised to become the new cool, credible face of British pop. Sadly, this didn't quite happen. Their pretty decent debut album 'Body Music' stalled at No 11 and none of their own tunes became as huge as 'White Noise', the Disclosure banger they'd featured on.

Now that multi-instrumentalist George Reid has stepped behind the scenes, absent from the London duo's videos and promo appearances, it could be easier for the more charismatic singer Aluna Francis to sell this second album. She's especially compelling on lead single 'I'm In Control', telling a would-be suitor "You gotta go deeper than deep to get me off" over an addictive pop-dancehall beat.

'I Remember' has other highlights. The stylish glide of 'Mediator' is like Sade reimagined for the smartphone generation, while the title track shows Francis's gift for an evocative, ear-snagging pop lyric: "I remember your scent when I just woke up and I'm on your chest".

But over 12 tracks,
AlunaGeorge don't do enough
to command full attention. 'Mean
What I Mean' and 'Hold Your
Head High' are solid slabs of
vaguely tropical Major Lazerindebted pop, but misfires like
'In My Head' and 'Wanderlust'
meander at a rather bloodless
mid-tempo. The uncluttered
production always feels
reasonably on-trend, but too
often these songs just aren't
catchy or inventive enough to
be truly memorable.

The result is another pretty decent album that doesn't quite ignite. **Nick Levine**

### **Shifting tides**

**Punk singer Laura Jane** Grace emerges from a period of enormous personal change as an essential cultural figure



'SHAPE SHIFT WITH ME'. the seventh album from Florida hardcore punks Against Me!. is a collection of love songs, mostly dealing with heartbreak. Through the churning power chords of 'Crash' (which features a single tinkle of triangle that indicates the record's poppier sensibilities), Laura Jane Grace barks, "What happened to us?", concluding that "the DNA has changed".

It comes after a period of enormous personal change for Grace, who came out as a transgender woman via an interview with Rolling Stone in

the artist Heather Hannoura. gave a moving interview to Cosmopolitan in which she insisted that their relationship would last. Yet the couple divorced in 2014, by which time drummer Jay Weinberg and bassist Andrew Seward had left the band. The resulting record, 2014's acclaimed 'Transgender Dysphoria Blues', was a brave and empowering album of triumphant punk anthems like the stirring 'True Trans Soul Rebel'.

If that album sounded like Grace riding the momentum of the upheaval in her life, 'Shape Shift With Me' deals with the fallout (she overcame a breakdown between the two releases). It's not a record about being trans, but it does benefit from her near-unique of hardcore punk. As she told Rolling Stone earlier this year: "Being able to write about love through a trans lens is something it comes to love songs."

BACK IN THE '80S, US customs agent Robert Mazur went undercover in Miami as corrupt businessman Bob Musella to infiltrate the world's biggest drug cartel and help uncover Pablo

Escobar. Now, craggy-faced Breaking Bad star Bryan Cranston is bringing Mazur's dangerous, debauched story to life in new film The Infiltrator, directed by Brad Furman (The Lincoln Lawyer). Here, he chats drugs, spying and politics - while dropping a big hint about Walter White...

"I've played real life characters before [writer Dalton Trumbo and President Lyndon Johnson] so I'm used to doing my research. I was able to meet with the real Bob Mazur and get a first-hand account of what it's like to risk your life in deep cover and wear a wire while posing as a money-laundering lawyer. He was meticulous. Meeting his family gave me a true sense of the man, beyond the film we were making. Bob teamed with the flamboyant Emir Abreu [played by John Leguizamo] and they became a formidable team assisting with the seizure of millions of dollars of drug money."

#### What does Mazur think of the film?

"He was pleased with how the creative licence was taken. His book - Infiltrator: Undercover In the World Of Drug Barons And Dirty Banks - was very illuminating, but it was fact-based and full of acute detail. First and foremost we're making a movie, so The Infiltrator had to be entertaining. He embraced that because we stayed as close to the truth as possible."

#### then President Reagan's war on drugs have any effect? Can the war ever be won?

"It's an emphatic way to put your flag in the ground. I'd equate saying 'We're gonna have a war on drugs' to saying 'We're gonna wipe out prostitution'. Both wonderful declarations... But good luck with that! It's never going to happen. To be realistic, drugs are here to stay. The most important thing is to focus on saving lives. Talk to kids as early as possible. But we also need a compassionate society to take care of those that become addicted and want to turn their lives around."

#### Will you ever resurrect Walter White for Better Call Saul? Say it will be so!

"The way I feel about how [show creator] Vince Gilligan and that show changed my life... Even if I hated the idea, I feel indebted, so if they wanted to bring me back I'd say yes in a heartbeat. But knowing Vince and [writer] Peter Gould as I do, they would make sure it's something interesting, cool and unique. Expect something random..."

HUNT FOR THE WILDERPEOPLE

THIS ADORABLE COMEDY is just the sort of directorial triumph that you'd expect to one day send its maker on to huge things. That's already happened for Taika Waititi who, off the strength of his work on vampire mockumentary What We Do In The Shadows and this, is currently calling the shots on Marvel's massive Thor sequel Thor: Ragnarok. He deserves every piece of his success because Hunt For The Wilderpeople is about as good a time as you can

ever hope to have in the cinema.

When we meet Ricky Baker (Julian Dennison), an overweight, surly foster kid, we're told he's a 'bad egg'. Child services have been keeping close tabs on him due to such unforgiveable atrocities as 'kicking things, throwing things, loitering'. This dangerous criminal nature means nobody wants him, except for Bella (Rima Te Wiata), a woman with a heart that's kind but not so strong. Ricky's happiness is short-lived and a series of unfortunate events put him on the run through the woods with Hec (Sam Neill),

Bella's curmudgeonly husband, pursued by child services, the police and an assortment of locals. It's a little bit Rambo and a little bit The Goonies, but with a low-key, doofus-y charm all of its own.

Waititi has a confident command of his own world. It's full of whimsy but he gives it some bite, largely with a fiercely downbeat Hec.

Hunt For The Wilderpeople is a strange film. It doesn't really fit comfortably into any particular genre but straddles fantasy and reality, comedy and tragedy, sense and nonsense. Just do yourself a favour and see it. Olly Richards





## The horror

Every bit as terrifying as the 1999 original. Maybe more so

#### **BLAIR WITCH**

WE WERE A SIMPLER PEOPLE when The Blair Witch Project came out in 1999. We believed it was *just* maybe possible that this film, purporting to be made up of 'found footage' of young fools who went missing in a spooky forest, could be real. We marvelled at how it was marketed on the internet, which then seemed a world of wonderful possibilities and not the thing that would assuredly destroy us all (if you weren't there, ask your parents). We're more cynical now. A sequel/reboot coming 17 years later can only reasonably expect to meet with an eye-roll and a weary sigh. And maybe you'll manage one, if your eyes aren't otherwise occupied weeping with fear. Because this is every bit as terrifying as the original, if not even more so.

There's already been a *Blair Witch* sequel but this film, like the public did, ignores it. We pick up in the present day with James (James Allen McCune), the brother of Heather, the missing woman from the original, planning to retrace his sister's steps in the hope of learning what happened to her. A friend,

Talia (Valorie Curry), is filming him for a college project. Two more friends come along for the trip because you need extra people to potentially die. They're all wired up with tiny cameras, so once more the story is put together from 'found footage'. Yes, it is essentially the same film with whizzier technology. Yet is that such a bad a thing?

What worked with The Blair Witch Project wasn't the great story but the way it threw you into the middle of the action, unsure of the sound behind you, dizzy at sharing the same trembling view as the characters. It's been copied countless times since, but many imitators have shown it's not easy. Director Adam Wingard (The Guest) has the knack. His script is serviceable and his characters so dumb that any deaths are mostly unmourned, but his scares are first rate; tension is maintained throughout, jumps thrust in just as you're insensible with dread at visual horrors only glanced. He has an instinctive grasp of the rhythms of a horror movie. Which is a long way of saying it's so scary you may want to buy two seats - one to sit on and one behind you to jump into. Olly Richards

# Even by the standards of a debut album, there's a great deal of personal narrative in 'I Told You'. Why did you feel it so important to tell that story?

"It was important because the narrative isn't just a fake story; it's my life on a timeline. A lot of times, people won't be 100 per cent real with their story and I wanted to give people the drawn-out experience of the perseverance and the struggle that it took to get here."

#### Is it true that your father was a missionary, a minister, who healed people through the power of God?

"A missionary preacher, yeah. He travelled all across the world preaching the gospel and healing people. He'd sit there praying in church. The whole church would sit there praying and people would come up and get healed. People would come in wheelchairs and he'd make them walk. It's just the power of God. It wasn't my dad; it's what God had instructed my dad to do."

#### You've been feuding with Drake for years...

"I'd rather not [talk about that]. I'm off that subject. I just wanna make good music."

### Is it true that you were Justin Bieber's hip-hop coach?

"Nah, I wouldn't say all that. People started saying that at one point, though, because he put out a freestyle where he used eight bars of my song ['Beamer Benz Or Bentley Freestyle'] when he was mad young. But he ended up being a great friend of mine. When I see him, it's like seeing a cousin you don't see all the time. He's a warm-hearted kid; a good kid."

#### What's your ambition for this album?

"This is the best music put out so far in 2016. There's no album in 2016 that's better than my album. When you take the time to dive into it, you understand why. I encourage everyone to go out and get it – not because I'm trying to promote myself, but because you've been starved of great music." Jordan Bassett
