#### It was controversial but Joe Corré's bonfire was punk as f\*\*k

AST WEEKEND, ON THE 40th anniversary of the release of the Sex Pistols' 'Anarchy In The UK' single, a 48-year-old businessman in a beret, pinstripe suit and natty cravat took to the River Thames and set fire to a vintage stallholder's dream haul. An estimated £5 million worth of punk memorabilia was burned to a crisp by Joe Corré, son of Sex Pistols manager and arch wind-up merchant Malcolm McClaren and iconic fashion designer Vivienne Westwood. The floating bonfire was a response to this year's establishment-endorsed Punk London events staged everywhere from the British Library to the Museum of London - or, as the controversial Corré saw it, punk being "castrated and neutered by the corporate sector and the state".

Reactions to this 2016 version of The Wicker Man with fewer

virgins and more pairs of Johnny Rotten's old trousers have been mixed to say the least, with many accusing Corré of acting like an arrogant, spoilt brat. But while it's a crying shame that there are fewer Seditionaries T-shirts left in the world, it's hard to deny that Corré's media-baiting move was actually punk as f\*\*k. Of course, many have said it might have been decent of him to

money to charity, but Corré - the founder of fancy-pants pants shop Agent Provocateur - is the son of the man who invented the modern publicity stunt. This was about more than money; this was about causing a scene and getting as many people as possible to watch.

I met up with Corré earlier this year when his plans were announced. He put forward a convincing case, arguing that

punk was never about hanging onto artefacts and locking things up in museums for people to stroke their chins over. The very

opposite of traditionalism, punk was a deeply DIY movement that anyone, anywhere – my 16-yearold mum in the wilds of Norfolk included – could join. "What was great about punk rock was that you didn't need any clothes – all you needed was a packet of safety pins," explained Corré.

When it comes down to it, Corré wasn't burning the Magna Carta, just some bits and bobs of merchandise - highly valuable merchandise, but merchandise nonetheless. Of course, we'll never know what McClaren would have made of it all, having passed away in 2010, but Corré certainly had the blessing of his mother, who was present at the burning and used it as a platform to speak passionately about climate change.

But let's not forget that the greatest thing about punk, the filth and the fury aside, can never and will never be burnt. The music of the Pistols, The Clash, Siouxsie And The Banshees, Crass, The Damned, X-Ray Spex, The Slits, The Vibrators and all the bands they inspired isn't going anywhere, no matter what stunts Corré pulls.



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






















COOKING LAGER

#### "So, like, you just wanna f\*\*kin'...

I'VE ARRIVED FOR MY MIDafternoon appointment at the secluded
mansion of Canadian dance-music
superstar Joel 'deadmau5' Zimmerman,
and he is not pleased to see me. Not
only is he wildly unenthusiastic about
being interviewed, he apparently finds
the very concept deeply unsavoury.
"So do you do this a lot?" he grimaces,
baffled, as if my line of work falls
somewhere between sex pest and
puppy abuser. He's walking away
now; I gingerly follow him in. "This is
something you do regularly? So what,
you need to follow me around, or...?"

Well, we could do that, I offer, or we could sit and talk for a bit?

"A 'bit'?"

Well, y'know, for 20 minutes, for a couple of hours – whatever you want, Joel.

"Well, I don't want to do this at all," he scowls, turning to reveal a truly pained expression. "OK, well..." – shrug, eye-roll, exasperated sigh – "let's f\*\*kin' sit down then, I guess."

Oh-kaaay.

I was, of course, braced for this. deadmau5's fearsome way with journalists is the stuff of legend – the few interviews he does give usually crash and burn inside 60 seconds. But Zimmerman's infamous ire isn't reserved solely for the media: his 15 million social media followers are regularly entertained by his bruising online clashes with the likes of Madonna, Kanye West, Skrillex, David Guetta, Arcade Fire and Justin Bieber. Fan of beef? Nobody cooks it better than Zimmerman.

"I guess I rub people the wrong way," he sighs, blessedly unclenching a little as he leads me into his cavernous living room. Situated an hour outside of Toronto in bleakly beautiful woodland, his \$5m mansion is filled with exactly the kind of kooky artefacts you'd expect of a rave kid made good: a pickled human brain, a full-sized Alien Xenomorph, a gigantic Puma Clyde shoe, a stuffed two-headed calf (real, apparently), a stuffed three-headed duckling (also real), a stuffed moose (named 'deadmoo5', obvs)... The Aphex Twin tracks bleeding in from the next room add to the air of surreality.

"All this Twitter beef s\*\*t, it's just funny – to me, anyway," he shrugs, lighting the first cigarette in a two-hour chain. "I love the predictability of it: a celebrity says

something dumb at me, then this happens, then this plays out like that, then it's all forgotten the next day – then the *next* dumb thing happens. That's why I'm never like, 'Oh man, this is really hurting my career.' Like, it's not. I mean, it's not exactly *helping* it either..."

He grabs his phone. "But watch: I'll tweet 'BRB drowning a bag of kittens @peta' right now – and see who gives a s\*\*t in three days." He does just that – likes, RTs and 'That's not funny' responses flood in within seconds.

immerman delights in idly tapping his finger on his career's self-destruct button. The first electronic artist to grace the cover of *Rolling Stone*, he became a figurehead for the EDM scene before ferociously turning on it, unleashing scathing – and not unfounded – attacks on what he came to view as an egoravaged, greed-crazed and creatively moribund movement.

Even deadmau5 himself isn't safe from the eviscerating judgement of deadmau5. When I tell him I enjoyed his new album, 'W:/2016ALBUM/' (named after the desktop folder he kept the album files in), he responds with a confused, "Huh. Really?" I like it, yeah. Does he not like it? "I dunno. I guess. It's just the culmination of three years of s\*\*t lying around on a hard drive."

Zimmerman's not affecting a shrugging, punk-rock attitude here – he really does regard his own output semi-disdainfully. Interactions with producers that he admires, such as Nine Inch Nails' Trent Reznor or Venetian Snares' Aaron Funk, invariably leave him racked with insecurity. "It's hard to talk to people that I respect like that because I don't even respect my s\*\*t, so

how are they gonna, y'know [laughs]?" This gnawing self-doubt is something he's learning to deal with. "I'd say there are 10,000 people within this field who do s\*\*t way better than I do, but then there are six billion people on the planet who don't, y'know what I mean? So you try to not get stuck in your own s\*\*t too much. Some stuff I put out I'm pretty proud of, and some of it is just... work."

Well, if he's unwilling to big up his eighth album, I'll do it for him. A judicious side-step away from the plasticky insta-rush of EDM, it finds Zimmerman rebuilding his sound around the huge collection of classic and rare synths he's lovingly assembled in his new studio. If Stranger Things had you swooning to VHS-era analogue melodies, 'W:/2016ALBUM/' will have you dancing to them.

"It's so easy to load up the latest sounds that every big track is using," says Zimmerman, explaining his shift over to 20th-century technology. "That s\*\*t is marketable and it'll do well, but it won't impress the people who know. So I make music for my peers more than my fans. If I made music for my fans I'd still be writing s\*\*t like [2008 anthem] 'Faxing Berlin'. I'll definitely get some fans being like [moany voice], 'Man, deadmau5 used to be good, now he sucks' but it's like, no, I've done that sound and I've moved on. I do this now. You can keep rinsing the same thing but it'll only get you so far, and you'll eventually get knocked back into obscurity by some guy who comes along and does it better than you."

'W:/2016ALBUM/' is the first album Zimmerman has released through his own label, mau5trap, having bought his way out of his contract with EMI for a rumoured seven-figure sum. "I had to

experiment with the majors to really understand just how much they suck. But now I have a great team in place, s\*\*t actually gets done, and it's like, why the f\*\*k was I with EMI again? What did they ever do for me?


"Maybe the whole major label thing works for some guys who are like, 'Just put the music out and give us whatever you're gonna give us.' Ignorance is bliss, right? But it's not just a monetary thing, it's also about control of your own creative vision. If it was all about money I'd quit this s\*\*t in a second and go into f\*\*kin' commercial real estate."

'Let Go', the first single from 'W:/2016ALBUM/', features vocals from unsigned unknown Grabbitz, who got the gig after tweeting Zimmerman a link to his bootleg reworking of the deadmau5 track 'Silent Picture'. Zimmerman is well aware that his tracks could be even more successful if he went the Sigma/ Guetta/Harris route and roped in A-list vocalists – and it's a temptation he admits to having entertained.

"With my previous record deal, it'd be like, 'OK, so I have this track then, EMI – do you know any singers, maybe? Do you have any singers on your little label there?' And funnily enough, they didn't." Eye roll. "But I prefer finding unknown singers myself anyway. I have this whole dictatorship vibe going here and I don't want to be dealing with someone's manager.

"I don't mind splitting publishing 50/50 – I do it with Ryan [Raddon, AKA Kaskade – a frequent collaborator] sometimes, because we split the workload 50/50. But say Rihanna, for example – and bless her, amazing singer – but she's in the studio for two, three hours, hums some s\*\*t out and then she wants 75 per cent of the f\*\*king publishing? Are you off your f\*\*kin' tits?"

immerman can afford to take frequent, gleeful risks with his career because his fanbase is not only enormous, it's also the most rabidly loyal in all of dance music. It's a loyalty he's earned through years of



#### 'FAXING BERLIN'

Eight minutes and 41 seconds of rolling bliss, deadmau5's breakthrough track was released to little fanfare in 2006 but received a huge boost when Radio 1's Pete Tong began championing it the following year. By 2009 it was inescapable.

#### THE CUBE (2010)

Designed by deadmau5 himself, the Cube was a stage platform with cutting-edge LED surfaces. Upon its debut the crowd couldn't believe what they were seeing – so, job done. The Cube v2 – over twice the size of the original – debuted in August 2016.

#### ROLLING STONE (2012)

Rolling Stone chose deadmau5 to act as EDM's ambassador, making him the first electronic artist to ever grace the esteemed magazine's cover.

Tidal itself may have floundered, but its star-studded launch broke the internet – and anyone still unfamiliar with deadmau5 was left asking, "Who is that mouse-headed guy stood between Madonna and Kanye...?"

tireless, down-to-earth interactions across Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter and Twitch. He's a one-man online reality show, so open about his creative processes that he streamed the entire making of 'W:/2016ALBUM/', from earliest jams to final mixdowns. (In the process, of course, he leaked the entire album, to his own cackling amusement and his manager's head-in-hands horror.)

The obsessive adoration he's cultivated has come with downsides. however. "I'm at about the maximum level of weirdness I can handle," he grimaces. "I do get freaked out sometimes. I have kids hop my fence, get into my back yard and just start screaming at me. I get chicks on Instagram saying that I raped them and that they're calling their lawyer. I do all my own s\*\*t - Snapchat, Instagram, Twitter - and I see everything, every weird private message from every random psycho. I'm not shielded from anything. I get messages from dudes saying, 'I'm gonna kill you at the show!' And I'm like, 'Well, f\*\*k - this could be it.'

"Look at Dimebag Darrell," he says, referring to the ex-Pantera guitarist, murdered onstage by an obsessive fan in 2004. "I'm probably at about the same level of fame as him, and there are always gonna be one or two crazies around, so some shows I'm just thinking, 'F\*\*k.' And the security sucks, it's never good. Those guys are just on their phone, not watching anything, and even if you're f\*\*kin' Super Hawkeye McGee, what are you gonna do, hit him with your flashlight? He's gonna shoot you in the face too." A gallows-humour cackle; another cigarette gets lit.

"I nearly killed a kid once," he continues, throwing his lighter back onto the coffee table. "I've never told this story. So I'm playing live, up in the Cube [his custom-made, raised onstage booth]. I've got this LED helmet on, I'm six foot in the air, I can barely see. All of a sudden I hear my manager screaming in my earpiece, and I feel someone grabbing at my waist. This kid has somehow climbed up into the Cube. I just panic. I kick back at him, and he just drops and lands on his back - bang. And he's motionless. I take off my helmet and look down, and for what felt like a looong time I'm like, 'I just paralysed or killed that kid.' Then finally he bounces up and is all 'Wooo!' at the crowd. Never been so relieved in my life. Scary.

"But it's like, what were you planning to do, dude? Take over the show for me? Go for it, I get paid either way. Do what you gotta do, ruin the show."

Describing himself as "very socially f\*\*king retarded" with a "huge anxiety disorder", Zimmerman is clearly happiest when the world leaves him the hell alone. "I haven't left this house in two weeks," he says, beaming like

a man living the dream. "I'm lucky. I only have to live out here with one other person [his girlfriend, Kelly]. Going out and being nice to the world at large doesn't make me feel good so I replace that with things, with technology that does get me excited and does get my brain spinning until one day it stops spinning and then you can bury me." He dabbled in the party-hopping A-lister lifestyle, even relocating LA for a while, but it clearly wasn't for him. "I've seen so many weird things that have unsettled me," he mutters, hauntedly.

he mouse helmet, the reclusiveness, the cartoonish anti-social attitude, the embrace of social media's synthetic intimacy - it all keeps the world at arm's length and allows him to avoid having to deal with industry shysters or weirdo superfans or nosy goddamn journalists. Saying that, I feel like we're almost getting on, so I ask him how he'd like to see himself portrayed in this piece.

"F\*\*k, I don't care!" he laughs. "I don't read any of this s\*\*t. Don't read NME, Billboard, any of 'em. I mean I guess if you're interested in me then s\*\*t like this might be cool, but... Like, I'm a huge fan of Radiohead, but I could care f\*\*king less about Thom Yorke's inner thoughts. I read something on him when 'King Of Limbs' came out, and it kinda ruined Radiohead for me. I was like, 'Wait, 'Codex' is about suicide? Oh man, this guy's really bummed out!' So really, who cares?

"I'm kinda s\*\*tting all over this interview, huh?'




#### THOM YORKE

"I did this job for *Mojo* with one of my heroes [legendary rock writer and former *NME* staffer], Nick Kent. The shoot was in Amsterdam around the [2006 solo album] 'Eraser' period. Thom brought the trench coat and I fashioned the lighting to be a little bit noir. This was showing a different side of Thom – a more constructed visual. It's got a bit of a *Clockwork Orange* feel to it, a sense of foreboding that I don't think a lot of people had seen from him before."



#### **COLDPLAY**

"Coldplay were touring 'Parachutes' and 'A Rush Of Blood To The Head' and were trying to win over an American audience. The show wasn't the Vegas spectacle it is now – it was all about presenting the songs. I was with them for four years and it got pretty intense. They were starting to be ferried around in private jets. It was surprising how quickly they took off in the US. I'd seen British bands like The Beatles blow up over there and it hadn't happened for quite a while."



#### THE WHITE STRIPES


"This was around 2002 and it was their first cover shoot. They were both in a great mood. We shot in an empty garage in Camden. I didn't ask them to do that pose, it was just a spontaneous moment. You can see all sorts of things going on in that photo – they're kind of giggling at each other and thinking, 'Wow, this is a cool moment for us.' We had no idea what their relationship was. Were they married? Were they brother and sister? Were they aliens? Who f\*\*king knew?"



#### **DAVID BOWIE**

"I spent 10 years working with Trent Reznor from Nine Inch Nails. In 1993/94 he toured with Bowie, and I was told not to photograph Bowie – 'Don't talk to him, don't go around him.' I went, 'F\*\*k it, I'm gonna do it anyway.' That shot was pure luck. It was the 'Tin Machine' era. Bowie wasn't popular at this time and he was searching for people who could restore his appeal. It worked perfectly for him and Trent. I think that's why they got on so well. I went to a few of the parties, but Bowie was always off limits. I'd loved to have talked to him about string theory or something."



#### **PEARL JAM**


"This was taken in 1992 at Lollapalooza. It was a really cold, s\*\*tty summer day, raining... everything you expect from the North West. It was in Bremerton, a naval city across from Seattle. Everything was kicking off with grunge. The fact that it was getting so much attention was big news for Seattle. Eddie Vedder wasn't from Seattle, he was from California, so Pearl Jam got a lot of stick. There was also some bitterness in the Seattle rock community because not everyone got taken along for the ride. This moment was just total luck and the picture ended up being a poster."

#### **PAUL WELLER**

"This was the first time I worked with Weller and it was for an NME cover. He was a super-nice guy. He just showed up on his own, confirming everything I loved about Weller – I was in awe of his coolness. We did this on the roof of the studio. The colours work really well but it was only by chance that he had that yellow shirt on to contrast with the sky. If you tried to get him to change what he was wearing, he'd say, 'I'm a mod, mate. Once a mod, always a mod."




#### **BJÖRK**

"I'd photographed her two years before this and she'd since become Björk the icon. She'd been stalked in Miami [the guy later filmed himself committing suicide]. We shot it in a hotel room in New York. I wanted to take pictures of her and put them on TV so she was watching herself. It was a stalker-type story which – surprisingly – she agreed to. It captures the last time I saw her as innocent and all the things we remember about Björk from the beginning."



#### **PJ HARVEY**

"Like Paul Weller, Polly showed up on her own. She was so cool, so kind. I think she's the greatest singer to ever come out of the UK. I wanted to represent her in a moodier way than she had been before. We gave her the full fashion treatment – she brought her own dresses and her own make-up and I kept the lighting soft. I always had a lot time for Polly so I wanted her to look as good as possible. This was a softer side to her – a bit of a fantasy version."



#### KINGS OF LEON

"This was the first time Kings Of Leon had been on the cover of *NME*. This is how we remember them – a new breed of hillbilly rock. We took them to Richmond Park in London because I wanted it to have this landscape feel to reflect where they're from. There was lots of alcohol going down. It was pretty chaotic – getting them to do stuff was pretty difficult. It was like, "Wait, you guys are just starting out! What's it gonna be like in another 10 years?"





On 'Rockin' he's on Adderall and spurning a clingy girl. On 'Ordinary Life' he gets wistful midway through a 45mph

blow-job: "I can feel her teeth when I drive on a bump...she don't know what I've done".

On Lana Del Rey co-write 'Party Monster', the hook is a little hackneyed ("Woke up by a girl, I don't even know her name") but it still does its earworming job perfectly.

The best thing on here is the juddering 'Secrets' – where a jealous Tesfaye lowers his voice to reprimand a lying girlfriend – but more focus will inevitably go to the collaborations. Del Rey herself pipes up on 'Stargirl Interlude', a deceptively delicate ditty set in a kitchen. On 'Sidewalks' Kendrick Lamar

delivers a typically killer verse over what sounds like one of Jonny Greenwood's Radiohead guitar lines. Then there are the two Daft Punk features that bookend the album: opener 'Starboy' is a moody acknowledgement of his celebrity, while closer 'I Feel It Coming' is a beauty, on which Tesfaye's trembling vocal unmistakeably echoes Michael Jackson's. Unfortunately, Daft Punk mar their subtle.

the obvious 2016 one: length. Streaming charts favour albums with more songs, like Drake's 80-minute 'Views'. At 18 tracks and 68 minutes, it's impossible not to see 'Starboy' aiming for those algorithms.

Deep into the album it becomes a slog, with too much banal, forgettable fluff like 'Attention', 'Nothing Without You' and 'Die For You' (this honestly goes, "I would die for you / I would lie for you"). ### The poet's way



AS A LONG-TIME RESIDENT of the city, it's no surprise that Peter Doherty's second solo album has a thing or two to say about last November's terrorist attacks in Paris, nor is what he has to say about them all that surprising. "Come on boys, you gotta choose your weapons -J-45 or AK-47," he sings on 'Hell To Pay At The Gates Of Heaven', decrying a generation who've chosen guns over guitars by harking back to ye olde Arcadian ideals of what follows when "faith in love and music" is lost. Like most of his proclamations, it's a poetic way of seeing the world, not a practical one: you don't look to Doherty for insight into how we live now, but reveries of how we might have lived in a mythological then.

The path of the J-45 hasn't always been a barrel of laughs for him either, but with 'Hamburg Demonstrations' - his third album in four years, and his first solo outing since 2009's 'Grace/ Wastelands' - Doherty is finally beginning to show an aptitude for staying on it. Recorded in Hamburg with producer Johann Scheerer, these songs find him exploring familiar themes - addiction and ruin on his heartfelt Amy Winehouse tribute 'Flags From The Old Regime', the "sickness of celebrity" on 'Birdcage', even a relic of his pre-Libertines years in the shape of the elegiac 'She Is Far' - with a wholly unfamiliar clarity of purpose and sound. Gone are the half-formed dirges slurred from the side of his mouth; in comes Scheerer's uncluttered production and some of the prettiest, best-realised songs of Doherty's career.

That's no overstatement, by the way: 'Kolly Kibber' and 'Oily Boker' – the former featuring a mid-song segue into dreamy Lee Hazlewood territory, the latter a whimsical mini-epic that somehow manages to stick the landing – are up there with anything he's written since the second Libertines album.

There's much more to 'Hamburg Demonstrations' than rose-tinted nostalgia for your misspent early-noughties youth; as he approaches 40, it sounds like a long-overdue coming-ofage. It's never been easy being a fan of Doherty, but it's certainly getting more rewarding.

# Mars attacks!

Half an hour of party tunes that sound like the best bits of '90s R&B

BRUNO MARS
24K Magic



IN A YEAR WHEN fellow superstars Drake and Kanye West have released sprawling, overlong albums and Beyoncé

accompanied hers with a 60-minute film, this record's brevity feels refreshing. '24K Magic' features just nine songs and a fat-free 33-minute running time. There's not even a deluxe edition with extra tracks.

Keeping his third album short is also ballsy. After all, Bruno Mars isn't just trying to match 2010's 'Doo-Wops & Hooligans' and 2012's 'Unorthodox Jukebox' – both multi-platinum chart-toppers – but also globe-conquering Mark Ronson collaboration 'Uptown Funk'. But instead of pogoing from genre to genre in pursuit of hits, Mars has crafted something compact and cohesive that feels like a proper album.

Although the title track's exuberant electro-funk apes 'Uptown Funk', the album is mainly a tribute to early '90s R&B. "Those '90s songs are what I was singing to get the girls in school, the songs that the girls like, what we were dancing to as children," Mars told *NME* recently, and his affection for this music is palpable. 'That's What I Like' has Boyz II Men-style

finger-snaps; 'Versace On The Floor' could soundtrack a prom scene in a '90s high-school movie; and 'Finesse' is a pitch-perfect pastiche of the new jack swing sound that recalls Michael Jackson's 1992 hit 'Remember The Time'.

But though '24K Magic'

is a total throwback, it's one that reels you in with slinky finishing touches like the unexpected "straight up" vocal hooks of 'Straight Up

& Down' and a cute Halle
Berry cameo on 'Calling On
My Lovelies'. It's less easy to
justify some of Mars' lyrics.
When he sizes up a woman's
body on 'Chunky' ("32-27-42 /
Squeeze all of that into my
coupé"), he doesn't sound
retro, he just sounds oldfashioned. He's better off
being kitsch than creepy.
"I'll rent a beach house in
Miami / Wake up with no
jammies," he winks playfully
on 'That's What I Like'.

In spite of these misgivings, it's hard to stay mad at '24K Magic' for long. Few albums designed to sound like a party actually play like one, but Bruno Mars has pulled it off with style. **Nick Levine**

At this point, it's barely a discussion worth having – experience tells us the Stones will keep rolling, while the laws of nature beg to differ; we'll see who blinks first. Yet 'Blue &

Lonesome' – their first fulllength since 2005's 'A Bigger Bang' – almost seems to invite such speculation: what better way for a half-century-old musical institution to bring things full circle than an album of Chicago blues standards harking back to their earliest days?


More likely than not, of course, 'Blue & Lonesome' is just a product of convenient scheduling and a desire to strike while the iron was hot.

These 12 tracks were recorded across three rapid-fire days during the downtime between tours, and sound less like a swansong than four old friends having an obscene amount of fun. The result is an album made for the sheer hell of it, devoid of frills, but not wanting for thrills.


You'd expect Keith Richards and Ron Wood to be in their element, and you can picture their Cheshire Cat grins as they trade licks with Eric Clapton on Little Johnny Taylor's 'Everybody Knows About My Good Thing'

and Willie Dixon's 'I Can't Quit You Baby'. Yet it's Mick Jagger who elevates things above an all-star septuagenarian garagejam, honking away furiously on Little Walter's 'I Gotta Go' (it's easy to forget what a wonderful harmonica player he is) and wringing every ounce of sexual frustration from the Memphis Slim-written title track. For a skinny bloke from Dartford, he was always blessed with a great voice for the blues; when he's not jazz-handing and Jaggercising around a stage at the same time, he's very much still got it.

As indeed do the Stones themselves. They've occasionally been guilty of embracing musical fads to reassert their relevance: it's partly why they've endured for so long, though it's also why records like 'Undercover' and 'Dirty Work' exist. By going back to the music that producer Don Was calls the "fountainhead of everything they do", however, they sound younger than they have in decades, 'Blue & Lonesome' is proof that old dogs don't always have need of new tricks. A boxing film that's kinda clichéd, but has a knockout ending

**BLEED FOR THIS** 15 Miles Teller, Aaron Eckhart, Katey Sagal BOXING BIOPIC COMEBACK

IT'S HARD TO GET TOO excited about another boxing movie after last year's Southpaw, which featured a knockout performance from Jake Gyllenhaal, and this year's endearing Rocky sequel Creed. But because Bleed For This is based on the genuinely remarkable career of '80s and '90s Italian-American champion Vinny 'The Pazmanian

When we meet Pazienza (Whiplash's Miles Teller), he's already a fading fighter on the comeback trail. After teaming up with Mike Tyson's former trainer Kevin Rooney (The Dark Knight's Aaron Eckhart), who also needs a career boost after an embarrassing DUI conviction, Pazienza beats the odds to claim another world title. Yet before he has time to bask in victory, Pazienza is involved in a gut-wrenching car crash in which his neck is broken and doctors tell him he'll never box again. Desperate and defiant, Pazienza secretly begins a training regime while he's still constrained by a halo, a brutal-looking circular metal device screwed into his skull in four places.

Writer-director Ben Younger (Prime) tells Pazienza's story efficiently but without depth.

A scene in which Pazienza has his halo screws literally twisted out of his skull after refusing anaesthetic shows the boxer's force of will, but elsewhere there's little attempt to get inside his psyche. "This is what I do." he responds nonchalantly when his motivations are questioned.

Bleed For This has some neat period details like a strip club scene set to George Michael's '80s hit 'Monkey', but its depiction of a working-class Italian-American family who squabble over spaghetti feels two-dimensional. Potentially interesting supporting characters like Pazienza's conflicted father (Game Of Thrones' Ciarán Hinds) and devoted Catholic mother (Sons Of Anarchy's Katey Sagal) are disappointingly thinly drawn.

Because of Teller's compelling performance and chemistry with Eckhart, it's hard not to be roused by the film's triumphant finale, but it never transcends the clichés of its genre. It's an often gripping film, but never very insightful. Nick Levine





the US elected a president who tried to appeal to African-American voters by telling them, "What the hell do you have to lose?", Chi-Raq is a bold, provocative and topical blast. It takes its title from a controversial nickname for Chicago that references the city's high levels of gang violence, especially on the predominantly African-American south side.

When a trailer showcasing the film's humorous moments was released last year, director Spike Lee felt compelled to state: "Chi-Raq is not a comedy, Chi-Raq is a satire." To be precise, it's a thrillingly ambitious musical satire based on

Chase & Status collaborator is breaking out with solo material

ALL IT TOOK WAS A tipple at a house party for Bedford-born Tom Grennan to have a little sing-song and discover his outstanding voice. Now he's teamed up with Chase & Status for their latest single, and his first solo EP 'Something In The Water' is a startling introduction. For him, everything's going "sick".

How did you discover your incredible voice?

"I got p" sed up for the first time at a party and just started singing, I remember going back to school and my friends were like, "Do you wanna join a band?" I said, "F" k off. Ended up doing it, and loved it," You're a big Arctic Monkeys fan, aren't you?

"At the beginning we were doing a lot of Arctic Monkeys covers. So I was replicating them a little bit. I used to have this northern twang in my voice — I was like. I'm not even northern, mate: Alex Turner is one of my heroes—his lyrics are genius. His dressing room was next to mine at a festival recently and he walked out like he was Elvis or something."

You've started writing your own songs now, but your dyslexia can be a challenge. How do you find a way around it?

"Basically, how I write now is that mentally I put stuff on a washing line. I just hang it all up and pick different parts in my head. So then I pick odd socks, lyrics-wise, and I put an odd sock to an odd sock and think, "How can I make that a pair of pearly whites?" It's weird."

What did you learn from working with Chase & Status on 'All Goes Wrong'?

"To not rush and just to be calm with a song and calm with the process. When I went in there I was thinking, "I've got to take a tune with me." But we got to it and let it happen naturally. That's the beauty of a song, the spontaneity of it, and I love that."

Musically, your first EP is pretty raw, Where do you go from here?

"The EP is raw and real; it's an introduction to the world really, basically saying. I'm Tom, I'm going to do bigger than this, but this is me right now. I just want to make an epic sound, like an orchestral sound. Violins, cellos trumpets, saxophones, all that kind of stuff – just epic."


