

Getting my first 'Now' album was a religious experience

MUCH LIKE YOUR FIRST kiss, your first gig or your first moment of public humiliation, you never forget your first 'Now That's What I Call Music!' compilation. In fact if you're lucky enough, maybe all four of them are combined in one extreme moment of lust, public nudity and pop magic. The long-running chart compilation released its 95th instalment last month, and despite the fact that CD sales have been slipping into oblivion for the past decade, the 'Now' market remains as strong as Donald Trump's toupee glue. The latest CD sold a humongous 230,000 copies in its first week, and over the years it's shifted over 100 million copies across the world.

The series launched back in 1983 and in 1992 I got my hands on my first 'Now', picked up from the long-since-gone Wood Green branch of Our Price.

Released just before Christmas, it was 'Now 23', a double cassette packed full of 39 bona fide bangers. It kicked off with one hit wonder Tasmin Archer's one very good hit, 'Sleeping Satellite', before offering up Billy Ray Cyrus's sanitised version of country in 'Achy Breaky Heart', The Shamen's not-very-subtleat-all drugs ode 'Ebeneezer Goode', East 17's ravey 'House Of Love' and the Euro-dance themes to computer games Tetris and Super Mario Land. There was also some ABBA, and for some reason ABBA tribute band Björn Again, Enya, Bob Marley, INXS and Roy Orbison.


Pop, reggae and psychedelic techno: early 1990s music was a beautiful thing indeed.

From the moment I had the chubby plastic casing in my hand, I was addicted. The next instalment came four months later, boasting perhaps the most beautiful of all the outrageously lurid 'Now' artworks; purple lettering floating in a violet-shaded gathering of clouds. The content was just as majestic.

Shabba Ranks, 2 Unlimited, Shaggy – and yes, yet more East 17. You can never have too much East 17.

In 2016, 'Now''s stronghold over the

British imagination is as potent as ever, offering an easy, tried-and-tested answer to that eternal question of 'What shall I listen to today?' without the faff of endless streaming of playlists with increasingly niche song selections. Instead, 'Now' does what it always has, offering up a shameless selection of chart hits, from Drake and Little Mix to Christine And The Queens. Pop has never been known for its staying power, but the compilation's 33 years at the top lets its makers boss the charts in the same way David Attenborough does the natural world. Now that's what we call impressive. @leoniemaycooper

Skepta For taking grime to the top of the charts

WHO Tottenham-raised grime icon

WHY Grime's storming comeback was the big British music story of 2016, and scene veteran Skepta was the face and focal point of that resurrection. Skepta started the year by signing Drake to his Boy Better Know imprint - a deal Drake sealed by getting tattooed with the BBK logo. He then took his own career next-level with the release of his much-hyped, much-delayed fourth album, the mighty 'Konnichiwa'. Generating the biggest buzz around a grime release since Dizzee Rascal's 'Boy In Da Corner' back in 2003, 'Konnichiwa' built up enough forward momentum to bag the Mercury Prize in September. It crowned a glorious year for both Skepta and the scene that he'd helped to bring back from the dead.

WHAT HE SAYS "My album came out in May. I was on a flight to Toronto the next day to play a show and they knew all the words to the new songs. The next day! You think when I was a kid I ever thought that would happen?"

WHO Star of blockbusters *Suicide Squad* and *The Legend Of Tarzan*

WHY This was the year Margot Robbie capitalised on the 'next big thing' heat she gained from 2013's The Wolf Of Wall Street. As grade-A nutjob Harley Quinn in Suicide Squad and Jane in The Legend Of Tarzan, she leapt from unknown supporting actress to female lead in two of the most high-profile films of the year. A 24-carat movie star, at ease with comedy, action and drama, Robbie was superb in each, playing good-hearted heroine and black-souled villain with equal magnetism, and proving that a female character can steal the show in the male-dominated world of superhero movies.

And what really made Robbie stand out this year, aside from the work, was her willingness to call out the sexism that goes with being a newly minted female star. When a *Vanity Fair* cover story kept harping on about how "beautiful" and "sexy" she is, as well as knocking her home country Australia, she ripped it for being "really weird" and "insulting". When you're still on the ascent, that's brave.

Girls Against

For fighting sexual assault one gig at a time

WHO Ava Cadenhead, Anna Cowan, Anni Cameron, Bea Bennister and Hannah Camilleri – a gang of fierce-asf**k teens who joined forces to eliminate sexual harassment at live music venues

WHY Girls Against got together at the end of 2015 as a response to being groped while in the crowd at gigs. They were angry, and rightfully so, intent on calling out the perpetrators and bringing an end to everyday sexual assault.

They've spent the past year and a bit fighting misogyny in the mosh pit, and the likes of The 1975, Wolf Alice, Slaves, The Vaccines, Hinds and Frank Turner have all done their bit to offer support and help spread their message.

Meanwhile, Girls Against have recruited 80 grassroots reps to raise awareness and make sure people know that touching someone up – or worse – in the crowd at a concert simply isn't OK.

WHAT THEY SAY "When you go out onto a busy and crowded street, you don't expect to be sexually assaulted, so why expect it when you're at a gig? Sexual assault is illegal and should be treated as such" – Anna

WHAT PEOPLE SAY ABOUT THEM

"Putting your hands all over any woman without her permission is not on at any sort of concert. Going as far as putting your hand up her skirt, forcing her to leave the venue and go home, ruining her night, is disgusting. Please go and follow Girls Against on Twitter to fight this kind of behaviour" – Slaves

So popular it spawned headlines about thieves luring hapless players to shady locations, people walking into ponds while playing it, and conspiracy theories about it being a new form of government surveillance.

The technology behind it wasn't new, but Pokémon Go was the first game to deliver an augmented reality experience that captured the public imagination, tapping into both a millennial nostalgia for the beloved Nintendo franchise and a universally appealing sense that the real world is more magical than you thought. Your local area might still be s**t, but now it has magical creatures living in it. Are we still playing? Hell no. But it was fun for a while.


WHY Riz Ahmed's year of glory didn't come out of nowhere: he's been ramping up to this for a while now, solidifying his rep through intense, darkly comic performances in the likes of Charlie Brooker's Dead Set (2008), Chris Morris's Four Lions (2010) and the jet-black Jake Gyllenhaal vehicle Nightcrawler (2014). His reward was a triptych of breakthrough roles for 2016, in Jason Bourne, Rogue One: A Star Wars Story and HBO's The Night Of, which earned Ahmed universal acclaim for his nuanced, heartbreaking portrayal of hapless protagonist Naz (plus he totally pulled off a legit Queens accent). Musically, too, Ahmed hit new heights, teaming with NY rapper Heems - ex of Das Racist - to form Swet Shop Boys, whose 'Cashmere' album was a killer cross-pollination of heavy AF beats, South Asian samples and righteous, timely polemic. Double win.

The year might have been something of a rollercoaster ride for Kanye, but the highs were skyscrapingly good. With 'The Life Of Pablo' he offered up arguably his finest ever collection of work; an ever-evolving, star-studded release that pushed the boundaries of mainstream hip-hop further than ever before and confirmed his status as one of music's most vital voices. The provocative 10-minute 'Famous' video earned the admiration of film legend Werner Herzog and also the shock of a public he'd played like a fiddle.

The epic, 20-track masterpiece also gave rise to his jaw-dropping 'Saint Pablo' tour, a feat of engineering and entertainment, with West performing on top of a moving platform suspended above the crowd amid a light show worthy of an alien landing. The tour reached 41 dizzying performances before its key player was hospitalised in November for "temporary psychosis due to sleep deprivation and dehydration". An intense year, then, and one with a fittingly intense ending.

WHY Just a few short years ago, Héloïse Letissier was lost and unsure of her place in the world. In 2016, she basically conquered it. The rise of Christine And The Queens was as atypical as it was irresistible – we Brits have historically given short shrift to French pop stars, and there was a delicious irony in her breakthrough Glastonbury performance coming mere hours after the Brexit vote was tallied – but no one who listened to

her re-recorded debut album, or caught one of her extraordinary live shows, could fail to be converted. In writing about subjects like queerness and gender identity from a perennial outsiders' perspective, she struck a strangely universal chord - who couldn't root for, or relate to, a ferociously talented young woman celebrating her own individuality? While politicians sought to drive wedges between us, she preached a doctrine of acceptance and inclusivity, of otherness being a virtue. She was the pop star we needed, but scarcely deserved. Long may she reign.

Waller-Bridge's Fleabag - a character based on a one-woman show that had impressed 2013 Edinburgh Festival crowds with its no-holds-barred depiction of female sexuality - was kind of a d**k. A self-centred, w**k-happy woman with limited drive, a failing small business and a family in ruins, her lifestyle tiptoed around the edges of urban hipsterdom, but also deep, dark loss. It might sound depressing, but its caustic humour and downright filthiness made it unmissable.



David Bowie

WHO The glue that held reality together

WHY For more than 40 years, David Bowie has helped us to make sense of life. In 2016, he taught us how to face death – on his own terms, without fear, compromise or sentimentality, in a last, remarkable rush of creativity. Knowing that the end was near, most of us would likely have spent our final months at home in the company of our families; instead, he was busy labouring away on a new album, choosing to confront his own mortality rather than meekly capitulating to it. Cancer may have killed Bowie, but it never defeated him. If anything, it seemed to embolden him.

When icons die, they generally leave a void, a sense of something left unfinished. Had Bowie passed before embarking on the late-career renaissance that began with 2013's 'The Next Day', that's almost certainly what would have happened. In the end, however, his death felt like a completion: 'Blackstar' hit shelves on Friday, and by Monday its author was gone, his work accomplished, just as the video for 'Lazarus' had not-so-subtly hinted. The shock and grief quickly reverberated all over the world, yet at the same time you couldn't help but admire how he'd handled it: for Bowie, death was simply another muse, another performance, and certainly nothing to be afraid of.

AVENGED SEVENFOLD

The Stage





AVENGED SEVENFOLD really divide rock fans. One camp berates them as style-over-substance guyliner-wearing pussies. The other side rates their constant reinvention and epic live shows – even in the face of adversity.

And things have been really crap for Avenged. In 2009 their beloved founding member Jimmy 'The Rev' Sullivan was found dead from an accidental overdose. A year later they

released 'Nightmare', which blended their early metalcore sound with their softer hard-rock guise and was the ultimate tribute album to a fallen friend. But they followed it with 'Hail To The King' in 2013, which was hugely derivative of Metallica and Iron Maiden and sounded like they'd lost their way.

That's why 'The Stage' is so pivotal for this band - it's the difference between keeping their festival headline slots or slowly slipping into oblivion. Things started well in October when they dropped the title track and first single which, with its spooky organ and soaring quitars, was compelling to the end of its eight minutes. The rest of the record doesn't flounder. 'Paradigm' is more lyrically sophisticated than they've been before as they imagine an Al world run by robots, while 'God Damn' is all thrasshy double drum kicks and sleaze-rock choruses. Producer Joe Barresi (Queens Of The Stone Age, The Melvins) seems to be the perfect fit, even if he's managed to make M. Shadows' usually explosive

vocals sound thin and nasal, most noticeable on ballads 'Angels' and 'Roman Sky'.

Avenged have uncharacteristically thrown everything up in the air with this record - from recruiting former Bad Religion drummer Brooks Wackerman to streaming an ambitious 360 degree/3D/virtual reality gig via mysterious 'deathbats' (the bands logo) appearing on key landmarks across the globe. As the album's swan song 'Exist' closes with a monologue from astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson, it's evident chapter where they appreciate rather than become their

THE PASS

THIS SPIRITED BRITISH film tackles a topical issue that could be a ticking time-bomb. Although LGBT rights have made great strides in recent years, most notably with the introduction of same-sex marriage in most parts of the UK, the same progress hasn't

filtered through to the world of professional football. Incredibly, there are currently no openly gay players competing in any of England's top four divisions. Former Manchester City midfielder Joey Barton, a spokesperson for LGBT charity Stonewall's Rainbow Laces campaign, has said they're "as rare as hen's teeth".

Adapted by John Donnelly from his own acclaimed stage play, The Pass is a sensitive story about repressed sexuality that takes place in three acts. The first chronicles an awkward sexual encounter between ostensibly heterosexual young footballers Jason (The History Boys' Russell Tovey) and Ade (Crazyhead's Arinzé Kene). The second follows an even more awkward sexual encounter between Jason, now a household-name pro with lucrative endorsement

deals, and a female stripper he hires to diffuse rumours about his sexuality. The third shows an emotionally charged reunion between Jason and Ade, whose own playing career quickly fizzled out, 10 years after they last met.

Because the story unfolds in three different hotel rooms with virtually no glimpses of the outside world, *The Pass* can feel more like a play than a film. Then again, perhaps director Ben A Williams



BEAUTIFUL THING (1996)

Also adapted from an acclaimed stage play, this seminal British film follows two teenage boys getting to grips with their sexuality on a tough south London council estate. decided not to expand the setting to highlight the claustrophobia of Jason's high-profile lifestyle and the constraints of the closet he's trapped inside. Donnelly's wordy dialogue can sound theatrical, too, but it's often powerful as well and boosted by a pair of brilliant lead performances. Tovey manages to evoke some sympathy for Jason even when he's being unbearably cruel and arrogant; Kene captures Ade's conflicting emotions for Jason

and his own sexuality with soulful restraint.

In spite of its flaws, this is a poignant and provocative film that often feels uncomfortably realistic. "I'm a f**king role model. Your kids have posters of me on their walls," a furious Jason rants at one point. "I ain't gay: gay ain't even an option."

Stranger than fiction

Moving doc about Disney films teaching an autistic man how to make sense of the world

AT THE AGE OF THREE
Owen Suskind's speech began
to deteriorate. The once chatty
kid started to detach from the
outside world and retreat into
a silent one all his own. Suskind
was diagnosed as autistic. His
parents were shocked, but the
family adapted to Suskind's new
normal, accepting that the son
they knew would probably never
return. Yet one day he did, led
back to them by, of all things,
Disney cartoons.

Roger Ross Williams' extremely moving documentary explains how a fixation with Disney animation taught Suskind not only to talk again but also to read and how to make sense of the world. The film tells two stories. One is of the now adult Suskind, who still has significant emotional and learning difficulties but has become independent enough that he's preparing to live on his own. The other is the story of Suskind's family and how they gently, lovingly coaxed Suskind back to them. When, after a year of silence, he began repeating a line of dialogue from The Little

Mermaid, then compared his older brother to Peter Pan, his parents saw that something in the cartoons was getting through to him, so they showed him as many as they could. Incrementally, Suskind himself became more animated.

It's a remarkable story very well told. The film is based on the book by Suskind's father Ron, a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist, and there's a cleareyed journalistic tone to it. As interviewees, the Suskinds are all eloquent and detailed, able to vividly describe scenes from decades ago. Owen's childhood is brought to life in old home movies and charming animation that gets more colourful as his world gets richer.

As much as it's an account of how Disney helped bring
Suskind back to his family, it's much more about how hard that family worked to help him find his way and how much they loved him at every stage. You might call it a corny, Disneyesque cliché, but it's really about how if someone believes in you, you can do incredible things.






