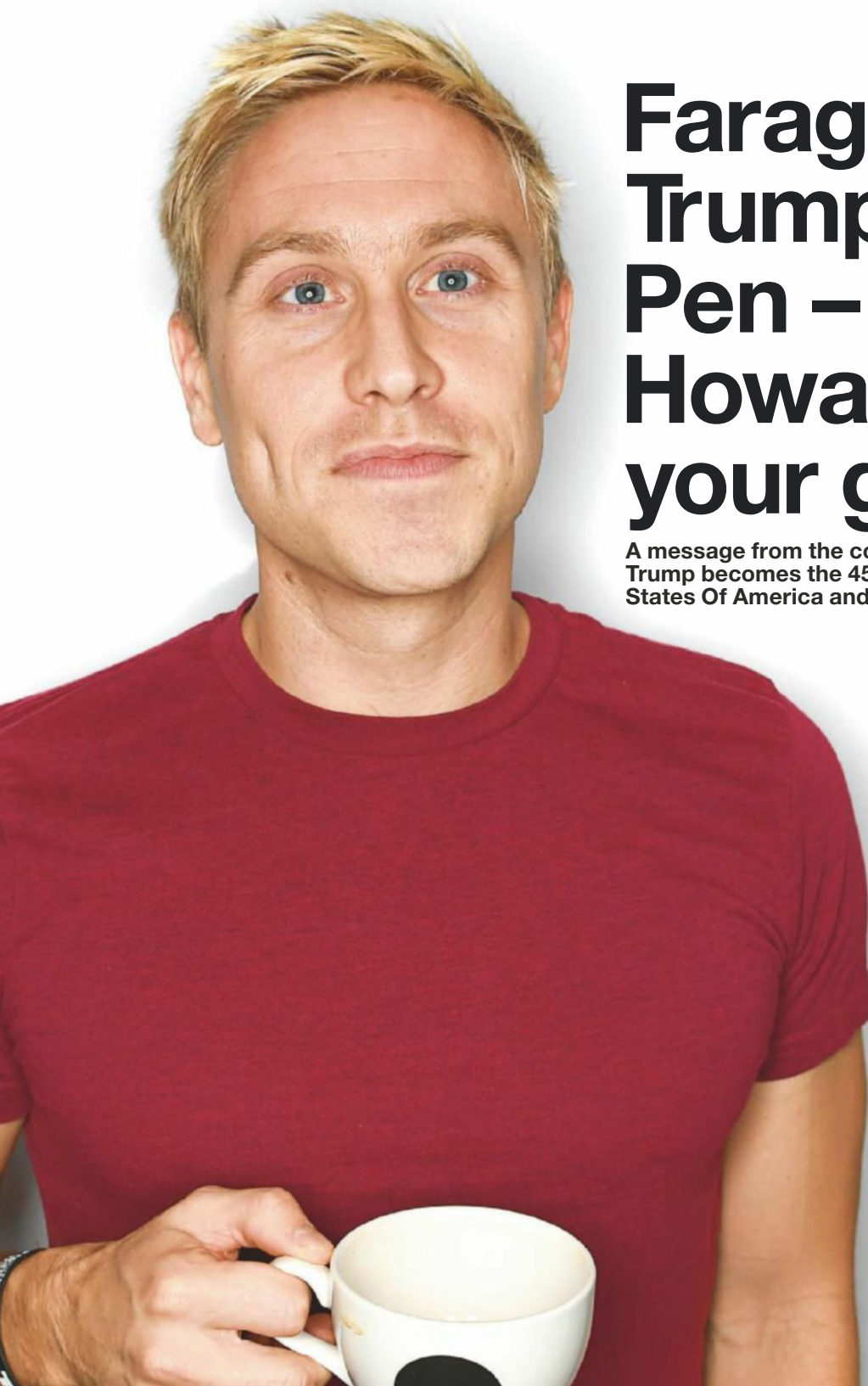

Going gaga for La La

Marius De Vries, musical director of *La La Land*, on why everyone's gone quite so bonkers for the jazz musical



MARIUS DE VRIES

Did you know you were making an instant classic?

"It's caught a spirit that's to do with magic, dreaming and romance. But you never really know how people will respond until after. If you're not slightly scared when making something it means you're not taking enough risks, and if you're not taking enough risks then you're not making something that's special."

Did Ryan Gosling and Emma Stone take to their roles quickly?

"They're both very bright and have very engaged creative minds. I remember late one night sitting in the studio with Ryan after we'd done another vocal session. We were saying how tired we were and how exhausting the process was, and he just looked at me and said: 'Yeah but we're trying to create magic and that's not easy.'"

Who in modern music embodies that jazz spirit?

"In LA there's a thriving alt-jazz community involving Kamasi Washington and Flying Lotus. There's tons of creative jazz around and what's interesting is how it's reaching out to other genres and cross-fertilising, which speaks to one of the central themes of *La La Land* – the creative tension between John Legend's character and Ryan Gosling's character about jazz's purity, but also how it needs to adapt. I don't think that's a question with a clear sense of right and wrong to us."

There's been some criticism of the film for a lack of diversity. How do you respond to that?

"It's a discussion rather than an accusation. There's always a lot of discussion around issues like this and for sure, in terms of casting and the philosophy of how we put it together, the approach was always thoroughly inclusive. I don't see the issue. We have John Legend playing a principal cast member and crucially involved in that discussion and I don't think it's a discussion where there's a right and a wrong answer."

"Defrost your icy windscreen in the winter. Rub it on your lover."

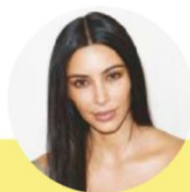
What's the spiciest thing you've ever eaten?

It's time to march against Trump, the poster boy for misogyny

ON JANUARY 21, THE DAY after Donald Trump officially takes up the post of p***y-grabbing President of the United States of America and begins systematically crushing the hopes and dreams of untold numbers of people, hundreds of thousands of women – and men, too – are expected to attend the first ever Women's March on Washington. There'll be similar protests across the world, including in the UK.

The protest, which recalls the huge anti-Vietnam War demonstrations that took place in the shadow of the White House in the 1960s, was born from social media outrage at November's shock US election result, in which Democratic candidate Hillary Clinton lost out to a reality television star and chump of a businessman with no political experience. A poster

boy for general b*llendery, misogyny and all the worst bits of capitalism, Trump's fondness for feminism and the rights of people who aren't quite so privileged as him is essentially non-existent. It might not be possible to give him a taste of his own medicine and fire his arse *Apprentice*-style, but it is possible to make a really, really big noise about how troubling his sinister rise to power is.

Rather than just pushing one agenda, the Women's March is about standing up for a whole bunch of issues that Trump doesn't seem to think matter – abortion rights, the environment, human rights,

gun legislation, healthcare, racial equality, LBGTQ rights, a minimum wage, police accountability and generally being a decent human being. Planned Parenthood and Amnesty International are just two of the hundreds of charities and initiatives taking part. Madonna's shown her support for the protest in typical Madonna style – by sharing a picture of an unknown model's pubes – while Katy Perry and Cher have also pledged their involvement.

Donald's d**k moves are likely to affect more than just those living in America. In charge of one of the most

powerful countries there is, Trump's decisions will have an impact far beyond the 50 states he's in charge of. So as well as 300 other protests planned in the US on Saturday, 30 other countries will also be taking part and showing solidarity, with women across the world kicking up a fuss of monumental proportions. Of course, women's rights are human rights, so men are welcome on the protests. Greenpeace, Solidarity with Refugees, CND and Pride London are all backing the UK event. If you're not up to anything else this Saturday, go and be outraged at the Women's March on London – and do it loudly. @leoniemaycooper

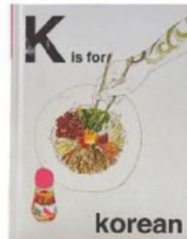

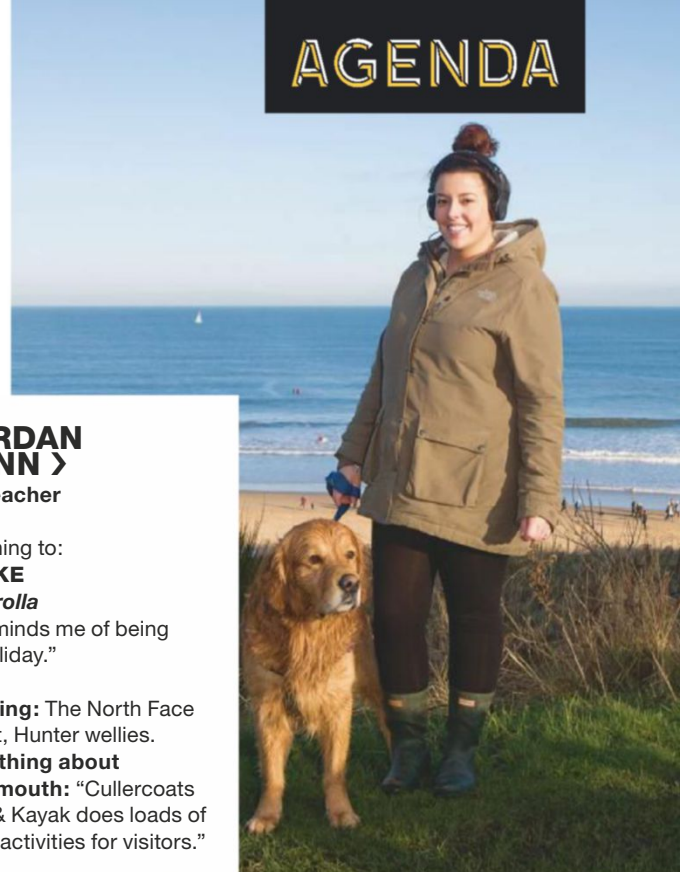

THE HEROES WE NEED

Run The Jewels are the US hip-hop duo who mix humour with hard-hitting politics. On the eve of Trump's inauguration, they tell Kevin EG Perry why they think we're living in a parallel universe

THIS WEEK, DONALD Trump will place one of his tiny hands on the Bible and his puckered lips will accept the US presidency: the first Twitter troll with

a nuclear arsenal. Holed up at a secret location in Nashville, preparing for a tour that's due to come to the UK and Europe at the end of March, firebrand rap duo Run The Jewels are somehow managing to see the funny side.

"As a guy who grew up on dystopian science fiction you can't help but be morbidly amused," says El-P, looking for a chink of light in the darkness. "It's scary but hilarious, in a f**ked-up way. It's the folly of man. It's also incredibly dangerous and deadly. The stakes themselves make the gallows humour that much more potent. But that's me. If I had an executioner's gun to the back of my head and he farted, I'd laugh."

Beside him, his sparring partner Killer Mike leans in. "I've watched every inauguration since Reagan," he says, in that Deep South baritone. "But this is the first time the President is gonna be sitting there tweeting: 'I told y'all, fools.'"

At times like these, we could do with more artists willing to talk s**t to power. Run The Jewels are the heroes we need. After their explosive first album together in 2013 proved their old-school hip-hop credentials, 2014's follow-up 'Run The Jewels 2' amplified America's anger at widespread police brutality. Their new album 'RTJ3', released as a free download on Christmas Eve, is their best yet. It's at turns smart, laugh-out-loud funny, politically aware and ferociously angry. This magazine's review awarded it a full five stars, much to its creators' delight. "That was surprising and amazing. We're blown away by that," grins El-P, before Mike adds: "I sent that s**t to my children to let them know their dad is still cooler than them."

It's a record that's been percolating since the end of 2015, when El-P started working on beats with producers Wilder Zoby and Little Shalimar. Mike and El-P began recording vocals in earnest in February 2016, around the time the presidential primaries were kicking off across America. Mike became well known across the country as a vocal supporter of left-wing Democratic candidate Bernie Sanders, who offered a radically more socialist vision of American politics but was narrowly beaten to his party's nomination by the more centrist Hillary Clinton. Run The Jewels took their frustration at the political process into the studio, where it surfaces on tracks like '2100' which opens with Mike rapping: "How long before the hate that we hold leads us to another Holocaust?"

Another new track, 'Thieves' (Screamed The Ghost)', returns to the

band's anger at the failure to hold police officers accountable, particularly for the killing of black men such as Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri, and Eric Garner in New York City, both of whom died in 2014. While the track is coruscating in its fury, the pair say they thought carefully about not making

the song a call to arms. "I remember when we were doing 'Thieves', we went back and forth because it could have been an encouragement to incite violence," says Mike. "There were points last year when everyone was angry enough to do that, every American, and especially me. It took me and El going back and forth to decide what the true message was that we wanted to leave. My anger would say, 'I wanna see everyone who's ever hurt somebody shot and killed.' As a rap group, and as public figures, you have to realise that the gravity of your words can sometimes lead to that s**t for real, and that's not what we wanted to do."

"That's a reflection of our friendship too," adds El-P. "We know when we have to sit down and talk. With 'Thieves', we had to make sure that we knew what we wanted it to be, which was an anatomy of a situation and not an encouragement."

Run The Jewels' big hitters

Never checked out RTJ? Start with these three tracks

'Close Your Eyes (And Count To F**k)' (2014)

Their first tune with Rage Against The Machine frontman Zack de la Rocha has become a signature anthem thanks to its "Run them jewels fast" hook.

'Lie, Cheat, Steal' (2014)

After bragging about their own misdemeanours, Run The Jewels go on to meditate on the liars and thieves who really run the world.

'Nobody Speak' (2016)

Run The Jewels are at their hilarious best on this collab with DJ Shadow, which opens with the unforgettable: "Picture this, I'm a bag of d**ks".

The tight friendship and symbiotic working relationship that's blossomed between El-P and Killer Mike is almost a surprise given they've only known each other for six years, but it's a combination that works so well it's now difficult to imagine them apart. "We the new PB&J," as Mike puts it on 'Legend Has It'. They first met in 2011, each aged 35 with storied careers already behind them. New Yorker El-P, born Jaime Meline, had made his name with underground hip-hop crew Company Flow before co-founding indie label Definitive Jux. Mike, full name Michael Render, had come out of OutKast's scene in Atlanta, Georgia, making his debut on their 'Stankonia' track 'Snappin' & Trappin' back in 2000. The duo first worked together when El-P produced Killer Mike's album 'R.A.P. Music', released in May 2012, but they quickly saw the potential in making their partnership permanent.

It's a friendship based on a shared affinity for old-school hip-hop and stoked by bales and bales of high-grade marijuana. ("Shouts out to Humboldt County, northern California!" says Mike. "The best weed in the world comes out of the Bay. I've also got to give Atlanta props for a strain called Gas – it's this OG kush that's strong as f**k.") Their shared sense of humour helps explain why it's not just politics that fills their records. There are also d**k jokes. Lots and lots of d**k jokes. "I'm not doing my job unless I can look over at Mike and he literally shakes his head in his hands and says, 'What the f**k did you just say?'" says El-P.

Mike cuts in: "When you're sitting at a table and you hear a guy say, 'I've got a unicorn horn for a c**k', to me that's when you walk out of the room like, yo, I got to step it up! The imagination it takes to come up with something like that! I still think of the moment he said that and chuckle."

That line appears on 'Legend Has It', but doesn't quite survive intact. In self-deprecating style, the final word is now replaced with El-P's girlfriend, musician and comedian Emily Panic, undermining his braggadocio by uttering a bored "Stop". Meanwhile, Mike more than holds his own in the d**k-bragging stakes, with lines like "I refuse to play humble as though my d**k itty bitty" on 'Panther Like A Panther'. All fun and games now, but El-P can't resist pointing out how some of those lines would play if Mike ever decided to try to follow his mate Bernie Sanders into office.

"I can't wait until you try to get into politics and they start reading out lines..." he teases. Mike immediately takes on the role of a shocked Fox News anchor: "HE ADVOCATES KIDNAPPING MOTHERS FROM JAZZERCEISE!"

If the idea of mixing pugnacious social commentary with irreverent silliness seems odd, it makes perfect sense to Run The Jewels. "I've seen people question, 'How can you guys be funny, not-give-a-s**t, braggedy-brag rap, and then a few [songs] behind that have thoughts, concerns and social commentary?'" says Mike. "It amazes me, because I'm like, I thought that was the full human experience! If you hang out with your friends through the course of a day, you guys are going to laugh, talk s**t, get drunk, remember some s**t you didn't like, fight, make up, talk about how f**ked up politics is, get high... To me, our records are about the full human experience."

Sometimes their stoner jokes take on a life of their own. While drumming up Kickstarter support for 'Run The Jewels 2', El-P wrote that if anyone donated \$40,000 he'd re-record the whole album using cat noises. The internet being what the internet is, that challenge was soon accepted. Rather than dismiss it as a joke, they decided to follow through when they realised they could donate the raised money to the families of Michael Brown and Eric Garner. Thus, 'Meow The Jewels' was born.

"It was just a joke I wrote while high," says El-P. "I almost shut it down, but then I realised we had an opportunity to do something for charity. We knew the record was f**king stupid, but it falls in line with the way we think, which is that we can do good by being idiots."

Having blown up to become two of rap's most potent voices from what started as an experiment, both Mike and El-P say they sometimes consider what their lives would have been like had they never met.

"That's what keeps you grateful," says Mike. "I'm thankful for the journey I've took. I'm thankful that El and I got



hooked up, and thankful that we were smart enough to know that this was something that could be cool."

El-P, typically, has a more surreal take on it. A fan of conspiracy theories, back in 2015 he caused an internet storm when he tweeted about a mind-blowing idea concerning children's book characters the Berenstain Bears. Many people remember the name as 'Berenstein', leading to a hypothesis that two alternate parallel universes had merged. On 'Hey Kids (Bumaye)', El-P extends this idea, rapping that while in the original timeline he had "no wins", it's this new, darker reality that's allowed Run The Jewels to take over.

"I think it's very real," says El-P, seriously. "Maybe if me and Mike hadn't gotten together, everything would be a lot better for everyone else in this world. It makes no sense that we're blowing up. Me and Mike being successful is clear evidence that we're in a dark, alternate timeline that experienced some sort of schism along the way. Really, if everything was going cool, Hillary would probably be President and me and Mike would be out of work."

Mike, the ardent Bernie supporter, breaks into a cackle beside him. "I did not mention Hillary!" he laughs.

"Don't get that twisted as a Hillary endorsement," clarifies El-P. "I'm just saying that's probably what would have happened in the original timeline. Donald Trump would just be a f**king TV star. I'd like to take this moment to formally apologise for upsetting the space-time continuum. Instead, what you got is a world on the brink of crisis and two 41-year-old rappers at the top of their game. There's no f**king reason that this makes any sense."

Mike, more of a realist, thinks there's at least one reason Run The Jewels make perfect sense: "We are dope as f**k. I will say that."

FAMILY GUY

South London rapper Loyle Carner has woven music by his late stepfather into his debut album – and it might just have you in tears, says Leonie Cooper

SUN OF JEAN', THE final track on Loyle Carner's stunning debut album, features the 22-year-old MC's mum reading a poem about her son ("He was and is a complete joy / The world is his, that scribble of a boy") over a heartstring-tugging piano sample played by his late stepfather. A stirring expression of a mother's love and moving tribute to his dad, it might just have you weeping like a baby. That, I tell Loyle, in a pub in London's Maida Vale, is what happened to me. "I'll tell my mum that," he says. "She'll just say, 'I'm so sorry!'"

It's just one of many gorgeous, emotive moments that make up 'Yesterday's Gone', itself named after a track on a secret album the rapper's dad recorded before his death in 2014. "He recorded it in the basement; he was a brilliant musician but it never happened for him," explains Ben Coyle-Larner – who gets his stage name from his habit of mixing up his surname due to dyslexia ("I used to get taken the p**s out of me for it a lot, so I flipped it on its head"). After his mum found the secret album, Carner put it on his laptop but couldn't bring himself to listen to it until months later. When he finally did, he was on the lookout for fatherly pearls of wisdom and quickly found them in the song 'Yesterday's Gone'.

"It was almost like he was talking to me now, after everything that happened. Him going, 'Pick yourself up and get on with it.'" The original song now appears as a secret track on Carner's own album, but with one change – his mum singing along with the track. "I got to immortalise my mum and my dad together," says Carner with a smile. "It was the idea of bringing them back together one last time."

Carner still lives with his mum and younger brother in Croydon, having moved there from West Norwood so that, as a 14-year-old, he could study at the BRIT School, which Amy Winehouse, Adele and his buddy King Krule all attended. Although he

was unaware of his dad's creative ambitions, when he was growing up there was always something excellent on the stereo, be it Bob Dylan and Patti Smith or David Bowie and Leonard Cohen. "It was all storytelling – anyone who told a story," explains Carner of the soundtrack to his youth.

"So when I started listening to hip-hop I was looking for the same thing, something that was real and tangible."

Carner's early rap icons were Nas and Common, artists who told moving, sometimes troubled tales based on their own personal experience. Add their inspiration to his childhood fondness for writing poetry and the seeds were sewn for a future career as an MC.

"I used to struggle with English at school but I found poetry really interesting," he explains. "I think it's because I was dyslexic. Mistakes weren't mistakes in poetry. It wasn't about form or structure or spelling, it was just about words, and I understood words – I just couldn't spell them or put them in the right place."

When, at the age of seven, his best friend died, he wrote a poem to help him work through his feelings. Although he was asked to perform it in assembly, he wasn't writing for anyone else but himself. "Because my poetry was so personal I used to be embarrassed by it, but I'd enjoy reciting it to myself in the shower, in the bath... It was mine."

Like all of his mates, in his early teens Carner

started rapping. Unlike his friends, he stuck with it. Like he'd done with his poetry, he was pouring his emotions into music. "When I first started I felt it could be a hindrance. I used to write songs and think, 'I can't use this,' because it was too open." His mum

and his collaborator, beatmaker Rebel Kleff, convinced him otherwise and soon he was making a stand against "the weird social expectations of being a young man and having to say everything's OK when it's not OK".

As such, none of his tunes are what you'd call uplifting; 'Mrs C' is about his friend's mum being diagnosed with cancer; the epic 'The Isle Of Arran' is about his frustration at not having a male role model (his biological father is estranged); and the soulful 'Damselfly' is about losing the ability to form meaningful relationships. "I've never been able to write positive tunes," he says. "I guess when I'm happy I don't want to write – I want enjoy being happy."

Now, his emotional openness resonates deeply with the fans he speaks to after each and every show at his merch table. "It's a beautiful thing," says Loyle. "People come up to me and open up like we've been friends for years. Some people have been through tough times and it's difficult, but it reminds you that you're not alone." If it's emotional catharsis you're after, then Loyle Carner doesn't just understand – he gets it.

Trump repeatedly asking a foreign policy expert why America couldn't use its nuclear weapons displays a reckless and deeply troubling attitude that could "accelerate global nuclear tensions" and indicates that "he might engage in dangerous nuclear brinkmanship in a crisis". Reif argues: "The fate of tens of millions depends on the good judgment and stability of a single person. The President, and the President alone, is the supreme authority to order the use of nuclear weapons. All of which makes Trump's erratic behaviour and loose talk on nuclear weapons deeply concerning."

HAM-FISTED ATTACKS ON ISIS RAMP UP TERRORISM IN THE WEST

Professor Inderjeet Parmar, an international politics academic at City University, sees potential problems with Trump's approach to the Middle East. Going back on the recent agreement to lift sanctions on Iran in return for them not developing their nuclear weapons programme could be "very, very destabilising" and if Trump's "secret plan" to defeat ISIS involves US troops on the ground in Syria, it could lead to "much greater conflict". "America will get embroiled in another Middle Eastern war, annoying the Muslim world," says Professor Parmar, and that could well mean more terrorist attacks on European targets.

Many fear Trump's antagonistic Twitter persona will widdle on the well-made bed of international relations. Professor Parmar sees it more as post-truth "smoke and mirrors". "Trump plays at several different levels," he says. "His tweeting and his public rhetoric is often contrary to what he's doing at a quiet level. So he'll rail against Wall Street but he's appointed loads of people from Wall Street into his administration. It's part of this quite robust strategy that you renegotiate relationships and use all instruments available."

SLOW DEATH BY CLIMATE CHANGE

Trump's belief that climate change is a conspiracy theory the Chinese invented because they want all the world's vehicles running on kung po sauce (or something) is of great concern to environmental experts, as is his suggestion to pull the US out of the Paris agreement on global temperature. Dr Thomas Crowther, a Marie Curie Fellow at the Netherlands Institute For Ecology, insists "meeting the goals set at the Paris agreement is absolutely essential to minimise the magnitude of the effects and it would be disastrous if the US pulls out, not just because they're one of the biggest emitters, but because other countries might follow suit." Left unchecked, climate change might see Britain looking more like Westeros than we'd like. "If the melting ice caps slow the Gulf Stream, the UK will be plunged into Arctic-like temperatures," explains Dr Crowther. In the most economically derived regions, it will lead to massive-scale migration, starvation and war.

JUST ONE OF THE laugh-out-loud lyrics on grime kingpin Wiley's booming, swaggering, long-awaited new album: *"I'm not a lager lout / But I'm still throwing bars about"*.

The whole album is stuffed with similarly brilliant gags and one-liners – including a joke about George Best, leading you to wonder just how long the east London rapper has been working on 'Godfather'.

His 11th studio album was originally intended for release in September, but was subject to several delays. At one point, Wiley threatened to call off the release entirely, tweeting that it was "pointless". Over the years he's carved out a reputation as one of the most unpredictable figures in grime, missing live dates and cancelling interviews, leaving dejected journalists clutching Dictaphones. When he turns up, though, Wiley really turns up, a fact that 'Godfather' attests to in dazzling fashion. With features from current genre dons Devlin, Jme, Frisco, Flowdan and, of course, Skepta, it feels like a celebration of all that grime achieved in 2016.

Opening track 'Birds N Bars' sets the tone with a shout-out to the all-conquering London crew BBK, before snaking synths weave their way through brittle beats and his deliriously confrontational flow. *"I can do it,"* he rallies, *"I don't need to try"*. It's a statement of intent: Wiley has come to reclaim the genre that he helped to create, a case he makes most compellingly on the Devlin-featuring 'Holy Grime', a demented march through



chanted vocals and battering rhymes such as *"For years I've been killing it, trust me / Swear down, I will never get rusty"*. The frantic pace lets up only on 'U Were Always, Pt 2', a slinky, heavy-hearted slow jam with guest spots from Skepta and Toronto MC Belly.

Wiley's 2008 pop crossover hit 'Wearing My Rolex' recently went Gold. He's claimed he conceded to the mainstream in a bid to provide for his daughter; that in different circumstances he'd have waited for grime's popularity to come back around and pay off. Well, he's managed to have his cake and eat it. And that's why they call him the Godfather.

The promise of a heavier You Me At Six record doesn't quite deliver

NICE POP ROCK SAFE

THERE'S A CASE for not tooting your own horn prematurely. You Me At Six singer Josh Franceschi publicly declared that this – their fifth studio album – would be a notable departure from their usual pop-rock shtick, as they're all huge metal fans and that's their big influence. And while nobody expects these Surrey lads to drop a record rivaling Slayer, that's a bold claim to make. So here's a heads-up: 'Night People' doesn't fully deliver on those promises.

Take 'Plus One', which is mildly brooding rather than malevolent – like a rabid Doberman giving you a tiny nip rather than a full-blown chomp – and slips away without twisting up your insides in the way that metal and hardcore does. That, you suspect, is the guile they're searching for. It's understandable they haven't found it yet, because they've been doing their thing for years without ever drastically changing their

sound, presumably to avoid distressing a loyal fan base who adore Franceschi's gentle vocals. But when 'Heavy Soul' is Snow Patrol meets Mumford, it

makes it hard to imagine a band like this ever getting much heavier.

That's not to say this album is without merit, though. What You Me At Six do, they do well,

and 'Swear' and 'Night People' both have a heavier groove and garage-rock vibes, with a Stone Temple Pilots-style swagger that works for them. Penultimate track 'Give It Up', meanwhile, has Hozier-like soulfulness that's dark without needing corpse paint and blood-dripping pentagrams. Life's too short to be something you're not, but it's also too short to take baby steps. 'Night People' is a fine album, but it's no different to previous albums. It's time the band took a giant leap. **Anita Bhagwandas**

ROCK ANGUISH TATTOOS

DESPITE LOOMING over the past decade of British hard rock in various different guises and consistently proving himself one f**k of a frontman, Frank Carter has remained something of a cult figure. His first crack of the whip came as vocalist of Watford hardcore heroes Gallows, who he parted ways with in 2011. Then it was onto the rather more family-friendly, pop-leaning Pure Love, a project with US guitarist Jim Carroll. Since 2015, he's been making a return to his more brutal roots, with the Rattlesnakes tearing up razor sharp riffs behind him, and his caustic, unflinching howl and doomy world view upfront and centre.

This, Frank Carter & The Rattlesnakes' second album, is an angry and sad but striking thing, all shimmering, serrated guitars and Carter's distinctive vocals imbuing everything with a vital urgency. If you want to

shake off any lingering New Year's cobwebs – and get a rather gloomy insight into the tortured mind of Frank Carter – then 'Modern Ruin' is the way to do it. The full-throttle 'Vampires' gives one of many

flashes into Carter's sorrowful psyche, as he admits:

"I feel like I'm breaking / Under the heaviest weight." The

maudlin but meditative 'Acid Veins' goes deeper still: *"I've got a skeleton inside me / Made from knives and chains,"* while 'Thunder' takes proceedings from the personal to the political.

A passionate comment on the migrant crisis, it throws up some seriously intense imagery inspired by some of the most upsetting headlines of recent times: *"I see a baby lying face down in the tide / And I see thousands of souls begging for their f**king lives."* The sonics are just as powerful. 'Lullaby' chugs along like Black Sabbath by way of Dalston Junction, an updated take on the metal icons' stoner sound. 'Wild Flowers' is furiously propulsive, a heavy, heady and yes, tortured, love song – but it's not all rough and rowdy.

'Bluebelle' is just over a minute long, a fatalistic blues ballad, with Frank in crooner mode, sighing:

"The worst that can happen is you die," over lonesome, tremulous electric guitar.

Don't come to 'Modern Ruin' looking to be cheered up then, but if it's catharsis you're after, there's nothing more fitting. **Leonie Cooper**

IF YOU'RE STILL feeling drained and deadened by the traumas of 2016, perhaps it's time for a musical tonic. Like cold, clean water, Austra's 'Future Politics' washes clear the mental muck, leaving you feeling alive again.

Latvian-Canadian producer Katie Stelmanis's aim on her electropop outfit's third album is, she's said, "a commitment to replace the approaching dystopia". Its beats are suitably

bracing; where Austra's 2011 debut 'Feel It Break' was minimal and cold wave-y, and 2013's 'Olympia' embraced a warmer, housier feel, 'Future Politics' contains their most purposeful music yet, sci-fi synths bolstered by futuristic dreams, gearing you up for the hard work of rebuilding

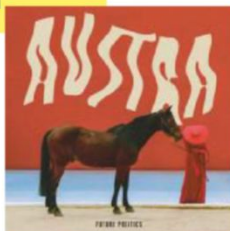
your faith in humanity. "Waking up got somewhere to go / I'm making sweat fall", 'We Were Alive' begins, Stelmanis's rich voice reaching out over dawn-soft synths, swelling

strings and a crisp snare beat.

But the promise of 'Future Politics' is more than just today's hard work; on the glorious synthpop of 'Utopia', glistening like a factory crafting new tomorrows, it imagines a radical future beyond labour, tired structures and old assumptions:

"I can picture a place where everybody sees it too / It might be fiction but I see it ahead". Hope is hard, though, and 'I'm A Monster' faces the stultifying weight of despair, Stelmanis sorrowing, "I don't feel nothing any more" over darkly throbbing synths.

The title track's fat, womping space disco hammers out a way forward: "I don't want to hear that it's all my fault / I'm looking for something to rise up above". The deep chillout of 'Beyond A Mortal' and the title of harp-laced instrumental 'Deep Thought' (the name of the computer built to answer the Ultimate Question in *The Hitchhiker's Guide To The Galaxy*), meanwhile, seem to point beyond our selves as we understand them, to a transhumanity in which technology might lift us beyond our weaknesses. Such visions are a welcome gift in a new year when resolution comes harder than ever. **Emily Mackay**

A force for chaos

Californian duo famed for toplessness, injuries and gyrating make surprisingly focused fifth album

INDIE SUMPTUOUS ORCHESTRAL

BEFORE RELEASING their last album, 2014's sprawling 24-song exercise in sloppy rock theatre '...And Star Power', Foxygen keyboardist Jonathan Rado hadn't time for standard-length records. "We just didn't want to make an eight-song record; here's more songs," he told *DIY* magazine.

Well, almost three years later, just look what the Californian so-and-sos (completed by singer Sam France, famed for toplessness, injuries and

demented Jagger-on-heat gyrating) have done. They've made an eight-song album.

But don't take this sumptuous fifth record – which marks

Foxygen's first proper studio effort and features a 40-piece orchestra on every track alongside contributions from Flaming

Lips multi-instrumentalist Steven Drozd and arrangements from Matthew E. White – as a step towards convention. 'Hang' may be crisp, clear and smooth, but Foxygen are still very much a force for chaos, the band nearly

being derailed by drugs, fallouts and France's broken leg in 2013.

Like their four previous albums, 'Hang' is propelled by two principal forces – star-quality musicianship and the will to trespass beyond tradition. And, crucially, at a third of the size of its predecessor, it allows Rado and France – who wrote and produced every song – to fully focus. Rado's keys are particularly outstanding.

Opener 'Follow The Leader' is a real pop nugget that swings like Foxygen classics 'Shuggie' and 'How Can You Really'. Backing vocals, brass and a brilliant bassline coalesce under France's vocals, which lurch from growling to snotty to sugar-sweet.

Upbeat ode to utopia 'Avalon' makes sense of France telling music site Nothing But Hope And Passion that 'Hang' is Foxygen's "Disney record". Epic lead single 'America' supports that description further. Drums and strings could soundtrack a chase scene in *Peter Pan*, and the piano tinkles as if

accompanying Belle dancing with the prince in *Beauty And The Beast*. France's yelping is freaky: "Just another witch who comforts you when you're dying / America!"

Elsewhere, the dramatic gun-referencing 'Mrs Adams' has him "hanging from a rope". But it's not all so hi-octane. 'On Lankershim' and 'Rise Up' deploy Harry Nilsson-style licks and unpredictable flashes of guitar to keep Foxygen from straying too far towards pantomime. And that's perhaps 'Hang's biggest accomplishment – reeling Foxygen back in and refocusing them for a brilliant and unexpected return to form.

Life after death

BIOGRAPHICAL DRAMA JFK

IT WOULD BE EASY TO make a politely anodyne film about Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, America's most glamorous First Lady. The wife of President John F. Kennedy was by her husband's side when he was assassinated on November 22, 1963, and retained the public's affection until her own death from cancer over 30 years later.

Yet this biographical drama from Chilean director Pablo Larraín takes a braver revisionist approach. Although *Jackie* is far from unsympathetic, it presents Kennedy as flawed, forceful and far less self-assured than her poised public image suggested during her lifetime. Larraín's film focuses on the week after JFK's death and begins with a grieving Jackie Kennedy (Natalie Portman) meeting *Life* magazine journalist Theodore H. White (*Watchmen*'s Billy Crudup) for an exclusive interview. Brittle but imperious, Portman's Kennedy calls the shots from the start. After she breaks down recounting the full bloody horror of watching her husband's skull being punctured by a bullet, she quickly regains

composure and tells White: "Don't think for a second I'm going to let you publish that."

These tense exchanges give way to revealing but non-chronological insights into Jackie Kennedy's defining week. We see her breaking the tragic news to her children, defying security advisers to plan a lavish funeral for her husband, confessing some uncomfortable home truths to a priest (John Hurt), and even peeling off her blood-stained clothes alone in her White House bedroom many hours after the assassination. This scattershot approach works because it captures the gathering storm of conflicting emotions Kennedy is feeling after her husband's death.

Portman appears in almost every scene and the film's thrilling intimacy is intensified by Larraín's uncompromising close-ups and a brilliantly brutal score by Micachu & The Shapes' Mica Levi. Greta Gerwig and Richard E. Grant provide appealing support as

Kennedy's closest White House confidantes, but it's Portman's tour-de-force performance that gives the film its real lifeblood. *Jackie* isn't just a convincing and riveting depiction of a 20th century icon; it's also a heart-rending portrait of a grieving woman trying to regain control when the life she knows is suddenly and cruelly taken away.

Defiant folk-pop from Mansfield

BANGING IN GOALS AS A highly touted football prodigy wasn't enough for the teenage Georgie, and well before she could buy a pint she was touring pubs playing acoustic sets. Now 22, she's supporting Blossoms and shaping up to unleash her blend of empowering British pop and old school soul.

Did growing up in The Midlands shape your early songwriting?

"Definitely. It's maybe seeing that sense of wanting to get out of it, or maybe the sense of seeing people you really love struggling within it. There's a real rawness to life in those mining towns, which is inspiring in a different sense for songwriting."

You did a lot of gigging in pubs as a teenager – what was that like?

"I was so young that some of them I had to sneak into to play. Once, I actually had a history exam the next morning and I failed it because I ended up staying and playing four sets that night."

Not only that, but you were banging in goals as a decent footballer...

"Yeah, my parents used to give me a pound for every goal I scored. But then I was scoring hat-tricks or sometimes eight goals and it went down to 50p, and then they said they couldn't reward me anymore because it was costing too much money."

Your first single 'Company Of Thieves' is a very defiant and self-assured song. Where did that influence come from?

"I think it *is* quite a defiant song, especially for women who've been in intimate relationships. Artists like Patti Smith, PJ Harvey and Janis Joplin were really inspiring for me as they also wrote those kinds of empowering lyrics."

You supported Blossoms on their UK tour in December. What did you learn from that experience?

"It was nice to see different feedback from different crowds. You get 30 minutes to really make an impression; it's an opportunity to convert them. Also, that it's really hard to be healthy on the road! You manage to get through a crate of beer every night somehow as well – it's like a magic trick."

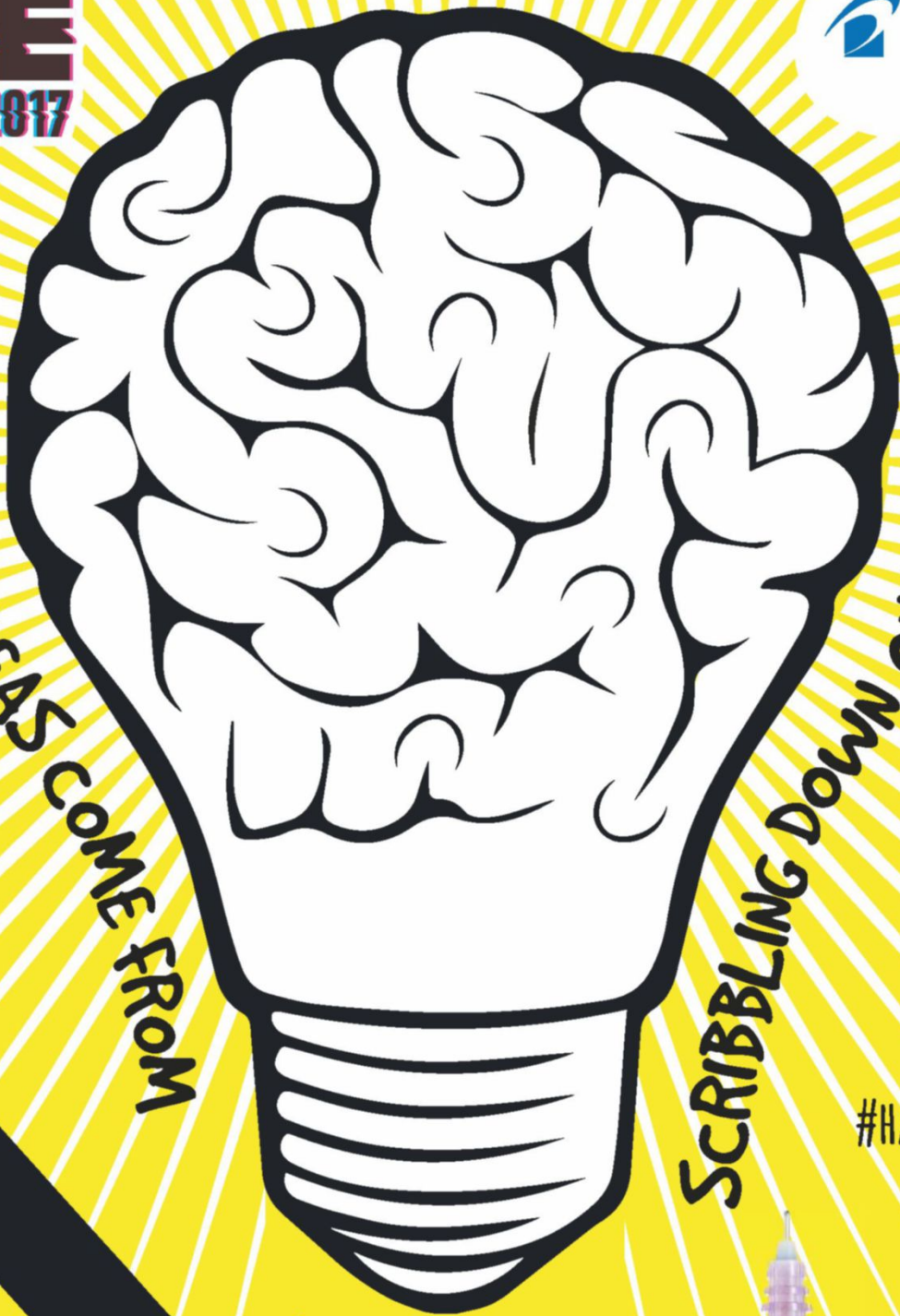
