It works because it's all so familiar. It works because it's still full of surprises. It works because of Renton, Sick Boy, Spud and Begbie. It works... Phew!

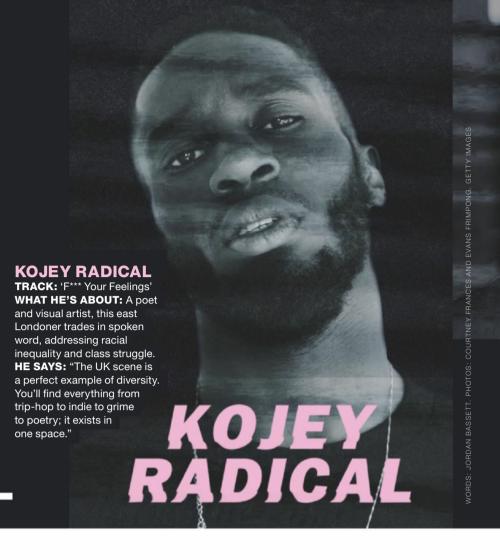

We're all f**ked without independent

venues

IF YOU'VE EVER BEEN holed up in a small, sweaty room and discovered an amazing new band, DJ or amateur interpretive dance troupe and had one of the best Tuesday nights of your life, you've been to an independent music venue. They smell of beer, teenage dreams and toilet bleach, and are wonderful, wonderful places. They're homes away from home, where love affairs begin and end, where people discover not just new music but themselves. They're an intimate, human response to the corporate gig venues that can be found in most major cities and this week they're getting the congratulations they deserve.

Much has been made of the threat UK nightlife faces, with outrage at sites closing up and down the country, but the Arts Council England-backed

Independent Venue Week shines a light on the smaller spaces that are standing tall against the troubling tide. Last weekend I was in Yorkshire, at Hebden Bridge's legendary Trades Club, watching a packed-out show by hard riffing psych-pop gang Toy. It was loud and lovely and proved that a couple of hundred people partying in a dark room can be loads of bloody fun. Built in 1923, with funding from union members from the local cotton industry, the spot now acts as a members co-operative and has seen shows from Patti Smith, Laura Marling, Temples and Sleaford Mods. It's even been shortlisted for NME's Small Venue Of The Year award.

A community hub as well as

a place to get t**tted and dance, there are hundreds of places iust like the Trades Club around the UK. There are the more established spots, like Leeds' Brudenell Social Club, Norwich Arts Centre, Glasgow's Stereo and The Dublin Castle in Camden, London, but newer venues are still popping up, with north London's New River Studios and Ramsgate Music Hall proving that, despite all the gloomy talk, there are still people committed to providing places

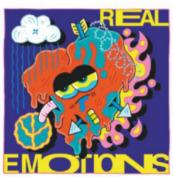

> where artists can hone their craft and subcultures can thrive. If it wasn't for the 100 Club and the long-departed Roxy in the 1970s, the clattering sonics and vibrant

politics of punk wouldn't have had a home. Arctic Monkeys might have a been a very different proposition were it not for the support of the nowdefunct Sheffield Boardwalk, while The Libertines owe a debt to the likes of Rhythm Factory, Nambucca, The Boogaloo and The Duke Of Clarence - only two of which are still in operation.

"An exotic bomb that went off in British culture"

As *T2 Trainspotting* hits cinemas, **Barry Nicolson** speaks to key players behind the book, film and soundtrack that defined a generation and the sequel that seeks to do the same



"Choose life.

Choose a job. Choose a career. Choose a family..."

When Trainspotting was released in February 1996, those words - voiced by Ewan McGregor's Mark Renton as he legged it down Edinburgh's Princes Street to the strains of Iggy Pop's 'Lust For Life' - sounded like a clarion call for a nation preparing to throw off the voke of Thatcherism and usher in a new era, a new culture and a new politics. With Britpop in full swing and **New Labour around the corner, Danny** Boyle's kinetic adaptation of Irvine Welsh's supposedly unfilmable debut novel gave British cinema a muchneeded shot in the arm, becoming a worldwide smash and a symbol of Cool Britannia's bullish selfconfidence. Two decades later, as the long-awaited sequel T2 Trainspotting finally arrives in cinemas, we spoke to the key players to find out how a scabrous novel about a clique of Edinburgh junkies became a bona fide cultural juggernaut...

1993 Meet the heroin addicts you want to hang out with



Irvine Welsh's 1993 novel was a searingly honest – and darkly hilarious – portrait of heroin addiction, from the troughs of depravity to the peaks of euphoria. It proved as

was controversial: the book was removed from the Booker Prize shortlist when two judges threatened to quit over its inclusion.

It takes this group of people who've been sidelined – and we all do it, we sideline junkies as something lower than human – smashes them straight back into your field of vision, and says, 'Consider them again as human beings.'"



JOHN NIVEN Author, Kill Your Friends "It was a game-changer.

The visceral quality of the writing, combined with the subject matter, really captured the time [Welsh] was living in brilliantly. I thought it was amazing, but I didn't know how big it could be outside of Scotland; later, I found out Stephen Fry would do the 'worst toilet in Scotland' scene from the book as a party piece, and that's when I realised it had taken off way beyond what I thought it would."

1996 The film that became a phenomenon

Hot off the success of 1994's Shallow Grave, director Danny Boyle, screenwriter John Hodge and producer Andrew Macdonald settled on Trainspotting as their next project. Shot over seven weeks in Glasgow on a budget of £1.5m, the film would eventually make £48m worldwide and land an Oscar nomination for Best Adapted Screenplay.

DANNY BOYLE

Speaking in 1996

"The problem is that people who make drug films make them so f**king depressing. We wanted to make a film that actually gives you the rush of drug culture - you go out there and have a fantastic time, and we wanted to reflect that. That's what was so shocking about the book, because it dares to say that it's f**king wonderful."

IRVINE WELSH

"A lot of really good filmmakers were interested in doing it, but they all wanted to take this social-documentary approach to the material, and there's nothing more dreary than making that kind of film about heroin addicts... To me, Trainspotting isn't actually a drugs film: it's about the vibrancy of youth, about how people adapt to changing circumstances in a world where drugs have replaced employment as the social lubricant of our time.

EWEN BREMNER Actor, Spud

"What I remember best is the downtime from filming. We'd all got rollerblades, so we'd be bombing around the derelict cigarette factory in Glasgow. We were also doing a lot of night shoots, so I'd often come home at 5am and lie on the grassy bank in Kelvingrove Park as the sun was coming up, totally blissed out."



KELLY MACDONALD Actor, Diane, speaking in 2016

"I think [the club scene] was my first day filming. That was a whole day and night shoot. All the boys were quite naughty and drinking, so I was drinking. Shirley Henderson [who played Gail] pointed out to me not to do that. I'd been in the pub for hours with various

people who weren't filming. I think I was

hungover by the time I did the scene."

EWEN BREMNER

"Outside of Scotland, Trainspotting was like an exotic bomb that went off in the culture. It was a strange, foreign world that hadn't been discovered yet, a world that was invisible in mainstream media. The idea of a film actually allowing you to enjoy the company of drug addicts - that was revolutionary."

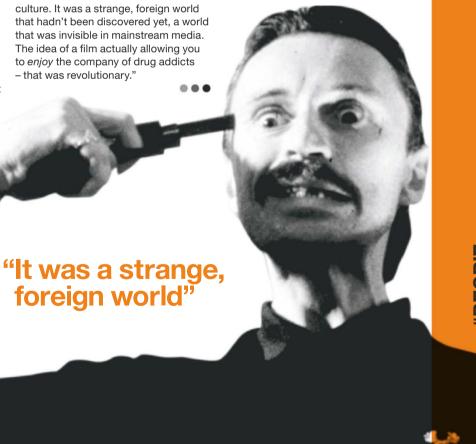

1996 The soundtrack that defined the times

The film's soundtrack became a huge hit in its own right, connecting the dots between UK club culture (Leftfield, Bedrock), the emergent Britpop scene (Blur, Elastica) and the counter-cultural '70s rock the film's characters were obsessed with (Lou Reed, Iggy Pop). It sold over 700,000 copies and spawned a huge Number Two hit single, Underworld's 'Born Slippy .NUXX', giving 72's soundtrack a lot to live up to.

"Danny was using our album 'Dubnobasswithmyheadman' as a kind of 'heartbeat' to cut the first edits of *Trainspotting* together. He was in HMV one day when he saw the 'Born Slippy' 12-inch, bought it, and knew immediately that was how the film should finish. We weren't keen on the idea at first, until Danny said, 'Come and watch the film', and after the first 15 minutes we decided he could use anything he wanted."

2002 The sequel that almost wasn't

Published in 2002, the novel Porno found Welsh revisiting the Trainspotting gang for a caustic revenge tale set in the murky world of the porn industry.

IRVINE WELSH

"I'd written the first draft of this book about the sex industry when I realised the character I'd written was actually Sick Boy, 10 years on. So the book evolved into a sequel. We started talking about doing another film almost as soon as *Porno* came out, but the problem was we wanted to do it in real time, and the stuff about the gonzo porn industry was very much of the late '90s/early 2000s, so it dated quite quickly."





What happened to the cast next?

Ewan McGregor (Renton) Became a household name when he played Obi-Wan Kenobi in the Star Wars prequel trilogy. Has since worked with everyone from Baz Luhrmann (Moulin Rouge!) to Tim Burton (Big Fish). Moved into directing last year with American Pastoral.

Jonny Lee Miller (Sick Boy) His film career has been underwhelming, but Miller struck small-screen gold with Elementary, a contemporary, New York-set re-imagining of Sherlock Holmes.

Robert Carlyle (Begbie)
Currently filming his sixth season of the hugely successful Once Upon A Time, he won a BAFTA for The Full Monty, faced down James Bond in The World Is Not Enough and recently directed his first feature, The Legend Of Barney Thomson.

Kelly Macdonald (Diane) Won rave reviews in the Coen Brothers' No Country For Old Men, voiced a princess in Pixar's Brave and was a standout character in HBO's Boardwalk Empire. Most recently seen in Black Mirror.

Ewen Bremner (Spud)

Has become a successful character actor, appearing n blockbusters such as Pearl Harbor and this year's Wonder Woman, as well as quirkier indie fare like Snowpiercer and The Acid House – another trvine Welsh adaptation.

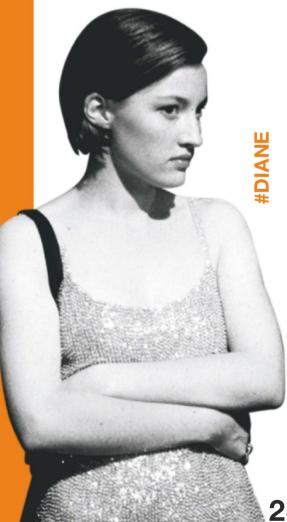

IRVINE WELSH

"T2 is interesting, because it's not just an adaptation of Porno - there's bits of Trainspotting in there, bits of Skagboys, even bits of The Blade Artist. It's an amazing piece of work and it's got me fired up about the possibilities of writing more about these characters again."

ROBERT CARLYLE "There's already been some discussion about filming The Blade Artist, and certainly I would play Begbie again in a heartbeat. I think if we were to do it, it would probably be the last time you saw him, but it would be a fantastic way to end things. The Begbie in that book is a very different guy, obviously a lot older, but I think it would be a fitting thing to do for the character - to put him to bed NME once and for all."

We're here in a brand new London venue Omeara – does this mean we're in the clear, or is UK nightlife still in danger?

Simon Neil: "We've got to be aware of it, or as a culture it's going to disappear. Of last year's big musical deaths, which hit you the hardest?

Simon: "David Bowie, because he's been such a big part of everything that we're aware of since we were born. Bowie was more than music."

How about George Michael?

Simon: "Believe it or not, we tried to get George Michael on 'Puzzle' when we were recording it. We love his voice and at the time he was making really slow R&B. He obviously got back and said, 'I'm not at all interested!'"

Simon, what can you tell us about your electronic music side project?

Simon: "It's called ZZC. It's going to be like the Pet Shop Boys. I'm going to be singing like Neil Tennant and my wife Francesca's going to be like Chris Lowe. She's going to look like the girl from The Ring. I'm getting projections of people playing instruments and as I move around the stage, I'm gonna join in. The music gets weird - it's not mainstream. I've got a seven and a half minute masterpiece called 'The Myth' - it's this neo-classical thing that goes into a little bit of math rock. I think it's one of the best pieces of NME music I've ever written."



R&B singer Kehlani has turned difficult times into a debut album full of positivity and banging tunes, says Rhian Daly

ROM COLLABORATIONS with Zayn Malik, Chance The Rapper, G-Eazy and Little Simz to her appearance on the Suicide Squad soundtrack and a Grammy nomination for 2015's debut mixtape 'You Should Be Here', Kehlani Parrish has got plenty to celebrate. But life – even since embarking on her music career – hasn't been easy for the 21-year-old.

The rising R&B star's dad died when she was a baby and her mum spent time in and out of prison. Only five years ago Kehlani was, essentially, homeless, drifting from couch to couch and stealing food in order to eat. Less than a year ago, she attempted suicide after false rumours that she'd cheated on her then boyfriend, NBA player Kyrie Irving, with her rapper ex PartyNextDoor led to horrific abuse on social media.

'SweetSexySavage', her debut album, is full of strength and ferocity as a result. "I'm kind of bad at writing sad songs, which is why I don't have too many," the Oakland-born singer explains. "Sometimes when I'm writing these 'I'm not hurting any more, I'm stronger' songs it's because I am hurting and I'm not strong yet, but that's me trying to get to that."

One of 2017's first great records, 'SweetSexySavage' is full of confessional and irresistible tracks, from 'Undercover', a bona fide banger about an illicit hook-up, to the sparkling balladry of 'Advice'. 'Too Much' offers a take on her healing process, insecurities and heartbreak, with a chorus that declares "I'm too much of a woman / Too much of a badass b***h / Too much of a boss / Baby it's your loss," with unwavering attitude.

Kehlani, who first found fame reaching the finals of *America's Got Talent* with her teenage group PopLyfe in 2011, has always been quick to point out that she's not a victim, whether that be in a relationship gone sour or the battle with depression that very nearly ended in tragedy last March. When writing songs for her album, she says she realised she'd also been the one "doing the hurting, being the aggressor".

In case you don't catch what the songs are all about, some come prefaced by recordings of Kehlani's friends dishing out explanations. "I feel like sometimes people just listen and jam – they don't actually take in the purpose of what you're trying to accomplish with a song," Kehlani says down the phone from New York, where she now lives. "I feel like having

South Londoner Loyle Carner's emotive rap is confessional, soul-searching and very, very good

THANK GOODNESS for Loyle Carner. British hip-hop has often been dismissed as lacking the bite, punch and sheer skills of its American counterpart, but 22-year-old Ben Coyle-Larner has stacks of talent, some seriously good tunes and some highly decent connections - he's already supported everyone from MF Doom and Nas to Kate Tempest and Joey Badass. He also spreads his smooth drawl over his debut album and is as proudly south London as Del Boy and Rodney Trotter.

On 'Yesterday's Gone' US rap's trademark arrogance is replaced by unabashed sensitivity and some serious emotional openness. If it seems like you're listening to Coyle-Larner reading out his diary when you listen, well, that's because you kind of are. This is music as catharsis, with much of the sonically laid-back album dealing with family, loss and friendship, over lived-in J Dilla and Tribe Called Quest-worthy beats. But that's not to say that there aren't some significant bangers in the mix. As epic album openers go, 'The Isle Of Arran' is way up there. A glorious gospel choir sample and a warm old-school soul sound both play out behind Coyle-Larner's effortless flow, as he serves up a heartrending study of grief and a family in turmoil, like Kanye West had he watched one too many episodes of EastEnders.

Feelings are similarly fraught during the moody 'The Seamstress', which deals with alcohol abuse, or the sparse,

stunning 'Mrs C', written for a friend whose mother was sick with cancer, and the powerful 'Sun Of Jean' which features piano from his late dad and spoken word from his mum. The bass-driven 'NO CD' is a fun, funny ode to buying and loving music in its physical form ("We got some old Jay Zs / Couple | ODBs"). 'Ain't Nothing Changed' is similarly addictive while 'Damselfly' boasts a dazzling jazzy backdrop and 'No Worries' sees a quest spot from UK rap icon Jehst. British hip-hop finally got serious - and Loyle Carner is leading the charge.

The Californian rock'n'roll auteur keeps it simple - for once

TY SEGALL Ty Segall CALIFORNIA ROCK LO-FI

YOU'D FORGIVE oddball Californian auteur Ty Segall for wanting to wipe the slate clean and start again. Over eight solo albums in as many years, plus nine collaboration records, he's veered as wildly around the rock underground as Boris Johnson has around international relations.

Cranky garage rock, experimental psych pop, nu glam, neo country and music he himself has described as "Satan in space" - Segall's been all over the nether regions of alternative music.

So for album nine, Segall steps back, self-titles an album for the first time since his 2008 debut and, to help

us catch up, goes back to basics. Pretty much. Besides a 10-minute garage psych sprawl called 'Warm Hands (Freedom Returned)' that sounds like The White Stripes collaborating with Hawkwind on a new thrash-blues song cycle for the climax of The Rocky Horror

Picture Show, this is a punchy half-hour summary of Segall's stylings so far, with a 'White Album' buzz to it.

Opener 'Break A Guitar' is a fine example of his gutter-glam

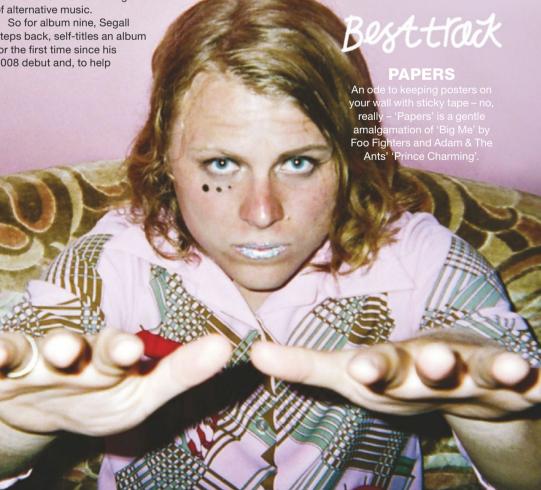
side, like the lycanthropic Bowie of 'Diamond Dogs' running feral around Hunger City; 'Freedom' is the same on a sugar rush. Come 'Talkin'', he's kicking back for a spot of porch-swing country, and 'Thank You Mr K' is skewiff Segall garage pop

at its finest, complete with a bit in the middle where he stops and smashes up his flat.

Where like-minded Californian indie rock artists like Thee Oh Sees and Ariel Pink often set out to challenge and alienate with such sounds, Segall is closer aligned here to more melodic types such as Christopher Owens, Kurt Vile and the solo albums by Segall's quitarist Mikal Cronin.

The folkier, T Rex-ish final third of 'Ty Segall' features 'Orange Color Queen', a tender love song to his redheaded partner Denée Petracek, and the 'Cry Baby Cry' rewrite 'Take Care (To Comb Your Hair)' - not a sentiment, let's face it, that comes up too often in the US indie scene.

Scraping off the garage rock grit and disjointed sharp edges that characterised his previous album 'Emotional Mugger' for this definitive self-portrait, Segall scrubs up great. Mark Beaumont

FOR THE FIRST FEW minutes of *Sing*, you'd be forgiven for thinking you're watching a sequel to one of last year's best animated movies, *Zootropolis*. All creatures great and small are commuting to offices, mostly shirted but pantless, politely not eating

each other. Unlike Zootropolis, which wove subtle, intelligent social commentary into the comedy, Sing swiftly makes it clear that it's not here for anything other than a good time – and a good time it has.

There's the thinnest suggestion of a plot to justify what's really merely a staging of *The X Factor* with cuter mammals. Matthew McConaughey voices a koala who nurtures dreams of being

a big theatre producer but is running his business into the ground. He comes up with an idea to make his name by staging a talent show that will give the winner a mediocre prize of \$1,000. Thanks to a mishap by his ancient assistant Miss Crawly – a glass-eyed iguana, voiced by director Garth Jennings – who adds an additional two zeroes to the flyer, huge crowds turn up with the

expectation of becoming rich.
They include a bored pig
housewife (Reese Witherspoon),
a gorilla who doesn't want to
join his dad's criminal gang
(Taron Egerton), a dark teenage
porcupine (Scarlett Johansson)
and a very shy elephant
(American singer Tori Kelly).
Which of them will be victorious?
Will the show be a hit? Thanks
to character development too
meagrely eked out across a large
cast, there's not much reason to
invest in the answers to these

questions. Yet somehow, out of nowhere, it finds a complete delight of an ending.

Jennings hasn't made a movie since 2007's wonderful Son Of Rambow and it's not until the final 30 minutes that he finds his feet again. His finale has emotional payoffs slickly edited into a big, rousing supply of song and dance. It remains low on substance, but all concerns about a lack of smart subtext fly out the window when you're enjoying the spectacle of a pig vamping to Taylor Swift while dressed as some sort of disco Batgirl. 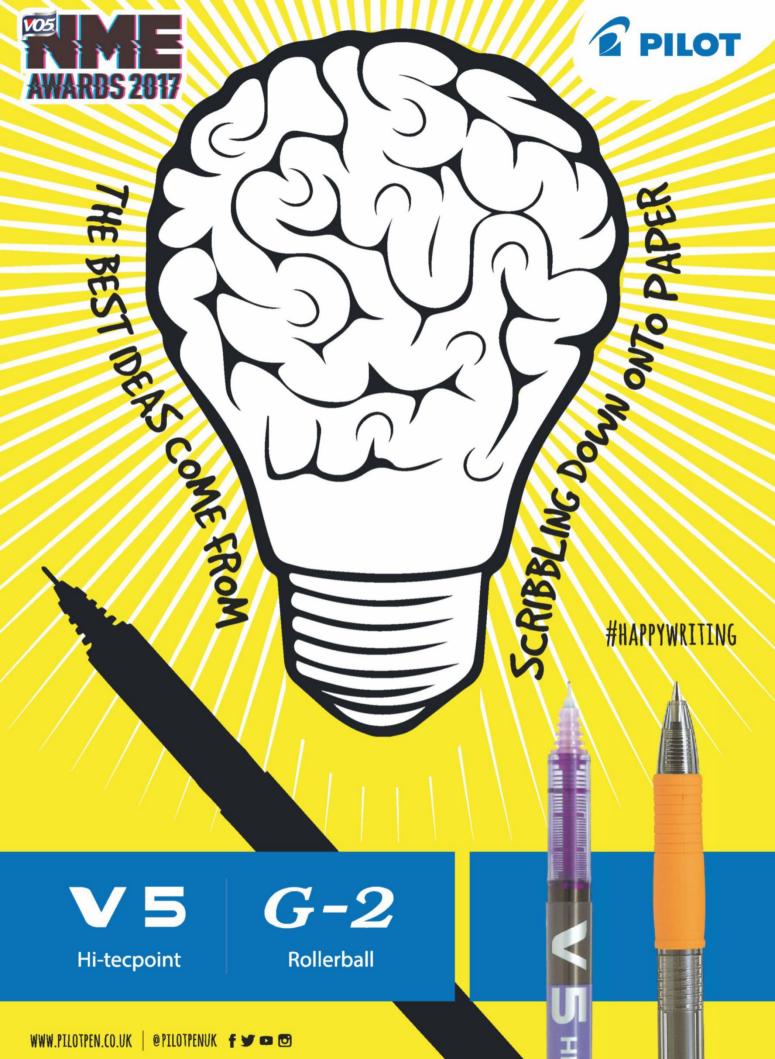

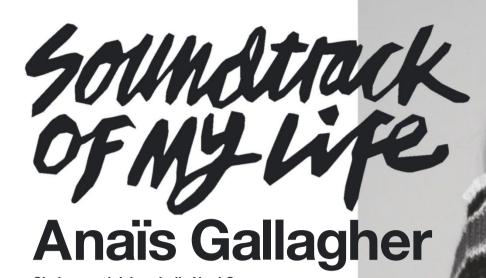
