ONE OF THE MANY highlights of the VO5 NME Awards 2017 was a supergroup of indie's finest coming together to rock for refugees. Bands 4 Refugees formed late last year after a charity gig arranged by London band Wolf Alice, and features Charli XCX, Pixie Geldof, Marika Hackman and members of Years & Years, Swim Deep, Black Honey, Slaves, Circa Waves and Peace. A year on – given the Brexit vote,

and the Government's scrapping of its child refugee scheme – their cause is more vital than ever. "It's easy to think your elected leaders will sort things out," says Years & Years' Olly Alexander, "but we need to make our voices heard."

On stage at the O2 Academy Brixton, they tore through a cover of The Rolling Stones' 'Gimme Shelter' to help raise awareness and money for the ongoing refugee crisis.

Feelgood hits for the summer

Kasabian's Serge Pizzorno on what to expect from their sixth album

TRACKS THAT TOOK 10 MINUTES TO WRITE

"I took last summer off and did a bit of living. It was great. I had the most amazing summer, then I added a few songs to the ones I'd already written for the album and they only took about 10 minutes to write. They were those dream tracks that really write themselves. It all just took it to the next level."

TRACKS WITH GUITARS ON

"I fell in love with the guitar again. I was listening to ESG and Talking Heads and in that kind of world, then it just took on a life of its own. I just wanted to make a guitar record that was relevant and important. It's been a while since that happened. We always react against our previous work. I did massively experimental synth work on the last record [2014's '48:13'] so I just looked at my Rickenbacker in the corner of the studio and thought, 'That's what I'm gonna do.' I just started smashing out tunes on that."

TRACKS WITH GREAT LYRICS

"I've got to say, these are the lyrics that I'm most proud of. I've got some beauties on this album. I tried to keep it really simple, but there's some really twisted, dark comedy on there too. There'd be so many good T-shirts out of the lyrics on this album."

TRACKS THAT ARE A REACTION AGAINST THE WORLD

"It's weird because last year I was making music, I got married and Leicester won the league. It was the best year of my life, but the whole world was crumbling. It's pretty mental. There's this vision of me in a studio, surrounded by vintage synthesisers, that's still standing perfectly but the rest of the world is just f**king bust. I wrote a proper feelgood album that will come out in the summer. It's just pure positive and the complete opposite of what's going on at the moment because that's where I was as a human being. This was my reaction against the rest of the world."

Kasabian's new album is out this summer. They're headlining Reading & Leeds and Glasgow's new TRNSMT Festival

Nazi nightmares

In new BBC One drama **SS-GB**, World War II is over – but Hitler won and he's occupied London. Executive producer **Sally Woodward Gentle** explains how they transformed the city into a dystopian Nazi nightmare for the show

Did you draw on any real-life plans the Nazis had for London?

"We didn't actually see any real ones. But we researched what type of bombs were dropped before and after the Battle of Britain. So we spent quite a long time thinking which buildings would still be standing if they'd won the Battle of Britain."

How did you stop people freaking out about seeing Nazi symbols while filming?

"We tried to minimise the use of swastikas in public as far as we possibly could. We got hyper-neurotic about it, even down to the pennants on the front of cars or a little bit of embossing on the top of a pillar."

That must have been so difficult to manage...

"We didn't want anything to cause offence because it's such evil imagery. We didn't want to be playing with it, and we didn't want to expose anyone to it either. When there were German soldiers on set, in between takes we covered them in ponchos."

What kind of changes did you have to imagine?

"Our production designer's view was that the Nazis would've taken things that were quintessentially British and rebranded them. So the red telephone boxes become yellow. The map symbol for the tube would've changed."

Why do you think that people have the appetite for stories like this now?

"I've been developing this for a few years, and I didn't think there was an appetite. I think what's happened since is that we're now living in an alternate world, with Brexit, Trump and Boris. We know, as well, that fate can turn really easily. It's terrifying."

IN THE HEART OF TEXAS sits a weird and wonderful paradise: Austin. It's known globally for its incredible music scene – from the venues of buzzing downtown hotspot 6th Street to festivals like SXSW and Austin City Limits – but there's so much more to the city, from food and urban adventures to vintage shopping, sports, amazing art and one hell of a nightlife scene. FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Austin is fast becoming a foodie hotspot, with everything from swanky restaurants to a buzzing food truck scene. Vegans will be in dairy-free heaven at The Beer Plant; for a Mexican munch, Torchy's Tacos is legendary; and artisan hot dogs can be found at Frank. For artery-busting fried chicken, Lucy's will do the business. Korean/Mexican fusion truck Chi'lantro is a must and East Side King's street food is mind-blowing.



GET SPORTY

Since the building of the Circuit Of The Americas track in 2012, Austin has been the US home of Formula One racing, with the United States Grand Prix taking place there every year. If you're after something a little different, then tailgating at a University of Texas football game is about as American as you can get.



ALL NIGHT LONG

Fans of nightlife are in for a treat in Austin. It's not quite the city that never sleeps but it certainly doesn't get much rest. The bars of 6th Street are legendary, with pool tables galore at Buffalo Billiards, speakeasy sass at Midnight Cowboy and Easy Tiger's sweet waterside patio. But be sure to venture further afield also to 'honky tonk heaven' with the Broken Spoke.



SHOP 'TIL YOU DROP

Skip to chilled-out South Congress Avenue – known as SoCo – to find the best vintage stores, like Feather's Boutique. Uncommon Objects is an antiques store like no other – get everything from taxidermy to old photos and costume jewellery at this rummaging mecca.



SWIM IN THE CITY

Barton Springs Pool is a gorgeous place to spend a sweltering day and take advantage of Austin's hot weather. Fed by underground springs, the outdoor swimming pool is open from 5am until 10pm and there are shady, grassy banks so you can chill out with a book or drift off listening to music. Bliss.

Tune back into radio – it's a music lover's paradise

EXCUSE ME WHILE I REACH for my hankie and dab at the big fat tears currently falling from my eyes, because news that people have fallen out of love with music radio has hit me hard. A new survey has found that over the past five years Radio 1 has lost almost a fifth of its listeners, and while 1Xtra, Radio 2 and 6 Music haven't seen such a substantial drop, it turns out that they too have been haemorrhaging fans as young people turn away from radio in favour of streaming services.

I adore the radio for many, many reasons, the first being sheer laziness. What's nicer or easier than flicking on your preferred station and then being looked after for the next few hours by a kindly DJ who'll introduce you to new things, chatter away without asking for anything in return and sprinkle a decent dose of songs you know and love throughout

proceedings? It's a simple joy.

The second is because radio is a place where eccentrics can thrive. One of my most vivid memories of being a little kid is related to the radio. I'm in the car with my mum on holiday in Cornwall. It's dark outside and we're driving down a winding country lane with only the warmly sardonic voice of John Peel oozing out of the speakers for company. One of Radio 1's most iconic DJs, Peel was known for his esoteric – and sometimes utterly mad – taste in music. He loved Aphex Twin, intensely hardcore gabba techno, dub reggae and folk ballads. On that dark night in Cornwall he was playing Half Man Half Biscuit,

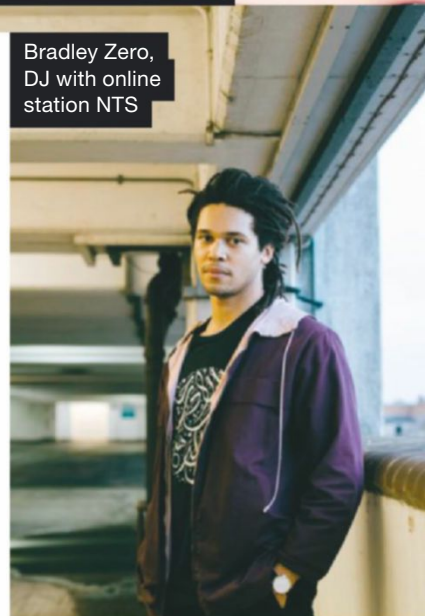
a bizarre folk-rock band who charmed and concerned eight-year-old me in equal measure. From that moment on I became obsessed with tuning into Peel – who passed away in 2004 – whenever I could. His late-night Radio 1 slot was a magical thing. He'd play records at the wrong speed and there'd be regular bouts of dead air, but it was charming and although I sometimes didn't like the music, deciding whether I did or not was always a thrill.

But mostly I love radio because it's a true music lover's paradise. For the past few years my go-to has been NTS, a London-based online station founded in 2011. With a seemingly endless run of shows by experts and highly enthusiastic amateurs, it hosts specialist shows in everything from electronica and metal to jazz and grime. You can also stream old shows, making it the perfect halfway home

between old school radio and millennial streaming culture. An exceptionally tasteful armchair crate-digger's heaven, I'm currently

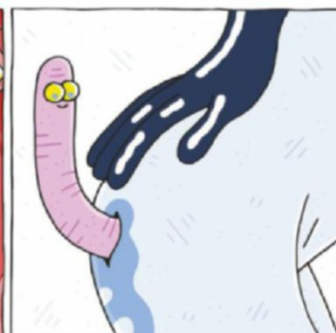
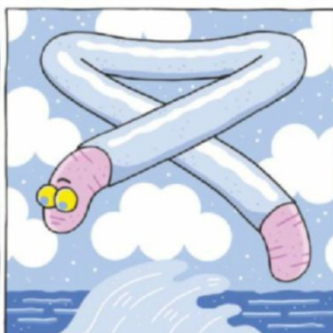

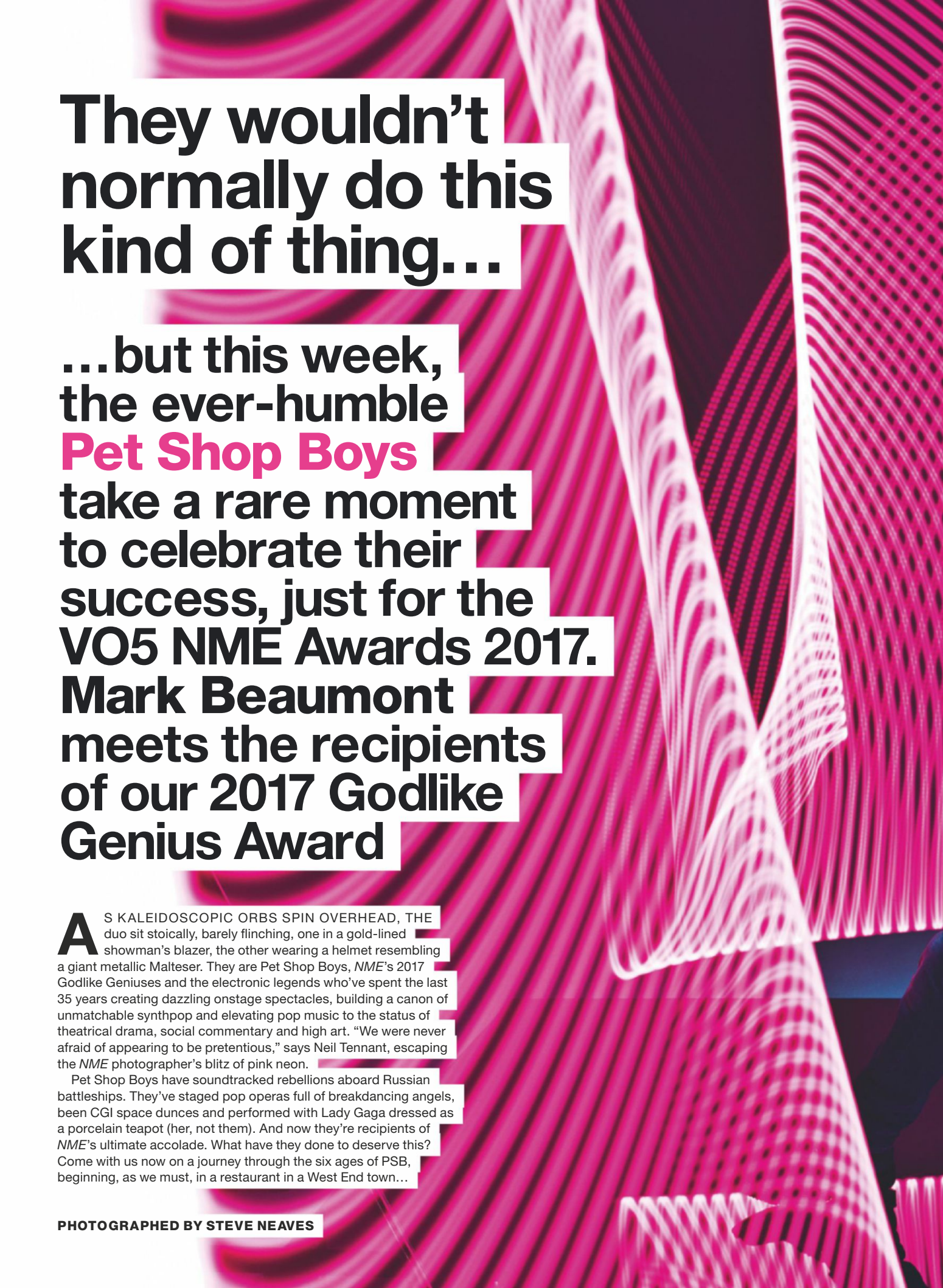

AS KALEIDOSCOPIC ORBS SPIN OVERHEAD, THE duo sit stoically, barely flinching, one in a gold-lined showman's blazer, the other wearing a helmet resembling a giant metallic Malteser. They are Pet Shop Boys, *NME*'s 2017 Godlike Geniuses and the electronic legends who've spent the last 35 years creating dazzling onstage spectacles, building a canon of unmatched synthpop and elevating pop music to the status of theatrical drama, social commentary and high art. "We were never afraid of appearing to be pretentious," says Neil Tennant, escaping the *NME* photographer's blitz of pink neon.

Pet Shop Boys have soundtracked rebellions aboard Russian battleships. They've staged pop operas full of breakdancing angels, been CGI space dunces and performed with Lady Gaga dressed as a porcelain teapot (her, not them). And now they're recipients of *NME*'s ultimate accolade. What have they done to deserve this? Come with us now on a journey through the six ages of PSB, beginning, as we must, in a restaurant in a West End town...

PHASE ONE POETRY WITH DANCE MUSIC 1981-1989

Well, OK, a Chelsea electronics shop. Neil Tennant, music journalist, met Chris Lowe, architect and accomplished stander-at-the-back, on King's Road in 1981. Two years later, Neil, in New York to interview The Police, bagged a meeting with prolific pop producer Bobby Orlando. "He said, 'Hey, let's make a record!'" Tennant recalls. "I said, 'You haven't even heard anything yet!'" Three weeks later we were back in New York in a studio off Times Square. The first song we played was an instrumental we'd written. I'd subsequently realised you could speak a rap over it, and that was 'West End Girls'. When the first version came out, [writer] Charles Shaar Murray in the *NME* gave it this incredible

review, saying, 'As an evocation of glamour and danger it is almost perfect.'

After a few false starts, 'West End Girls' became a huge international hit in 1985 and Pet Shop Boys emerged as an antidote to the swashbuckling New Romantics. "Our ethos was to make dance records that had the sort of lyrics that didn't get into dance records," Tennant says. "More like the sort of lyrics you got in new wave music or Bob Dylan. Some poetry with dance music."

Politics too. "[Second album] 'Actually' was meant to be a picture of Britain in 1987,"

Tennant explains. "'Shopping' was inspired by selling off all the nationalised industries, and it ends with the song 'King's Cross', which in those days was a very run-down, dangerous area. We were using that as a metaphor for people that got left out of the new, bright Thatcherite Britain."

From the outside, by contrast, Pet Shop life in the '80s was a riot. They used their vaulting popularity to work with heroes including soul legend Dusty Springfield and Barbara 'Peggy Mitchell' Windsor, and to indulge their high-art ambitions by injecting references to T.S. Eliot and Shakespeare into their songs. Yet Tennant has described this period as a "bitter 24-hour struggle" full of "arguments". Why? "There was so much promotion," he says. "We were pop stars with a Number One hit in America. You could do interviews 24 hours a day and it still wouldn't be enough."

PHASE TWO SCI-FI ART PRANKSTERS 1990-1994

In the '80s PSB had the brains, they had the looks, but they didn't have the money they needed to play live. It wasn't until 1991 that PSB fully realised their onstage vision. The Performance tour was a surreal cabaret extravaganza featuring pumpkin-headed women, pig bankers and a bit where Lowe sat reading *Playboy* in his pants.

"It was produced to look like an opera," Tennant remembers. "We didn't acknowledge the audience between the songs. We all come on dressed as schoolboys, Chris sits down and all he does in the first song is hold up an apple. It's a very beautiful moment."

In 1993, 'Very' brought candy cane dunce hats and computer-generated videos that looked like Willy Wonka directing *Barbarella*. "It was a reaction to grunge," Tennant says. "The grunge thing was, 'Hey man', letting it all hang

out, which was very much not what we are."

"There'd been an explosion in video game technology," Lowe adds, "and we thought it'd be good to look like we were part of a video game."

"We always wanted to be like a cartoon," says Tennant. "To create our own world, a universe of our own that doesn't necessarily apply to everything else that's going on outside. We sort of achieved that with 'Can You Forgive Her', and with 'Go West' we went even further. In the final video, 'Yesterday, When I Was Mad', Chris was just a lamp."

Lowe laughs. "My favourite performance in a video. I didn't even have to turn up."

Their cover of Village People's 'Go West', which Tennant considered "ghastly" until Lowe pointed out it shared a chord progression with Pachelbel's Canon, became their biggest '90s hit. "I never know whether 'Go West' didn't establish such a strong idea of us in the public eye that it became an albatross," Tennant shrugs. "It's such a strong thing, it's difficult to escape from – assuming you want to escape from it. People expect you to do doof-doof,

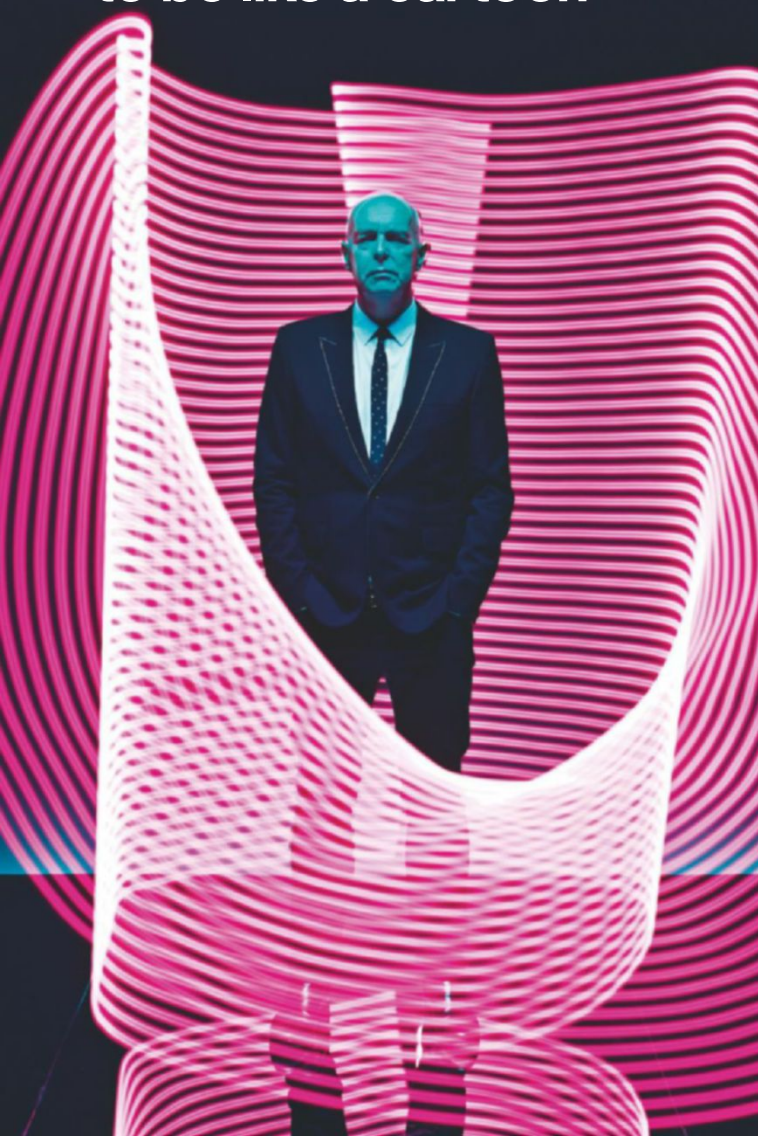
four-on-the-floor and we don't necessarily do that."

PHASE THREE ENTERING THE ESTABLISHMENT 1995-1997

As Britpop smacked its Union Jack Gibson into the knackers of the mid-'90s, the ever-contrary Pet Shop Boys went 'world music'. They toured South America, embraced Latin samba rhythms on 1996's 'Bilingual' and began cosying up to the biggest names in the rock firmament – Tina Turner, Bowie, Elton. But Tennant insists that they were something of a scalpel across the throat of the establishment.

"When David Bowie asked us to do a reworking of 'Hallo Spaceboy', that was a career

high point,” he says. “But the song only had one verse and Chris in the studio suggested we cut up ‘Space Oddity’ to make a second verse – ‘Ground to Major bye-bye Tom / Dead the circuit countdown’s wrong’. David Bowie phoned up to ask how it was going and we said, ‘We’ve cut up the lyrics of ‘Space Oddity’.’ Silence. ‘Sounds like I’d better come in.’ We completed the Major Tom trilogy: ‘Space Oddity’, ‘Ashes To Ashes’ and suddenly ‘Hallo Spaceboy’. I said to David Bowie, ‘It’s like Major Tom is in one of those Russian spaceships they can’t afford to bring down,’ and he said, ‘Oh wow, is that where he is?’”

PHASE FOUR GETTING WEIRD AGAIN 1998-2000

In the late '90s, PSB re-embraced the weird in order to give themselves some alien distance from Tennant's most personal lyrics to date. How weird? They wrote soundtrack music for an eclipse. They re-created the drawing room from *2001: A Space Odyssey* onstage at Creamfields. They sported an android shock-wig look that Chris describes as “a combination of samurais with *The Little Prince*”. And, during a residency at the Savoy Theatre in London, they literally leapt from the screens.

“[Artist] Sam Taylor-Johnson came up with this brilliant idea of filming a party with two sofas,” Tennant explains. “We’re on the sofas and we walk off the sofas and onto the stage while the party carries along on the screens behind us. At the end of the first half we walk off the stage and back onto the screens. It lost £12,000 a night. In effect we were giving every member of the audience £10.”

Luckily, PSB have a fairly blasé attitude to cash. “We earn money but we’re not super-rich,” Tennant admits. “My friends think I’m richer than I am. A close friend of mine was astonished to learn that I got paid a salary. People think that vast waves of money crash over you and it’s just not like that. Pop stars now will

have a fashion line – the music is just part of the brand. People see themselves as entrepreneurs now. We’ve never been entrepreneurial. We’ve always been much better at spending money than making it.”

PHASE FIVE INTENTIONAL DOWNSIZING 2001-2007

As the millennium dawned, PSB were in a rarefied position. They’d played their first ever festival show as headliners of Denmark’s 130,000 capacity Roskilde Festival. They had their own musical, *Closer To Heaven*, in the pipeline. They’d sold 50 million records and would never again have to rent out a fancy dress costume. They had it all, but Lowe pined for less. So, in 2002, on the back of Blair-baiting, guitar-leaning album ‘Release’, PSB toured student unions. No s**t. “I always felt our career’s gone in reverse order,” Lowe says, “so I thought in that case we should end up doing the student circuit, because we’d never done it.”

“Our first proper gig in London was at Wembley Arena,” says Tennant. “We wanted to reboot the idea of the Pet Shop Boys, to get away from ‘Go West’. Famously in 1972 Paul McCartney and Wings got into a van and turned up at student unions saying, ‘We’re going to do a gig.’”

“Neil drew the line at the van,” says Lowe. “And, ‘We’re not staying at the Travelodge.’”

The duo played the Camden Barfly for War Child and 20 years into their career they did a BBC John Peel session for the first time. “John Peel said, ‘If you’re having trouble listening to this,

just imagine it’s an obscure German techno band,’” remembers Tennant.

PHASE SIX POP VS ART 2008- PRESENT

In the recent past, PSB have known no creative boundaries. Their high-art leanings have been ramped up to the max with performances of their soundtrack for 1925 Soviet silent film *Battleship Potemkin* in Trafalgar Square, a ballet called *The Most*

Incredible Thing and a laser-blasted stint at the Royal Opera House featuring luminous inflatable sumo wrestlers. “Andy Warhol can do an Andy Warhol version of the Mona Lisa,” Tennant argues, “so that’s our view of pop music.”

At the same time, they’ve keyed into cutting-edge contemporary pop and the visual zeitgeist like never before. “Something started for us when [early-2000s dance scene] electroclash happened in London,” Tennant reveals. “We used to go to Nag Nag Nag every week with Sam Taylor-Johnson. That rejuvenated our interest in electronic music. We started doing remixes for people – The Killers, Madonna, Rammstein, Yoko Ono.” And performed alongside Lady Gaga dressed as a teapot at the 2009 BRITs? “She said, ‘As you’re English, I’m going to be dressed as a teapot.’”

We said, ‘Oh great!’ She had this very beautiful Wedgwood teapot costume.”

Pet Shop Boys will clearly leave the pop world a very changed beast from when they found it – more surreal, cultured, articulate and liable to dress entirely in Ming. And besides their undeniable influence, their Godlike standing is assured by the fact that their music has always been a document of their times. “Someone pointed out to me that our songs are a bit like a social history of Britain during that period,” Tennant says. “When the last song is written, whenever that is, I think that will be quite an impressive catalogue of songs that will say something about life in Britain, and indeed the world, in the era.”

And when they look back upon their lives, it should be with a sense of omnipotence.

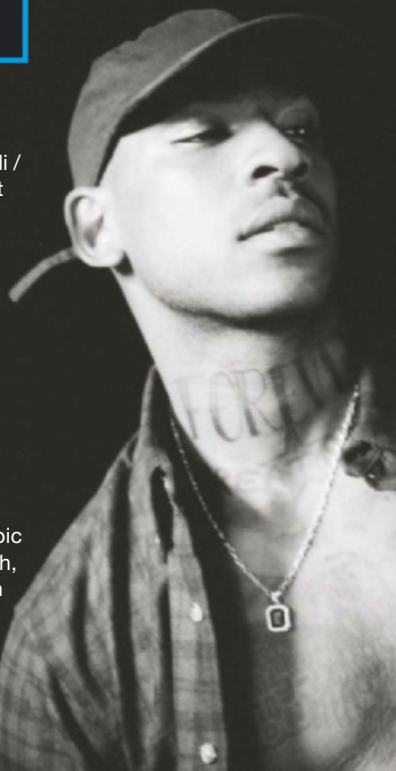

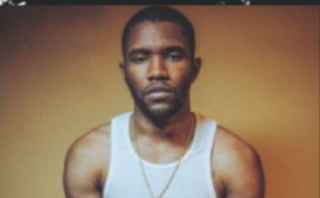

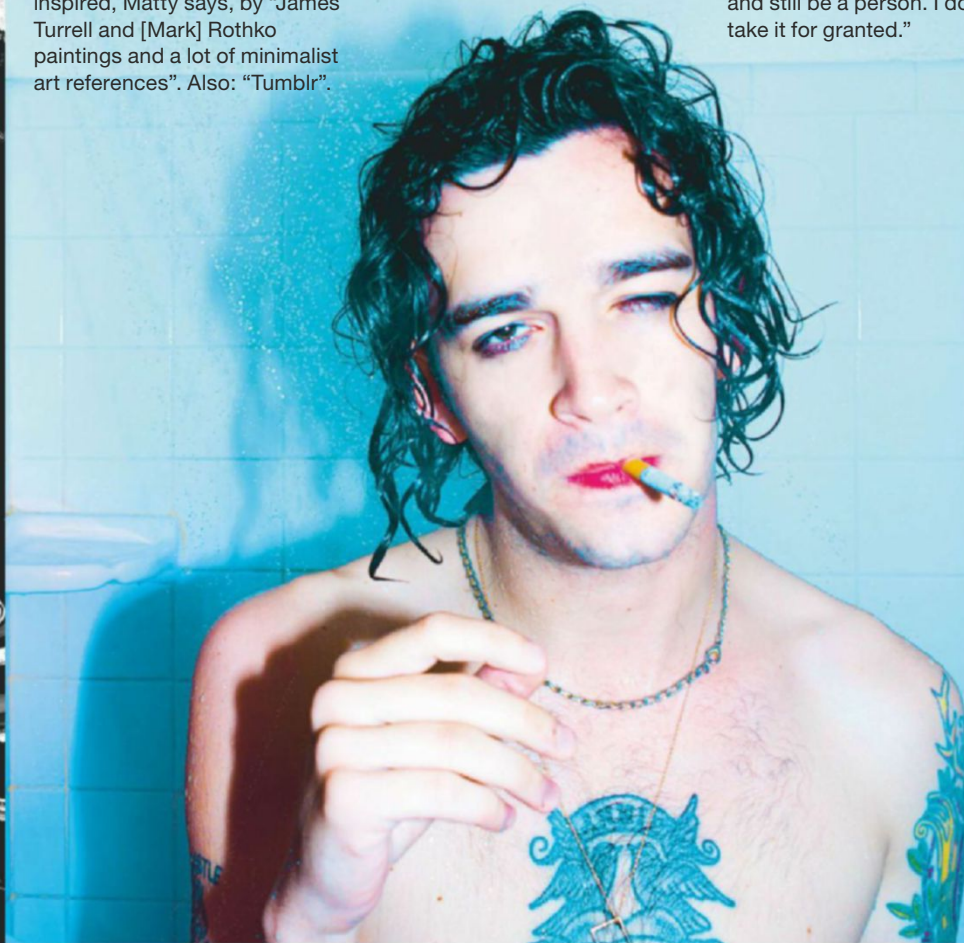

HEARTBREAK CATHARSIS

MORE SO THAN his alt-country covers of zeitgeisty non-country albums or his arbitrary forays into arena rock and heavy metal wish-fulfilment, what Ryan Adams truly excels at is documenting and dissecting failed relationships. With *'Prisoner'*, the 42-year-old singer-songwriter is (conservatively speaking) on his third such album dedicated to doing just that, this time picking over the bones of his six-year marriage to actress Mandy Moore, which ended in 2015.

Fortunately – both for us and, in a more cathartic sense, Adams himself – the passage of time between this album and 2004's *'Love Is Hell'*, or even his 2000 solo debut *'Heartbreaker'*, hasn't

dulled his gift for creating art out of pain. *'Prisoner'* isn't quite up to the career-best standards of its predecessors, but it's a remarkably focused and effective successor nonetheless.

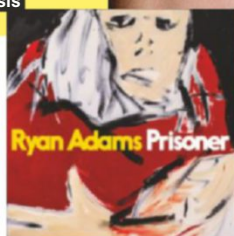
Opener *'Do You Still Love Me?'* sets the tone, if not quite the sound, for much of what follows, with a disconsolate Adams pleading, *"Is my heart blind and our love so strange?"* over a backing track equidistant between Whitesnake's *'Here I Go Again'* and The Eagles' *'Victim Of Love'*. As '80s power-ballad pastiches go, it's expertly done,

though the rest of the album takes its cues from more tasteful, less bombastic sources, namely 'Tunnel Of Love'-era Bruce Springsteen (see the brilliant – and devastating – *'Haunted House'*) and Bruce Hornsby (the widescreen soft rock of *'Anything I Say To You Now'*).

Adams' pen doesn't hold back on the heartache – *"I see you with some guy / Laughing like you never even knew I was alive"* goes one pointed line on *'Shiver And Shake'* – yet the overwhelming

sentiment isn't pettiness or acrimony, but an acceptance that some things are built to fall apart: as *'To Be Without You'* eloquently puts it, *"We are like a book and every page is so torn"*. It's a wisdom that comes from having been over this ground many times before, and while you wouldn't wish it on him again, the worst sort of anguish brings out the best in him. **Barry Nicolson**

Ryan Adams

On truth, divorce and desires

This is a very raw and open album. Was writing it a cathartic exercise or did it all just pour out?

"I don't remember being aware of needing to hold back anything. I felt like I needed to tell a story – the story of how I felt, or what was happening internally at least, in the truest way possible. I wanted to avoid feeling like playing guitar on a soapbox... like some f**king bulls**t."

So where did the title come from?

"I think the theme of this record is that we're all prisoners of some desires, in that the very things we love are the things that hold us hostage and keep us trapped."

Do you think fans will be looking for 'clues' about your personal life?

"For me, the big shadow illuminating things for fans will be that this record is directly related to my divorce and to what was going on inside me – how I endured it and where I was in my emotions at that time – and they wouldn't be wrong. I believe in art, and it sounds so stupid, but I think it's more stupid to pretend things aren't happening to you and write some bland f**king useless bulls**t."

Now That The Light Is Fading EP



FOLK FLOATY ELECTRONICA

LAST YEAR 22-year-old Maggie Rogers found herself in a rare position for an unsigned artist. There she was, a total unknown, in the middle of a serious swell of industry hype after praise was heaped on her lush folktronica sound by one of the biggest artists in the world. See, Pharrell Williams had casually dropped by New York University to deliver a music masterclass and when he heard Rogers' track 'Alaska' – which features on this fragile yet fulsome EP – he had to hold back the tears. He was moved, and you should be too.

'Now That The Light Is Fading' is US musician and producer Rogers' first

extended collection of songs for a major label and it's a gossamer-light, glorious thing that, over the course of four songs, builds into something approaching pop perfection. Following in the footsteps of Bon Iver, Rogers melds natural and man-made sound, creating soul-stroking emotion in the process.

Opener 'Color Song' offers up a decidedly low-key start, with Rogers layering her voice over and over, while field recordings of chirruping birds play out in the distance. It's simple but stunning, recalling

criminally underrated vocal trio Mountain Man, whose only album, 2010's gorgeous a cappella 'Made The Harbor' should be sought out by fans of Rogers, as well as band member Amelia Meath's current project, organic disco duo Sylvan Esso.

Williams' fave, 'Alaska', is up next. Like Haim on a hiking trip, its melancholy melody is at odds with its serious groove. When it comes to sonic textures, Rogers is experimental, but not at the risk of alienating the listener. This is mainstream but with an artful edge, with wobbly beats, twinkling keys and her signature stacked harmonies gracefully plaited together. 'Dog Years' takes her formula to perhaps a slightly too bombastic place, but on the twirling 'Better' the EP regains its hypnotic, classy vibe. Rogers' voice and instrumentation is impressive throughout, but it's on the production side that she really shines. In an industry where female producers are few and far between, she's a welcome new talent. **Leonie Cooper**

EMOTION SENSITIVE GROWING UP

MOONLIGHT'S STATUS AS AN award-season champion – it's already taken a Golden Globe for Best Motion Picture (Drama) – rising above much starrier, more expensive films, is at odds with its quiet grace. This is a film of gentle moments and pregnant silences that tells a story the vast majority won't directly relate to, but does so in such a way that everyone can feel its pain.

The second film by writer-director Barry Jenkins (his first, 2008's *Medicine For Melancholy*, was well-reviewed but not widely seen) visits three stages in the life of Chiron, a boy growing up in Miami with his drug-addicted mother (Naomie Harris). Sensitive and shy, Chiron is

teased for being gay, which he is. At nine, he's barely aware of what this means; as a teenager he's fighting furiously against it, while also nervously exploring it; as an adult he's buried his true self so deep he's almost suffocated it completely. Almost.

The authenticity with which Jenkins tells Chiron's story makes it surprising that this isn't autobiographical (it's actually based on a play, *In Moonlight Black Boys Look Blue* by Tarell Alvin McCraney). The emotions of Chiron's journey are huge, but Jenkins plays them all softly. Chiron, at all ages, rarely speaks, more often telling his story through wordless moments, as he watches those around him – a sympathetic drug dealer

(Mahershala Ali) who befriends him as a boy; a childhood friend who reappears at every stage of Chiron's life – and tries to understand how they live in confidence and relative happiness, which he cannot find.

He's ever watchful of the world but too afraid to take part in it, only allowing himself fleeting moments of freedom and trust in others before curling back into his shell. When he does speak, Jenkins' script makes every word count. The heartbreaking question, "What's a f*****?" uttered by a nine-year-old speaks volumes about how the world sees him and what he doesn't see of himself.

The three actors playing Chiron – Alex R Hibbert, Ashton Sanders, Trevante Rhodes – serve Jenkins majestically. It's far too early in the year to call *Moonlight* the best of 2017, but it would be among the finest of any year. **Olly Richards**

Slick Wick

Keanu Reeves killing bad guys in his gruff kinda way

JOHN WICK: CHAPTER TWO

15 Keanu Reeves, Common, Laurence Fishburne



BLOOD GUNS SURPRISES

IF YOU COULD ACCEPT THE initially flimsy premise – that Keanu Reeves' retired hitman was compelled to load up his guns again because a mobster's son killed his dog – 2015's original *John Wick* film was a slick and gripping action thriller.

This sequel, directed by Chad Stahelski, who also co-directed the original, offers similar thrills and spills on a grander scale. Here, Wick is forced out of retirement (again) when an Italian gangster redeems a blood oath against him. With gruff reluctance,

Wick travels to Rome to kill the gangster's sister as prescribed, but when he succeeds, it sets off a chain reaction. Not only does her loyal bodyguard Cassian (Common) want payback, but the gangster sneakily places a \$7 million open contract on Wick's head, as it would be "dishonourable" not to avenge his sister's death – even though he ordered it. When Wick returns to New York City, every assassin in town is after his blood.

Like the original film, *John Wick: Chapter Two* requires a hefty suspension of disbelief: many of its bloody murders take place in public places, but no one ever seems to report them. Nevertheless, Reeves' turn

feels believable and dovetails entertainingly with some flashy supporting performances. He and Laurence Fishburne, playing a camp crime lord called The Bowery King, riff winningly on their old *The Matrix* chemistry. *Game Of Thrones*' Ian McShane, reprising his godfather-like role from the first film, is typically charismatic. But as ever, it's the action that dazzles. Stahelski choreographs the killing sprees with gruesome elegance and the flick contains genuinely tense and unpredictable moments.

John Wick: Chapter Two ends by beating a very clear path towards a third film. This kind of signposting sometimes feels like a cheat, but here it works because you'll leave feeling both satisfied and intrigued. Bring on Chapter Three. **Nick Levine**

Raw and alternative R&B from Los Angeles

AFTER YEARS OF WRITING and producing for other acts, R&B duo Dante Jones and Drew Love got sick of the conventions, and decided to team up for their own material as THEY. Taking inspiration from Nirvana, Vampire Weekend and Timbaland, they've coined their own genre – 'Grunge & B'.

You've produced and written for artists including Chris Brown and Kelly Clarkson – how different is it working on your own debut album?

Love: "It's a very different process. It gives us the space to take a lot more risks. Trying to cater to someone else can really put you in a box and I don't believe that's where the magic happens. We wanted to start making things different, which didn't follow on those conventional musical lines."

You've known each other for a long time. What were you like as kids?

Jones: "We were both troublemakers. We didn't really listen to authority and didn't like to follow orders. We spent a lot of time getting suspended or in the principal's office, but I think that's what led us to be so different musically. We don't like to listen to people telling us to make music this way or that way – we just don't like to listen to anybody."

How does your love for Nirvana and indie music bleed into what you make?

Jones: "With Nirvana, I think there are a lot of parallels in the way that we structure songs and the catchy melodies. Indie has always been a huge influence for me. It's just a scene that I can always rely on to give me inspiration – I still use Vampire Weekend's latest album as a sonic point of reference."

Dante, not long ago you tweeted: "Our idols are ageing, this generation is hungry for visionaries."

Are you the visionaries that music needs right now?

Jones: "I could never refer to myself as a visionary. I'm just trying to use my gifts in the best way I can and trying to work on music that I know I can be proud of. Only time will tell what titles we deserve." **Thomas Smith**

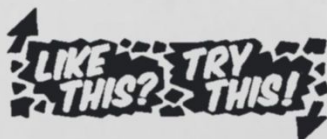

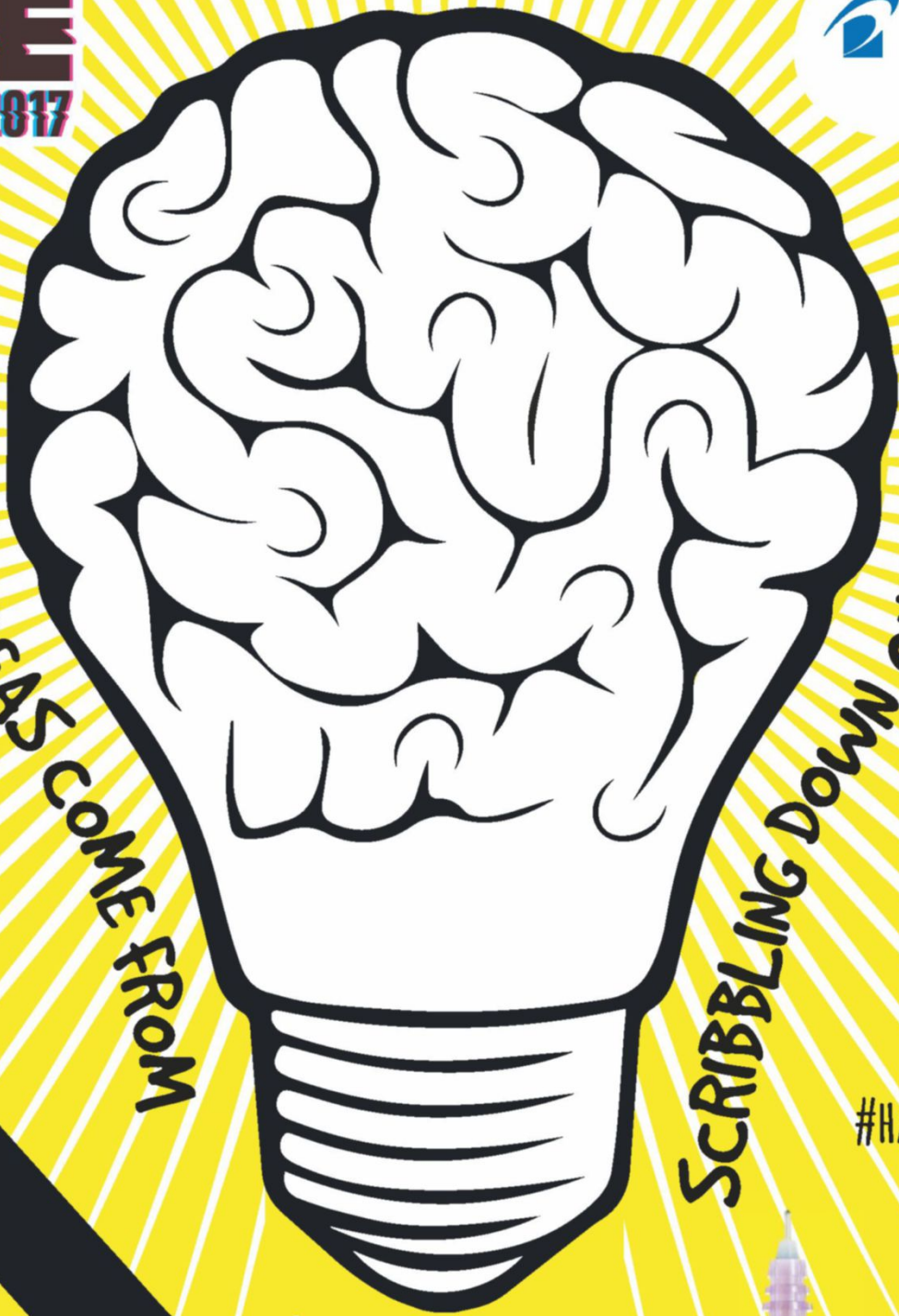

Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds are bringing 'Skeleton Tree' to five massive UK venues

AN ARENA TOUR IS not where Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds fans were expecting to hear songs from 'Skeleton Tree' live for the first time. The Aussie band's 16th album emerged in September as their most harrowing and personal to date, shaped by Cave's teenage son tragically dying in an accident midway through its recording. "We've been in a strange place," Cave said last month at the Derwent Entertainment Centre in Australia, at the Bad Seeds' first gig since 2015. "We haven't played for a long time and it feels like suddenly I'm coming out blinking into the light." 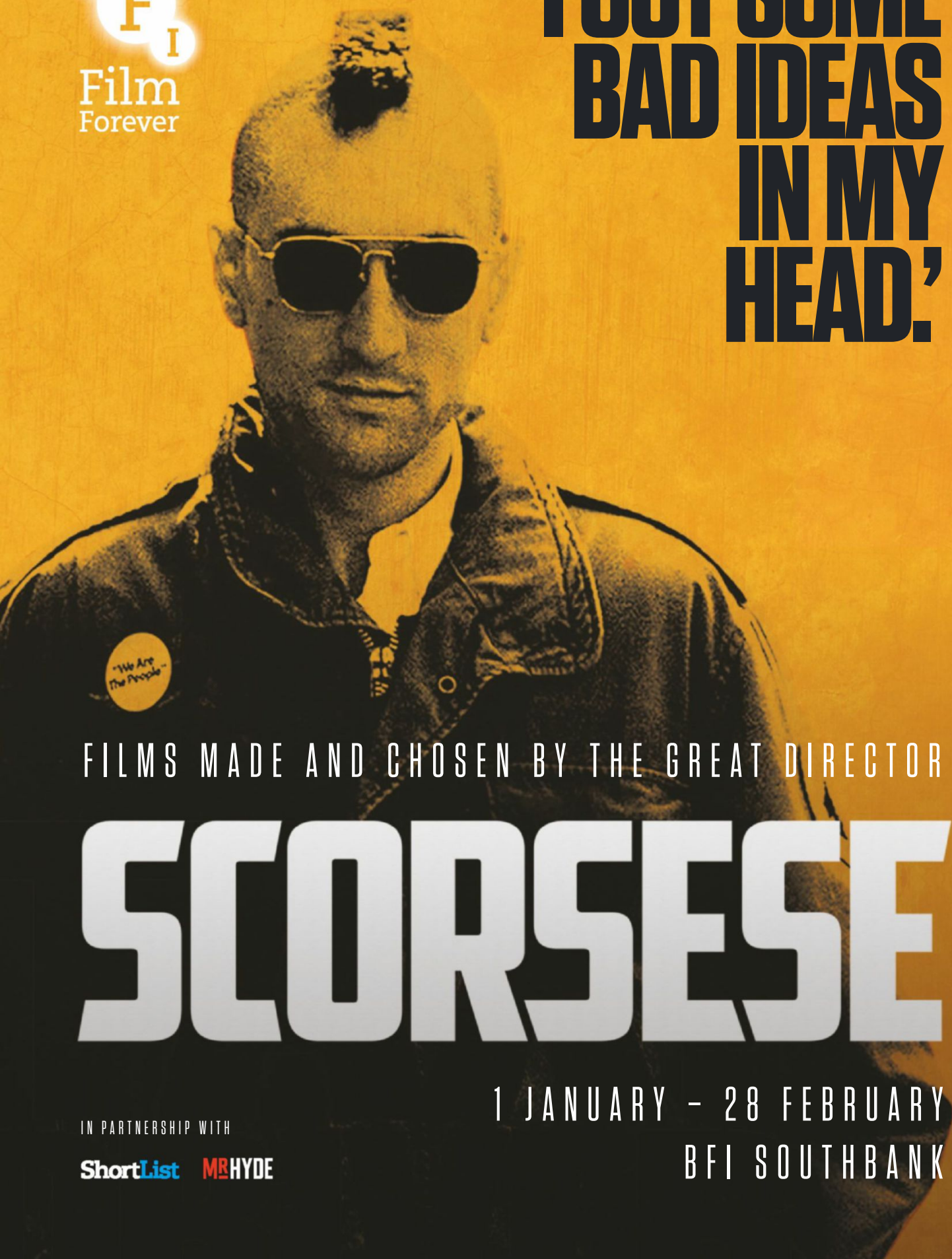
