Four years after conquering the world with 'Royals' and 'Tennis Court', Lorde is back. A good time to revisit these magnificent words she posted on Facebook in November, about turning 20 and her imminent second album

"I maxed out every single emotion I have in the best possible way, the colours still aching behind my eyes like this weird blissful hangover."

"My heart broke. I moved out of home and into the city and I made new friends and started to realise that no one is just good or bad, that everyone is both. I started to discover in a profound, scary, blood-aching way who I was when I was alone, what I did when I did things only for myself. I was reckless and graceless and terrifying and tender. I threw sprawling parties and sat in restaurants until the early hours, learning what it's like to be an adult, even talking like one sometimes, until I caught myself. All I wanted to do was dance. I whispered into ears and let my eyes blaze on high and for the first time I felt this intimate, empire-sized inner power."

"And then I wrote a record about it, all of it, so much more than what I've written down here, and I'm in New York getting it done. And tomorrow, I'm not a kid any more, and more and more I'm realising that the weirdness of those Mylar balloons is going to be okay. Writing 'Pure Heroine' was my way of enshrining our teenage glory, putting it up in lights forever so that part of me never dies, and this record well, this one is about what comes next."

"I want nothing more than to spill my guts RIGHT NOW about the whole thing – I want you to see the album cover, pore over the lyrics (the best I've written in my life), touch the merch, experience the live show. I can hardly stop myself from typing out the name. I just need to keep working a while longer to make it as good as it can be. You'll have to hold on. The big day is soon. I know you understand."

Soon, Massachusetts rock sensations PVRIS will release their second album and tour the US with Muse and The 1975. Singer Lynn 'Gunn' Gunnulfsen is ready for the major leagues

Why did you go down so well with fans on your recent tour with Bring Me The Horizon?

"They've always been a band that aren't afraid to push boundaries and evolve while still remaining true to their core entity. Their fanbase has grown with them and always been incredibly receptive and enthusiastic towards that, and it's amazing to witness. Our band has the same mentality and confidence in taking risks – as long as it remains cathartic and real, perhaps that's what their fans have picked up on."

When you were writing debut album 'White Noise' you said you were in a very "dark place" in your mind. Will the next record sound more hopeful and optimistic?

"Looking back, I can assure you that 'dark place' was nothing compared to where I found myself during and after the record cycle – it got worse. I've found myself in an even darker place. This next record

will not sound hopeful or optimistic, at least not in a blatantly obvious manner, and I'm not quite sure if our music ever fully will. It'll always possess melancholy undertones. That being said, there are ways to find growth and constructiveness through the times and situations we label as negative."

It must be terrifying living under the rule of Donald Trump. Has that given you any kind of musical reaction lately?

"Definitely. This is a time of heightened anger, fear, sadness. More than ever, people are looking for something to latch onto – whether that's on the most personal levels or the broadest. Everything on this record was written before the election and it was written from incredibly personal areas of my life, but current events have made me take a deeper look into those subjects and emotions."

You've been very outspoken about your dislike for religious hypocrisy. Have you seen any increase in that in society at large?

"Oh, absolutely. I dislike hypocrisy in any environment. The world's in a very volatile state but I think in time, most likely after much more confusion and chaos unfortunately, it'll find its balance again. I truly think that humanity as a whole is capable of working together to reach that, slowly but surely. While all the negative and dividing factors have been so apparent lately, unity and fire and compassion are just as apparent, which gives me so much hope."


Man and Suspiria to take a sledgehammer to the patriarchy. The film tells the story of Elaine, a woman who uses sex magic to

He considered a name change "for a fresh start". His choice? "Redward. Edward with an 'R'. As in Jedward, who came along afterwards."

It's because he received "quite a few death threats" when he first made waves in 2011.



HE'S ANTI-SMARTPHONE

During his year away from music, travelling the world to visit countries he'd toured but never seen very much of, he ditched his iPhone and never wanted to go back to it. "I enjoy life without a phone – it's a lot less hassle," he said.



HE ONCE GOT A BARBIE DOLL FOR HIS BIRTHDAY

It was a gift from his brother. He definitely didn't ask for it. Absolutely not.



HE WAS BORN TO SOUNDTRACK THE HOBBIT

When Sheeran was asked to write a song for Peter Jackson's film The Hobbit: The Desolation Of Smayg, it was the culmination of a life-long fascination with Tolkien's classic story. His grandfather's first edition of the novel was the first book that Sheeran's father ever read to him.



PETER JACKSON STRAPPED HIM TO A PLANE

As soon as he got the call about *The Hobbit* from Jackson, Sheeran raced from a wedding in Ibiza to Wellington, New Zealand, where the director keeps his collection of WWI airplanes. "He strapped me to the front of one of them and flew me around." Sheeran told *Entertainment Tonight*.



NANDO'S MADE A SAUCE FOR HIM

After he posed for a photo holding what's believed to be a mythical Nando's black card, allowing him free food from their restaurants whenever he likes, the peri-peri chicken chain went one further and created a special 'Ed's Peri-Peri Sauce' with his face on.



PIZZA EXPRESS MADE HIM A TRIBUTE PIZZA

For his 26th birthday, Pizza Express created the Ed-Abrese, a birthday pizza 'cake' made from Calabrese ingredients.



HIS VIDEO FOR 'THE A-TEAM' COST £20

It paid for fishnet stockings and a crack pipe.



HE'S TATTOO BROS WITH HARRY STYLES

They have matching Pingu tattoos. Hard-nut Sheeran went for the full portrait while soft-boy Styles just had the name done.



HARRY STYLES IS BLACKMAILING HIM

Styles has a video of a young Ed performing in a school production of *Grease*, and he's threatened to publish if Sheeran upsets him.













HE'S A FRESH PRINCE FANATIC

When Sheeran occasionally drops the rap from *The Fresh Prince Of Bel-Air* into his songs onstage, it's just a hint of his obsession with Will Smith's '90s show – he's even had a tattoo in honour of it. Although, that said, Sheeran has had so many tattoos he's probably got one about *Celebs Go Dating* on there somewhere.



HE SPENT A WEEK SLEEPING ON THE CIRCLE LINE...

For a week during his much talked-about homeless years in London, Sheeran would finish gigs, stay up drinking into the early hours, wait until 5am for the tube to open and then get four hours' sleep on the Circle Line.

HE OBSESSIVELY TRACKS HIS SALES

After every media appearance, Sheeran leaps online to check how the publicity has affected his sales. "It's just because I've never been good at anything before," he told *The Big Issue*. "I never won anything at sports, any academic award. This is the only thing in my life that I can win at. Unless Adele's about, obviously."



HE WAS DISCOVERED BY JAMIE FOXX

The first of Sheeran's numerous big breaks came when he landed a slot on Jamie Foxx's radio show in LA. He ended up hanging out in Foxx's Hollywood mansion as the major labels began circling.



HE COULD NAIL STRICTLY

Ed took two ballroom dancing teachers on tour with him for three weeks and spent five hours a day practising for the 'Thinking Out Loud' video, which has racked up a staggering 1.5 billion YouTube views.



HE'S CONSIDERING MAKING '-', AN ACOUSTIC RECORD

If he continues with his mathematically themed album titles, the next will have to be '-', which he's thought about making a stripped-back affair on which he'll "take away from the production".



HE CAN FIT A LOT OF STUFF IN HIS MOUTH

A video of a teenage Sheeran online proves that he can stuff a grand total of 40 Maltesers in his mouth before gagging.

'Afire Love' from 'x' was dedicated to his Irish Catholic grandfather who suffered from Alzheimer's for 20 years before his death in 2013. Sheeran finished writing the song at his funeral.

HIS ACTING NEEDED SPECIAL HELP

In the film *Bridget Jones's Baby*, actor Sarah Solemani wanted him to look more taken aback during their scene, so she surprised him by stripping off and dancing in her underwear.



HE HELPS PEOPLE HAVE SEX

"A cousin of mine went on a girls' trip," Sheeran's said. "They were in a bar and a dude came up saying, 'Do you wanna come back to mine? I've got a song on the radio – my name's Ed Sheeran.' Apparently it works for him. There's loads of ginger people who are having a lot of fun. I'm not hating on it – we're finally getting laid!"



HE MADE A FANTASTIC GINGERBREAD MAN AT HALLOWEEN

Before he named his record label Gingerbread, Sheeran had dressed as the Gingerbread Man from *Shrek* on Halloween in 2013.

"I still wear skater hoodies, jeans and skater shoes," he told the men's style mag.



HE'S WORKING TO A 15-ALBUM MAXIMUM

"The first five EPs, then the first album '+', then 'x' and now '÷'. There'll be two more in this series of five albums and then five more after that," he's explained. "My benchmark for the second album was Coldplay. This album ['÷'], it's Springsteen... I do have numerical targets. I did 14 million of 'x' and I want to do 20 million of '÷'... 




DRINK

Gather in the cool courtyard of the Hotel San Jose (1) for wine and micheladas or head to Perla's (2) for cocktails on the patio. If you're after something with no frills, kick back with a cold beer at the Continental Club (3) and drink like a local.

FOOD

Open 24/7, the Magnolia Café (4) is a classic diner with a twist, where you can pick up traditional American food like mac 'n' cheese, as well as sturdy Tex-Mex cuisine. Guero's Taco Bar (5) offers straight up Mexican munch, with vegan and gluten-free options, and Home Slice Pizza (6) is great if you're after food in a hurry, with a takeout slice hatch as well as a sit-down restaurant and the finest pizza in town. Feeling flush? Then sophisticated Japanese spot Otoko (7) is the one for you.





Street is as picturesque as it is buzzing

FOOD

Street food fans rejoice - there are food trucks and late night eats aplenty here. Banger's (1) serves up 101 beers and nearly as many sausages on its huge patio, while down the road at Craft Pride (2) you can pick from a selection of 50 Texan craft beers. When you've worked up an appetite choose from G'Raj Mahal (3), an outpost of a former food truck that serves tasty Indian fare, or Art of Tacos (4) where traditional Mexican tacos are the order for the day. Pizza trailer Via 313 (5) is also worth a visit.



DRINK

Rainey Street is great for bars and many of them are found in gorgeous old converted wooden houses – often with huge garden patios – and the artfully dilapidated Lustre Pearl (6) is a must-visit. For the full experience, order Black Eyes: local beer with a shot of Jack Daniel's. Cocktails abound at craft cocktail haven Half-Step (7) (check out the Floradora – gin, lime and raspberry) and the velvet-clad Lucille (8), with a menu of signature Martinis.



The three districts (Sixth Street, West Sixth Street and East Sixth Street) pack in a whole lot of different vibes



FOOD

Austin is well known for its delicious way with BBQ meat. Veggies look away now, but if you're into brisket, pulled pork and all other barbequed delights, then hit up the Rollin Smoke truck (1) for their house special, the Playboy sandwich. Other 6th Street food trucks worth a visit are Baton Creole (2), for Louisiana street snacks like fried jambalaya on a stick, and for Asian fusion delicacies that vegetarians will love, look no further than East Side King (3).



You're never more than a few metres away from a bar on 6th Street, but if you need a little help finding the perfect spot, we suggest starting at the Midnight Cowboy speakeasy (4) – if you can find it – and then winding your way down to hipster dive Shangri-La (5) for happy hour on the outdoor patio before classy sake cocktails at Ah Sing Den (6).



MUSIC


The music leg of SXSW spreads itself all over Austin every March, but the bars and venues of 6th Street are the perfect place to start if you're feeling a touch overwhelmed by the huge scale of the yearly event. From the swanky Driskill Hotel (7) to the

rooftop deck of Maggie Mae's (8), there are brilliant bands all over the bustling city hub. 6th Street is also a serious destination even when SXSW isn't in full swing – Austin is, of course, the Live Music Capital of the World® and you can find bands playing nightly up and down the strip at Parish, The Belmont, Flamingo Cantina and, NME's personal fave, Hotel Vegas (9), which is one of the city's quirkier venues.



FILM

The branch of Alamo Drafthouse (10) on East 6th Street is just one of six in Austin; the independent cinema offers cult classics, new films and endurance-testing filmathons and themed events – with great food and drink on tap to keep you going throughout. Austin also becomes the film capital of the world during SXSW Film Festival, which takes place in March every year in the run-up to the madness of the music event.



Three blocks packed with barbeque joints, courtyards and banging live music



MUSIC

Austin institution Stubb's Bar-B-Q (1) isn't just a place to get unbelievable barbeque food, it's also one of Austin's best gig venues, with indoor and outdoor shows from acts including Catfish & The Bottlemen, who appear in May. The nearby Mohawk (2) is another essential bar/eatery/venue, with a year-round programme of bands. Find more local bands in Beerland (3), a great little dive with cheap drinks.



DRINK

Lively nights are guaranteed on Red River. Hit Barbarella (4) for a packed dancefloor, a labyrinth of dimly lit rooms and an alternative music policy, or head next door to Swan Dive (5) to relax. Or check out Cheer Up Charlies (6) for a huge, lively bar with indoor and outdoor areas, kombucha on tap and live music framed by a natural limestone rock wall that borders the outdoor stage.





MUSIC

The Moody Theatre (1) is home to Austin City Limits Live, which birthed the annual Austin City Limits festival and offers huge-name performers in a modern venue with state-of-theart lighting and sound, plus a statue of Willie Nelson outside. The xx are playing there soon. Elsewhere, you'll find nightly jazz and excellent craft beer at the neon-lit, underground Elephant Room (2) and open-air gigs amid the skyscrapers at Cedar Street Courtyard (3).



Expect big names at Austin City Limits Music Festival

OUTDOOR

Austin enjoys long, hot summers, meaning you'll need somewhere to cool off. Walkable from Downtown is the 351-acre Zilker Park, home to popular swimming spot Barton Springs Pool (4).



FESTIVALS

Zilker Park (4) is home to Austin City Limits, the giant music festival in the heart of the city that takes place over two weekends every October. This year's line-up is yet to be announced, but previous performers include Kendrick Lamar, Radiohead and Mumford & Sons. So pretty big.



SPORT

Austin is home to the Formula One United States Grand Prix. You can find the Circuit of The Americas (4) in Elroy, where the annual event takes place. Taylor Swift even played her only show of 2016 by the track.

OUTDOOR

Head just outside of the city and you can go hiking, biking and more. NLand (5) is the US's first artificial surf park, so you can catch some waves even though you're nowhere near the beach. There are plenty of inspirational walking trails if you don't fancy getting wet. Get on your bike - or hire one - for action-packed cycle trails through Walnut Creek (6) and Slaughter Creek (7).

Telly funnyman Russell Howard has just kicked off a massive world tour that puts him firmly in comedy's premier league. He tells Larry Bartleet why he's not yet demanding Weetabix from strangers

You're famous for talking about good news, but there's not loads of it about at the moment. Has that impacted on your new touring show?

"Yeah, it's loads of stuff about politics. Loads of stuff about anger. Yeah, it's mostly politics and anger at the moment. I don't think we've ever been more divided. It's only right-wing f**k-knuckles that grab the public's attention – Farage or Trump or Le Pen or Wilders from Holland. You think, 'Where are our Gandhis? Where are our Martin Luther Kings?'"

What are your politics?

"I think all our leaders are utterly beneath us. You just watch Prime Minister's Questions and go, 'How is this the best that we've got?'"

Didn't you once get approached by some political parties for advice on talking to young people?

"They interrupted when I was watching *The Secret Life Of Pets*. Like, I am *not* the go-to person to fix this country. You know you're in real trouble when you're thinking: 'OK, ask that bloke off the telly, see what he thinks.' Where does that f**king end up – doorstepping Joey Essex? Like, 'Alright, he wants inflatables. Can we get some?'"

You're really quite famous now, Russ. How do you stay grounded?

"I just have my brain. I find it really weird, when I'm shopping in Tesco, the amount of times I have people like, 'What you doing in here? You're famous!' Well, I'm not going to f**king clap my hands and go, 'You in the street, get me Weetabix!'"

Let's talk money. How do you spend your riches?

"I bought my mum a car and I bought my brother one of those hoverboards for Christmas, and I bought my family a holiday to Australia. Those are some recent things I've done with my money."

What about weird hobbies or collections, though? You must have some, come on.

"I buy a lot of Liverpool trinkets. I've got Philippe Coutinho's boot – I spent three grand on that. Which, you know, is insane. But it's Philippe Coutinho's boot, what you gonna do?"

Are you famous in any surprising countries?

"Apparently the ...Good News YouTube channel has quite a big following in North Korea and Vatican City. It's just really funny to think that there's some cardinal slinking off, 'Just off for a bit of fast-paced satire, see you in a bit!'"

"Yes. The new October: it'll be ...Good News and Ne

Does that change the way you approach your material?

"Like what, am I going to do a gig in North Korea? No, f**k no!"

You are playing Dubai, though. Do you think you'll have to adapt your act at all for the local morality laws?

"I'll just crack on and do whatever, I think. Hopefully I don't end up in prison for a f**king joke. S**t! I hadn't thought about that..."

Are there any other strict countries like that on your tour?

"I'm doing a week of gigs in China, so I had to send a video of me performing in Hereford – I think for some guy in the Chinese government to check whether it's allowed to be said. I just feel so sorry for him. Poor sod's got to traipse through everything I say – like, 'What does he mean? What are Ginger Nuts?'"

You play a fair few music festivals. What's that like as a comedian?

"You feel like a piece of wool being pushed around by a cat. It's brilliant. When I did Leeds, all I said was 'Alan', and then literally 5,000 people started going 'Steve!' Apparently it's a YouTube clip of a squirrel? Mate, I had no idea. That was the first time I learnt about 'd**ks out for Harambe' too. I was chatting about the gorilla that got shot, and this bloke got his c**k out. I'm like, 'What you doing?' and he's like, 'D**ks out for Harambe'. Again the crowd chanted it – and you're like, 'What the f**k is going on?'"

You mentioned ... Good News – has that stopped now that you've signed up with Sky?

"Yes. The new show doesn't start 'til October: it'll be like a hybrid between ... Good News and a chat show."

Speaking of good news - is there any at the moment?

"There's a lady in Hull who dresses up as a bee."

As a bee. "Yeah"

What?

"I think she's 85, and she dresses up as a bee to raise money for Age Concern [now Age UK]. I think she's raised like £170,000. Every Saturday she dresses up as a bee and raises money for lonely people. She's absolutely incredible. There should be a section at the end of the BBC News that just has a little clip of her every day, going, 'And in other news, that little old lady is still dressing up as a bee and raising money for other little old ladies.' F**king right."

"Doing this has changed my world for ever - I'm all-in."

MINIMAL ANGRY POETRY

SLEAFORD MODS HAVE made a name for themselves as the stripped-back sound of austerity Britain. Over minimal laptop beats courtesy of Andrew Fearn, lead agitator Jason Williamson has marked out his turf as part Mark E Smith of cult post-punkers The Fall and part foul-mouthed John Betjeman in the body of a This Is England extra. His words - and there are lots and lots of words - don't sugar-coat. They are at turns funny, bleak and furious, taking to task big business, the government and rubbish indie bands with equal amounts of glee and derision.

'English Tapas' is the Nottingham duo's first album on the Rough Trade label, named after they spotted the phrase on a pub menu advertising a platter of chips, a scotch egg, a mini pork pie and some pickle. "It says everything about this f**king place," said Williamson. "It's comedy, it's make-do, it's ignorant and above all, it's s**t." British s**tness finds itself at the centre of this 11-track collection, from the takedown of Sir Philip Green, his super-yacht and disregard for workers on 'BHS'

to sneering mentions of Snapchat, selfies and Superdry on 'Snout'. In fact, no one is safe from Williamson's scorn. The doomy 'Dull' even has a pop at us. "Try scrolling down the website of the NME / Without laughing / I'll give you ten quid if you can keep a straight face," he rants. Sorry you're not into it, babes.

Their stark sound might not be for everyone, but Williamson's sideways swipes at pop culture and his own big nights out are as hypnotic as Fearn's punked-up electronica which, despite its simplicity, is nigh impossible not to move to. Never stop being p**sed off guys – because it just sounds far too excellent when you're in a mood. Leonie Cooper

The history makers

New documentary about the greatest moment in Welsh football history

DON'T TAKE ME HOME

Chris Coleman, Gareth Bale, Ashlev Williams



THERE ARE LONGsuffering sports fans... and then there are followers of the Welsh national football team. Until last summer's Euros, it had been almost 60 years since Wales had qualified for a major

tournament. After decades of agonising near-misses, finally, in 2016, they made it.

Don't Take Me Home - named after the supporters' chant that would become synonymous with the team's unlikely successful run - tells the story of Wales' giddy summer in France.

Award-winning Merthyr Tydfil documentary maker Jonny Owen pieces together match highlights, behind-the-scenes smartphone footage and new interviews with key figures. Likeable and articulate manager Chris Coleman takes the lead.


It begins by going back further, revisiting the challenging circumstances surrounding his appointment following

the shocking death in 2011 of former coach, and Coleman's close friend, Gary Speed. It was a painful period, but one that would galvanise a group of players who would go on to make history.

In the competition five years later, Wales' success was a classic, plucky-underdog sports story. It revisits their win over Slovakia in their opening match, the last ditch loss to England and their sensational performance against Russia on their way to topping the group, and ultimately an unlikely appearance in the last four against the tournament's eventual winners Portugal.

Of course, this wasn't a

real-life Miracle On Ice. When the thousands of fans - 'The Red Wall' - lined the streets of Cardiff to welcome the squad home, there was no trophy. But they'd jumped more than 100 places in the world rankings over four years and became the smallest country to ever reach the semi-final of a major tournament. It was about pride and team spirit. The contagious joy in the film is seeing the stuff outside of the games: the small moments of the players bonding, Gareth Bale messing about on a golf buggy and captain Ashley Williams recalling how he'd watch Rocky IV on match day, plus the countless shots of fans having the time of their lives. It's cheesy in parts, sure, but it'd struggle not to be. As one exhilarated supporter towards the end puts it: "We've taken too many hours off work, we've spent too much money, but do we care? No!" films) is so vastly talented that
the prospect of the three
on screen together should
have any film fan salivating.
They prove a combustible
combination in Trespass Against
Us, even if a thin script doesn't
offer them much fuel.

At the heart of this spotty drama is Chad (Fassbender), the heir apparent of a small traveller community. Extremely skilled as a getaway driver and a thief, Chad wants out of his current existence and is making plans to take his small family to a quieter camp, where they can live a more innocent life. Standing in his way is his dad, Col (Brendan Gleeson). A wannabe Don Corleone in a second-hand shell suit, Col expects the world to bend to his will. His son should do anything asked of him and his word should be unquestioningly followed. He's so pompous that he believes the Earth is flat because his father told him so, and any attempt to correct him is disrespect. He's the most dangerous kind of authoritarian: a thick one.

These are good, solid characters. Archetypes, certainly – the prideful, fading father; the defiant but frightened son – but you can do surprising things with archetypes. Alastair Siddons' screenplay, though, doesn't. The paths these men take are well worn and as the film progresses it's up to the viewer to plug the gaps in the characters based on what we know about their type. Col is feared by all, but the film only really shows him to be petty and vindictive. There seems a link missing between Chad's love of crime and his insistence that he's done with it, but we know how to join those up.

Harris is the hastiest sketch, as a simpleton coddled by Col. Watching Fassbender and Gleeson go at each other is as compulsive as you'd hope. These are two great actors who feed hungrily off each other. It's a shame they're not given material that draws out parts we don't know. This talent combination ought to surprise instead of simply satisfy. Olly Richards
