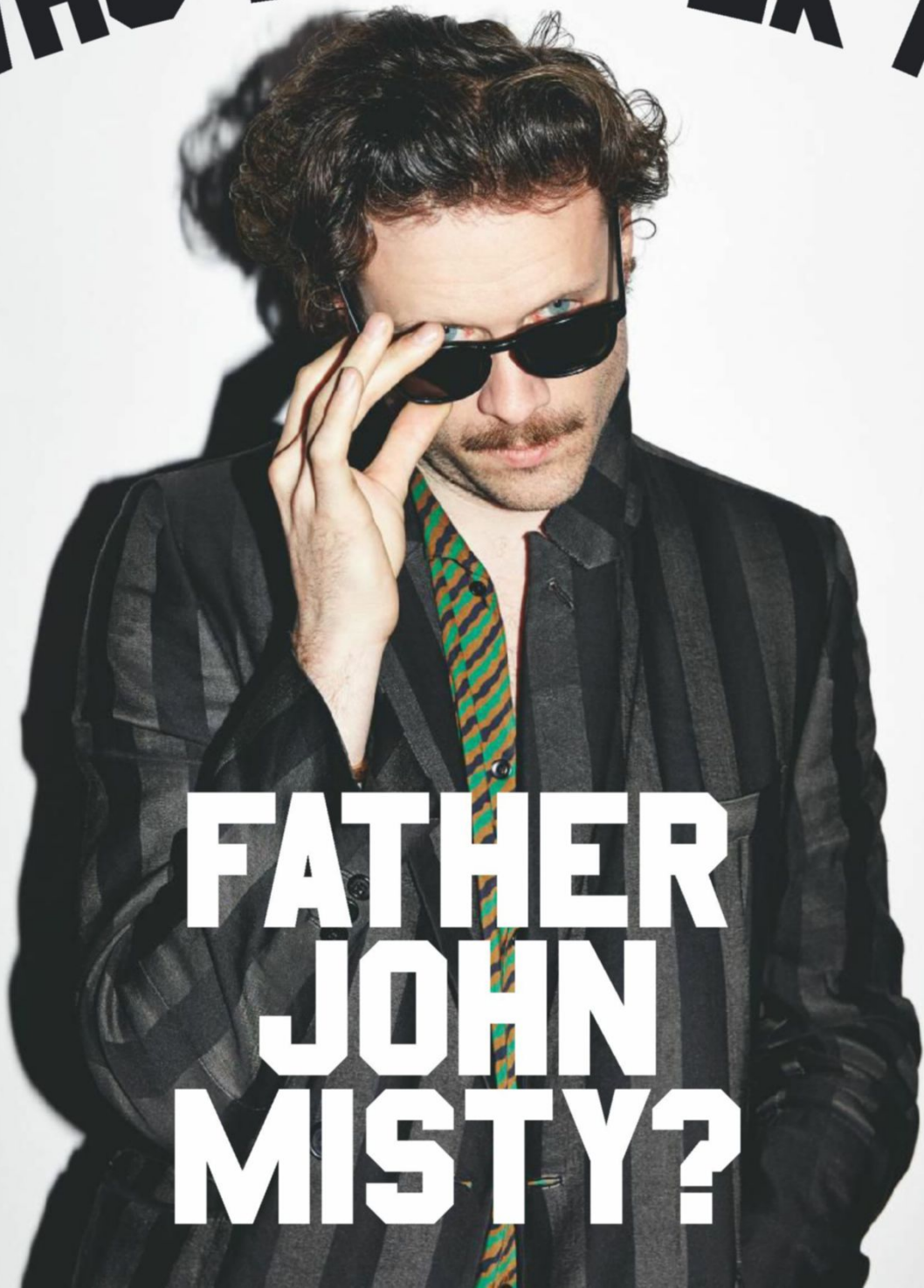

Lorde and Jack Antonoff

Jack of all trades

Former fun. guitarist Jack Antonoff – AKA Bleachers – also co-writes mega-hits for megastars, including Taylor Swift, Sia and Zayn. He tells us about his most recent sparring partner: Lorde

[Yelich-O'Connor, AKA Lorde], we both love pop songs that are interesting on the production side and also have a lot to do with break-ups, which can be devastating. Making 'Green Light', we thought: 'Let's not dumb anything down, let's make the pop music we love.'"

Bleachers albums, it's a very different thing. On [new single] 'Don't Take The Money' you can hear me rolling around on my chair in the studio, making this sound of being a mess and trying to hold it together, trying to make sense of it."

You make your music at the studio in the apartment you share with girlfriend Lena Dunham. What's it like to have two such creative people in the same house?

"We support each other and give each other space. With Lena's work, I look at it as a fan. I say if I like it or not. She's my actual audience too, a human being trying to connect with music on an emotional level."

How is it different working with a big star compared to working alone on solo stuff?

"I have one goal. When I'm with someone else I'm not trying to write what I think a hit is. I'm trying to write something very special that wouldn't have happened if these two people were never together. I think to myself: 'How does 1 + 1 = a million?' When I'm making

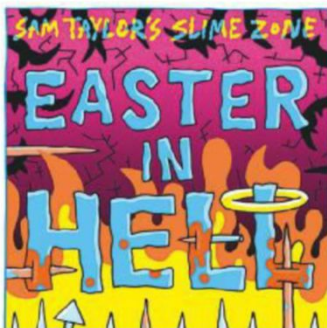

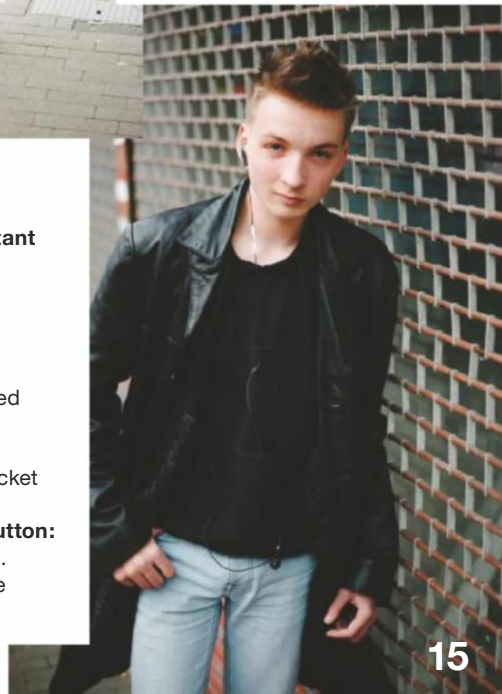

ESTEEM

Father John Misty's last album made him a sex symbol, folk-rock superstar and collaborator with pop's A-list. It also made him a totem of everything he hates. As he releases new album 'Pure Comedy', Barry Nicolson meets a man contemplating life, religion, power and whether he's a "pretentious douchebag"

FATHER JOHN MISTY wants you to know that he doesn't know it all. The singer-songwriter, real name Josh Tillman, may be all things to all people – hirsute hipster-folk shaman, unlikely sex symbol, incorrigible bulls**t artist – but nobody ever mistook him for a sage. Sure, he's just written an album about the absurdity of the human condition, and at one point during our interview will even wonder aloud if he's stumbled upon the meaning of life itself (see later), but his epiphanies invariably come with disclaimers of self-doubt.

Case in point: the response to 'Pure Comedy', Tillman's third album under his alias of Father John Misty. Its 13 songs are a caustic, soulful and hilarious howl of existential exasperation, but according to Tillman, the general consensus thus far, at the time of our interview pre-release, is that they're "preachy, tuneless, self-indulgent and depressing. I think most people aren't able to see beyond this idea that's cultivated around me, that everything I do is disingenuous or insincere. They see me as a charlatan, and that disdain is probably what's going to ruin this record, which is too bad because it's actually very sincere. The phrase I see most often is 'pretentious douchebag'. You can put that one on my tombstone."

This is a favourite rhetorical tic of Tillman's. Ask him a question and he'll preface his answer with statements like, "This won't look good in print..." or, "This will sound insufferably grandiose..." before concluding with the fait accompli of his artistic failure, or mocking himself as "an elitist blowhard who thinks he's too good for a Chipotle commercial" (a credo which caused him to turn down \$250,000 of the restaurant chain's "burrito money" last year). In between, he might make insightful, well-argued observations on everything from the Syrian refugee crisis to the co-opting of folk music by the advertising industry, but by the time he stops talking, you can bet he'll have found a new way to call himself an a**hole. "I'm a dramatic, depressive person," he tells me. "I've engineered my life so that my only value in this world is in my writing, which is really dangerous, because if it's a failure, then my life is meaningless."

The last Father John Misty album far exceeded Tillman's own modest definition

of success, so perhaps it makes sense that he's become obsessed with failure. Released in 2015, 'I Love You, Honeybear' was a saucy, self-excoriating look at his romantic transgressions and white male ennui, whose humour and candour found a larger audience than the eight bloodless folk albums he'd previously recorded under his real name. Suddenly, Tillman was no longer "the guy who used to drum in Fleet Foxes" but an enigmatic folk-rock superstar who collaborated with Lady Gaga, cavorted with models in a Lana Del Rey video and even scored a writing credit on Beyoncé's 'Hold Up'.

Yet, while Father John Misty's songs came from a place of ruthless honesty, everything else about him was viewed through the prism of irony. Onstage, he was arch and sardonic; away from it, he earned a reputation as a first-rate troll by, among other things, covering Taylor Swift in the style of Lou Reed (purely to bait alt-country star Ryan Adams, who recorded his own take on Swift's '1989'), launching a fake streaming service (which only contained muzak versions of his own songs) and 'confessing' to the theft of a quartz healing crystal from an LA juice bar (don't ask). Tillman undoubtedly had a lot of fun along the way, but as he points out, "the last album cycle started with me on *David Letterman*, in a suit with a fresh haircut, yukking it up in front of a player

piano. It ends with me bedraggled and f**ked-up onstage at a festival, screaming about entertainment..."

The incident he's referring to occurred last summer at New Jersey's XPoNential Music Festival, when Tillman, disturbed by Donald Trump's speech at the Republican National Convention, used his set to deliver a lecture to the crowd ("the most incoherent thing I've ever said") about Trump's "clichéd evil" and the role of the entertainment industry in making his rise possible. As he concluded that day, "You may be bummed that homeless Chris Isaak is up here in a half-unbuttoned shirt telling you that entertainment is stupid, but it may be the only thing that sticks out about the hickory-smoked f**king abortion that this culture is."

Tillman calls Trump, "the perfect symbol of the failure of our culture", but as an entertainer, he also considers himself part of the problem. "People used to see things that disgusted them and say, 'I never want to see that again.' Now we've reached the point where we see things that are disturbing and revolting to us, but we want to see more and more of it. The scary thing is that a lot of liberals are waking up every morning thinking, 'I can't wait to see



what horrible thing Trump's done now.”

Trump's victory affected Tillman in unexpected ways: for one thing, he shaved off his beard the day after the election (“People will roll their eyes at that, but I just felt crazy”) and now claims he'll never play his signature tune ‘Bored In The USA’ again, citing its “ineffectual liberal platitudes” as something he can no longer stand behind. Yet, while nothing on ‘Pure Comedy’ would have been invalidated by a different outcome last November, he does question whether his history of douchebaggery makes him the wrong vessel for its message.

“When this record comes out,” he declares, “all anybody is going to care about is the Taylor Swift line.” The line in question – “*Bedding Taylor Swift every night inside the Oculus Rift*” – appears on ‘Total Entertainment Forever’, a song that wonders where our growing addiction to entertainment may eventually lead us. The answer plays out like an episode of ‘Black Mirror’, as the human race becomes permanently plugged into what Tillman describes as “a narcotic state of total entertainment, where we're never bored and never have to feel despair again – and maybe that's the answer to the meaning of life.”

All of which sounds suitably dystopian, and entirely plausible. But about that Taylor Swift lyric... “Oh, I tried to think of someone else who rhymed with ‘Oculus Rift’, but I just couldn't. I don't want that to happen to Taylor Swift, but look at the hope people once had for the internet as the tool of true democracy, and now we mostly just use it for pornography.

“If you don't think that one of the first things they're gonna do with VR is figure out a way for you to have sex with any famous person you want, you're kidding yourself. But I knew that line would sink the whole album, that people would get mad and call me a misogynist, because right below pornography, our second favourite form of entertainment is outrage.”

Another new track, ‘Leaving LA’, is either a remarkable 13-minute portrait of the artist as a self-loathing middle-aged man or, as the song describes itself, “*some 10-verse, chorus-less diatribe*”, that will horrify and alienate his fans. It imagines an encounter between Tillman and the Buddhist demon Mara, who ridicules him for being “another white guy in 2017 who takes himself so goddamn seriously”. The moral of the story, he explains, “is that we all have to face the fear that we're delusional. When you write songs and put them into the world, you're vulnerable to criticism. The strange thing is, when I started doing this,

I thought to myself, ‘I'm not gonna be one of those white guys living in a white-guy romantic fantasy – I'm gonna take myself to task.’ Fast-forward five years, and when people think of a clichéd, bearded, white-guy singer-songwriter, it's my name that comes up. I set out to be a real human, not a cartoon character, and now I am the cartoon character...”

Tillman was raised in an evangelical Christian household, and while he no longer believes in God, “I still talk to him a lot.” Given the anxiety and confusion he feels about the state of the world, however, I can't help wondering if he misses the spiritual certitude of organised religion.

“No, because it was terrifying,” he replies. “My whole childhood I was convinced that I was going to hell, and when the idea of demonic possession entered the scene, that really scared me.” The closest Tillman comes to a religious experience these days is through songwriting. “When I first discovered that, I was like, ‘Oh, so *this* is the feeling of transcendence everyone was talking about’.

“There's a song on the album called ‘When The God Of Love Returns’ that imagines this scenario when God comes back and we're all like, ‘F**k you! You have no right to judge us, you made us this way!’ In Genesis, God made the world because he was bored and lonely, and that's why we make things, too. We make things to be understood, which is why it's so tragic to make something and only become more misunderstood. If the music I make just pushes people further away, that's real failure.”

There's more to connect with on ‘Pure Comedy’ than Tillman gives himself credit for – look beyond its black humour and penchant for apocalypse, and you'll find an album full of warmth, empathy and admiration, even, for our over-achieving “race of demented monkeys”. Not for nothing does its final track, ‘In 20 Years Or So’, end on a note of reassurance, with Tillman singing over and over that, “*There's nothing to fear.*”

“You can look at that line and say, ‘You idiot, look at the world! There's everything to fear!’ But I don't think there's any virtue in fear: it's just a choice. You can choose to live in love, or choose to live in fear. That sounds naive, but I don't think the answers are as sophisticated as we wish they were.” Being the “insufferable know-it-all” that he is, Tillman has one such answer he'd like to propose. In the 1,800-word essay he wrote accompanying the album, he posits a return to what he calls the ‘Vedic cycle’, where humanity goes back to its primal

hunter-gatherer scene and every day that we manage not to get eaten by a bear constitutes progress. It's a hard sell, but he's sticking to his guns. “That essay is about the core irony that our boundless appetite for progress and entertainment and advancement are the same things that make us unhappy, that destroy the environment, that isolate us from one another. We take it for granted that we can walk down the street and not

worry about a lion dismembering us, but if it gets a couple degrees hotter, we'll probably have no choice but to re-enter the natural order.”

And how would he fare in that bear-eat-man natural order? “Me?” he laughs. “If I got sent out on a hunting expedition, the first thing I'd do would be to lay down in the rain with my mouth open and wait to drown. I'm too philosophical to survive.” Now, there's an epitaph worthy of Josh Tillman's tombstone. **NME**

WAVING around Cardiff train station on an old bike, dressed in leggings, a black hoodie and football boots “for the grip”, 27-year-old Astroid Boys vocalist Benji Kendell cuts a faintly ridiculous figure. Since recording the filthy, furious grime-punk band’s as-yet-untitled debut album, he’s taken to cycling for hours in the Welsh countryside to try to stay out of trouble. It’s what he plans to do later on today, straight after his lunchtime interview alongside 25-year-old bandmate Phil ‘Traxx’ Davies, who arrives in black turn-ups and a zip-up coat. The pair co-founded the five-piece band around a decade ago after meeting at a house party. “There’s a video of us in this council flat,” Kendell explains, settling in a sedate brew-house pub. “We’re both taking it in turns on the mic and it’s quite obvious that there’s tension. But that tension grew into a bond. We both understand the work-rate that’s needed.”

It has to be said, that work-rate hasn’t resulted in a breathless output to date: just two EPs, ‘Bacon Dream’ and ‘CF10’, both of which came out in 2015, have appeared so far. In part, this is because Kendell spent 16 months in prison for unlawful wounding in 2014. He was attacked by a group of men and stabbed an assailant in the neck with a broken bottle.

“I was mad at myself because I’d hurt somebody,” he recently told the BBC.

Kendell’s jail time came when work was well underway on ‘Bacon Dream’, a record that combines grime beats, punk bile and towering, looping riffs that sound suspiciously like nu-metal. Traxx was left to finish and tour the EP without Kendell.

“I had the boys on the phone saying, ‘Bro, it’s looking good for you when you come out,’” Kendell explains. “I had purpose, I had something to look forward to, but for all I knew the buzz around ‘Bacon Dream’ could have ended naturally by the time I was released.” He spent the time inside writing an autobiography and preparing to work on ‘CF10’, which was recorded upon his release.

His incarceration also caused difficulties on the ‘CF10’ UK tour. Kendell was electronically tagged, so the band played daytime shows and raced home in time for his 7pm curfew. “We played a sold-out show at [east London venue] The Old Blue Last,” Traxx says, “ran offstage and dived into the car. We were even gonna get a back-up motorbike if there was traffic.”

O riginally a grime duo, Astroid Boys became a group after a late-night performance at Glastonbury’s Shangri-La. “After the show I had such euphoria,” says Kendell. “It was like I was on serious drugs. [Traxx] said to me, ‘Man, I can’t wait to play this live.’ He said he wanted to add drums and guitar and stuff. I was like, ‘We’re not a rock band, bro, we’re rappers.’”

Kendell was a hip-hop fan (“Mos Def, Common, anything on Rawkus Records”), so Traxx introduced him to underground bands such as Bad Brains and Gorilla Biscuits. It was Traxx who recruited Richard ‘DJ Comfort’ Bancroft, drummer Harry Williams and producer Elliot ‘Dellux’ Brussalis to fill out the line-up.

“We’re a very random mix of boys and that’s important,” says Kendell. “I’m a quarter Greek, a quarter Irish and half Jamaican. [Traxx] is Greek and white. We’re relatable. Britain is balancing out multiculturally and everybody now has friends from multiple backgrounds and they’re familiar with people who like all genres of music – it’s not like when I was at school and it was just the chavs and the moshers. It’s a melting pot and we’re representative of that. We’re the perfect mongrel.”

The group’s racial awareness is evident in ‘Foreigners’, the lead single from the forthcoming album. It features the rapper Sonny Double 1, who Kendell met in prison. The track throbs with muted beats and the chant “*We know that you don’t like the foreigners*” and could be an anthem for a racially, culturally and politically divided post-Brexit Britain, though they insist it’s not a protest song.

“It’s not angry, it’s not happy,” says Traxx. “It’s just awareness, ‘cos the situation is what it is.”

“[Racial tension] just isn’t surprising any more,” Kendell adds. “It’s a bigger statement to feel detached from it.”

“People only unify through hate,” Traxx says. “They protest when they’re angry. The only time people come together for anything other than hate is at festivals. So ‘Foreigners’ isn’t about hate; it’s about mutual understanding. You’ve gotta look at the people around you and say, ‘We all cool? Good: everybody’s on the same page. Let’s make the best of a bad situation.’ And then you keep extending that understanding.”

“We’re the perfect mongrel”

G rime is often compared to punk, a socially conscious

genre that emerged from disenfranchised youth. Since the mainstream has embraced grime, though, Astroid Boys reckon it has lost a little edge. “Back in the day,” says Traxx, “it was so f***king dangerous. It still has that, though not so much.” Kendell adds:

“We’ve been through gang problems, drugs, fighting, bad attitudes. If I hadn’t found music, I would have been a bit of a muppet. But you can’t do both. I don’t think Skepta’s sincere because he’s rapping about things he ain’t doing.”

Traxx is more forgiving: “He’s changed – he ain’t about that life any more.”

It’s debatable whether the most exciting genre in decades is really lacking edge. But it seems certain that Astroid Boys’ debut album, due in summer, will inject new life into grime.

“It’s a very, very woke album,” says Traxx. “It’s very conscious, but at the same time it’s got flavours. We like to have a good time so some of the songs are just grime bangers that make you want to jump up and shout. But we’re speaking a lot of truth too.”

Traxx leaves after an hour, but Kendell stays for a mid-afternoon piss-up with *NME*. He explains that Traxx has an unusual level of drive and ambition: “People in Wales don’t move as fast as he does.” Traxx wants to leave Cardiff behind, while Kendell would be happy to stay, start a family and live a quieter life. He abandons

the bike ride, but the next morning tweets, “Rode 35 miles today and I can barely feel my legs right now... champion!” The road’s been bumpy, but Astroid Boys will go the distance in the end.

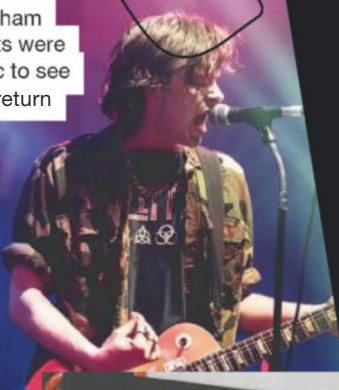

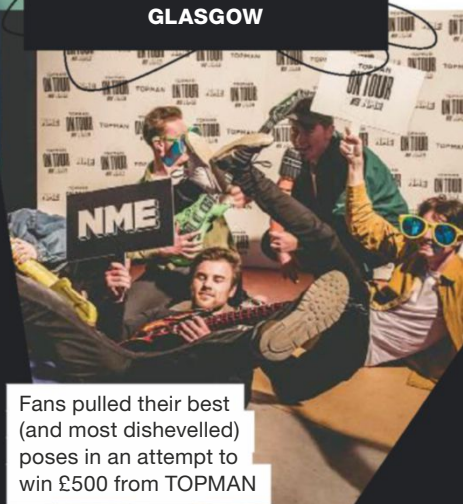

THE FULL-ON RETURN OF Peace seems to be drawing nearer, as the Birmingham band conclude their three-date live comeback with a compelling set at The University Of Sheffield's Student Union as part of TOPMAN ON TOUR WITH NME. It's been two years since their last visit to the Steel City and 1,000 eager students flood the sold-out venue to witness the four-piece deliver a tsunami of indie anthems.

Sparking an electric atmosphere comes easy for promising pop maverick Will Joseph Cook, who delivers a lively performance of material from his upcoming debut 'Sweet Dreamer' to get the night underway. Unfazed by the heaving throng of bodies in front of them, sugar-sweet Brighton indie band Fickle Friends follow, in relaxed and chatty form. Frontwoman Natti Shiner even promises to

join the crowd for Peace before diving into the tropical hit 'Swim'.

Opening with 'Higher Than The Sun', the blistering first track from their 2013 debut album 'In Love', Peace get straight to the business of getting the students into a mad frenzy. The band then rattle through singles 'Lost On Me', 'Money' and 'I'm A Girl' from their second album 'Happy People', all of which have the crowd generating mosh pits. As promised, Shiner can be seen jumping along with the students.

Remaining generally quiet between tracks, frontman Harry Koisser announces they'll be slowing it down a little for a song they haven't played for a while. The tender lilt of 'Float Forever' follows, but the calm interlude isn't sustained for long as the room erupts when the first few chords of 'Wraith' drop. Peace wrap up the night with 'World Pleasure' before blowing kisses (and any hope of new material being performed) goodbye. Fresh tunes may remain elusive, but their return brings Sheffield a lot of pleasure.

TINIE TEMPAH IS UK RAP'S nice guy done good. He's the charmer who grew up on a London estate, cut his teeth on pirate radio and struck gold with 'Pass Out'. His 2010 debut 'Disc-Overy' sold over a million copies. Patrick Okogwu's success has transported him to a new world: one where he can call Prince William a mate, add a personal tailor to his staff and buy a townhouse previously owned by designer Alexander McQueen, complete with a taxidermy zebra in his kitchen.

Tinie's earned life's finer things, and he loves them. His message: I came from very little; you can make it too. Yet, because of the pop world he inhabits, Tinie is always judged on the size of his last hit. His second album 'Demonstration' attempted something more cohesive, showcasing his evolution. Singles 'Trampoline' and 'Children Of The Sun' went Top 10 – but it didn't match 'Disc-Overy'. Now, after a series of delays, its follow-up 'Youth' is here, and it begins with Tinie giving himself a pep-talk on the title track: *"I've been coasting but the last few years have been weird / I'm either self-assured or*

I'm scared and it's how I deal with the fear."

If album three starts off vulnerable, though, it soon turns defiant. 'Not For The Radio' is a double-bluff pop song pitched at his detractors, hooked around an MNEK chorus line that's, ironically, perfect for daytime playlists. At this early point, though, 'Youth' begins to zig-zag. The hits are present – his breezy Wizkid collaboration 'Mamacita', club smash 'Girls Like' featuring Zara Larsson and 'Text From Your Ex' with Tinashe. Plus 'Not Letting Go', the Number One he released in summer 2015, strangely tagged on the end as the album's final track. Then there's the ones he hopes will be future hits, the strongest of which is 'Lightwork'.

But all too often, tracks feel like connectors – carriages to transport listeners between the singles. There's little narrative, few definitive themes, but there are lots of guests. Some add bite, like Stefflon Don, Manchester MC Bugzy Malone and, oddly, Jake Bugg on the folky 'Find Me'. Tinie's story is a great inspiration, but a truly outstanding album still evades him. **Greg Cochran**

DARREN JORDAN

Cunningham has been making boundary-pushing electronic music under the Actress name for well over a decade. His last album, 2014's 'Ghettoville', was a dark, glitchy and soulful triumph. 'AZD', his fifth, is no less imaginative, a record themed entirely around chrome. Concept albums are few and far between in 2017, but even rarer are the ones dealing with the shiny surfaces found in mid-range suburban wine bars. But then, the work of Actress is less music and more sound art. You won't be seeking out the complex digital symphony that is 'Faure In Chrome' the next time you hijack a house party aux cable at 2am, but you might want to let its crisp textures percolate through your brain as it scours away the nonsense of the day.

Repetition is one of Actress's core building blocks, with 'Blue Window' based around a hypnotic groove, while 'CYN' brings in one of the only vocals on this record, sampling the late graffiti artist and hip-hop pioneer Rammellzee over skittering beats and dreamy synth lines. It's like two different songs are happening at the same time, but it sounds magical. Big, beefier beats step in for 'X22RME', one of the few tunes that could sneak onto the dancefloor, but preferably in a seedy Berlin basement.

The more experimental side of the record is where things get really challenging. 'Dancing In The Smoke' is Actress's very own sonic Pollock, a six-minute soundscape that's part deep house meditation, part Burial B-sides. You might be more likely to find 'AZD' at the Tate Modern than in the charts, but that's part of why British music needs him. **Leonie Cooper**

Breathing fire

Surprisingly effortless sexiness from the Swedish electro crew

Season High



ELECTRO MELODY SEXINESS

YOU COULD BE forgiven for expecting Little Dragon's fifth album to sound kind of strained. When the Swedish electro crew announced 'Season High', their follow-up to 2014's Grammy-nominated 'Nabuma Rubberband', they didn't exactly gush about the creative process. "We're four strong wills who find it really frustrating

to compromise," singer Yukimi Nagano said. "We've gotten better at that, but it's still a real battle. It gets harder and harder for us to make records, but we still love it."

So it's a pleasant surprise to report that 'Season High' actually feels pretty effortless. Produced by

the Gothenburg four-piece with Simian Mobile Disco's James Ford, this is a fresh and inventive electropop record with a healthy disregard for current chart trends. There

are no painful attempts to incorporate tropical house, and when you expect a chorus, you always get a chorus – not a trendy, Major Lazer-style drop.

Fittingly for an album that contains a song called 'The Pop Life', Little Dragon really bring the hooks here. With its refrain of "let love drip", 'Celebrate' is a sexy blend of Prince and '80s Janet Jackson. 'Should I', a midtempo electro rush, comes off like a freaky Pet Shop Boys-Neneh Cherry mash-up. And the breathy dance-pop of 'Sweet' is so cute and catchy, it could almost be a more experimental Kylie Minogue hit.

In fact, Little Dragon only really falter when their

songwriting loses its pop focus. The offbeat electronica of 'Butterflies' spreads its musical ideas a little too thin, while final track 'Gravity' meanders towards the end of its seven-minute runtime. Yet those self-indulgent moments don't kill the vibe.

This is an album that delivers both mood and melody, thanks in no small part to Nagano. Whether she's whispering "it's your birthday" suggestively on 'Celebrate', or asking a lover to "roll another one for me" on 'High', she's a compelling presence who really sells her band's sleek and sophisticated tunes.

After one of their shows, Luciano became pen pals with a nine-year-old aspiring musician and invited her band to feature in their video for 'Tummy Ache'.

NEW YORK punk duo Diet Cig – Alex Luciano (guitarist, singer) and Noah

Bowman (drums) – are masters of getting straight to the point. Their 2015 EP 'Over Easy' had references to adolescent anxiety running throughout, and on 'Tummy Ache', from debut album 'Swear I'm Good At This', they deal with objectification and female erasure. We spoke to Luciano about what it means to be punk in 2017.

You've described your music as "radically soft" punk. What did you mean by that?

"Being soft can be just as punk and political as being aggressive, and we definitely have a lot of energy in what we do. We think it's OK to be empathetic and show your feelings and listen to other people's feelings."

Do you think you're helping people change their view about what 'punk' is?

"It doesn't make you any less punk or less strong – I actually think it makes you more punk. Caring about people at your shows is way more punk than just moshing and not thinking about anyone else. We realised you don't have to be really aggressive to be really punk. It's a thing we're trying to promote; listen to your friends and care about people."

When did you first realise you wanted to make music with a message?

"It wasn't until I was in college and getting involved in the DIY scene that I really started realising the importance of women in music. I was inspired by a lot of current musicians like Hop Along and Frankie Cosmos, just women who were using their music to talk about their feelings. I wanted so badly to just do the same thing and make people feel like they're not alone. When we were writing this record I was like, 'Oh my God, people are listening now, but what do I have to say?'"

What do you think of the assertion that punk will be better under Trump?

"It's a weird thing because you're saying, 'I'm so excited for the awful things happening because punk is going to be good.' I think privileged people would say that; a lot of people are scared for their lives right now, and they aren't thinking, 'Oh good, a catastrophe's happening but we're going to have good punk music.' And I also don't like people kind of crediting Trump for an amazing music revolution, because it's not him. We would have been making political music regardless." **Thea de Gallier**
