The UK reels from a shocking terrorist attack at Manchester Arena

ARIANA GRANDE FANS WERE THE target of a horrific terrorist attack at Manchester Arena this week (Monday, May 22). At the time of going to press, 22 were dead and 59 more were wounded, making it the deadliest act of terror since the London 7/7 bombings in July 2005. Taking to social media, Grande said she was "broken", adding: "From the bottom of my heart, I am so, so sorry." Messages of support have poured in for the loved ones of those who lost their lives. James Corden gave a heartfelt message on his *Late Late Show*,

saying: "If it was even possible, the spirit of the people of Manchester will grow even stronger this evening." Liam Gallagher said he was "absolutely devastated", while former Smiths member Johnny Marr declared: "Manchester stands together."

Remembering Chris Cornell

The music world pays tributes to one of rock's finest

LAST WEDNESDAY (MAY 17), Chris Cornell was found dead in a Detroit hotel room, just hours after playing his final show with Soundgarden, the group with which he became the architect of the sound of Seattle grunge in the '90s. Known for his jaw-dropping vocals, the 52-year-old also enjoyed success as a solo artist and with the supergroup Audioslave alongside Rage Against The Machine's Tom Morello. Millions bought his records, and the impact of the loose, slowed-down, heavy rock sound he helped create can still be heard today. Here's what some of his peers said about him.

"Your talent was pure and unrivalled. Your voice was joy and pain, anger and forgiveness, love and heartache all wrapped up into one. I suppose that's what we all are. You helped me understand that."



Linkin Park have gone pop – so what?

PEOPLE CHANGE, THANK goodness for that. If they didn't I'd still be wearing purple corduroy flares, obsessively listening to Fun Lovin' Criminals and collecting crystals in a small plastic tub for undisclosed teen magic purposes. So why is it that when a band decides to shake off the shackles of the past they get in so much sh*t for it? Ladies and gentlemen, I give you Linkin Park, who, on their recently released seventh album 'One More Light', decided to ditch the screaming and nu-metal misery and in its place give us Justin Bieber and Chainsmokersesque Urban Outfitters pop pizzazz. The fans, to put it mildly, were not best pleased.

"This is total trash. I wanted to give it a chance, but sorry you crapped out a 10-track pile of nothing. Don't do it again," moaned one on Facebook.
"You disappointed me for the last time LP. The whole thing is

just massive snore fest. Slow, boring pop." sobbed another.

Now. Linkin Park are big enough and ugly enough to not need me to come to their rescue - in fact, frontman Chester Bennington has rather ungallantly offered to "punch... in the f**king mouth" anyone who calls them sellouts - but I'm all for musicians pulling a serious sonic volte-face. Imagine if Fleetwood Mac hadn't blossomed from a noodly British blues band to a grown-up pop megaforce; if the Beastie Bovs hadn't ditched their hardcore punk roots and become a rap powerhouse: or if Radiohead never shifted from glum little indie band to electronic experimenters? No 'Rumours' or 'Ill Communication' or

'Kid A', that's what.

We're not for a minute suggesting that Linkin Park were trying to release a decadedefining album – in fact, it's more than likely that it's simply a cynical ploy to sell more records in a world that now prizes a tropical-house jangle over a scratched guitar riff – but would you rather Linkin Park forced out yet another weak facsimile of 'Hybrid Theory'? Not I. Fellow former cohorts in heaviness Paramore have followed the same path with

their latest album too, the irrepressibly perky 'After Laughter', which comes over more like Taylor Swift than My Chemical Romance, while Miley Cyrus has suddenly started releasing tracks that sound like Auto-Tuned Mumford & Sons.

I know it's sometimes hard to believe – especially when you look at their pool party in Ibiza/stage-side at Coachella/top table at Chiltern Firehouse Instagram pics – but musicians are people too. They should be allowed to experiment, allowed to f**k up and allowed to move the hell on. So here's to Linkin Park's next album; a psych-folk concept record about pizza.

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written by Liam, with help from Greg Kurstin (who's worked with Adele, Beck and Lily Allen), Andrew Wyatt (who's in Miike Snow and has worked with Carl Barât and Mark Ronson) and Simon Aldred (leader of Bolton indie band Cherry Ghost). The vibe is somewhere between Oasis and Liam's last band Beady Eye, who split in 2014: tons of energy, flashes of anger and loads of big, bad, loud guitars.

For now, though, the album can wait. For now, Liam's concentrating on getting himself back on stage and letting that voice out. But not before he's given some rip-roaring interviews to get this Liam 'solo artist' Gallagher thing on the road.

Is going to the pub and serenading the locals what you normally get up to when you visit Ireland?

"I chill around the house, I go to the pub and have the craic, and then I get a b*****king off me mum like [puts on Irish accent], "Stay out the f**king pub.' Normally I'm good and I keep me head down, but I must've been in a good mood that day."

How did a guitar end up in your hands?

"F**k knows, mate, Guinness,"

Why did you play 'Bold' and not, say, 'Wonderwall'?

"I dunno, I just thought... It wasn't like, 'Oh, here's a song, it's going to be out next year.' There was no plan to make a record, but if I'd known there was going to be a record I probably wouldn't have done it. Everyone's just all cloak and dagger these days, like, 'I've got a new song and you can't hear it until it's out.' At that time I thought, 'F**k it, it's a f**king song,' ya know what I mean?"

You've got big songwriters on the album. Greg Kurstin co-wrote 'Hello' with Adele. How big do you want this to get?

"I'm not arsed where it goes. I just f**king wanna get back doing what I do, less of the f**king drama. I've had four years of f**king private-life bulls**t, which is all my doing, and I want to get back to doing my job, playing rock 'n' roll to the people who like it. I love it and people can see that. You can tell by that big vein down the side of my neck. I'm not afraid to be big and I'm not afraid to be small. It's all a piece of p**s."

Are you into grime? No guitars but lots of energy?

"My kid Gene is bang into Skepta. I like the look of him. He looks a bit odd and kooky. He's a bit funky."

There's a picture of him wearing

a Pretty Green [the fashion label founded by Liam] T-shirt.

"Yeah, Gene showed me. Apparently he went in and whacked out five grand. That's the kind of s**t I'd do. So now he's welcome to have it for nowt, 'cos it says a lot about someone. I like the little f**king Del Boy hat he's wearing in that pic, and the round John Lennon beams. He looks cool, man. Odd and cool. I can't wait to meet him."

You'd like grime. Grime is dangerous music.

"Good for them. Anger's an energy, mate. It's where it's at, man. I'd rather that than some f**king watered-down f**king guitar band."

Are you still angry?

"I'm not angry at life, like, 'Oh, my f**king life should have turned out like this.' I've had a f**king great life and still have. I'm just angry at... I dunno, f**k knows. I've still got f**king fire in my belly and soon as that microphone is there I'm ready to f**king spit the words out. It's called passion. I guess. but it could come across as anger. But I'm not anary when I'm out and about. and when I'm with my mates I'm pretty f**king chilled. I'm not walking down a road like that fat f**king geezer out of 'Where's Your Head At?' or whatever. Running chills me out a bit, but it depends. There's a lot of d**kheads out there. If people are cool, then I'm cool. If there's d**kheads around, I'll f**king show me teeth."

Who's your competition right now?

"There's no one out there like me. I've nailed it 'cos I've got the tunes. If it goes on attitude and aggression then I've p**sed it. If it goes on how s**t you are, they win. Because I ain't s**t."

Have you heard the new Harry Styles stuff?

"I don't mind it, man. There's some interesting bits in it. I mean, I don't know how it f**king goes, but fair play to him. I'm sure, like, it's a bigger f**king cost. I've got the weight of Oasis still hanging over me and I'm sure I'll always be that guy from Oasis, so I'm sure he's carrying an equal weight. If he wants to get out of that pop world and into something with a bit more substance I think that's a good thing."

Are you OK with always being the guy from Oasis?

"I f**king love Oasis. I am Oasis. It doesn't matter who wrote the f**king songs and who f**king sung them, I'm the one that f**king took them for a walk on the wild side. I'll always be Oasis, man, that's my f**king first love. I don't yearn for it,







though, like some people go on about. If I yearned for it I'd be sending our kid chocolate, not f**king hate mail."

Do you listen to Oasis?

"Only when I'm rehearsing it, or if it comes on in a pub or in the car. Turn it up, man."

When it comes on in a pub, do people come up to you?

"Yeah, man, There's a lot of love, More so then f**king ever. That's why I'm not gonna bother about being in a band again. It's my name now. I've joined the f**king d**khead gang, f**king Mr Solo. This is the last chance to dance. I'm not into f**king dance music. It is what it is, but I'm never gonna make a f**king lan Brown solo record - it's always gonna be f**king loud guitars, which will also get compared to Oasis. It's not a band thing, it's me doing my thing. It's the last real f**king roll of the dice, but not in a desperate kind of way. It's just: 'This is f**king my thing, let's see what's going on."

What will you do if you roll the dice and it isn't a six?

"We'll cross that bridge when we come to it. I won't panic or flip out. But I'd be f**king gutted, mate, 'cos I love being in front of that mic, man, with f**king guitars behind me. I'd be f**king devastated, but I'd get over it. You just have to move with the times. It's like a fighter, innit. If you're not good enough you're not good enough."

You were tweeting about boxer Anthony Joshua at the weekend.

"Mega. Nearly as f**king cool as me."

What do you like about boxing?

"People getting their f**king heads kicked in."

Have you always been into boxing?

"I've been to a few fights and that, and I know Ricky Hatton and carried his belts in for him in Vegas [in 2008], but I'm not into it myself. I'm far too good-looking for that."

On May 30 you're playing live [see box] for the first time since November 2014, when you sang 'My Generation' with The Who. How's your voice?

"It's just like riding a bike, innit."

Do you have to look after your voice better now?

"I never looked after it in the old days. You've just got to be good when it comes to gigging, go easy on the cigs and alcohol. But it can't all be no fun – I wouldn't do it if it was. I'm not Aled Jones. It can't be all work and no f**king play. You've just got to pick your moments to let loose."

Do you practise your stance in front of a mirror?

"I get up at five and do it for an hour every day, just to stay trim."

But you've reined the stance in a bit to protect your vocal chords?

MAM GALLAGHER

Which Oasis songs will Liam do live?

"Every one I'm doing, I'm doing because I like singing it."

DEFINITELY

ROCK 'N' ROLL STAR "Standard."

D'YOU KNOW WHAT I MEAN?

"All seven minutes of it. I'm not doing it for the 'Be Here Now' anniversary. I couldn't give a f**k."

SLIDE AWAY "Sounding good."

BE HERE NOW

"Sounds like the Stones. Gonna get a load of brass on it so it sounds f**king flith. 'Kicking up a storm from the day I was born' – it's perfect. It's got me written all over it."

ROCKIN' CHAIR "Yeah I nail that"

"Nah. Although I'd f**king nail it. I sing it in the shower every day. It's amazing."

Do you go back and watch yourself singing old Oasis songs?

"No, I'm not even listening to them. It's just straight in."

"I'll always do it 'cos it's fun. I f**king find it funny anyway. A lot of people tell me to grow up, but I'm not growing up, mate. People go, 'Behave, 44, behaving like a f**king...' and all that nonsense. but just because you've turned 40 or 50 doesn't mean vou have to start behaving. I don't f**king think so. Over my dead body. You spend 20 or 30 years trying to be the most realist person on the planet, then 10 years later everyone wants you to forget about all that and turn into a f**king d**k. pipe and slippers and wearing beige f**king iackets. 

Debut album from a roadman of many voices



IF ANY SINGLE artist embodies the boundary-trouncing cross-pollination that's making hip-hop so exciting right now,

it's 20-year-old London rapper J Hus. He's a total vocal chameleon, capable of convincingly switching flows - switching nationality, even - depending on what the track requires. A single verse can find J scrolling through the louche grind of Jamaican dancehall, the Auto-Tuned bounce of Ghanaian hiplife, the aggy energy of London grime and the zoned-out drawl of Atlanta rap. It's a dizzying, dazzling trick.

J Hus's prodigious genrehopping means that, despite containing only four brief guest spots, his 17-track debut album remains energised and entertainingly unpredictable from end to end. Changes in mood arrive almost as frequently as switches in flow: one moment J Hus is a grinning high-roller basking in local adulation ('Bouf Daddy'): the next he's the screw-faced roadman roaring threats ('Clartin''): the next he's a cheeky ladies' man with a mind full of X-rated thoughts ('Closed Doors').

The album's beats - courtesy of fast-rising producer Jae5 - are even more eclectic. The title track offers multilayered soul melodies worthy of prime-period Rick Ross; 'Did You See' mixes trap's minimalism with woozy hiplife hooks: while 'Plottin' and 'Goodies' rewind back to the late '90s to reference, respectively, UK garage and

backpack rap. In truth, the album is as much Jae5's as it is J Hus's – you can almost feel the pair of them

driving each other on, good-naturedly trying to outwit each other with unexpected stylistic switch-ups.

For all its alobe-trottina

genre-hopping, however, 'Common Sense' is an album that could only have been released in the UK in 2017 - not only because of its very London-specific blend of influences, but because of its big-budget glossiness and world-beating confidence. This is very much a post-Stormzy, post-Skepta, post-Drakegoing-roadman album, and an important stepping stone along the path to the UK establishing itself as a bona fide worldbeater at beats and rhymes.







DID YOU SEE

an album filled with hooks, the sly chorus of this recent single ("Did you see what I done? / Came in a black Benz. left in a white one") is the hookiest of all.



"insipid" wave of music coming through, or Kasabian saying that they're the only ones who can "save guitar music from the abyss", things seem hostile for emerging acts. Reading rock group The Amazons are in for a daunting task, it seems,

As the record progresses, it becomes clear there's little danger of the group ripping up the rock rulebook, but that doesn't necessarily make it any less thrilling - most notably on the anthemic 'In My Mind' and the twisting 'Black Magic', a pair of bruising belters anchored around stadium-

But for all its leather-clad. rock 'n' roll bravado, frontman Matt Thomson is at his most sincere and pleasing when the band ease up and embrace their sweeter side - like on the record's closing piano ballad 'Palace' and the nodding funk of 'Holy Roller'. Those exceptions to the formula are too rare, and the lack of

'The Amazons' will do little to dispel any of the criticisms of the current state of rock, but there's just enough here to suggest that when the band are at their most electrifying. not much can halt their inevitable rise to the top - despite what the old guard say. PIRATE DISNEY SWASHBUCKLER

THE INCREDIBLE SUCCESS OF *Pirates Of The Caribbean* is an endorsement of the old "Disney magic". It's hard to imagine anyone else turning a theme park ride into a film franchise that's grossed over \$3.7 billion. This fifth instalment feels rather tardy, arriving six years after *Pirates Of The Caribbean: On Stranger Tides*, but otherwise it's yery much business as usual.

As ever, a knotty plot revolves around Johnny Depp's Captain Jack Sparrow. This time, he's pursued by old seafaring rival Captain Armando Salazar (Javier Bardem), who wants revenge for the time Sparrow turned him into a sort of water-bound zombie. To thwart Salazar, Sparrow sails off in pursuit of the Trident of Poseidon, a mythical artefact that grants whoever holds it control over the oceans. Along the way, he picks up Carina Smyth (Skins' Kaya Scodelario), an astronomer wrongly accused of witchcraft, and Henry Turner (Home And Away's Brenton Thwaites), a fresh-faced sailor who believes the Trident can free his father Will (Orlando Bloom) from a ghost ship.

Directed by Norwegian duo Joachim Rønning and Espen Sandberg (who previously made the Oscar-nominated 2012 film *Kon-Tiki*), *Salazar's*

Revenge packs a lot into its 129 minutes. The spectacular underwater finale is one of several slick action sequences, but there's also a schmaltzy Javier Bardem subplot involving Sparrow's plays Captain frenemy Captain Barbossa (Geoffrey Rush) and lots of Salazar surprisingly adult humour. One running joke pivots on the word "horologist" which sounds like a crude term for "prostitute". The film features a cameo from Paul McCartney, who gamely delivers a few jokes as Sparrow's banged-up uncle. Bardem's villain is suffocated by excessive CGI, but Rush's Barbossa remains entertaining and Scodelario energises a Made in Australia, this is actually the first Pirates progressive character who's no bland Disney princess, and instalment not to be filmed even the most bloated moments in the Caribbean. are anchored by Depp's winningly shifty Sparrow. At Geoffrey Rush times, Salazar's Revenge is a returns as jarring mix of salty humour and Barbossa treacle-sweet sentiment. But thanks to the old Disney magic, it somehow comes together in the end. Unfriendly fire

America's disastrous peace mission in Afghanistan has been turned into a sharp, satirical comedy starring Brat Pitt

BY FAR THE STARRIEST OF Netflix's self-built movies so far – as well as megastar Brad Pitt, the cast includes Ben Kingsley, Tilda Swinton and Will Poulter – War Machine is a satirical jab at the United States' disastrous approach to creating peace in Afghanistan.

Pitt plays General Glen McMahon, based on real-life controversial loudmouth General Stanley McChrystal. McMahon is beloved by his men, in whose isolated military world he is king, and respected by US government bigwigs who entrust him with ending the Afghan war. It's a task that seems impossible, but McMahon believes every war can be won.

In Afghanistan, though, battle is a nebulous thing. There's little organised military to engage with, instead pockets of insurgents - and every US military action appears to create more complexities. As McMahon's methods become more costly and erratic, and his doubters become more vocal. his team makes the immense mistake of inviting a Rolling Stone reporter to profile McMahon. The last thing his operation needs is media scrutiny.

The witty, intelligent script by writer-director David Michôd (Animal Kingdom, The Rover) does a confident job of making sense of a senseless situation. His lead, however, is confused and even more confusing. Pitt, now 53, gives a performance that shows a desire to shift into 'character actor' territory, where you look less handsome but play juicier parts. He gives McMahon an excess of character. His performance is a lot. He does a funny voice. holds his hand in a claw and pulls a gurning face at all times.

IT'S BEEN ALMOST A YEAR since the Brexit vote and the hangover from that event is already having an impact on young musicians today. Step up Matt Maltese, the 20-vear-old crooner whose breathtaking and sweeping indie ballads make nods to the current political landscape and might just become the soundtrack to the apocalypse - if he has it his way, that is...

So what's your single 'As The World Caves In' all about then?

"It's inspired by this idea of Donald Trump and Theresa May having a final night on Earth, clicking the red button and then enjoying ravenous lovemaking. In these times, I felt I could be as ridiculous about the situation as possible. But it's sweet in some ways as well, so I'd like to think if the world ended that way a few lovers would be listening to this song as it all crumbles."

Has the ominous turn our world has taken helped vou find inspiration?

"I like to think I've always had good observations of the world, but in my writing I've found that I've developed a dark humour recently, which you need to have right now. If you're a compassionate person you can't help but want to talk about everything going on in the world in some way."

What kind of influence has producer Hugo White [The Maccabees] had on your most recent material?

"The first song we did together was the single 'Vacant In The 21st Century' last year, and it felt like quite a nice departure from everything else I'd done. Getting the big rock treatment with drums and quitars was definitely alien to me at the time. Although if I'm not able to try out different extremes now, then when can I? In the past I've left most of my recordings pretty sparse, but I think it was more just laziness than anything else."

'Brexit pop' appears in your Twitter bio - is that how vou'd describe vour music?

"Technically, everything we're making is 'Brexit pop' now. right? It's obviously a p**stake, but if I can own that genre I'd happily I'd write that on my tombstone." Thomas Smith


