Ariana Grande's Manchester benefit concert was a unifying triumph

AFTER 22 PEOPLE WERE killed and 116 injured by a terrorist outside her concert on May 22, Ariana Grande told her manager Scooter Braun: "We must do something." Within two weeks, she'd organised a dignified, unifying response to the tragedy – last Sunday's One Love Manchester benefit. Here are its most spine-tingling moments...



#### MANCHESTER WAS IN FINE VOICE

After adapting his hit 'Strong' to include the line "Manchester we're strong", Robbie Williams' voice started to crack during 'Angels'. He apologised, saying: "For the last chorus I need you." They didn't need telling twice.



#### THERE WERE DANCING POLICE OFFICERS

Throughout the show, BBC cameras broadcasting the event cut to cameras at the back of the gig, where police officers were dancing with the crowd. The heartwarming clips went on to garner tens of thousands of phares an assist media.



#### MILEY & ARIANA SHOWED TRUE FRIENDSHIP

Ariana reunited with her friend Miley Cyrus to play Crowded House's ballad 'Don't Dream It's Over'. Cyrus later told Nick Grimshaw of Ariana: "I think she's finally found her real job."



#### 4 ENEMIES UNITED

In his time, Liam Gallagher has compared Coldplay's Chris Martin to a Tweenie, a vicar and a plant pot. Their 'Live Forever' collaboration was an impossible moment made real, with the crowd of 60,000 duly singing along.

#### Never underestimate the power of pop music

LESS THAN TWO WEEKS after the tragic events at Manchester Arena, Ariana Grande returned to the city to head up a concert in tribute to the 22 killed at the venue after her gig and to show that she, her fans and Manchester wouldn't be cowed by the terror attack. The US singer was rightly praised for her compassion and strength, proving herself to be the kind of dignified statesperson that any country would be proud to have as their leader.

During the concert, she spoke out not with anger but with love, offering comfort, hope and a brilliantly unlikely Coldplay/Liam Gallagher collaboration. During a spectacular three-hour show. even the human dishrag that is Piers Morgan was moved to issue a public Twitter apology to

Grande after slagging her off for leaving the UK after the May 22 attack to return home. The fact that such a powerful stand against terrorism was undertaken by a 23-year-old woman must have ruined him.

The beauty of the One Love Manchester event was that it wasn't about finger pointing and fear but community and coming together. The show's star-studded questlist, from Milev Cyrus and Justin Bieber to Katy Perry, showed us the power of music, not just in helping those who were at the Arena show forge new, positive memories, but as a powerful, positive act of defiance. It wasn't just what was happening the crowd belting out 'Don't Look Back In Anger' and the vellow-jacketed police dancing with kids that made the day so meaningful. When horrible s\*\*t happens, the best thing you can do is to carry on living your life, but even more fabulously and even more loudly.

After the London Bridge terror attack - which took place the night before the Manchester One Love concert - Richard



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## HIGHER STATE OF CONSCIOUSNESS

Katy Perry's new album, 'Witness', is a socially conscious record about personal, sexual and political liberation. But it doesn't mean she's no fun anymore, finds Dan Stubbs

HEN. IN FEBRUARY. Katy Perry released 'Chained To The Rhythm', the ultracatchy first taste of new album 'Witness', it seemed like something of a rebirth had happened. The pop megastar behind 2010's 'Last Friday Night (TGIF)', a song about waking up to post-party carnage, had instead woken up to modern politics, referencing the toxic effects of social media feedback bubbles and concerns about personal liberty ("Come on. turn it up, keep it on repeat / Stumbling around like a wasted zombie / Yeah. we think we're free / Drink, this one's on me"). The single promised to usher in a new era of what Perry neatly described as "purposeful pop". Her Twitter bio was "Artist. Activist. Conscious." Four months later, in the present day, Perry's bio reads as follows: "I know nothing." What happened? "The genuine story behind that," she says, after a long précis of her journey so far, "is whenever I think I know something I just get served." Served by what? "By the universe."

Perry has been in London for less than 24 hours. It's midnight when we meet at a five-star hotel in the West End, and she's practically bouncing off the walls. She's wearing stilettos and a boxy, silver-coloured couture jumpsuit, with arcs of geometric blue eyeshadow. She looks like an android and moves like Tigger, bounding into

the suite belting out the chorus to Kanye West's 'All Of The Lights' as hotel staff struggle to turn them on.

She circuits the room and, finding a microphone tucked away in a corner, grabs it and does a mock talent show for the benefit of the half-dozen people present. Perry stops, declares she wants a "SPAG BOL" and flops down in a booth for the interview, removing five chunky rings from her fingers as she does, as if to imply she might deck me but spare my teeth. Only when she occasionally stops mid-sentence does Perry show any sign of fatigue. "I'm jet-lagged, so..." she says. She seems full of beans, I comment. "I am full of beans! I've always been full of beans. Magical beans."

Three hours ago, Perry played a secret show at Water Rats, the tiny King's Cross venue where, nine years ago, she made her London debut. As well as performing a nearincomparable string of hits (you know all of them), she handed her own phone to a fan to stream the whole gig, cried real, honest tears when paying tribute to the victims of the terror attack at Manchester Arena and talked at length in a stream of consciousness, at one point extolling the virtues of "beautiful, consensual sex" in your thirties. In a time when pop stars are too afraid to say or do something weird or controversial or different, Perry is the blessed antidote. Her new album has a song about

"beautiful, consensual" sex on it, too, called 'Tsunami'. She describes the songs on 'Witness' - out today - as being "like body parts". She elaborates: "'Swish Swish' is the middle finger, 'Bon Appétit' is maybe the p\*\*sy, 'Chained To The Rhythm' is the mind, you know, so it's kind of like I'm having a mental liberation, or I'm having a sexual liberation, or I'm having a liberation from all the negative things that don't serve me."

he record sees Perry working with a cast of A-list collaborators (plus some surprises – UK geektronica types Hot Chip appear on one track) on 15 tracks of very good, very modern pop. Also present is songwriting supremo Max Martin, co-author of Taylor Swift's 'Bad Blood', widely believed to be a f\*\*k-you track to, well, Katy Perry. Awks? "I can't speak for him, but he didn't know [who 'Bad Blood' was aboutl." savs Perry. "I'm not supposed to tell him what he can and can't do. I'm very fair; I'm super-duper fair and I'm not one of those people who's like, 'You can't do that because I don't like that person. Just, like, you do you, make your own choices.' And I love Max. I've been working with Max my whole career. I'm not his mother and he was fine before I met him, you know what I'm saying? He'll be fine continuing." In fact, Perry recently spoke



about the long-running beef with Taylor Swift for the first time, on James Corden's Carpool Karaoke. Why did she break her silence? "Well. James Corden makes me and the whole world feel very safe," she says. "No one has asked me about my side of the story, and there are three sides of every story: one, two and the truth." It means it's difficult to be a Katycat and a Swiftie. Isn't that against the message of fan-group unity she recently posted? "I said that but, I mean, I'm not Buddha - things irritate me." she savs. "I wish that I could turn the other cheek every single time, but I'm also not a pushover, you know? Especially when someone tries to assassinate my character with little girls. That's so messed up!"

ow 32, Perry seems to be enjoying a newfound wisdom after a period of reflection - she went into what she describes as "lo-fi" mode from October 2015 to June 2016. "I know exactly when it's appropriate to get [in] the spotlight or turn the spotlight off," she says, "Every once in a while, I'm really good at turning off my magnet and when I'm about to release a record, like, let's go. I'm here to serve." She says she's become obsessed with philosophy in her fallow time ("I've got a massive crush on Socrates. I'm like, dude! The guy that asked too many questions. Me too!") and her conversation is peppered with cosmic metaphors and aphorisms. "There's a saying like, 'the longer you live life, the better you get at living it. so stick with it," she says. "You've

guess I did a lot of mending, basically."

Knowing when to go out and when to stav in, as David Bowie would have it, is important for a person whose last 10 years panned out like Perry's have. She says it's been "like a rocket. All of us are kind of in this car that's on fire and everybody's really excited to pass [it] on the freeway and they're like, 'What is that? I've never seen that! Let me take an Instagram of that!' But at some point you've just got to get out of the car or you get engulfed in flames. You know, you have to gracefully learn how to transition."

In reality, that means turning the microscope on her own creation, the neon-coloured, cream-squirting, cartoony Katy. "There's a time capsule version of me and it's been four years," she says. "I've left my twenties, surrendered to my thirties, learned a lot along the way, broke a couple of emotional cycles and decided that I can be more myself. I love being Katy Perry, and I'm not saying anything about Katy Perry, but I was born

Kathervn Hudson and I think people are gonna start seeing more of that, because I was terrified to show that. so I built this character that's still me, but the exaggerated version." Perry's not touched a drop of booze since January. She's been in therapy for the past five years, but since her third album, 2013's 'Prism', she's committed to transcendental meditation and group therapy sessions - with her parents. She says the experience is "amazing - and not very English". Perry's relationship with her parents has long fascinated the press: they're born-again Christians who you'd assume were happier with Perry's pre-'I Kissed A Girl' career as a religious rocker. The reality, she says, is more nuanced.

"My parents, they're in their late sixties and just seeing everyone evolve and keeping their heads somewhat on straight and, like, really proud of everyone because the truth of the matter is, no one in my family signed up for this. They still get... I would say - I want to choose my words right - it's like they didn't sign up for this and they benefit from it and they also get bothered by it."

You can understand Perry's search for a little peace. Legitimately one of the most famous people in the world (she's the most followed person on Twitter), Katy has been tabloid fodder for the best part of a decade, a period in which she married and divorced Russell Brand, whom she refers to only as "my ex-husband" in NME's company. She's considered fair game - one recent 'sidebar of shame' story. for example, concerns her being accused of being a witch by nuns. "God bless those nuns because I really feel for them, but just because I dressed up like a witch once doesn't make me a witch," she reasons. "I

happening right now.Something brilliant is really happening, which is: people are waking up. People are waking up and we wouldn't have... we would have continued in the same pattern, in the same way, in the same comfort, in the same utopia. We're waking up, we're all voicing our opinions, we're all getting more educated, we know the names of [members of] Parliament and the names of [United States senators] more than we know the names of band members these days. That's how it should be, because those people actually help change our lives, sometimes."

Perry's involvement in politics coincided with the groundswell of popular movements such as Black Lives Matter and an increasing social and political awareness among pop culture figures. There have been innumerable thinkpieces asking when Katy Perry got 'woke'. So when did she? "Do you know, it's so funny don't vou feel like we're in a race to become the most woke?" she asks. But she willingly entered the race, no? "Well, I did, but somewhere along the way I realised that there is no destination, it's just a journey. Do you know what I'm saying? Can someone tell me where the starting line and the finish line of all the wokeness is?"

It's 'I know nothing' again - and it's a good defence, if one were needed. But really, Perry just feels like a real person having real experiences, good and bad. She's fun, engaging, energetic company, jet-lagged or not. And this is an indisputable fact: the pop world is a far better place with her in it. Maybe her theory about being served by the universe is the thing that keeps her real. Who else would be upstaged at the biggest performance of their life - 2015's Super Bowl halftime show

> - by an errant dancer in a shark costume, only to have the same happen at this year's BRIT Awards. when a dancer dressed as a house stacked it from the stage? "Yeah, I don't know," she smiles. "Well, I guess I'm just... I'm very OK with not being perfect. I never try and come off as though I've got all the answers. I'm a constant work-inprogress. I've come so far mentally, spiritually, physically, musically and I have so far to go. I always tell myself there is no there there - and that's NME

totally fine."

## MANCHESTER UNITED The Courteeners just played the biggest show of their lives to a home crowd

of 50.000 fans at an event that became about much more than finally proving their doubters wrong, says Andrew Trendell Liam Fray fronting The Courteeners


FAR AFTER YEAR, ALBUM after album. Manchester's Courteeners have confounded their critics by playing ever-moremassive Manchester venues. From Manchester Arena (2010) to Delamere Forest (2011), Castlefield Bowl (2013) and Heaton Park (2015), a homecoming gig for these boys is never a small - or polite - affair. Meanwhile, each of their albums has either landed in the Top Five or not been far off - yet you wouldn't know it from looking at the mainstream media and radio, who've long written them off as a parochial concern, a diet Oasis for those too young to have seen the real thing.

That hasn't escaped the attention of frontman Liam Fray, a man too easily caricatured as the inheritor to Liam Gallagher's 'gobby Mancunian' title, yet more thoughtful than that in person. "You can feel this sneery classist undertone," he told *NME* earlier this year. "These people think, 'Oh, you're only big up north and they're f\*\*king monkeys who don't understand anything.' Give me a break. That angers me. It's just absurd."

t's wrong to say Fray's band is only big at home, but it's also a fact that The Courteeners are legitimately massive in Manchester. So in an act of great bravado, they booked an insanely huge show at Old Trafford Cricket Ground off the back of their fifth album, 2016's 'Mapping The Rendezvous' – and effortlessly sold out all 50,000 tickets. It's a venue normally reserved for the likes of Oasis and Radiohead.

With a support card of Cabbage, Blossoms and The Charlatans, it was intended to be "a gentle reminder that things are still happening up there", in Fray's words. Then, just days before the show, a lone bomber walked into the foyer of Manchester Arena and killed 22 music fans leaving an Ariana Grande gig, injuring 59 more – and the story shifted. "That was an attack on everything," says Fray. "It was an attack on young people, on creativity. It was children going for a nice time with their parents."

While the people of the city recoiled in shock and mourning, they also refused to be defeated. In that spirit, The Courteeners declared that the show would go on, and their gig



became a symbol of defiance and unity in itself. Before it, the city centre is abuzz: fans stop for selfies with policemen and gather on street corners to howl songs by Oasis. Down at Old Trafford, they laugh, dance, fall over, pick each other up and – against a request from the organisers – light flares.

hen Fray takes the stage to read a poem by local writer Ryan Williams, it captures the essence of the day, the fans roaring in unison as he clenches a fist to make it through the lines: "Time after time we'll rise from the dust / You'll never prevail – not against us / This is Manchester, our Manchester, and the bees still buzz".

And so to business as usual: a 21-song indie masterclass from a band that were becoming one of the UK's biggest while the world was looking the other way. The centrepiece is a solo acoustic cover of 'Don't Look Back In Anger' - a song that's become the anthem for Manchester's bounce-back, and one that couldn't be any better received if it were the Gallaghers themselves on stage. For a band meant to be having their own Knebworth moment, it's symbolic of the occasion. "I feel like it wasn't about us tonight," Fray says after the show, looking out from his dressing room window as the crew dismantles the stage. "It wasn't 'our gig'. It was a celebration of people doing what they love. This will stay with me for the rest of my life."

Jubilation aside, it was the bravery and fraternity of the gig-goers, bands and crew that made the show worthwhile for Fray. He admits the band felt "duty-bound" to carry on with it, but then says it's "nothing" compared to the security staff, truck drivers, bar workers and the countless others he sees sweeping up the floor of the venue as the rain pours down. In the aftermath of tragedies like the Arena terrorist attack, he says, "You realise that people are good."

This isn't the Fray you might know from interviews, a man convinced of his own genius where others might raise an eyebrow. "This gig had enough fans to prove we're not arrogant," he says. "If you're around after 10 years, the time for all that chest-puffing has

gone. What, you're the f\*\*king bollocks? F\*\*k off. Who the f\*\*k are you? Prove to me that you're the f\*\*king bollocks. Do something courageous. Do something meaningful."

He points out to where 50,000 frenzied fans just lost their minds. "We know it's all about them. We're their band. I don't think there's another band in the UK that have that relationship with their fans. And I'll tell you why: because I don't class us as a big band. I genuinely don't."

They are, though, and more arena tours will come. The next biggest stadium is Manchester City's ground, and Emily Eavis recently told *NME* that The Courteeners are worthy of headlining Glastonbury. So what will it take for the cynics to get their heads around it? "We just don't give a f\*\*k," laughs Fray. "If you have any misconceptions, you should have watched it tonight. What else have you got? There has to be a time when people go, 'Alright, they're not going anywhere. They're alright, these.""





### **Stop! Grammar time**

British trio's beautiful trip-hop crystallises on a stepping-up second album

LONDON GRAMIMAR Oh Woman Oh Man

LONDON GRAMMAR chose not to find it galling when David Cameron declared himself a fan. In 2014, the man who let Brexit

happen said he thought the trio were "brilliant", and while Britain cringed on their behalf, the Nottingham-formed minimalists, despite being pro-Labour, remained polite. "How can you stop anyone listening to your music?" asked guitarist Dan Rothman. "It's so classist."

Their second album, 'Truth Is A Beautiful Thing', doesn't try so hard to sit on the fence. The trio have mostly been working

> with Paul Epworth and Greg Kurstin – producers for Adele – and they've polished London Grammar's already glossy

trip-hop up to a mirror-like sheen, more willing to take risks. Best of the lot is 'Big Picture', a symphonic torch song produced by the band with Mercury-nominated electronic musician Jon Hopkins. Here, Hopkins brings into play the panoramic introspection of his 2013 album 'Immunity', giving frontwoman Hannah Reid – a singer with the force of Florence Welch and the restraint of Bat For Lashes' Natasha Khan – her most ethereal moment to date.

Elsewhere, there's a refreshing amount of stylistic variation compared to the band's two-million-selling 2014 debut 'If You Wait'. The tale of distorted anatomy on 'Bones Of Ribbon' is punctuated by a weird sample of Reid's voice; 'Non Believer' stomps along with a swaggering, two-beat drum line from Dot Major; 'Leave The War With Me'

sets gorgeous, reverbheavy guitar against skittering beats.

Where the album sometimes fails to connect is in its lyrics, especially when they're front and centre in the mix.

Opening track 'Rooting For You' chucks out the drums in favour of string-backed soul-searching: "Where did she go?" ponders Reid, "Truth left us long ago / And I need her tonight."

They're not exactly expected to diss Cameron in a thunderous, anti-Brexit attack, but they could still say more, or go beyond a default of singing about the complex ups and downs of relationships. Still, that doesn't stop 'Truth Is A Beautiful Thing' from being an undisputed raising of the game. There are ballsy moments – they just happen to be coated in the trio's signature icy cool. ## Perry Perry sauce

Katy melds social awareness to highoctane electropop

**KATY PERRY** Witness WOKE POP SYNTHS

KATY PERRY is a changed woman. Well. kinda. For her fourth album under the Perry name - let's

pretend her god-bothering 2001 debut 'Katy Hudson' never happened, eh? - she's attempting to bring a little more meaning to her music. Speaking about the album earlier this year, she proudly stated: "I think it's definitely a new era for me. I call it an era of purposeful pop."

The all-new 'woke' Katv isn't

just about giving you decent things to dance to on a Friday night or up-tempo fluff for your gym playlist. Instead, she's pushing the sleek, chart-friendly empowerment of 'Roar' and 'Firework' even further, into socially aware electropop territory, like 'The Fame' period Lady Gaga doing an evening class at SOAS.

First single 'Chained To The Rhythm' nailed the diva-with-a-discourse vibe. fusing an intensely catchy chorus with lyrics that muse on apathy and ignorance. 'Bigger Than Me' might not be as big a belter, but her heart's still in the right place as she muses on her place

> in the world over icv. shimmerina synths: "If I'm not evolving / I'm just another robot / Taking up oxvgen."

The compelling 'Hev Hev Hev' sees Katy dressing up Lorde's languid,

spacious sound, adding some serious girl power - "Because I'm feminine and soft / but I'm still a boss" - and using the kind of retro-meets-trashy Americana imagery Lana Del Rev would be proud of. calling herself "Marilyn Monroe in a monster truck".

Calling in Nicki Minai's fast and furious flow for the Fatboy Slim-sampling 'Swish Swish'. meanwhile. is something of a master stroke, turning a good song into a great one. The high-end auests continue with 'Bon Appétit', which features Migos and sees Katv dropping the personal politics to sing about the glory of shaqqing, And why not?

Sure, 'Witness' isn't about subtlety, but if you're going to deliver important messages about female autonomy to a young audience, it's surely better to shout than whisper. Leonie Cooper

Francipane, AKA Halsev, Her 2015 debut 'Badlands' made her a cult popstar. 'Closer' made her a household name.

In truth, 'Closer' has a trace of blandness Halsey stampedes past when working on her own. 'Hopeless Fountain Kingdom' gets by on a universal quality, but there's a personal touch you don't find on everyday pop full-lengths. It's a break-up album, placed in the context of a Romeo And Juliet-inspired world. The record even begins with the prologue to the Shakespearean tragedy, while the video for 'Now Or

Never' is like her own take on Baz Luhrmann's iconic 1996 film.

On 'Sorry' she admits to treating "the people that I love like jewellery" over heart-wrenching pianos. "I didn't mean to try you on," she sings. 'Good Mourning' gives Rihanna-gone-sci-fi-vibes, while 'Bad At Love' recalls the singer's past relationships.

'Hopeless Fountain Kingdom' might be defiantly ambitious,

> but it's surprisingly cohesive. Even cameos from Fifth Harmony's Lauren Jauregui and Migos' Quavo, and co-writes from Sia and Greg Kurstin can't derail the feeling this is 100 per cent her

own output. The only time a quest threatens to overshadow her is on 'Eyes Closed', co-written by The Weeknd and drenched in his brooding R&B signature. But it's far from the best song on the record, proving Halsey's fast moving from cult hero to global superstar. Rhian Daly

## Bad romance

Murder lurks in this claustrophobic adaptation - but it lacks a killer blow

#### MY COUSIN RACHEL

12A Sam Claflin, Rachel Weisz, Holliday Grainger



ADAPTED FROM ONE OF the lesser-known stories of British author Daphne du Maurier – writer of Rebecca, Jamaica Inn and The Birds – My Cousin Rachel is the ever-morphing tale of a very dark romance and a mission to solve a murder that may not in fact be one at all. Not so much a whodunit as a didanyonedunanything.

Philip (Sam Claflin) was raised by his wealthy cousin Ambrose, who later marries a woman named Rachel (Rachel Weisz). When Ambrose dies in suspicious circumstances, he leaves everything to his cousin and nothing to his wife. Rachel comes to visit Philip, which he sees as an opportunity to prove

she's a gold-digging murderer – a plan muddied by the fact that he's fallen for her.

The atmosphere in *Notting Hill* director Roger Michell's adaptation is so thick, the cast practically has to claw it aside. It's a film that rarely lets you get your footing; Philip's view of Rachel flips constantly between wanting to lock her up and wanting to marry her. This ups the mystery factor, but it also makes him a tough lead – it's difficult to root for a hero who's impossible to

understand, whose impulses lack the connective tissue an audience needs to piece things together. Rachel - played with smart reserve by Weisz - works much better, the details of her true self eked out sparingly. To say why the film ultimately stumbles would be a spoiler, but it doesn't give much away to say that Michell's build-up promises a conclusion that his film, and in fairness the source novel, cannot deliver. All its tension is released not in a gasp but in a sigh. Olly Richards

#### There was a period in your life where you suffered from insomnia, wasn't there?

"Yeah, when I was nine years old. At the time there was serious confusion – you don't know whether you're in a dream or not. I used to get strange recurring nightmares too – it made me think that I was haunted. Eventually, my dreams became more interesting and I actively started engaging with them rather than being scared of them."

#### You've channelled that into your music now, right?

"'Waterslides', a song on my album, is about a dream I had where I was in a water park on an island and it was full of totally deadpan women and men walking around in suits, carrying briefcases, going down water slides. I always feel like it would be a waste to have a dream like that and not try to capture it in a song."

#### You were at The Brit School as a teenager. Did you feel any pressure being there?

"Not really. I was never really into mainstream music so I've always felt quite detached from it. I wasn't even sure I wanted to be a performer until after I left. Certain people were born to do it and other people have to grow into it – I was definitely the latter."

#### There's a song on the album called 'Everything's Weird In America'. What's the weirdest thing you've seen there?

"On a video shoot that I did, there was a sword swallower which was a pretty f\*\*king strange thing to see; a man pulling a 10-inch sword out of his mouth. Everywhere is just mad; it gets a bit much. I just want to chill out when I get there – get me to the beach or something."
