I wanted people to listen to the vinyl and look through it. There's a lyric book that's like a magazine with all these places in it and bits of artwork. Hopefully it all links together."

2 How did you end up working with Damon Albarn?

"I met him at 13 Studios and we started chatting about Essex. He kind of helped steer [the album] in the right direction and we worked on 'Turn Round M8' and 'Get Over It' with him. It's cool because the studios are two rooms next to each other, with a glass wall. Next door they were making the Gorillaz record. They were in there 9am 'til 7pm, trying new stuff out – it inspired us to be there every day making music."

3 Are you calling out Theresa May on the song 'Boiling Point', with lyrics such as "the world is near boiling point / Seeing Theresa May who we didn't appoint / This is our so-called democracy"?

"That was one of the latest songs to go on the album. You don't want Theresa May running the country, do you? And I mean it's good to be really direct with it, not to pussyfoot around with all the politics."

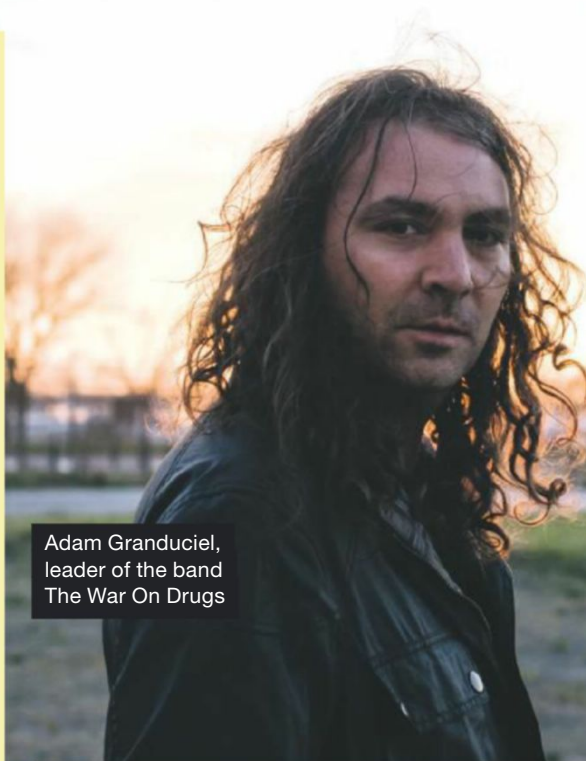

Hope and heart in the age of Trump

THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW

Need some good US vibes to remind you that America is actually really great? Turn up The War On Drugs' stunning new album, 'A Deeper Understanding'

IN 2014, AFTER ALMOST A decade in the indie wilderness, Philadelphia's The War On Drugs released their masterpiece. 'Lost In The Dream' was an epic slice of big-sky Americana, as perfect for a Route 66 road trip as it was the 55 bus to work. It gracefully tipped the band into the mainstream, and now they're back with the even dreamier 'A Deeper Understanding'.

The album was recorded over a year in Los Angeles. On it, bandleader Adam Granduciel branches out from his trademark wistful guitar. "I play a lot of piano on the record," he says, before reflecting on why the album can sound sad. "I was in my own zone and I felt pretty isolated and lonely." That sadness might be to do with all the contemplation of ageing, and the passing of time. "It's about trying to figure out my relationship to growing up – [my] idea of becoming an adult may be slower than others," muses Granduciel. So that's the 'Deeper Understanding', then? "I guess it's trying to figure out where my story is in this big thing."

IN THE END, IT'S ALL ABOUT AIR DRUMMING

Made against the unsettling backdrop of Donald Trump's election campaign and subsequent success, the unsettled mood of America features, too. "Everyone in the studio was obsessed with it," he says, while explaining that Trump's influence is a little more esoteric. "It'd be idiotic to not have it creep in. But I can't sit and write about a specific thing in the same way that somebody else would." Instead, what we get is an ambiguity in mood, reflecting what Granduciel sees as the "general hovering anxiety" affecting the States. Throughout the darkness, though, the hopeful vibes are strong. Like 'Lost In The Dream', this is a huge, classic-sounding album. It's full of Springsteenian gusto and catchy, riff-tastic heartland rock moments of glory. "I'm really into solos you can whistle to," says Granduciel. "Or play along to – it's important to have things in songs that you can play air drums on a steering wheel to." See you on the freeway, guys. **Leonie Cooper**

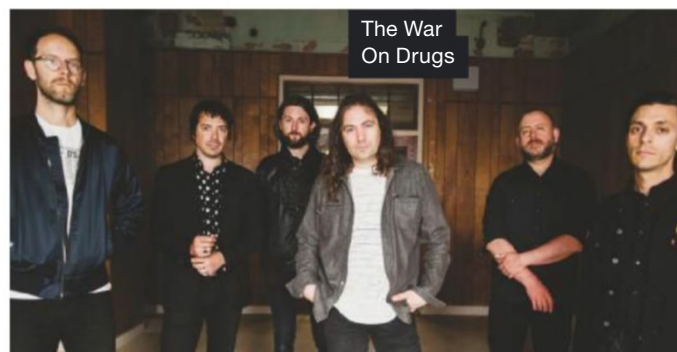

This year's Carnival will be a powerful tribute to Grenfell

THE NOTTING HILL Carnival is undoubtedly the greatest 48 hours in the British party calendar, not least because the annual event – which brings millions together to eat, drink, be merry and dance to bashment across the Sunday and Monday of August bank holiday weekend – has its roots in political activism and a foundation in the power of community. Founded by Claudia Jones, the Trinidad-born editor of *The West Indian Gazette*, the celebration of black culture was arranged as a response to racially motivated riots in west London in 1958, five violent days and nights that saw 'Keep Britain White' mobs battling black residents, something which seems horribly familiar in light of recent events in Charlottesville.

Jones' Caribbean Carnival grew and grew, and by the mid-1970s it had become a party of major proportions, with floats, sound systems, steel bands and an almighty parade running through the same

streets where West Indian immigrants had settled after the Second World War. It's an area of London that remains powerfully diverse, with people from all over the world living side by side. But as evidenced by Grenfell Tower, it was BME and working-class residents in the London borough of Kensington and Chelsea who were disproportionately affected by the disastrous results of living in some sub-standard housing, a damning indictment of the way certain groups of people are treated in this country.

To Londoners, Carnival – only amateurs say the 'Notting Hill' bit – is a vital celebration of community, and in the wake of Grenfell, that makes it even more important. So when Greg Hands, the newly appointed Minister for London, suggested that the event be moved from the area

it's so intrinsically linked with because he thought it would be inappropriate for it to take place in the shadow of a major national disaster, locals were rightly p**sed off. Thankfully, all-round excellent man and Mayor of London Sadiq Khan had no time for Hands' bulls**t. "Notting Hill Carnival is a firm London tradition and incredibly important to the local community. It should not be moved," he tweeted. Yes, the burnt-out shell of Grenfell Tower will be seen by many people attending Carnival. Yes, it will be upsetting, and yes, it will be difficult – but it's been a lot more difficult for those directly affected by the fire. The fact that it's no longer headline news doesn't mean that the

victims no longer need their stories told and no longer need help. It's been two months since the deadly fire and none of Grenfell's survivors have yet been placed in permanent accommodation, despite Theresa May promising that everyone would have a new home within three weeks of the blaze. Reports have also emerged that suggest only a small fraction of the millions raised to help have actually been received by the residents.

There'll be a minute's silence at 3pm on the Monday of Carnival for Grenfell – but don't forget the tragedy still needs a lot of noise made about it as well. @leoniemaycooper

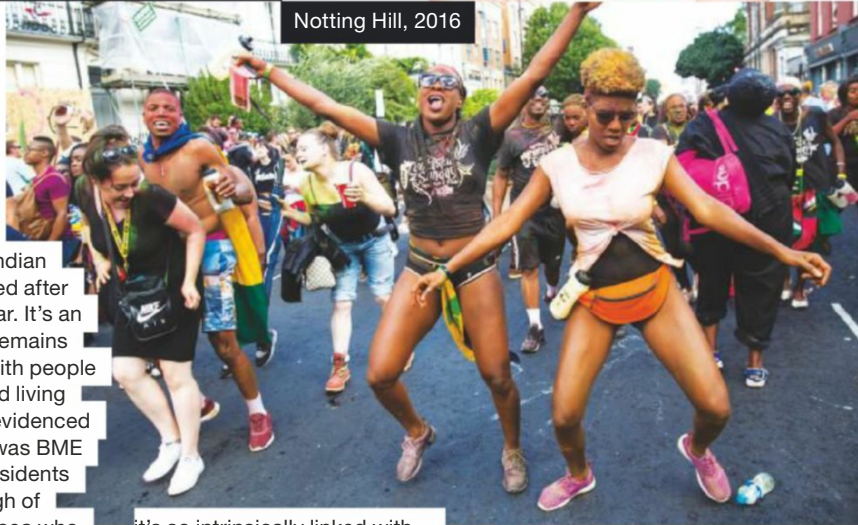

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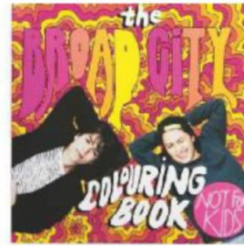

Bastille are mad about films. They put quotes in songs, worship director David Lynch and they curated this summer's CineJam events for NME, the BFI and Zig-Zag. Here, frontman Dan Smith talks us through 10 films every single person in the world should see



THE OBLIGATORY HITCHCOCK FILM

PSYCHO

Alfred Hitchcock, 1960

"It starts as this petty crime love story drama about a woman who's having an affair and takes off to a motel with a load of money, then half an hour into the film, the star is brutally murdered in the shower – and that was a big shock at the time. It's creepy, it's unsettling, it's much parodied. The most famous bit of all is the shower scene – the score, the image of the knife being waved around, the shower curtain being pulled, the blood going down the plug hole. It's so clever – you don't see any nudity or actual violence, it's all implied."

Did you know: "We sampled bits of dialogue from *Psycho* in a cover of 'No Scrubs' that we put on one of our 'Other People's Heartache' mixtapes, on the basis that the killer Norman Bates lives with his mum and is a scrub."

Number of times I've seen it: "10."



THE CONFUSING ONE **MULHOLLAND DRIVE**

David Lynch, 2001

"It's a noir-ish mystery and a love story about two women in Hollywood and the chaos that surrounds them. I saw it when I was a young teenager when I was obsessed with film and directors and David Lynch in a really geeky way. This was the first of his that I could see in the cinema and I went with my dad, which was uncomfortable during the sex scenes. I remember thinking it was a visually beautiful, incredibly confusing piece that left me wanting to know more. I talked about it for ages."

Geeky fact: "People have different ideas about how to interpret the film. I subscribe to the dream theory narrative, where the second half is the reality and the hammy, soap opera-like first half is a fantasy. Did I ask David Lynch if that's correct when I met him? No – I had to rein in the inner fanboy. I took a photo with him and I was so excited it looks like a vein in my forehead is about to explode."

Number of times I've seen it: "Probably about 15."

THE 'HEEEERE'S JOHNNY' ONE

THE SHINING

Stanley Kubrick, 1980

"I first watched it one Christmas night after everyone had gone to bed, which was absolutely terrifying. It's so unsettling, so many amazing performances, so surreal and slow and iconic. This film is so entrenched in the popular consciousness, from the creepy twins to the elevator opening and blood pouring out to the 'Heeeere's Johnny' scene where Jack Nicholson hacks through the door with an axe. By all accounts it wasn't a fun film to shoot – Kubrick was hard on his actors and went to great lengths to get the performances he wanted – but the end result is amazing."

Best performance: "Oh, Jack Nicholson, the hero who becomes the villain. It's one of the all-time greatest descents into madness ever captured on film."

Number of times I've seen it: "Six."



THE DOOMED ROMANCE

BADLANDS

Terrence Malick, 1973

"It's a love story and road movie that gets twisted up with crime, and it's the film that inspired *True Romance* and *Natural Born Killers* and any doomed romance. When we first started Bastille, I used bits of *Badlands* as a music video for our song 'Flaws'. The film is beautiful – every frame is a perfectly composed image – and I thought it would be interesting to try and re-edit the story without any of the underlying darkness."

Did you know: "I recreated the iconic image of Martin Sheen walking through the badlands with a rifle over his shoulders for an early press picture."

Number of times I've seen it: "About 25, because of the editing."





THE COSMIC ONE

2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY

Stanley Kubrick, 1968

"You have to look at films in terms of artistic merit as well as entertainment. Not everyone in the band agrees; our drummer Woody's favourite film is *Mike Bassett: England Manager*. *2001* isn't narratively the most exciting movie, but visually and stylistically it set pop culture's view of space. It's probably better if you're slightly inebriated. I first watched it when I was 13 or 14 after begging and begging my mum and dad to get me a Kubrick box set, and I devoured all of the films in a row."

Best scene: "I'm going to cop out and go for that famous cut of the bone being thrown, because it's a beautiful, simplistic piece of editing."

Number of times I've seen it:

"Probably the least out of all the films, but let's say 2001 times just for fun."



THE HIPSTER ONE

THE ROYAL TENENBAUMS

Wes Anderson, 2001

"*The Royal Tenenbaums* is a mad and brilliant tale of this very complex, far-reaching family. It's iconic and funny and sad and brilliant. Wes Anderson's aesthetic and the tone of his films definitely rubs a lot of people up the wrong way, and I can see why it's divisive, but I think he's brilliant and if you haven't seen one of his films, this is the one to start with."

Favourite character: "Gwyneth Paltrow is brilliant as Margot Tenenbaum – she's so dry and dark."

Number of times I've seen it: "Seven."

THE POST-MODERN HORROR

SCREAM

Wes Craven, 1996

"My obsession with film started with horror movies. I saw this when I was 10 or 11, and I think I must have been at a friend's house because my parents would never have let me watch it. *Scream* is funny, it's referential, it's sly, clever and scary. They cast the biggest star, Drew Barrymore, in a role that saw her killed her off in the first scene, which hadn't been done since *Psycho*, and there's a big twist at the end, too. It's ribbing the slasher genre it's filmed in, which the director, Wes Craven, was a huge part of creating. [Dawson's Creek creator] Kevin Williamson wrote the script and it was a big part of that late '90s teenagers talking like 35-year-olds thing. It's steeped in pop culture and wisecracking humour."

Favourite quote: "It has to be, 'What's your favourite scary movie?' But I wouldn't go around saying it to my mates."

Number of times I've seen it: "25."

THE TEEN CLASSIC

DONNIE DARKO

Richard Kelly, 2001

"I spent a lot of our first album campaign wearing the same T-shirt as Donnie. He's this teenager who has problems and keeps finding himself sleepwalking to remote locations. It looks at mental health and adolescence and ideas of what's real and what isn't. It really spoke to me as a teenager, with amazing music from Echo & The Bunnymen and Tears For Fears and all these bands I didn't know at the time. It's got this dramatic, yearning thing going on and it's weird and Lynchian and doesn't make sense to a lot of people."

Geeky fact: "It was supposed to come out around 9/11, but because it involves an aeroplane engine falling out of the sky it didn't get a proper release in the States at first."

Number of times I've seen it: "30."





THE DEPRESSING -AS-F**K ONE

REQUIEM FOR A DREAM

Darren Aronofsky, 2000

"It's a tragedy – four narratives about how addiction destroys lives. I first saw a clip of it on a plane and I was so captivated by the editing and visual style I sought out the whole thing. The film is devastating but it's fast-paced and surreal and dark and humorous too. Ellen Burstyn's performance is amazing, and it made me fall in love with Jennifer Connelly a little bit as well."

Did you know: "I've always been really obsessed with the score by Clint Mansell, and we sampled those amazing strings our first mixtape, 'Other People's Heartache'."

Bonus did you know: "The film is shot in Coney Island in New York, which is where we shot the official video for 'Flaws', too. But we had a much nicer time there than anyone in the film."

Number of times I've seen it:

"Probably 12. But it's way too depressing to watch that many times. I wouldn't show it to Kyle in the band, because it would destroy him."



THE OTT ONE

ROMEO + JULIET

Baz Luhrmann, 1996

"It was a film that looked and sounded like nothing else. It riffs on such a famous text and lives in this fantastical, completely ridiculous OTT space, so it dragged Shakespeare back into the lives of a generation. It straddles the right line between teen heartthrob hysteria and creativity. It's a big sugar rush of a film."

Did you know: "I got really into the idea of using this film as a template aesthetic for our next album. But then it feels like I've seen a lot of people walking around in Hawaiian shirts, so I'm not sure any more."

Number of times I've seen it: "Four."

NEW ALBUM

"We never really stop writing and recording, but I can confirm we spent a lot of this year writing our third album. We wanted to do something that feels a bit different, wanted to take it a step on from our last record and acknowledge that since we released that album the world seems an even more bizarre and tempestuous place, but to not necessarily dwell on that, and to make an apocalyptic party record instead. It's been fun playing with new sounds. We've put together a record of middle-of-the-night torch songs with elements of slightly nostalgic rave beats from the Fatboy Slim, Prodigy era. It sounds ridiculous but we want to make something that feels concise and short and for the night-time."

NEW OUTLOOK

"The new album acknowledges that we live in very strange times that are hard to ignore, but if the last record was us taking the blue pill in *The Matrix*, talking about the world, questioning it, being confused by it, this one is us taking the red pill. We've spent the last year singing songs about how abhorrent we find Donald Trump and Theresa May and people who preach

hate and bigotry, with a stage production that involves footage of a shadowy politician figure. I'm proud of the production we toured but I've had these moments too... we played a festival called Rock am Ring this summer that was shut down because of a terrorist threat. It dawned on me that people look to music and art for escapism too, and I wanted to make sure we find the right balance."

NEW COVERS

"We've been working on a cover of Green Day's 'Basket Case' for a TV show called *The Tick*. As a Green Day fan I was hesitant to touch that song because it's such a classic and it's one I love loads. Rather than try and do something similar, we did it just with strings, brass and orchestral production."

NEW MIXTAPE

"We have a mixtape coming at the end of the year – 'Other People's Heartache Volume 4'. Having spent years on our first record and three years on our second record, I like the idea of putting this mixtape out within months of having made it and then following it up with our third album. It's a bunch of very weird covers, a bunch of new tunes and some surprising collaborations. I can't tell you what's on it yet, but it will be out this year, with the album to follow early next year."

JOHN BOYEGA

HONEST JOHN

King of the rebooted *Star Wars* films. Star of the hard-hitting new civil rights film *Detroit*. The most exciting young actor the UK's produced in ages. John Boyega's a cool, straight-talking motherf**ker. Dan Brightmore meets him

DETROIT DEPICTS a night of police brutality in 1967, but still resonates with our contemporary chaos, especially in the US. Can we do more to heed warnings from history?

"This movie is no longer an escape from our reality – it's an in-depth look at it. You go outside and hear the same things are still going down. You watch *Detroit* knowing there's a part for you to play right now. It's not a film where all that injustice is ended and done, it's asking you: what's your role in this? I've questioned myself on that and understand I've failed at meeting those responsibilities, even just in clarifying it's not a responsibility for me to shoulder."

Do you hope *Detroit* can start a positive conversation and help us make sense of the violence and conflict in the world?

"I feel like if you have the truth it doesn't necessarily give you the right to say it, if the intentions and the goals aren't right. There's a new reference of mine and you guys can have it: 'clickbait clarity'. That's where a lot of us are getting our information from now. There'll be a funny, funky title the media puts out for us. We click on it, gain clarity, look at a video and then we just react, showing passion or some form of regard for an issue. We all know that really, deep down, it's just temporary. After five minutes, you're on to the next thing. But *Detroit* forces you to have an in-depth conversation. Not only with the people you've seen the film with, but with yourself. That's what makes it so intriguing – your mind is taking in scenarios from different perspectives. I hope there's more of that rather than just reactions on Twitter."

What do you take from your experience with *Star Wars* that helps you on a film like this?

"No movie has ever intimidated me, big or small. The smaller movies can actually be more challenging because it requires you to be the machine and make them. I don't 'make' *Star Wars*, you're a part of that machine, a piece of the puzzle. *Detroit* has been the biggest step in my career... Kathryn Bigelow brings out a certain kind of performance from actors which gives you more confidence."

Oscar Isaac [who plays Poe] told *NME* you really get to understand who your characters are in a crisis in *The Last Jedi*. What's your take?

"I think Oscar stole that line from me! The friendships are there, strong bonds that get tested. *The Force Awakens* set up these new characters of Finn, Poe and Rey, and everything is moving forward. *Star Wars* fans have demanded much more clarity and you'll get that."

You've shared a picture of Finn undercover in a First Order uniform on your Instagram feed and said there's still a chance for him to be the best he can be. What can we expect from his journey in *The Last Jedi*?

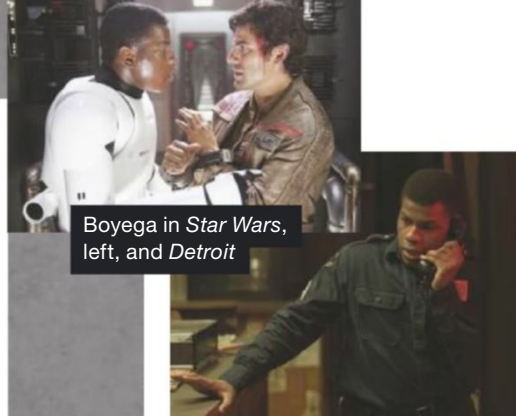
"He played his part with the Resistance and wants to get away from the war, head to the Outer Rim and find Rey. Loyalties are tested but expect Finn to get back in the action."

Isaac confessed to not knowing who Gary Barlow was when his cameo was announced. Is there anyone you've been introduced to who was famous in their field but you didn't have a clue and had to play along?

"Man, I can't lie to you. When I'm on a red carpet it's 95 per cent of those people! To be honest, I don't pretend and I'll just ask their name. I'll always introduce myself, it's the right way to do things, because what if the person has never seen *Star Wars*?"

Has it been difficult to adjust to being so recognisable that even the release of a Finn action figure has people guessing at *Star Wars* plot lines?

"It's a strange thing... But I was in Tesco yesterday and no one bothered me. I don't feel the intensity of celebrity when I'm just living my life. I'll get the odd person say, 'Hi!' For now, that's how it is. I'm sure that will change after *Episode 8*!"

What's the weirdest moment you've had with a fan?

"I was doing a play at the Old Vic and this guy followed me from there to my friend's house. When I was on the road outside he was stood there with a picture of me and a pen. He says, 'Oh, John Boyega!' acting as if he just saw me. I'm like, 'Dude, that's wack!' But it's mostly positive."

What keeps you grounded and stops you from getting too 'Hollywood'?

"When I wasn't in the public eye and I looked at celebrities, I never added this whole seasoning to their lifestyle and separated them from everyone else. If a bullet was coming towards them they'd jump out of the way, the same as I would. I've lived 20 years as a normal person and it's only been two years of fame. It's not gonna rewrite all my stupid habits – but check me in 10 years!"

What are the habits you have to keep in check?

"I like to go shopping by myself... But I also like to iron my own damn clothes and clean my own house. I do the stuff we all do and that doesn't change. The house is different! But it doesn't change me because of that. Things get elevated by our clickbait culture but I'm not into that. You might see an actor surrounded by bodyguards but most of the time that's just the movie studio, so that imagery, that elevation, is not necessarily the person. That's why I think I get along with people, whether they're well known or not, because I don't care. If you're cool, then you're cool!"

What was your highlight from the last ever Secret Garden Party festival?

They were in the 'Where The Wild Things Are' section, set in a woodland area of the grounds. IT'LL COME AS NEWS TO no one that Queens Of The Stone Age man mountain Joshua Homme likes a bit of a boogie. The bequiffed high priest of desert rock has always imbued his full-throttle stoner sound with a certain amount of hip-shaking sass, but on 'Villains', he truly lets his dancing shoes take the floor.

The heavy-duty rockers' last album, 2013's portentous 'Like Clockwork' was packed full of cameo appearances from their famous friends, Elton John and Arctic Monkeys' Alex Turner included, but on album number

seven only one guest has been allowed through the studio doors. Mark Ronson is the sharp-suited interloper, here to offer up his funky-up pop production skills after Homme decided he wanted the dry, tight sound the Brit showcased on 'Uptown Funk'.

Those worried that QOTSA might have gone full Sheeran needn't be concerned – this is definitely still the same band who came slinking out of the sand-strewn wilds of California in 1998. 'Villains'

brings a smooth shot of disco to the band's sleazy shtick, kicking off with the punchy 'Feet Don't Fail Me', which bursts into vibrant, glitzy life after well over a minute of moody sonic foreplay. The sinister swagger powers on through 'The Way You Used To Do' and 'Head Like A Haunted House's glam-tastic 1970s stomp. The pace slows for the meditative 'Fortress' and stealthy 'Hideaway', but this is still QOTSA at peak party.

Written after the tragic terrorist attack at an Eagles Of Death Metal – Josh's other band – show at Paris's Bataclan venue in 2015, it's hard not to see 'Villains' as a response, offering up a vibrant kind of escapism. While not mentioning the incident directly, it heralds the power of partying as a release. As Homme told *NME* earlier this year, "Queens has always been like an ice-cream parlour or a video arcade. It's safe from the bulls**t of the day. I'm not interested in being topical in that way, yet at the same time it's completely about now." This, then, is the sound of living in the moment and it's glorious. **Leonie Cooper**

ROCK SOFT MULLETS

IMAGINE, somewhere on the LA airwaves, there's a station that you can only pick up from a convertible radio after midnight. Its skunk-blasted DJs play nothing but the distant, hazy sound of '80s soft rock – Bryan Adams, Foreigner, Don Henley's 'Boys Of Summer', Eric Carmen's 'Hungry Eyes' – merged together into an endless narcotic drawl of slick nightrider riffs and husky vocals that sound like Bruce Hornsby flicking a mullet over the raised collar of a red leather jacket.

This, essentially, is where the music of The War On Drugs' Adam Granduciel lives, and lovers of the plush paranoia of 2014's breakthrough album

'Lost In The Dream' will be relieved that his fourth outing doesn't touch that dial. From the opening highway piano judder of 'Up All Night' it's like losing yourself once more in some lost golden age of MOR.

But Granduciel is a reinventor rather than a recreator – his vision of '80s pop-rock is warped through the prism of second-wave shoegaze.

These songs revel in their spaciousness, like three-minute drivetime anthems from 1986 set free from their radio edits to muck around with 2017's oddest noises for seven minutes at a time. Granduciel's music is such a sumptuous wallow we don't mind moving forward by the inch.

This is the only War On Drugs that should continue, because it's working. Tune in. **Mark Beaumont**

POP ELECTRO DARK

DARK, SEXY, grown-up – not adjectives you would previously have associated with Massachusetts trio PVRIS, who were until recently poised to clamber their way to the position of electropop-punk heroes. After 2014's debut album 'White Noise' and its killer singles 'Fire' and 'St Patrick' rose up the charts, PVRIS could have followed the tried and tested route to fame by dialling back the heavy and upping the pop. Hey, it's worked for Paramore (they're still epic) and even Avenged Sevenfold (they're just as heavy, less screamy).

What PVRIS have somehow managed to do

is keep everything they put into the first record, but add a darkness that's taken their game to a whole new level.

Although 'All We Know Of Heaven, All We Need Of Hell' is not heavy in the traditional sense, it's still weighty and cloying. Opener 'Heaven' roars and rumbles along to an

awe-inspiring close and the foot-stomping synthpop of 'What's Wrong' will surely be an instant hit. 'Separate' is darker than anything they've

done before, with singer Lyndsey Gunnulfson slithering along it in all the right ways. It's the kind of track you want to hear at a festival as the sun dips, when you know s**t is about to go down. By the time 'No Mercy' arrives, there's no escaping how catchy this record is. **Anita Bhagandas**

Girls gone homicidal

Broad City stars bring their unique surreal humour to this darkly funny buddy comedy

BACHELORETTE MURDER

BROAD CITY HAS BEEN one of the most influential TV comedies in recent years and *Rough Night* sees three of its stars bring its surreal, boundary-pushing humour to the silver screen. Ilana Glazer stars as the familiar Frankie, an unemployed weed smoker who's also something of a

firebrand, while the movie was created by Lucia Aniello (recurring director on the US programme) and Paul Downs (the show's overzealous gym trainer Trey).

Like the hit series, *Rough Night* succeeds at being out of the ordinary. Yes, there are scenes in the club, sexual innuendo aplenty and heartwarming moments of true friendship and bonding, but it also throws more plotline curveballs than any other bachelorette-themed female buddy movie going.

Jess (Scarlett Johansson) is an uptight politician running for office while also trying to

prepare for her wedding day. If that wasn't stressful enough, she's heading off to Miami to celebrate her last days as a single woman with her chaotic old college roommates (Glazer, Jillian Bell and Zoë Kravitz) and Pippa (the lung-burstingly funny Kate McKinnon), her best friend from a year abroad in Australia.

What starts off as a weekend of fun soon descends into one of bickering, b***hiness and – when an apparent stripper turns up at their plush beach rental – a bit of accidental murder. The ensuing cover-up is where the film really comes into its own. When a phone call with Jess's fiancé Peter (Downs) is abruptly ended so he doesn't catch on that something's not right, he leaves his own, far more civilised party to drive through the night, encountering a series of hilarious obstacles along the way.

The women's attempts to

dispose of the body, meanwhile, land them in situations that are both farcical and gripping, causing the characters' flaws to pierce through the veneer of wacky jokes with alarming pace. It's this that makes you root for them – even Bell's jealous and insecure Alice – and, ultimately, what makes each minute increasingly watchable. *Rough Night* is comedic carnage that will leave you in hysterics and, quite possibly, with a new fear of hen dos. **Rhian Daly**



This is America, right now

A film about the 1967 race riots that feels sadly relevant

RACE RIOTS TRUMP

IN THE SUMMER OF 1967, one of the largest riots in the history of the US erupted in Detroit, Michigan. The event that sparked it was relatively small-scale – the raiding of an unlicensed club frequented by African-Americans – but the kindling was centuries of oppression by arrogant white forces. The anger hit breaking point and over five days the city burned; 43 were killed and many hundreds were injured. Kathryn Bigelow, the Oscar-winning director of *The Hurt Locker*, depicts those days in one of the most gripping films of the year so far.

Few directors can pace a film like Bigelow, who keeps the start of *Detroit* almost languid, watching her ensemble as they go about their evening even as the riots are gaining speed. A young singer and his friend wait for their chance to become stars in a talent show. Two

women flirt their way around a motel. A group of friends joke about teasing the cops who've overtaken their city. Bigelow ratchets this up with expert timing, brilliantly showing how insignificant events can snowball. The firing of a harmless cap gun leads to an astonishing hour of cinema.

The centre of the film is a clash between three police officers, led by Krauss (Will Poulter), whose baby face masks a monster, and a group of young people, mostly black, who are in the wrong place at the wrong time. The officers want to assert their authority and find the person who 'shot' at them. Their captives just want to get out alive. Not all of them will. It's an agonising sequence, weak men doing horrible things to bellow their strength. It's frequently very hard to watch but impossible to turn away from.

There are a few times when the dialogue is a bit tin-eared, particularly an unnecessary 'not all white people' moment when one man escapes, and later scenes can't help but lose the iron grip of the standoff. Those are small quibbles. This is an urgent, maddening, superbly made film and its relevance to what is happening right now in America could not be clearer.

Lao Ra

South America's most audacious pop export, sometimes eats worms

A FIRST DAY AT SCHOOL is daunting for most, but for Lao Ra it became a statement of intent. In front of the entire class at her school in Bogotá, Colombia, she picked up a worm from the ground and ate it in one go. "I had to do something to have people respect me," she says. "I wouldn't do that today, though – that's f**king gross."

This story encapsulates everything great about the 25-year-old. Her music is a fiery mix of bombastic pop music, with a welcome Latin twist – but she doesn't play by any rules other than her own. Her 2016 debut EP featured the rebellious 'Jesus Made Me Bad', and her live shows are proving to be the hottest ticket in town. "When I play, I'm a fireball," she says.

She had enough time to stoke that fire, though. A move to the UK at age 18 saw Ra live in Guildford briefly and then take on odd-jobs as a carer, a breast model and doing PR for a smoke alarm company – basically everything apart from making music. It was a chance meeting with her now-manager at a London curry house in 2015 that saw her finally unleash her musical potential: "I started to do exactly what I wanted, without any kind of restrictions."

Since then, she's released a string of intoxicating singles – including the M.I.A.-esque 'Bala' and the dance-pop banger 'Body Bounce'. It's 'Bang Boom', though, where Lao Ra really cements her reputation. "Bang, shot me down / But I'm a pitbull, boom / Like a shark I'm gonna eat you," she warns in the song's chorus. Now, with a new single on the horizon, she's ready to take the next step and give her self-coined brand of "pineapple pop" a little kick. "I'm going in for the kill," she says. "I feel like my sound has matured. It's more like piña colada now – it's got that little rum twist. I wanna get you all drunk!" We'll drink to that. **Thomas Smith**

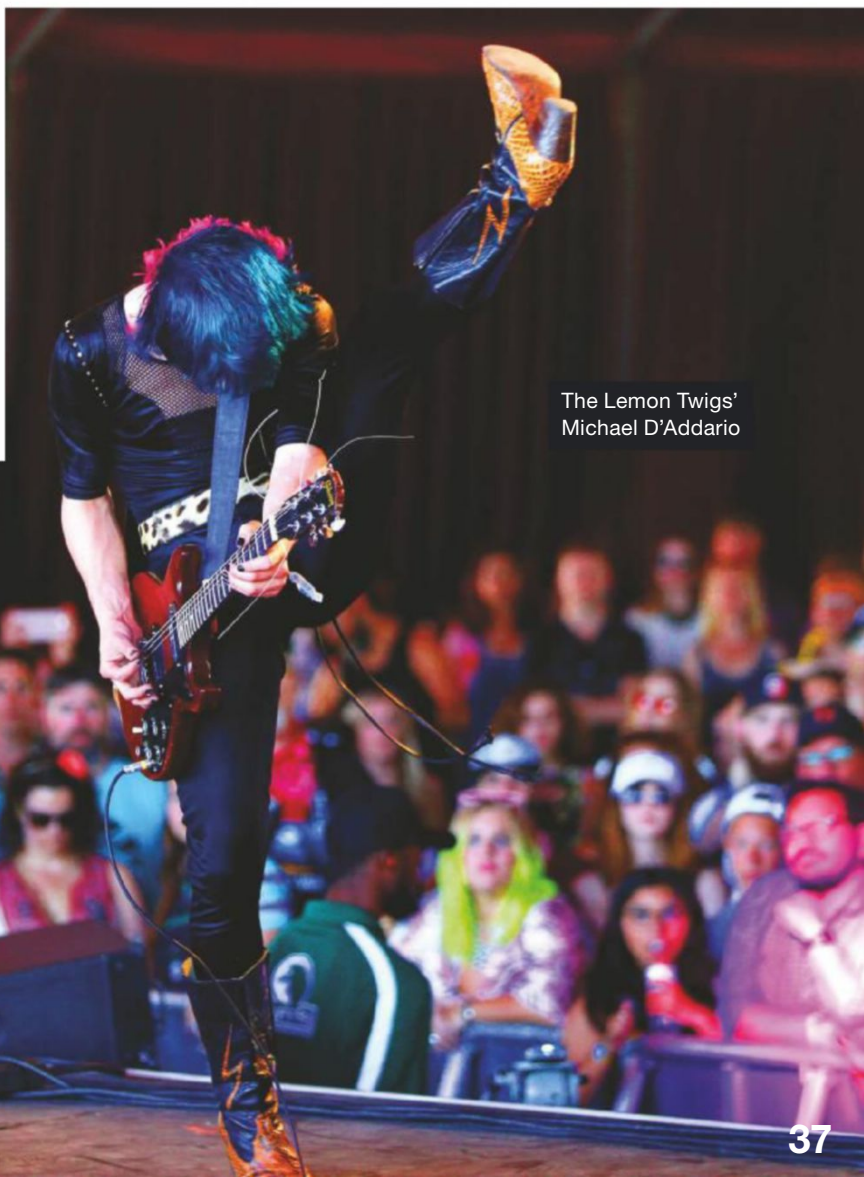

MUNGO JERRY

In The Summertime

"I remember this playing on the radio in my dad's kitchen. It was the early '70s and reminds me of summer and growing up. They were crazy-looking dudes. The main guy had that scary hippy thing going on – a bit like Jimi Hendrix."

"It was quite racy. Very adult-themed; something about a rubber doll. I was a bit embarrassed by it, Sting expressing his metrosexual concerns and all that. They were very good technically; you were allowed to like them if you were a slightly nerdy music type."

"Recently my boys have discovered James Brown and we dance quite a lot to that. I'm like some old funk dad strutting about the room pretending to be Johnny 'Guitar' Watson from back in the day."

THE FIRST GIG I WENT TO

WEATHER REPORT

"We went to Manchester with all my dad's mates when I was about 12 or 13. The gig was at the Manchester Apollo and I remember Jaco [Pastorius] jumping over some amps, flying onstage like a superhero. I caught his eye and he gave me a little knowing nod, as if to say, 'You're young, but I can see you're getting down with it.' It was really quite inspirational to me."

THE FIRST SONG I FELL IN LOVE WITH

JOHN MILES

Music

"I was eight and I sent my dad out to buy it because I liked it so much. I feel very weepy now when I hear it. The lyrics are quite naïve – almost like a nursery rhyme. It's also quite proggy and the whole construction of the song is really elaborate."

THE SONG I WISH I'D WRITTEN

BOB DYLAN

Blowing In The Wind

"I marvel at people like Dylan. This track still sends chills down my spine – the way he caught the zeitgeist and yet is so timeless. It's amazing, the command he has of all the influences that he's weaving together. He's also hilarious as a performer – the rhythm of his comedy is quite incredible. I missed Bob Dylan on the way up, so now I'm journeying back into his old stuff."

THE SONG I DO AT KARAOKE

"I had a go at this once live during a gig. I suddenly realised that it's really hard to be powerful and poetic in the way that he is. I was stumbling around and getting things wrong, thinking, 'Oh God, this is awful.' I overstretched a bit, I think."
